

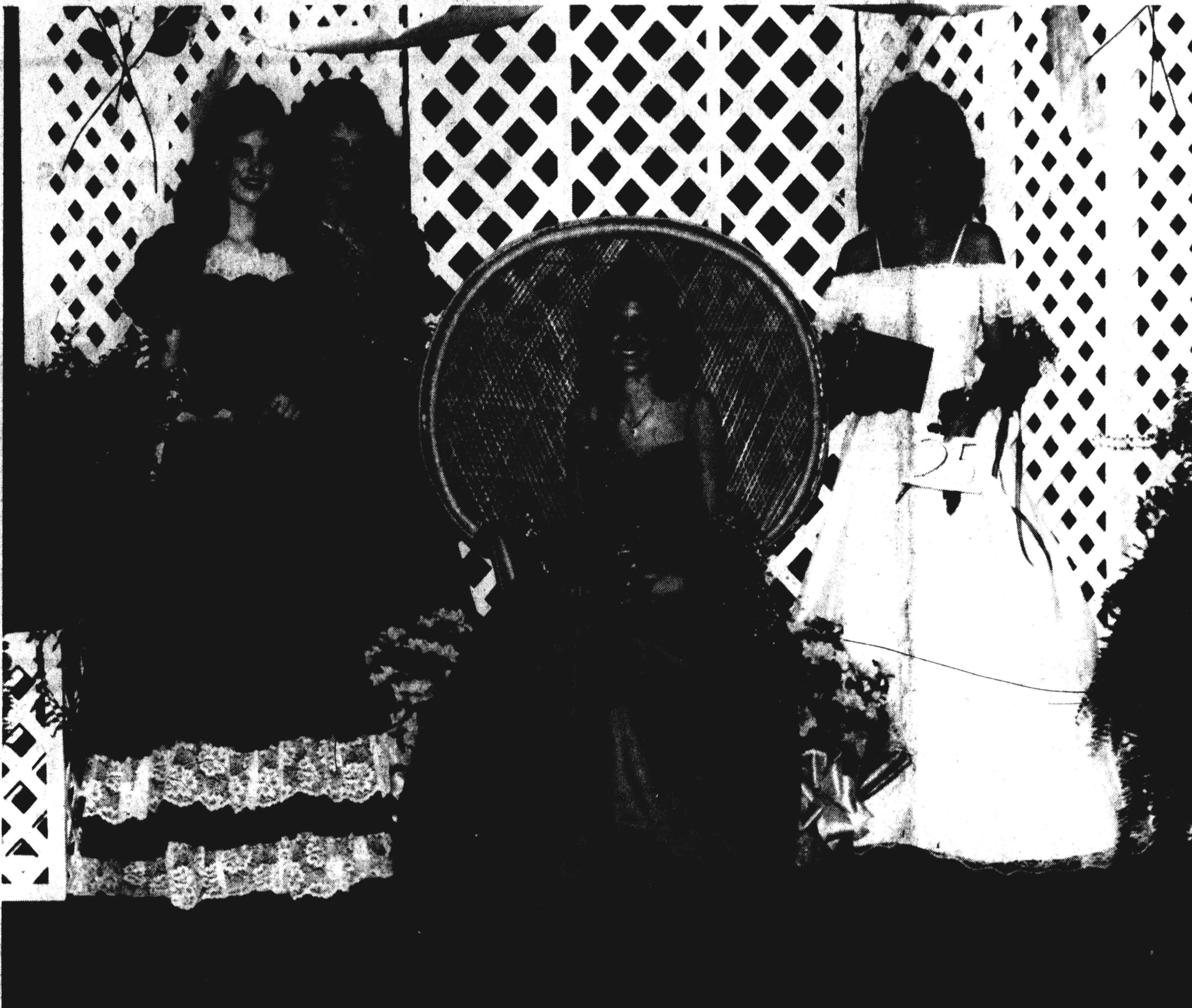

## New Angles To Ripley Voting

Two years ago, this news story would have said that Ripley voters are going to the polls this Thursday to select a mayor and six aldermen for 2-year terms.

One major difference this year is that the terms are for four years, on the city board's request, honored (as traditional, by the county's state House member, Floyd Crain, of Ripley, who secured the General Assembly act just signed by Gov. Ned McWherter, on the idea that local governments should be allowed their preferences, within reason, on terms of office.)

