Phone Booth Suicide Is Echo Of Brother's

After Bonnie Elaine (Mrs. Clue Gaines) Howell, 34, granddaughter of Mrs. Myra McAlister, of Halls, was killed Tuesday of last week, police report, by Wiley Ray Watson, 39, in the Brownsville home they shared, he shot himself to death in a phone booth in much the same manner as his younger brother, seven years ago.

Police Chief Jerry Wyatt said Watson, an employee of Cub Cadet Manufacturing Co., called the Haywood County Ambulance Authority at 12:06 p.m. and said he "hurt Mrs. Howell real bad."

Within minutes, Watson called back, saying he had shot himself. But he would not reveal his location.

Paramedics found Mr. Watson lying unconscious in a phone booth near the National Guard Armory, less than 30 minutes later. He died about 2:30 p.m. in Haywood Park Hospital, of a single wound in the chest.

Wyatt says the two deaths are considered a murder-suicide.

Seven years ago, Watson's younger brother, Tommy Lee Watson, fatally shot his wife before shooting himself in a phone booth near the same armory, according to police records.

Wiley Watson was a member of the First Presbyterian Church. He was a member of the Haywood County Rescue Squad and was a volunteer fireman with the Brownsville Fire Department.

Services were at 10 a.m. Thursday in Brownsville Funeral Home, with burial in Oakwood Cemetery.

He leaves a daughter, Miss Sheila Watson, of Monroe, N.C.; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Rye Watson, a sister, Mrs. Peggy Young, and a brother, John Thomas Watson, all of Brownsville.

Services for Mrs. Howell were at 4 p.m. Thursday in Halls Funeral Home, with burial in South Fork Cemetery near Halls.

She also leaves a son, Clues 'Tubby' Howell, of Lucedale; a daughter, Miss Patricia Elaine Howell, of Brownsville; her mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Mayfield, of Alamo; her father, Roy Calvin Pendergrass, of Pascagoula, Miss.; and two brothers, Charles Pendergrass, of Alamo, and William Lee Pendergrass, of Pascagoula.

