Halls Mayor Buys Taco Bell In Jackson, Moving Nearby

Halls Mayor Sammie L. Arnold, owner of Arnold Health-Mart Drugs in Halls, has paid \$427,000 for the franchise of Taco Bell at 2330 N. Highland in Jackson, formerly company-owned, managed by Arnold's brother, Harold, of Scottsboro, Ala.

The Arnolds expect to move in February to a new home they are building on Medon-Malesus Road. Arnold was born in that area.

Harold says he operated a Captain D's in 1976, has also worked for Bonanza and Dairy Queen, and owns a Dairy Queen in Scottsboro but is selling it and his home there to move to Jackson.

"We plan to buy other stores," he says, starting with more Taco Bells but not ruling out other restaurants.

Robert M. Hendrix Dies; Dyer Leader

Robert M. Hendrix, 61, of Dyersburg, brother of Earl Hendrix, of Ripley, died Wednesday of last week in Methodist Hospital in Dyersburg.

Services were at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in First Baptist Church in Dyersburg, in which he had served as deacon. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

A retired farmer, he was chairman of the board of directors of Dyersburg Production Credit Association.

From 1971 to 1973, he was chairman of the National PCA Advisory Committee and in that capacity testified before House and Senate hearings on the Farm Credit Act of 1971.

He also served on the Fourth District Farm Credit Board of Louisville, Ky.

"The farm credit system would not have succeeded without his guiding hand and influence," said Frederick Wagner, an executive manager of Farm Bank services.

"Farmers will probably never really know what men like Bob Hendrix did for American agriculture."

He also leaves his wife, Jackie C. Hendrix; a son, Robert, Jr., of Dyersburg; a daughter, Mrs. Patricia Jane Gibson, of Winslow, Ark.; another brother, Forrest Walker Hendrix, of Finley; and five grandchildren.

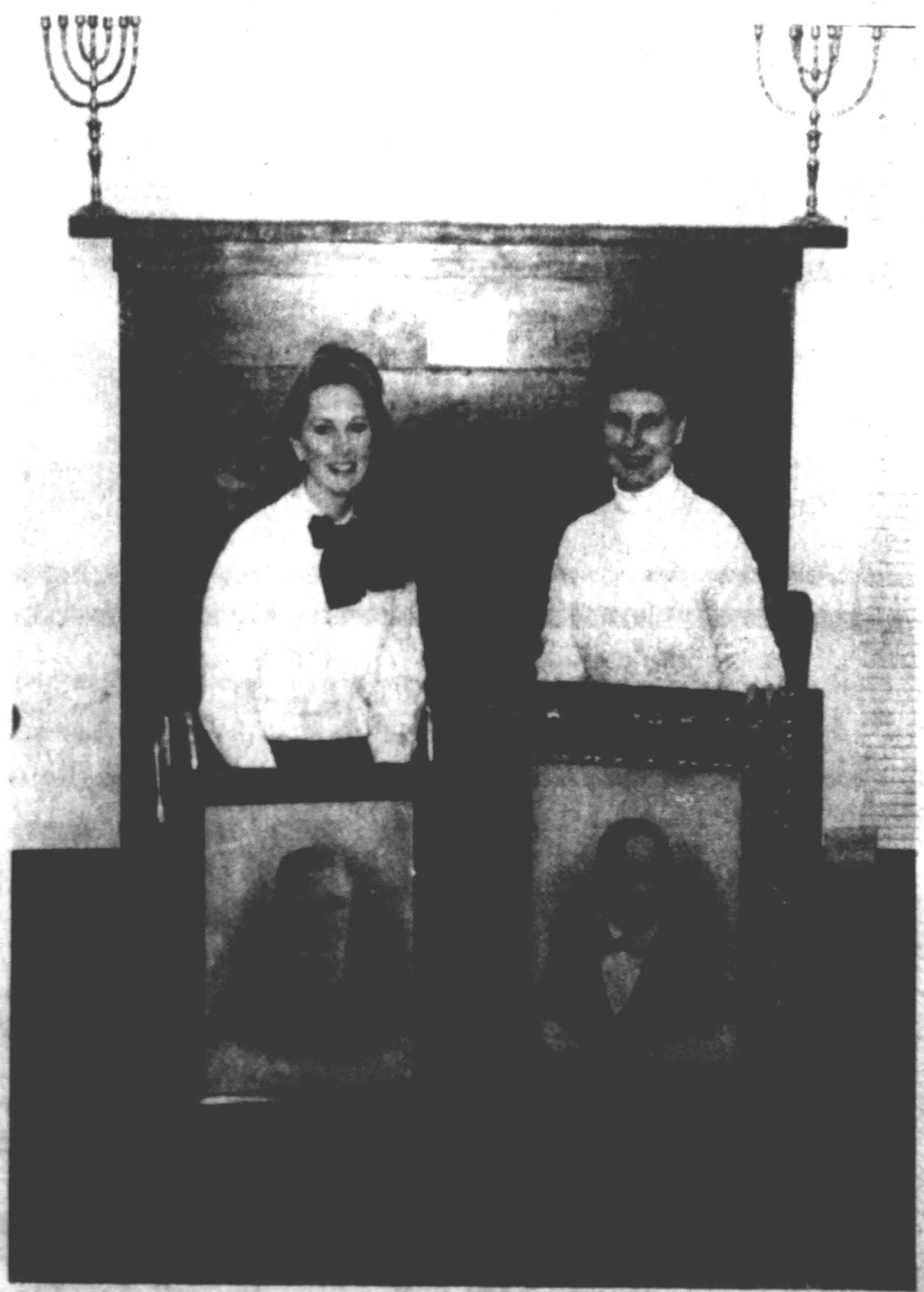
Takes Trenton Bank Helm

Governor Names Panel On Future Of Henning

Gov. Lamar Alexander has created a Committee on the Future of Henning to assist the town, Alex Haley's boyhood home, in becoming an historic and educational center.

"The State has already established the Alex Haley Museum in Henning, and we anticipate that the area will become a popular one for tourists as well as Tennesseans from across the state," the governor says.

"The mission of this committee is to plan for the growth of Henning in a way that will make the most of the opportunities for tourism but still preserve the natural flavor of the region."

Governor Alexander has authorized \$10,000 from his emergency and contingency funds to finance the operation. He has appointed Haley and nine others to the new committee.

Ripley Asks County Aid On Its Rural Fire Calls

Ripley's Board of Mayor and Aldermen has notified County Executive William ("Bill Pete") Tucker that unless the county assumes liability risks, it can no longer send city fire equipment outside the city limits after midnight next Monday.

The city has long answered rural fire calls as a "good neighbor" policy, though the city fire department receives no share of county taxes.

Though this policy has not changed, a recent ruling by the state attorney general says use of city fire equipment outside the city exposes the city to the possibility of claims against it from fire victims or others injured in such operations.

The city is willing to continue the service only if the County Commission will assume liability for such possible complaints.

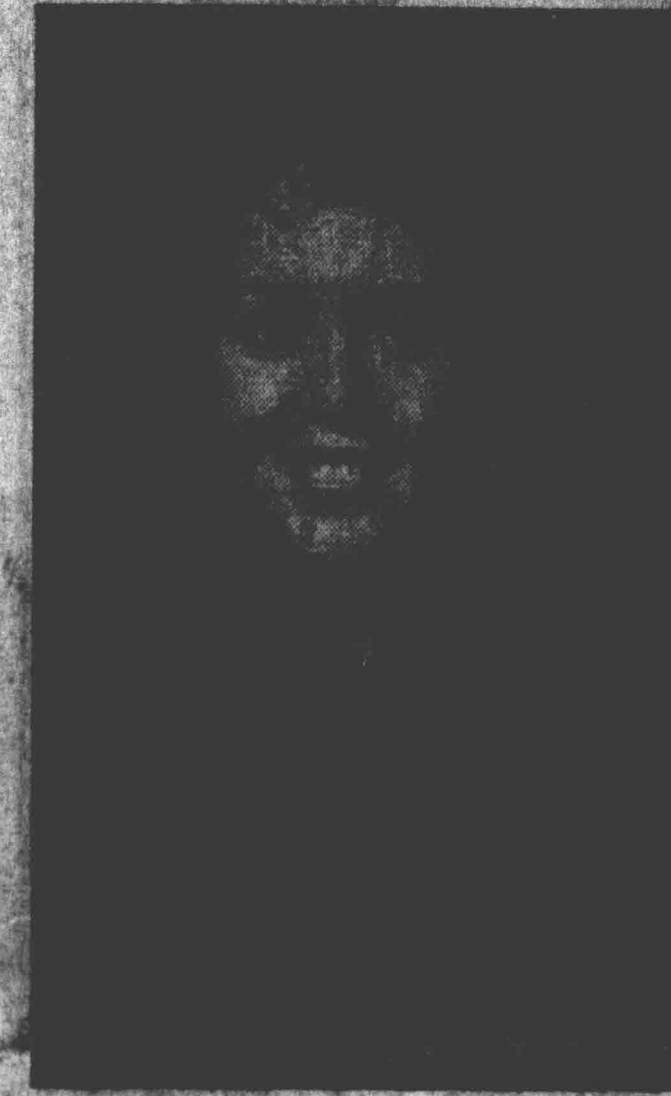

Farm Record Tips Offered

Lauderdale County farmers and their wives are invited to attend a farm record-keeping workshop at the County Extension Office on Tuesday, January 13, at 7 p.m. The Agricultural Extension Service will conduct this as a part of the proclaimed "Farm Record-Keeping Month" by the 94th General Assembly and the Governor.

