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Buddy Moore Is A Halls Fixture

If you can read this newspaper, then you should certainly recognize the name Chief Buddy Moore.

"Mr. Buddy", as he is known by most school children, is definitely a familiar face among the streets of Halls. I doubt there is a child anywhere in this area, who wouldn't recognize the face of the man who has seemingly greeted them each day when arriving at school.

"Mr. Buddy" has been with the Halls Police Department since 1962. When he started, he was one of two policemen, working a six to six shift, with no time off, and no vacations. Things have certainly changed since then.

In 1981, the police station, previously located in one of the buildings recently razed by the city, moved into a new building on Front Street, also occupied by the ambulance service. There are now four full-time and several part-time officers, a much larger force than the previous twosome.

Although there have been several changes, Chief Moore will be the first to tell you that crime in the area hasn't changed too much. In the past seven years, Halls has had less crime than any other town in Tennessee! That is definitely a statistic to be proud of!

Even though it is usually quiet, there have been several incidents that will always be remembered. When asked about the one thing that stands out in his memory the most, Chief Moore laughed and replied, "That's Easy". He quickly recalled a time when he had to arrest a drunken driver. At first it seemed like any other DUI arrest, but this driver had no legs and tipped the scales at a point that Chief Moore couldn't handle him alone!

This put the Chief in a very strange situation. He had to ask the man to drive slowly to the calaboose, and stay until sobered up. The driver acknowledged, and when he arrived, he crawled out of his car into the calaboose. The next day, he crawled out of the calaboose, back to his car, got in, and drove off!

Other than incidents such as this, there is generally never much of anything out of the ordinary to happen. Chief Moore says that one of the things that he likes best about his job, is that Halls is such a peaceful town. He also likes the fact that he knows the people of Halls personally, and can lend a helping hand when necessary. His favorite deed is helping the senior citizens, and paying them visits as often as he finds time.

After 25 years of service, one might think that Chief Moore would be tired of his job. This is definitely not the case. Spend five or ten minutes with "Mr. Buddy", and you'll see that this is certainly a man who loves his work, and his town!

Halls History

Three historic buildings on the corner of Main and Front Streets were demolished about three weeks ago. In their place will be a pretty mini-park—pretty, yes, but quite expensive, as the town, county, and state will no longer collect taxes from these buildings. The taxpayers also paid many times what the owners paid for them originally.

This week, I have researched what history I can find on the building that faces both Main and Front Sta., owned by the Cherry brothers.

As long as I can remember, this has been known as the Pugh building. I really don't believe F. E. (Gene) Pugh built it.

Henry Murchison tells me that Mr. Pugh did own it in 1912, the year his father, J. H. "Buddie" Murchison, moved his family here from Maury City to join Mr. Pugh as a cotton buyer.

There was a cotton buyer office on the upper floor of the building until Mr. Pugh's son, Farnsworth, moved his office to what was then, I believe, Planters Gin.

The offices were then rented to the government to house the offices of architects and engineers as the Air Base was being built during World War II.

The lower floor always held four different businesses, as I remember. The largest one was on the corner of Main St., and Levy's Alley. As a child, I remember Hearn's Drug Store being there. Dr. and Mrs. Hearn's daughter, Kathryn, was in my second grade class, which Miss Omega Kenley taught. We also began music lessons together under Mrs. C. F. "Lula Moore" Harward, along with Mr. Harward's daughter, Marialine, and Margaret Daws (now Mrs. Cecil Massey, of Ripley).

After the drug store, this

became a barber shop. Mrs. Robert Baker said her husband went there to work when the late R. L. Siler owned the business. Mr. Baker bought the business when Mr. Siler died. Barbers on the other two chairs in the shop included Henry Baldrige, E. D. "Shorty" Norman, and Mr. Garrett. This shop had a bath tub for many years, where you could take a bath for 25¢, hair cut with tonic 25¢ and shave 15¢. Cox's Jewelry Store was next. This later became John Scott's

Jewelry Store, and Mrs. Webb ran it after John's death. Then there was the meat market next door. I do wish I could remember the name in the telephone directory. We all knew it as Bob and Beck Burnett's Meat Market. To my knowledge, there has never been a couple in Halls that did more for this town. She was a pillar of the Baptist Church, and he was a pillar in the Methodist Church.

My son, Cary, was privileged to work for them during the summers, on Saturdays and after school, when he did not have basketball or football practice. He brought home tales of Alice (Mrs. O. J.) Nunn calling up and wanting "a skillet-full of steak."

Everybody charged in those days, paying at the end of the month; some only made a partial payment, never paying even as much as was charged the last month, their total becoming bigger and bigger. One man would come in and pay with a check—Bob would send Cary to the bank with it, as he knew the man had only put enough in the bank to cover that day's checks.

