## Bean Acreage Drops Again

Soybean acreage in Tennessee declined in 1985 for the sixth consecutive year. The largest soybean acreage ever harvested in Tennessee was in 1979, when 2,620,000 acres were harvested, with a yield of 27 bushels per acre, for a total value of \$449,200,000. Soybean producers in 1985 will harvest 1,360,000 acres, expected to average 28 bushels—at \$5 per bushel, about \$200,000,000, less than half the value of the 1979 crop. The value of the 1984 crop was \$286,600,000 in Tennessee. The Tennessee Soybean Expo and annual meeting will be held Feb. 27th at the Civil Center in Jackson. The Expo and annual meeting will be a 1-day event.

## Protect Fruit Trees

Winter freeze damage, also called southwest trunk injury, affects many fruit trees in Tennessee each year. This injury results from extensive temperature fluctuations in the bark on the south to southwest side of the tree trunk.

Even though the air temperature may be below freezing, bark temperatures on the side of the trunk facing the sun may exceed 80 to 90° F. on a clear, sunny day. At these temperatures, cells lose hardness quickly. At night, bark temperatures quickly drop to the same level as the air temperature. If this is much below freezing, cells in the trunk may be injured or killed.

Trees in the range of two to eight years of age appear to be the most susceptible to southwest trunk injury. Bark on these trees is thinner and smoother than on older trees and heats more. Also, trees in the above age range have large enough trunks to expose a lot of surface area to sunlight.

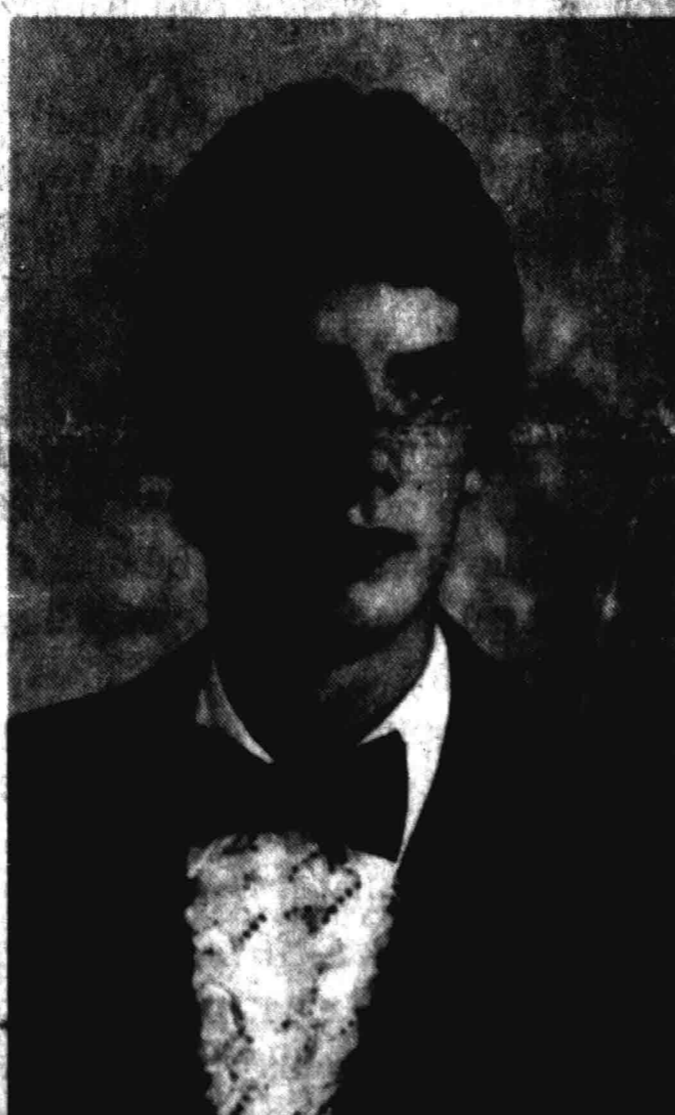
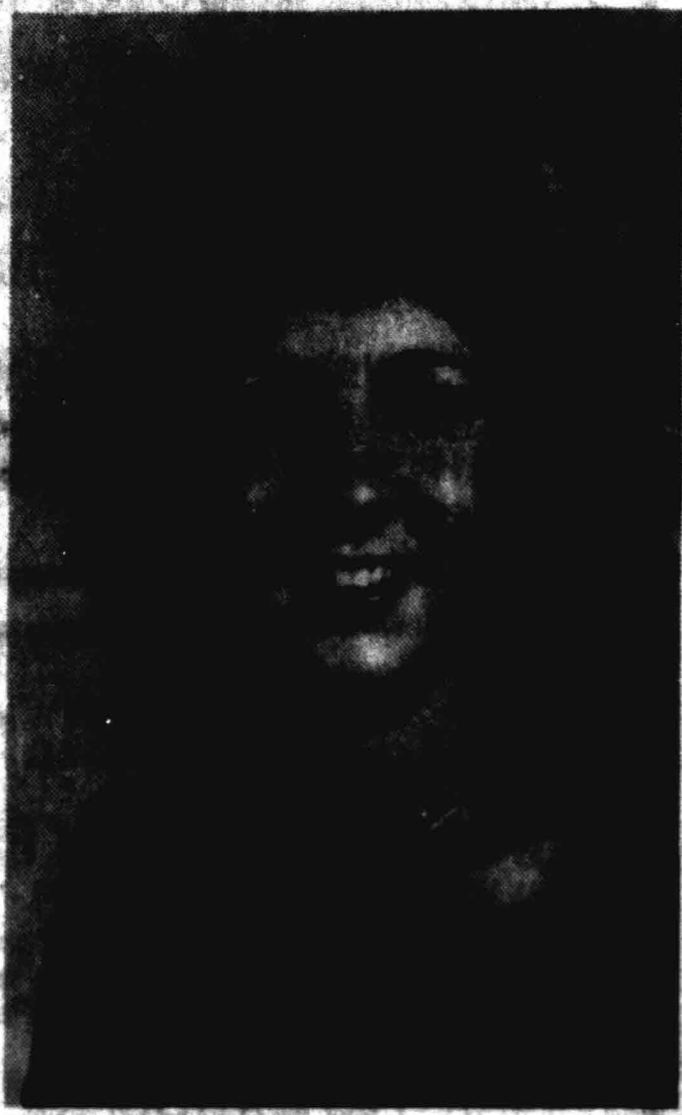
Several methods of preventing or at least reducing the amount of winter damage to tree trunks exist. All methods depend on insulating the trunk from the sun's rays or reflecting sunlight to reduce heating.

Guards put around the trunks can be made of reflective foil, white paper, or plastic. These guards should extend from two inches below ground level up to about 14 to 18 inches above ground.

White latex paint may be applied to tree trunks from ground level up to about 18 inches above ground. Paint either all the way around the trunk or at least the south to southwest sides of the trunk. The white paint reflects sunlight and keeps the trunk cooler. Bark temperatures as much as 40 to 50° F. lower have been recorded on painted trunks vs. unpainted trunks.

Put guards or paint on in November. Allow the tree to harden off first. If painting, select a warm, sunny day so the

If guards that will not allow good air or spray penetration are used, they should be removed in spring.

## Farm Taxes Going Up?

Two of the proposals in the Reagan administration's tax reform plan would increase taxes for farmers.

The proposals which would hit agriculture hardest are the eliminations of the investment tax credit and income averaging.

Eliminating investment tax credit would have a negative impact on most farmers. Under present law, farmers are able either to reduce or, in some cases, eliminate their tax liability with investment credit.

Although elimination of this credit would increase farmers' taxes, lower tax rates in the reform plan would offset the loss of investment credit for some farmers. In some cases, taxes might be lower because of the reduced rates.

The actual effect on the individual farmer would depend on the level of income and the amount of property qualified for the investment credit.

Another change this proposal would bring is in the way farmers make investment decisions. More decisions would be based on economics rather than reducing taxes.

## Control For Moles

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Palmer, of 135 Lafayette, Ripley, may have found a new method of control-

ling moles. In California a year or so ago, they heard of a plant called gopher purge, have tried it, and it seems to work.

Gopher purge is a bi-annual meaning it will grow 1 1/2 to 2 years making seeds and dying. The seeds can be collected and replanted in the spring.

Gopher purge likes to be kept on the dry side, and over-watering will sometimes cause it to rot in the ground. These plants grow best in full sun but will do well in partial shade.

## Halls Board Approve Purchase of Cable TV

Representatives from Enstar Cable TV received the Halls Board of Mayor and Aldermen's approval to purchase the rights to the local television service from Ripley Cable TV at Monday night's meeting, if the companies can complete on-going purchase negotiations.

Ronnie Slaughter, spokesman for the trio of Enstar representatives, explained that the company, with a regional office in Covington, serves more than 50 municipalities with 28 cable systems, including the Atlanta area. If the purchase is completed, the Halls area will see no changes during the transfer but eventual plans call for improved service and more channels.

Slaughter, John Bombs, who will be in charge of operations and finances, and John Secrest reported that President Reagan will begin deregulating cable television rates in January of 1987.

In other business, Mayor Sammie Arnold told the aldermen that Basil Smith would be contacted to appraise land owned by Bud Fitzhugh in an attempt to help the city and Fitzhugh settle an argument caused by the

installation of a natural gas line. Arnold and Alderman James Jones met with Fitzhugh Friday to discuss the disagreement but could not decide on a settlement. Fitzhugh has been advised that he cannot build over the gas line.

## Ask Judge Blackwood Review Reviere Cases

Gov. Lamar Alexander announced Tuesday he was appointing Kerry Blackwood, 38, of Somerville, an assistant to 25th Judicial Circuit Attorney General Paul G. Summers, of Somerville, as the circuit's judge to succeed Herman L. Reviere, of Ripley, who resigned, effective last Friday, to head an alternative sentencing program.

If the new judge shares Summers' sentiments about alternative sentencing, as seems probable, Reviere's program, funded by a \$299,000 state grant, is in trouble.

Summers has filed motions in all five counties of his district—Lauderdale, Tipton, Fayette, Hardeman, and McNairy, reading as follows:

"(1) It has come to the attention of the State of Tennessee that each county jail houses state prisoners pursuant to orders of the Court or as a result of the Federal Court order restraining the Department of Correction from accepting new felony prisoners.

"(2) It is understood that the current Circuit Judge's predecessor in office has modified the sentences of some of these prisoners and placed them in some type of alternative sentencing program. The docket sheets reflect some of these modifications.

"(3) The District Attorney has not been made a party of these modifications. Furthermore, neither the District Attorney nor the present judge is knowledgeable of the provisions of the alternative sentencing program.

"Premises Considered, the District Attorney moves this Court to review the docket sheet and minute entries of each prisoner sentenced by this Court and determine his or her present status.

"That upon such determination, the Court make a decision as to whether the defendant's current status is properly reflected on the minutes of this Court.

