### Help Needed Now

Members of the Halls Cemetery Association committee and Mrs. L. E. Crihfield, Jr., secretary-treasurer, tell your editor the association is direly in need of additional funds if the cemetery is to be maintained as it has been in past years.

Marshall Pierce, committee member, in asking for our help in publicizing the need for more money, told us that continually increasing operating costs are fast depleting the approxi mately \$2,000 on hand at the beginning of the mowing season Pierce said that it has been necessary to terminate a contract to maintain the cemetery, because of unsatisfactory performance. Another contractor has assumed the job and is presently getting the cemetery in satisfactory condition. Estimates are that \$200 per week, for about 26 weeks, will be

Probably fewer than 10% of the members of the Congress would argue that the federal budget is not out of hand and desperately needs to be gotten under control, but apparently not even that great a percentage is willing to bite the bullet and take the necessary steps to reduce the budget.

In recent weeks, President Reagan and Republican members of the Senate have reached an agreement for cuts that would make a big dent in the deficit, but apparently the measure has little or no chance to be passed

We are not suggesting that the compromise budget is the best possible measure, but at least it is a step forward. However, almost every senator or representative is screaming that this or that should not be cut. Perhaps they are right, but its self-evident that cuts must be made. Of course, cuts can be made in the defense budget, but not nearly enough to get the deficit under control. Many of us do not want Social Security cut, but your editor can't quite understand the contention that slowing cost of living increases is a cut. No one drawing Social

Security will be drawing any less. Members of Congress had the opportunity last week to make a token gesture toward lowering the deficit by passing a measure to cut their pay by 10%, but the cut never had a

Over the years, voters have had a tendency to forget what their senators or representatives did in the past, but we wonder if the memory of the voters isn't becoming better. Failure to make definite steps to cut the deficit this year may prove costly to office holders in future elections. We hope so!





There is no clear cut evidence that the basketball team nor Coach Dana Kirk have been involved in anything illegal, ulthough there can be no doubt that NCAA regulations were violated when Memphis State supporters allowed one member of the team to borrow and drive cars. There are allegations that some team members were given more money than regulations allowed, but apparently there was no effort to conceal the pay-

# More Gasoline Tax

Tennesseans will be paying an additional 3¢ per gallon for gasoline soon. The state legislature has passed, and Gov. Lamar Alexander is expected to sign, a bill placing an additional 3¢ tax on gasoline, with the money to be used for roads.
