What's Happening?

U.S. Highway 51 in Lauderdale County seems to have become an extremely dangerous stretch of road for over-theroad trucks during the past few months.

Since last spring, when a driver was killed when the truck he was driving smashed into another truck on Hwy. 51 just south of Halls, at least a dozen truck crashes have occurred, some minor and some of major proportions.

During the past week, five accidents have occurred in an approximate 10 mile area between Ripley and Halls.

Halls Turf Readied County Proposes New School Plan

County Executive William Tucker IV proposed Tuesday afternoon to Ripley Mayor Rozelle Criner, lead negotiator for the county's four incorporated cities, the latest of at least five formalized plans to fund what the county orginally proposed as a \$6,975,000 school improvement program.

This proposal-to provide the same school improvementsis for only \$4,450,000 in bonds.

Bonds would build a new school for grades 4-8 east of Ripley Elementary School (now K-6, to become K-3); close Arp, both Henning schools, and Ripley Junior High; add to Halls Elementary; and renovate Halls Junior High, Halls High, and Ripley High School's gymnasium and its vocational and handicapped education building.

Various reasons for the accidents have been offered, including tire failure, fog, and striking other vehicles, but we are wondering if excess speed and driver carelessness aren't major factors.

Also, it has occurred to your writer that since the highway is divided and four-lane truck drivers have become so accustomed to limited access highways, they fail to realize that there are numerous county roads, home driveways, field roads, etc. that have direct access to the highway in this area, creating unexpected hazards.

No doubt there are many reasons for the wrecks, including liquor and drugs, but highway signs reminding drivers of the hazards created by vehicles coming onto the highway might be of some benefit. Perhaps the state Department of Transportation would do well to study the effectiveness of warning signs.

State Rep. Floyd Crain told this writer Wednesday of last week that he had been in contact with state transportation authorities after the early crash, but no direct action has followed.

Perhaps the signs would be of no value, but certainly some effort should be made to determine why there are so many wrecks on a divided 4-lane highway that doesn't present any particularly visible hazards. Perhaps county officials should make it a point to contact state officials.

The situation is potentially dangerous to Lauderdale County residents and all others traveling the highway.

Line Veto Needed

It seems very unlikely that President Reagan will be able to get Congress to pass the law giving him the right of line veto of budget items, but in our opinion the line veto has become neces sary.

Several U.S. Senators, including Stennis, of Mississippi, and Heflin, of Alabama, have led the fight in opposing the line veto, stating that such a ruling would allow the President to blackmail the Congress with the threat of vetoes.

As we remember, the Congress should be able to recognize blackmail when it sees it, since on numerous occasions the Congress has attached civil rights bills, spending bills, etc. to needed bills which President Reagan and past presidents have sought, daring them to veto the added amendments, since it would defeat the entire bill. Actually, we think that two changes would serve the nation well. The first would permit a line veto to control spending, and the other would limit bills to their original limits when introduced, thus curtailing the attaching of dissimilar amendments.

Halls And Ripley **Open Jamboree**

Eliminated are reserves on which the county would have drawn a higher rate of interest than it would pay for the bondsdenying the bonds tax-exempt status.

The county and the cities — both faced with revenue problems — have been fencing about the bond financing for months.

The cities, which long have automatically turned over all of their share of local sales taxes for county schools, have balked at doing so after the county has reaped hand some income from investing surplus sales tax funds.

County and cities reached an agreement satisfactory to both, but bond attorneys-despite pleas from both Criner and Tucker-said the Internal Revenue Service wouldn't approve. The county would still be raking in too much tax-free money.

Under the new proposal, the county will put up all of its funds on hand up front, but with the total bond issue cut sharply, the cities wouldn't share in excess sale taxes for two years.

After that, they'd get more per year than under any previous offer from the county-the difference between about a million dollars a year (based on the current economy and current sales tax rates) and requirements for repaying the \$4,450,000 ands:



Bridge Opened **South Of Halls**



Virtually every Tennessean will benefit in some manner from such a major plant coming to Tennessee. We think it is a good job and deserves praise, not criticism.


More MUS Problems



Walking Carefully

Last week, we reported Joe McCarthy's problems on vacation, but there is a sideline to the story that was not included. Shortly before Joe and his family left on their Western vacation, he told this writer about various points they planned to visit, including Salt Lake City, Utah, before returning to Colo rado to tour Estes Park and Rocky Mountain National Park. He told us about the route he planned to take to reach Denver, which included some rather narrow and difficult roads. Having traveled through the same area, we suggested

that he take Interstate 80 from Salt Lake City to Cheyenne and then turn south toward Denver and Estes Park. When they left Salt Lake City, they decided to travel I-80, with the result that they reached Cheyenne just in time to be involved in the major flood there, which killed about a dozen people. Joe says that he wished he had this writer by the neck while waiting out the storm.

We have been walking very carefully around Joe since he arrived home. We don't plan to make any suggestions to anyone any time in the near future.

Incidentally, the airline found his bag, which they had misplaced, with contents intact, but they sent it on the bus to Dyersburg, rather than delivering it to Halls.

The Postal "Service"

Several times recently, we have read that the head of the U.S. Postal Service has stated that the USPS is losing a million dollars daily.