"That if the current status is in the interest of justice, that the Court approve such status. If the Court does not approve same, that the Court take appropriate measures."

#### CONSUMERS, FARMERS BENEFIT FROM BANNING PESTICIDES IN IMPORTED TOBACCO

Making laws usually requires having to choose between the wishes of competing groups. Few issues present the opportunity to actually bring competing groups together.

That kind of rare compromise is exactly what led the Senate recently to adopt my amendment to the Farm Bill banning imported tobacco containing dangerous pesticides prohibited in domestic tobacco. It forged a historic alliance between health groups and tobacco farmers.

Both interests are served, because the amendment is designed to protect the American farmer and the health of the American people. It will give American farmers an opportunity to compete more fairly with their foreign competitors. And it will give those Americans who do smoke assurances that the tobacco is free of pesticides banned for health reasons.

Nearly one-third of the tobacco in American cigarettes is now imported. The amendment simply requires that imported tobacco be certified as not containing unapproved pesticides before it can be brought into this country. This is the same requirement American growers must comply with before selling their tobacco in this country.

American farmers are already prohibited from using pesticides and other chemicals such as DDT, dieldrin, endrin and toxaphene. They have all been banned for health reasons.

But until my amendment, we have not considered imposing such restrictions on tobacco imported into the United States. In fact, no agency of the federal government even keeps track of what pesticides of other chemicals are being used on imported tobacco. This inaction raises a potential health hazard. And it puts American farmers at an extraordinary disadvantage in competing with their foreign counterparts.

The State Department conducted an incomplete survey last year that showed many countries do permit the use of pesticides banned in the United States. The survey provided no information about chemicals used in some of the largest suppliers of tobacco, including Turkey, Bulgaria, Lebanon and Zimbabwe.

The amendment is not protectionist legislation. It merely follows the United States' obligation to its citizens to impose the same health and safety regulations on imported goods that we rightfully apply to those produced here. It's the same standard we already apply to imported cars, machinery and other consumer products.

The Great Seal of the U.S. has 13 of each of these items: stars, stripes, clouds, arrows, laurel leaves, berries, feathers in each wing and tail, and rows in the pyramid. This is one case where 13 is a lucky number.

The amendment is very similar to the first bill I introduced after being sworn-in to the Senate in January. I modified the provisions so that it fully complies with the General Agreement on Trade and Tariffs (GATT), the set of rules that guide international trade.

This is a cautious, reasonable approach to a potentially serious problem. It is satisfying to consider legislation that farmers and health groups can support and that will benefit consumers.

# Halls Tops Crockett To Post 7-3 Season

Two second-quarter touchdowns and single scores in both the third and fourth periods gave Halls a 27-0 lead against Crockett County and the Tigers coasted to their fourth straight win and into the state playoffs on a winning note.

Crockett County scored two fourth-period six-pointers against the Black & Gold reserves but it was way too little to keep the Tigers from finishing the regular season with a 7-3 slate and to stop the host Cavaliers from recording a winless campaign.

Halls, the runner-up in Region 7A, will open the playoffs at home against rival Old Hickory Academy, a team the Tigers bested 13-10 in the first round of the playoffs last season.

"I'm glad we got a comfortable win in the last regular season game," said Halls Head Coach Andy Pugh. "We wanted to get in the right frame of mind and the win at Crockett County should help us get prepared for Old Hickory."

Against the winless Cavaliers, the Tigers started slowly and were fortunate not to fall behind in the opening frame. The host team put together a good drive early but missed on a field goal try, giving the ball back to the Tigers.

Jarrett Rogers, the Halls workhorse, scored the first of two touchdowns on a four-yard run with 10:50 on the clock in period two and Benjie Goodwin booted the first of three extra points to give Halls the lead. Rogers' score capped an 80-yard drive after the Cavaliers missed the three-point try.

Sophomore Tim Wright got Halls' second score at the 2:42 mark of the frame, capping a 12-play, 77-yard march. Wright's 13-yard jaunt made it 13-0 and Goodwin's PAT gave the Tigers a 14-point bulge and the contest.

Offensively, for the Tigers, Friday's outing was one of the best of the season with eight runners carrying the ball for 293 yards. Rogers was the leader with 141 yards on 23 carries but Goodwin gave his best effort of the campaign, running three times for 54 yards and helping the team get a second half score. Quarterback Terry Lents gained 34 yards on seven tries and Wright finished the evening with 29 yards on six carries.

"The line blocked well and the backs ran well," Pugh said. "At times, we've had good line play and poor running efforts or poor line play and good running efforts. When you get both together, things usually add up well."

Junior Greg Johns turned in his best blocking and tackling performance of the season and he and Brian Terry pushed the Cavaliers backward to help the Tigers get the ball back for the second score.

Halls' third score came on a six-play, 75-yard march at the 7:07 mark of the third stanza. Goodwin, one of a number of backs used by Pugh, ran hard for 19 yards on first down and then picked up 22 yards with a pretty run to the CC 23. Rogers picked up 15 to the eight and Richard Voss got the final eight, making it 20-0.

Derrick Harris and Tyrone Patrick made a good tackle on a fourth-down effort by Crockett County, stopping the play and getting the ball back for the Halls offense.

In seven plays, the Tigers made it 27-0. Rogers picked up a Lents fumble, got a tremendous block from an alert Johns and scampered 16 yards for the six-pointer with 8:18 to play.

Crockett County registered two scores against the Tiger reserves in the final minutes, getting long passes from quarterback Bart Ward to David Johnson. The first score was a 44-yard connection and the pair connected minutes later for a 71-yard scoring strike. Two-point conversions after both scores failed, leaving the final 27-12. Statistically, the Tigers rolled up 313 total yards to Crockett County's 292. Most of the Cavalier's yardage was in the late going though, since they only picked up 30 yards on the ground in the opening half against the Halls starters.

On defense, Harris was the leading tackler with eight, followed by Johns with seven and Patrick with six.

## Five In Region Into Play-Offs

With the regular season complete, four of the five competitors in Class A's Region 7 turn their thoughts to the opening round of the TSSAA's state playoffs.

Lake County, the region champion, Halls, the runner-up, and the third and fourth place teams, Dresden and South Fulton, respectively, open postseason play Friday night. The top two teams will host opening round games but the bottom pair of squads will begin the playoffs on the road.

"There have been some pretty big games in the past between Halls and Old Hickory and this is going to be another one," said Halls Head Coach Andy Pugh. "We did all right last season. I hope I can say the same after this week is over."

Last year, the Tigers met the Generals in the first round of the state playoffs and left Jackson with a 13-10 victory. As the playoffs begin in 1985, the teams are the same but the location has shifted to Halls.

Old Hickory, the third-place team in Region 6A behind runner-up McKenzie and champion Adamsville, finished the regular season with an 8-2 mark. They clinched a playoff spot by dumping Denmark West 14-6 in the regular season finale.

By comparison, the Tigers defeated West 41-12 two weeks ago.

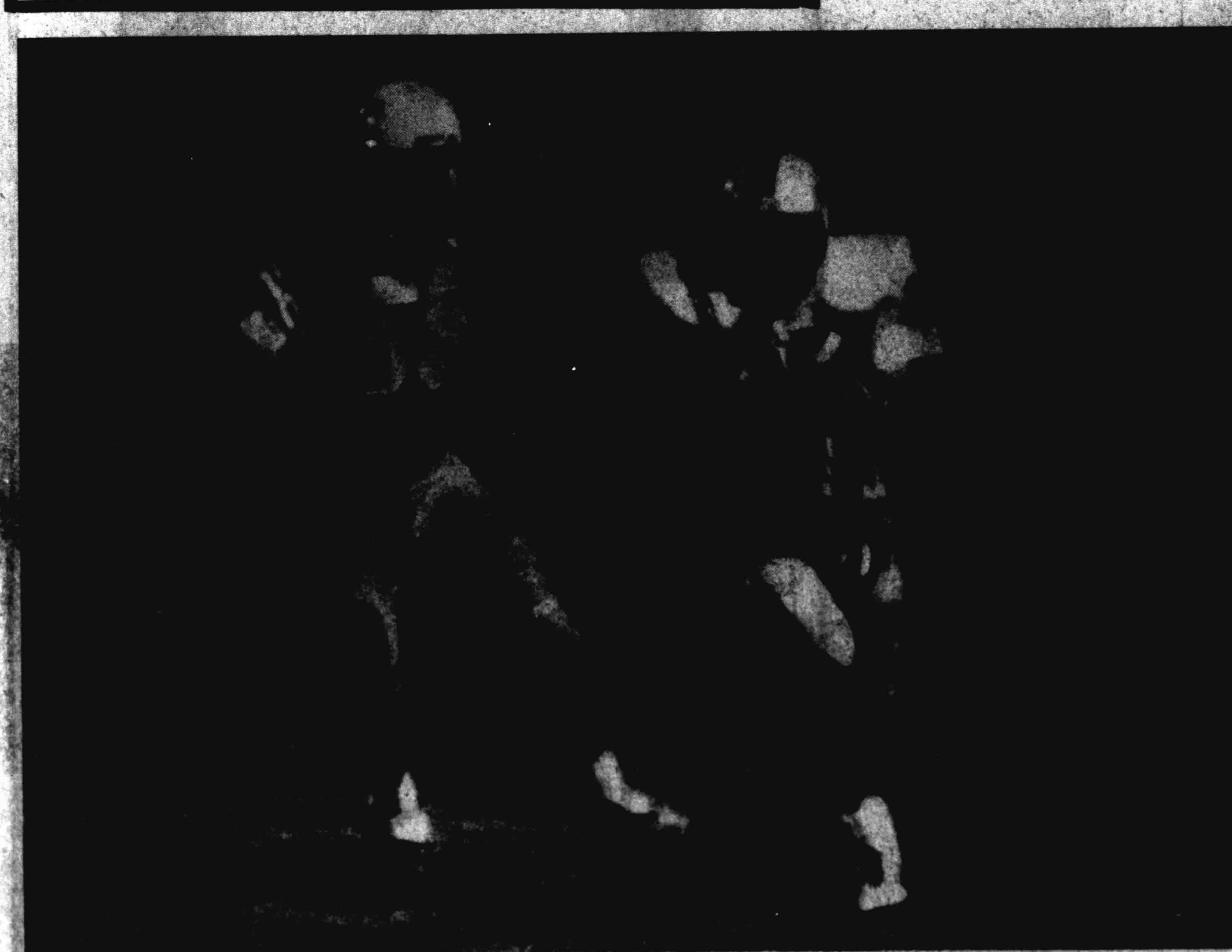
"Comparisons are hard to use, especially in football," Pugh said. "The regular season is over, these are the playoffs and everything else can be thrown out the window."

