Halls Mayor Buys Taco Bell In Jackson, Moving Nearby

Halls Mayor Sammie L. Arnold, owner of Arnold Health-Mart Drugs in Halls, has paid \$427,000 for the franchise of Taco Bell at 2330 N. Highland in Jackson, formerly companyowned, managed by Arnold's brother, Harold, of Scottsboro, Ala.

The Arnolds expect to move in February to a new home they are building on Medon-Malesus Road. Arnold was born in that area.

Harold says he operated a Captain D's in 1976, has also worked for Bonanza and Dairy Queen, and owns a Dairy Queen in Scottsboro but is selling it and his home there to move to Jackson.

"We plan to buy other stores," he says, starting with more Taco Bells but not ruling out other restaurants.

Robert M. Hendrix Dies; Dyer Leader

Robert M. Hendrix, 61, of Dyersburg, brother of Earl Hendrix, of Ripley, died Wednesday of last week in Methodist Hospital in Dyersburg.

Services were at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in First Baptist Church in Dyersburg, in which he had served as deacon. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

A retired farmer, he was chairman of the board of directors of Dyersburg Production Credit Association.

From 1971 to 1973, he was chairman of the National PCA Advisory Committee and in that capacity testified before House and Senate hearings on the Farm Credit Act of 1971.

He also served on the Fourth District Farm Credit Board of Louisville, Ky.

"The farm credit system would not have succeeded without his guiding hand and influence," said Frederick Wagner, an executive manager of Farm Bank services.

"Farmers will probably never really know what men like Bob Hendrix did for American agriculture."

He also leaves his wife. Jackie C. Hendrix; a son, Robert, Jr., of Dyersburg; a daughter, Mrs. Patricia Jane Gibson, of Winslow, Ark.; another brother, Forrest Walker Hendrix, of Finley; and five grandchildren.



County Will Assist Cities

In Rural Fire Protection County Commission agreed Monday to add \$60,000 to next fiscal year's budget to equip the Ripley fire department to ade-

quately answer calls within about five miles of the city limits The funding will purchase another pumper, train another fireman, and finance sending four additional firemen to rural blazes. (Volunteer firemen have received no pay for going to rural fires, and though bills are sent for responding to fire calls, the majority are never paid; the homes most likely to burn are also those most likely to be uninsured or impoverished.)

The city-county mutual aid agreement will also bring the city back under immunity from liability for suits arising from its serving rural areas. The county is self-insured.

The county will negotiate similar agreements with Gates, Halls, Henning, and Fort Pillow State Prison Farm fire departments, to attempt to continue fire protection for all areas of the county, says County Executive William "Bill Pete" Tucker. He anticipates this will add about 15¢ to next year's county real estate tax rate, but without any fire department service, most ru ral homes would find it difficult to find insurance at any fee Commissioners also approved the sheriff department's purchase of an additional automobile from revenue sharing funds.
