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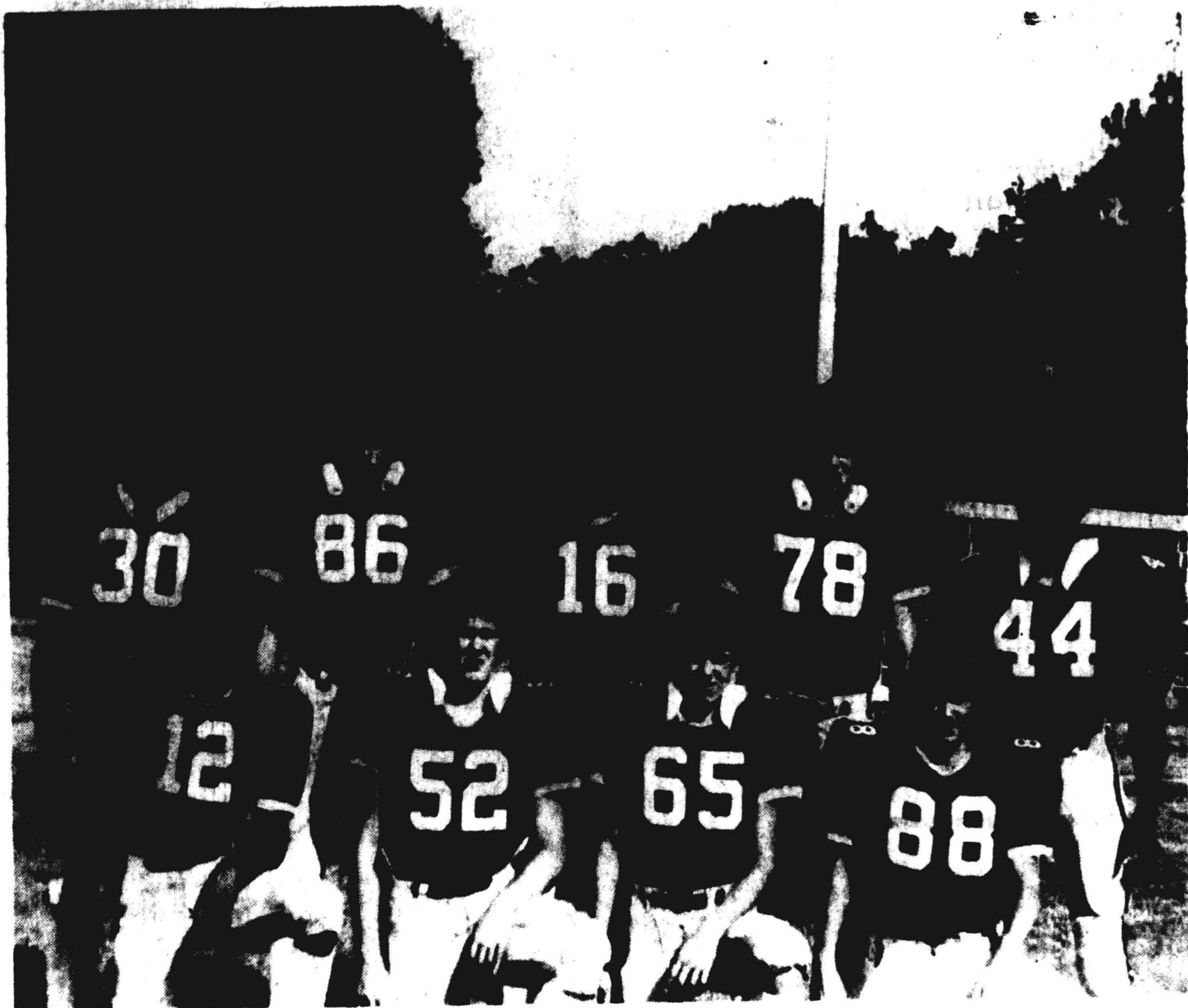