Cary carried groceries to many widows and poor people's homes that often ordered one or two items every day, as this was about the only connection they had with the outside world.

Ed Stanfield had the big restaurant on the corner of Main and Front. There were many others there, but I really do not remember ever eating or getting a Coke there. Ed was my distant cousin. The late Will Cherry, who worked at Connell Drug Store, was also a cousin, and told me this story:

Ed would charge to most any one and give them a chance to pay, for some time. Then he would write their name and the amount they owed on a bulletin board; when they paid up, the name was marked off.

Halls has not grown much in population in the last 20 years. So many people live just outside the city limits and pay no city taxes. If you live in Halls and get the service of Halls Gas and Water and Ripley Power and Light (electricity), your minimum bill is \$18.10, which is about three or four times what it was just 15 or 20 years ago.

History buff that I am—I hated to see these buildings torn down, as I did when our depot and Halls Elementary and High Schools were demolished.

Even though Halls now has an airport, two housing projects, a Senior Citizens Center, tennis courts, baseball fields and apartment complexes that are enjoyed by many old and young, no taxes come in from these projects, and the taxes rise higher and higher on taxpayers.

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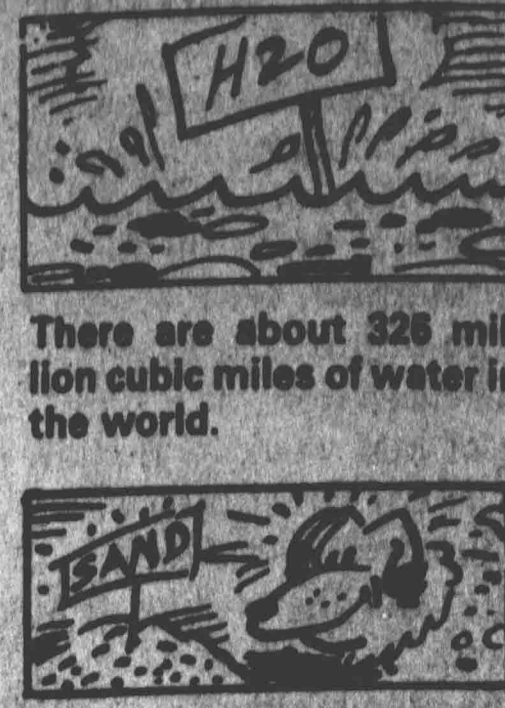

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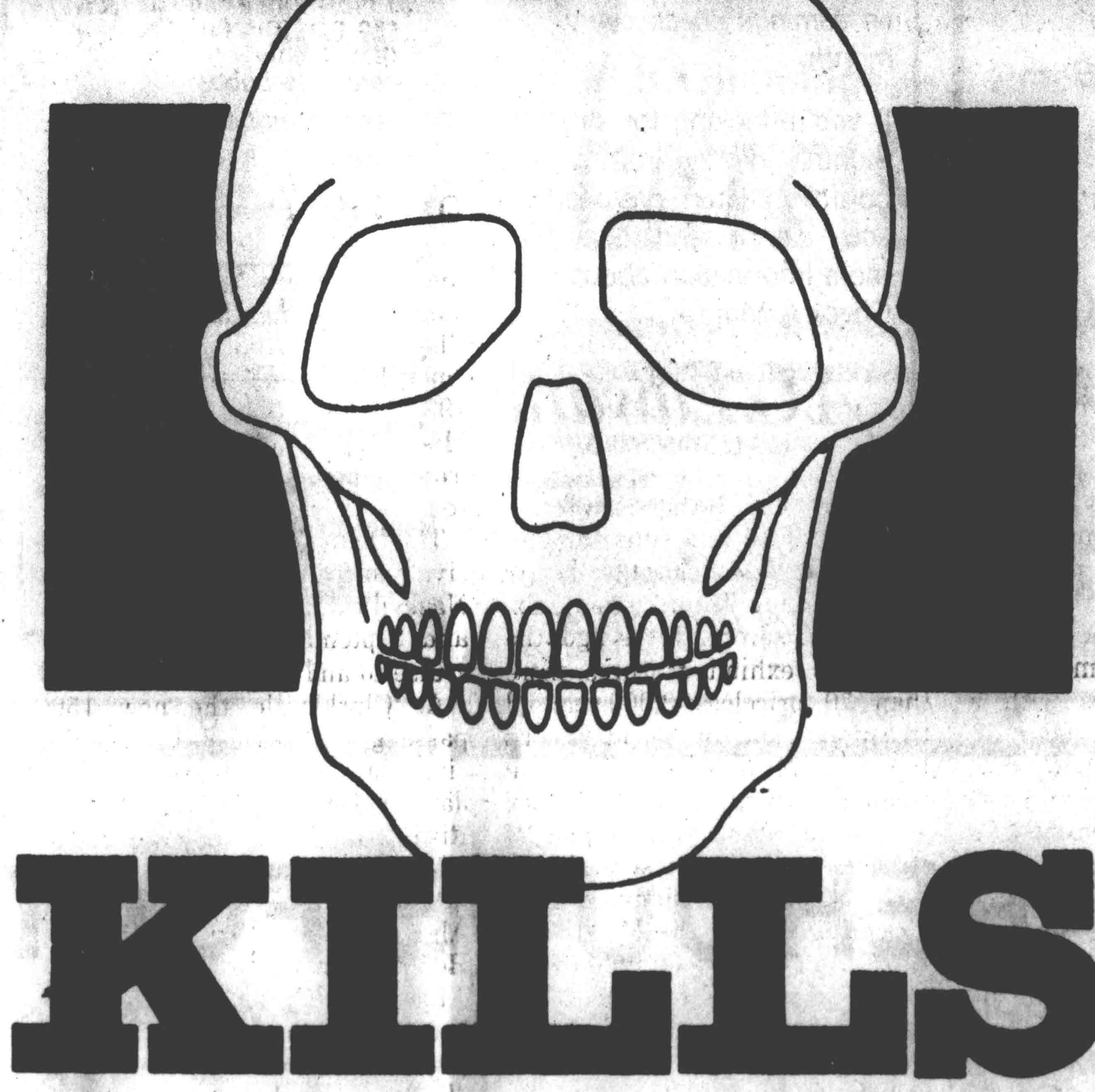

