Halls Band Tops State



BOBBY WEBB, Halls Golden Tiger Marching Band director, got a free ride Saturday night in Mount Juliet after announcement that his band had placed first in Division I state competition and won the Governor's Challenge Cup.

Halls police waited at Gates to give the band followed by three miles of sired escort through Halls. At Halls High School, the band gave its winning show to a vast crowd of spectators, in the rain, at which the band has become expert!

Halls led preliminaries Saturday with 76.5, averaged with the final 80.1 to win with 78.3. Second place went to Goodpasture High School, of Madison, 73.8. Other finalists, chosen from 12 original participants, were Franklin Road Academy, of Nashville, 73.65; McKenzie High School, 69.9; Huntingdon, 68.15; Mount Pleasant, 64.3; Westmoreland, 63.15; and Lewis County, of Hohenwald, 59.45.

Halls Field Commanders Hope Harris and Jeff Prescott took first place over-all with 18.1 of 20. Second place went to Franklin Road Academy, with 14.9.

The color guard scored 13.7 of 20 in the finals to take second place. First place went to Huntingdon.

The contest was judged by the Bureau of Marching Music Adjudication, of Belleville, Ill., with eight professional band and drum and bugle corps judges (using caption judging), some on the field.

Mayor Joe Jacobs has proclaimed this Thursday "Band Day." He will read the proclamation in ceremonies on H. G. Conley Memorial Field at 1 p. m. The band will perform its state championship routine, public invited.

Halls Band Boosters will meet at 7 p. m. this Thursday in the band room.

Cotton, Late, Left Sodden

Cotton producers struggling with a crop that is two weeks late to begin with are now faced with the prospect of lower quality lint and reduced yields as the result of recent rains (9.43 inches in Ripley from Oct. 5th through Oct. 25th).

"We are finding rotten bolls," says Rickey Daniels. "I am scared to think what cotton will grade. It already had a gray color last week."

Lower temperatures at the proper application time have kept defoliants from working.

Sam Williams is applying Prepp, which contains ethrel, a material that causes bolls to open.

"I may leave big tracks in the field, but the amount of weight loss as well as quality makes it important that I harvest as soon as possible."

Final yields will be cut from those expected three weeks ago, when many of producers easily had one and one-half bale yields and some, I believe, would have made two.

Rain made soy beans, especially earlier varieties, such as Essex, which had dried down to harvesting moisture, swell and pop from pods.

The radical or "first root" at the top of the bean, next to the stem, also swelled. Under the right moisture and heat relationships, this could continue. If a producer can get the sunshine necessary for drying, a quick harvest probably can save these beans.

Grain sorghum, not already harvested—and we have at least 30% of our crops still in the field—was found sprouting. The danger of sorghum shattering, even during the rainy period, is a danger and could be even a

Wheat-30% acreage reduction (20% unpaid, 10% paid). Average loan rate \$3.30 per bushel, target price \$4.38, projected deficiency payment, \$1.08, diversion payment \$2.70.

Feed Grains-10% acreage reduction programs, for no pay. For corn, target price \$3.03 per bushel, national average loan \$2.55.

Upland Cotton-30% acreage reduction (20% acreage reduction program, 10% paid land diversion). Deficiency payments are estimated at 19.8¢ per pound, payment for land diversion at 30¢.

Jury Buys Only Escape Counts

Lauderdale County Circuit Court jurors, 30 minutes after given the case, convicted three men of escape from Fort Pillow State Prison Farm Feb. 18th but acquitted them of kidnapping the David Demps family, of Gates, of armed robbery in commandeering a car from James Hubert Harris and Ezell Miller, of Cherry, and of assault to murder Miller, Wayne Douglas, of Ripley, and Emily (Mrs. Phillip) Rhoads, of Fort Pillow.

Armand DeSollar, of 211 College, Halls, foreman of the 5-man, 7-woman jury, said Atty. Gen. Paul G. Summers, of Somerville, failed to convince the panel, in presenting three and a half hours of testimony by 11 witnesses, that the trio sought anything more than escape or that two—Randolph Oliver, 33, and Sulvester Alexander, 33—ever had a weapon.

Oliver's uncle, Riley Arzenaux, who at age 26 was serving 25 years for murder in Shelby County, was convicted of misdemeanor assault and battery in firing a shotgun at Douglas's car.

The defense contended shots were fired only at tires and that the trio's only intention was to join an escape led by James E. Clegg, 30, of Sullivan County, serving a life sentence as a habitual criminal, and Ronald Lewis Freeman, 41, of Knox County, serving 198 years on two counts of murder.

Freeman was slain by North Carolina officers on March 7th. Clegg faces the same charges as the trio Nov. 7th in Tipton County Circuit Court, where the three will appear for sentencing.

Escape carries a one to five year term. Arzenaux's misdemeanor up to 11 months, 29 days.

Oliver is serving life plus 35 to 40 years for assault to commit murder, rape, and robbery with a deadly weapon in Shelby County. Alexander is serving 40 years for

Decorating the party rooms were arrangements of roses from

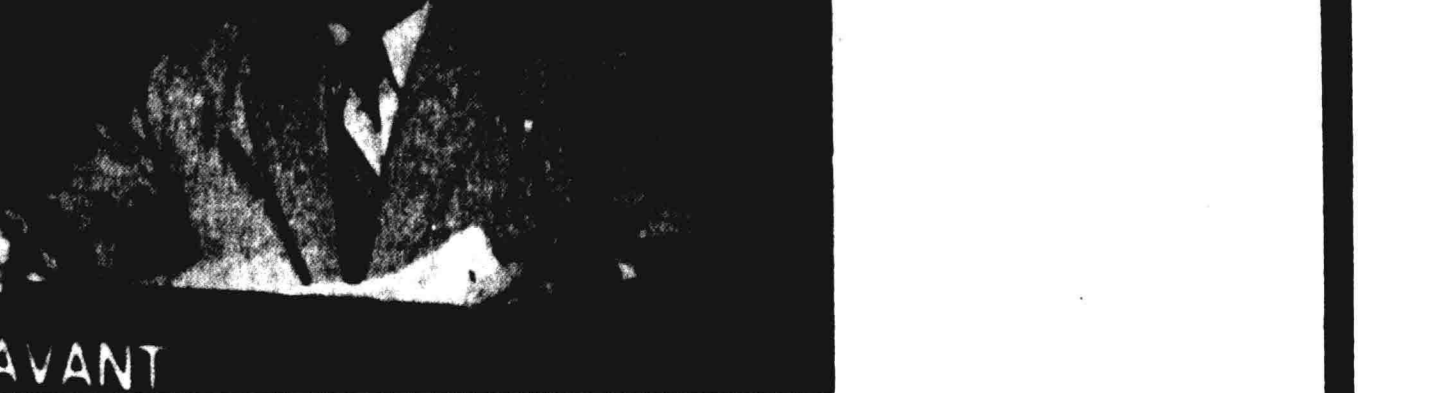

held between Presidential elections. However, there have been some encouraging signs. The same percentage of eligible people voted in 1980 as did in 1976. The 40 percent of those eligible that went to the polls in 1982 represented the first upswing in the number of people voting in mid-term elections in many, many years.

