## Rural Fire Service Provided By Halls

Halls' city board Monday unanimously approved, on Mayor Sammie Arnold's recommendation, provided terms for all county cities are equal, an agreement with the county under which Halls will receive \$500 for each fire call responded to outside city limits, plus any insurance payment available, for one year.

Ford Construction Co., of Dyersburg, was low bidder, at \$63,833.50, on street repairs (the only other bid, from Frank Climer Paving, Bells, \$60,915.50).

Claunch Construction Co., of Dyersburg, was low bidder, at \$14,652, on side-walk repairs (the only other bid, from Childress Construction Co., Ripley, \$15,597.)

On motion of alderman Stan Young, seconded by Bob Stolarick, the mayor, Eugene Pugh, and Mack Stanley were authorized to study the bids and award the contracts.

The board asks business owners to contribute 20% of the cost of repair of sidewalks in front of their premises.

The board approved \$250 for Crime Stoppers and \$200-\$300 for the Industrial Appreciation Week and Banquet, for which Memphis Mayor Dick Hackett will be the speaker.

Aid is subject to more pressing requirements elsewhere and does not extend to grass fires or automobile fires unless a life or major property is threatened.

The agreement also holds only if "the other cities in the county continue responding to rural fires."

But as of late Thursday of last week, the Ripley fire department was again responding to rural fire calls.

## Insects Attack Big Corn Crop Evangelist

County corn acreage, spurred by the federal grain program, is up sharply, to near 8,000 acres, and much has been plowed, but George Meadows, noting yellow spots on older leaves, found damage from corn flea beetles.

If a majority of plants show browning of leaves, six inches or smaller, Ambush 2.0, Lorsban 4E, Sevin XLR, and Malathion will provide control.

Wheat looks fair; some fields promise high yields, and most will run below 40 bushels per acre.

Wheat will be hurt by gloom blotch—a disease which infects the head and shrivels seed; spray control isn't justified by wheat prices.

One grower has severe rust. Much wheat has shown powdery mildew, but after a dry week, it shouldn't be a big problem.

County cotton is up sharply, around 25,000 acres—some of it "wildcat," outside allotments, not eligible for federal loans.

Much of this cotton has already been picked with strippers.

Cotton is one of the brighter spots now in crop production. Yield potentials are good, and the federal program helps make it profitable.

Johnie Ford, of Curve, is one of about 100 tomato growers who have set the early crop and are looking toward setting a crop for the late market in May. Johnie has set several varieties for various markets.

With probably as many acres of tomatoes as ever, county producers should begin arranging markets—they will be a problem when all county tomatoes mature.

Pepper acreage, up, will be marketed mostly through the Lauderdale Produce Growers Cooperative, as well as at least 50 acres of cabbage, plus fall cabbage.

The Produce Co-Op will be handling produce for non-members this year (information from Bruce Little, 635-5035).

Grain sorghum acreage will be down, after low prices in 1986.

Grain sorghum would be planted to provide organic matter in a rotational situation.

There is concern about the lack of sub-soil moisture.

Had it not been for sub-soil water storage in 1986, the soybean crop in particular would have been very poor.

Cotton growers have discussed fungicides in the furrow with cotton seed to prevent seedling diseases. These usually happens in years of higher moisture levels, and particularly in cool spells called "Blackberry Winter."

This helps cotton get a better start.

Insects will be a problem in all crops this year. The mild winter will allow more eggs to hatch, and cotton boll weevils have built up south of this county. With the proper wind and hibernations, these could later present problems here.

## Bees, Borers, Wasps

Joe Osteen has carpenter bees this spring. These bees, which look like bumble bees, bore round holes in building rafters. They are more nuisance than a danger.

A dust gun charged with 5% Sevin dust can be used to blow material in tunnels. Diazinon or

Dursban can be used on the surface of infested wood to prevent bees from cutting entrance holes into the wood.

Dogwood borers can be controlled by spraying trunks with Dursban now and in September.

Take care not to damage tree trunks with lawn mowers.

Consider Chinese dogwoods, not attacked by borers.

Paper wasps nest under eaves or under carports or porch roofs. Dursban or Malathion, at about two tablespoons, should be effective. A hose end sprayer with the tip removed will enable you to reach the nests.

## Black Rot On Grapes

Gardeners with grapes should examine leaves now for black rot symptoms.

This disease completely destroys the fruit when it is nearly full size.

At this time, light-brown, circular spots will be on the leaves if black rot fungus is present. The rot first appears on the fruit as a light circular spot. Later, the berries turn into hard black mummified fruit.

Control with Benlate, Ferbam, Diathane M-45, or Manzate 200.

Spraying now is important. When you see the diseased fruit, it is too late.

## Market Out-Look

The wheat crop will probably be larger than last year's production, despite reduced acreage. Export volume and total use are expected to increase, but loan rates have been reduced 12¢. The season average price is not expected to change much from this year's \$2.35 per bushel.

Vegetables are encouraged as income supplements for row crop farmers. This may lead to increased production, poor quality, and inadequate consideration of packaging and marketing. Careful planning, good quality, and regular buyer contact is essential for commercial producers.

Old crop soybean prices are not likely to move much above current levels unless new crop problems develop. The 1987 crop will probably be smaller. New crop prices could improve modestly if major changes are not made in the loan program.