What's New In Tennessee For 1987

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Major expansions at Opryland and Dollywood, a huge exhibit of Egyptian antiquities, and a cost-of-thousands re-enactment of the Civil War Battle of Shiloh are in store for visitors to Tennessee during 1987.

Nashville's immensely popular Opryland theme park launches its 16th season in late March with a new \$2.6 million water thrill ride dubbed "The Old Mill Screamin'." The ride occupies a new 10-acre mountain and climaxes with a 50-foot drop into Eagle Lake.

In addition to the new ride, Opryland will also feature two new shows for the 1987 season — a 45-minute music-comedy-action show with a western theme called "Way Out West" and the new 45-minute "The Big Broadcast" production which pays tribute to the golden age of broadcasting.

Also in Nashville, the gorgeously restored New Union Station Hotel has opened in the once abandoned downtown L&N train station. Originally built in 1900, the new 128-room hotel features 24-carat gold leaf decorative work and the depot's original stained glass windows and skylights.

A second major hotel, the new 675-room Stouffer Hotel and Nashville Convention Center is scheduled to open in August.

Also opening in the summer of 1987 is Nashville's new \$25 million Fountain Square complex at Metro Center. The 200,000 square-foot lakeside shopping and entertainment complex will feature specialty shops, restaurants, a 400-seat amphitheater for live entertainment, street performers, and a huge fountain offering 1,000 different light and water shows.

Dollywood, Tennessee's second major theme park, opens its second season at Pigeon Forge with a \$6 million expansion including the new bobsled-style Mountain Slide-winder thrill ride, a new children's play and activity area, a new toy factory, a candy factory, a new restaurant, and the sets from entertainer Dolly Parton's highly