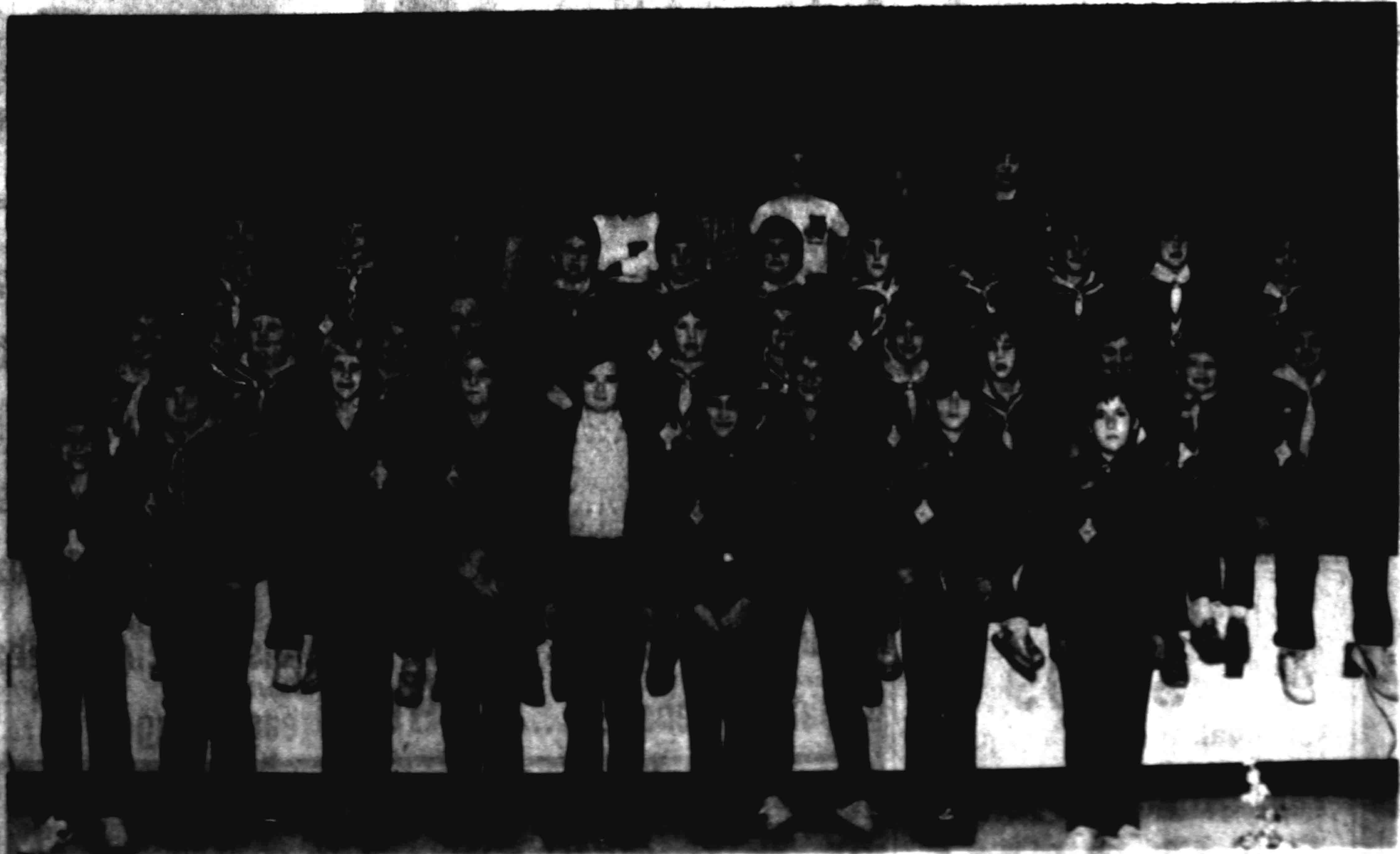

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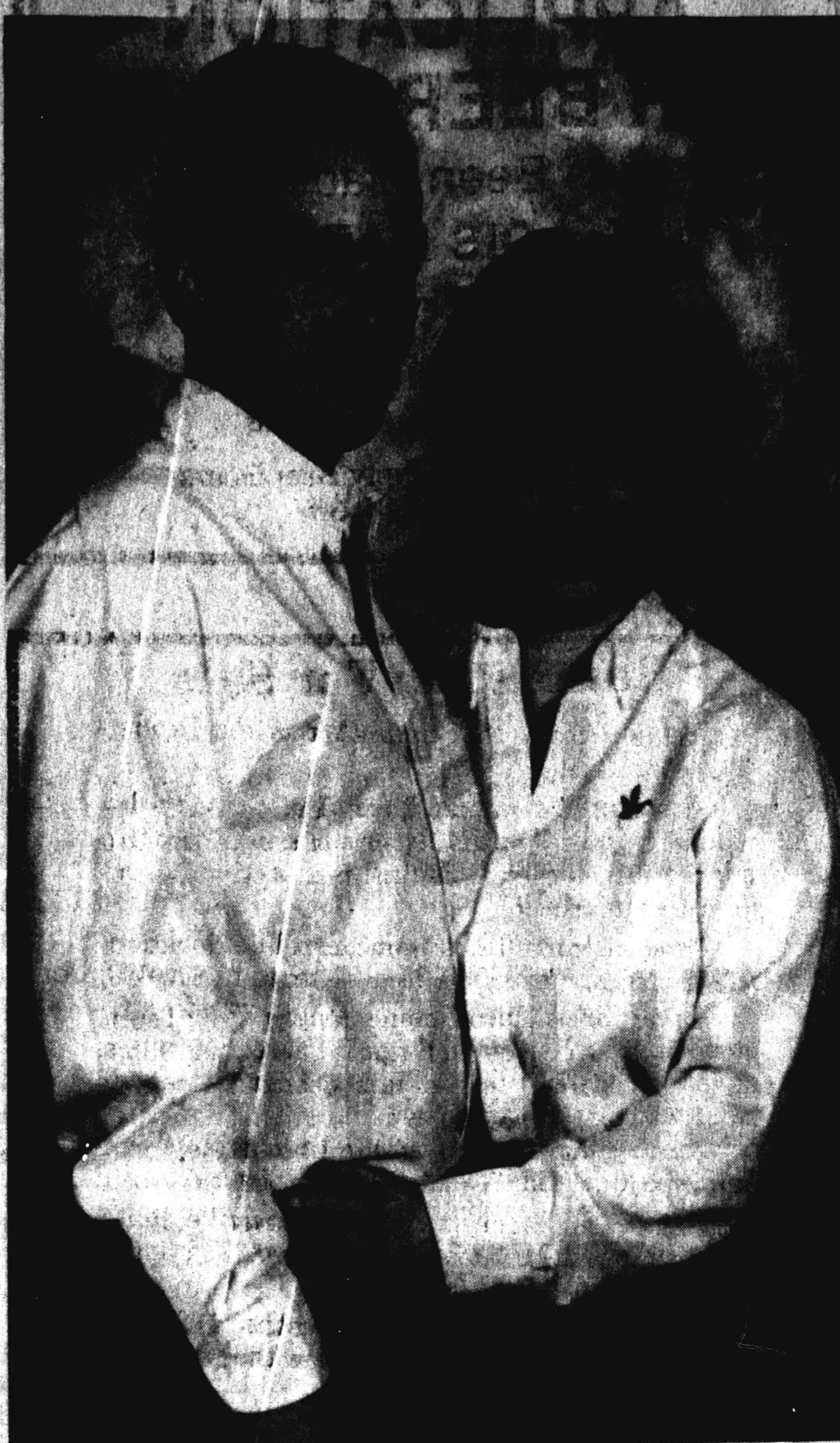

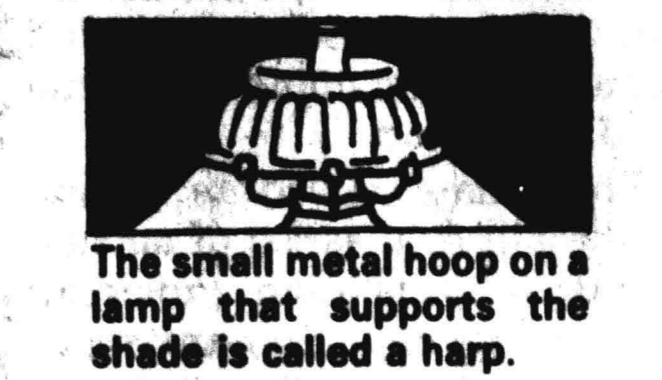

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Since the 99th Congress, debate has droned on and become more and more partisan over the controversy surrounding the election of a Member of Congress in the Eighth District of Indiana. At present, both candidates, the incumbent Congressman Frank McCloskey, and the challenger Mr. Richard McIntyre, are claiming victory. However, due to the complexities and alleged irregularities in the vote counting and recounting, neither has been seated by the House of Representatives. Instead, the entire matter has been referred to the Committee on House Administration which is the House Committee charged with the responsibility of investigating contested elections.

Obviously, the problems in this election all began on election day. At the end of the days' voting, Mr. McCloskey, a Democrat, was the apparent winner by a very small margin of 72 votes. A recount was requested by Mr. McIntyre, a Republican. After the ballots on one county in the 15-county district were recounted, the Indiana Secretary of State declared Mr. McIntyre the winner. After that, the situation only got more complicated with each passing day.

After the one-county recount resulted in a McIntyre margin of victory of 34 votes, a recount in another county put Mr. McCloskey in the lead again. Finally, when a district-wide recount was completed, Mr. McIntyre was again declared the winner with a 418 vote margin which would presume to show a clear victory. Unfortunately, that recount also included the disqualification of 5,000 ballots though no voter fraud charges were suspected. In some precincts, every vote was disqualified for various technical reasons.

Though another vote was taken in the House of Representatives on who should be seated, the matter remains under investigation by the House Administration Committee. In addition, several suits have been filed, one by a group of voters in the district challenging the disqualification.

clauding the bill for the President's signature.

"The Senate version of the bill provides for a 100 percent increase in the amount of the loan guarantee to our farmers," said Jones who chairs the Subcommittee that marked the bill up and needed its passage in the House in only seven days.

Jones said that consideration of the Senate version of the bill precludes the need for a Conference Committee to work out differences in the House and Senate versions of the bill.

Acceptance of the Senate version of the bill by the House would send the bill to the President.