I am hopeful that this trend upward continues this year and into the future. There can be no more important activity than casting one's vote in elections, whether they be local, state, or federal. The right to vote has always been a fundamental precept of our democratic form of government. In this one visible act, each individual citizen chooses leadership, endows it with power, expresses one's own views on the conduct of government, and holds those in public office accountable. It is truly the symbol of the democratic experiment undertaken over 200 years ago by our Founding Fathers.

Make no mistake about it; the right to vote has been grudgingly given in many respects. Even in the beginning of our nation's history, the framers of our Constitution were uncertain, and frankly unable to reach an agreement, on what made a citizen eligible to vote. Some states imposed the qualification of landowner or taxpayer. Others used more ambiguous terms such as "those of sober and peaceful countenance". Through the years, those restrictions have been lifted slowly until today when the right to vote is given to all.

the electoral process. In 1964, when Lyndon Johnson and Barry Goldwater faced each other on election day, 69 percent of those eligible voted. In 1980, the number of those voting dropped down to 59 percent of those eligible. That same trend has been evident in the elections

I know that there are many who feel that their vote does not

count. There are just as many instances of when one vote decided an election. There is the story that goes around Washington of the Member of Congress who faced with primary opposition. He and his opponent came out with the same number of votes. In accordance with his state's constitution, the two drew lots to determine the winner. The Member of Congress lost and sank into political oblivion. That story ends because his secretary was too busy with office work to cast her ballot on election day.

No one can confirm whether or not the story is true, but it does illustrate how quirks of fate can change the course of an election. There are documented cases of one vote changing the outcome of a Presidential election. That occurred in both the elections of 1824 between John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson, and again in 1876 between Samuel Tilden and Rutherford