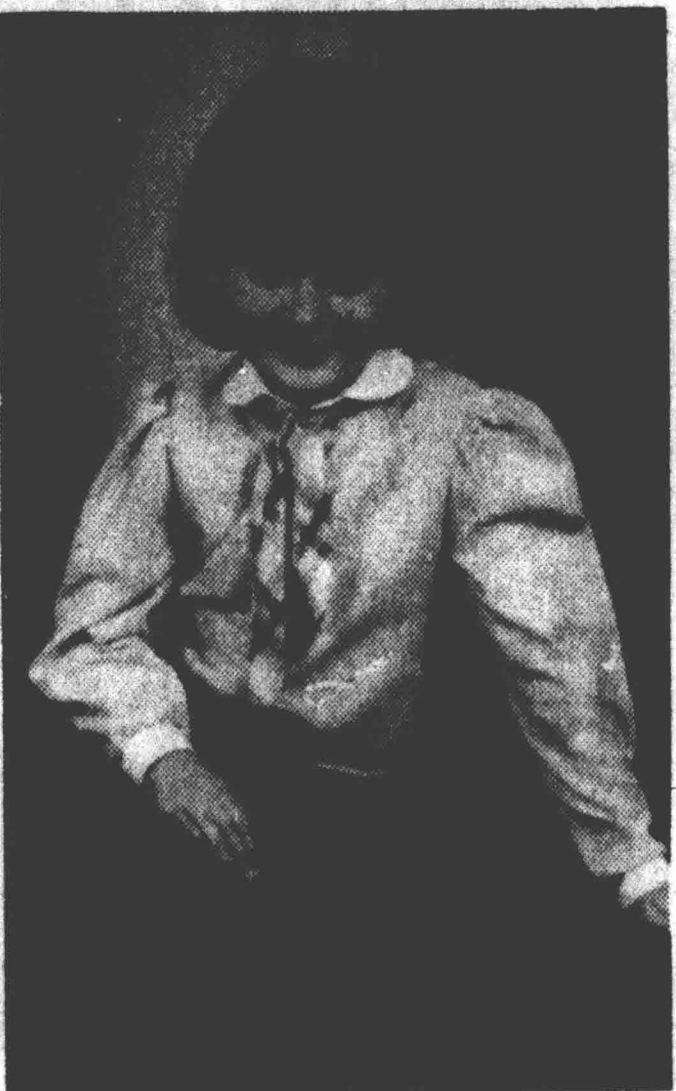

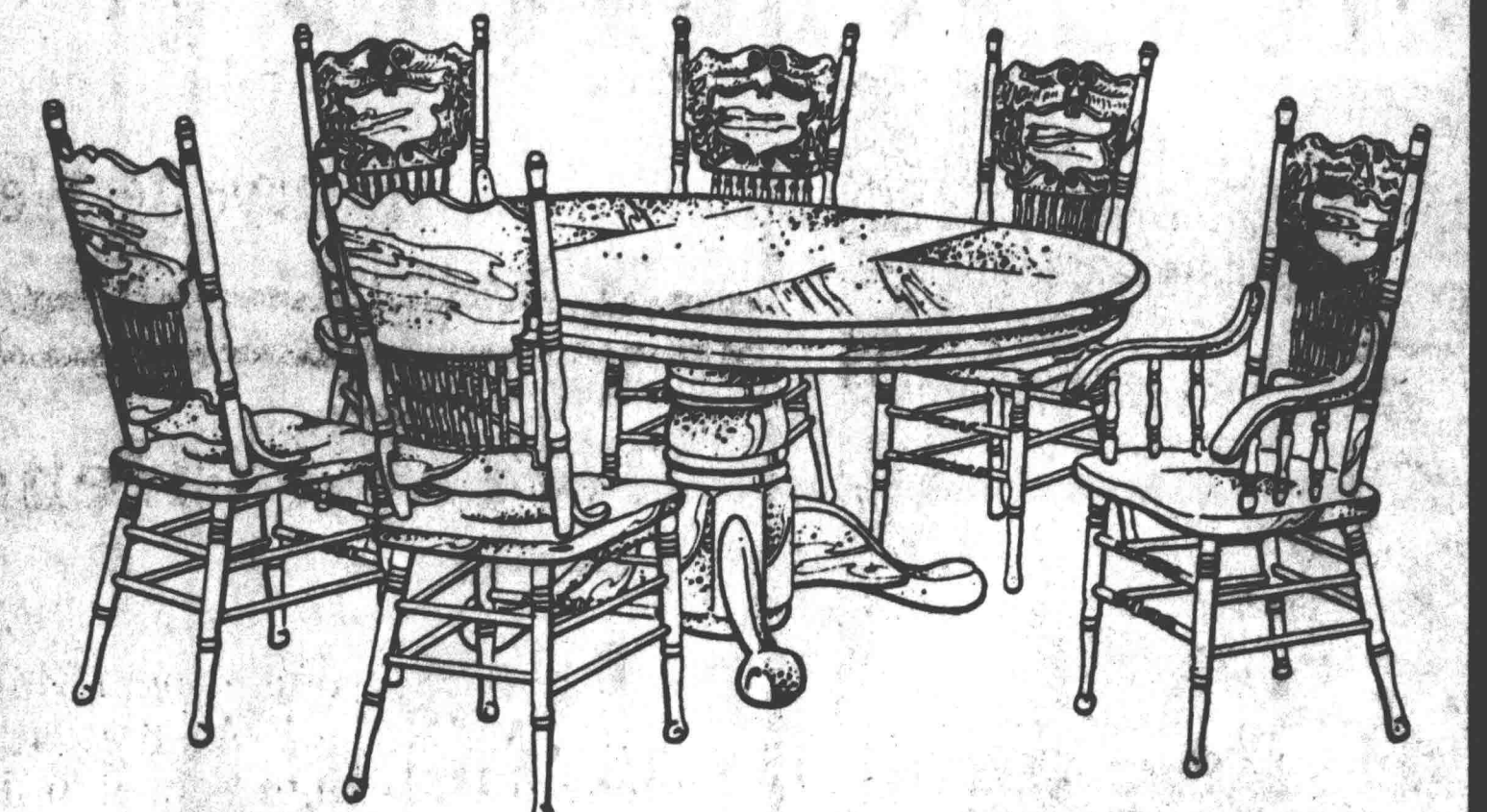

#### Comments Misinterpreted

Apparently a few of our readers misinterpreted our comments last week concerning the "gag rule" which a federal judge had ordered on comments about federal charges brought against 9th District Cong. Harold Ford.

A few felt that we were defending Rep. Ford. Actually, we made no comments about the innocence or guilt of Mr. Ford but merely stated that we had always felt that imposing a "gag rule" on a defendant was close to violating the right of free speech and also possibly infringes on the rights of the accused to defend himself.

In the past we have felt that some judges have been overly zealous in the use of the "gag rule" and also the power to declare a person in contempt of court.

No defendant should be free to make comments about the judge who is to preside over his trial but on the other hand no judge should pre-judge a case or become biased.

Although the ruling has been modified Rep. Ford has stated that he is not satisfied and will carry the fight to a higher court. We think it will be an interesting situation.

#### Looking Back

While watching a recent television show we were reminded of an amusing situation in which we found ourselves a little more than 50 years ago.

During the early 1930s The Rev. Harry L. Carter was pastor of Halls First Baptist Church. Prior to coming to Halls The Rev. and Mrs. Carter had spent several years in China as missionaries. At least one of their two daughters was born in China and both had spent their early years in China.

Of course every one else, particularly the girls, was amused. Mrs. Carter finally relented and gave me a fork.

Wonder if that is the reason I don't care for Chinese food today?