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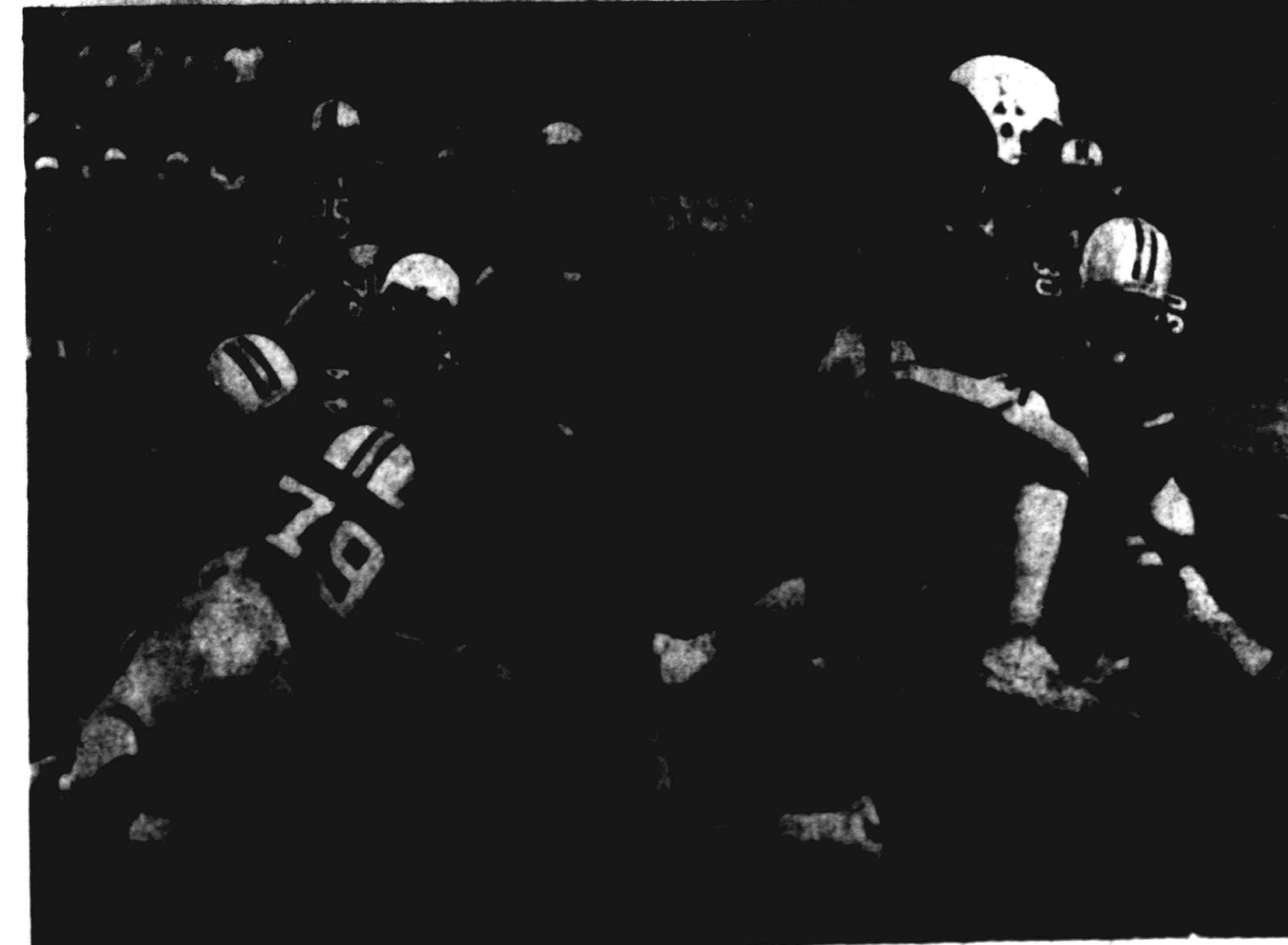

#### Too Pessimistic

Quite a few Halls fans seemed ready to throw in the towel Saturday after the trouncing the Halls Tigers were given by Ripley at the Jamboree Friday night in Dyersburg.