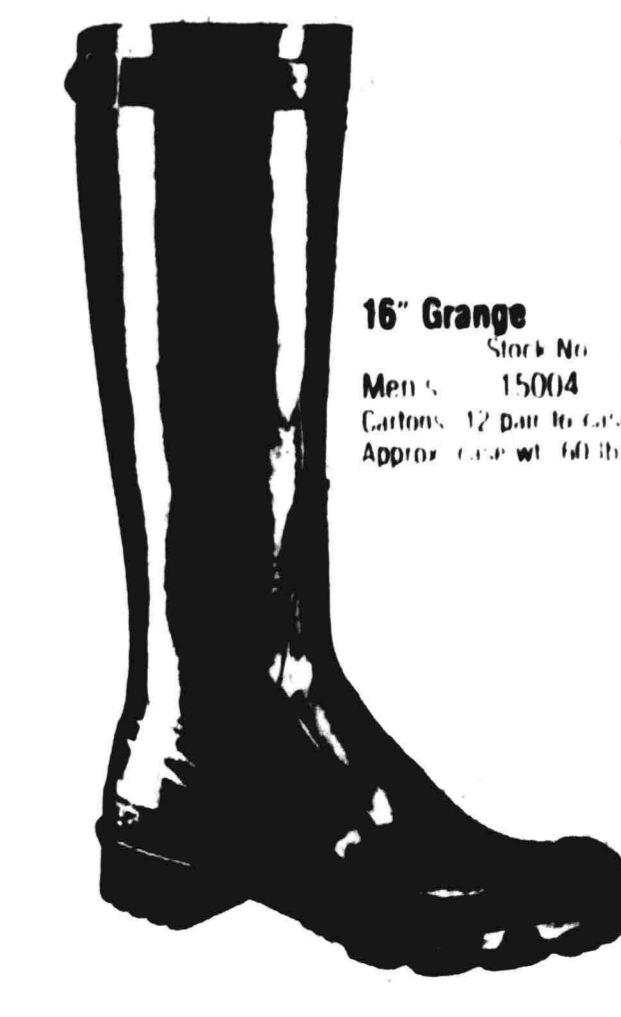

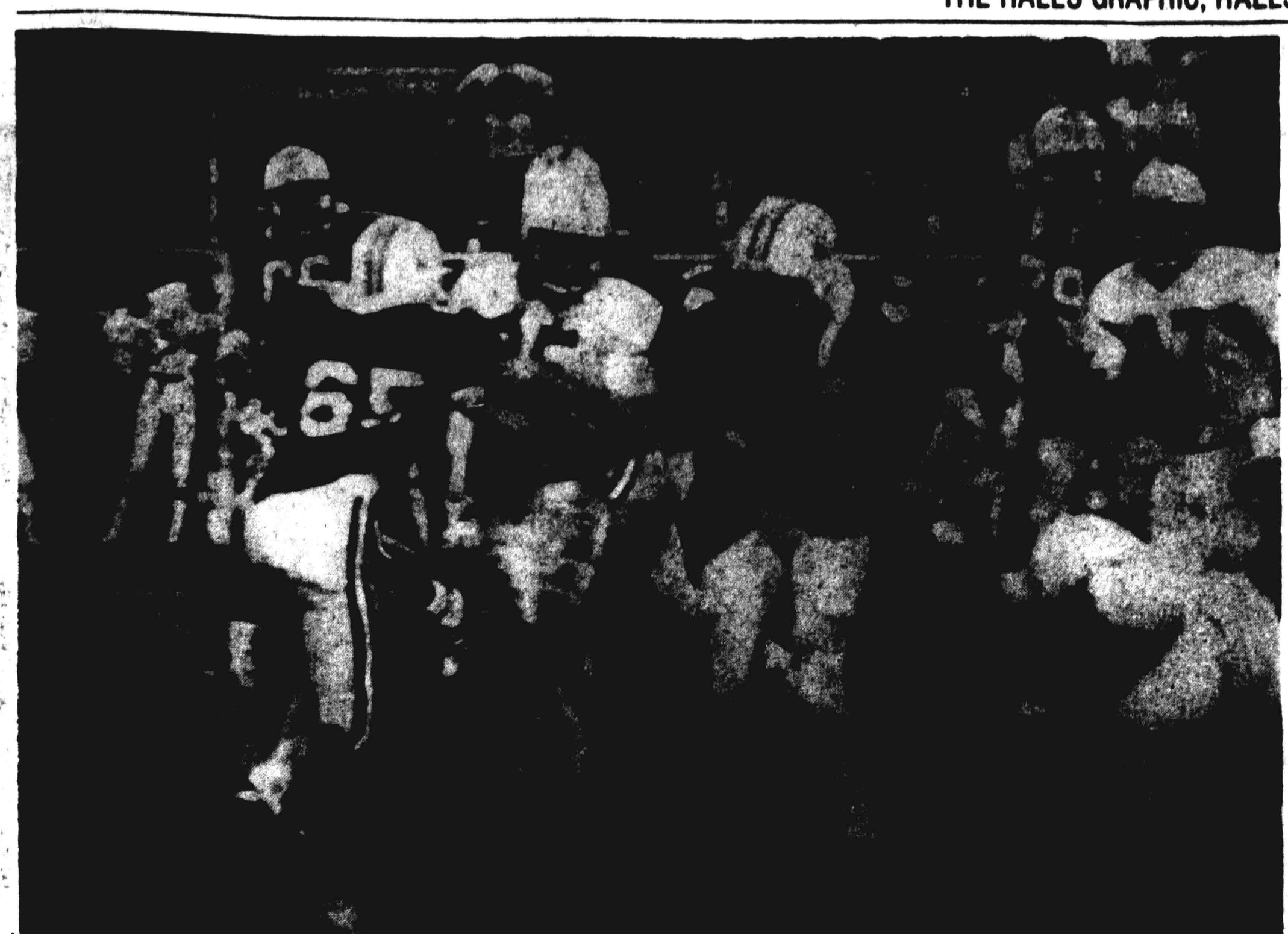

Halls Tigers Near Play-Off Position

The Halls Tigers will be on the road for their final two games of the regular season after a 29-12 win over visiting South Fulton last Friday night. They will play at Trenton Friday night and then go to Sharon next week for their final regional game.

Trenton will be the fourth Class AA eleven that the Tigers have faced this season and the first on the road. The Tigers have wins over Crockett County, Dyer County and Gibson County but will face much stronger opposition at Trenton and without the advantage of the home field. Trenton has a 4-3 record which includes wins over the three Tiger Class AA opponents and a surprising 20-13 defeat of McNairy Central at Selmer. McNairy Central had already clinched the District 14-AA playoff spot.

Halls has not yet clinched a Class A play-off spot. Both Sharon and South Fulton have a chance at second place in the district, though Sharon (9-2) must still meet South Fulton (1-2) and Halls (2-1).

A win Friday with South Fulton over Sharon would clinch the spot for Halls, or a Tiger win next Friday, should Sharon defeat South Fulton.

Play-off games begin Nov. 16th, with Bruceton at Lake County and Old Hickory hosting Halls, Sharon, or South Fulton. The Tigers fell behind 12-0 Friday night as the South Fulton Red Devils gained field position on two Tiger fumbles. Joey Hall drove in from the one-yard line for the first Red Devil score with 1:30 remaining in the first quarter. The try for two points was stopped.

Steve Simpson got the second South Fulton touchdown after a five-yard run and again the try for point was unsuccessful to give South Fulton a 12-0 lead with 1:23 remaining in the first half. The Tigers wasted no time in moving 74 yards for the first Tigers points. The touchdown came on a 6-yard pass from Sammy Burnette to Chris Dennis. Benjie Goodwin kicked the extra point to leave the Tigers trailing 12-7 at half time.

The Tigers gained the lead at 6:58 in the third quarter on a 40-yard run by Dennis for the touchdown and a pass from Burnette to Terry Lewis for the two-point conversion and a 15-12 Tiger lead. Charlie Wilder added to the

and bring their record to 6-2 for the season. The Tigers had eight first downs with 195 yards rushing and 85 yards passing for a total of 280 yards. The Red Devils posted 10 first downs with 115 yards on the ground and 117 yards passing for 232 yards. Burnette threw nine times with five completions and no interceptions for Halls. South Fulton put the ball in the air 35 times but could complete only 11 with three interceptions. Halls fumbled three times and lost all of them. South Fulton did not fumble.

Dennis led Tiger rushers with 120 yard on 18 carries. Malcolm Parker added 55 yards with 11 attempts. Dennis caught two passes for 19 yards and one touchdown; Richard Voss had one catch for 29 yards to set up the first Tiger touchdown. Bubba Wright and Terry Lents each caught a pass.

Joe Patrick led Halls defenders with 14 tackles and two interceptions. Voss got the other Tiger interception and seven tackles. Phil Hastings was credited with 11 stops. Dennis had seven and John Arwood six.

Ripley, Vs. Bolivar, Really Races Cats

Ripley High School's Tigers (5-1) host Bolivar Friday but will really be battling Haywood County (5-1) for the District 13-AAA crown.

Bolivar, 3-3, has almost no shot at the title, after narrowly failing to ambush Haywood last week; a Ripley win this Friday would put it out of contention and keep Ripley abreast of Haywood, 6-1, if Haywood tops Covington. Then if both Ripley and Haywood win their final games, from North Side and Jackson Central-Merry, respectively, Ripley gets the crown on its 21-20 defeat of Haywood.