Another major difference is that many votes have been cast long before election day—absentee voting in person up 33% (to 388, from 292 two years ago), absentee voting by mail up 78% (to 160, from 90 two years ago), at close of business Tuesday, with two days' mail still to arrive.

That means that compared to 1,868 voters for mayor candidates two years ago, as many as 548 (29% of that vote) have already voted before election day—and won't show at the polls.

Seeking the mayorship to which Vernon Gilliland is not seeking re-election, after one 2-year term, are Rozelle Criner, former mayor, and J. B. Ammons, incumbent alderman.

Other incumbent aldermen seeking re-election are Frank Currie, Tommy Dunavant, Pete Lawrence, Charlie Moore, and Billy Poston.

Other candidates for aldermen who have served in the past are Richard Douglas and Ben Emerson.

New names on the ballot, in the race for six alderman's seats, are Barry Bates, John Gaines, Larry McBride, Jon Pavletic, and Milton Taliaferro.

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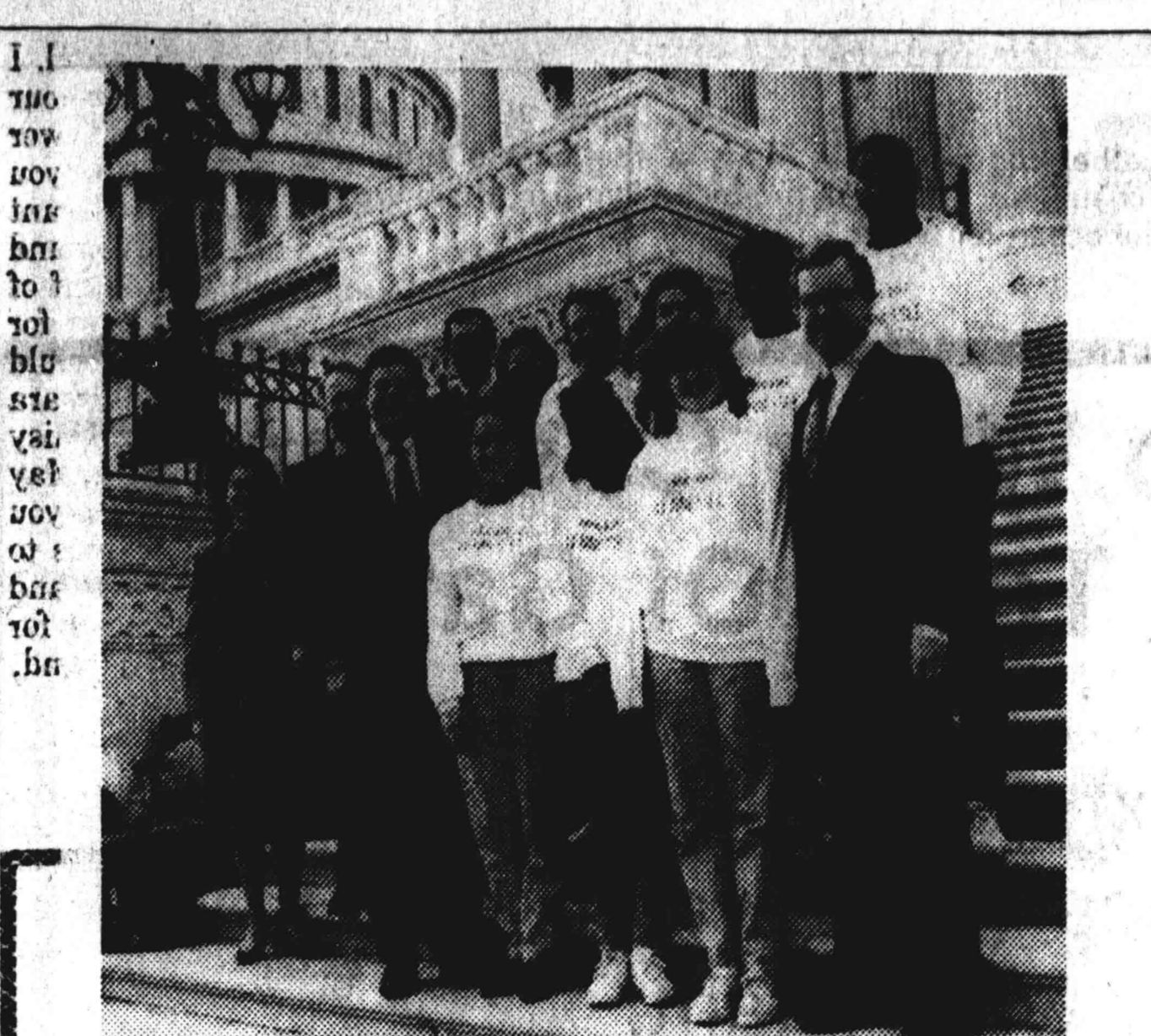