The Senate version of the credit legislation provides an additional \$1.85 billion of Farmers Home Administration loan guarantees authority compared to the House's \$3 billion. Unlike the House version, however, the Senate version of the bill provides for an interest rate subsidy. Eligibility requirements for advance Commodity Credit Corporation crop loans are essentially the same though less restrictive than the House version.

"The emergency nature of this bill dictates that it be passed as expeditiously as possible so that its provisions are available to farmers as they plant this spring's crops," Jones added. "This is the best way to achieve that goal. With the overwhelming majority (818-103) that the House version of the bill obtained last week, I see no reason why the Senate version should not command the same kind of support."

The Senate passed its version of the bill as a series of amendments to legislation providing for emergency humanitarian food assistance for African nations whose populations are suffering from low food supplies due to extended droughts.

Presidential approval of the legislation is far from assured since it has been reported that the President opposes it and plans to veto the entire package of emergency farm aid and farm assistance.

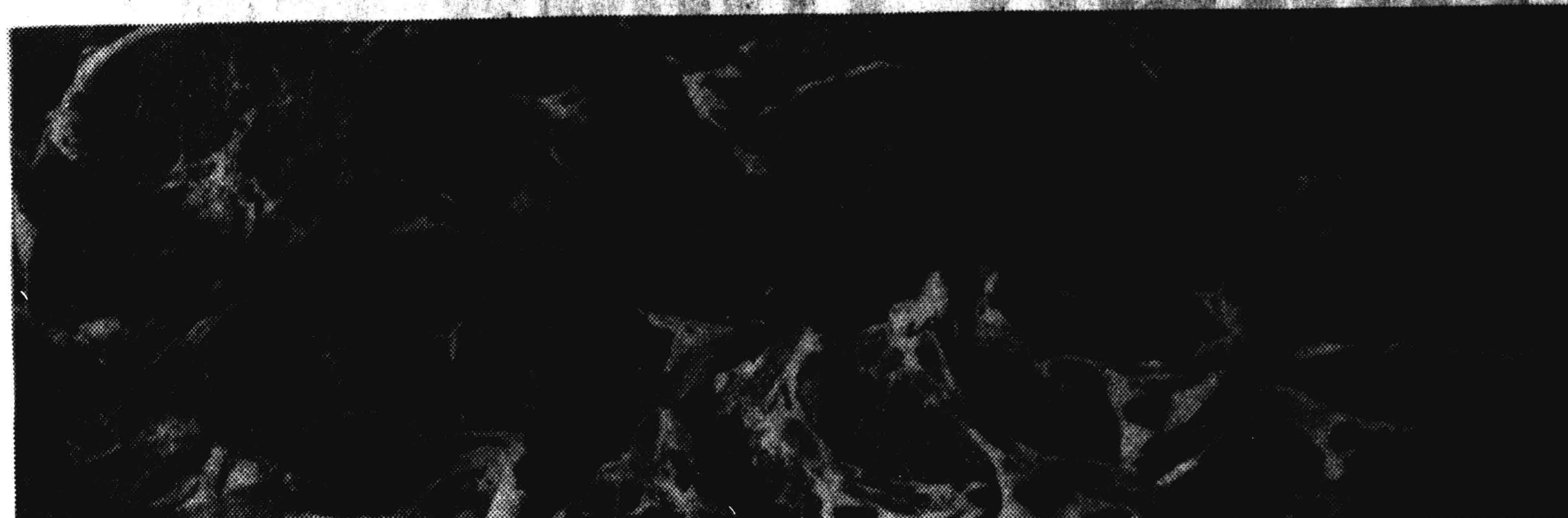

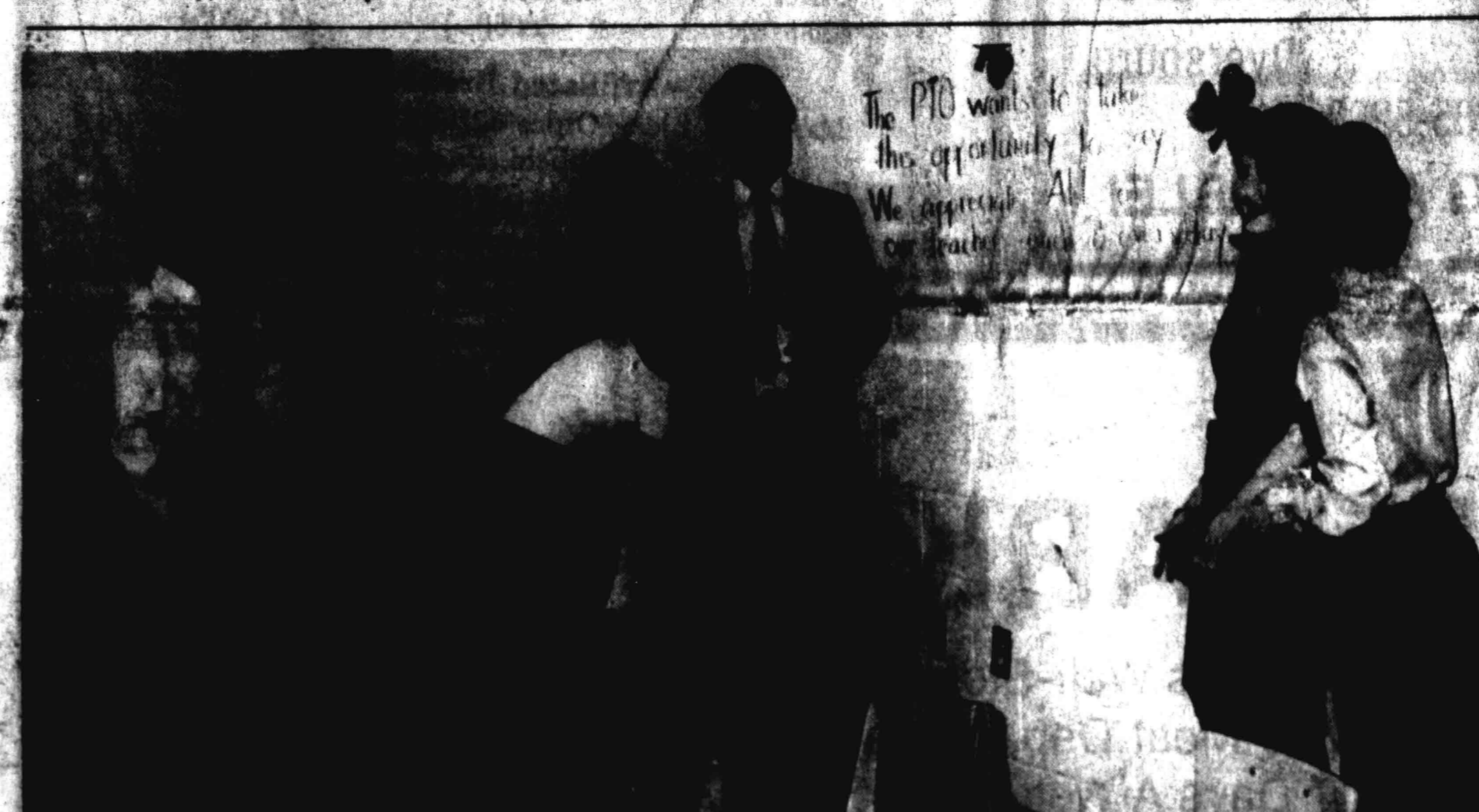

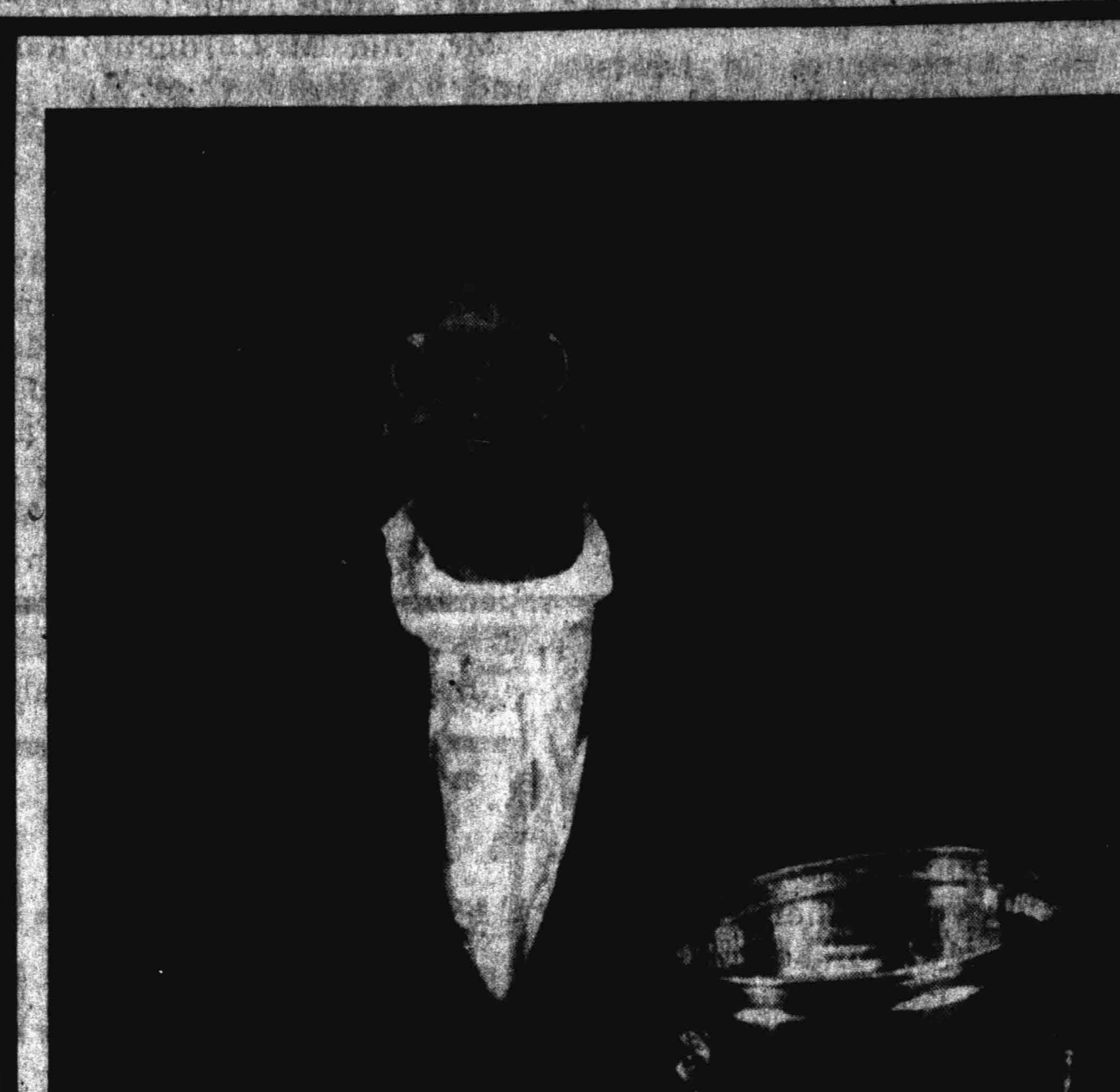