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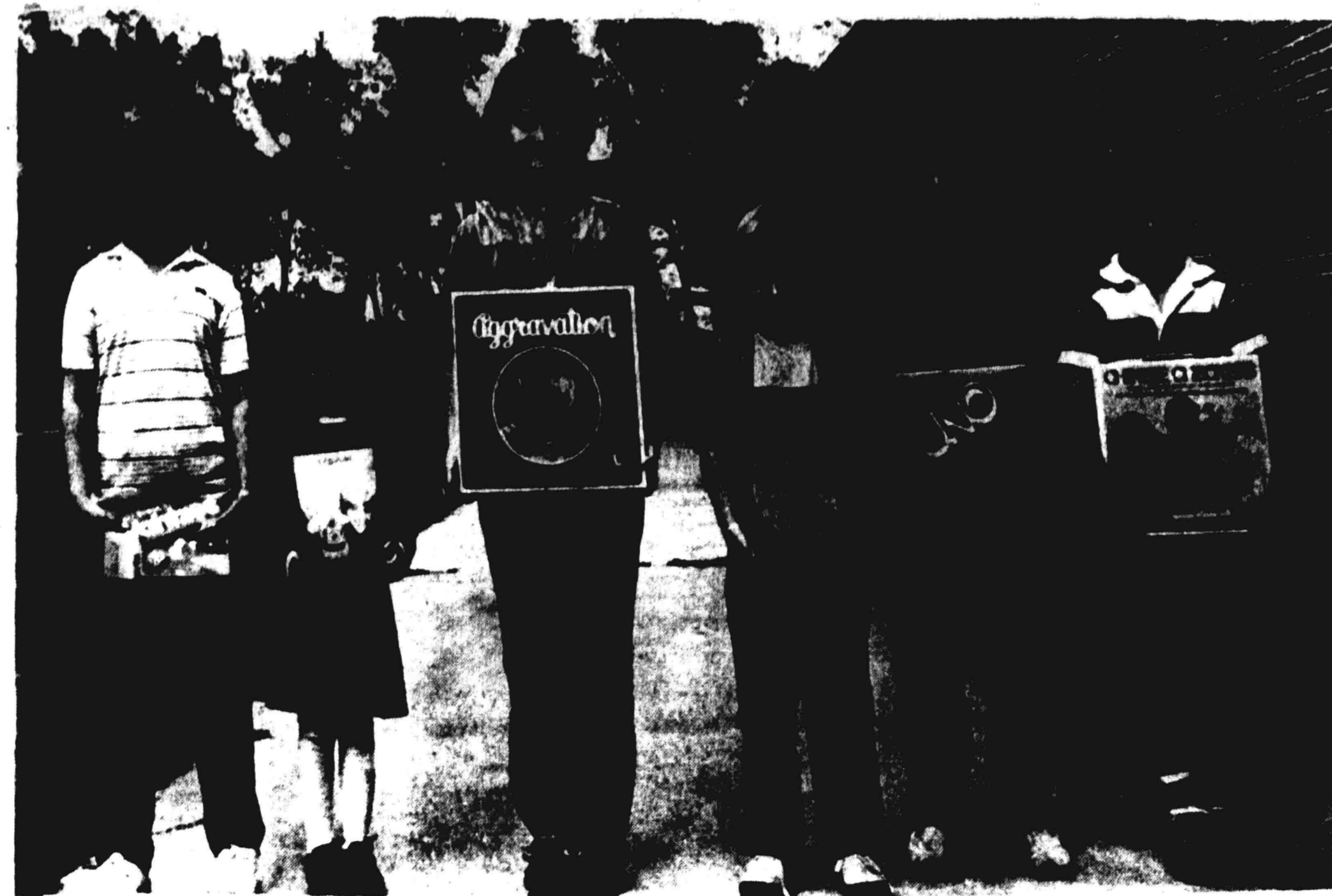

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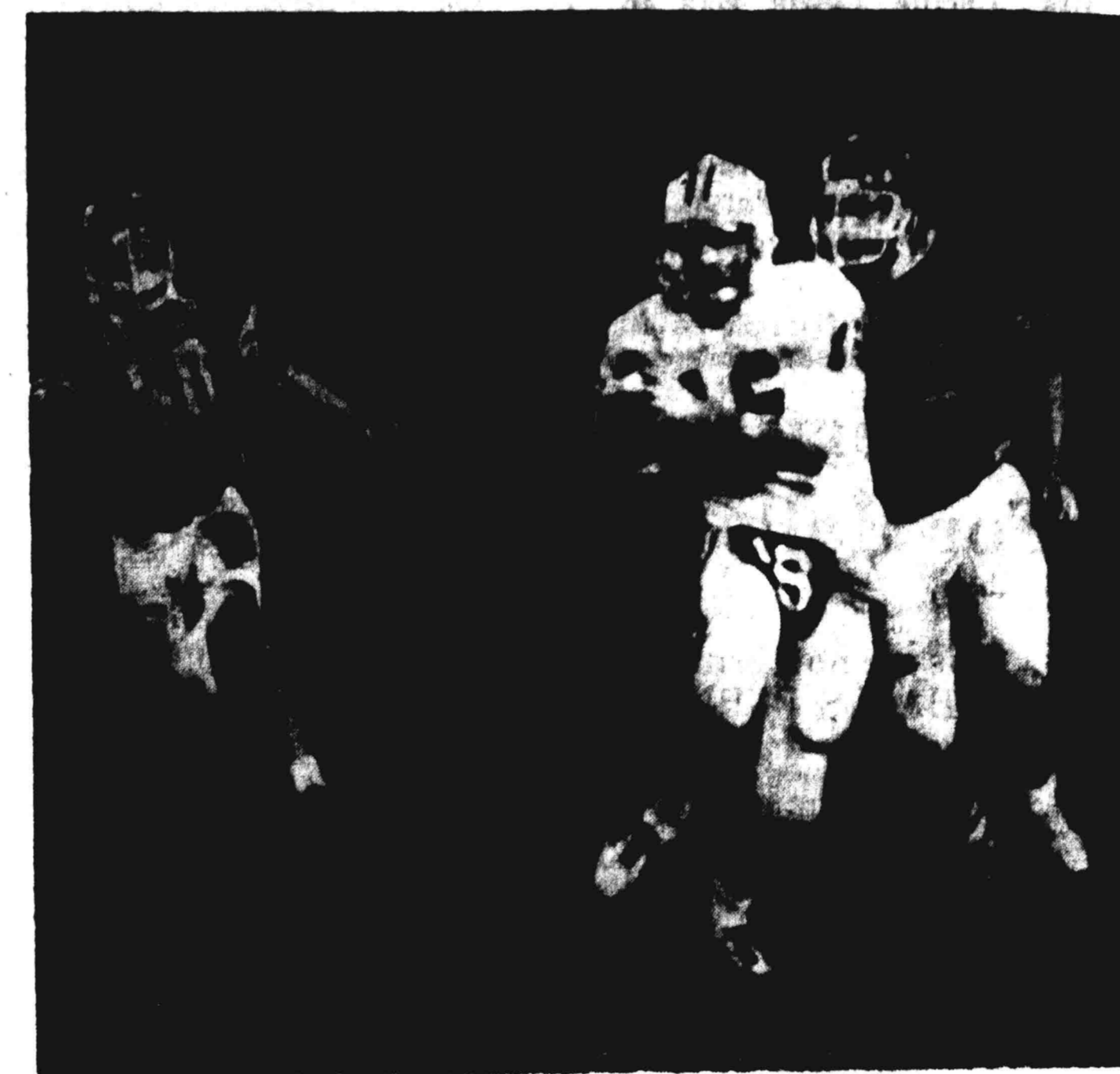

After a storm-shortened 47-14 victory in Sharon Friday, Halls High School's Tigers are preparing for their third appearance in the state play-offs in four years, still seeking their first play-off win.

With a 7-3 record, the Tigers will be slight favorites as they visit OHA, 8-2, at 7:30 p.m. Friday. If they win, they will host the next game, with the Region 5 winner—Columbia Academy or Moore County, both now 9-1.

Lake County, 9-0, only Region 7 team to top Halls, is a strong favorite as it hosts Bruceton, 5-4, this week. If it wins, it will play the Region 8 winner—Evangelical Christian School, of Cordova (now 10-0), last year's Class A champs, or Memphis Prep (now 3-6).