Dean McEloyd Downen of the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service said the purpose of these activities is to help strengthen the business practices of Tennessee farmers.

The Extension Service is putting a high priority on good farm record keeping as part of its Tennessee Manage Program. Educational activities will include workshops on how to use record information to make better decisions.

Downen said successful farm families in the future must commit themselves to the business aspect of farming. Good yields and hard work will still be critical to success. However, those who produce food and fiber in the future must put additional effort into improved decision-making to manage for tomorrow.

For information on record-keeping activities, contact the County Agricultural Extension Service Office.

Cotton Exports Strong

One of the few bright spots among U.S. exports is cotton. Boosted by the government's marketing loan program and competitive prices, cotton exports are booming and should continue at a high level over the next few years.

The U.S.D.A. Extension Service said lower interest rates and a weaker dollar abroad are giving the new cotton program a big boost. Foreign consumption of cotton is rising at an accelerated rate and is pushing world cotton prices to a higher level while reducing stocks. At the same time foreign cotton production will likely be about eight million bales short of mill use. All of that is good news to U.S. producers.

Declining exports from Russia may lead to some increase in U.S. shipments to the European market. Major markets will remain in Asia, Japan, South Korea and Taiwan.

U.S. producers must compete against foreign production that is highly subsidized. Therefore, producers must rely on highly productive operations to compete against low-cost foreign labor with rapidly improving technology. This means that strong trade policies and trade agreements remain important in maintaining and expanding exports.

Friendship Plant Moving To Halls

Armstrong Products, of Friendship, manufacturing lower doors, will move its operations to the former Halls Building in Halls over the next 90 days, Halls Mayor Sammie Arnold reports.

The firm, founded in 1976 and owned by Cecil and David Armstrong, of Dyersburg, employs about 25.

In games Friday both Halls High School basketball teams were losers.

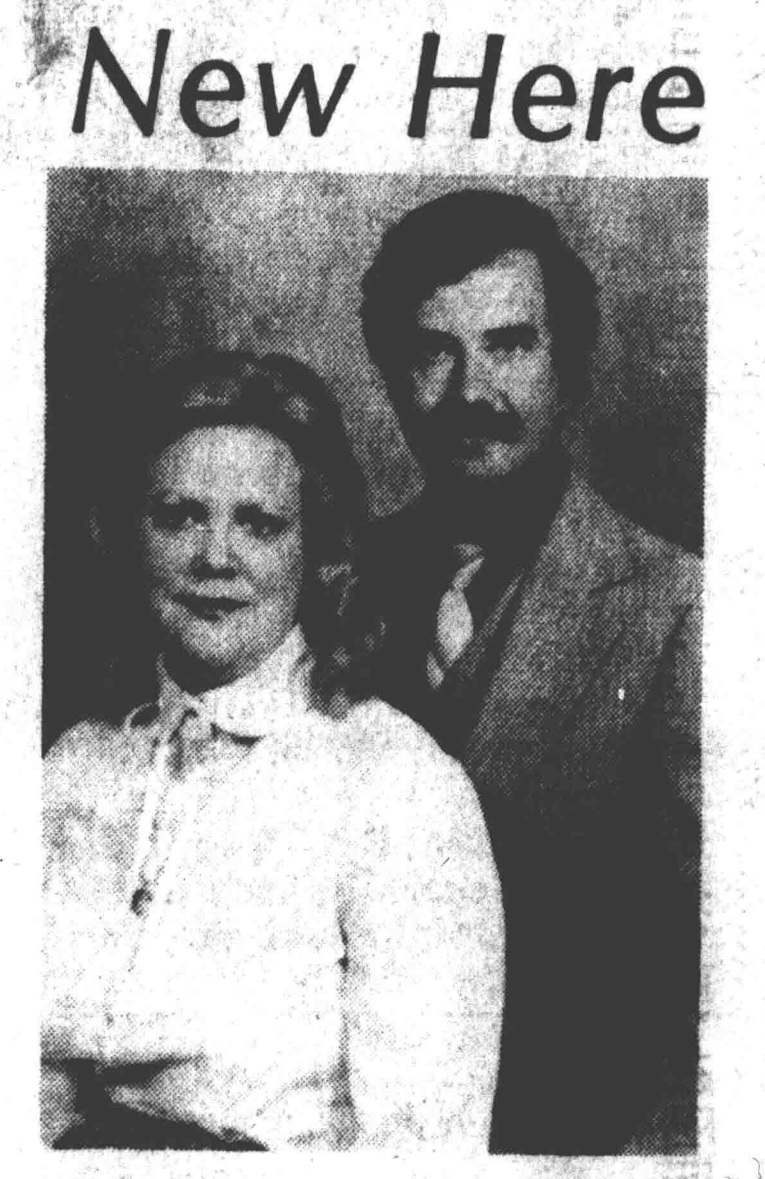

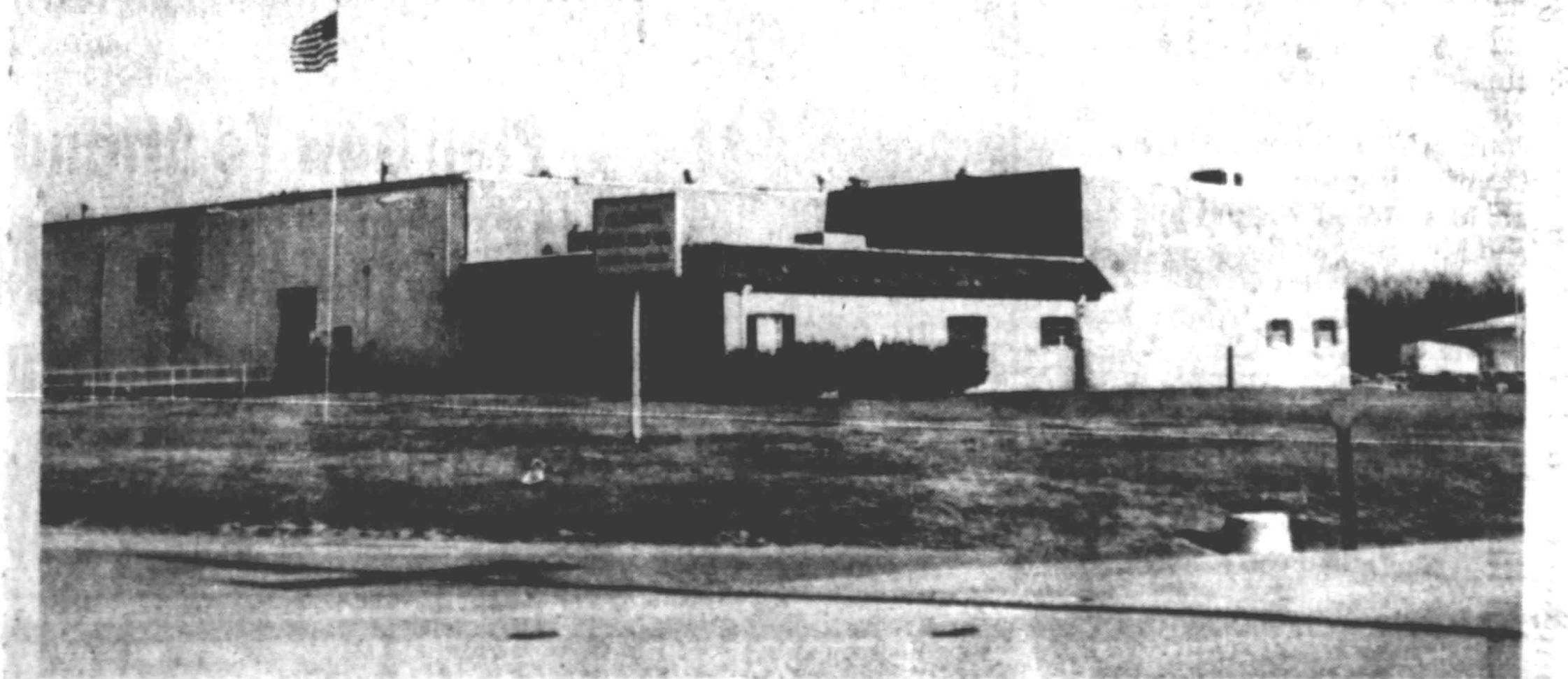

Public Notice Town Of Gates Supports Fair Housing Laws

Civil Rights Law of 1966—This law gives minority persons the same property rights as white persons.