**Readers Speak**

Evelyn M. shot her husband, James, six times. They were driving back from a local establishment late at night, and Evelyn contended that James committed suicide. The jury did not believe her, and she was convicted of second degree murder. The Judge sentenced her to 20 years in the state penitentiary, and she was transported to the Tennessee Prison for Women (TPW).

The Judge gave her credit for time served in the jail pending trial, and he set her release eligibility date at 30% of the sentence. That meant that she could be considered for parole after she served 30% of her time.

Her court-appointed attorney, who represented her competently in trial, appealed the case. The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the conviction but reduced the release eligibility date to 20% because she had a history of mental problems.

Recently I received a phone call from the victim's brother asking if Evelyn M. had been paroled. I told him that surely she had not been paroled, but I would check. I did. She was paroled in December of 1987, and she appeared before a one-man hearing board. The entire Board of Paroles did not hear her case, but accepted the recommendation of the hearing officer. As District Attorney whose office prosecuted the case, I received notification of the hearing date. I also have never received formal notification that she was paroled.

I called her parole officer, and he told me that he would be transferring her parole to North Carolina in a few days. He stated that she was working in the restaurant business, and he did not know exactly where she was. He did not mention that he was not that interested, and I just know that North Carolina will have about the same interest when she goes on parole there.

I am upset. The victim's family is upset. Our system is in a mess. Evelyn M. served 3 1/2 years on a 20-year murder sentence. In my opinion, the reason that she was released so early is not because she had been "rehabilitated"; but rather, she was released because of our prison overcrowding situation. We are under court orders as to the maximum number of convicts in the system, and the Department of Correction cannot legally hold any convicts over that maximum. The door to the system is open at both ends. When one prisoner goes in, one must go out.

If we need more prisons, we need to build them. If we need to increase taxes to fund the costs, we need to increase the taxes. Criminals know the system better than we do, and they are no longer afraid of the system. Unless you are a victim of a crime or have a friend or relative who is a victim, you do not understand the imminent problem. But it is not only a problem, it is a crisis.

Costs are going to be high to build more facilities. I know that, and you know that. But the price will be higher if we do not clean up this mess.

Recent legislative action has been taken on the way diesel fuel taxes are collected. As part of the fiscal year 1988 Budget Reconciliation Act passed last December, the diesel fuel excise tax collection process was changed by Congress. Under the new law, diesel fuel will be considered a producer's tax, rather than the previous retail tax. The term "producer" is defined to include wholesale distributors, as well as other immediate persons in the chain of distribution of the taxable fuel.

Such persons include farmers, contractors, waterway users, independent petroleum marketers and others who previously were able to buy diesel fuel tax-free for off-road use. Now these persons will be required to pay the tax and either take a credit on their income tax or apply for a refund.

Resulting from the Budget Reconciliation Act, the tax on special motor fuels continues to be imposed at the retail level. Diesel fuel taxes and nongasoline aviation fuel taxes are technically imposed on the sale of the fuel by a producer. Certain users, such as state and local governments, are allowed tax free sales of diesel fuel at the discretion of the Treasury Department.

Although provisions may be sought permitting exempt sales beyond the wholesale level, these provisions are generally repealed. Under the discretion of the Treasury, certain sales are exempt from

tax where the purchaser demonstrates that the fuel will be applied in a non-taxable use. In addition, the purchaser must register and satisfy such bonding requirements as the Treasury may prescribe.

Sales that may be exempted include diesel sold for use as a fuel for trains, aviation fuel sold for commercial aviation, and taxable fuel sold for use by any state. Any and all other exemptions from these taxes must be made through refund procedures following purchase of the fuels and payment of the taxes.

