

The board also voted to offer ICG \$19,000 for 38,950 square feet north of East Main and east of Front St., for parking and "several other optional uses."

State plans to widen Highway 88 west of Halls have been maturing for years without considering Halls' gas and water lines serving rural customers, the board was told; board minutes say the state "was not aware" of the lines.

Unless the state will pay for re-lo-cating the lines, Halls is left with only two alternatives, the board was told:

• End services.

 Ask users to pay their share of the re-location expense, which won't be cheap.

Other board business included closing of the street between Allen-Stone Boxes and the Huey house, to which no one objected in a public hearing.

Creating Problems

Wandering Around

PUBLISHED WEEKLY

Through the years of writing this column we from time to time have commented on some of our pet peeves. During that more than 40 years we expect we have been more aggravated by the tendency of some persons to call us to suggest an item

We have always welcomed suggestions and some of the bet-ter received comments have resulted from some of these suggestions but quite often it turns out that the person making the suggestion has some complaint they want made but they are unwilling to take responsibility for the criticism. Often they have had some merit but when we suggest that they write a letter to the editor or allow us to use their name they immediately back off and want no part of it.

A case in point is a letter we recently received, supposedly from a local teenager, in which the writer makes some comments against the charges of alleged use of drugs by teenager There were some good points in the letter but unfortunately was signed only with initials and we were unable to verify the letter. We do not use anonymous letters or even suggestions and while the letter was well written we seem to remember some of the wording from other sources. We will be happy to talk about the letter if the writer can be identified.

Last week a nationally distributed columnist, James J. Kil patrick, wrote a column which should be required reading for every member of the United States Congress.

Mr. Kilpatrick, a conservative, was writing about a bill sponsored by Sen. David Pryor, of Arkansas, called the American Taxpayers Bill of Rights. Sen Pryor's bill would limit some abuses of citizens' rights by the Internal Revenue Service. Briefly the bill would force the IRS to show the taxpayers their rights, slow the arbitrary seizure of money and property and other alleged abuses by the IRS.

There is one feature of the proposed bill which Mr. Kilpa-trick doubts as being wise although we cannot see why. The clause in question would make the IRS prove their case rather than the present practice of the taxpayer having to prove their innocence. Mr. Kilpatrick is afraid that such a change would encourage more taxpayers to avoid paying taxes. That possi-bly could be true but the present method has created some