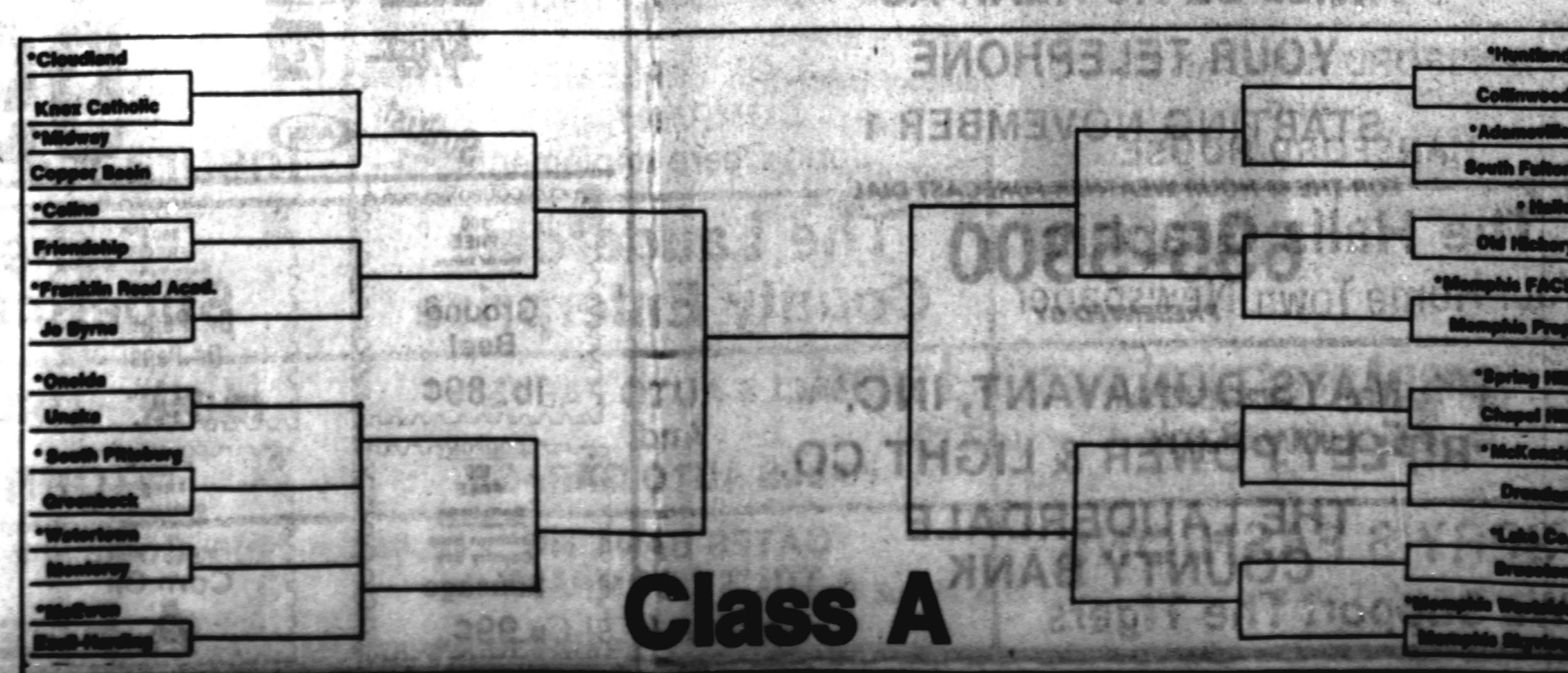

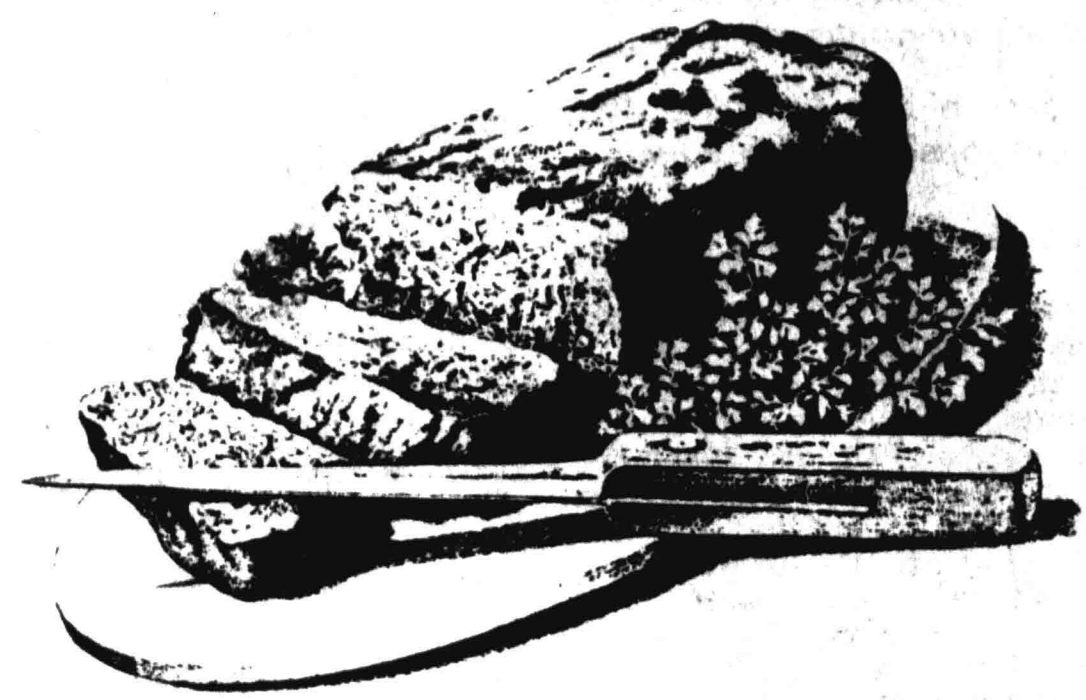

No evidence indicating foul play in two 1982 Lauderdale County farm deaths was uncovered after the cases were reopened, Dist. Atty. Gen. Paul Summers, of Samerville, said last week.

Continuing questions about the 1982 deaths of Peggy Childress and Pat Gay led him to reopen the cases, Summers said.

"I wanted to answer those questions and put a stop to the innuendo and rumors" that had been circulating he said.

Mrs. Childress, 44, died April 25, 1982, after she was dragged several hundred yards under a mole-drawn sled used in tomato cultivation.

Her brother-in-law, Pat Gay, 41, was found dead May 17, 1982, of skull fractures, after apparently been run over by his tractor.

Both deaths were ruled accidental in 1982.

Summers said he received a report on the new investigation last week and, after conferring with Tennessee Bureau of Investigation Agents Tommy Lewis and Tony Bowers and Lauderdale County Sheriff Milford Durham, concluded there was no evidence indicating homicide.

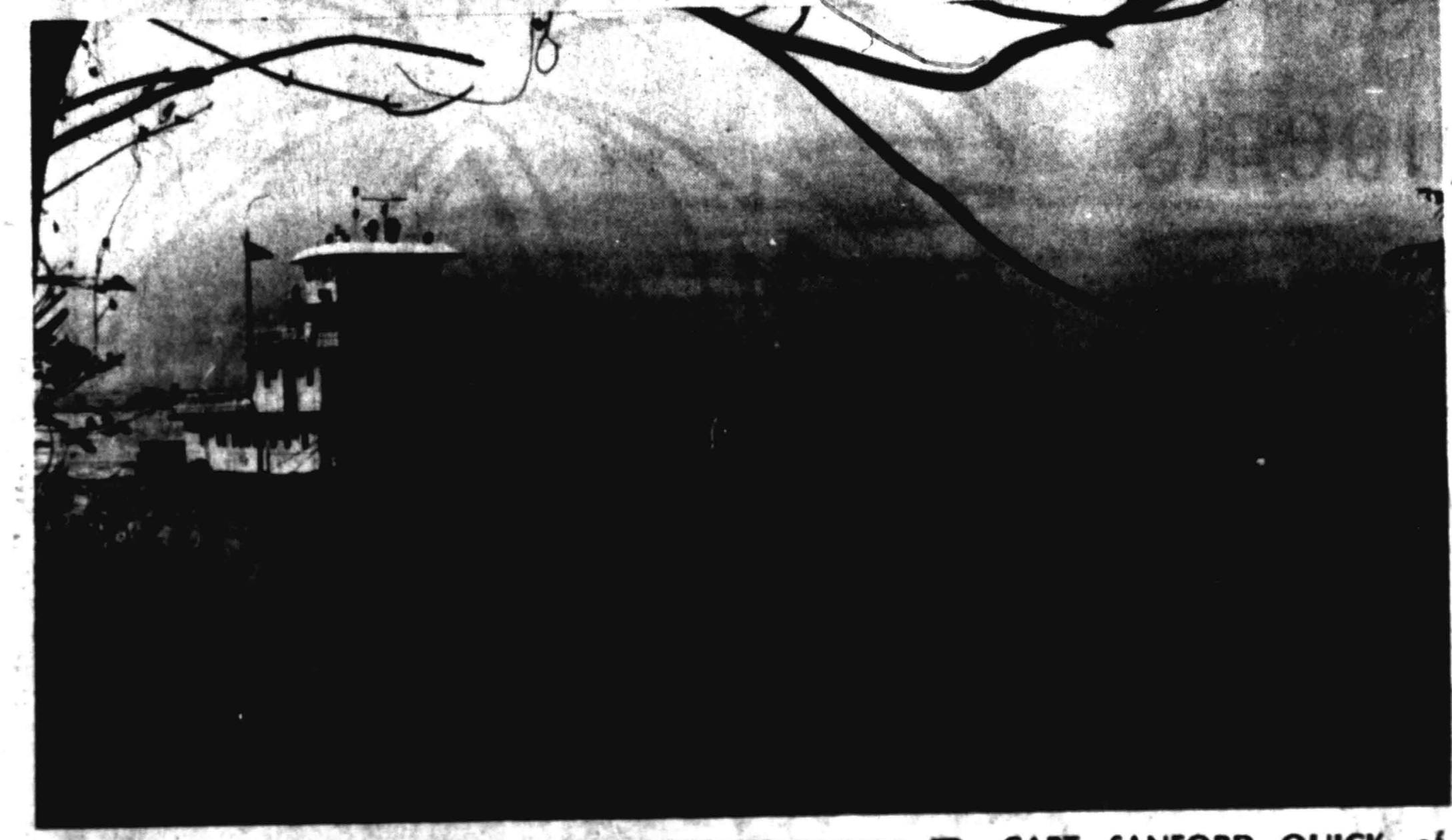
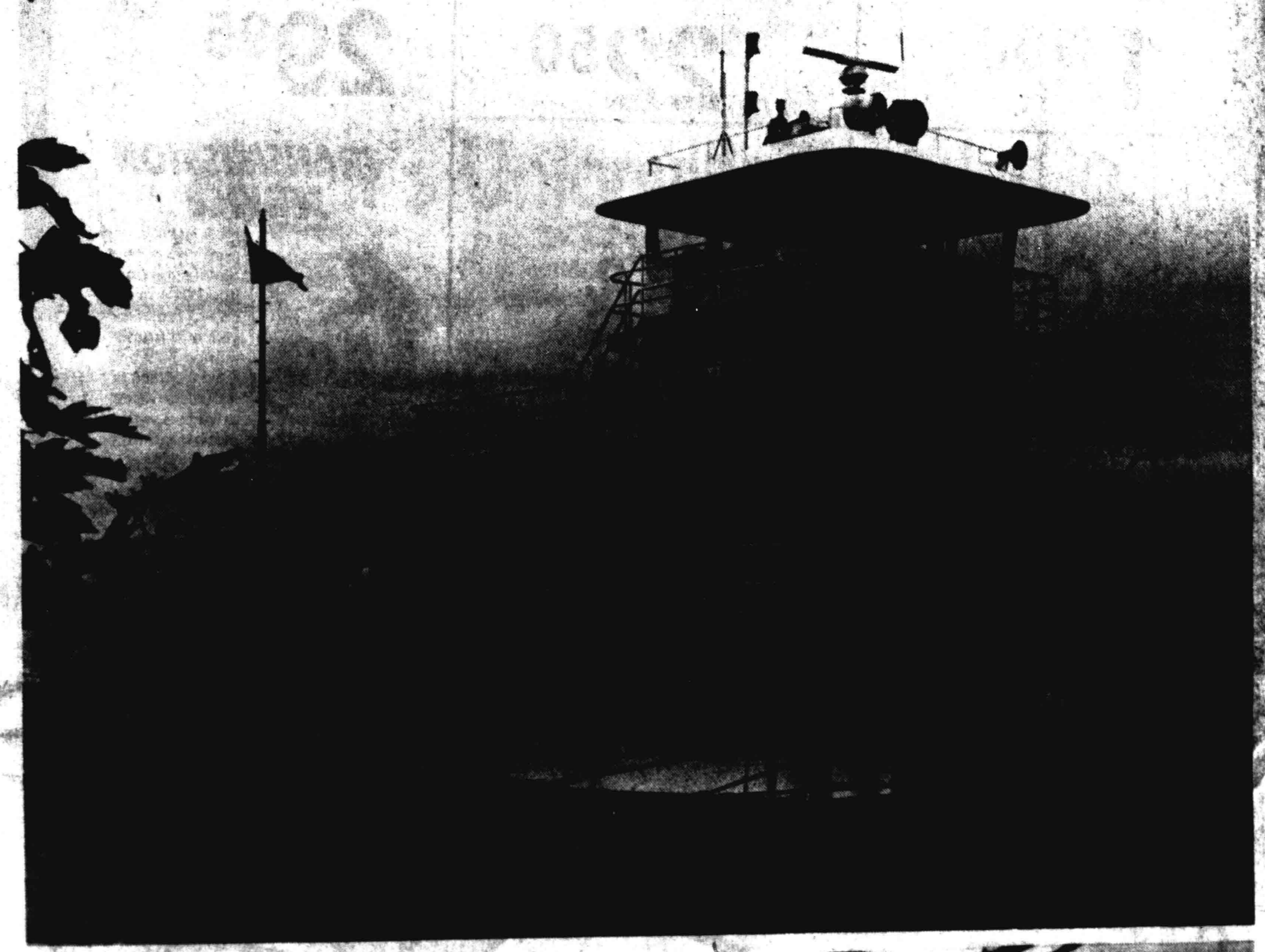