Ex-Mayor Arnold Runs Against Mayor Jacobs

Halls Mayor Joe Jacobs will be opposed by former Mayor Sammie L. Arnold in the Halls city election, May 2nd. Jacobs is seeking election for a second term. Arnold has served six terms as mayor and one term as alderman. Only two men, former alderman Noel Sherrod and Lester Lee Kilzer, had qualified in the race for the six seats on the Board of Aldermen at noon Monday. Qualifying deadline for the election is noon Saturday.

County Families Short On Plans And Records

Surveys are conducted annually to guide the Agricultural Extension Service in planning the home economics program for this county.

Jane H. Connell and Christene Anderson, associate Extension agents, met with a committee March 13th to evaluate the results of the Family Resource Management and Interior Design Surveys conducted in the fall of 1983. The committee was composed of Mrs. Earlene Halliburton, Mrs. Clifford Sweat, Jr., Mrs. Helen Wadsworth, Mrs. F. H. Paschal, and Mrs. Stella Harris.

The survey showed some improvement in home-makers making long-range plans, from 38% in 1977 to 63.3% in 1983.

Budgeting, however, was extremely weak; only 33% of those surveyed had a family budget.

Home-makers scored well on selecting and purchasing home furnishings, reading labels and hang tags, and considering guarantees and services (80%). The 1977 survey showed only 45% interested in guarantees and services.