It seems to your editor that they are much to pessimistic! They failed to take into consideration several factors which determined the results.

To begin with, the Tigers were playing without the services of 240-lb. tackle John Arwood, who was ill, possibly pneumonia.

While one player could not and did not make that much difference, it did emphasize the fact that the Tigers are limited in reserve strength. When any one of the top 15 or 16 players is missing, there is a wide gap in replacements because of experience, size, and even numbers.

We wrote earlier that we doubted that the Tigers should be playing a Class AAA team, even a practice game. The numbers just won't balance. Ripley fielded a squad of 68 players, while the Tigers could field only 33, including seven freshmen.

We don't know whether Ripley's squad picture included freshmen or not, but we do know that for the first time in many years, the Halls Tigers will not be able to field a freshman team.

Local fans have become accustomed to having a winning team, and certainly, we like it, too, but many of us can remember the days when a losing complex prevailed at Halls High School.

There is no reason for such a complex to arise again, but pessimistic outlook by the fans can help create such an atmosphere.

We think that the Tigers should be able to compete within their own class and will continue to have outstanding records. However, your help and support is needed, too!

#### Cemetery Woes

During the past two or three weeks, your editor has had some telephone calls and also some conversation on the streets concerning the condition of the Halls Cemetery.

Several weeks ago, after a meeting of interested citizens at the cemetery, we suggested that a trust fund should be established to take care of its monetary needs. For a number of reasons, more or less volunteer donations have not brought in sufficient funds to care for the cemetery as Halls citizens expect.

No one has stepped forward to spearhead such a drive or to offer any other suggestion, so nothing has been done. Some group or organization should look into the possibility of establishing such a trust fund.

Basic needs of such a trust fund already exist at Bank of Halls, and we are certain other banks would co-operate, so no great planning is needed—just some one to carry the story of the need to the people who should be most concerned—those loved ones buried there and who expect to be buried there themselves. Any volunteers?

#### Higher Phone Rates Sought

South Central Bell has asked the Tennessee Public Service Commission to re-price local service, calls from coin telephones, directory assistance, and some special business lines.

State-wide basic home service increases would range from \$1.95 to \$2.55 a month—in Ripley and Henning, up from the present \$10.05 to \$12.10.

Overall, local rates for business customers would increase an average of 15%.

Coin telephone rates would increase to 25¢.

Home customers would get three free calls to directory assistance each month and would pay 30¢ for each additional DA call.

Jim Johnson, South Central Bell's vice-president for Tennessee operations, said additional revenues are needed to cover higher costs of providing service, including the cost of capital.

"We'll invest \$195,000,000 to improve and expand telephone service in Tennessee in 1984 and \$200,000,000 in 1985," he said.

"We don't have the financial power of American Telephone & Telegraph (AT&T) behind us anymore," Johnson said, "so the need to recover all of our costs in Tennessee is urgent. Because of divestiture, we also must continue to price telephone services more in line with their costs."

The request would produce an 8.2% increase (\$79,900,000) in South Central Bell's annual Tennessee revenues.

#### SALE APPROVED

Purchase of controlling interest in Gates Banking & Trust Co. by Warren Nunn, president of Bank of Halls, from R. V. Lilley, president of the Gates bank, has been approved by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the Tennessee Department of Banking.

Transfer of the stock was completed last week. No change in operation of the bank has been made, nor is any anticipated. Lilley, who has announced his intention to retire on or before Jan. 15, 1985, remains president of the institution.

#### Halls High Grid Debut In Bolton

The Halls Tigers will travel to Bolton Friday night to open the 1984 football season. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

Despite the return of 18 lettermen, the Tigers will lack experience at several spots on defense. Missing are both linebackers from last year's squad, although Chris Dennis saw considerable action.