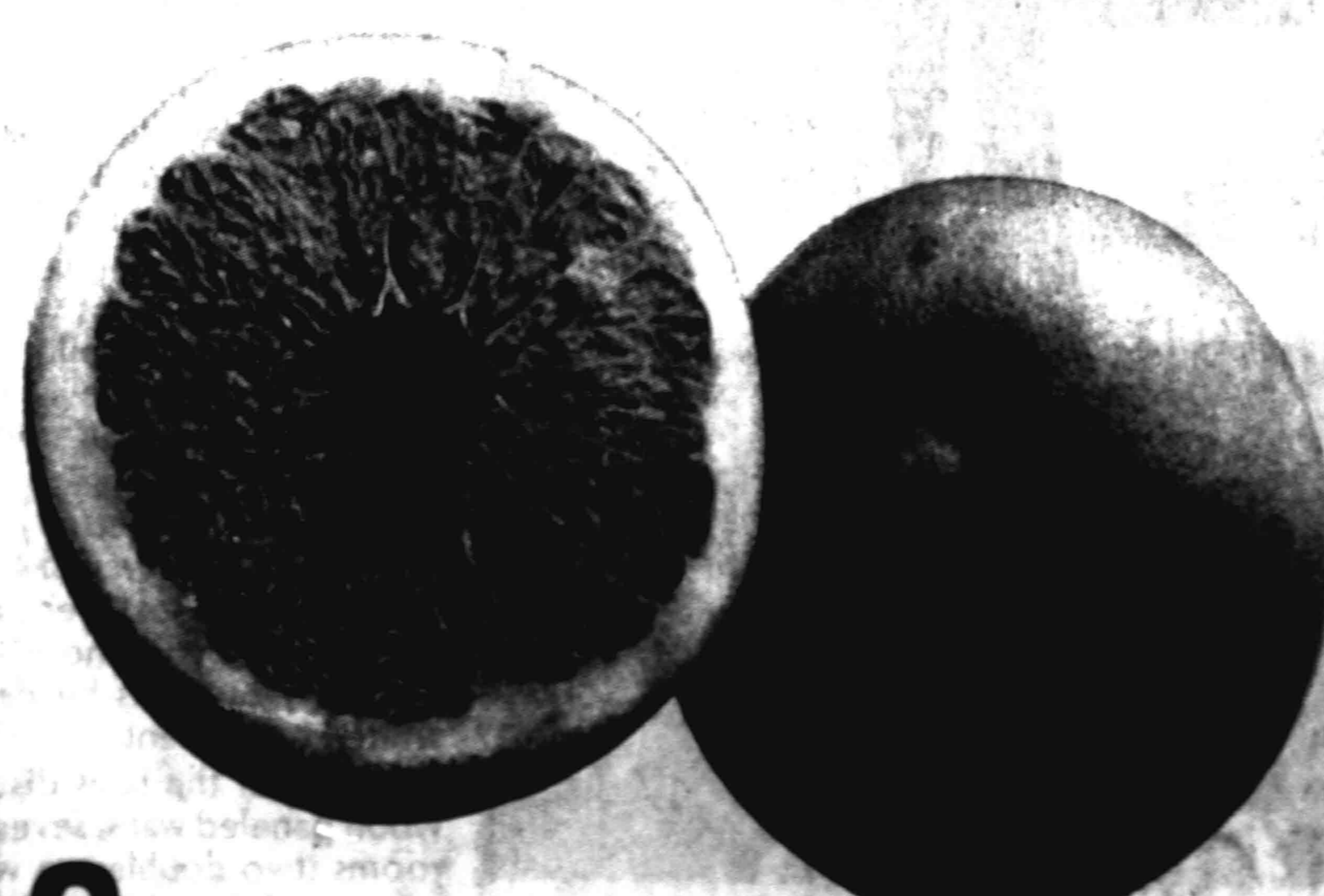

Halley's Comet: Tennesseans Prepare for Return

The return of Halley's Comet is one rare event that unites many people and cultures in the sighting and study of this common phenomenon for planet Earth, according to astronomer Donald Male, of Manchester, Tennessee.

"It's an event that we can experience that connects us with 2,000 years of history and also connects us with the celestial world," Dr. Male said.

"Recently I saw a young boy with a t-shirt with the words 'I'm going to see THE COMET' on it," Dr. Male said.

Man's Desiring, by the Ball Choir, and Show Me The Way, by the choir.

Dr. C. Wayne Fessmer, of Dyersburg, district superintendent, delivered the sermon.

During the morning service, Katie and Will Spence gave this brief history of the church:

"Soon after the incorporation of the Town of Halls in 1882, some of the citizens became interested in having a public place of worship according to the Methodist beliefs, and since there was not any building in the community for this purpose, they began meeting with friends at Bethesda Methodist Church, located about two miles west of Halls.

"In due time, a group of local men got together and planned a building which was a small frame structure.

"The present brick building was built in 1906 on the exact site of the original frame building while The Rev. R. M. Vaughn was pastor. The first annex was built in 1925 while The Rev. I. M. King was pastor; and the second annex was built in 1956 under the leadership of The Rev. J. K. Stuart.

"The first official board was composed of W. A. Young, A. B. Young, P. M. Sawyer, J. D. Sawyer, J. F. Dunavant, D. H. Cherry, J. F. Young and S. G. Baucom.

"A Sunday School was organized at once when the church was completed and D. H. Cherry was made superintendent and held this position continuously until 1918 when he moved to Dyersburg.

"The church has grown over the years by the faithful work and witness of many dedicated ministers and laity. The present membership of the church is 295. We are proud to be the oldest church in the Town of Halls.

"Ministers who have served this church since it was organized are as follows: G. W. Evans, T. P. Ramsey, E. E. Hamilton, W. R. Barner, J. S. Remshaw, J. B. Knight, D. M. Evans, R. L. Robinson, A. F. Haynes, K. G. Dunn, M. L. Davis, E. E. Thurmond, V. H. Burnett, W. F. Masdon, H. A. Goforth, C. B. Warr, A. K. Farmer, Hubert Clayton, J. K. Stuart, Joe Summers, Pittman Marbury, John Deal, W. H. Mann, Russell Boyd, James R. Bailey, Paul Jones, and Norman Cooney.

Dr. Male continued, "The next time it is scheduled to appear is 2061-62, and that's why the scientific community is excited about the 1985-86 opportunity to see and study this comet. It's a once in a lifetime opportunity for many of us."

The Englishman Sir Edmund Halley (pronounced to rhyme with "valley") was the astronomer to first discover in the 1700s that it was the same comet that kept coming back approximately every 76 years.

The comet had been recorded as appearing in the heavens as early as 240 B.C. by the Chinese and it has never been missed on any of its returns since then. For Halley's discovery of its periodic return, the comet was named after him.

The last time it appeared, in 1910, Halley's Comet was 14 million miles from Earth and looked like a spectacular fireball. This time, due to its being further from the Earth (39 million miles) it will be dimmer than the stars in the Big Dipper.

A comet is a mixture of ice, rocks, dust and frozen gases, sometimes compared to a "dirty snowball." The core is called a nucleus, and the tail or "coma" always points away from the sun. The comet's light is the reflection from sunlight and the glow from

the gases. The nucleus is only a few miles in diameter while the coma may be tens of thousands of miles across.

"Comets are very interesting to scientists because they are made up of the same stuff from which the solar system was created," Dr. Male said. "The precise composition is still a mystery."

While planets have orbits like circles, comets' orbits are football-shaped. However, similar to planets, they also use a star - the sun in this case - as the primary gravitational force for their orbit.