I have co-sponsored several pieces of legislation this year which would help bring an end to some of this unnecessary paperwork involved with applying for exemptions and refunds. Resulting from the Tax Reform Act, state and local governments must now pay the excise gasoline tax and then file for a refund. One of the bills I co-sponsored would restore the right of the state and local governments to purchase gasoline without payment of the federal gasoline tax.

Another co-sponsored bill would restore the up-front exemption and permit tax-free sales of diesel fuel for use on a farm. Still another would restore the up-front exemption to contractors and other off-road users including waterway users and port authorities. Hearings are already being held on some of this legislation.

The blizzard, which began 100 years ago in the early hours of Monday, March 12, dropped 40-50 inches of snow on the northeastern U.S. and was accompanied by gale force winds that left drifts of 30-40 feet. The storm left 400 dead, 200

in New York City alone. Some of the survivors formed a club, known as "The Blizzard Men of 1888," and held annual meetings in New York City as late as 1941 to recollect the event.

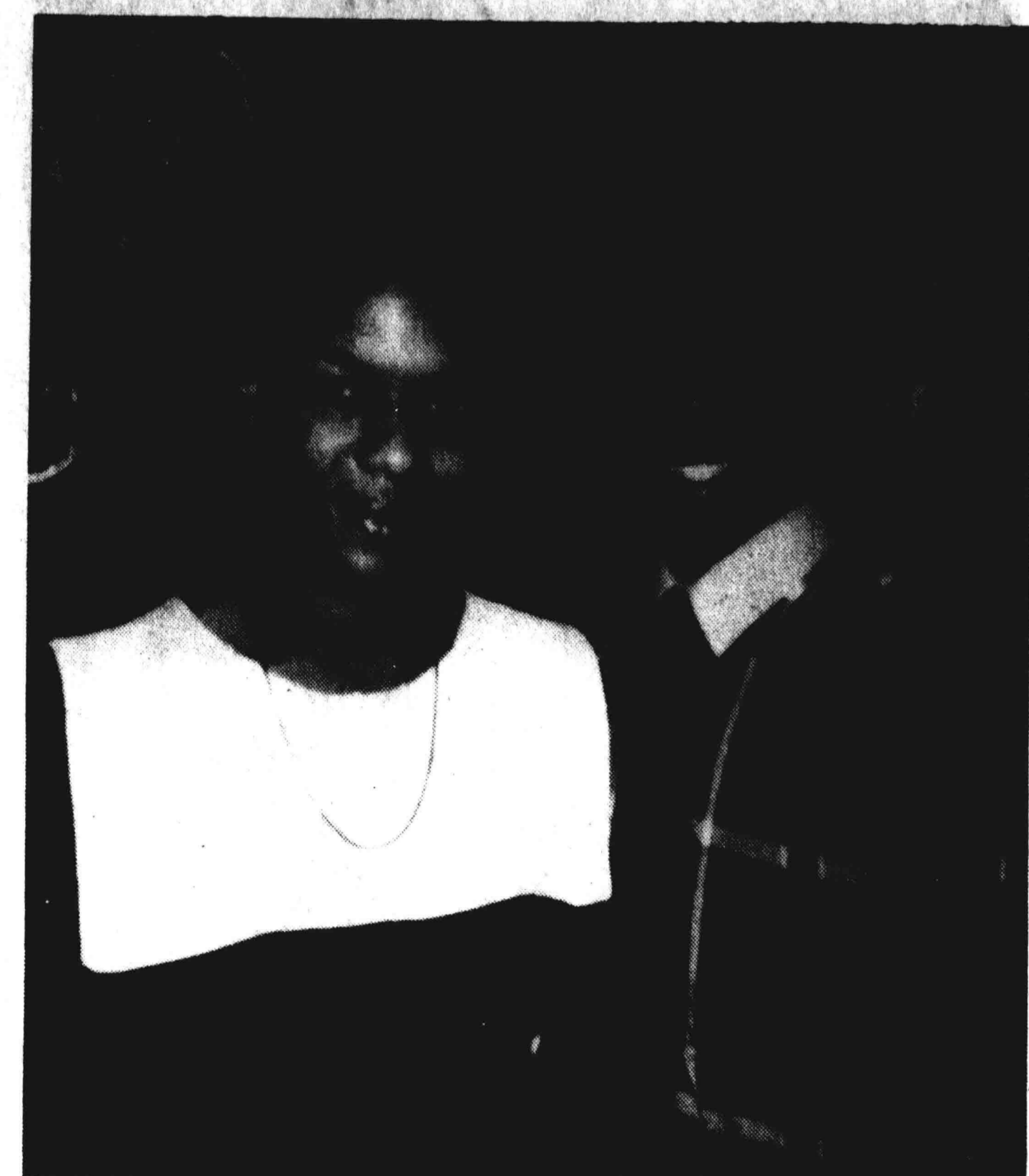

#### SPRING TURKEY TIPS FOR CALLING THAT OLE TOM

While turkey hunting in the spring can be extremely challenging, it also can be the most fulfilling time of year to hunt. For the best results, you must be familiar with several key types of calls which, if used correctly with proper planning and preparation, will help you bring home that grand ole tom.

Setting up and establishing your location is a very critical element for a successful turkey hunt. Knowing where that tom is and where he's coming from is the key to bagging your spring tom.

There are three calls a hunter can utilize other than a turkey call to make a tom talk: an owl hooter, a crow call, and the hawk call. All three are natural sounds of the woods, and ones to which a turkey will normally gobble.

Once you know where the tom is located after he's answered your call, you must next find the best position in the woods to call that gobbler to you. If you've scouted before your hunt, you should be able to take a stand along a route that the gobbler would naturally use to move to a hen.

**TIPS TO REMEMBER:**  
(1) Always make it easy for the gobbler to come to you.  
(2) Make sure you don't have water between you and the turkey that he must cross.  
(3) Be certain there are no old fences, roads, or thick brush for

