State Sets Deadlines For School Upgrade

John C. Neff, State Fire Marshal as well as state Commissioner of Commerce and Industry, in a letter dated Sept. 26th, set three deadlines for improvement of five county schools:

"1. A funded plan approved by the School Board and County Commission to correct outstanding deficiencies shall be submitted to the office of the State Fire Marshal no later than December 1, 1984.

"2. Architectural plans shall be submitted to the Engineering Section of the Division of Fire Prevention for review and approval by January 1, 1985, on new buildings and/or renovation of existing buildings.

"3. Construction of new buildings and/or renovation of existing buildings shall be completed no later than August 15, 1985.

"Failure to comply with the aforementioned three requirements may result in an Order directing the immediate closure of the affected school plants...."

Neff said five county schools "have serious life safety code deficiencies." The schools, with their respective deficiency points, are:

Halls Junior High School 77 Deficiency Points | Kans., and his wife, Marcia, Arp Primary (Main Bldg.)73 Deficiency Points | reside in Hutchinson, Kans., | after his '79 Oldsmobile Cut-Ripley High School (D Bldg.) . 70 Deficiency Points Henning School 6-8 69 Deficiency Points

"You have further been advised," Neff wrote, "that, in view of the structural nature of these deficiencies, substantial renovation or new construction would be necessary for remedial purposes....

"A recent inspecton indicates that virtually all serious life safety code deficiences still exist in the above schools and no funded plans have been approved by your School Board or County Commission.

"It is not our desire to close any schools; however, it is our desire to help make them safe for every student. "The continued use of these schools," he wrote, "will depend upon the satisfaction" of the three requirements.



Indictments Disclose Drive Against Drugs Monday's grand jury returned ten of its 31 in-

dictments, holding defendants for Circuit Court trial, in cases involving marijuana or other drugs.

Eight indictments, sought directly from the grand jury by state agents, without warrants, reflected undercover work in the county during recent weeks.

Names of defendants in these cases were withheld from the public records, pending arrest. Many names came from the grand jury as "John Doe."

Sammy Crook, suspended Fort Pillow State Prison Farm transportation officer, and Margaret Best, were indicted for manufacturing marijuana.

They were arrested in August after sheriff's department investigators reported finding 34 marijuana plants growing in a field near their home at Asbury, plus marijuana in the house.



The board rejected an offer by the Tennessee Department of Transportation to re-imburse the city if it would assume responsibility of maintaining state highways within city limits. The board felt the city has neither personnel nor equipment to make such an agreement.

Mayor Jacobs said he had received a number of complaints about signs being placed on streets, filling parking space. A city ordinance forbids this practice. Police Chief Buddy Moore was instructed to contact owners and ask them to remove the signs.

Election Settled

All reasons for holding the national election Nov. 6th became invalid Wednesday of last week, after a mock election at Halls High School.

Halls High students cast votes for president and U.S. Senator from Tennessee with more than surprising results—at least in your editor's opinion.

With 350 students casting ballots, the Reagan-Bush ticket received 232 votes, the Mondale-Ferraro ticket polled 118. The fact that the Reagan-Bush ticket garnered a majority of the votes was not too surprising, since the students could be expected to be more familiar with President Reagan's name, but the size of the vote was somewhat surprising.

Much more unexpected was the count in the race between Democrat Albert Gore, Jr., and Republican Victor Ashe in the race for the Senate post being vacated by Tennessee Senator Howard Baker. With 349 students voting, Ashe was the distinct leader with 216 votes; Gore's total 133.

We wouldn't want to predict any state or national trends because of the results of this vote, but since Lauderdale County is very distinctly Democratic in normal circustances, we are baffled by Ashe's lead. There would seem to be little doubt that Gore's name should be more easily recognized, since his father was a U.S. Senator for 18 years, and Albert Gore, Jr., is himself a U. S. Congressman from Tennessee's Sixth District.