Because of its elliptical orbit, Halley's Comet will be visible in the earth's sky as it approaches the sun from about mid-November through the end of December. The comet then goes behind the sun on February 9. Earthlings can again view it the last two weeks of March and the first week of April as it heads back towards the outer reaches of its orbit around the planets Neptune and Pluto.

The International Halley Watch, established in 1979, has organized 900 professional astronomers and 450 amateurs in countries around the globe to coordinate obser-

ptions of the comet, an around-the-earth chain of sightings. The Inter-Agency Cooperative Group, a collaboration among the space agencies of Europe, Japan, the United States and the Soviet Union, is coordinating the collection of data from spacecraft that will pass near the comet in a single week in March. These spacecraft will actually go through the tail of the comet for a close-up study of the gases and other materials composing it.

Many senior citizens can remember Halley's Comet from its appearance in 1910. One is Georgia Harris Thomas, a retired school teacher of Oak Ridge, Tennessee. Mrs. Thomas, a native of Louisiana, says she was eight years old at the time.

"Back then there was no television or even radio news coverage, but my family had told me about it from newspaper accounts. I was playing with some friends one night and there it was in the west, a star with a big long tail. My family and some friends went out into the road to see it better," she recalled.

For viewing the comet on this return, Dr. Male recommends a good pair of binoculars and a dark location away from a town or city and any artificial lights. An unobstructed view of the southern horizon is also recommended. Ideal conditions will be during the darkest phases of the moon on cloudless nights.

Dr. Male encourages people to make a social event out of it. "Experiences like these are better shared, and since some of the best times for viewing are going to be the early morning hours, take some friends on your drive out to the countryside. Take your small children, too, because they will remember it."

Because of its distance from Earth, a comet appears to move slowly. Comets should not be confused with meteors, which burn as they enter the earth's atmosphere appearing as fast-moving streaks across the sky.

"Watch local newspapers, newscasts or consult astronomical publications to determine where the comet will be located on particular nights," Dr. Male said.

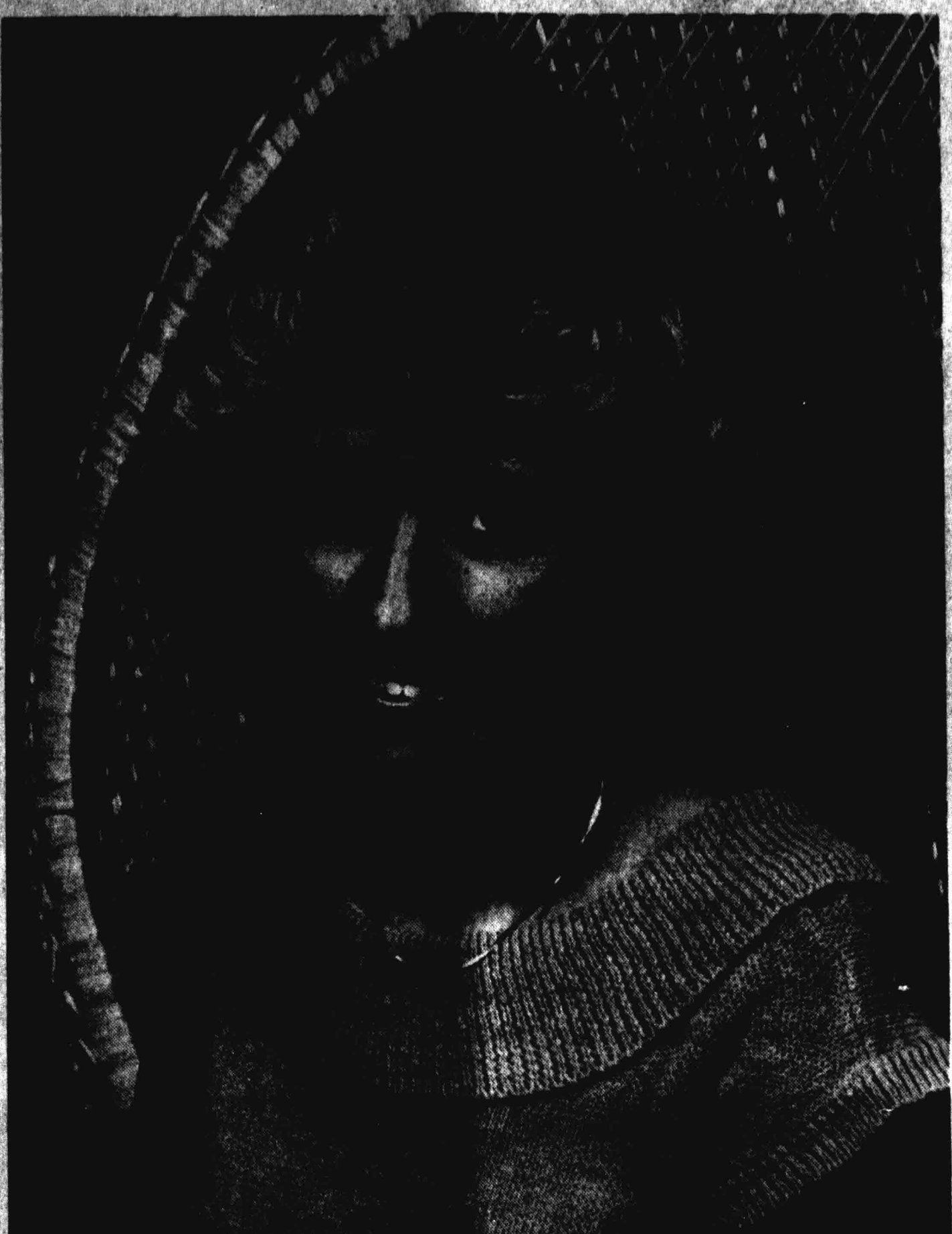

# Halls Again Tops OHA By 3 Play-Off Points

With 65 ticks left on the game clock and a fourth down at the Old Hickory six, Halls senior Benjie Goodwin booted a 25-yard field goal to give the Tigers a 3-0 win over the rival Generals and a place opposite unbeaten Memphis First Assembly Christian School in the second round of the state playoffs.

The field goal capped a tremendous "bend but don't break" defensive struggle and allowed Halls to defeat the visiting Generals for the second straight season in the first round of playoff action. Last year, the Tigers claimed a 13-10 triumph in Jackson and advanced to the semi-finals before bowing out.

Goodwin, a third-year kicker, got the call from Halls coach Andy Pugh after the Tigers pounded the ball to the six. On fourth and two, the Tigers called time out, settled on the field goal attempt and moved into position to make the game-winning kick.

After seeing Halls' decision, Old Hickory called time out to make Goodwin wait but the veteran got a good snap from Terry Lents, a good hold from Richard Voss and good blocking from the line, giving him time to boot the winner.

"I just wanted to make sure I got it straight," he said. "Length was no problem. It was just about like an extra point. I wanted to get good height on it and kick it straight. I knew I could make it if I did that."

After the three-pointer, Old Hickory threw a scare into a chilly but excited Halls crowd by completing a 23-yard pass to mid-field but an incomplete pass and three quarterback sacks by an emotional defensive unit sealed the victory and allowed Halls to advance in playoff competition.

In the first half, Old Hickory threatened to get on the scoreboard but couldn't crack the Halls defense. After intermission, it was Halls who threatened but the Tigers, too, had trouble getting on the scoreboard, until Goodwin's kick ended the skirmish.

The Generals, 9-2 in regular season play and the third-place finisher in Region 6A, stayed in Halls territory throughout much of the first half, starting beyond the 50 in three of six possessions. To Old Hickory's credit, it moved deep into Tiger territory twice, getting to the 16 before losing the ball on downs and to the 28 before punting to pin the Tigers against their own goal line.

Halls, meanwhile, had terrible field position before the break, starting six possessions deep in its own end of the field. Tiger drives started at the 25, 16, 11, 15, 7 and 15. Only once did the Black & Gold manage to cross mid-field, advancing to the General 34 before losing the ball on downs.

"I don't know what either defense could have done any better," Pugh said. "Our defense did a heck of a job holding them in our territory and their defense stopped us every time except one. I'm glad we got close enough to get the field goal to win it."

In the second half, Halls fell victim to its own mistakes when the General defense bent and remained scoreless. On five possessions, the Tigers started in Old Hickory territory twice, beginning drives at the General 28 and at the 39. The other drives started at the Halls 45, 39 and 48. Interceptions—one each by Dees Elmore, Goodwin and Jeff Buckner—started three of the drives but two efforts ended with fumbles, one ended on downs at the General 18 and another ended when Goodwin was called on to punt but was forced to run when the snap went over his head.

The other drive, a march which started at the Halls 48, ended with Goodwin's winning kick.

After taking a General punt, workhorse Jarrett Rogers carried on nine of 10 plays to move the ball into scoring position. Rogers, who finished the evening with 102 yards on 24 attempts, pushed the ball to the six with a third down effort, leaving the Tigers with a fourth and two with 1:05 remaining, setting up the winning kick.

The boot was straight and long and the Tigers, now 8-3, had their fifth straight victory and remained alive in the state championship hunt.

Statistically, the Tigers registered 243 total yards to Old Hickory's 123. Halls rushed for 168 yards and got 75 yards through the air while the Generals managed 95 ground yards and just 28 via the pass. Halls had a dozen first downs to OHA's seven.

Greg Johns was the leading tackler for Halls with seven solo efforts, including a sack on the final play of the game which forced a fumble. Dicky Deston recovered the loose ball for the Tigers, giving them the ball and the victory. Elmore, John Arwood, and Derrick Harris each recorded five solo stops.