the turkey to cross in order to reach where you are.

(4) Set up where the turkey can't spot you from long distances. If possible, you should be able to bag the bird as soon as you see him.

(5) Don't set up with brush or bushes on either side of your stand that would prevent you from being able to swing your shotgun to take a shot.

(6) Have a tree larger than your shoulders at your back to lean up against so that your sil-

houette will be broken up. Now you're ready to call.

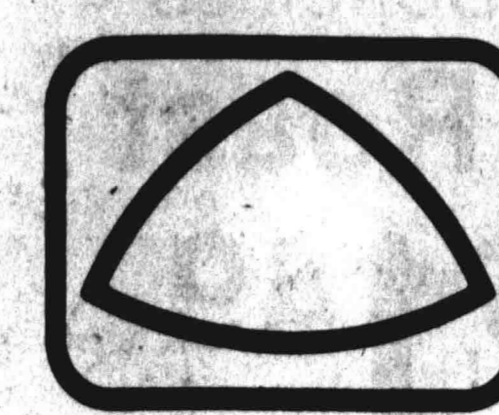

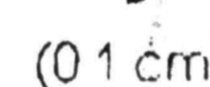

### Handbook Helps Housework Hassles

Vacuuming? No problem. Dusting? Piece of cake. Win-  
"low"? A snap.

Most people perform these basic housecleaning chores with ease. But when faced with more exotic cleaning challenges, they panic. For example:

• That thick carpeting looked great when you bought the house. But now that the previous owners have moved out, you see deep depressions where heavy furniture stood.

• Your miniblinds collect dust like a magnet. And just the thought of dusting hundreds of slats individually is enough to exhaust you.

• You threw a party last night, and today there's a big white ring in the middle of the coffee table where someone parked a wet glass.

To the rescue comes "How to Beat Housework," a new book containing thousands of tips for tackling these and other housecleaning hassles.

Published by Eureka, the vacuum cleaner manufacturer, the 479-page hardcover book isn't for sale. Instead, the company is giving it away now through July 31 to anyone who buys a Eureka vacuum cleaner worth \$50 or more.

Here's what "How to Beat Housework" has to say about the above cleaning problems:

To raise depressions left in carpet by heavy furniture, try steaming. Hold a steam iron close enough for steam to reach the carpet, but don't let the iron touch the fibers (synthetic fibers can melt). Let the steam penetrate, then lift the fibers by scraping them with the edge of a



coin or spoon. Finally, vacuum.

• For routine cleaning of miniblinds, you'll save lots of time by using the dusting brush attachment of your vacuum cleaner rather than dusting each slat individually. But when blinds require a thorough cleaning, use soap and water. Plastic, metal and painted wood blinds can be immersed in the bathtub; natural wood blinds should be hung on the clothesline and scrubbed. Wear cotton gloves so you can clean each slat with your fingers. Let blinds drip dry and rehang while still damp, stretching the tapes or cords to prevent shrinking.