Starting on offense for the Tigers will be Sammy Burnette at quarterback, Chris Dennis at tailback, Malcolm Parker at fullback and Richard Voss at wide-out. Burnette and Dennis are returning starters. Parker saw considerable playing time before being sidelined by injuries. Voss has played at fullback and wide-out.

The offensive line will have Bubba Wright and Keith Barlow as ends, John Arwood and Dickie Deaton as tackles, Jimmy Clark and Chuck Patrick as guards, and Wade Stanley at center. Wright, Barlow, Arwood and Deaton were starters last year.

On defense, Dennis and Phil Hastings will be at the linebacking spots. Charlie Wilder, Voss, Benjie Goodwin and Dees Elmore probably will start in the defensive secondary. Arwood and Deaton will anchor the defensive line at tackle, Barlow and Joe Patrick will be at the ends, and Chuck Patrick and Parker will be in the middle.

Expected to see some action, although inexperienced, is Kelvin Robinson, a 6'3" 240-pounder at defensive tackle.

Bolton is expected to be much improved this year. Off to a slow start last year, it came on strong later in the season for a 5-6 record.

However, it will be playing without the services of Sylvester Gray, 6'6" end, who was outstanding on both offense and defense.

Gray, only a junior, decided to by-pass football for basketball. Predictions are that he will be an all-stater in basketball.