It should be noted that it is the resident's own economic and budget advisors that provide that information. They report that if all the President's current tax and spending proposals are adopted and all of his economic projections come true, the budget deficit in 1989--five years from now-would still be \$139 billion. What the House is seeking to do with this legislation is use the present budget system to mandate a balanced budget. It recogmizes the responsibilities of both the executive branch of govern ment and the legislative branch of government in agreeing on a fiscal policy that reaches a bal-

anced budget. Under the terms of this bill, the President, regardless of who he is, would be required to subtimetable for achieving a balanced budget. This bill does not make any other changes in the budget pro-

cess. The President would still be required to submit his budget proposal 15 days after the beginning of each Congressional Session as he does now. The Budget Committees of Congress would also report their budget out by April 15th of each year. However, if an alternative budget was necessary, an explanation of why a balanced budget could not be achieved would have to

In practical terms, this legislation could be more effective than a Constitutional amendment. It would certainly establish a set procedure for budgets to be considered. In so doing, it actually addresses the methods by which a balanced budget would be achieved, something a Constitutional amendment does not do. Needless to say, the important thing is that this legislation



High crop yields and the strong U.S. dollar, making export difficult, spell lower prices for farmers.

To Save Garden Seeds Why pay 50¢ or more for a package of seeds, when one plant can produce the equivalent of many seed packs? Also, choosing seeds from

plants which have produced well in your own garden environment will allow you to develop strains of vegetables and flowers which may out-perform commercially available seeds. Avoid saving any seed from

varieties labeled F-1. These hybrid plants are crosses from two different types of parents. Seeds from hybrid plants revert to the parents, producing plants inferior to the ones you Seeds which are most easily

saved include those of beans, peas, peppers, tomatoes, eggplant, lettuce, and most flowers. Vine crops such as cucumbers. melons and squash often crosspollinate with other varieties, making it difficult to predict the quality of their seeds.

Prepare Early Gardens Since cool, wet springs can delay soil preparation, we sug gest preparing a portion of the garden in late fall.

Cool-season vegetables, such as broccoli, cabbage, and cauli flower, should be planted early, because yields fall off if they are exposed to high temperatures for long periods. They are generally planted four to six weeks before

season crops, such as lettuce. mustard, onions, radishes and spinach. While garden soil may be too wet to work so early in the spring, it is often possible to plant if the soil is already prepared. I suggest preparing the soil for cool-season crops by turning it and forming ridges eight to 10 inches high after tempera-

Low winter temperatures will prevent significant weed growth before planting time. The ridges will warm up and dry out more rapidly than level soil and permit early planting without further soil preparation. Ridges should be arranged to minimize erosion. Erosion may make fall soil preparation inadvisable o severly sloping garden sites

New Classification

Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association officials released football classifications last week, with Halls narrowly escaping a Class AA classification.

The TSSAA Board of Control voted last June to continue to divide into three classifications-Class A, with an enrollment of 295 and under, Class AA, 296 to 692, and Class AAA, 693 and above. Class A and Class AA each have 115 schools; Class AAA has 114.

Halls is the second largest Class A team in the state, with 292 students in the upper three grades. Only Goodlettsville is larger, with 295 students. Halls' rival, Lake County, shows 269

Several schools in West Tennessee will be affected by the new classification figures. Covington and Lexington, now Class AAA, can drop to AA. McKenzie, now AA, will drop to

Ripley, with 735 students in the top three grades, must remain in Class AAA. Both Crockett County and Dyer County are well into the Class AA group. The 1984 Class A champion, Cordova Evangelical Christian School, with 298 students, must move into Class AA.

Your editor is still of the opinion that there should be four classifications, to equalize athletic talent.

Class AAA ranges from 695 students to 1,922; Class A ranges from 18 schools with less than 100 enrolled to 295. Only Class AA is anywhere close to parity, with 296 to 692.

It seems to us that TSSAA officials should start now to study changes to better equalize competition.