Coach Jerry Cecil's Generals, 3-6 last season, had 28 players return this fall, including several seniors, and they've made up in scrappiness what

Air Strategy Moderated

From the power I, Cecil expected much this fall from the strong arm of senior quarterback Rick Stonceper and got it in the Generals' debut, over Greenfield, 14-7. Cecil's 80th win as a head coach.

But receivers haven't been as dependable, and tailback John Sherrod (5-8, 150) has keyed the Generals' offense, on the ground. Sherrod's also stout from OHA's 50-defensive set, along with skilled linebacker Shannon Hughes, corner-back Tom Mullin, and end Ben Ross (6-1, 180). End Norm Teake gives OHA a potent kicking game.

2 Common Opponents

Halls and OHA have played two common foes this year.

OHA lost two fumbles, each team intercepted once. Gibson missed field goal tries of 39, 31, and 41 yards. Halls won decisively from Gibson, 37-8.

SBEC Simply Swamped

Last week, OHA dropped Southern Baptist Educational Center, of Memphis, to 2-8 with a 36-6 victory at home. Sherrod went 52 yards to score on the game's third play, added TD runs of one and 35 yards, took a conversion pass from Stonceper, and got 155 yards in 10 carries, of 246 rushing for OHA.

The Generals linked two of 14 passes for 56 yards, one a 36-yard scoring toss to Don Phillips. Hughes had a 2-yard TD, 15 tackles, two interceptions, and a fumble recovery. Jack Tucker had 13 hits and regained a fumble. Sherrod had nine stops and deflected two passes. Ross and Trebor Jelks intercepted.

Sharon Was Overtaken

The Tigers were off to a slow start on a rain-soaked field Friday, trailing Sharon 14-13 after the first quarter. They came to life in the second quarter for 20 points and added 14 in the third, before the game was cut short by threatening lightning and storm conditions. Benjie Goodwin opened Tiger

scoring with a 33-yard run and kicked the point.

Sharon quarterback Mike Wiley caught the Tigers napping when he kept the ball on a quarterback draw and dashed 60 yards to score. An attempt for two failed.

Chris Dennis put the Tigers on the board again with a 4-yard run, but Goodwin's kick was wide. Sharon then took its only lead when half-back Bruce Taylor hit Troy Nanne with a 59-yard pass. Taylor ran for the 2-point conversion to make it 14-13.

Through county, city, and local funds, the current facility—a former automobile service station with circa 1930 Spanish style architecture—was renovated and occupied in January, 1982.

Since the 1977 board, others serving on the board include Jerrie Palmer and Marcus Spiller. Current members are Pat Higdon, Betty Lovelace, Connie Moore, Jerry Criffield, Allen Tillman, Lucille Moore and Nannie Leake.

Marie Sumrow became the librarian in May, 1984; Camille Pitta is the assistant librarian.

As a participant in the Forked Deer Regional Library Center, which is part of the Tennessee State Library and Archives, the library provides services to 1,030 registered borrowers.

The grant is part of funds in the amount of \$910,680 for library projects in 12 counties in Tennessee, including Lauderdale.

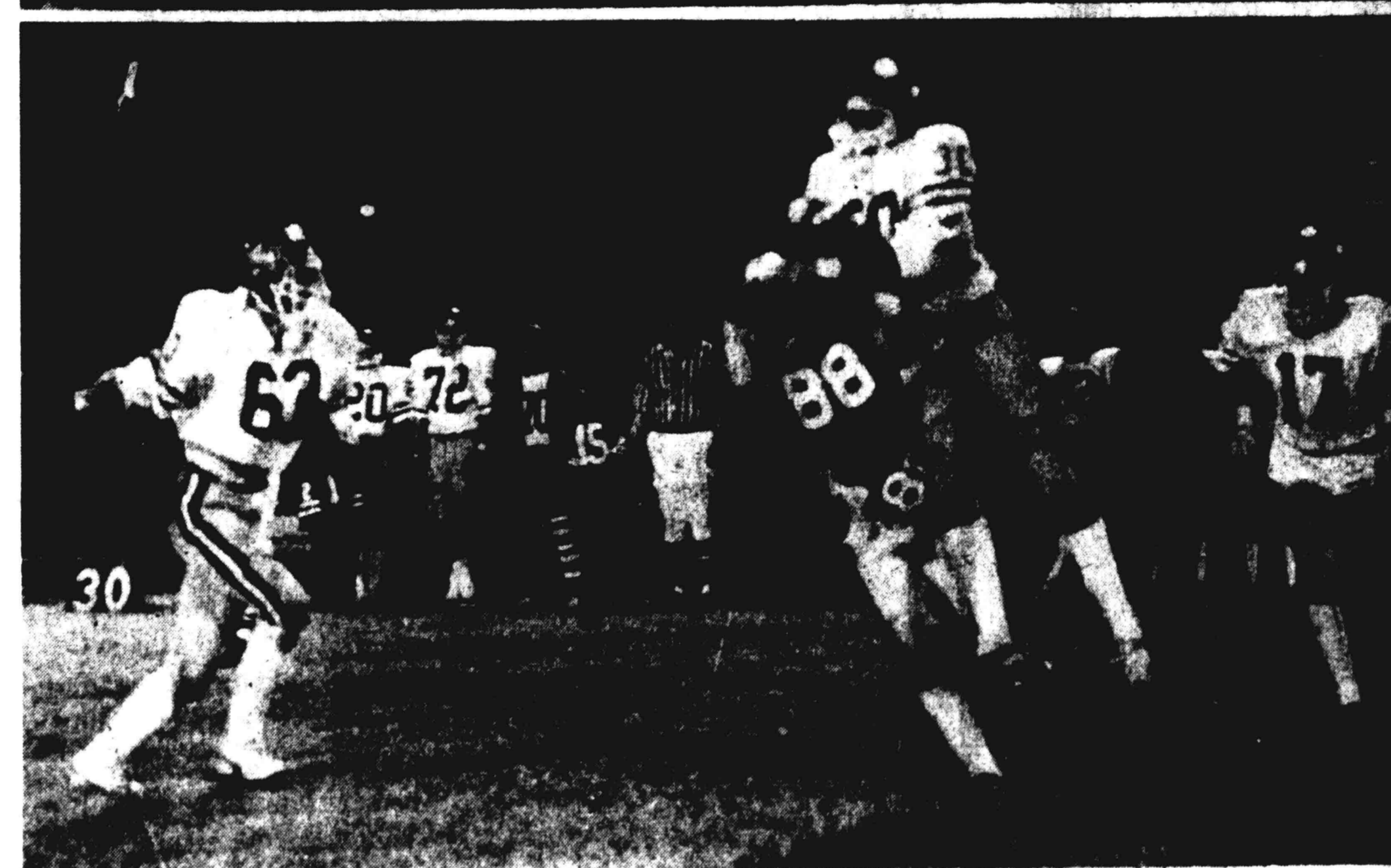

Halls Plays Host For The 1/4-Final

With a come-from-behind win last week, 13-10, from Old Hickory Academy in Jackson, Halls High School's Tigers advance to the state play-off quarter-finals at 7:30 p.m. this Friday, hosting the Region 5 champions, Columbia Academy's Bulldogs (tickets on sale at HHS and at both Halls banks).