Civil Rights Law of 1968, Title VIII—The Act specifies illegal acts of discrimination in the sale, rental, or management of housing.

Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1979—These amendments to Title VIII give HUD actual authority to enforce Title VIII: include the hand-capped as a protect class; explicitly proscribe mortgage and insurance red-lining; and narrow the owner-occupied exemption.

1974 Housing and Community Development Act—Extends fair housing coverage to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex.

Civil Rights Act of 1968, Title IX—This Title makes the harassment and physical intimidation of persons exercising their fair housing rights a criminal act. This Title also protects affirmative housing firms.

Prohibition of the Handicapped—These regulations insure financial benefits to handicapped persons seeking housing and requires the elimination of architectural barriers in housing.

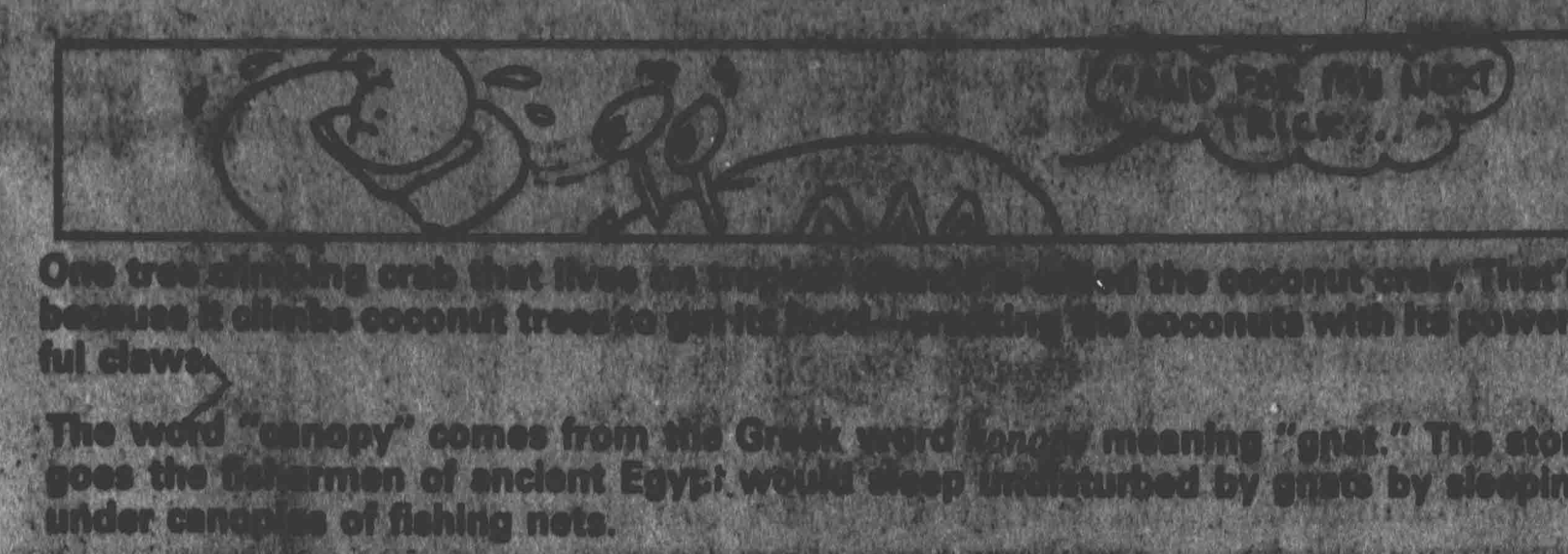

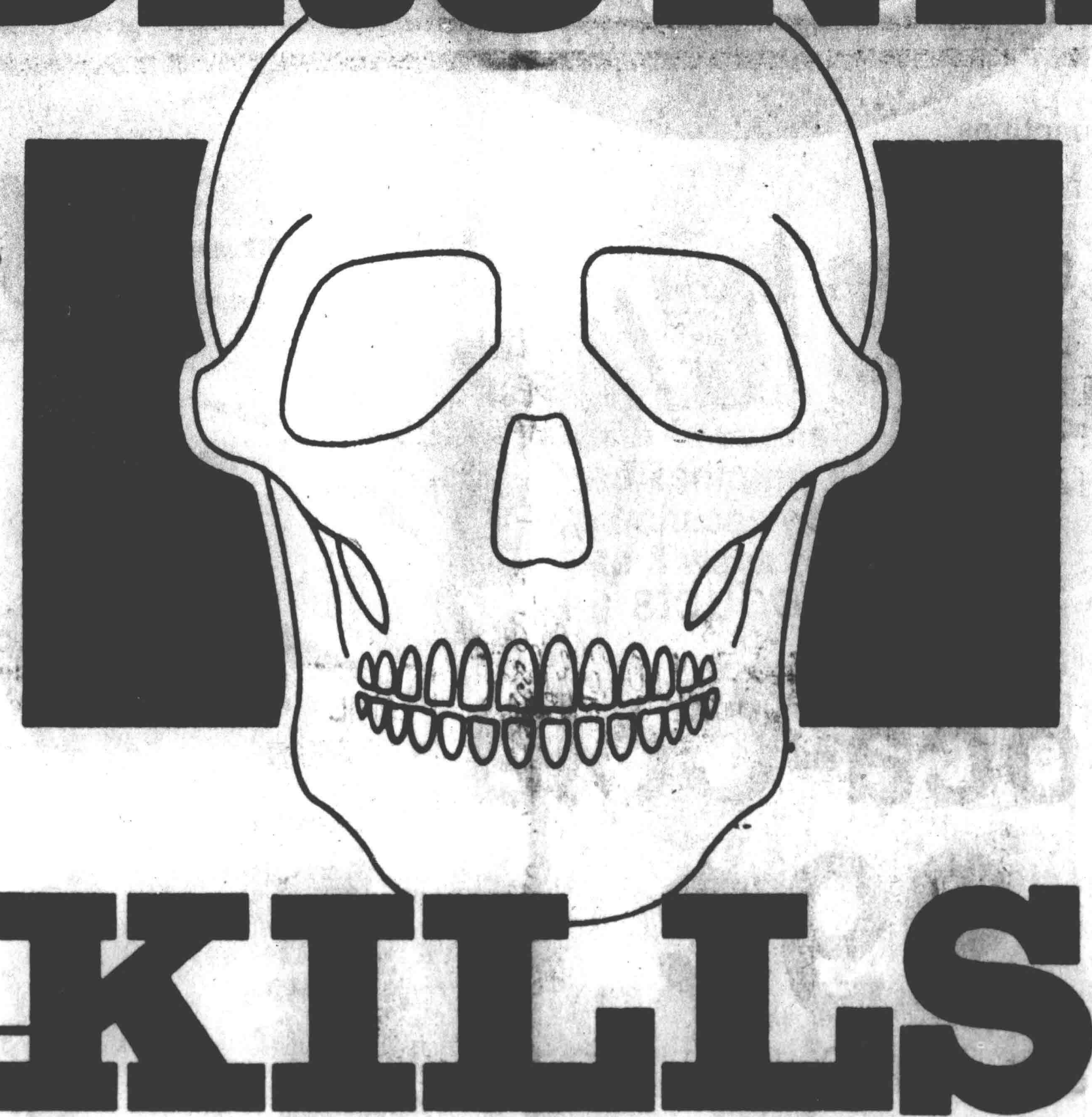

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

Recently, Secretary of Health and Human Services Otis Bowen presented a report to the President that may well establish catastrophic health care financing as a major issue in the 100th Congress. Doctor Bowen chaired a presidential task force charged with the responsibility of developing a strategy to deal with the tremendous costs associated with long term medical care for catastrophic diseases. Nine out of ten Americans already have some kind of health insurance, but about 30 million Americans are uninsured.