The survey showed a lack of planning and setting both short and long-range goals, record keeping and having a written will. Home-makers felt their plans were least adequate for life insurance, savings, and vacation. These families least often planned in advance for food (30%), clothing (12.5%), and recreation (20%).

Only 25% of the families surveyed had written wills; however, in 1978, only 15.4% of those surveyed had wills.

Home-makers keeping records in 1983 were 57% compared to 31% in 1978.



Board Says People Should Elect Supt.

The county Board of Education voted unanimously Thursday of last week "to support the present method of selection of the Superintendent of Schools in Lauderdale County through election by the voters...."

"Lauderdale County Board of Education opposes the appointment of the Superintendent of Schools by either the Lauderdale County Commission or the Lauderdale County Board of Education."

County Commission Monday of last week approved, 18-5, a motion by Billy Spence, seconded by Roland Henderson, to seek state legislation to allow the Commission to elect the county Superintendent of Schools.

County Executive William Tucker IV allowed the vote, although the matter was not on the CC's agenda for the day. The County Court, which became the CC, agreed years ago to balk such surprise maneuvers by requiring agenda listing of matters to come before the Commission, so that all interested parties could be heard before action was taken.

Nays came from Delmus Connell, Lawson Elder, Robert Flagg, Gus Hargett, and Charlie Moore. Don Ammons and Gwinn Mathews abstained from voting.

From the County Court Clerk's rough notes, this newspaper reported last week that the motion was offered by Clifford Sweat and seconded by Spence, and that Roy Cook was one of the five nays, instead of Delmus Connell. We gladly correct the record, as now reflected in the Commission's minutes, with apologies for the misinformation.

