# Ask Judge Blackwood **Review Reviere Cases**

Gov. Lamar Alexander announced Tuesday he was appointing Kerry Blackwood, 38, of Somerville, an assistant to 25th Judicial Circuit Attorney General Paul G. Summers, of Somerville, as the circuit's judge to succeed Herman L. Reviere, of Ripley, who resigned, effective last Friday, to head an alternative sentencing program.

If the new judge shares Summers' sentiments about alternative sentencing, as seems probable, Reviere's program, funded by a \$299,000 state grant, is in trouble.

Summers has filed motions in all five counties of his district-Lauderdale, Tipton, Fayette, Hardeman, and McNairy, reading as follows:

## **Bean Acreage Drops** Again

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By Charles T. Peal Soybean acreage in Tennessee declined in 1985 for the sixth consecutive year. The largest soybean acreage ever Green harvested in Ten-Scene nessee was in 1979. when 2,620,000 ac-

res were harvested, with a yield of 27 bushels per acre, for a total value of \$449,200,000. Soybean producers in 1985 will harvest 1,360,000 acres, expected to average 28 bushels-at \$5 per bushel, about \$200,000,000, less than half the value of the 1979 crop. The value of the 1984 crop was \$286,600,000 in Tennessee. The Tennessee Soybean Expo and annual meeting will be held Feb. 27th at the Civil Center in Jackson. The Expo and annual meeting will be a 1-day event.

## Ray Winberry, 21, **Killed In Impact**

Ray Winberry, 21, of Bells, half-brother of Jeff Burse, of Halls, and a passenger, Tela Gay Bell, 33, of Humboldt, were killed Saturday when their automobile ran off U.S. 79, striking a utility pole.

A highway patrol spokesman said the accident occurred about 12:45 a.m. Neither victim was using a seat belt, the spokesman said

"(1) It has come to the attention of the State of Tennessee that each county jail houses state prisoners pursuant to orders of the Court or as a result of the Federal Court order restraining the Department of Correction from accepting new felony prisoners.

"(3) The District Attorney has not been made a party of these modifications. Futhermore, neither the District Attorney nor the present judge is knowledgeable of the provisions of the alternative sentencing program.

"Premises Considered, the District Attorney moves this Court to review the docket sheet and minute entries of each prisoner sentenced by this Court and determine his or her present status.

"That upon such determination, the Court make a decision as to whether the defendant's current status is properly reflected on the minutes of this Court.

"That if the current status is in the interest of justice, that the Court approve such status. If the Court does not approve same, that the Court take appropriate measures."

## **Protect Fruit Trees**

Winter freeze damage, also called southwest trunk injury, affects many fruit trees in Tennessee each year. This injury results from extensive temperature fluctuations in the bark on the south to south west side of the tree trunk.

Even though the air temperature may be below freezing, bark temperatures on the side of the trunk facing the sun may exceed 80 to 90°F. on a clear, sunny day. At these temperatures, cells lose hardiness quickly. At night, bark temperatures quickly drop to the same level as the air temperature. If this is much below freezing, cells in the trunk may be injured or killed.

Trees in the range of two to eight years of age appear to be the most susceptible to southwest trunk injury. Bark on these trees is thinner and smoother than on older trees and heats more. Also, trees in the above age range have large enough trunks to expose a lot of surface area to sunlight.

Several methods of preventing or at least reducing the amount of winter damage to tree trunks exist. All methods depend on insulating the trunk from the sun's rays or reflecting sunlight to reduce heating.

Guards put around the trunks an be made of reflective foil, white paper, or plastic. These guards should extend from two inches below ground level up to about 14 to 18 inches above

**Farm Taxes Going Up?** Two of the proposals in the Reagan administration's tax. reform plan could increase taxes for farmers.

The proposals which would hit agriculture hardest are the eliminations of the investment tax credit and income averaging.

Eliminating investment tax credit would have a negative impact on most farmers. Under present law, farmers are able either to reduce or, in some cases, eliminate their tax liability with investment credit.