Based upon remarks in his State of the Union message in 1986, it is clear that the President has identified these costs as a serious problem facing many American families. In fact, there are numerous incidences of cases where families are simply unable to meet the costs of taking care of a family member afflicted with a catastrophic disease. Trying to do so drains all of their financial resources and causes many of them to have to liquidate their assets to insure that the needs of their loved ones are met.

A physician, Doctor Bowen himself pointed out in his report that he has seen cases like that which have resulted in the family spirit having been broken, as well as its resources spent, in the attempt to shoulder the enormous financial burden the illness has brought.

Doctor Bowen's recommendations include expanding Medicare benefits, revising employer health plans, and changing tax codes. In the Medicare area, the task force recommendations call for a \$2,000 cap on what a Medicare beneficiary has to pay each year for health care. To impose that limit on out of pocket expenses would require an increase of \$4.92 per month in the premium Medicare beneficiaries pay for supplemental medical insurance.

In addition, the task force recommends that tax revisions be made to encourage individual medical accounts similar to the individual retirement accounts. This would allow families to set aside a special fund to help pay for long term health care in the future. In addition, other tax changes are recommended to allow a full tax deduction for health insurance costs of the self-employed and unincorporated businesses. This approach would allow many small businesses to offer health insurance coverage they were financially incapable of providing their employees previously.

Making changes such as these is going to require a good deal of debate over the next several months. Though there may be some initial misgivings voiced by Administration sources, it must have the opportunity to analyze in detail the Bowen proposal.

It must be made clear that Doctor Bowen is not proposing a system of comprehensive national health insurance. His proposal is narrowly defined as one to cope with the difficulties associated with catastrophic diseases. This is an issue that has generated longstanding interest among a number of policy makers on both sides of the political fence ranging from liberals, who advocate national health insurance, to conservatives, who view this as a family issue.

Financing health care for those afflicted with catastrophic diseases demands levelheaded and objective consideration and debate.

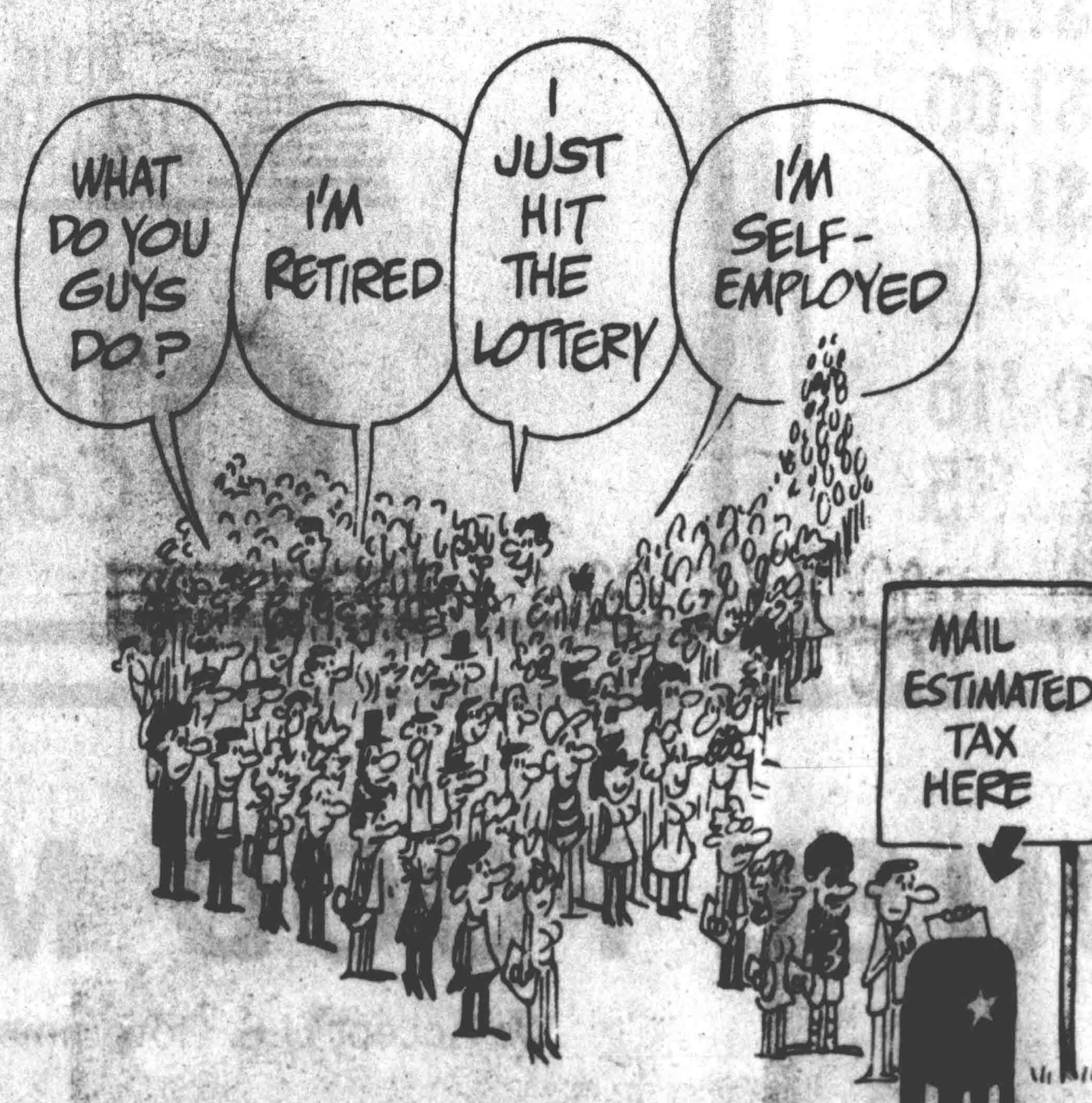

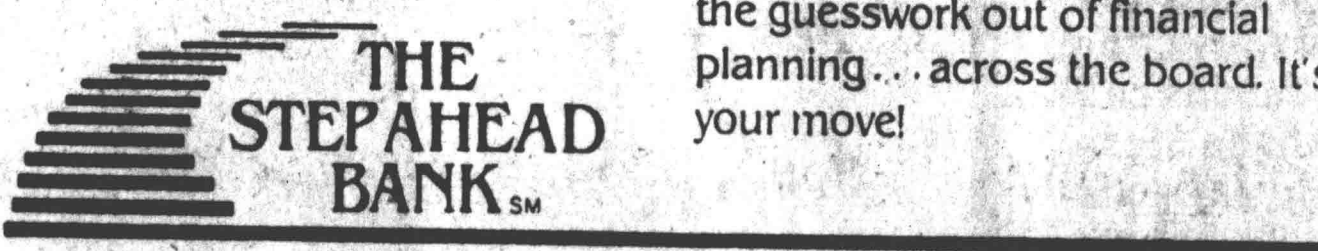

MagneTek Buys Universal And M'Graw Edison Firms

County 4th In Bean Seed Certification

Joe Dudney, manager of the Tenn. Crop Improvement Assn., reports Lauderdale County stood fourth in soybean Green acres approved for certification in 1986, with approval given to 6,277 acres.

J&S Fullen Farm, Hurt Seed Co., and the Tennessee Farmers Co-op were the applicants, and there were 12 contract growers.

Varieties grown were Essex, Forrest, Centennial, Bay, Epps, and Tracy M.

Fields are inspected more than once during the growing season to determine purity characteristics.

When the beans are sold, they usually bring a small premium above the market price which is some incentive to producers.

Fire Ants Reported

In the past 18 months, fire ants have been found in Tennessee, with Shelby County having the largest number of infestations.

In every situation, the ants have been found to be associated with nursery and greenhouse materials moved into the state from infested areas to the south.