Lake County, hosting Bruceton, led 32-0 at the half last week and won 39-20. This week, the Falcons visit the defending Class A state champs of Evangelical Christian School in Memphis, who last week kept their record unblemished with a 28-0 defeat of Memphis Prep.

In the last three minutes, Christian Brothers full-back Stacy Brown went 57 yards to drop Ripley's District 13-AAA's champs from the Region 7 play-offs, 14-7.

David Vs. Goliath Clash, In Enrollment
Coach Rick Barker's Columbia Academy squad of 29 comes from a school with an enrollment of only 111 sophomores through seniors; only 24 of 115 Class A schools have less.

Halls, with 292, is runner-up to the largest school in the class, Goodlettsville, with 295.

Seven freshmen, eight sophoms, six juniors, and eight seniors have run CA's record to 10-1, to 8-3 for Halls.

They've run up scores like 40-6 over Cornersville and Wayne County and took their first-ever District 10-A crown with a 31-21 victory over Maury County rival Spring Hill (enrollment 164), averaging a 10-7 loss for the title last year.

Trailing in the district were Collinwood (262, 2-2), Wayne County (274, 1-3), and Lynnville Richland (250, 0-4).

Only Loss Reversed In State Play-Offs

CA's only loss this season, to 10th-ranked Moore County, of Lynchburg (189, 9-1 for the regular season and District 9-A champs, 4-0, over Chapel Hill Forest, 3-1, and Cornersville, Huntland, and Wartrace Cascade, 1-3), was redeemed last week when CA met Moore in the state play-offs, CA winning 3-0 on a 22-yard field goal by Richard Farris.

CA held Moore to five first downs, 44 yards passing, and 61 yards rushing.

CA's Freddy Vialock rushed for 56 yards in 18 carries and recovered a fumble.

Team-mate Thomas Riley got 54 yards in 12 carries.

Halls Coach Andy Pugh expects a washbone attack with power and sturdy defense.