Cindy Carmack Chosen Winner

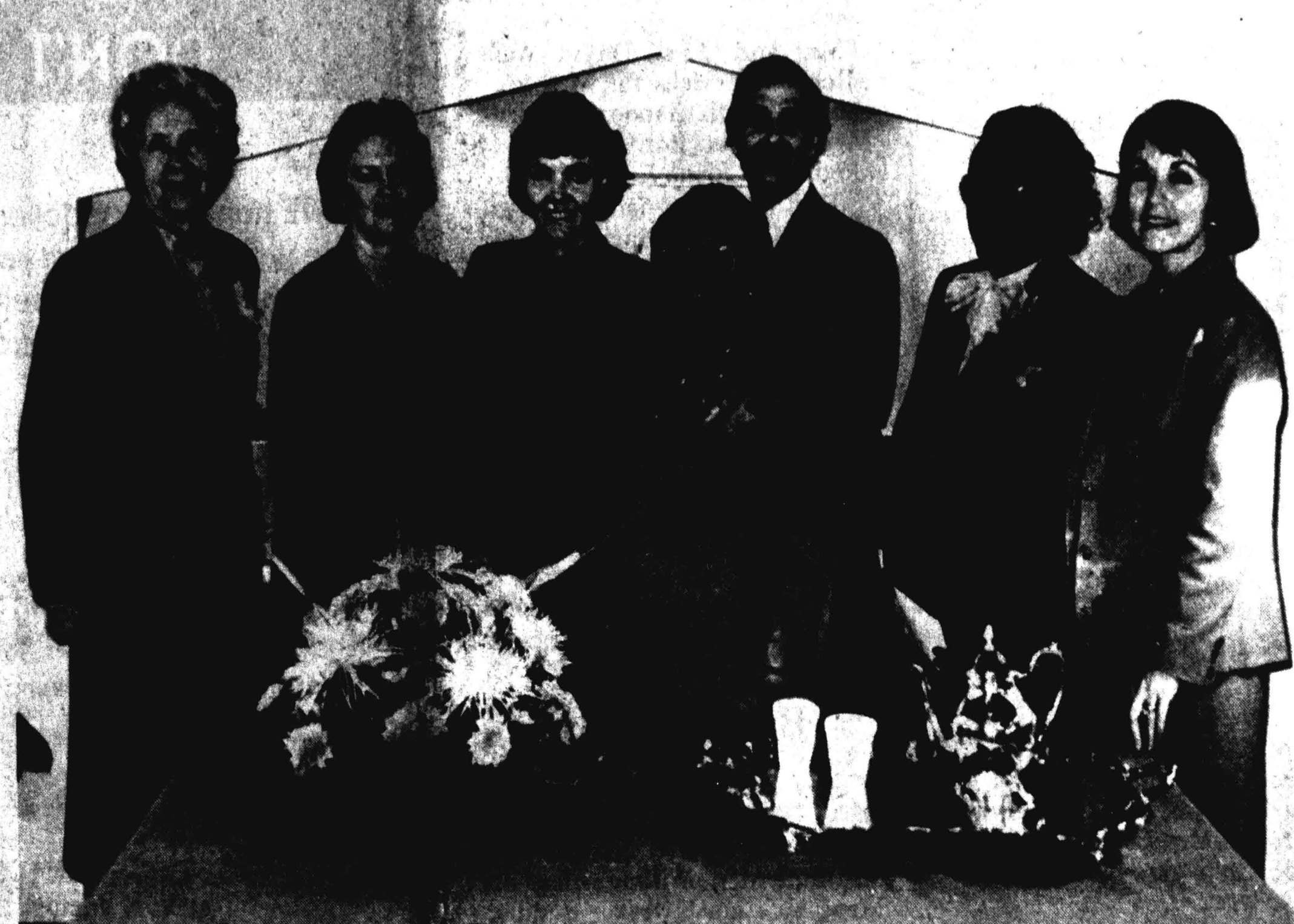

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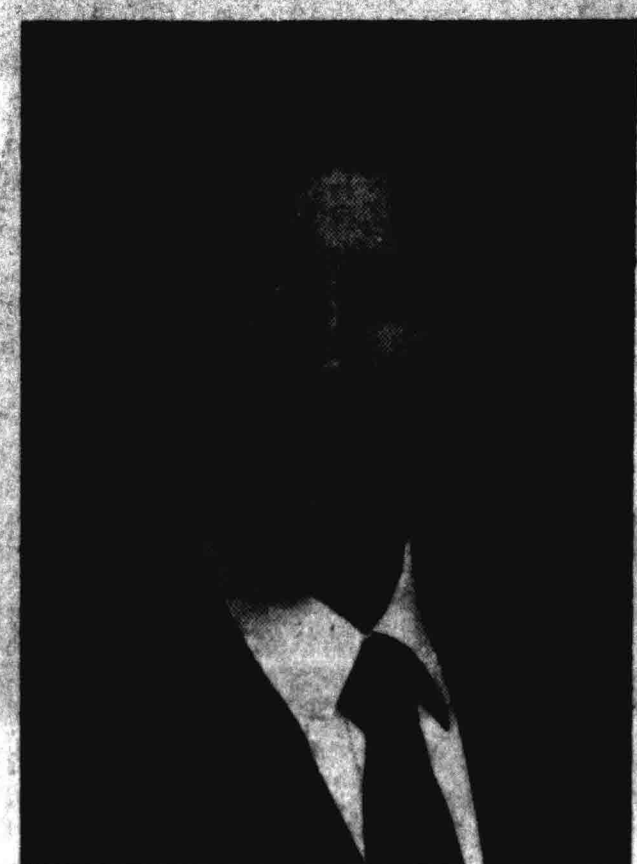

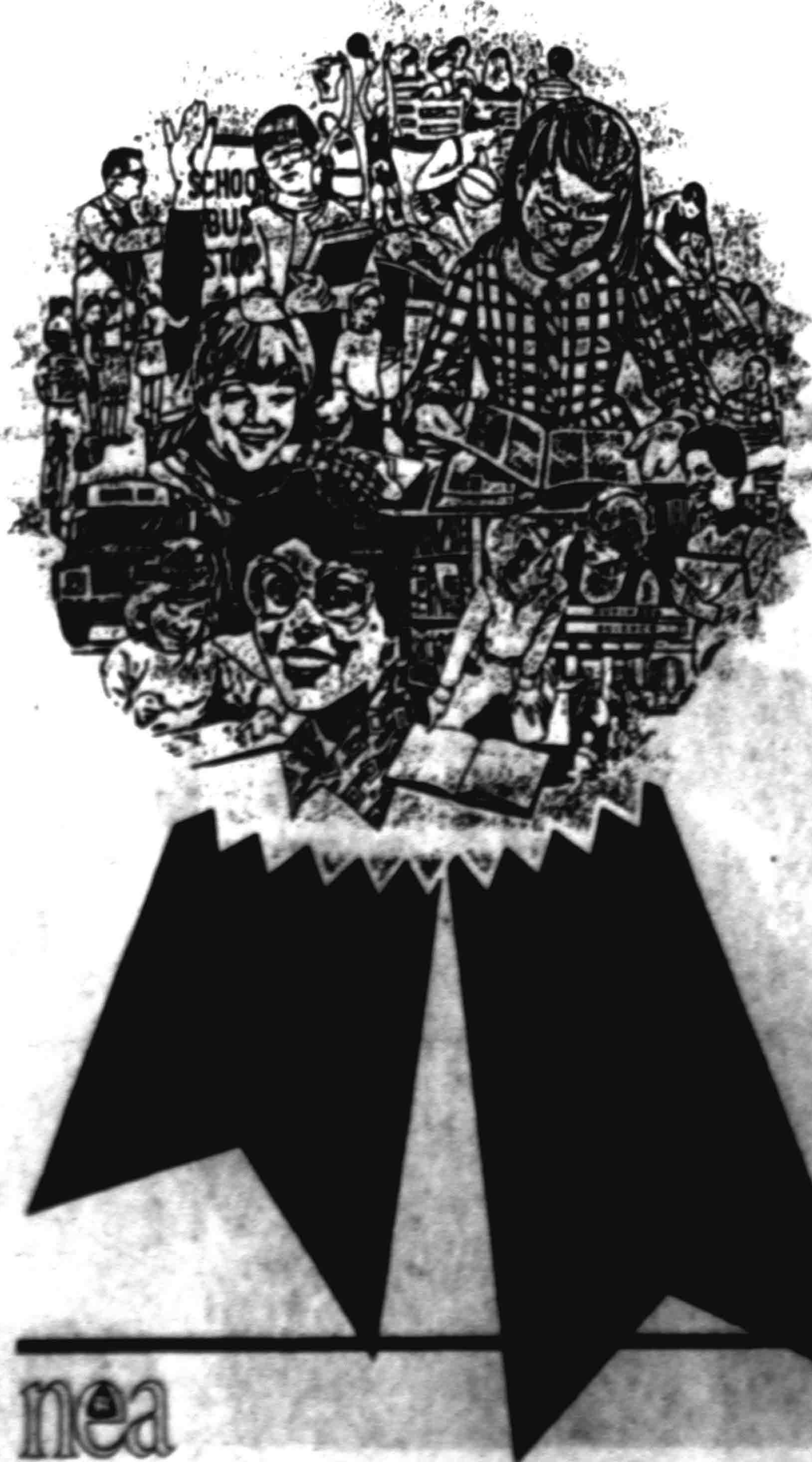

# Halls Caught Fire Late To Fall From Play-Offs

"Quitters never win," the writer once said. "And winners never quit."

At Conley Stadium Friday night, the Halls Tigers proved they were winners in a losing situation by battling to the final second in a 16-8 loss to unbeaten First Assembly Christian School in round two of the state playoffs.

The visiting Crusaders, 12-0, carried a 16-0 lead into the fourth quarter but had to fight off a gallant Halls effort to record the win and advance in the race for Class A's grid championship.

Halls, a playoff competitor in each of the last five seasons, had won five straight contests but had offensive problems in the first three periods against FACS, moving close to scoring but failing to get any points. With a 16-point deficit ahead of them and time running out, the Tigers came alive and roared back into the contest.

Sophomore Tim Wright, a quick back, capped a 71-yard, seven play drive with a 37-yard touchdown rattle with 8:38 left in the contest, trimming the deficit to 10. Senior workhorse Jarrett Rogers, who rushed for 107 yards on 24 attempts, then added a two-point conversion and a desperate situation turned into an intense affair in the closing minutes of play.

Terry Lents, a Tiger senior, then added fuel to Halls' fire by snagging an errant FACS pass attempt, giving the host team the ball and plenty of time for a slender defender, picked off the toss near mid-field and rambled beautifully to the Crusader edge, giving the Tigers fantastic field position—until officials negated the jaunt because of an illegal block and penalized the Tigers from the point of the infraction.

After the penalty, Halls took over at the 50, needing a touchdown and another two-point conversion to tie.

The drive started good with Rogers picking up six yards on first down and four on third, getting a first down. But a fumble, the first bobble of the evening, stopped the drive and FACS took control, needing only to run out the clock to preserve the victory.

Andy Pugh, Halls' 10-year head coach, used his time outs and the defense managed to get the offense the ball back with time for about one play but a desperation pass fell incomplete, ending the game and the Black & Gold's season.

The Crusaders went ahead in the second period when running back Chaney Starnes scored on a three-yard run. The visitors had a fourth down situation inside the Tiger 10 but a penalty gave FACS a first down and Starnes got the score on the next play. David Tucker's kick made it 7-0 with 6:56 left in the first half.

Halls, the runner-up in Region 7-A, put together a pretty drive following FACS' first score, mov-

ing from its 20 to the Crusader 38 before losing the ball on downs.

The Tigers also lost the ball on downs on the game's first possession, stalling at the FACS 34.

"We had some chances to score but failed to take advantage of them," Pugh said. "There was some big plays which really made a difference in the game. A different result on any one of a few big plays would have made a big difference in the game."

In the third period, Starnes added an eight-yard run to cap an 80-yard scoring march which took 14 plays and more than seven minutes off the game clock. Tucker missed the PAT but, after an interception gave FACS the ball, he redeemed himself with a 35-yard field goal.