With the construction boom in Nashville and Memphis, landscapers and nurseries have been importing large quantities of plant material to be used in the landscaping of apartment buildings and office complexes.

State Education Conference Hears Ripley High Teacher

One of two career ladder teachers selected by the state Department of Education to speak at the Third Annual Conference of State Education Boards January 8-9th in the Opryland Hotel in Nashville was Jerre Stallings, an English teacher in Ripley High School, who presented an up-to-date on the extended contract program in the county and explained the Enrichment Program in Children's Literature she taught last summer.

Hearing her were members of the four state education boards—the State Board of Education, the State Board of Regents, the Board of Trustees of the University of Tennessee, and the Tennessee Higher Education Commission.

These officials set policy for and oversee Tennessee's system of public education.

The theme for the conference was "Pioneering in Education, Tennessee Style."

Later Mrs. Stallings was a guest of the conference moderator, Gov. Lamar Alexander, at a luncheon honoring the top ten schools in Tennessee.

County Executive Expects Good '87

County Executive William "Bill Pete" Tucker says 1986 was a busy year for county business and that 1987 looks promising.

"In 1986, aging equipment was replaced at the Landfill. Two new ambulances were purchased to upgrade the ambulance service. The liability insurance crisis forced the county to become self-insured.

"Much to everyone's dismay, the county was reappropriated by the State of Tennessee. The Federal Government discontinued revenue sharing funds to the County, forcing the County Court to balance the school budget with property taxes.

"We applied for a grant to extend the county water system.

"Alex Haley's renovated home was opened to the public. Gov. Alexander walked from the county seat to Henning to say "good-bye" to the people and to help with the opening ceremonies of Haley's home.

"There are promising positive things in store for 1987. Even though the insurance problem still exists, there is good hope for relief through state legislation. The extension of water lines will give the service to many more county residents. We are operating under a balanced budget with no deficits. Our equipment is in good shape. 1987 should be a good year.

"The future holds many things for our county.

"The State of Tennessee is planning a new prison at the Fort Pillow farm, with an annual payroll of approximately seven million dollars.

"A group in Arkansas has initiated a drive for a bridge across the Mississippi River into Lauderdale County. A project of this magnitude will take many years to accomplish, but needless to say, we are supporting this drive wholeheartedly.

"The federal government is rapidly purchasing a great deal of land for waterfowl sanctuaries and hunting spots.

"Alex Haley's book, *Henning, Tennessee*, should be out by summer, and I am told this will make Henning a booming tourist attraction.

"There is great promise in the future for Lauderdale County."

County Will Assist Cities In Rural Fire Protection

County Commission agreed Monday to add \$60,000 to next fiscal year's budget to equip the Ripley fire department to adequately answer calls within about five miles of the city limits.

The funding will purchase another pumper, train another fireman, and finance sending four additional firemen to rural blazes. (Volunteer firemen have received no pay for going to rural fires, and though bills are sent for responding to fire calls, the majority are never paid; the homes most likely to burn are also those most likely to be uninsured or impoverished.)

The city-county mutual aid agreement will also bring the city back under immunity from liability for suits arising from its serving rural areas. The county is self-insured.

The county will negotiate similar agreements with Gates, Halls, Henning, and Fort Pillow State Prison Farm fire departments, to attempt to continue fire protection for all areas of the county, says County Executive William "Bill Pete" Tucker. He anticipates this will add about 15¢ to next year's county real estate tax rate, but without any fire department service, most rural homes would find it difficult to find insurance at any fee.

Commissioners also approved the sheriff department's purchase of an additional automobile from revenue sharing funds.

Among program cuts included in the President's FY88 budget proposal is a five billion dollar reduction in spending for programs for rural America. The President's budget calls for cuts in soil conservation, rural housing, child nutrition, and agricultural research. It also calls for user fees for previously government funded services such as grain and meat inspection.

which determine the amount of deficiency payment a farmer can receive for raising many commodities. That is not surprising considering that the Administration has, in the past, sought to eliminate them altogether.

According to comments from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, it appears that the Administration is coming around to the view that current levels of production in the face of bin busting surpluses is not only counterproductive, it is costing the federal treasury far more than ever expected. The impact of farm program spending has pushed

the Administration into considering some changes to the 1985 farm bill—something the Administration was opposing only a few months ago.

Now the circumstances are different when it comes to making changes in agricultural policy.

The Administration's proposal is not the only game in town and it is not the first to suggest that changes are needed. Senator Patrick Leahy, the new chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, indicated two months ago that he planned to take another look. New House Speaker Jim Wright also has indicated that a look at the crisis in agriculture would be among his highest priorities in 1987.

As for proposals, there is at least one that would change current subsidy programs so that they would be targeted to specific groups of farmers. Another that has gained in popularity in recent months is one that imposes production controls if such a policy was approved in a referendum of American farmers. There are others as well.

What this all comes down to is that farm programs themselves are going to be reexamined early in this Congress. Not only will their impact on the budget be considered, but their effectiveness as well.

At this stage, I think it is important to look deeper than just the budget figures. The Administration is seeking a 10 percent reduction in target prices