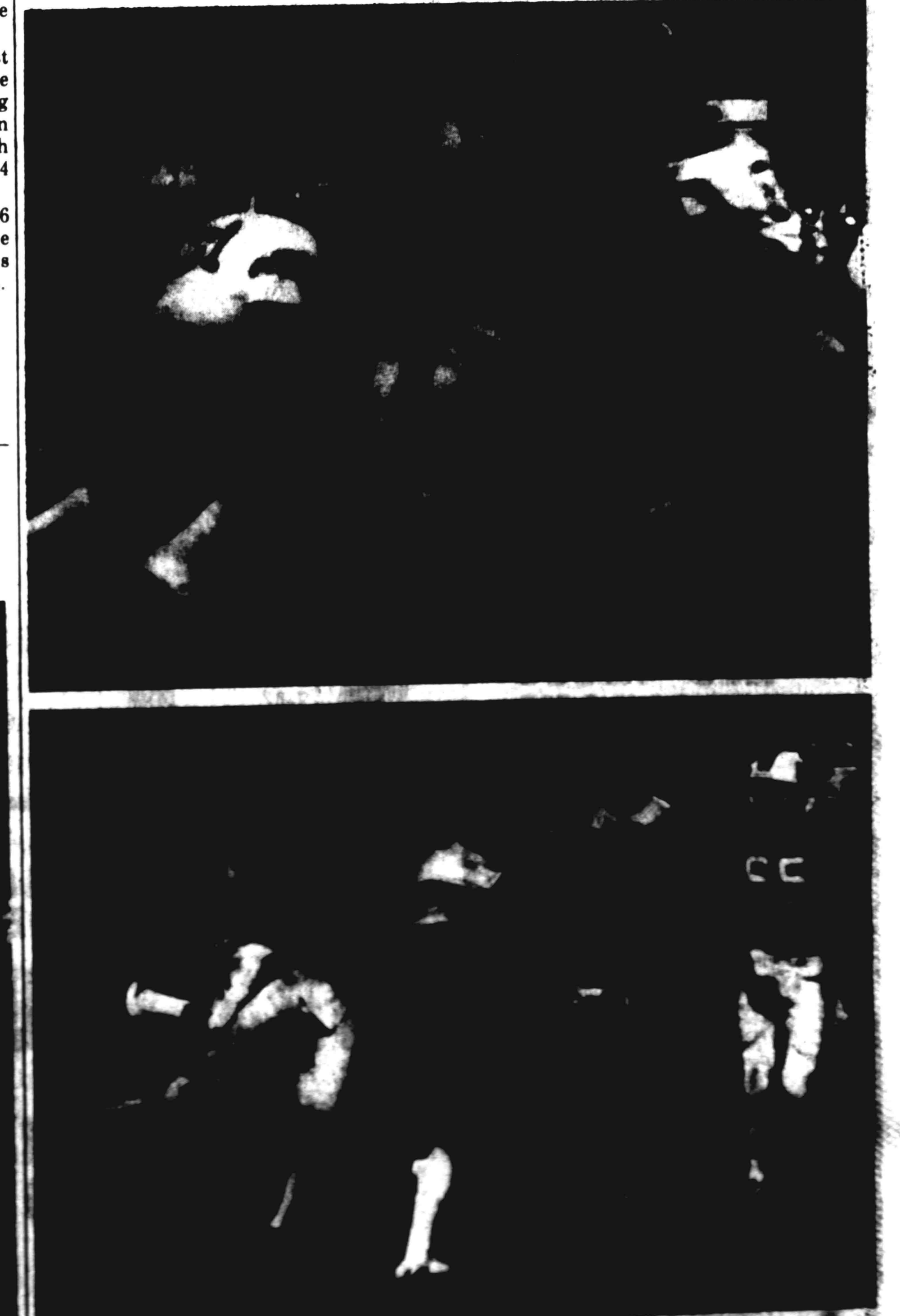

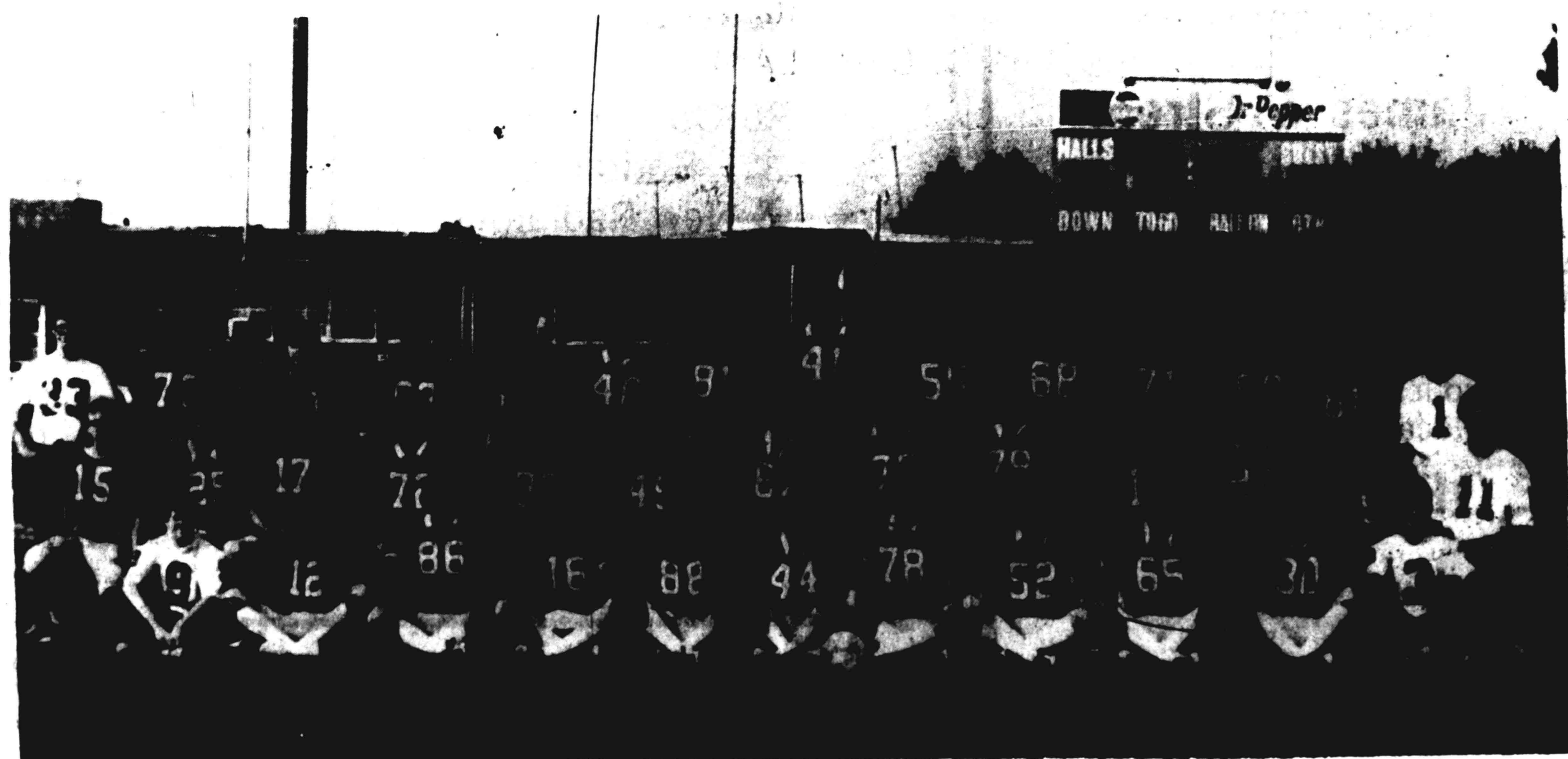

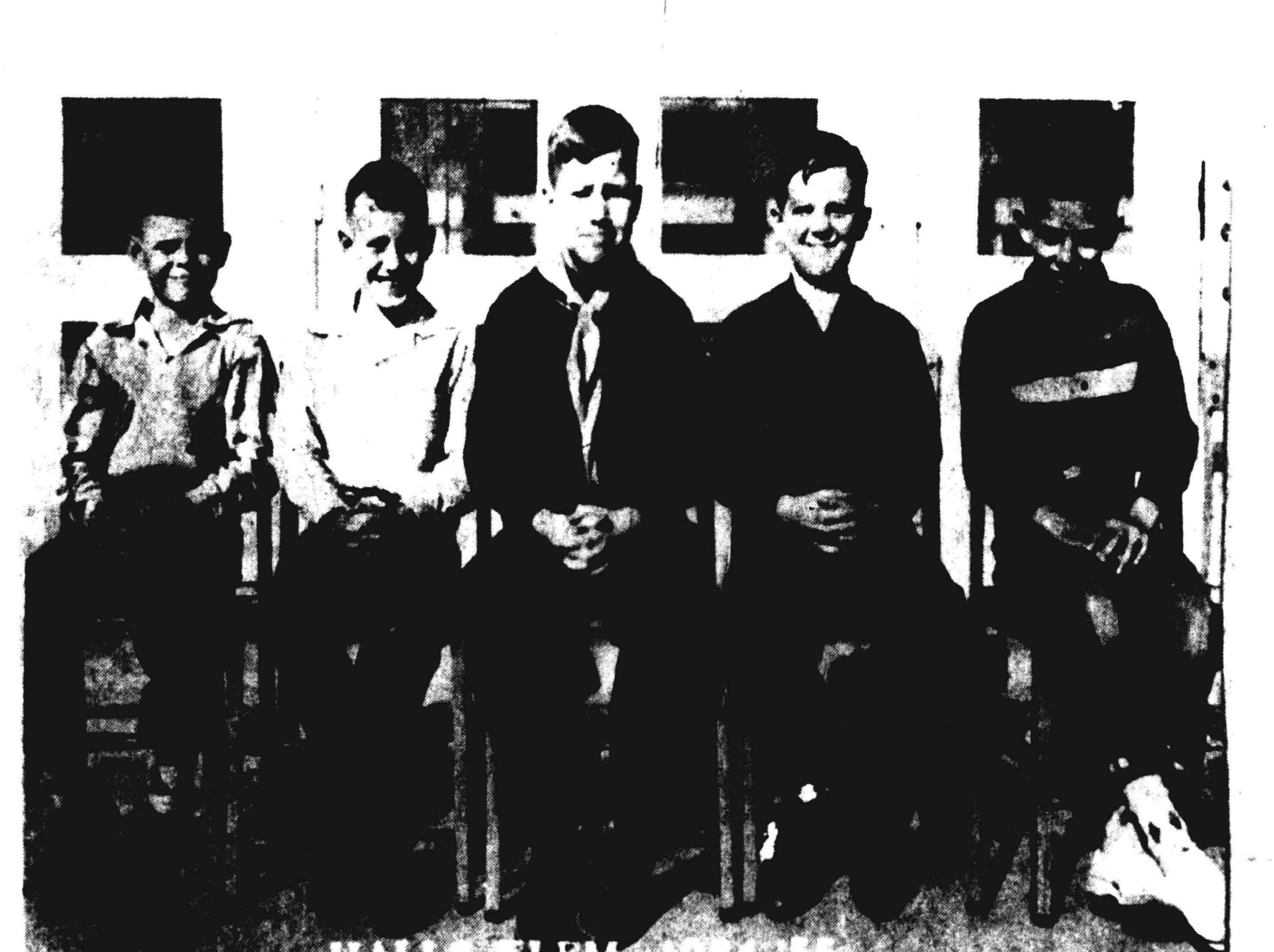

## Charged As Plotting To Slay Nephews

FRED ARCHIE BIRD, 61, right, of 33 Roy Davis Road near Jackson, had about 30 pounds of silver in his possession when he was arrested Tuesday evening of last week by Tennessee Bureau of Investigation agents, including Tommy Lewis, center, and processed for jail by Madison County sheriff's department dispatcher Leon Dugges, left. In white polo shirt, frayed blue jeans, and handcuffs, he was charged next morning before Jackson City Judge Walter Drake with two counts of solicitation to commit murder—of his nephews, David Bird, of Jackson, and Allen Bird, of Forked Deer—and one count of solicitation to commit arson—of his rural home. At-

orney General Jerry Woodall said Bird contacted an undercover agent he believed to be a professional killer and arsonist Sept. 14th and said "it would be fine with him if the two wives of the