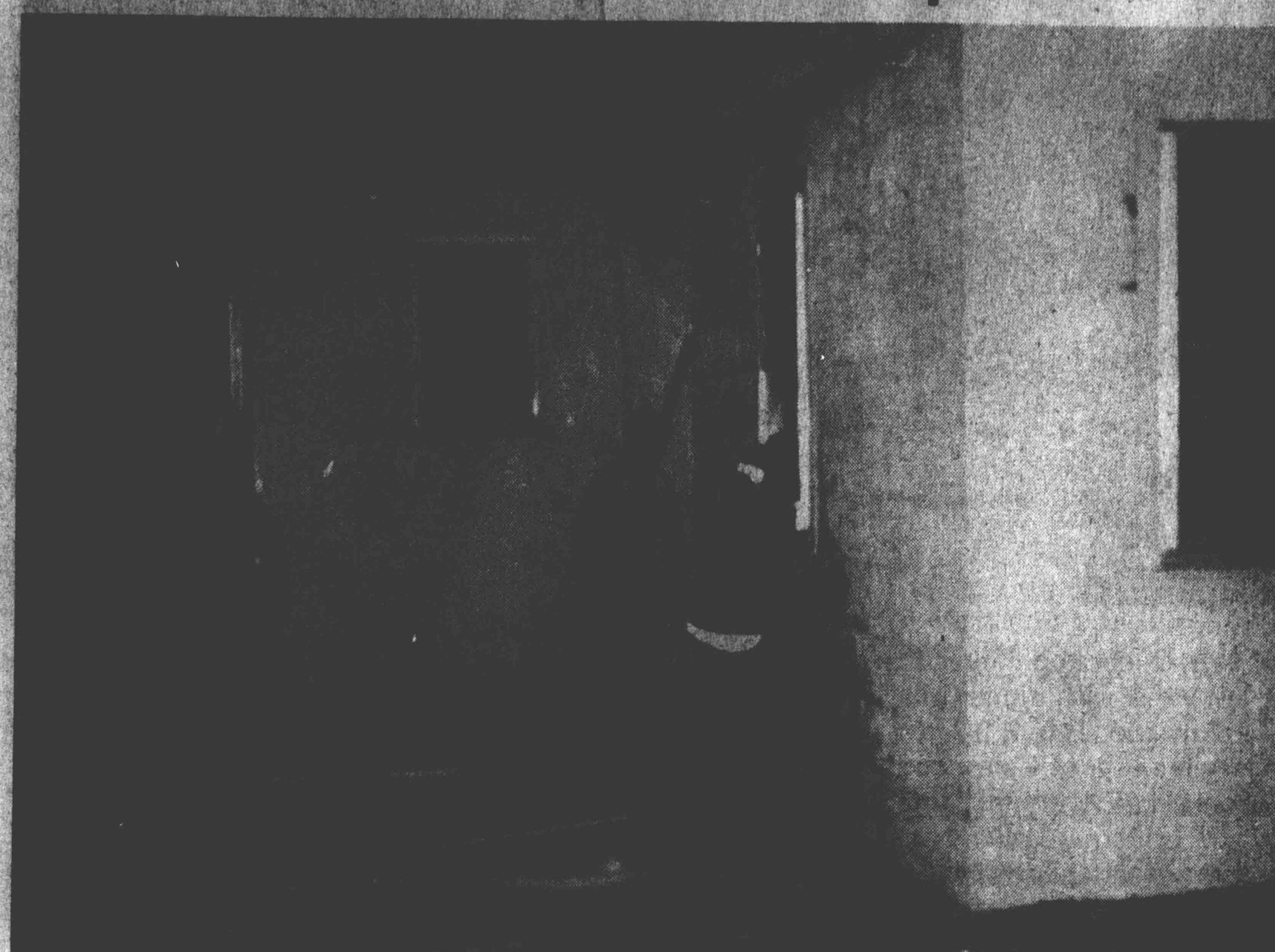

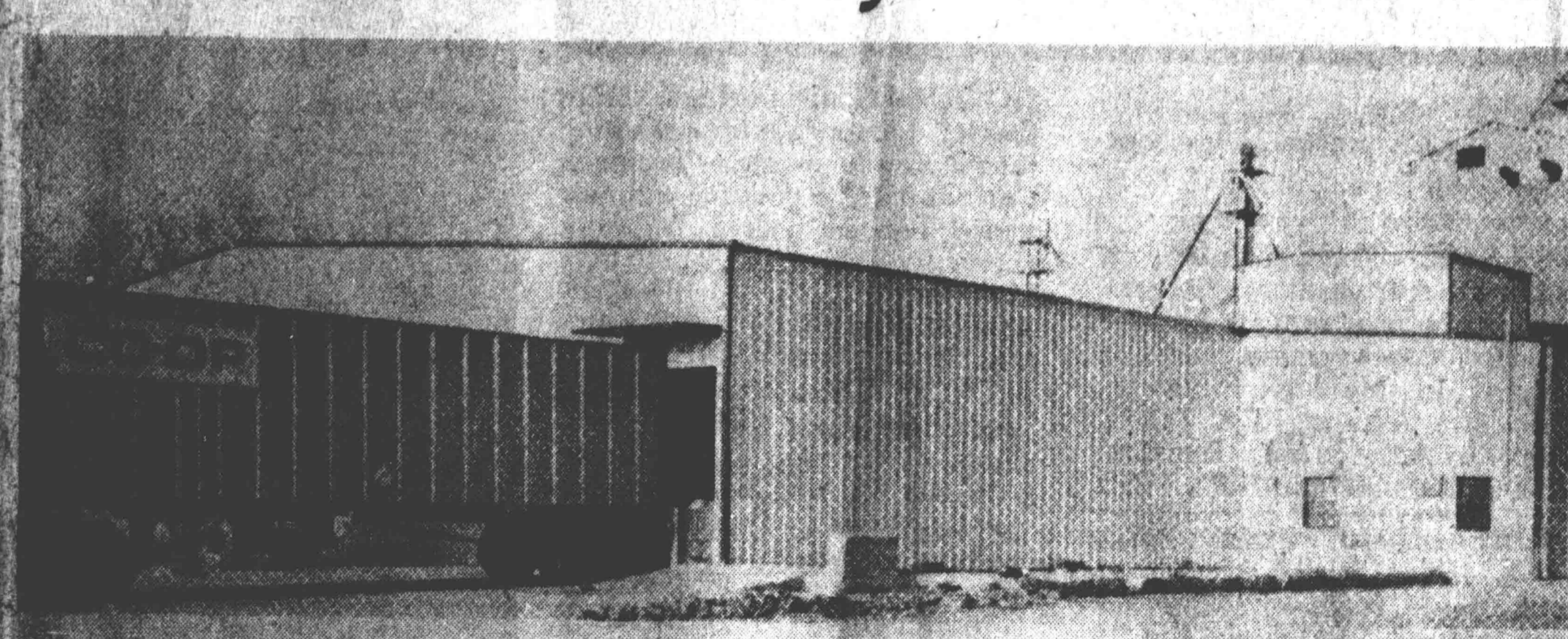

account for the Emergency Food Assistance Program to pay for the cost of living raise. It simply did not seem fair to me that increases in salaries should be financed by taking money away from programs that were designed to assist the poor. Quite frankly, I was among many Members of Congress who were surprised to learn that the Administration had even advanced such a proposal.

The legislation disapproving the transfer of funds was passed in the same bill that was passed to disapprove the Congressional raises.

This attempt to transfer funds from the program to provide food to the poor would have essentially forced state and local

governments to stop their distribution of this food. It would have meant that agricultural commodity surpluses would have gone unused and that some Americans would have gone hungry. Both results would have constituted setbacks to our nation's efforts to feed our hungry and improve circumstances for our hard pressed farmers.

This is a simple case where the Administration's action did not live up to the goals it advocates in its talk. Pay raises, whether they are cost of living raises for all federal workers or periodic raises for federal executives, should never be financed from tax dollars appropriated to help those who are least able to help themselves.

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Over the past several weeks, there has been the traditional and justifiable criticism of pay raises for federal government executives, Members of Congress, and federal judges. The President recommended to the Congress that pay for his Cabinet officers, sub-Cabinet officers, and division and agency heads, Members of the House and Senate, and judges be increased by as much as 16 percent.

Since the early days of the republic, salary levels for government officials has been a volatile subject and one that usually sparks very emotional debate. This year was no different.

I opposed the salary increase as I have each time the subject has come up during my 18 years in the Congress. However, in addition to casting my vote against the pay raise, I also introduced legislation to disapprove another little noticed, but serious part of the whole issue of federal salaries.