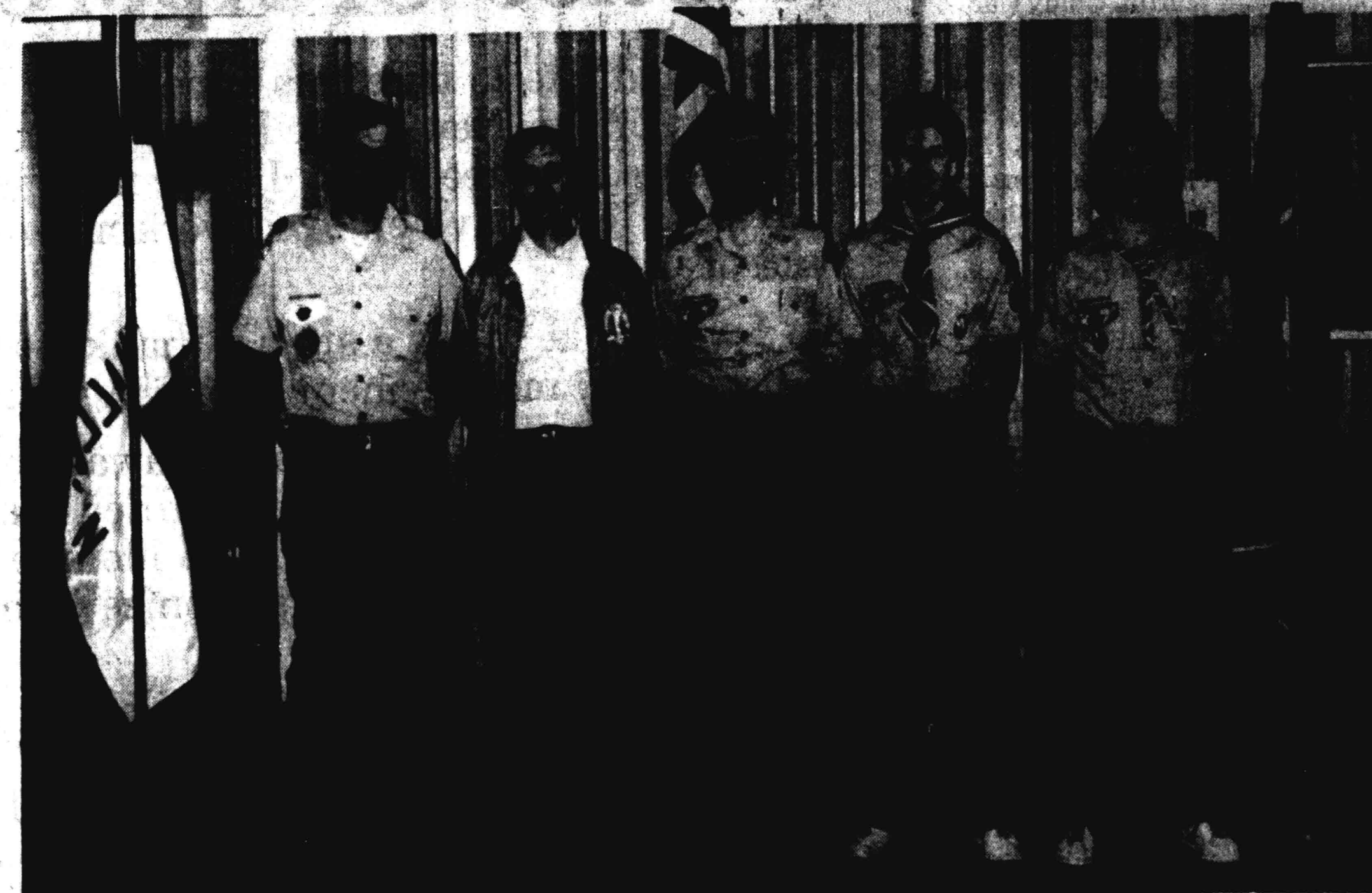

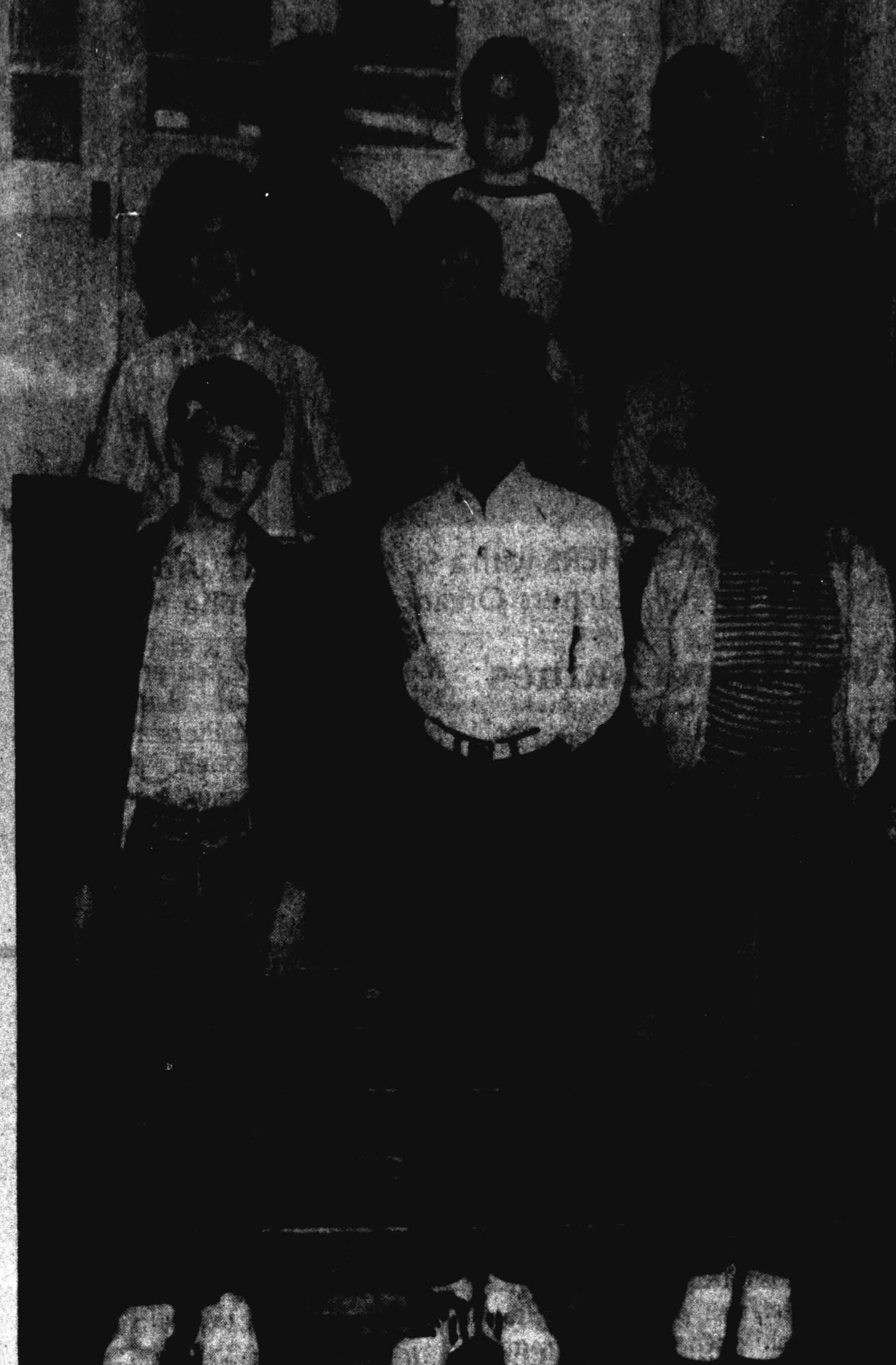

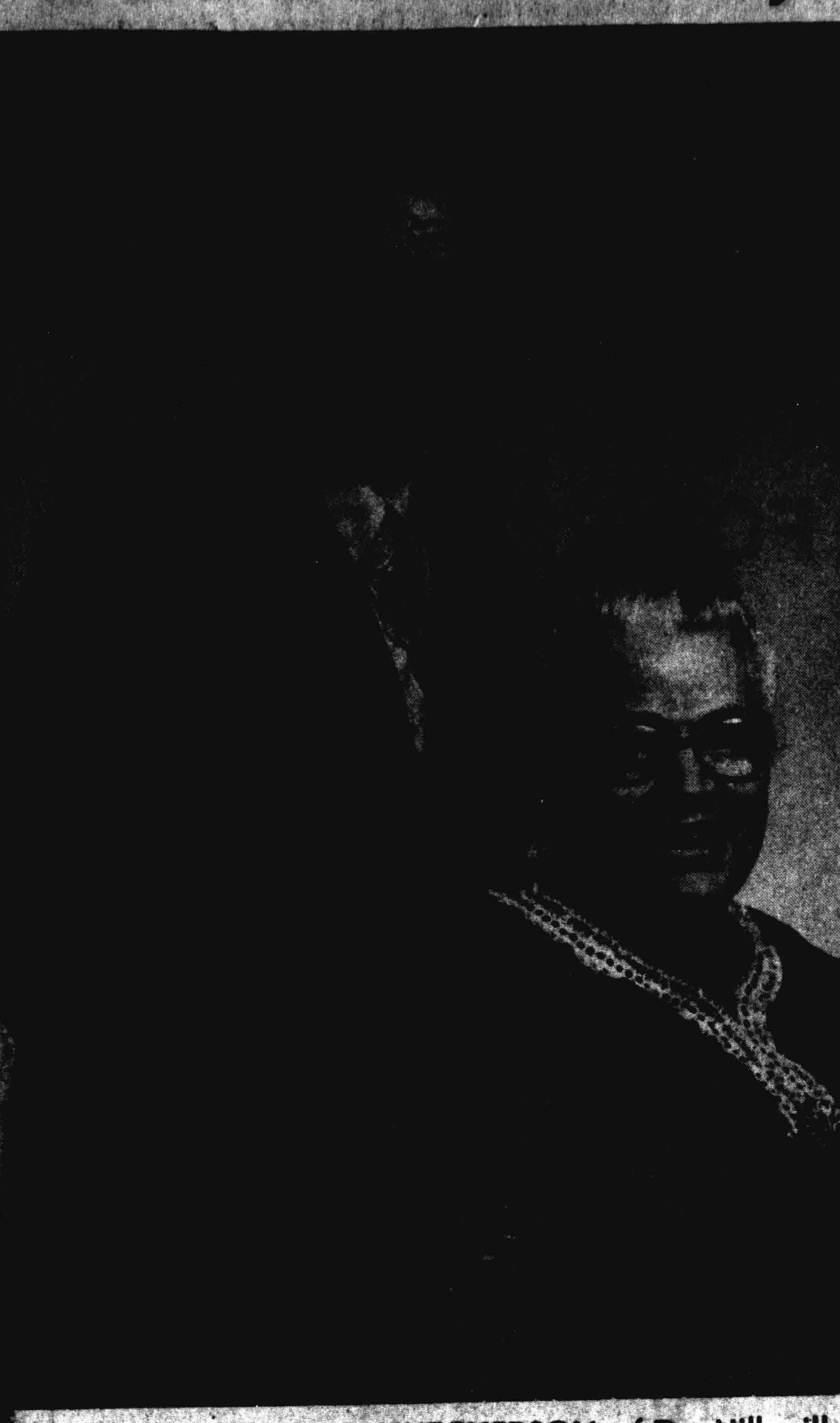

See How They're Made!

