Not So Simple

Last week President Reagan introduced a proposal to simplify the income tax laws with certain clauses that will eliminate income taxes for the poor and insure that all corporations and high income individuals will pay some tax.

We are not at all certain just what effect the proposed changes will have on the general economy and if some of the changes are even desirable.

We are certain that while it is advanced as a tax simplification plan, passage of any such measure will be far from simple. By the time special interest groups are finished in attempts to amend such a bill, it is likely that it will be simple in name only.

We hope that the Congress will act on this badly needed bill, but we are not optimistic.

Board Holding Halls Tax Rate

Halls' Board of Mayor and Aldermen last week retained the present \$2.30 per \$100 tax rate, financing a proposed 1985-86 budget of \$1,617,746.79, down about \$66,000 from 1984-85.

Mayor Sammie Arnold was authorized to determine the low bid on a new tractor and mower and buy. Stallings Implement Co. was low bidder at \$5,024.24, but it was not clear whether the bid included the mower.

The Board approved a contract with Alexander & Holmes, of Dyersburg, to audit the city books for a fee of \$4,500.

The Board approved the sale of an abandoned water tank at Nankipoo to Thomas Hammock for \$50; delayed action on bids to paint the water tank in Forked Deer-Concord community, for further study; and deferred action on a request by Larry Reynolds for natural gas service, until cost can be determined.

Speaker



NICKY CRUZ, internationally acclaimed crusader against drugs and violence, will appear on Ripley's Knee Field this Thursday, after the Laymen Quartet and Dan Perry provide music beginning at 7 p.m.

Cruz, whose story was depicted in the well-known book and film *The Cross and The Switchblade*, and his best-selling autobiography *Run Baby Run*, was once the leader of a fierce New York City street gang.

The squalor and the filth he encountered as a lonely, frustrated Puerto Rican teenager drove him to the false security of the gang-family.

Once he proved his toughness to the gang members, Cruz directed his hatred and anger into drugs, alcohol, and brutal violence. He led the feared Mau Mau gang into streetfights, bloody retaliations and senseless killings.

One psychologist told him, "You're on a one-way street to jail, the electric chair and Hell."

The radical change came from the persistent efforts of evangelist David Wilkerson, whose street-gang ministry pierced through Cruz's fierce exterior and touched the lonely boy beneath.

At a time of deep despair, he turned away from the gang life and decided to spend his life helping others to find an inner peace and understanding.

Since that time, Cruz has traveled around the world giving compassion, encouragement and hope to those in need. He touches on many issues including pot smoking, drug abuse, sex, child-parent relationships and the role of prayer in the home.

He shares his own personal experiences and advice in plain language, weaving the story of how emptiness and fear turned into confidence and hope.

Currently, Cruz is involved in establishing a counseling network, including Youth Outreach Centers, to offer guidance and shelter to troubled young people. He spends the remainder of his time in Colorado Springs, Colorado, with his wife and four daughters.

Admission to the appearance is free. The appearance is sponsored by participating churches in Lauderdale and surrounding counties.