In submitting his budget proposal to Congress, the President also sent up to Capitol Hill a package of proposals to transfer funds for various federal programs from one account to another. One of those transfers would have essentially eliminated the temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program.

This program has operated successfully for six years. It provides for the distribution of surplus agricultural commodities such as cheese and butter to poor families who need food. It is a rather modest program on which \$50 million will be spent in FY87.

What the Administration wanted to do was take \$28 million from the Emergency Food Program and use it to finance part of the three percent cost of living increase granted to federal

employees on January 1. The remainder needed to finance the rest of the cost of living adjustment would have come from transfers from other accounts.

The legislation I introduced was designed to disapprove the transfer of funds out of the

The National Field Trial Championships At Ames Plantation

GRAND JUNCTION, Tenn. — For 88 years, sportsmen from throughout the United States have been gathering in the tiny town of Grand Junction on the Tennessee-Mississippi border some 50 miles east of Memphis each February for what might be called the "Super Bowl of Bird Dogs."

Officially known as The National Field Trial Championships, the eight to ten days of intense competition beginning February 23 will result in the selection of a 1987, "World Champion Bird Dog."

"It is an honor just to be allowed into the National Field Trial competition," explains Jim Anderson, superintendent of the huge Ames Plantation which has hosted the event each February since 1886.

"The qualifications each dog must meet are so strict that by the time the national competition begins, the eliminations have reduced the field to just 30 or 40 really outstanding dogs."

For those top dogs, the National Field Trials represent one of the most grueling tests of endurance in the sporting world.

"February can bring almost any kind of weather to southwestern Tennessee," Anderson says. "We have had mild and sunny days for the trials some years. We have also had freezing weather, and sometimes even rain, sleet or snow. A true champion dog must be able to hunt in any kind of weather and

at every conceivable kind and brand of hunting and outdoor equipment, such as it sold through the firm's thick mail order catalog.