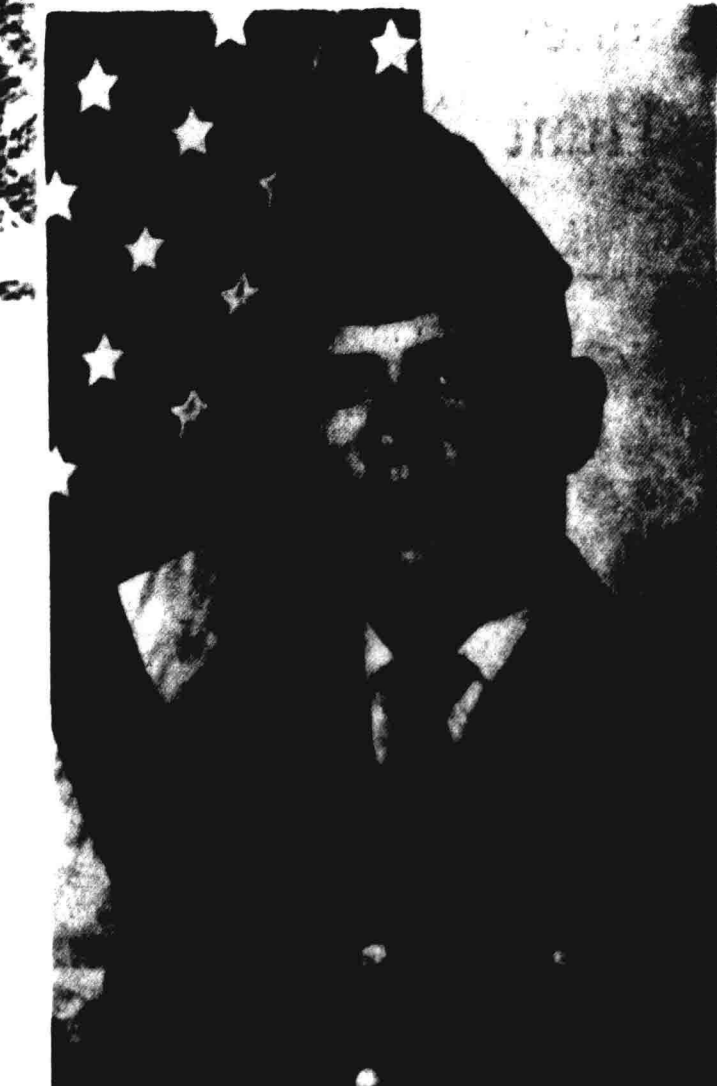

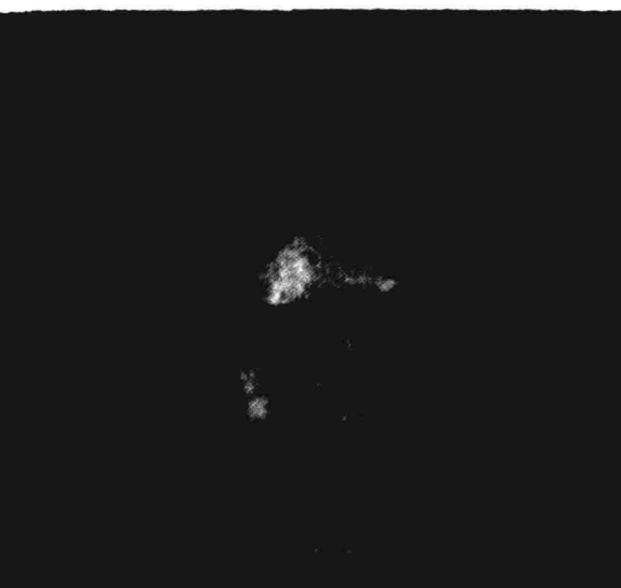

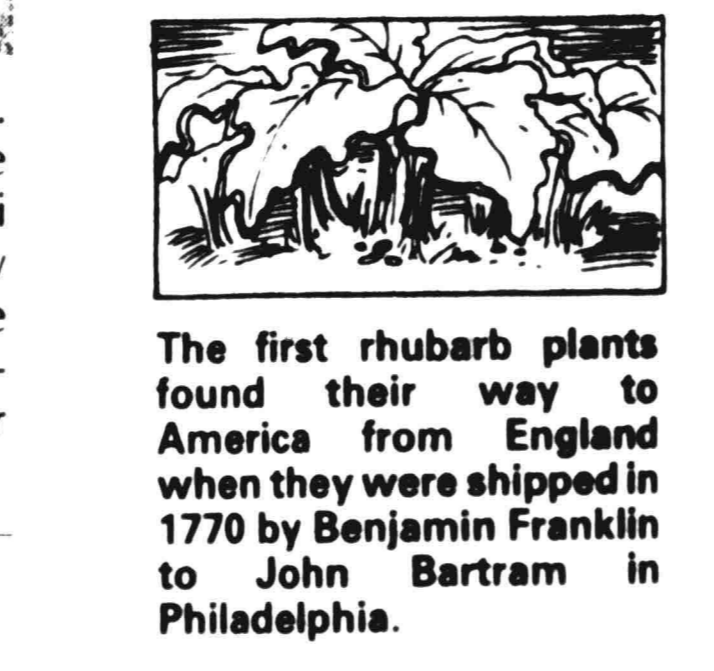

Today's news always seems to focus on the bad things that happen—disasters, outbreaks of violence both at home and abroad, difficulties in the economy, and the like. This year has been no exception. While there have been continued improvements in the economy, our own district is still feeling the effects of relatively high unemployment and serious financial difficulties for many farmers.

Maple syrup provides North American touch

This history of food is rife with imities. Foods which today are commonplace were delicacies decades or centuries ago. Equally, today's rarities—born of diminishing supply or simply the advent of convenience foods and supermarket shopping—were yesterday's staples.

Maple syrup, an intrinsic part of our ancestors' pantry, is a case in point. Before sugar was available on the North American continent, sweetening was effected by means of two foods—honey, gleaned from the hives of bees imported from Europe, and maple syrup, which originated in North America.

Today, honey is enjoying a resurgence of popularity because of the interest in "natural" foods; however, maple syrup, which is an extremely labor-intensive product and is produced in only a relatively small area of the U.S. and Canada, has become both costly and hard to come by.

The sweeter upon which past generations of Americans relied (our colonial forbears consumed four times the amount of maple syrup we do today, and it remained the foremost sweetener in the northeastern part of the continent till the end of the 19th century) is now a scarcity.

Yet, it is eminently worth seeking out for its unique flavor (popular pancake syrups which are largely composed of corn syrup are not adequate substitutes), and for the special touch it adds, not only to freshly made pancakes and waffles, but as a cooking ingredient as well.

In fact, it was originally utilized in precisely that way, by the native American Indians for whom maple sugar was not simply their only sweetener, but virtually their only flavoring.

When the European settlers first arrived in North America, they discovered the native Americans freely taping sugar maple and black maple trees for sap (which is particularly sweet, since it is largely water) which could be boiled down to become maple syrup and maple sugar.

The Indians willingly taught the settlers how to do this, ensuring the settlers a free and plentiful source of sweetener for baking and cooking.

Much of the uniqueness of maple syrup derives from the specific conditions needed to produce it. Climatic requirements have turned maple syrup into a product of a small geographic area—namely the northeastern United States and the Canadian provinces of Quebec and Ontario—and all attempts to coddle the maple tree into yielding the precious sap in other regions have been a signal failure.

This is because the maple tree requires a long period of cool weather (usually the late winter through early spring) during which the temperatures remain above freezing while nighttime temperatures dip below the freezing mark.

The uncertainty of how long this syndrome will persist each year results in a maple syrup output which can vary greatly from spring to spring, with maple syrup seasons as short as a week and as long as six weeks.

"Sugaring off" occurs, therefore, in the spring, and to country people serves as a harbinger of warm weather to come and as a reason for celebration.

The sap which is boiled down to make maple syrup and sugar is not the maple tree's ordinary sap, but a special secretion whose purpose mystifies botanists.

This sap is extracted with great care (the native Americans used a tomahawk to gain access to it), the early colonists used wooden spoons, while today metal spoons are used) and gathered in buckets for boiling over hot oil or wood fires. (The American Indians boiled the sap by inserting heated stones into the bark containers which held the sap.)

Fresh snow, creating a sweet and chewy treat. Some regions do not enjoy "sugar on the snow" at "sugaring off" time; rather, they freeze fresh snow and prepare the delicacy on a steamy summer's day.

Fresh maple syrup will last a long time if properly stored. It should last for months, kept in the refrigerator. For longer storage, freezing is recommended though, before using frozen maple syrup, a thawing period is necessary.

Maple syrup truly inspires a multitude of uses—its culinary impact is by no means limited to breakfast fare. Dixie and Norman Jewison (he's the director whose films include *The Russians Are Coming*, *The Thomas Crown Affair* and *Fiddler on the Roof*) have a home among the Canadian woods at Caledon East in Ontario, where they produce maple syrup under the label "Purity Health Farms."

They suggest using maple syrup in the following ways: as a glaze for baked ham or poultry, to flavor "blender" drinks such as milkshakes, as a sauce for crepes or ice cream, to marinate smoked pork chops.

They also shared the following recipes for Irish Canadian Coffee, Maple Glazed Squash and Maple Bran Muffins.

IRISH CANADIAN COFFEE
Strong, freshly brewed coffee
Add to:
1/4 oz. Canadian whiskey
1 tsp. maple syrup (earlier mixed in a wine glass)
Top with whipped cream

MAPLE GLAZED SQUASH
2 small acorn or pepper squash (about 750 g.)
1 tsp. maple syrup
20 ml. melted butter
125 ml. maple syrup
2 ml. finely grated orange rind

Trim ends of squash. Cut each in 3 rings and remove seeds. Place in baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and drizzle with butter. Bake at 190°C until almost tender (about 45 min.). Combine syrup and orange rind. Bring to boil, reduce heat, and simmer until thickened (3-4 min.). Pour over squash and continue baking until squash is tender (about 10 min.).

MAPLE BRAN MUFFINS
3/4 cup of natural wheat bran
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup maple syrup
1 egg
3/4 cup vegetable oil

1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Combine bran, milk and maple syrup. Mix in egg and oil. Combine remaining ingredients and add first mixture to this until just moistened. Spoon batter into greased muffin tins. Bake at 200°C (400°F) for 20 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

Also hailing from Canada is the following recipe for Old Fashioned Maple Sugar Cookies, which is reproduced here courtesy of Black Creek Pioneer Village, located in North York, near Toronto.

A restoration village dedicated to authentically recreating Ontario's past, Black Creek Pioneer Village makes much of maple sugar time, which was an important aspect of life in the rural Ontario community the Pioneer Village celebrates.