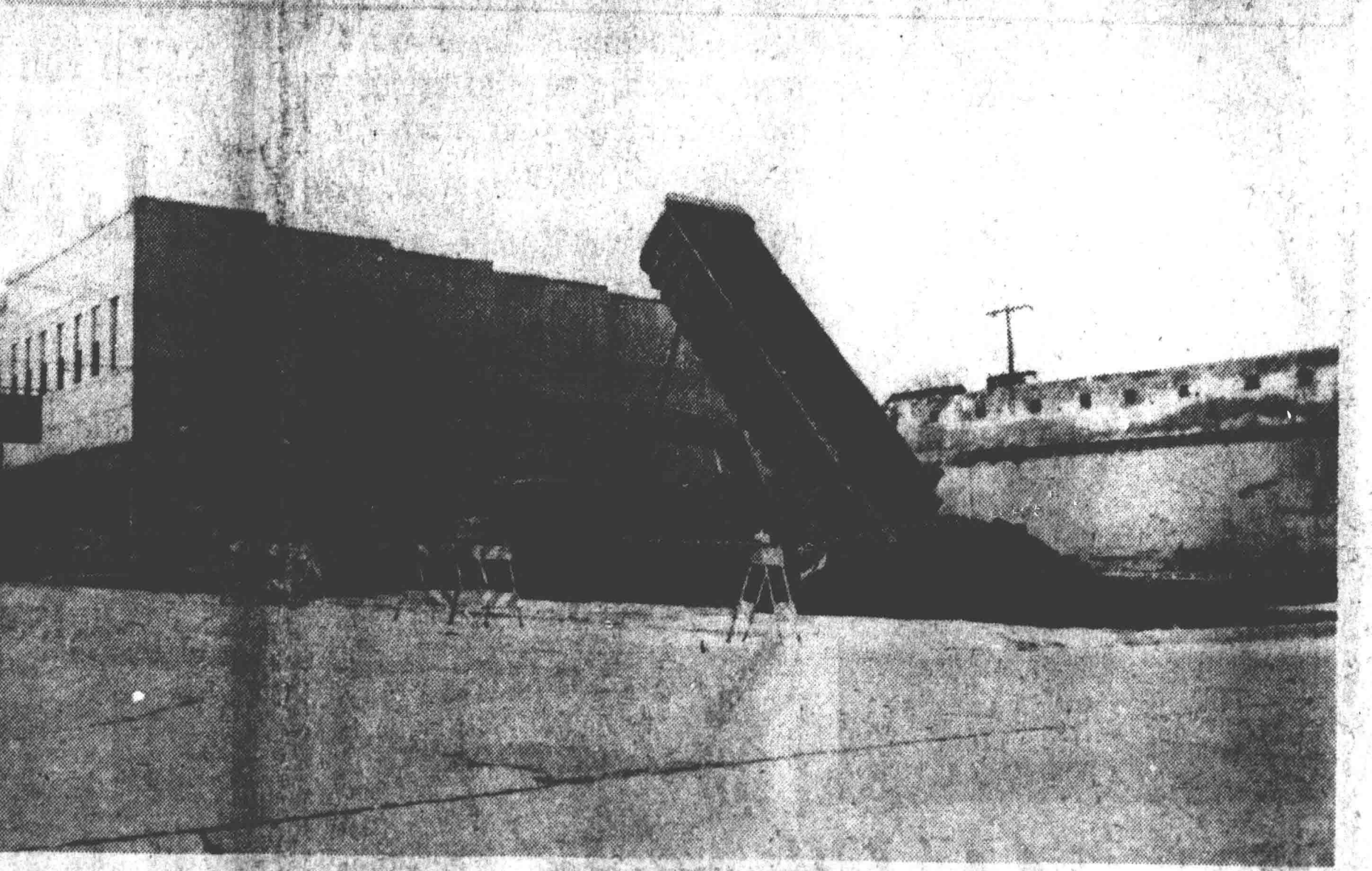
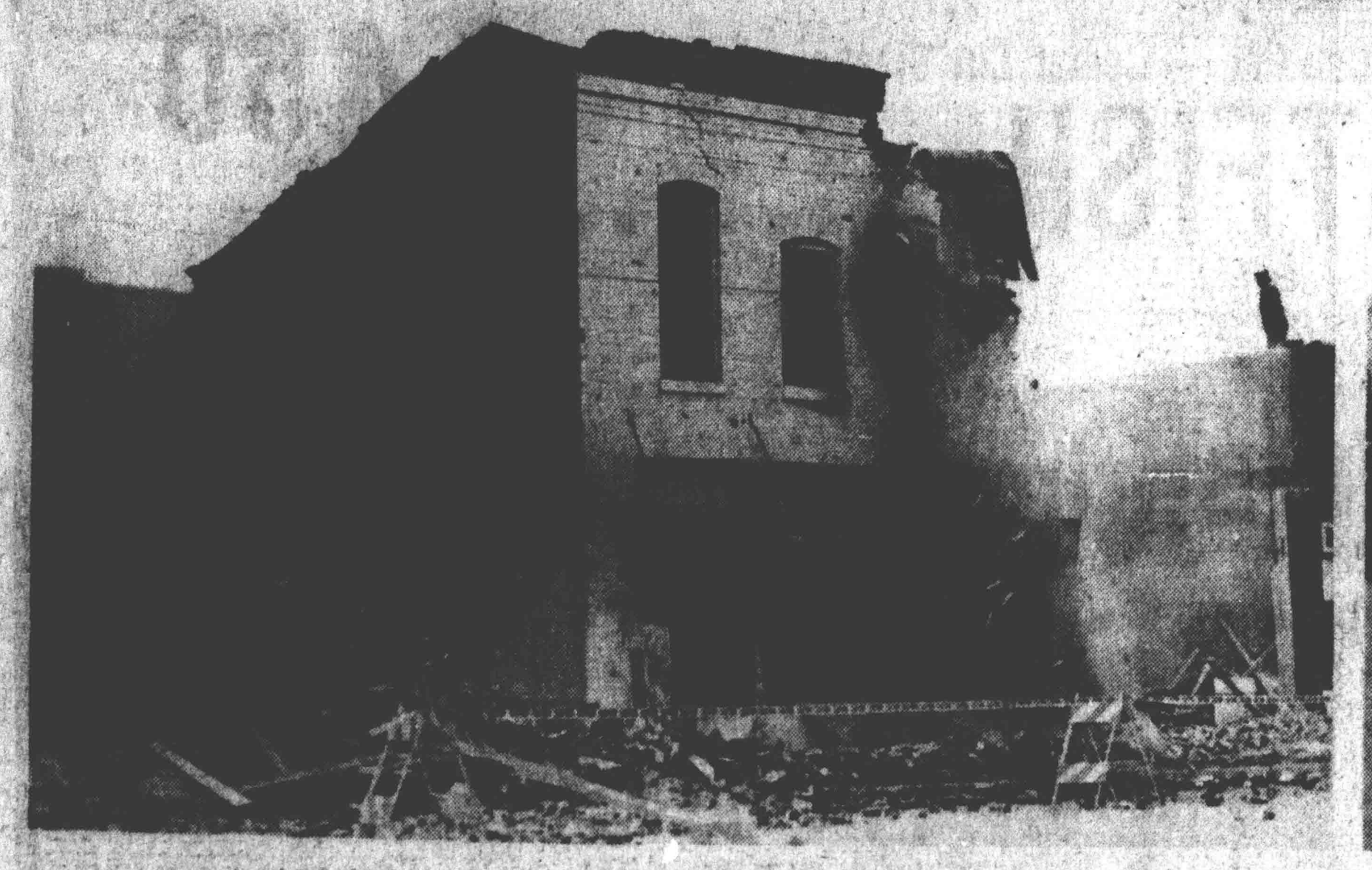
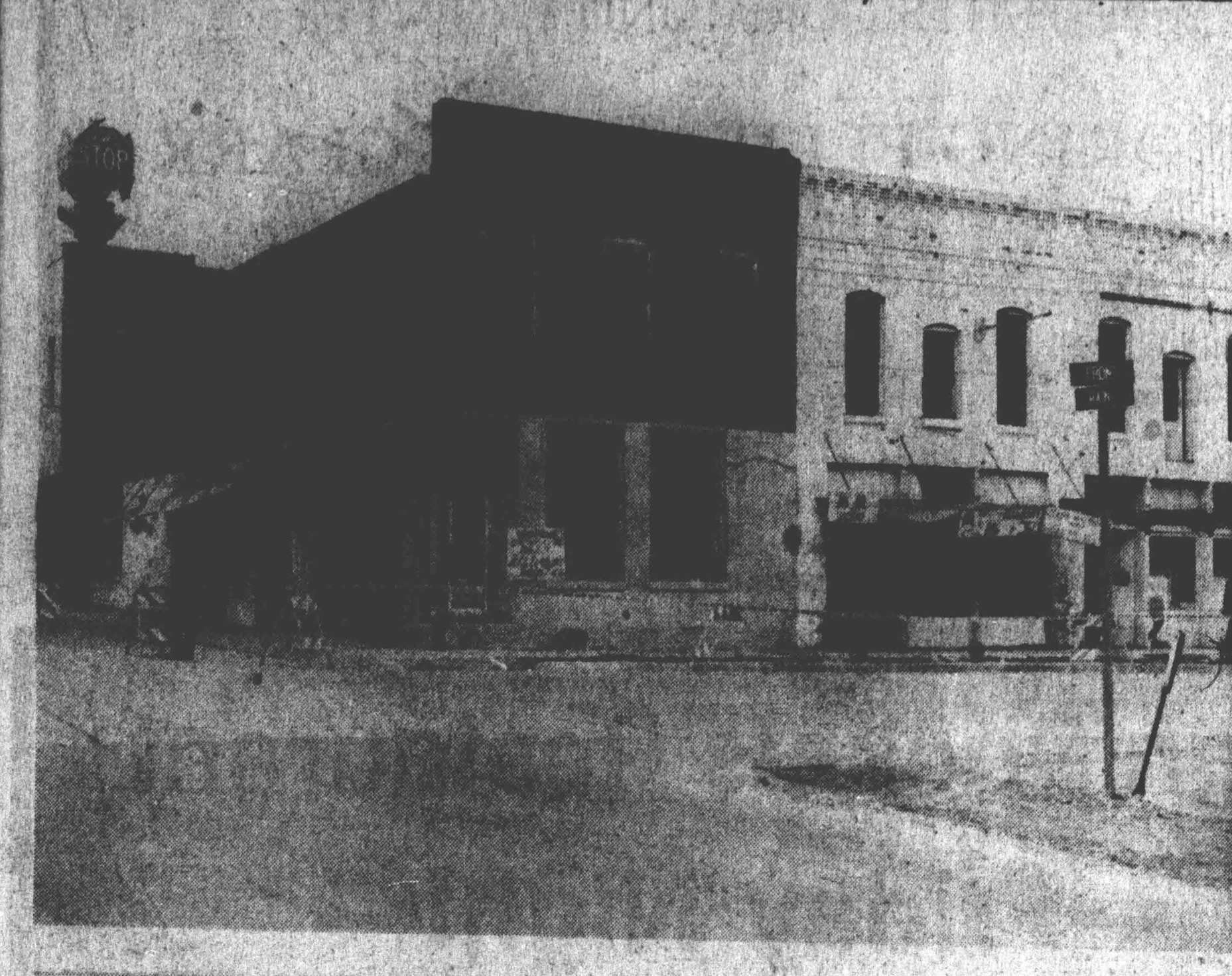

Buildings Gone, Memories Live

It was as if a page of history had been neatly tucked away, only to reappear once more, unfolding many long forgotten memories.