Although elimination of this credit would increase farmers' taxes, lower tax rates in the reform plan would offset the loss of investment credit for some farmers. In some cases, tax s might be lower because of the reduced rates. The actual effect on the individual farmer would depend on the level of income and the amount of property qualified for the investment credit.

Gopher purge likes to be kept the dry side, and overon watering will sometimes cause it to rot in the ground. These plants grow best in full sun but will do well in partial shade.



other chemicals such as DDT, dieldrin, endrin and toxaphene. They have all been banned for health reasons. But until my amendment, we have not considered imposing such restrictions on tobacco imported into the United States. In fact, no agency of the federal government even keeps track of what pesticides or other chemicals are being used on imported tobacco. This inaction raises a potential health hazard. And it puts American farmers at an extraor-

dinary disadvantage in competing with their foreign counterparts.

The State Department conducted an incomplete survey last year that showed many countries do permit the use of pesticides banned in the United States. The survey provided no information about chemicals used in some of the largest suppliers of tobacco, including Turkey, Bulgaria, Lebanon and Zimbabwe.

The amendment is not protectionist legislation. It merely follows the United States' obligation to its citizens to impose the same health and safety regulations on imported goods that we rightfully apply to those produced here. It's the same standard we already apply to imported cars, machinery and other consumer products.

"A Sunday School was organized at once when the church was completed and D. H. Cherry was made superintendent and held this position continuously until 1918 when he moved to versburg

"The church has grown over the years by the faithful work and witness of many dedicated ninisters and laity. The present membership of the church is 295. We are proud to be the oldest church in the Town of Halls



net. It's a once in a lifet approximately every w the Chinese and it ha its returns since then. Fo Halley's discovery of its periodic return, the comet wa named after him.

The last time it appeared, in 1910, Halley's Comet was 14 million miles from Earth and looked like a spectacult fireball. This time, due to its being further from the Earth (39 million miles) it will be dimmer than the stars in the Big Dipper.

A comet is a mixture of ic cks, dust and frozen gase sometimes compared to a "dirty snowball." The core is call ed a nucleus, and the tail o "coma" always points away from the sun. The comet's light is the reflection from sunlight and the glow from

From an abandoned, leaking structure buried behind the town's business section, the Halls Public Library has emerged in a beautiful, modern facility to better serve residents of Halls and Lauderdale County.

To showcase recent renovations and dedicate its numerous materials, an open house was held Sunday at the library, located at 110 North Church, capping a determined library board's drive to offer the best in library services.

"We've had good support from the town and the entire county and we certainly hope we continue to receive that support renovations," said Mrs. Pat Higdon, the library board's chairper son. "We now have a spacious facility, a lot of research mate-

rial, a wide variety of reading materials and services through the regional library. We think we have something for everybody. Included in the library is a weekly program for pre-school

children, a program heavily attended each Wednesday. And other activities are periodically heduled

"The library can be, and should be, an important part of any community," Mrs. Higdon added. "We feel our library i now taking its place in the com munity."

Halls had its first staffed ibrary in 1980 but the location abandoned clinic behind a number of other businesses offered only a temporary solution to search for a permanen facility. Through funding from city, county and state organiza tions, the library was 1 its present location, the site of a former automobile tion with Spanish-style architecture. Following some renovation, the library was opened in Janu-

ary, 1982. A \$50,000 matching-funds grant paved the way for the most recent renovation and, with that work completed, members of the library board feel the facility can serve the community for a longtime to come.

Among special guests at Sunday's open house were Halls Mayor Sammie Arnold, Mrs. Virgie Norman, the library's first librarian, Miss Betty Goff, the regional library director, and James Williams, the Memphisbased architect in charge of ecent renovations.

The library, with assistance from the Forked Deer Regional Library Center, a part of the Tennessee State Library and Archives, has more than registered borrowers. Hours are 12:30 to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday.







FACS will advance to the third round of the playoffs, traveling to Adamsville Friday night. Halls ends the year at 8-4.