Tennessee's long standing reputation as a place of rural peace and scenic beauty is well deserved, but something of a facade as well. In recent years, Tennessee has been steadily moving to the forefront among the nation's industrial states. The more than 6,000 manufacturing firms in Tennessee produce a total of some 11,000 different products ranging from accordions and automobiles to zippers, zithers and zwieback.

Tennessee industries range from small manufacturers employing a handful of people to such industrial giants as Nissan, Combustion Engineering, Tennessee Eastman and Du Pont. Many Tennessee manufacturing operations also offer public tours, generally arranged through the firm's public relations office. Most companies require advance notification. Tour sizes are often limited and tours are frequently available only on specific days.

An exception to this general rule are the Jack Daniel's Distillery at Lynchburg, the George Dickel Distillery at Tullahoma, and the Ship Brewery at Memphis, all of which are equipped to handle free tours for all comers with no advance notification required.

Many of Tennessee's soft drink bottlers also offer public tours. One of the most interesting of these is the Chattanooga Coca-Cola bottling plant. The popular beverage was first bottled in Chattanooga in 1899 and in addition to tours, the modern plant also features a small museum of Coca-Cola artifacts, including the original contract in which Coca-Cola assigned bottling rights to what was then a fountain drink to two Chattanooga attorneys for the magnificent sum of \$1.

That first Coca-Cola bottling plant also led to the establishment of Chattanooga Glass Company, which once made most of the Coca-Cola bottles used throughout the world, and Cavalier Corporation, which still makes most of the world's supply of Coca-Cola vending machines.

Among Tennessee's most interesting industrial tours is the Nissan Motor Manufacturing Corporation U.S.A. plant at Smyrna, one of the most modern and highly automated motor vehicle assembly plants in the world.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

About 10 days ago, American arms control negotiators left for Geneva to begin discussing arms control with a like delegation from the Soviet Union. Within days of their departure, the death of the Soviet leader was announced and his successor installed. While all of these events are being watched extremely closely by the rest of the world, they also hold great interest and some direct relationship with legislation pending before the Congress. Later this month, the House will debate and vote on spending resolutions that will release \$1.5 billion in funds for production of 21 additional MX missiles.

These funds were authorized last year during debate on defense authorization legislation. The spending of these funds was postponed until these resolutions are passed. It is expected that the Senate will take up the resolutions this week and the House will follow next week. The production of the MX has long been a controversial issue. Originally, the controversy centered on the need for the new, more powerful missile. After the question of its use was resolved, the controversy shifted to how it would be deployed. It was first thought that the missile would be deployed on a large track. The missiles would be moved constantly so that their locations could not be detected and thus their vulnerability minimized.

Because that method of deploying them would be extremely expensive and because the western states where the missiles were to be deployed objected, President Reagan changed the method of deployment. Instead of a track-type movable basing system, the President decided to base the missiles in existing missile silos. Now the debate focuses on whether or not this method of deployment accomplishes the goals the MX was designed to achieve; that being, a counter-balance to similar Soviet missiles already deployed.

Those discussions continue to go on and form the nucleus of the debate over the resolutions that are pending now. However, the most effective argument on the continued production of the missiles is the new arms control negotiations now underway. The reasons are clear. The Soviet negotiators must understand that the United States will continue its buildup and modernization to maintain our own national security unless the Soviets negotiate seriously to limit nuclear arms. Those who advocate the continued production of the MX missile argue that

negotiating position in Geneva. Needless to say, those negotiations are important to world peace and stability. The bipartisan nature of the negotiating team is an indication of how those talks are viewed by all elected leaders. That is not to say that there are not still legitimate concerns over the effectiveness and necessity of the missile. However, the argument for its continued support during these negotiations, which tend to succeed or fail on nuance and subtlety, should not be overlooked. The goal of these talks, as idealistic as it might sound, is to establish a climate among the world's superpowers that will eliminate the need for weapons such as these. That day remains far away, but the effort to make progress in that direction must be given the opportunity to succeed.