As time moved into the fourth frame, Halls began its outstanding comeback effort, an effort which ended when Wright, a talented underclassman, lost control of the ball while stretching for more yardage.

Statistically, the Crusaders registered 201 yards rushing against the Tiger defense, most of it up the middle behind a big line. The visitors had no luck passing, though, failing to complete either of four passes. For the Tigers, Rogers picked up his second straight 100-plus playoff effort and 107 of the team's 179 rushing yards. Leading the defense was John "Bulldog" Arwood and Zane Bernard with nine tackles each.

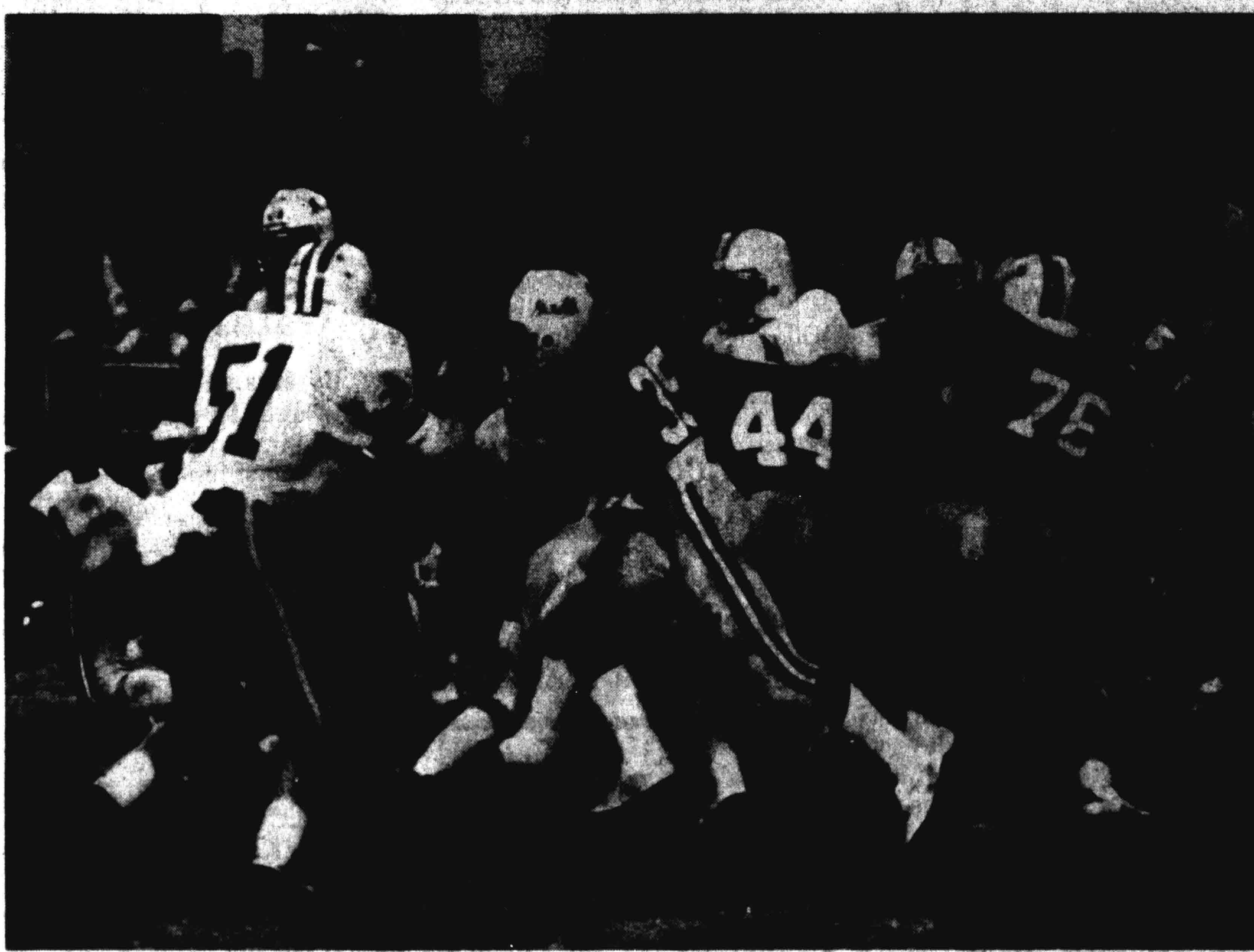
"It is disappointing to lose but, considering the injuries we've had this season, I feel like the team accomplished a lot. I'm glad we got this far."

Pugh's 10th season at the Tiger helm ended just one win short of the 80-win plateau. His record stands at 79-32-1. In his 10 years, Halls has made four bowl trips and earned five state playoff berths.

FACS will advance to the third round of the playoffs, traveling to Adamsville Friday night. Halls ends the year at 8-4.

Still alive in the title hunt in AAA are Ripley, a 27-0 winner over Memphis Northside, Whites Creek, a 14-0 victor over Henry County, Rhea County, a 7-9 winner over Riverdale, Memphis Hillcrest, who dumped J-C-M 10-7; Heritage, a 21-0 winner over Science Hill; Jefferson County, a 21-14 winner over Knoxville; Halls; Gallatin, a 6-3 victor over MBA; and Cleveland, a 21-14 winner over Franklin County.

Ripley, 12-0, hosts Gallatin Friday in the only local AAA action.

### RHS Hosts Gallatin In State's 1/4-Finals

Ripley High School's Tigers blanked Memphis Northside 27-0 Thursday of last week in the Liberty Bowl in Memphis to move into the state play-off quarter-finals, hosting Gallatin (11-1 after a 6-3 win Friday from Montgomery Bell Academy, which had posted seven shut-outs).

Gallatin has superb quickness in some positions and often goes for the big play, its trademark for years.

Friday's shut-out was the second in a row for the Tigers, who opened state play-off action with a 3-0 overtime decision over Christian Brothers.

It was also the third time this season that Ripley has faced a Memphis-based team and walked away with a shut-out victory.

The Tigers also beat Overton 14-0, during the regular season. It was the Ripley defense that sent Northside packing.

It was the first of many big plays for Coleman, who also had a fumble recovery, one sack, and four tackles.

Northside, seeing its seven game winning streak come to a halt, never recovered from Coleman's big play.

By half-time, the Cougars had mustered only 17 yards rushing and nine yards passing.

Defenders Coleman, Mark Taylor, Greg Knighton and Emmitt Aleston kept the Cougars in a hole.

Taylor finished with four tackles and a quarterback sack.

The Tigers swept 54 yards in 12 plays for their second touchdown, surviving an 8-yard loss on a bad pitch.

Aleston kicked the second of his three extra points kicks.

The Ripley lead went to 21-0 when quarterback Kelly Wright flipped a 12-yard scoring pass to James Griggs with 2:38 left in the third quarter.

The drive covered only 27 yards after Northside punter Brent Young couldn't handle the snap from center.

Ripley put the game away with a 12-play, 60-yard drive that required five minutes, 37 seconds