To remove white rings and other stains from wood furniture, rub with toothpaste on a damp cloth, or with a mild abrasive and oil. Appropriate abrasives are ashes, salt, soda or pumice; suitable oils are olive oil, petroleum jelly, cooking oil, or lemon-oil furniture polish. You can also use paste furniture polish, but only if the furniture has a polished, not oiled, finish.

We can't see them ourselves but the dogwoods, azaleas, and other flowers must be gorgeous. Spring is our favorite time of year.

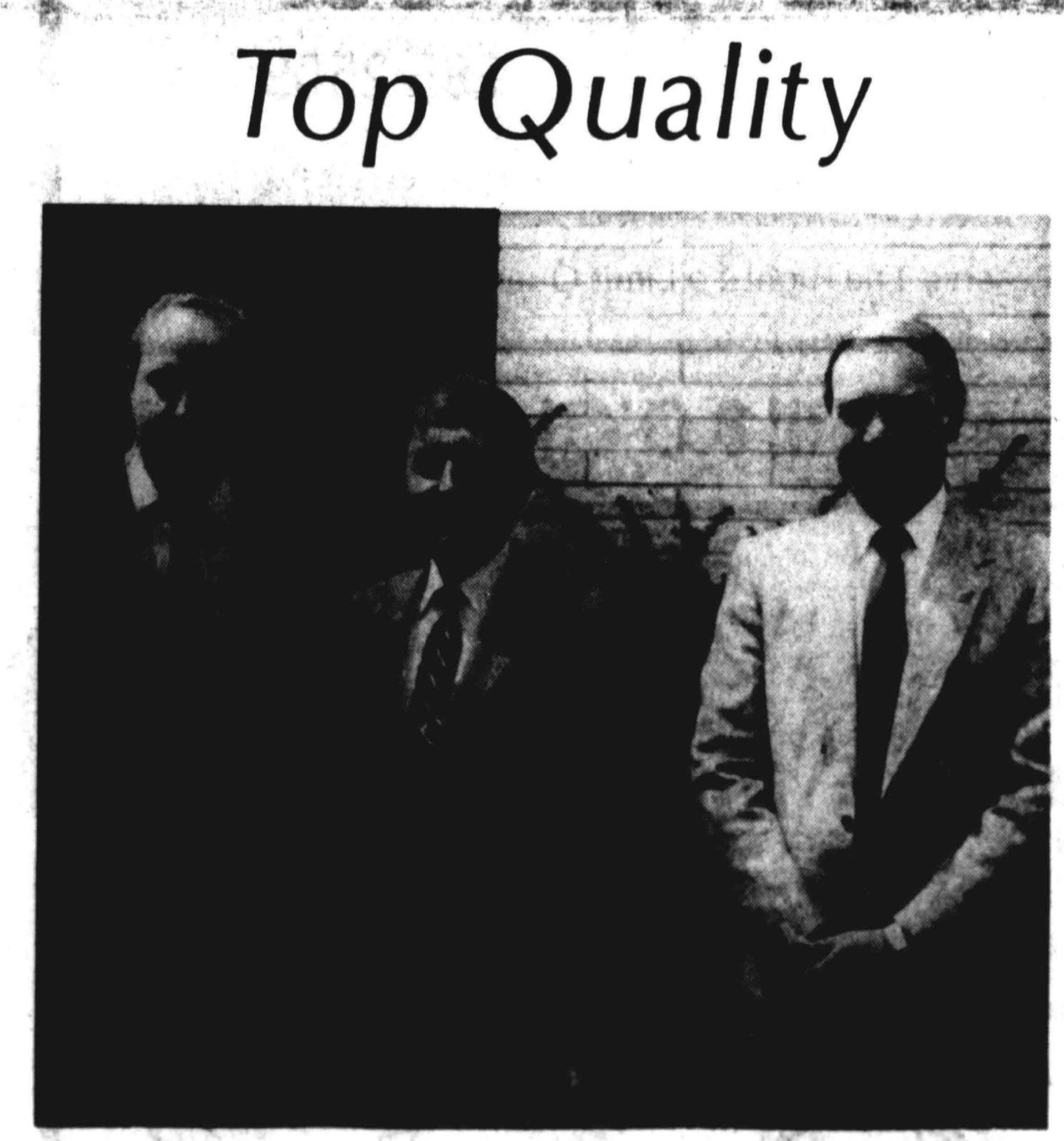

**Saluted Claybrook Trial Set In Humboldt**  
Circuit Judge Dick Jerman, of Alamo, has moved re-trial of convicted murderer Willie Claybrook from Crockett County to Humboldt, *The Jackson Sun* reports.