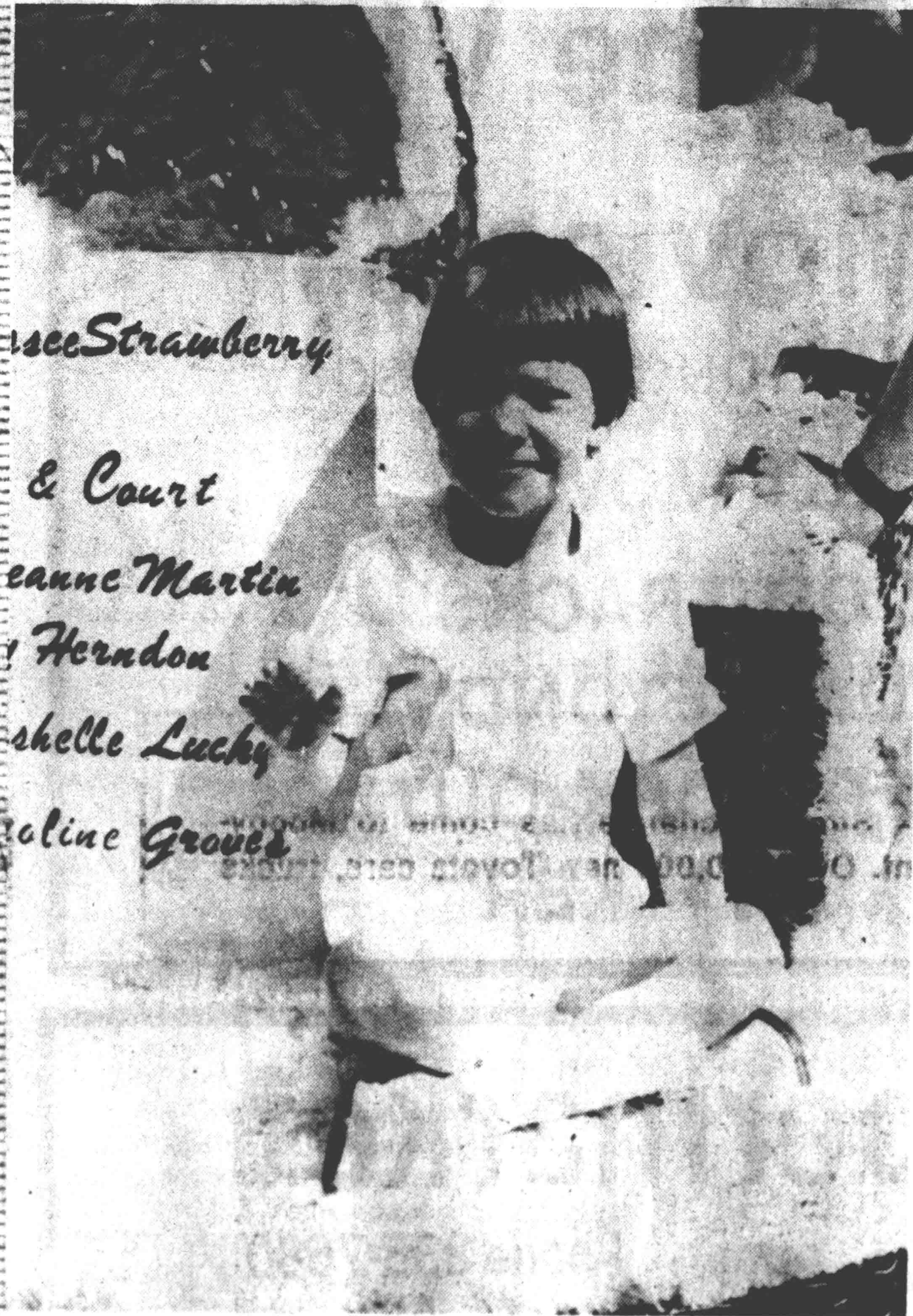

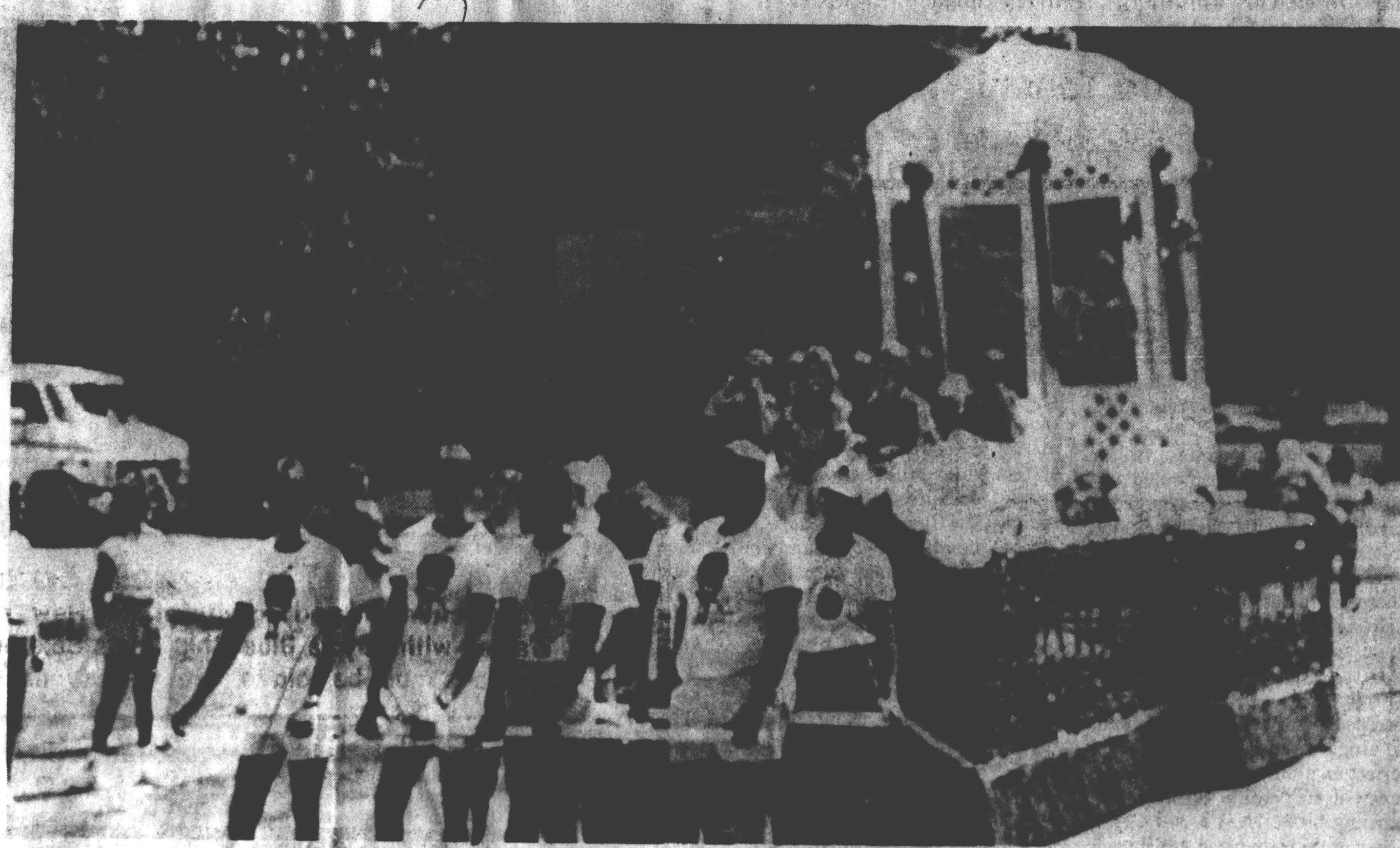

He holds a bachelor of science degree from Lambuth College in Jackson and a master of education degree from Memphis State University.