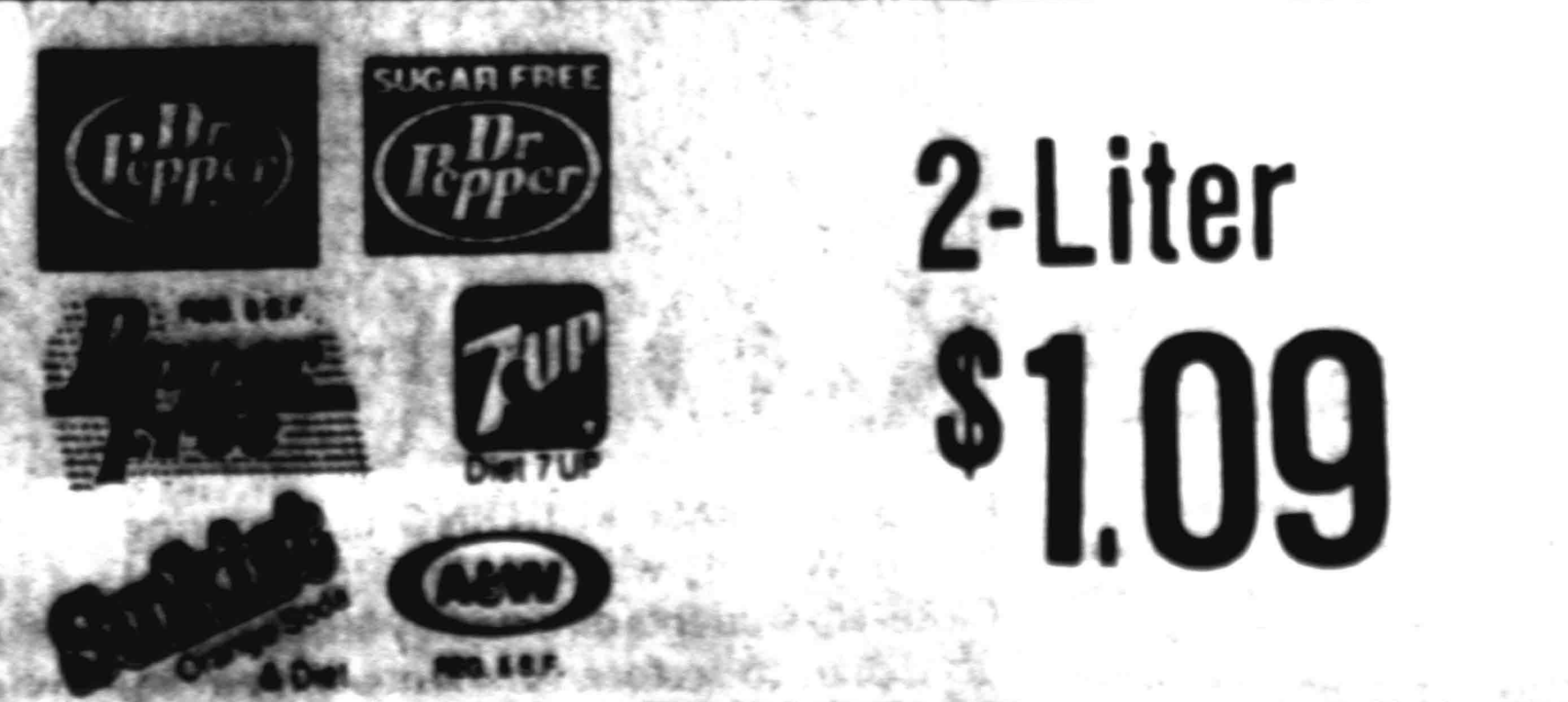

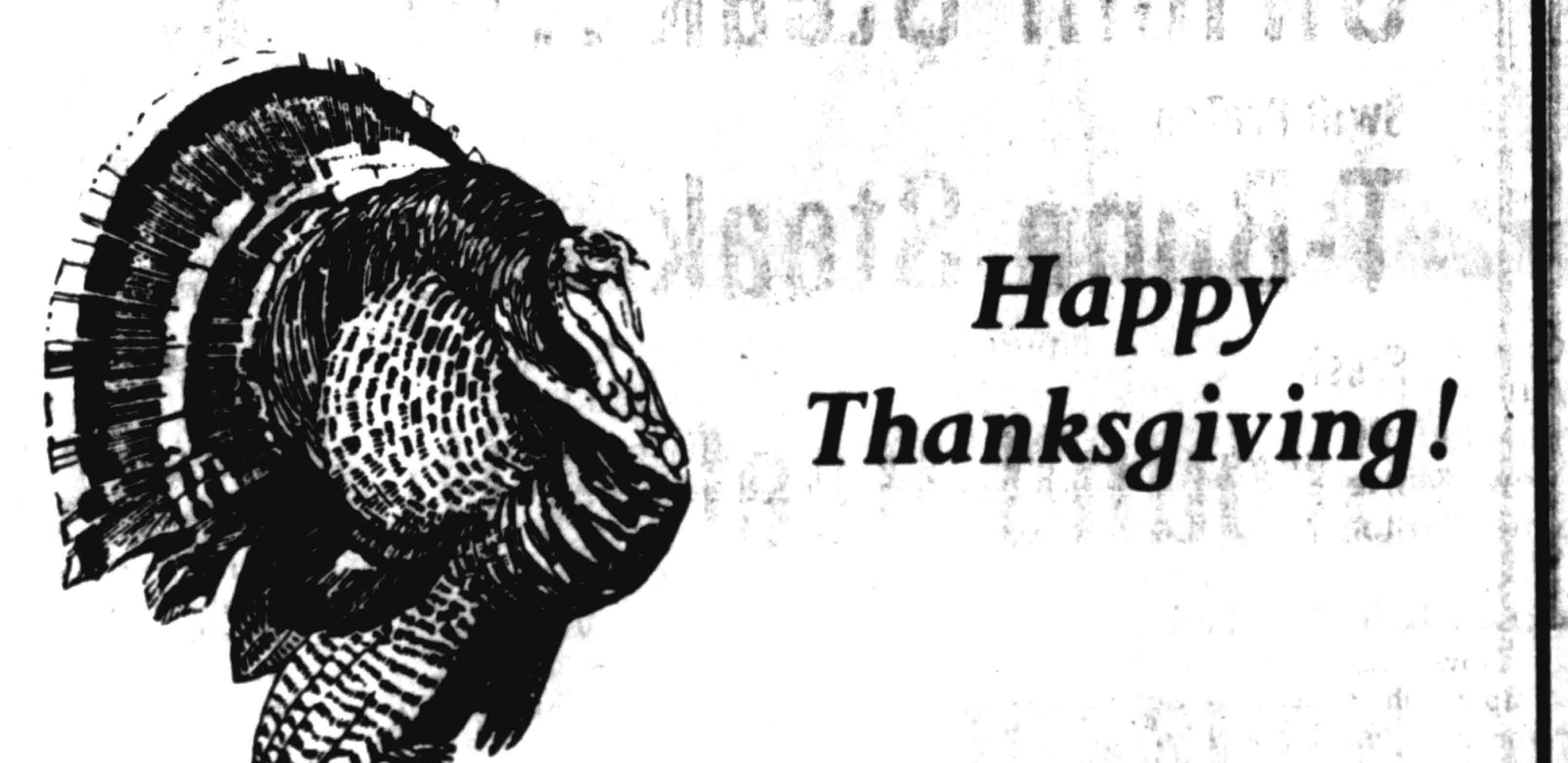

## Halls Cagers, 1-2, Seek To Devise Consistency

Three games into the 1985-86 basketball campaign, the Halls Tigers have given Head Coach Winston Jarrett a trio of performances with which he can mold a competitive team. One outing was good, one fair, the other poor.

By tournament time, Jarrett hopes to take strength of a youthful and inexperienced squad and build a good, solid team with a eye on the District 13-A title.

"I think we have the ability, we only need to develop the consistency to be a winner," said the sixth year head coach following the first week of play. "In the first three games, we showed we have some talent but we also showed the inexperience we have and some weaknesses. We're going to have to mature, have a good attitude and stay willing to learn to overcome them."

"I hope I'll be seeing my team develop as the year goes on and, by tournament time, I may want to change my vote."

Jarrett has guided the Tigers to one substitute berth in his five previous years, bowing out to Bolton in '83-84. His teams have made it to the regional tourney three times.

This year, he'll be assisted by veteran coach Al Bradford.

In the season opener Tuesday night of last week, the Tigers looked good in a 61-51 victory over Class AA Crockett County at Halls. With senior Rodney Foster and sophomores Tyrone Patrick and Anderson Tyus leading the way, Halls moved ahead to stay in the second quarter and coasted to the win. Foster finished with 13, Patrick was the leading scorer with 14 and Tyus added 10.

In Friday and Saturday games, though, the young Tigers struggled, losing at Denmark West 45-40 and then making a poor outing at Ripley in an 89-44 beating.

But, according to Jarrett, such things can be expected in early season with a young squad.

"It will take some time to get things together," he explained. "Most of the players are still in a learning phase. Hopefully, we'll be playing our best ball after Christmas when we start driving toward the tournaments."

Leading the Tigers' drive will be Foster, the only senior. At 5-8, his quickness and experience is the trigger of the youthful squad.

Junior Lewis Hudson, Bobby McKinney, Dalton Jackson, Milton Jarrett, and Rod Ward follow Foster but with the inexperience begins with the group. All have seen little, if any, playing time.

Hudson, at 6'0, 155, has good range, according to Jarrett, especially against zone defense. His scoring ability can be a big help. McKinney, at 6'1, 175, is expected to help in the middle with rebounding skills and has shown a pretty good outside jumper. Jackson, a 5'8, 160-pound player, is strong. Jarrett said, and has good rebounding ability. Ward, 5'9, can be a big help if he develops his jumping ability and Jarrett, 5'7, is quick, especially on defense.

The key to the squad may be the sophomores, headed by Patrick, 6', and Tyus, 6'. Patrick had an outstanding outing against Crockett County, especially considering he had practiced only one day after leaving the football pads behind. He could be the leader inside for the Tigers and has shown some scoring ability.

Byrd has already seen some playing time and, at 6', is a potential rebounder and scorer in the middle. Nelson showed some ability against Crockett County and makes up for a lack of some talent with good hustle.

Halliburton handles the ball well and provides another outside shooter while Claybrooks offers speed and quickness and a good touch. Glynn reportedly has the best touch on the team and his 5'9 frame should see plenty of action at guard.

Rounding out the roster are two freshmen, Dennis Brown and Keith Brown. Dennis, at 6'0, is strong and quick and could be a big help on the line. Keith, at 5'8, is a quick guard and has a good jumper.

"Defense is the key while the offense is young but we're not going to be big scorers anyway," the coach added. "We'll press a lot, in fact, I tell the players that we should be thinking press when we get on the bus. Everybody has a role and how well everybody develops in that role will determine what kind of season we'll have."

The Tigers, 16-5 last year, will compete with Kenton, Greenfield, Bradford, and Sharon for the district title with Jarrett giving his pre-season nod to Greenfield.

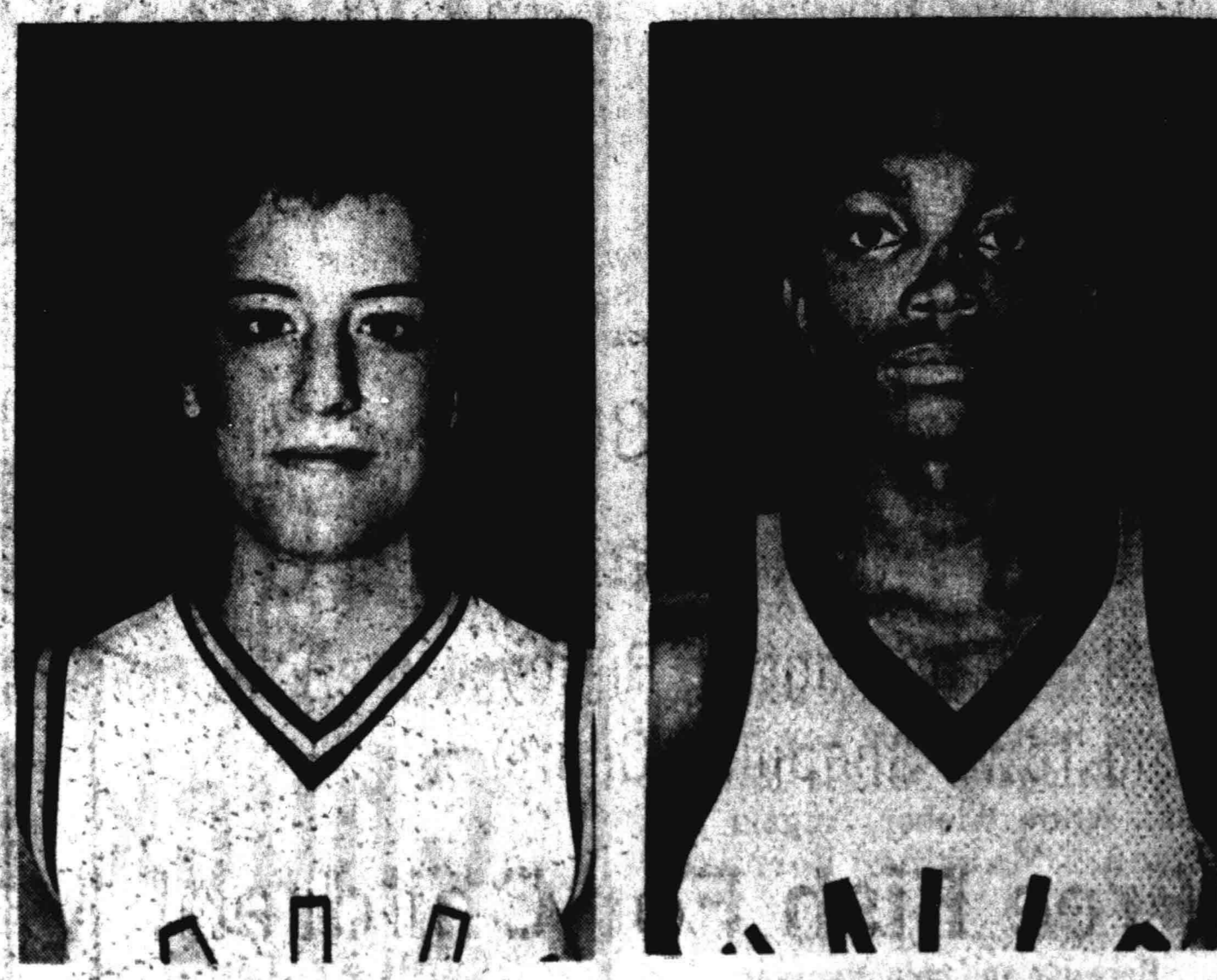
## 50th Anniversary