nephews were also killed." Janice (Mrs. Allen) Bird is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. "Red" Williams, of Forked Deer, and formerly taught in Halls Kindergarten. Bird was held in jail under \$150,000 bond until his attorney, Hughie Ragan, persuaded Drake next day to halve the amount, which was promptly posted. Among those urging lower bond for Bird, retired owner of a crane service, was Dr. Alex Leach, Madison County executive. Preliminary hearing is set Friday.

### More About Cemetery

We have been somewhat surprised with the response that our recent comments on the condition of Halls Cemetery and the need for funds have received. We find that most of the people of Halls are concerned about the care of the cemetery, but, like your editor, were waiting for someone else to do something.

As you will remember, we suggested that a trust fund is needed to insure future care of the cemetery, and we commented that such a fund, although small, already existed at Bank of Halls.

During recent weeks, there have been additional donations made to the trust fund, and others are planning to make donations within the next few weeks.

At the present time there is slightly more than \$9,000 in the trust fund. The funds are covered with certificates of deposit and are drawing the highest available interest. The interest is deposited to the account of Halls Cemetery Association and used to defray expenses of mowing and maintaining the cemetery, but, of course, that is far from enough.

Anyone wishing additional information or wanting to add to the trust fund should contact Donald Hogue, bank trust officer, or other bank personnel. Donations to the maintenance fund may be made at the bank or to Mrs. L. E. Cribfield, Jr.

It is our estimate that at least \$50,000 is needed in the trust fund to properly maintain the cemetery, but this is not an insurmountable sum, if each family which owns a cemetery lot will add to the fund. Any amount is acceptable and welcomed.