Defense attorneys also sought to move the trial because of what termed extensive and "prejudicial" coverage from *The Jackson Sun*.

"We feel like the information about this trial has been widely disseminated in this county," Brown said.

Brown pointed to the mention in several articles of Claybrook's conviction in Lauderdale County for beating his girlfriend to death. "That's something that is going to stick in the minds of the citizens of Crockett County."

While Jerman said he believes Claybrook could receive a fair trial in Crockett County, he agreed that the case was widely publicized and that it will be difficult to pick a jury elsewhere.

"Brown also contended Jerman should refuse to allow prosecutors to mention Claybrook's conviction in Lauderdale County if Claybrook testifies on his own behalf because it would be highly prejudicial. Normally, prosecutors only can bring up the prior record of a defendant if he takes the stand."

The state Supreme Court chose not to bar prosecutors from bringing up prior records, District Attorney General Clayburn Peoples responded. If prosecutors cannot do it during murder trials, then defendants charged with killings would be at a great advantage to those accused of other crimes, he added.

Jerman will rule on the question sometime before Claybrook's August trial.

**Retirement Center Wins 30 Days More To Help 10**  
The County Commission Monday delayed until May 30th closing the County Retirement Center (in the former county hospital building), after 25 supporters of 10 residents presented petitions with about 400 signatures.

Steve Snapp, president of Health Facilities Management Corp., of Jackson, which has operated the Center, said the building needs repairs in excess of \$25,000 to meet state standards, which would end his firm's interest in the project.

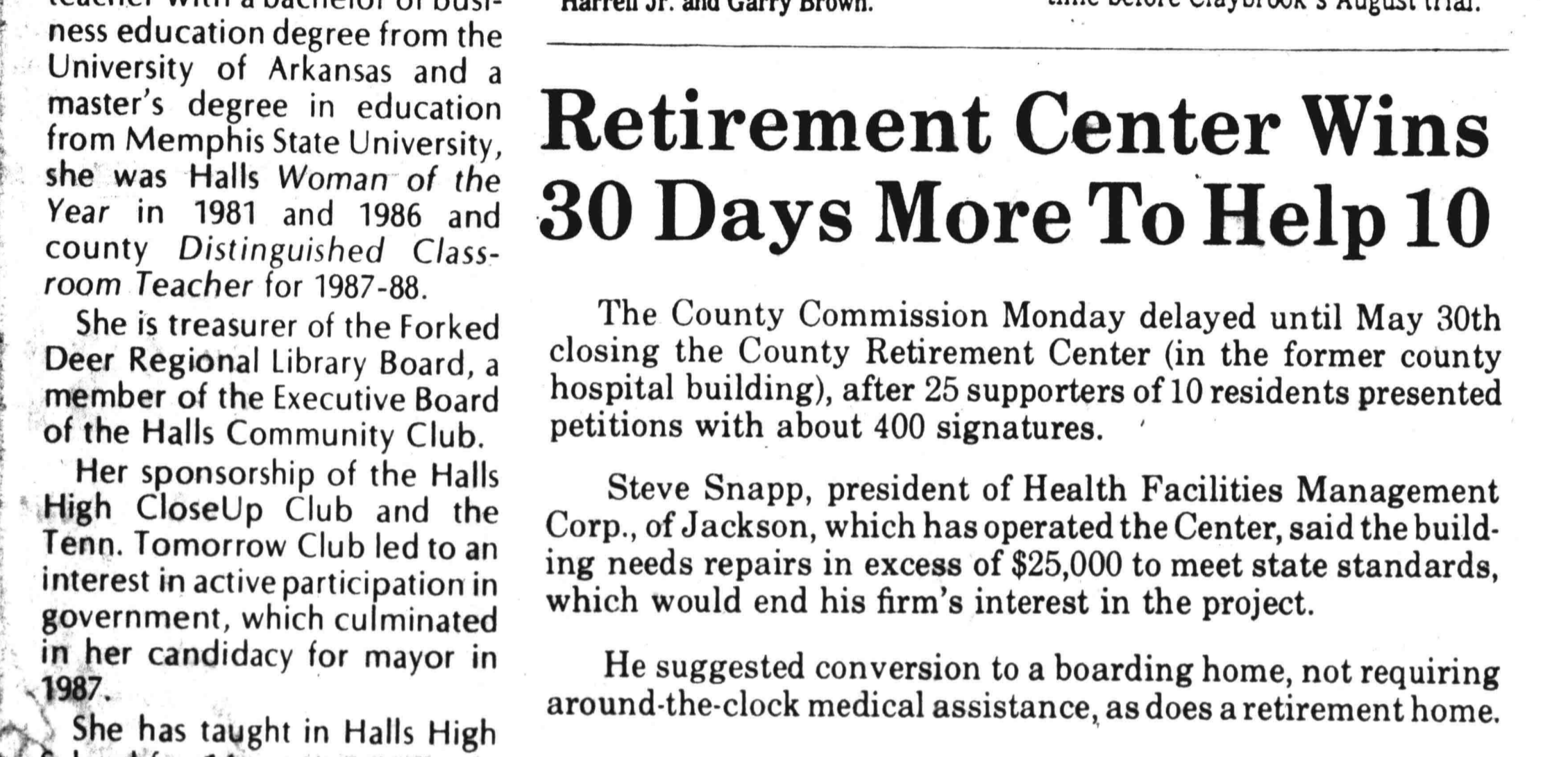
He suggested conversion to a boarding home, not requiring around-the-clock medical assistance, as does a retirement home.