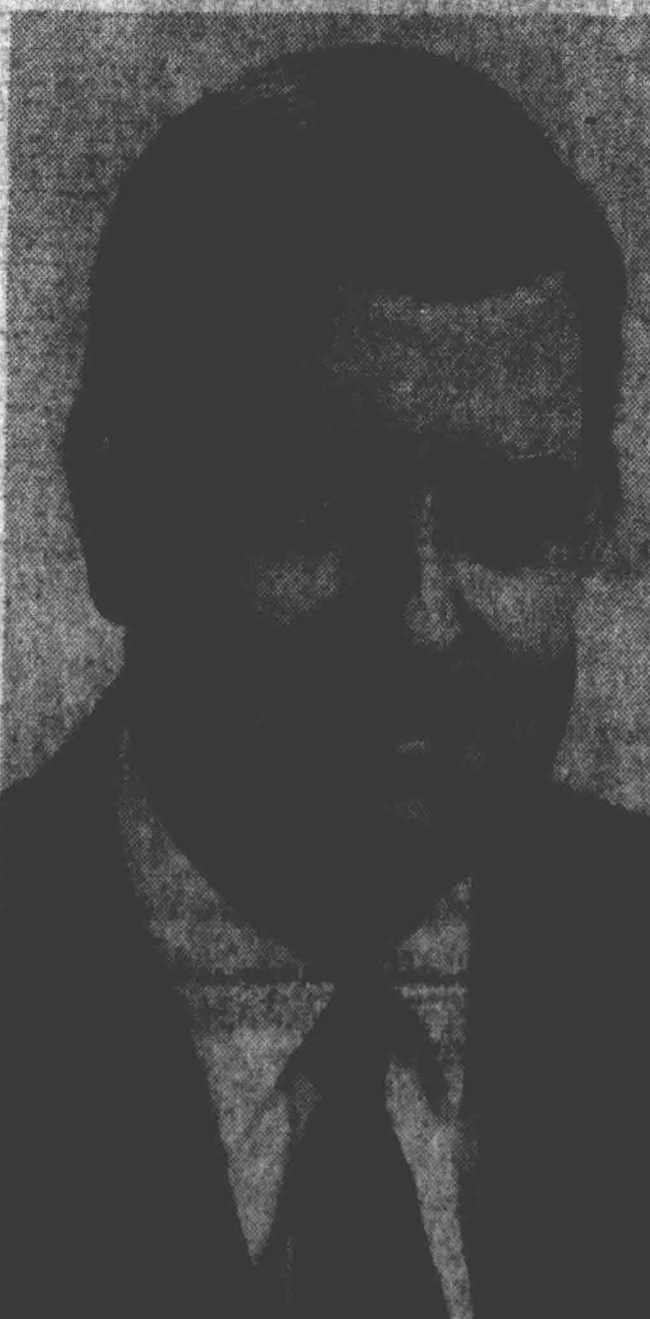
For the past eight years he has been a personnel relations specialist and labor negotiator for Montgomery County Public Schools in Maryland, suburban to the Washington, D.C. area.

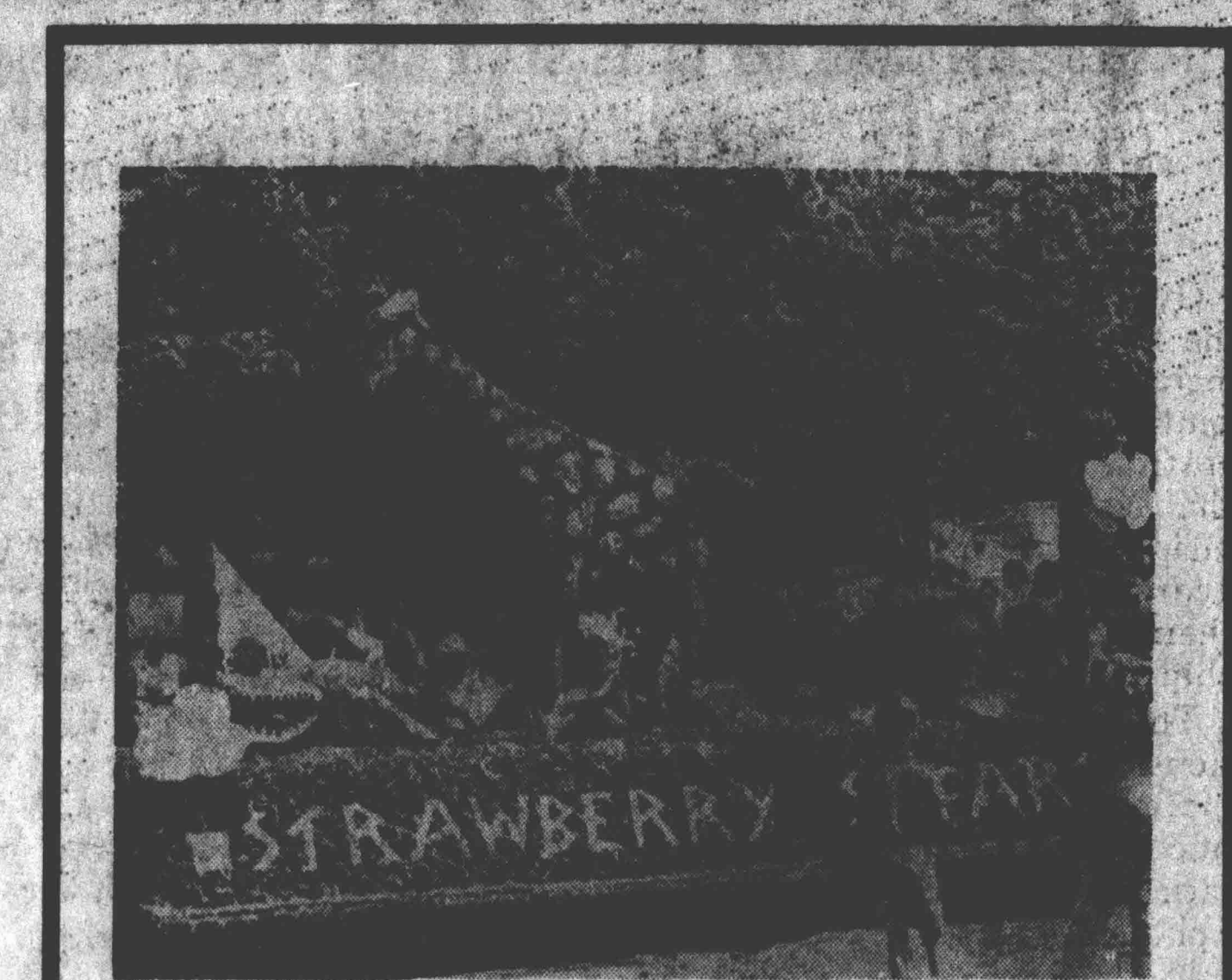

**REPORTS FROM WASHINGTON**

Over the past several weeks, the focus on foreign policy has included an embarrassing incident involving Marine guards stationed at the American Embassy in Moscow. In that incident, several Marine security guards have been arrested by their military superiors and charged with espionage.

The charges stem from relationships these young Marines maintained with Soviet women, and their breach of security regulations they are charged with upholding.

The Marines in question are assigned to the Marine Security Battalion. The mission of that unit is to provide security details at American embassies throughout the world under the supervision of the Department of State.

