Halls Band Tops State





BOBBY WEBB, Halls Golden Tiger Marching Band director, got a free ride Saturday night in Mount Juliet after announcement that his band had placed first in Division I state competition and won the Governor's Challenge Cup.

Halls police waited at Gates to give the band followed by three miles of sirened escort through Halls. At Halls High School, the band gave its winning show to a vast crowd of spectators, in the rain, at which the band has become expert!

Halls led preliminaries Saturday with 76.5, averaged with the final 80.1 to win with 78.3. Second place went to Goodpasture High School, of Madison, 73.8. Other finalists, chosen from 12 original participants, were Franklin Road Academy, of Nashville, 73.65; MeKenzie High School, 69.9; Huntingdon, 68.15; Mount Pleasant, 64.3; Westmoreland, 63.15; and Lewis County, of Hohenwald, 59.45.

Halls Field Commanders Hope Harris and Jeff Prescott took first place over-all with 18.1 of 20. Second place went to Franklin Road Academy, with 14.9.

The color guard scored 13.7 of 20 in the finals to take second place. First place went to Huntingdon.

The contest was judged by the Bureau of Marching Music Adjudication, of Belleville, Ill., with eight professional band and drum and bugle corps judges (using caption judging), some on the field.

Mayor Joe Jacobs has proclaimed this Thursday "Band Day." He will read the proclamation in ceremonies on H. G. Conley Memorial Field at 1 p. m. The band will perform its state championship routine, public invited.

Jury Buys Only **Escape Counts**

Lauderdale County Circuit Court jurors, 30 minutes after given the case, convicted three men of escape from Fort Pillow State Prison Farm Feb. 18th but acquitted them of kidnapping the David Demps family, of Gates, of armed robbery in com mandeering a car from James Hubert Harris and Ezell Miller, of Cherry, and of assault to murder Miller, Wayne Douglas, of Ripley, and Emily (Mrs. Phillip) Rhoads, of Fort Pillow.

Armand DeSollar, of 211 Col lege. Halls, foreman of the 5 man, 7-woman jury, said Atty Gen. Paul G. Summers, of Somer ville, failed to convince the panel, in presenting three and a half hours of testimony by 11 witnes ses, that the trio sought any thing more than escape or that two-Randolph Oliver, 33, and Sulvester Alexander, 33 — ever had a weapon.

Oliver's uncle, Riley Arzenaux, who at age 26 was serving 25 vears for murder in Shelby Coun ty, was convicted of misdemeanor assault and battery in firing a shotgun at Douglas's car.

The defense contended shots were fired only at tires and that the trio's only intention was to join an escape led by James E. Clegg, 30, of Sullivan County, serving a life sentence as a habi tual criminal, and Ronald Lewis Freeman, 41, of Knox County, serving 198 years on two counts of murder.

Freeman was slain by North Carolina officers on March 7th. Clegg faces the same charges as the trio Nov. 7th in Tipton County Circuit Court, where the three will appear for sentencing.

Escape carries a one to five year term Arzeneaux's misdemeanor up to 11 months, 29 days.

Oliver is serving life plus 35 to 40 years for assault to commit murder, rape, and robbery with a deadly weapon in Shelby County. Alexander is serving 40 years for

1. Proof of ALL household income.

2. Names and Social Security numbers of all family mem-



Equally, today's rarities — born of diminishing supply or simply the advent of convenience foods and supermarket shopping were vesterday's staples. Maple syrup, an intrinsic part of our an-

cestors' pantry, is a case in point. Before sugar was available on the North American continent, sweetening was effected by means of two foods — honey, gleaned rope, and maple syrup, which originated in North America.

forebears consumed four times the amount of maple syrup we do today, and it remained the foremost sweetener in the end of the 19th century) is now a scarcity. Yet, it is eminently well worth seeking out for its unique flavor (popular pancake syrups which are largely composed o corn syrup are not adequate substitutes) and for the special touch it adds, not only

as a cooking ingredient as well. In fact, it was originally utilized in precisely that way, by the native American In dians for whom maple sugar was not simply their only sweetener, but virtually their only flavoring.

When the European settlers first arrived in North America, they discovered the native Americans freely tapping sugar maple and black maple trees for sap (in itself not particularly sweet, since it is largely water) which could be boiled down to become maple syrup and maple sugar. The Indians willingly taught the settlers how to do this, ensuring the settlers a free and plentiful source of sweetener for bak-

ing and cooking. Much of the uniqueness of maple syrup derives from the specific conditions needed to produce it. Climatic requirements have turned maple syrup into a product of a small geographic area namely the northeastern United States and the Canadian provinces of Quebec and Ontario - and all attempts to coddle the maple tree into yielding the precious sap ii other regions have been a signal failure. This is because the maple tree requires a long period of cool weather (usually the

late winter through early spring) during which the day temperatures remain above freezing while nighttime temperatures dip below the freezing mark. The uncertainty of how long this syndrome will persist each year results in a maple syrup output which can vary greatly from spring to spring, with maple syrup seasons as short as a week and as long as

"Sugaring off" occurs, therefore, in the spring, and to country people serves as a harbinger of warm weather to come and as reason for celebration. The sap which is boiled down to make

tree's ordinary sap, but a special secretion whose purpose mystifies botanists This sap is extracted with great care (the native Americans used a tomahawk to gain access to it: the early colonists used wooden spouts, while today metal spouts are used) and gathered in buckets for boiling over hot oil or wood fires. 



Wandering Around

Sometimes your editor wonders if he shouldn't just shut up and forget about writing this column. But then someone comes along and tells us that they have agreed or disagreed with our opinions, or have gotten a chuckle from some comment, so we go ahead and try again. We wouldn't dare take a vote on it, so we'll just plug along and write whatever comes to mind.

We received a short note Friday from Jim Peery, former Halls High football coach and principal, commending the Halls Tigers for reaching the state playoffs and wishing the

Jim, now retired in Apopka, Fla., after many years of teaching in Florida after leaving Halls, was pleased that both Halls and Ripley reached the playoffs. Jim was a tailback for the Tigers in the late 1930s and played at Union University in Jackson before entering the Army during World War II.

Jim used to tell a story of his days in the Army which still gives us a laugh. It seems that Jim, awaiting passage home after the end of the war, was conscripted as a football coach for a camp team. He had some former high school, college, and sandlot players, but no punter. Jim decided he would pick out someone and try to teach him to punt.

He demonstrated the technique of the punt, and to his surprise and delight the ball took off with a beautiful spiral and sailed some 50 yards downfield. Jim immediately laid the ball, remarked "That's the way to do it," walked away, and swears he has never attempted to punt a football since that day.

Back in 1946, your editor was a member of the old Halls High Athletic Association Committee, which voted to hire Jim as the Halls Tiger football coach while he was still in Europe and without even contacting him to see if he was interested. As it turned out, he was, and the choice was a good one!

Other committee members included the late H. G. McCorkle, HHS principal, the late Paul Henderson, county school board member, the late F. E. Pugh, the late 'Red' Thompson, and E. S. Crihfield. Mrs. W. A. Smith, Jr., who now resides in Norman, Okla., HHS typing and bookkeeping instructor, was the committee's secretary.