During 1984, USPS reported a small surplus, yet in February, 1985, it raised first class rates 10% and increased other postal charges-and now they have hugh losses. Postal charges have climbed dramatically over the past several years, while service declined.

Under postal regulations, newspapers are supposed to receive the same treatment as first class mail, but apparently are not doing so.

In August, 1984, our son, Buddy, became publisher of The Carthage Courier, about 50 miles east of Nashville. Through the remainder of 1984, the Courier, mailed on Wednesday, arrived in Halls on Friday or occasionally on Saturday, and The Halls Graphic took about the same amount of time to reach Carthage.

In January of this year, service became much slower, with the Courier reaching Halls on Wednesday, a week after being mailed, and sometimes on Thursday. Delivery of The Graphic has been just as slow.

During a telephone conversation Sunday with her sister Lena Mullins, of West Palm, Fla., Nell was told that Lena received the July 18th and July 25th copies of the Graphic at the same mail delivery.

The problem isn't with local post offices, but in the sectional distribution centers. We have talked with others who have the same problems, and they all think that the Postal Service badly needs to improve operation of the centers. Certainly, some changes need to be made.

Raise Speed Limit?

Two articles in the Memphis Commercial Appeal Thursday of last week were of great deal of interest to this writer. Sen. Chic Hecht, of Nevada, is seeking to justify support for a bill now in Congress to raise the present legal speed limi from 55 miles per hour to at least 65 on interstates and other

Gerard J. Trippitelli, president and chief operating officer of a major trucking company, is writing in opposition to raising

Each writer offers statistics to support his position. It seems to this writer that some of the statistics are contradictory, but we are not in any position to refute or affirm any of them.

We have been able to adjust to the present 55 m.p.h. limit, Four From Halls but Sen. Hecht maintains that at least 75% of drivers on inter-Paris Fair Stars states are consistently violating the speed limit, and we feel that he is correct

On the other hand, Mr. Trippitelli states that higher speed Monty McWilliams, taking limits will increase the severity of highway accidents, and fuel efficiency will be reduced.

As we recall, when the present limit became a federal law, the truckers were screaming that fuel efficiency would be reduced and that truckers would be unable to maintain their

Any driver on interstate highways can affirm the fact that truckers presently are not abiding by the speed limit. Just set your cruise control at 55 m.p.h. and count the trucks that pass you. Of course, other motorists are also driving beyond the

It is our feeling that the speed limit either should be enforced or should be raised. The majority of drivers, truckers or passenger car drivers, seem to be ignoring the limit.

Dozen Seniors Pace Halls 11

With a dozen seniors leading the way, the 1985 Halls Tigers open the grid campaign this week by participating in a foot-ball jamboree Friday night at Dyersburg High School.

The Tigers, 9-4 last season and playoff semi-finalists, will tangle with Class AAA Ripley in the first half of the jamboree. Host Dyersburg will meet Dyer County in the second half.

"We're looking forward to getting into a game situation," says Halls Head Coach Andy Pugh "It'll give the team an opportunity to work in a game atmos ohere, get used to working out before a crowd, and help us mentally prepare for the regular sea-

Pugh, in his 10th year at the Tiger helm, says it will also give his team a chance to play against a good Ripley team before the regular season competition begins.

"We're looking at the jamboree as an opportunity to do some things that we can't do in practice," he explains.

"It'll give us a chance to work in a real huddle, work with officials, and a time to hit somebody than ourselves.

"We hope it'll give us a boost into the first regular season game against Bolton."

The Tiger mentor also says it will be the first look at some of his players in a game-type situa tion and help determine some remaining starting positions for the first contest.

Pugh adds that the contest against a strong Ripley squad will offer an opportunity to experiment with players in new positions to determine if some players can help out the more experienced, members on the small squad.

Captains for the 1985 Tigers will be seniors Dicky Deaton Richard Voss and Benjie Good win. Deaton is an offensive and defensive tackle and both Voss and Goodwin play halfback on both offense and defense.

A fourth captain will be selected each week from the remaining senior team members

DSC Starting Fund Raising

For the first time in its history, Dyersburg State College is plan-ning a full-fledged fund-raising campaign in an attempt to offset declines in financial aid and cuts in federal spending on educa-tion, Douglas "Buck" Tarpley, the school's director of research and planning, told Monday's luncheon of the Halls-Gates Rotary Club.

The goal of \$130,000 is part of 4-stage effort to improve a number of programs at the comunity college.

First stage is to finance an utomated manufacturing train center to assist existing industries and automative opera tions. It is expected to help draw industry to the area.

Phase two is an effort to finance scholarships at the college, shrinking because of rising fees, escalating costs for books and supplies, and numerous state and national budget cuts.

Third stage of the plan is a push for cultural events which can be show-cased in the new theatre. Included is a grand piano for the facility.

Phase four earmarks a portion of funds for athletics, especially for furnishings for apartments for student-athletes too far from home to commute. The funds are expected to help more competitive teams at the college.

In an attempt to show support for the plan, members of the DSC staff have already pledged more than \$18,000, and enough money has been raised by students to begin an annual scholarship


Many Lauderdale Countains know me, as I have lived here all my married life (38 years); my husband, Marcus Jo Garrett, lived in this county most of his life, and died also.

want every citizen to know I am proud to stand up and say I'm from Lauderdale County.

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
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