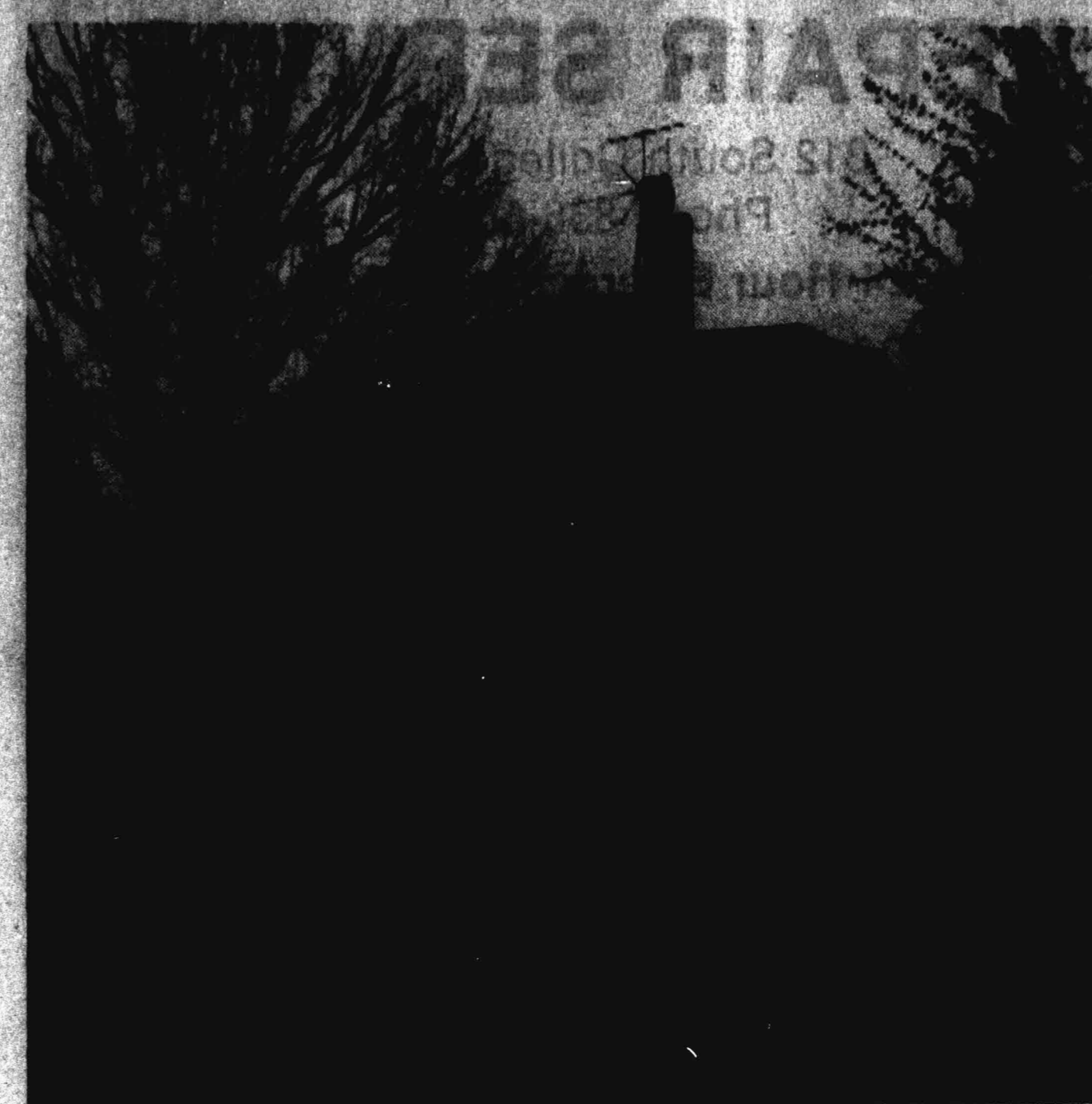

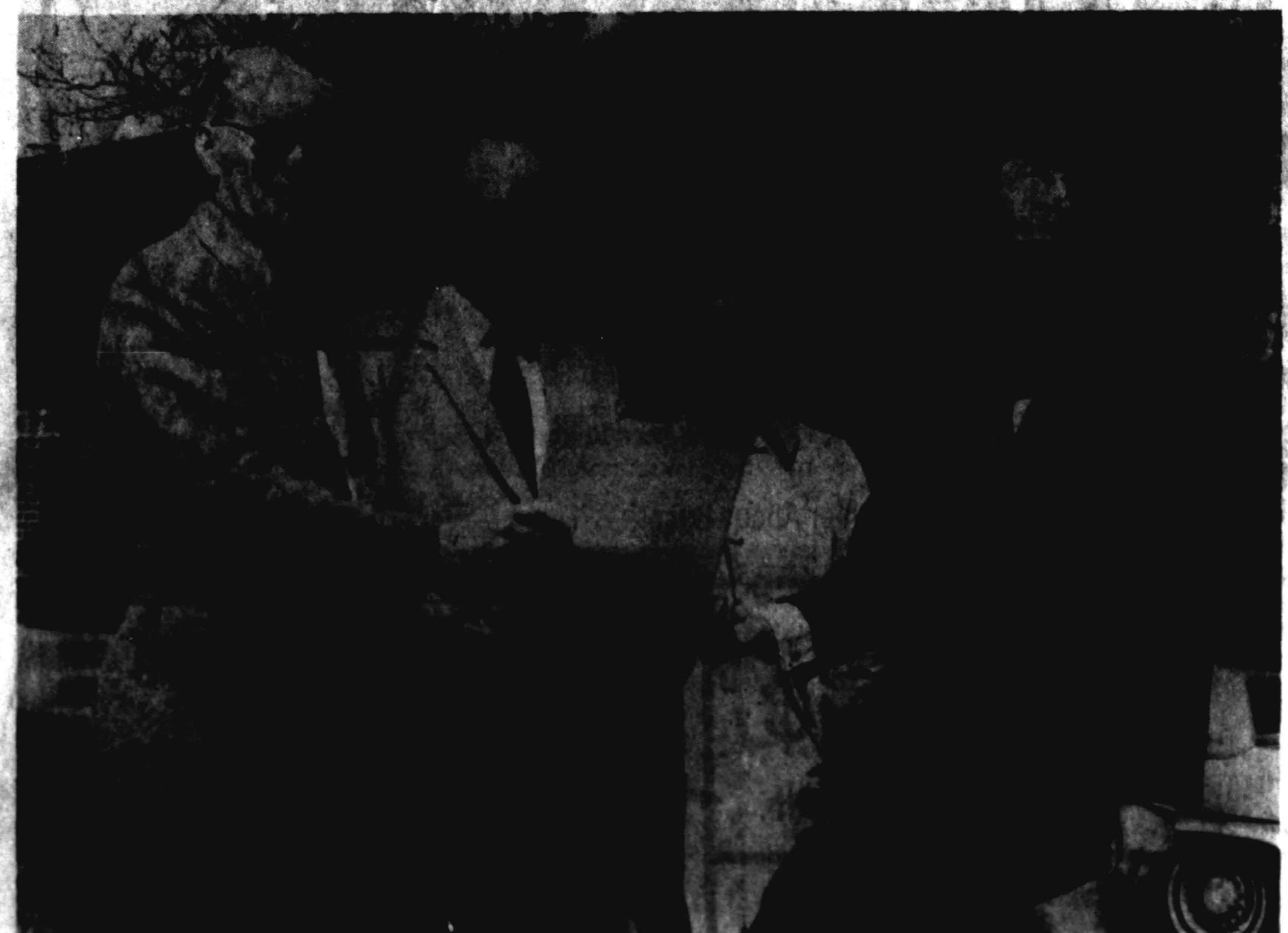