These buildings have seen many changes. The first was built in 1899, and was then the Stevens Brothers Saloon. Several years later, it was transformed into a grocery store run by Will Daws. In 1923, J. L. Carnell went into business with Mr. Daws, and the Daws-Carnell Grocery remained until 1930 when Mr. Carnell went into business for himself. It was here that many memories began.
In 1940, the grocery became a part of the Jitney-Jungle chain. It was then that Halls got its first shopping carts. Most women were so busy that they didn't go to shop, and these were

the ones, along with others, who found their groceries delivered in a buggy along side Mr. Carnell's motor scooter.
Several of the men, who weren't interested in buying the groceries, would gather at the pot-bellied stove to decide the fate of the "affairs of the world." Some played horseshoes in the alley, weather permitting, and those who weren't big fans of throwing the iron, took on an intense game of marbles.
Inside, one might have found a long line of small children waiting and hoping that they might be lucky enough to get a ride on Mr. Carnell's "elevator." The "elevator" actually consisted of boards, a rope and a pulley. It was mainly used for lifting canned goods and extra stock up to the second floor until needed, but some 6 or 7-year old might get a ride to the top if lucky enough.
During the warm summer months, some enjoyed sitting around on the large ice cream freezer eating a pint (or maybe two) of ice cream. This was especially exciting, in that not only were there few ice cream freezers, but few stores sold ice cream and supplied a nice "cool" place to sit and pass the time!

If you did happen to be shopping though, you might have purchased a medium size box of washing powder for 2 cents, a 10 pound bag of sugar for 47 cents, a long loaf of bread for 5 cents, or a dozen of eggs for 25 cents. A fact is, many of today's prices, aren't they?
There have been many changes throughout the past 80 years, not only price differences, but also with everyday habits. How many times this past week have you played horseshoes, marbles or even stood around a pot-bellied stove?
A walk down Main Street will certainly be different than it would have fifty years ago, but when you do go by, who knows, you might find yourself with a terrible urge to stand in line for an elevator ride, or maybe for a pint of ice cream?

Loan To Require Crop Insurance

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration for 1987 losses will need to have multi-peril crop insurance if it is available.
Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 35 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the costs by about 50%.
If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of his crop loss is still 30% or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.
The new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987. It will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987.
The closing date for insurance sales on spring-planted crops in Tennessee is April 15th.
Information is available at most county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Soybean producers should support activities that are aimed at producing more income for the commodity.
Minerals A Must
There is a tendency during hard economic times to cut cash outlay as related to crop and livestock production. James and Jimmy Koonce, among others, feel that this is false economy when concerning minerals for their cattle. They fully realize that minerals are essential. In numerous University experiments one pound of salt has saved up to 180 pounds of feed. Other studies have shown that one cent spent on minerals returned 35 cents for the investment.
The recommended time for nitrogen application is 30 days before bloom. Acceptable results may be received when it is applied during late fall or winter. Potash and phosphorous may be applied whenever it is convenient.
Nitrogen is found to be the most frequently limiting fertilizer material for proper growth and fruiting. When fertilizing newly planted trees, keep fertilizer away from the tree trunks to avoid burning.
Multiple fertilizer applications at reduced rates to non-bearing trees in spring and early summer may encourage more growth than a single, larger application. A balanced fertilizer may be the best for the first application of the year. Successive applications should be nitrogen fertilizer. For apple and peach trees growing in sod, apply fertilizer at the rate of 0.1 pounds actual nitrogen per year of tree age. Level off this rate as the tree approaches maturity.
Growth the previous year may be a good indicator as to whether your fertilizer rates have been sufficient.

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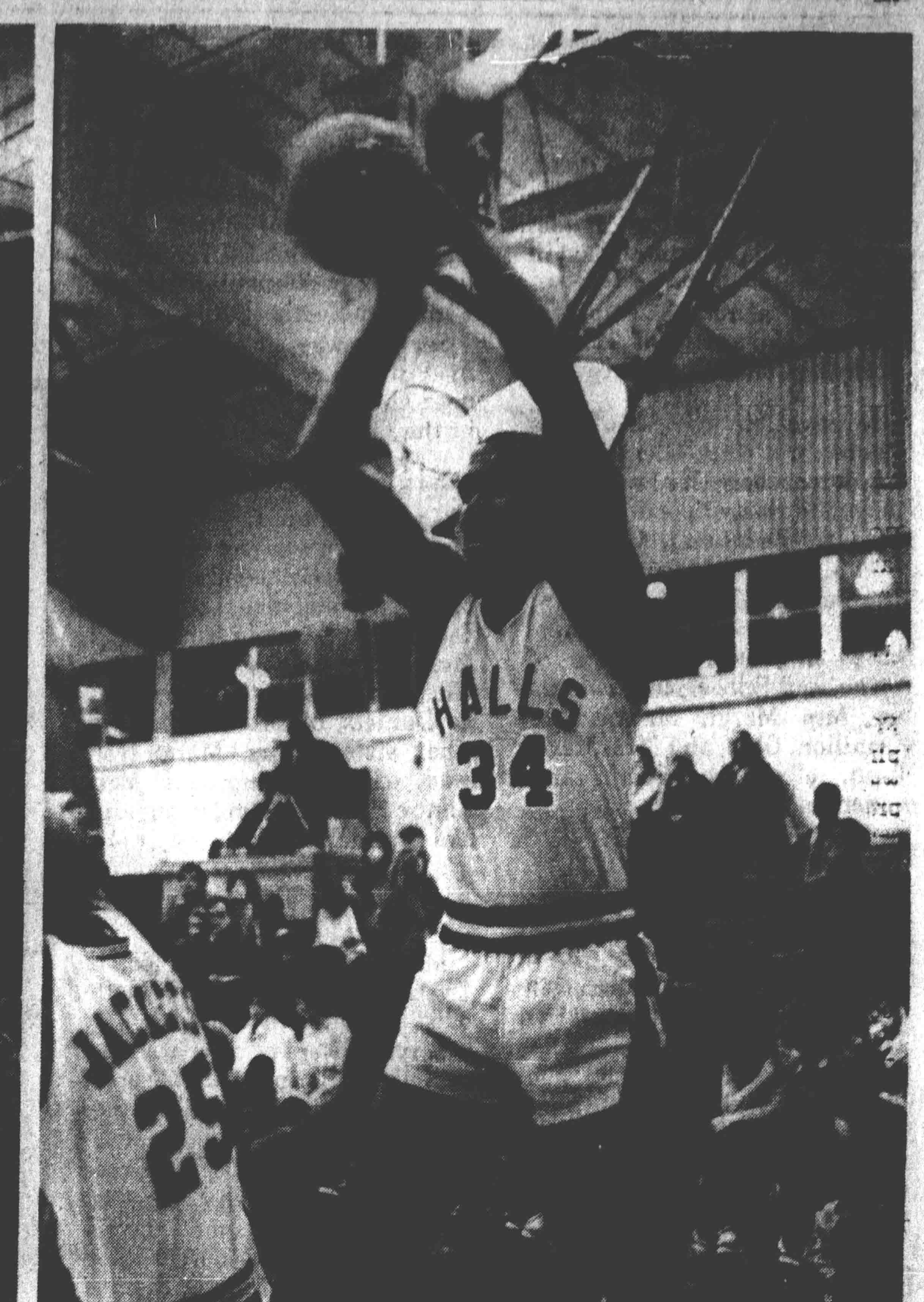

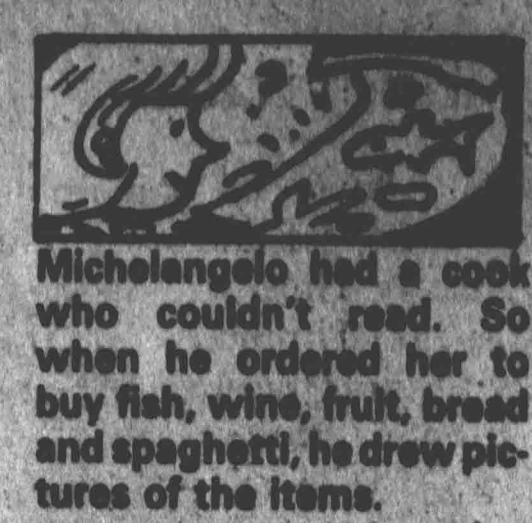

REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON

With the 100th Congress having been in session for two of the past three weeks, the House of Representatives has already passed two pieces of major legislation: the Clean Water Act and the Surface Transportation Act. Both of these bills were acted upon in 1986. The Clean Water Act was passed unanimously by the Congress. In spite of the lack of objection to the substance of the bill, the President vetoed it.

