Brought Memories

A news story Sept. 10th which told of Memphis State University celebrating the 75th anniversary of its founding brought some early memories of our own.

The news story stated that the first students to enroll, about 200, were required to have an elementary school education, \$2 registration fee, and a certificate of good moral character.

Established as West Tennessee Normal School, by the time we enrolled, 16 years later, it had become West Tennessee State Teachers College and had about 600 students. As we recall, the registration fee was about \$40. Enrollment at the present time is about 20,000, and we suspect that the registration fees will run into hundreds of dollars. We don't know just what happened to the certificate of good moral character, but it must have disappeared before we enrolled, since we don't remember any such requirement.

Even in the early days many of the students commuted, but we knew the majority of those on campus and many of the day students, which, of course, is impossible today.

A 21-yard field goal put Lake ahead at the half, 10-0, and with 6:04 in the final period, Yancy made it 17-0, with a boot by junior center Cleveland Porter (5-10, 190).

The 772-year-old document, on loan from the Lincoln Cathedral in England, is the centerpiece of an exhibition entitled "Magna Carta: Liberty Under the Law." "For most of us this is a once-in-

ifetime opportunity to see the Magna Carta," said museum director Lois Riggins. "The exhibition celebrates the 200th Anniversary of the United States Constitution, and it is designed to trace our Constitution through its British heritage back to the Magna Carta." Now the oldest written national

onstitution in existence, the U.S. Constitution can claim its descent from the document drawn up at Runnymede seven centuries ago. The Magna Carta came over the years to stand for certain principles that aided American colonists in founding a nation based on liberty and equality.

resque cove of the Great Smoks

as a monument to the educational process of another century and as a memorial to one of the legendary figures of American history.

Built in 1794, two years before

Tennessee became a state, the tiny log structure is shaded by oak and out of the walls on two sides served as windows. Shutters on the insides of these long windows opened downward to form writing desks.

Each year the patrons of this school employed schoolmaster. In the spring of 1812, their choice for the job was a young man named Sam Houston

The Houston family had arrived in Blount County, Tennessee, from Virginia in 1807 when Sam was 14 years old. Houston's widowed mother and his eight brothers and sisters settled on a grant of land acquired by his father.

In his new surroundings young Sam developed a fascination for the lifestyle of the neighboring Cherokee Indians. He was eventual ly adopted by the Cherokees, who called him "The Raven," and Houston later referred wistfully to that time as "the moulding period

When he left his Cherokee life to take the teaching job in Maryville, Houston had precious little in the way of formal education, but he had read every book he could find, had "spelled down" most of the population of the area, and could recite large portions of the 24 books of Homer's Illiad from memory. It was enough to satisfy the educational requirements of the Ten-

The patrons of the school raised their eyebrows a bit at the high tuition rates he charged. Eight dellars per term was two dollars more than they were used to paying, but Houston insisted on the exorbitant price, demanding one-third in cash, one-third in corn and the final third in the brightly colored calico he liked for his shirts.

Houston's career as a teacher 1813, he enlisted in General Andrew Jackson's army to fight in the Creek Indian War, rising to the rank

In 1818, Houston moved to Nashville and began the study and practice of law. He also got into the Mr. And Mrs. Reece In 1827, with the powerful support of Andrew Jackson, he was elected Governor of Tennessee.

The tall and imposing governor was also a most eligible bachelor. When he married during his term in office Houston's life seemed complete, but the marriage lasted only a few months before ending for reasons neither ever disclosed

Heartbroken, Houston resigned his position as governor and returned to his Cherokee family, now exiled to the distant Oklahoma ter- animals. ritory via the infamous "Trail of

Appalled at the conditions his Cherokee friends endured in Oklahoma, Houston made several trips to Washington on their behalf. He so impressed his old commander that Andrew Jackson, now President of the United States, appointed him to represent all of the Indian tribes in Texas, a territory which officially belonged to Mexico, but rapidly filling with American settlers chafing at the restrictions and regulations imposed on them by Mexican authorities.

Houston quickly became a leader in the movement for Texas independence. His rag-tag army rac ed against time to prepare for bat-tle against a disciplined Mexican ar-my led by General Santa Anna.

Another Tennesseean, an excongressman and friend named Davy Crockett, helped buy Houston the time he needed with a spirited defense of a fortified church

Tigers Have Chance

Despite a season which has been plagued by injuries, mental mistakes, and a couple of dubious calls, the Halls Tigers still have a chance for a respectable season and a spot in the state Class A play-offs.

Now holding a 3-4 record, the Tigers can win their final three games to reach a 6-4 standing and 3-1 slate in the district. The Tigers will be rated as even in Friday night's game at Dresden; favored over Denmark West next Friday; and even as they host Greenfield in the final regular season match. They must defeat Greenfield if they are to reach the play-offs and must win at least two of the three games if they are to avoid a

Several records will be maintained, should they win all three games. Coaches Andy Pugh, Al Bradford, and Ike Taylor have had only one losing season in their 11 years as coaches at Halls High School. Over the past 11 seasons, the Tigers have played in eight post-season games, either bowl games or state

The offensive show the Tigers displayed in the last half of the game in South Fulton last Friday was the best Tiger showing this year, and returning injured players are strengthening the defense. We believe they can do it.

Political Implications

Everyone in this area who follows politics should be particularly interested in last week's mayor's election in Memphis.

It seems to us that the low turn out and that Mayor Dick. Hackett was able to avoid a run-off against two reportedly strong opponents and six candidates indicates that the failure of State Rep. Harold Ford to support any candidate played a major role in the election. It was well known that there was no love lost between black candidate Minerva Johnican and Rep. Ford; as an influential Democrat, he was unwilling to support Republican Bill Gibbons, even though the city election supposedly was non-partisan; and Mayor Hackett and Rep. Ford do not see eye to eye on many issues. As a consequence the blacks followed the lead of Ford and stayed at home. Ford will continue to be elected unless he is convicted on the federa charges which have been brought against him, but black efforts to take over Memphis still have some distance to go

More Personal Opinions

We applaud Judge Robert Bork's decision to refuse to withdraw from the Supreme Court confirmation proceedings, even though there is small chance that he can be confirmed. We think, as he charged, that the Senate hearings were unfair and in many instances the charges were untrue, and we believe the full Senate should be placed on record. Some of the Senators are likely at a later date to regret their decision to be guided by the committee hearings and purely political motives. Perhaps a better man or woman can be found, but we hope that no other will be put through such an ordeal.

The continued efforts of Congress to take over the executive branch of government are not good for this nation. Everyone is entitled to his or her own opinion but we have enough problems now without the Congress trying to be President. Let us all remember that when the 1988 elections are held.