Members of that unit are considered by many to be the elite of the Marine Corps, closely screened prior to being assigned embassy duty and trained thoroughly to carry out their duties. Unfortunately, the careful screening and intense training they undergo failed, in this case, to ensure their fidelity to the United States.

The Marine guards in question allegedly violated standing regulations prohibiting relationships with the Soviet women. Even more seriously, it is alleged that the women with whom they had relationships were Soviet spies who were allowed access to classified areas of the Embassy. That, of course, is a serious breach of security at the Embassy. The investigation into this incident is on-going and being undertaken by the Administration as well as Congressional committees with oversight responsibilities.

In addition to the allegations of security breaches at the Moscow Embassy, an additional issue has arisen focusing on the construction of a new American

In the wake of the allegations against American Marine guards, another look at that building has been undertaken. On-site inspections by knowledgeable people have turned up distressing information. Visual inspections by State Department officials, Members of Congress, and others have shown an obvious attempt to "bug" the new American Embassy.

These two incidents have renewed deep, widespread concerns over our country's approach to security in sensitive operations overseas. There are serious deficiencies apparent in the accusations against the Marines and the management of important projects such as the construction of a new embassy in a country that is America's chief adversary.

These questions are certain to be examined carefully in the coming weeks. No doubt, there will be a number of proposals to improve the process of selecting military personnel for security guard details as well as major reforms of how we manage construction projects of sensitive installations overseas.