OLD FASHIONED MAPLE SUGAR COOKIES
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 cup maple syrup
4 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. ginger
2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. cloves
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. salt

5-6 cups whole wheat flour
1 cup sour milk

3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1/4 cup hot milk
4 egg yolks
5 egg whites

Preheat oven to 400°. Butter a 1 1/2-quart (6-cup) soufflé dish. Melt the butter in a wooden spoon, and cook over moderate heat for 2 minutes without letting the mixture color. Remove from heat. When the bubbling stops, pour in the hot milk and oyster liquor all at once, whisk vigorously until blended. Beat in the salt, pepper, and cayenne, return to heat, and bring to a boil, whisking for 2 minutes. Remove from heat and beat in the egg yolks. Gently stir in the oysters.

In a large bowl, beat the egg whites with a pinch of salt until stiff. Stir about 1/4 of them into the sauce to lighten it, fold in the balance. Pour the soufflé mixture into the prepared mold, put in the oven, and immediately lower heat to 375°. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until the soufflé is well puffed and browned. Serves 4.

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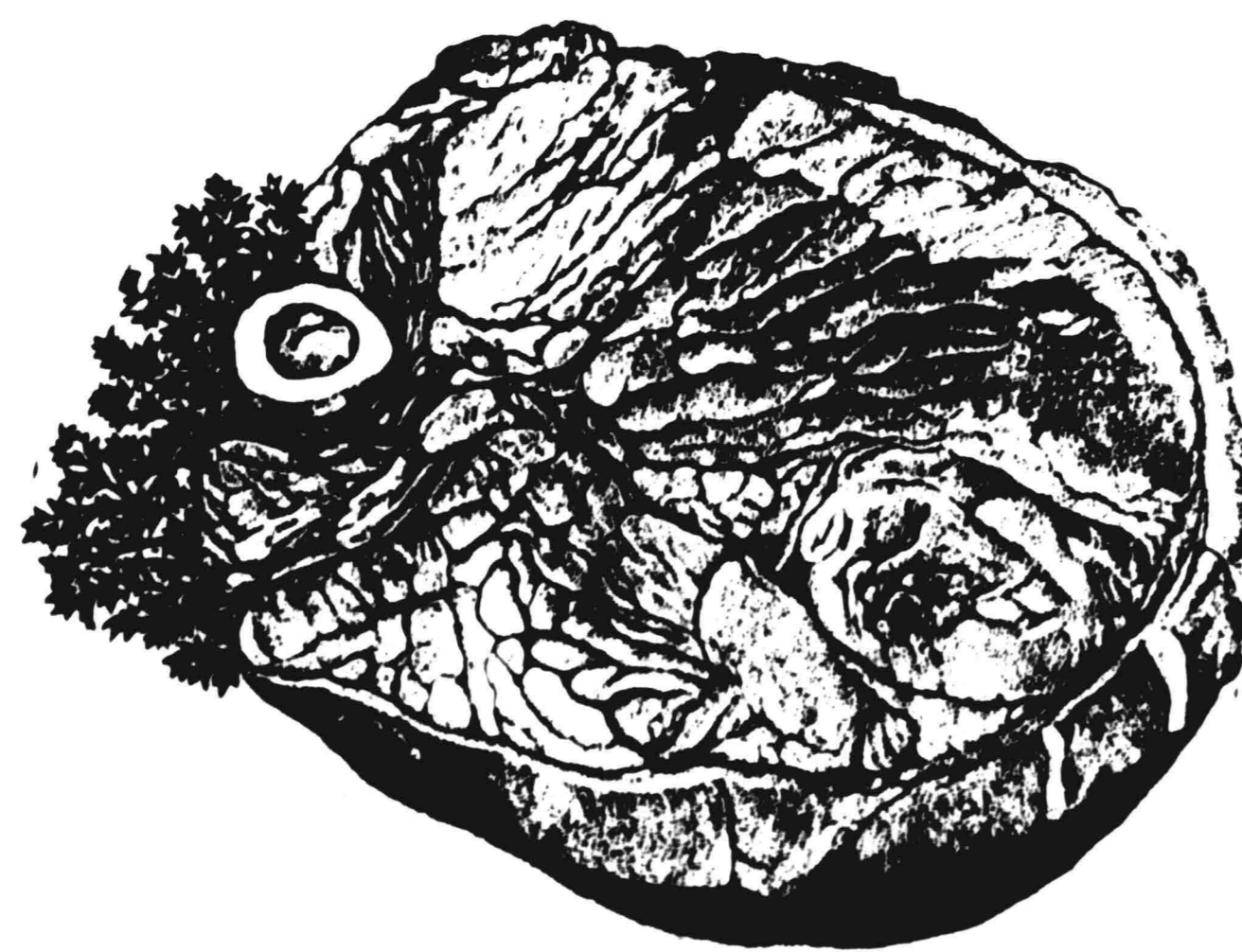
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Fewer Farms Fail But Many Periled

Though the Farmers Home Administration says only 6,713 (2.4%) of its borrowers failed financially this past fiscal year—fewer than in the previous two years—20% of its borrowers are behind in repayments.

Many farmers quit before the FmHA, which lends to about 12% of U.S. farmers—those who can't get credit elsewhere—foreclosed. The debt load of a growing number of farmers is so large their debt-free neighbors and rural businesses—local banks, input dealers and farm collateral values—could be dragged down with them.

As many as 10% of America's farmers now hold debt that exceeds 70% of the value of their assets. One recent report by Iowa State University said that if current economic conditions persist, within the next two years, 10% of the nation's farmers and 25% of all farm debt will be liquidated.

Family Farm Fading?

U.S. agriculture is projected to continue its evolutionary trek into the 21st century, but the changing "high-tech" face of farming may push many family operations into extinction.

By the turn of the century, farm operations will use mechanization and automation, improved management and technological breakthroughs in plant and livestock research that will continue the startling production gains farmers began in the 1950s, says Ken Farrell, director of the National Center for Food and Agriculture Policy in Washington.

Cowpie Fuel Utilized

Texas panhandle ranchers will soon be serving up cowpies to help fuel Austin's electricity needs.

Austin Mayor Ron Muller and Dallas businessman Ed Cox, Jr., have signed a contract for Austin to buy 100 megawatts of power annually produced by Cox's Valley View Biomass Electric Generation Plant.

The plant will burn manure collected from panhandle feed lots.

Options Traded Anew

Agricultural commodity options, banned since 1936, resumed trading Oct. 30th-31st on major commodity exchanges, in a 3-year pilot program authorized by Congress and administered by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission.

Commodity options are a forward pricing tool which farmers can use to set a floor price for a commodity to be sold at a later date.

If prices rise after the options position is taken, the option can be ignored and the grain, cotton or livestock sold at the higher price.

Options of principal interest to Tennessee farmers are for soy beans, live-fed cattle, cotton, and wheat.