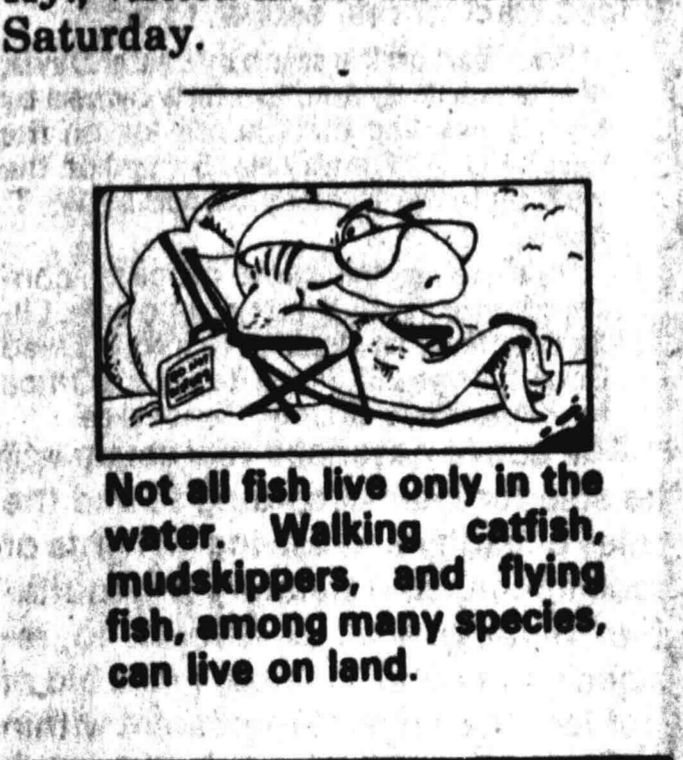

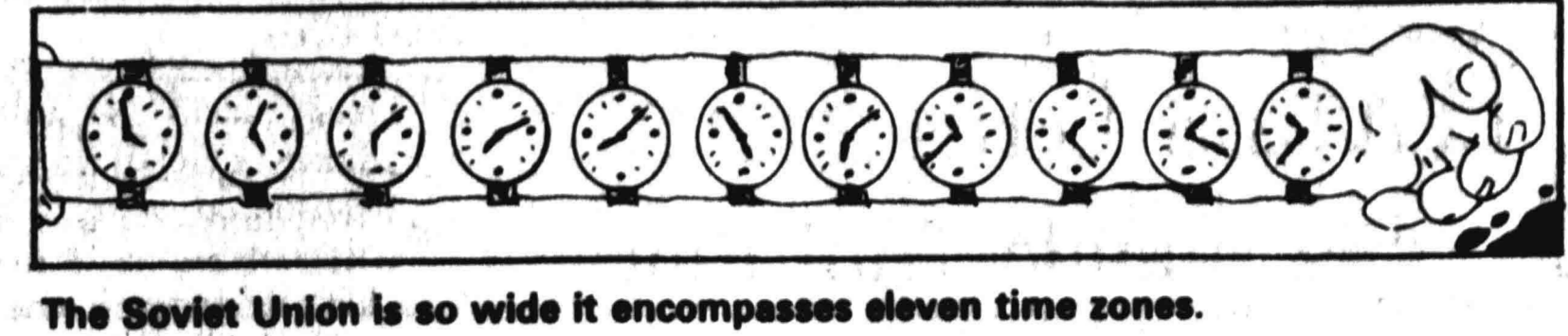

Big Buffalo Trail Ride

"Some people like to ride in horse shows, some people like to ride in rodeos and some people just like to ride." Mike McDonald tilts back his cowboy hat and explains the appeal of his family's development, the Big Buffalo Trail Rides, Inc., located in north Wayne County, Tennessee.

"Trail rides are rides taken with other horse-lovers who enjoy being out in the open, riding with others and seeing new and interesting territory," McDonald said. "I ride on my farm but I get tired of riding over the same area. The Big Buffalo Trail Rides give people a chance to ride through unspoiled woodlands and at the same time enjoy the fellowship of other horse-lovers."

Week-long trail rides are scheduled three times a year at the Big Buffalo Trail Rides' permanent camp on the Buffalo River. Two rides are scheduled each summer and one ride, in mid-October, is timed to show off the fall colors on the surrounding wooded rolling hills of middle Tennessee.

McDonald, along with his father, Fred McDonald, and his brother-in-law, Tim Aston, have developed the campground which serves as the base for all the rides. The facilities include a kitchen and dining hall, two sets of bathrooms, stall barns, a general store/office, two riding arenas and campsites.

The campground, located four miles off Highway 13 in Wayne County, is 50 acres of cleared land nestled in a curve of the Buffalo River.

"The campground is surrounded by 30,000 acres of forest land, available to us for the trail rides," McDonald said. "This is wooded territory that does not have fences and gates to go around. Our trails are cleared and marked and a lot of them are old logging roads through the Tennessee hills."

During each trail-ride week, guided rides are offered daily, beginning at about 9 a.m. Two half-day rides - one fast and one slow - and one all-day ride give riders a choice depending on the type of horse they have and the amount of time they wish to spend on the trail. Each guided ride has a lead trail boss and a drag trail boss.

"The half-day rides return at lunch, and the all-day rides include lunch served on the trail, with riders returning at approximately 5 p.m."

"We don't want anybody to be uncomfortable with riding these trails. Any novice rider can participate without difficulty," McDonald said. "No one is compelled to take any of the rides, and there are other recreational opportunities available during the day."

A wilderness overnight ride is an option for experienced riders. Riders eat and sleep on the trail, riding two full days.

Each camper brings his or her own horse and must furnish camping gear and sleeping facilities - which range from sleeping bags under the stars to sophisticated recreational vehicles. Campsites are not reserved, and electrical hookups are available for a small additional charge per day. Firewood is available at no charge.

The fee for each week covers campground privileges, all meals, trail rides and nightly entertainment. Motels are available in the area for those who do not wish to camp, but all riders must pay full trail ride fees, even if meals are not eaten.

"We have good home-cooked Tennessee-style food," McDonald said. "Free coffee is available 24 hours a day at the dining facility."

Country and western music is played in the dining hall, which has rustic decor and red-checked tablecloths, beginning at 8 p.m. each night. "We have a band each even-

ing and people are welcome to push back the tables and dance or sing if they want to," McDonald said. "The band also welcomes requests for favorite tunes."

Nashville tours for groups of 10 or more, featuring a visit to the Grand Ole Opry, are available on advance reservation and for an additional fee. The Country & Western Tours package includes round-trip

Big Land Sale Spurs Fears



SALE OF 5,832 ACRES (bordered, approximately, in dots) from more than 32,000 acres of Lauderdale County lands owned by Anderson-Tully Lumber Co., of Memphis, to the Nature Conservancy, to be donated to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to establish a Chickasaw National Wildlife Refuge, removes more of the county's 325,800 acres from the tax rolls, notes County Executive William Tucker IV. The purchase ups federal ownership from 3,027 acres, mostly in the Lower Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge; though the county receives in-lieu-of-tax payments on these acres, they are not guaranteed and have been declining and may vanish as the federal government struggles to reduce its deficit. And the Conservancy plans to purchase more A&T lands: With the state already paying no taxes on 8,600 acres of Fort Pillow State Prison Farm and Fort Pillow State Historical Area, county taxpayers, receptive as they are to all these useful institutions, are being deprived of normal real estate taxes to provide resources to the state and federal governments—when those governments are cutting back on their support, Tucker warns.

Beauty Queen's Death Charged As Homicide

Morris Mealer, 35, of McKenzie, is charged with vehicular homicide in the death Sunday on Kentucky Lake of Joyce Renee Shatley, 17, of Halls, second runner-up to Miss Tennessee Teen USA.

Mealer is free on \$5,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is set July 2nd in Henry County General Sessions Court.

Tennessee Bureau of Investigation Agent Ansel McDuffee said a bass boat driven by Mealer was out of control and rammed a ski boat in which Miss Shatley was a passenger near Pine Point Campground.

"She was struck in all probability by a part of the boat," McDuffee says. She was not thrown into the water.