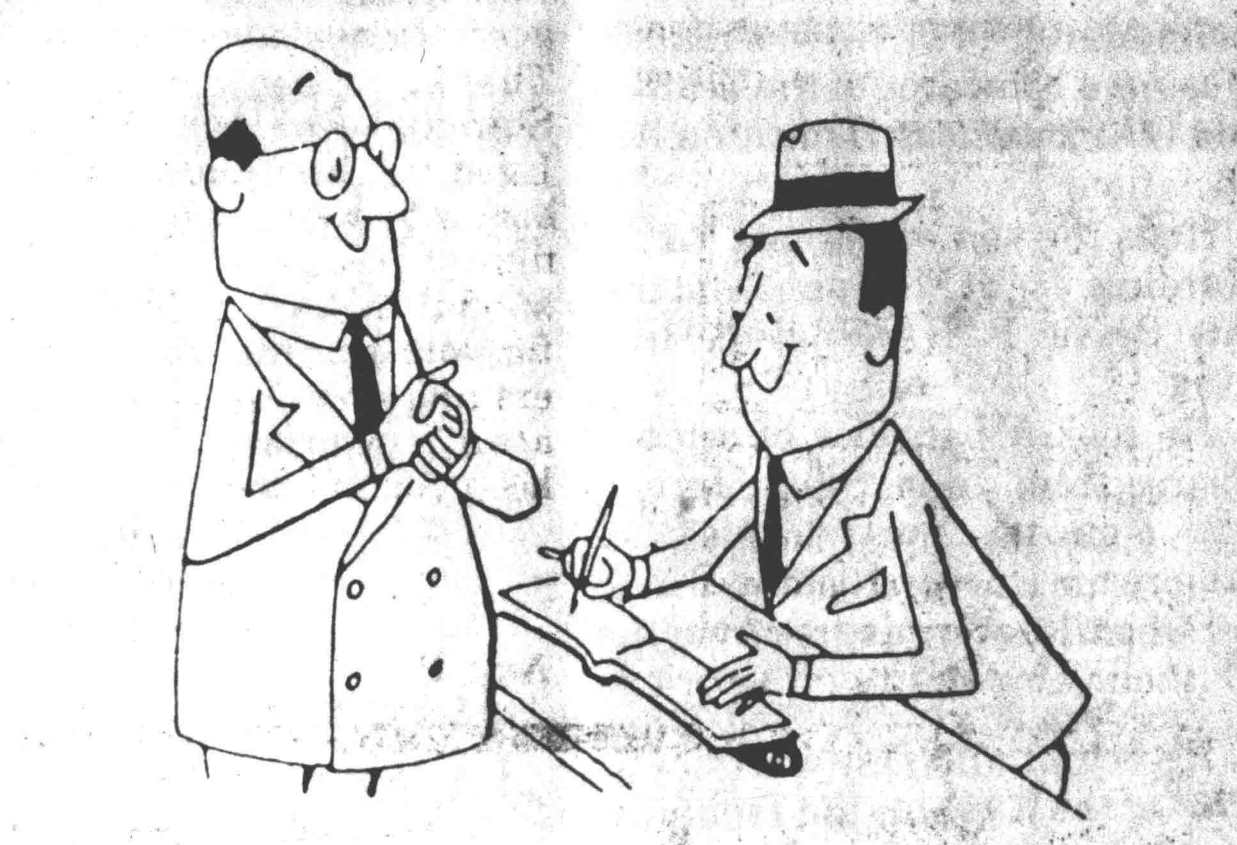

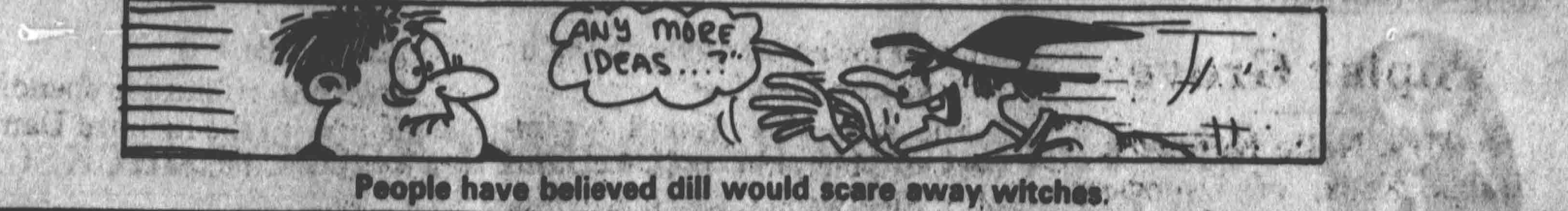

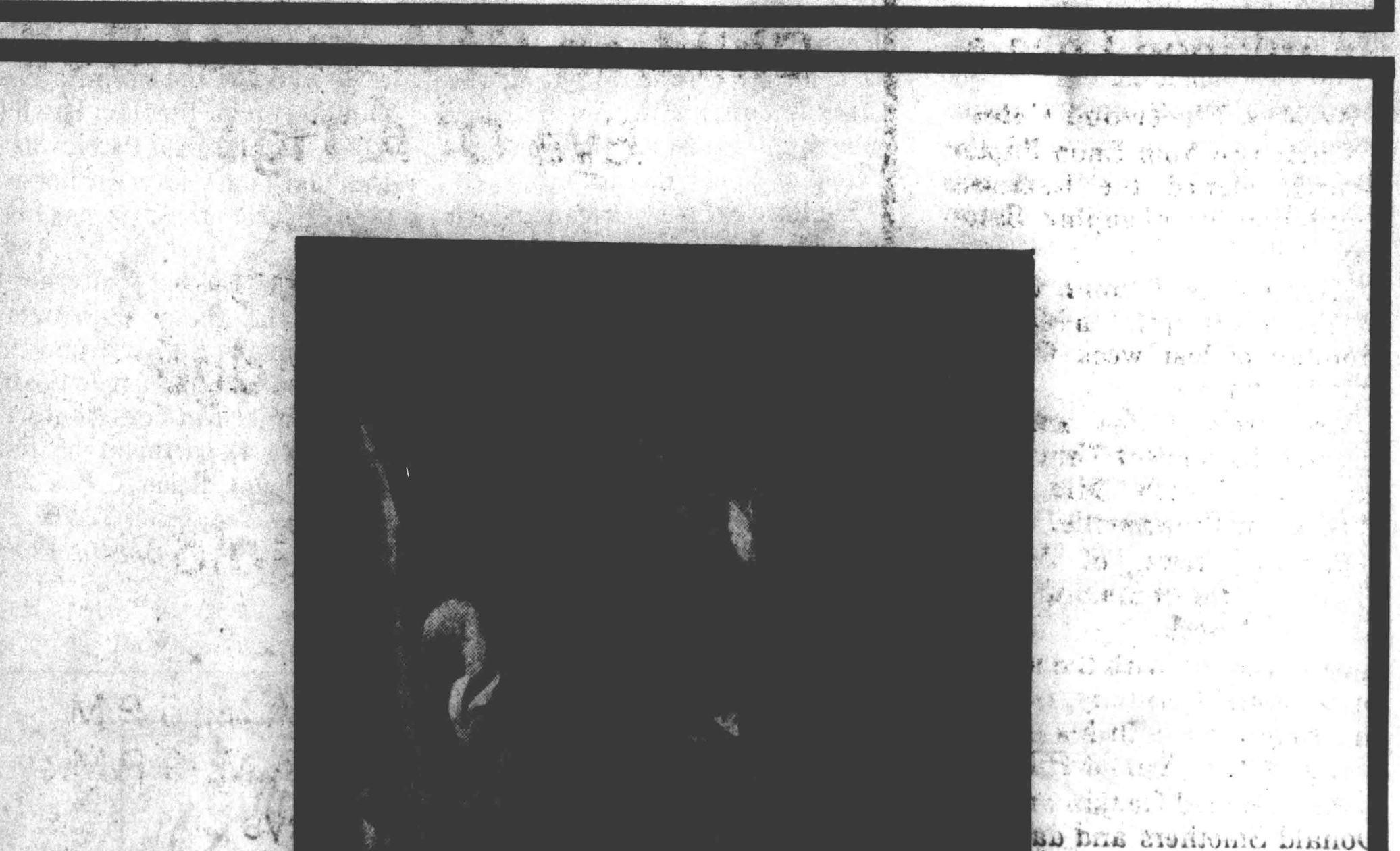

**The Hermitage Remembers Andrew Jackson**

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - Tennessee's frontier spirit is epitomized in the character of Andrew Jackson, whose fierce pride, fiery temper and military prowess carried him to the presidency of the United States, opening a new era in American politics.

The nation's seventh president, and the first elected from Tennessee, was a symbol of pride for the settlers who pioneered the land west of the Appalachian Mountains. Affectionately known as "Old Hickory" to his admirers, Jackson polished his popular image as a rough-hewn frontiersman, Indian fighter and war hero. But the Hermitage, Jackson's home near Nashville, displays another side of his complex personality, reflecting a refined taste in architecture, landscaping and furnishings.

The mansion features large white columns, wide verandas and expansive rooms with high ceilings. Over 400 acres of the surrounding 625 acres of farm and woodland were part of the original land purchase by Jackson in 1804. The Hermitage has remained virtually unchanged since Jackson's death in 1845.

Built originally in 1819, the Hermitage was extensively remodeled in 1831, but heavily damaged by fire in 1834. Jackson, who was serving his second term as president at the time of the fire, had the house rebuilt within the original walls and foundation.

The Jacksons loved to entertain family and friends, and the house reflects this gracious lifestyle. The spacious entrance hall is lined with scenic wallpaper, made in France and hung in 1836. A gracefully curved stairway at the rear of the hall leads to the second floor where four bedrooms used by family and guests are located.

Lively chandeliers, now electrified, distinguish the two parlors and the downstairs hall where Jackson greeted guests arriving at the Hermitage. The exquisite prisms in the chandeliers were imported from Europe. The down-

stairs rooms are furnished with many items used by the Jackson family, including a piano and guitar. The president's bedroom contains personal items used by Jackson and his wife, Rachel. Portraits of Jackson, his wife and other members of the family are displayed throughout the mansion.

Jackson retired to the Hermitage following his second term as president, and welcomed guests from all over the country in the library which became the center of his daily activities during the eight years before his death. Martin Van Buren, Sam Houston and James K. Polk were among statesmen who visited the retired president at home.

On the east side of the mansion is the garden, designed by English gardener William Frost who was employed by Jackson in 1819. The tomb of Rachel and Andrew Jackson rests in the corner of the garden under a column supported dome roof. The garden is maintained as it was in Jackson's day with old-fashioned flowers, shrubs and other plants.

The detached kitchen at the rear of the mansion and a separate smokehouse contain utensils typical to the era. The grounds of the Hermitage also contain two log cabins used by the Jacksons for 16 years, prior to the completion of the mansion. These cabins were home for Rachel and the family while Jackson was building his reputation as a military leader fighting the Creek Indians and during his heroic campaign against the British at the Battle of New Orleans.

The Battle of New Orleans, which occurred January 8, 1815, won Jackson national fame. One mantel at the Hermitage is a tribute to Jackson from a soldier who fought under Jackson at New Orleans. For 24 years the soldier worked on the mantel only one day a year, on the anniversary date of the Battle. The "Eighth of January mantel," made of hickory wood, was installed in the dining room by Jackson.

mansion contains items relating to the history of Jackson and his family and has exhibits which interpret the architecture of the different stages of the Hermitage mansion. Across Lebanon Road from the Hermitage are Jackson's church and the mansion "Tulip Grove," both part of Historic Hermitage Properties.

In 1823, Jackson gave three acres of his farm as the site for a church, which also served the community as a school. When Jackson returned to the Hermitage at the end of his presidency, he joined the church. The Hermitage Church is restored to its 1837-1845 appearance, the time when Jackson worshipped there.

Tulip Grove, completed in 1836, was the home of Emily and Andrew Jackson Donelson, Mrs. Jackson's niece and nephew. A. J. Donelson served as Jackson's secretary during his presidency and Emily served her uncle as Hostess of the White House.

Each year in mid-May, The Hermitage opens its grounds to a special *Andrew Jackson Day* celebration which features games, sporting events and a variety of special activities intended to honor the memory and re-create the life and times of the nation's seventh president.

One of Jackson's favorite sports was horse racing, and among the sporting events during the mid-May celebration at The Hermitage is the annual run for the Sam Patch Cup.

The original Sam Patch was Andrew Jackson's favorite horse, an 1833 gift from the citizens of Pennsylvania. A portrait of Andrew Jackson on the big white horse is among the many paintings on display inside the mansion.