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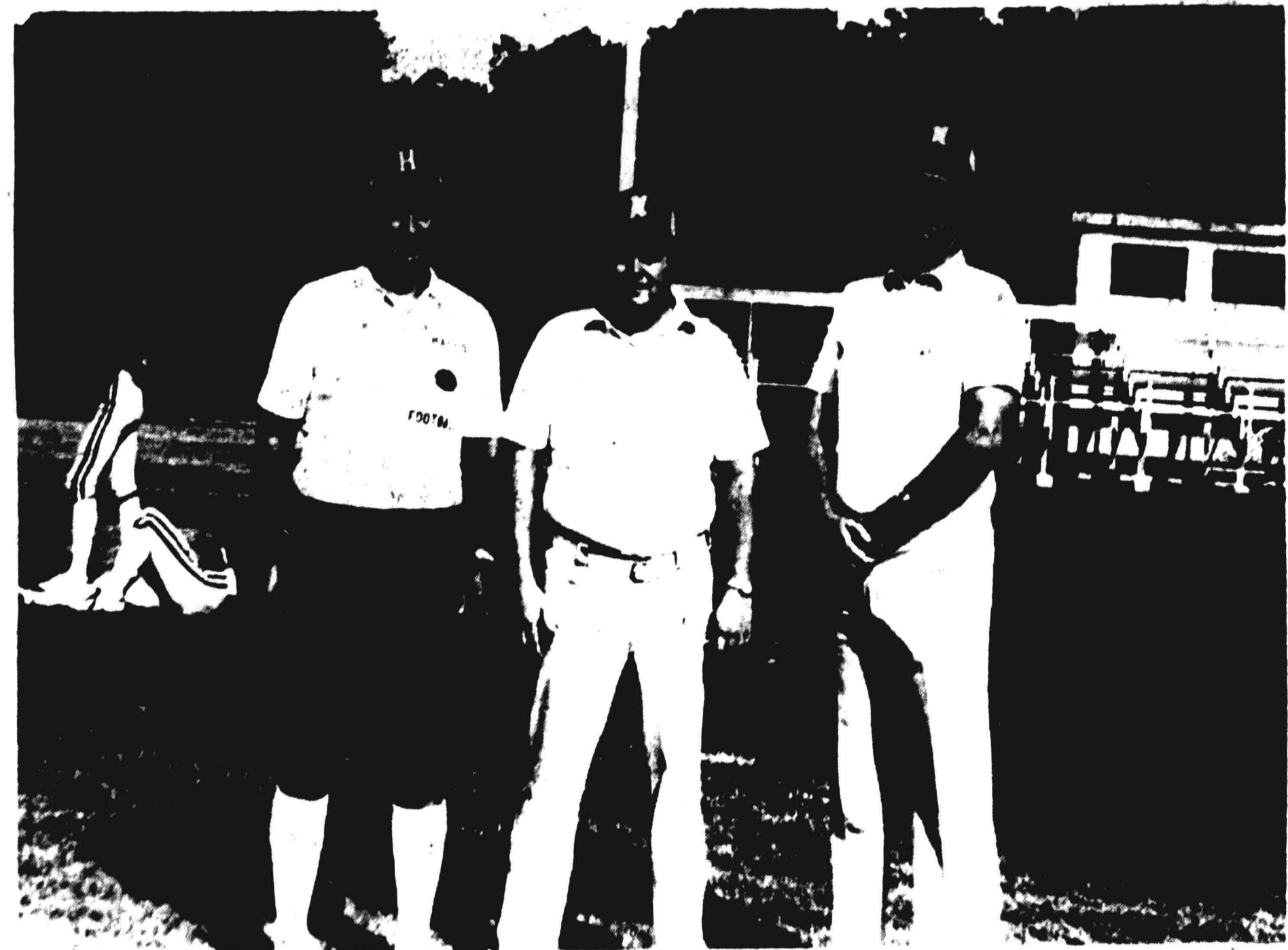