Photographs of past champions and their handlers line the walls of an entire room devoted to the National Field Trials. The dogs gaze down solemnly from the frames as if someone aware of the honor associated with their display in this hallowed gallery of champions.

The latest addition to these portraits of honor is a dog named Bluff City Mike owned by Bob Wallace of Memphis. As the 1986 National Field Trial champion, Bluff City Mike brought home a cash prize of \$8,000, an impressive collection of trophies and a sterling silver edition trooper saddle presented by Tucker Saddlery of Southaven, Mississippi, a long-time sponsor of the competition.

"The National Field Trials are Grand Junction's major claim to fame," says Dunn's Vice President Jerry Gatewood. "It just seemed sort of appropriate for us to put the photographs on display. Every National Field Trial champion since the first one in 1896 is on display here, and the store has become something of a museum for the National Field Trials. In addition to all the photographs, there are all sorts of saddles and training equipment on display along with personal items which once belonged to some of the top bird dog handlers and trainers in the country. To hunting dog people, their names are as familiar as Babe Ruth's is to a baseball fan."

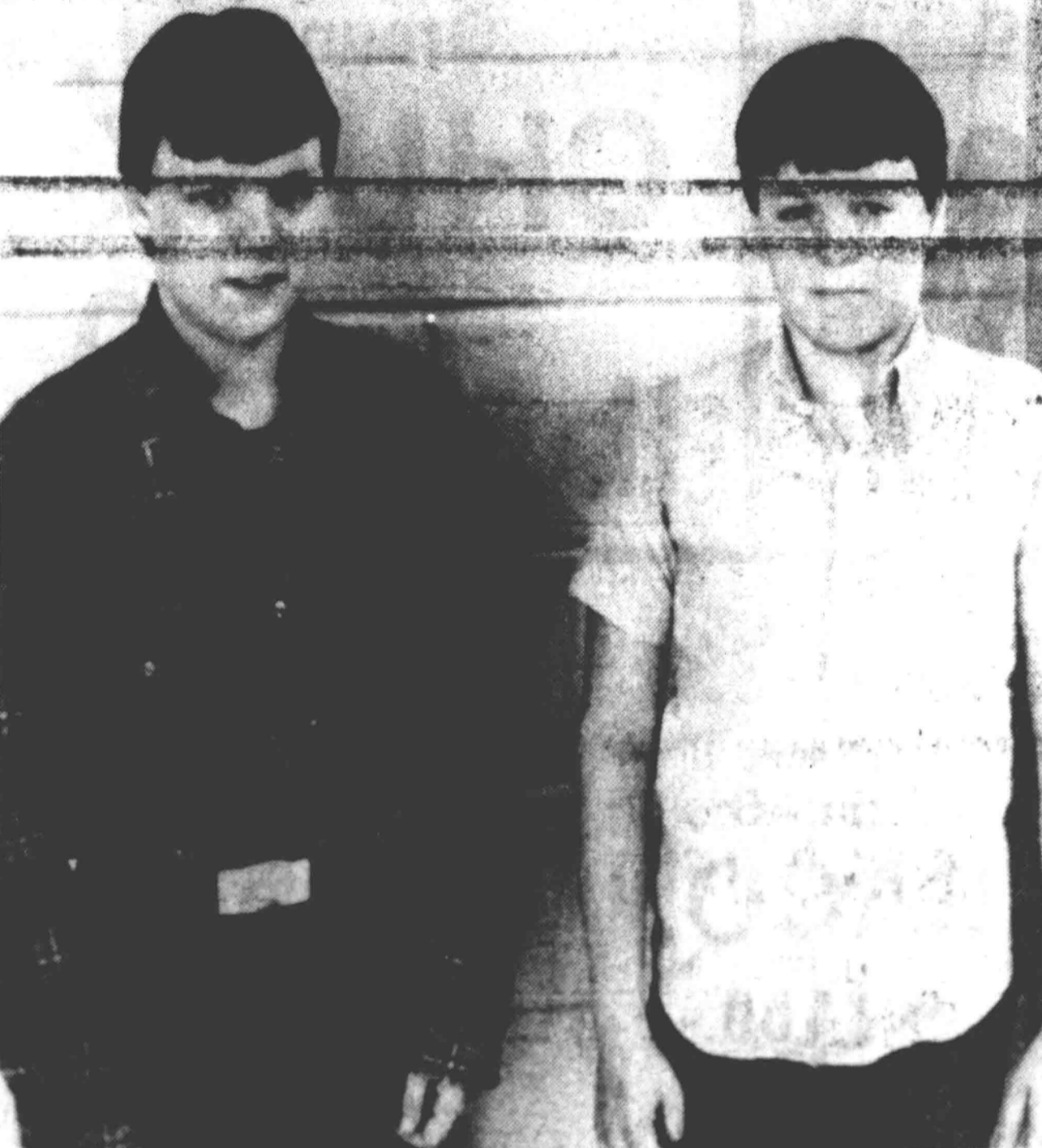

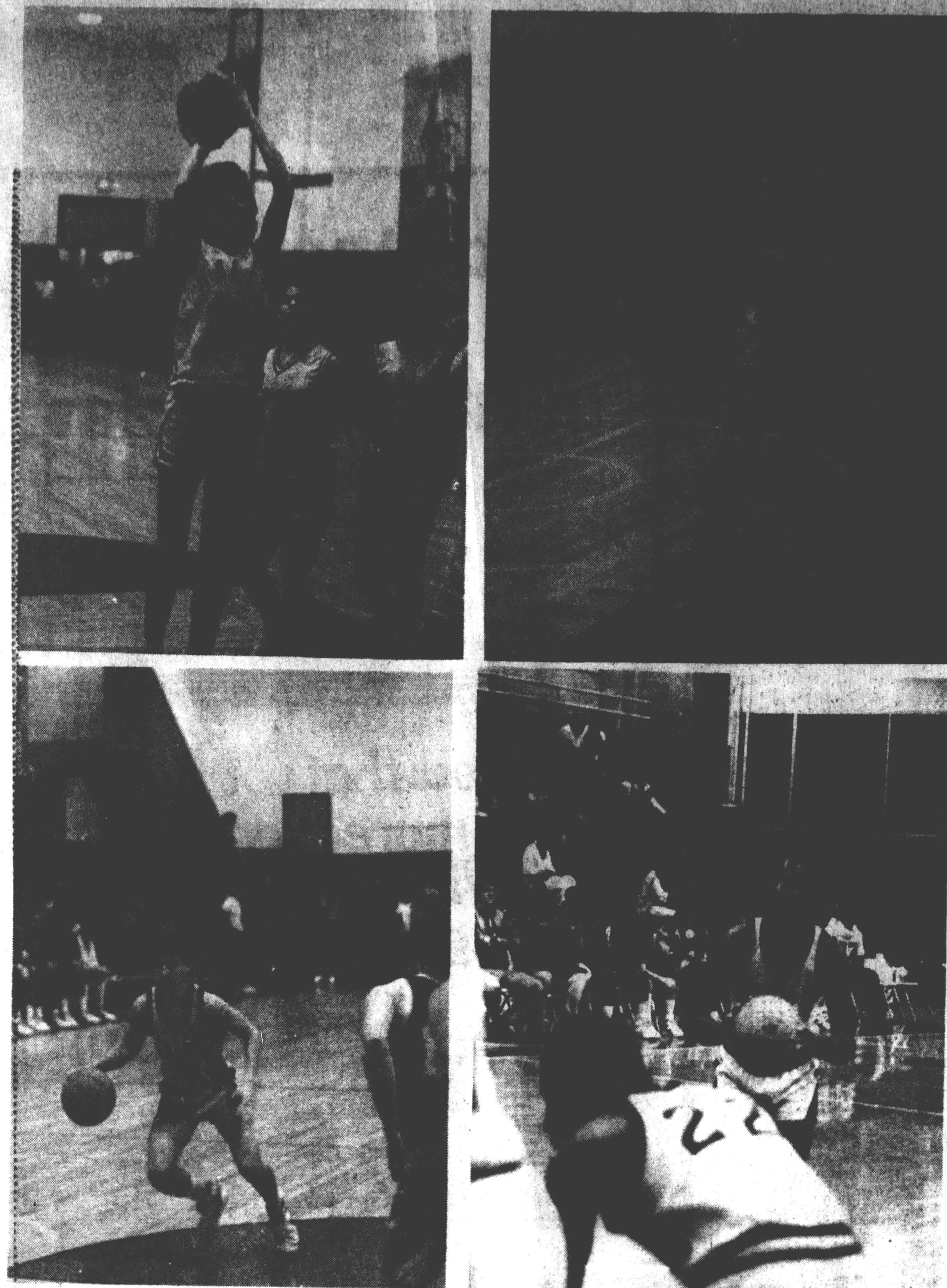

Beverly Hastings and Gentry Lacy were reappointed to the Planning Commission for 2-year terms. Alderman Stanley said the Commission is weighing keeping zoning to its present 5-mile radius or reducing it; the board asked for recommendations later.

Arnold reported negotiations with the county for a mutual aid agreement to provide rural fire protection. He said Dyersburg and Dyer County have worked together successfully in this manner.