Honeybees have troubled Susan Farris and other homeowners in at least two ways. Swarming bees have taken temporary residence on trees and shrubs in lawns, and many people have called about bees in the house.

The problem with bees on shrubs and trees can be overcome by simply waiting until the following morning, when, around 10 a.m., they usually leave to seek a new home.

Bees inside the walls of homes are somewhat more difficult but can be handled by using a dust gun with the tip removed, a dust of 10% Sevin, Chlordane, or possibly Malathion will fog all recesses, cover the comb, and cause the bees to leave, since it will remain so, they will not return.

Once they have left, the homeowner can plug the hole, and he is through with this problem.

**Scale Crawlers Active**  
The immature crawler stage of tussockmill scale is now active on junipers 1/2-inch long, found mainly on leaves.

Damage is first seen as yellow spotting on the upper surface of the leaves. This results from the insect sucking sap from the leaves. Stems are also fed upon.

As populations increase, leaves and stems become encrusted with scales.

**Apple Leaves Distorted**  
Much distortion of apple leaves has been seen here (mainly in homeowner apple trees). The leaves take on a twisted, curled appearance, similar to 2,4-D injury.

Closer inspection may reveal the presence of aphids or signs of aphids, such as cast skins, honeydew, sooty mold, high populations of ants feeding on honeydew, and ladybeetles feeding on aphids. Homeowners may use Malathion.

There are a number of reasons why peonies do not bloom, but two of them are pest-related.

**Crain Says County Gains State Funds**

State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, says state funding for Lauderdale County for fiscal year 1987-1988 will increase by almost \$500,000 over this year.

"Everyone knew that we would be living with a tighter budget than we would have hoped," Crain says. "That is why it is especially pleasing to announce that Lauderdale County will receive more money this year than last."

During fiscal year 1986-1987, which ends June 30, 1987, the state allocated \$29,347,470. Crain says the state will contribute \$29,780,902 for Lauderdale County in the coming year.

Lauderdale County is also getting over \$3,000,000 in capital outlay projects, with \$50,000 going to several projects at the armory.

Crain says tax collections in Lauderdale County increased by about \$19,000 over the last year.

"We've seen a growth in the county's share of state funds of over \$6,000,000 in just the last two years," Crain says. "With a better budget situation, we hope to increase our funding even more next year."

Crain is serving his fifth two-year term in the House. He is a pharmacist in Ripley.