Different versions of the highway bill, on the other hand, were passed by the House and Senate in 1986. Unfortunately, the conference committee was unable to work out the differences in the two bills.

The big sticking points which prevented a final vote before adjournment in 1986 were the 55 mile per hour speed limit and the number of highway demonstration projects. Part of the reasoning behind the quick consideration of the highway bill in 1987 was to avoid these issues so that highway construction that is vitally needed could move forward as quickly as possible. In some part of the country, bad weather causes the construction season to be quiet short. Therefore, it is hoped that agreement can be reached in conference rather quickly so highway projects ready for construction can move ahead.

In Tennessee, bid openings on some projects have already been delayed because the highway bill has not passed in 1986. Certainly, we do not need to see another Tennessee construction season pass without this bill in place and highway funding available for much needed projects.

The bill passed overwhelmingly by the House is almost identical to the one passed in 1986. When it was brought to the floor it included several amendments passed in 1986, but the 1987 version of the bill was not open to further amendment this year.

Overall, the bill will be for

expenditures of almost \$14 billion annually in fiscal years 1987 through 1991 for highway programs. It calls for spending additional funds on mass transit programs. Maybe most importantly, it releases funds from the Highway Trust Fund for distribution to the states by approving the interstate cost estimate which is used in apportioning highway funds out to the states.

One significant change included in the bill is the way funds are distributed to the states for highway repairs. In the past, these funds were allocated based upon two factors: interstate lane miles and the number of vehicle miles travelled on the interstate highways.

Under the new formula, the importance of highway miles in this formula is reduced and the importance of vehicle miles travelled is increased. This is accomplished by providing for the allocation of highway repair funds 50% based upon the number of interstate vehicle

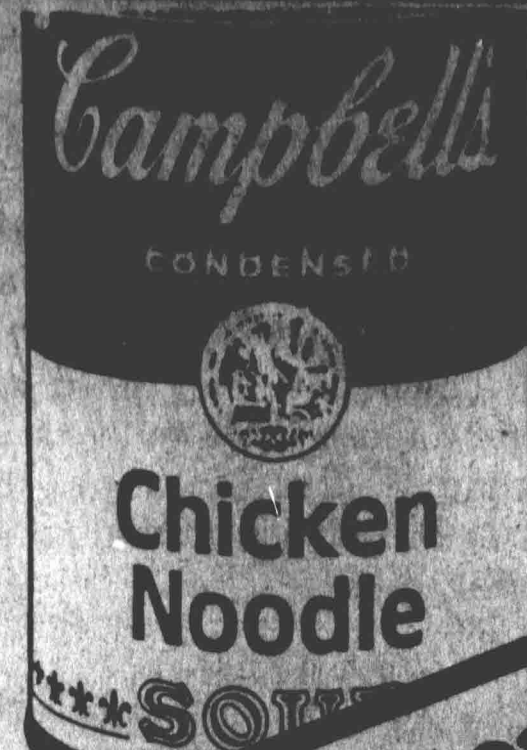

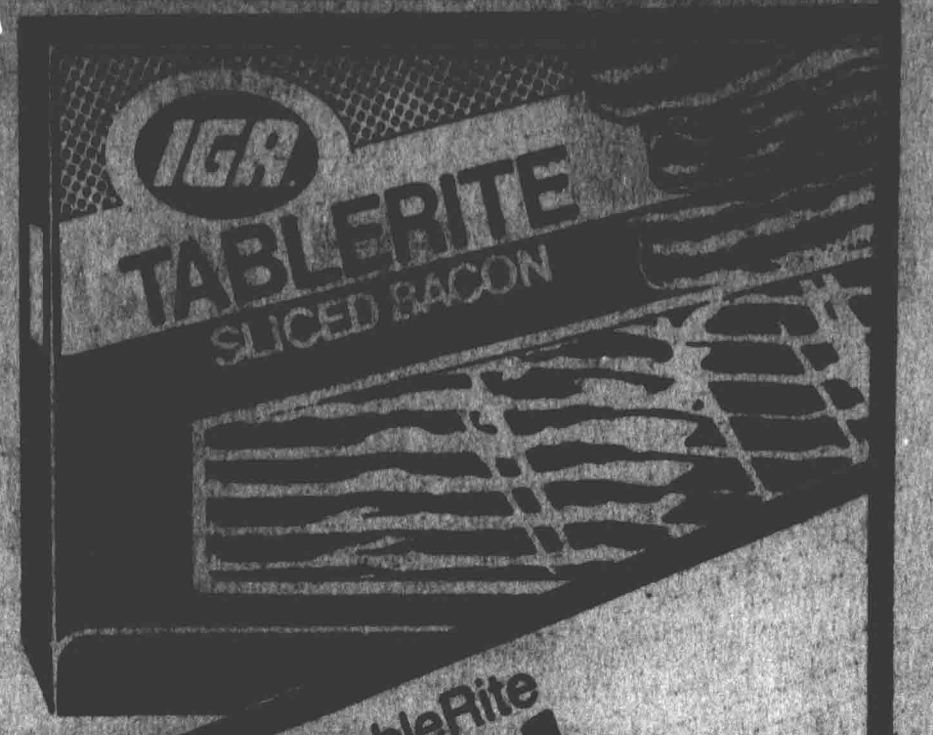

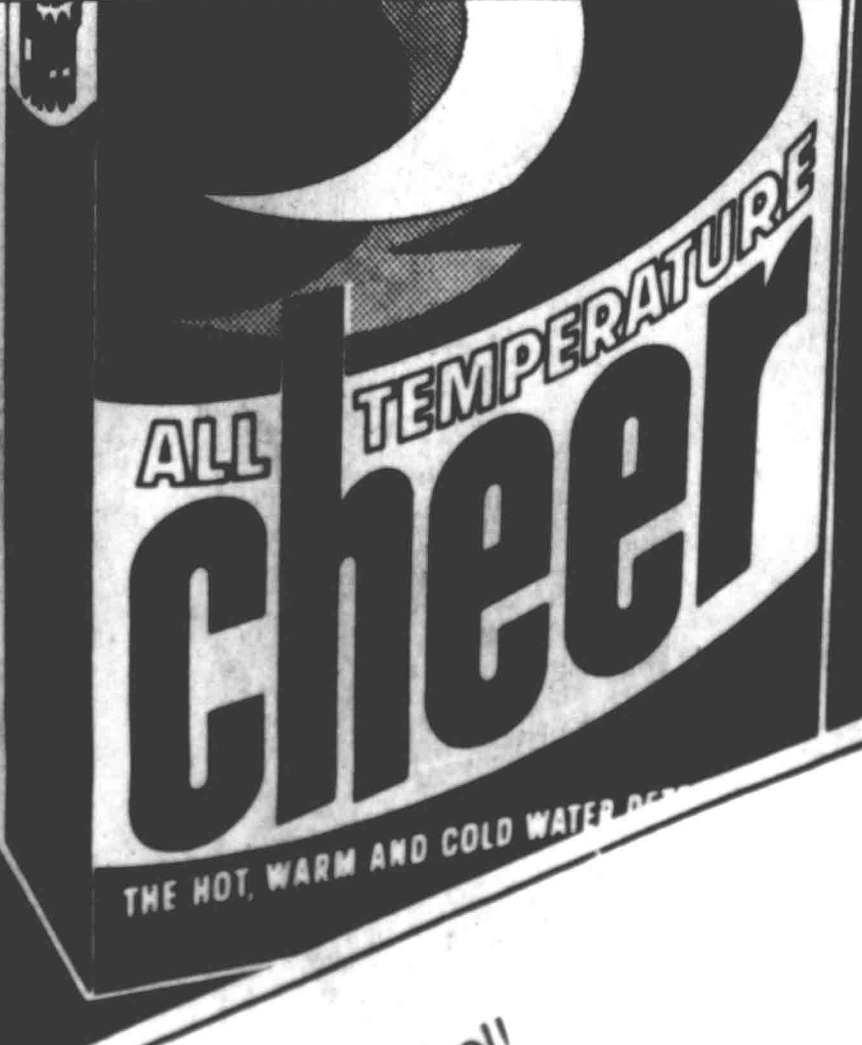