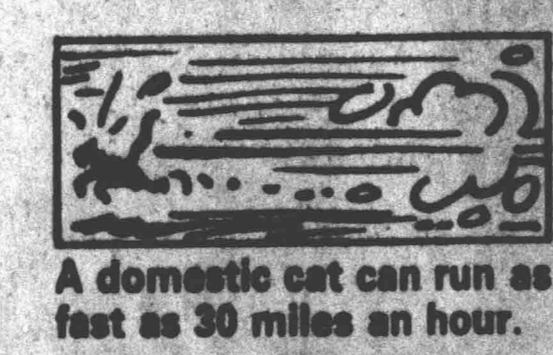

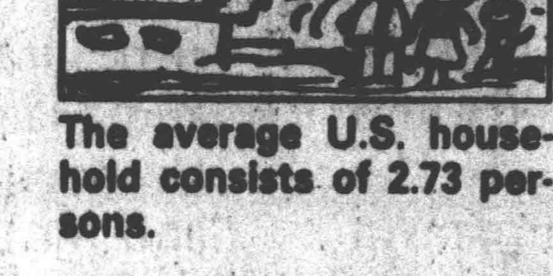

ED JONES REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

As is the usual custom for the occasion, President Reagan used the State of the Union message to lay out his legislative agenda for the first session of the 100th Congress. While the State of the Union message given before a joint session of Congress is not a very good forum for providing specific proposals, the President made it clear that among his priorities is catastrophic health insurance. At this point, despite his comments in the State of the Union and the development of a comprehensive package by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the White House has not yet adopted a specific plan.

Nonetheless, the President has by his own statements made it an issue that is sure to draw intense consideration by the House and Senate. In the absence of an administration backed plan, the Congress is not waiting. It has already held several hearings. Because of the complexity and nature of this issue, there are certain to be many more.

Rising health care costs is, without question, one of the most pressing problems this country faces. It is an issue that affects everyone or has the potential to affect everyone, but it is the elderly who seem especially hard hit. Increasingly, they are being forced to sacrifice their security by depleting their savings to pay for necessary, long term health care. Furthermore, their children in many cases must shoulder additional burdens to insure that their aging parents receive proper and adequate health care.

About 28 million senior citizens and three million disabled

people qualify for Medicare. Unfortunately, that program is set up so that as hospital bills rise, Medicare pays a declining share. In spite of Medicare Part B coverage and private insurance available to Medicare recipients, there is still a significant portion of our senior citizens with insufficient insurance coverage.

Health and Human Services Secretary Otis Bowen has testified at several hearings on this subject. His proposal calls for an increase in the Medicare Part B premium in exchange for Medicare Part B paying for all out of pocket costs in excess of \$2,000 per year.

Another serious, and possibly more complex, aspect of this whole question of health care costs is the problem of providing and financing long term, nursing home care for those who need it. Today, Medicare pays less

To Speed Vegetables:

The first warm days of the year spur interest in gardening and impatience for fresh vegetables.

There are several ways to shorten the wait, notes Charles L. Peal, county Extension Leader:

Cool season vegetables, such as spinach, onions and English peas, can be planted early in the spring, in some cases, as soon as the ground can be worked.

A second way to get early vegetables is to plant quick maturing varieties. A few of these plants can provide fresh fruits well in advance of the main crop.

Plant on a slight slope to the south in light, sandy soil. These areas of the ground will warm up sooner.

Remember that transplants grown in large containers will have a head start on those in small containers.

What's Your Opinion?

Jack Anderson, nationally syndicated newspaper columnist, has an opinion poll in progress which we find quite interesting.

Mr. Anderson is asking the reading public to respond to the question, "How should Congress re-

duce the deficit: by raising taxes? Or by cutting federal spending?

Taxpayers may respond to the poll by calling either of two telephone numbers depending on which the taxpayer thinks is the best solution. Or if the taxpayer prefers not to spend the 50c which the call will cost one may list the preferred telephone number on a postal card and mail it to a post office address. Mr. Anderson states that he will see that the results of the poll will be brought to the attention of Congress.

We find the poll interesting because of our belief that both measures will be necessary if any real progress is to be made in cutting the ever-growing federal deficit. However, also we agree with those opposing tax increases unless some controls are put into place to insure that the additional money raised by tax increase is earmarked to cut the deficit and not simply more money that Congress can spend.

We will try to keep abreast of the results of the poll and keep our readers informed about just what the public thinks.

Incidentally, Mr. Anderson was somewhat shocked with the results of a similar poll which found that the public felt that the news media was being unfair to President Reagan. He writes that 97% of more than 100,000 callers felt that the media is unfair. Those answering by postal cards also felt that the media was unfair but a small majority. However, only a few more than 3,000 answered the previous poll by mail.