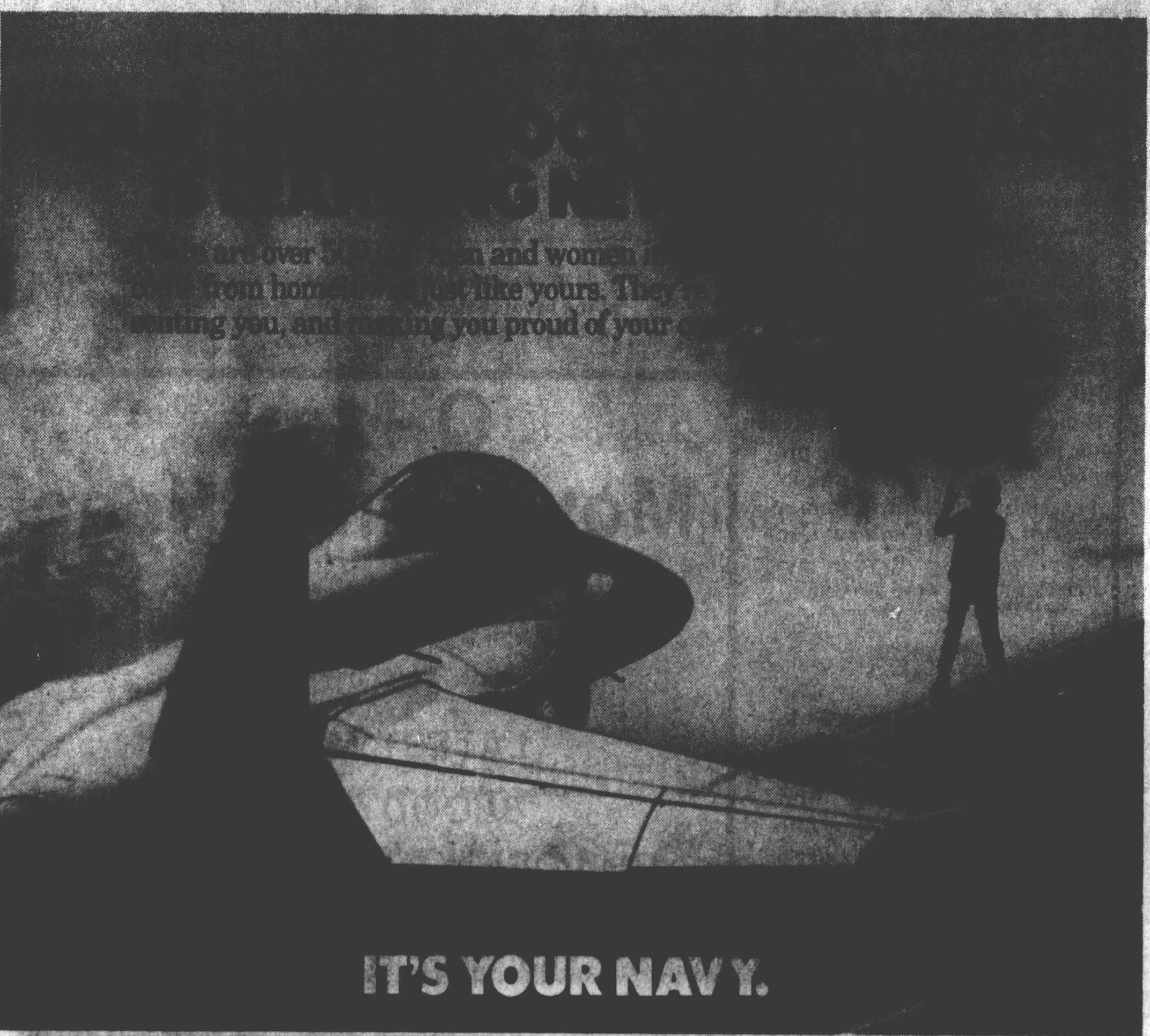

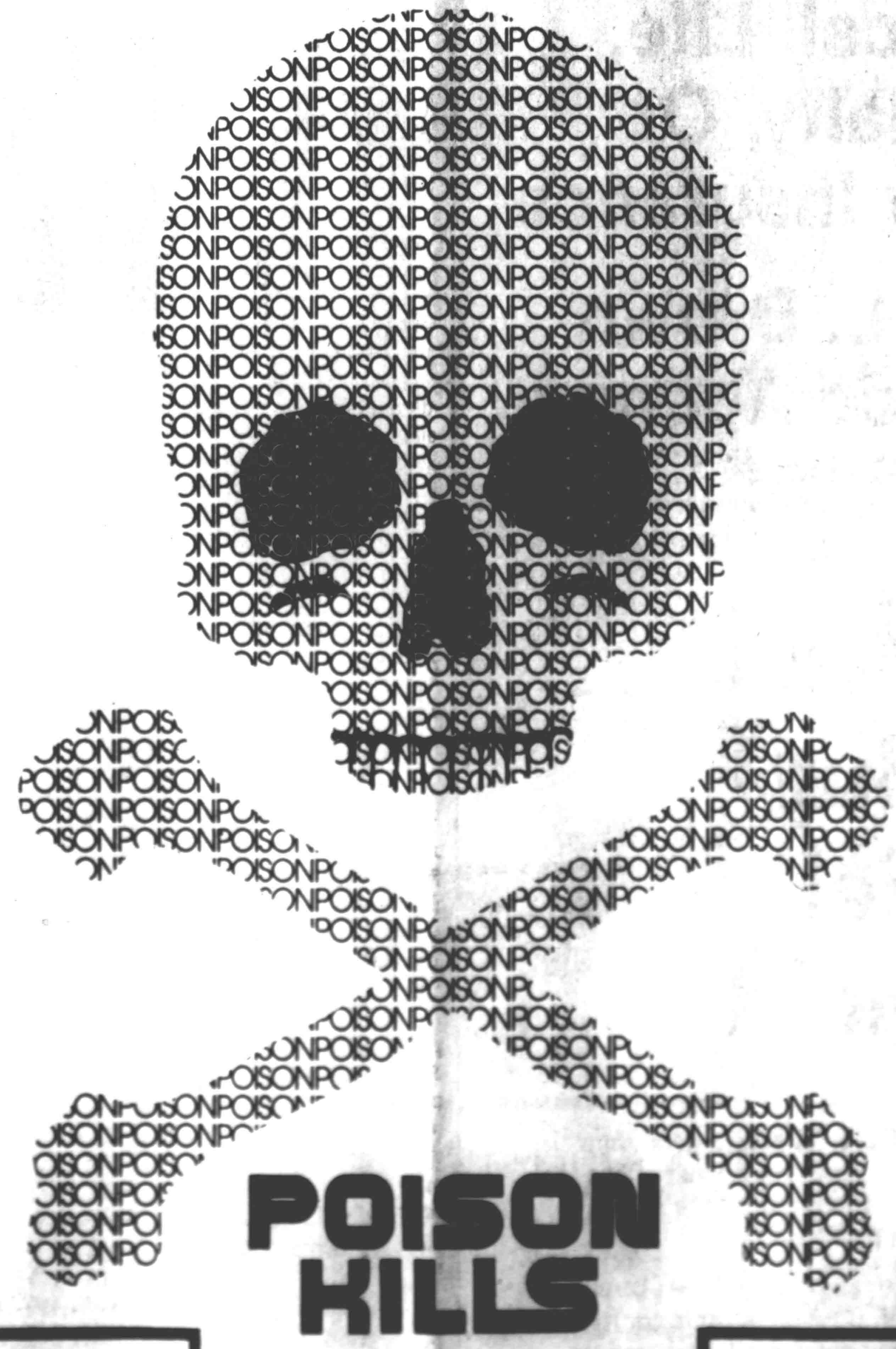

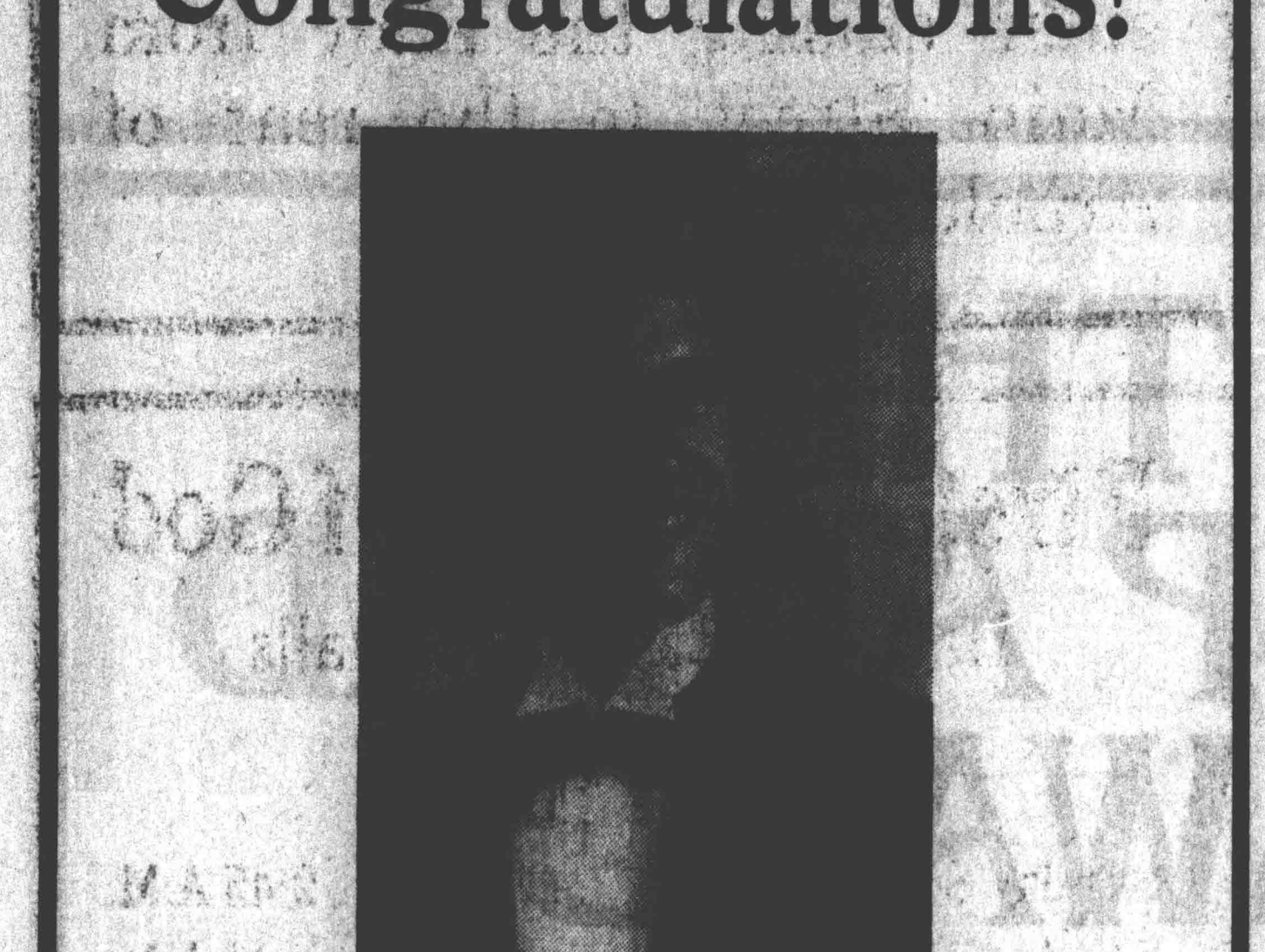