**Farmers Shouldn't Count Beans Out**  
By Charles T. Peal  
Contract soy bean prices near \$7 indicate farmers should not count this crop out for 1988, but producers must be more efficient. They must boost profits by reducing costs and improving yields.

Several short run recommendations will reduce variable costs. Richard, Rickey and Walter Lazure, of Nankipoo, have found that \$2.50 each for soil samples for major field area has saved considerable money over the last few years. Producers are advised to take soil tests, since some fields do not require as much phosphate and potash as many farmers here are applying. If soil pH is between 5.6 and 6.1, use molybdenum seed treatment of 2 ounces per bushel of seed as a substitute for lime. A substitute for lime is advised, but it is preferable to lime the soil when the pH is between 5.0 and 5.5. Molybdenum may replace half of the lime recommended. Apply potash according to soil recommendations, but do not apply nitrogen to soy-beans. Generally, this county's hill land does not require too much phosphate, as it is present in the soil already and lime makes it more readily available. Potash is the most profitable fertilizer element you can add to soy-beans, as it makes larger fruit and sturdier stalks. Identify weed problem for each field and select the most economical herbicide program. Plant recommended varieties for this area, according to yield potential, disease problems, and resistance to nematodes. The University of Tennessee Diagnostic Lab can identify nematodes. If you feel you have them, you will need to bring one quart of dirt to the Extension office and get it tested for \$5. Cyst nematodes can drastically reduce yields in fields planted with the susceptible soy-bean variety.

**Note Powdery Mildew**  
Powdery mildew has shown in some wheat fields during the rainy period, about two weeks ago. Though rainfall has since been sparse, producers are advised to check fields carefully, especially with more rain and humidity. This fungus affects all aerial portions of the plant, but it is usually most prevalent on the upper surface of the lower leaves. Infections continue upward as the plant grows, when temperatures are cool, 59-72 degrees, and moisture is available. It is retarded above 77 degrees. Dense stands with heavy nitrogen fertilizer and humid conditions favor disease development. Foliar fungicides, such as Dithane M-45 or Manzate 200, have proved effective for an average increase of 10.6 bushels per acre.

**Calibration Guides**  
The University of Tennessee has re-issued a sprayer calibration guide which works like a slide rule, smaller and handier to carry on the dash-board of a truck. Charles Neal, who has been using one for several years and likes it, because it is faster in calibrating, got his new one last week. They are available free. **County Maps Offered**  
The county Extension Service has provided county road maps for many years. One-half inch to the mile road maps are sold for 75¢ each.

**Get Mumps Shot To Start School**  
Children 5 or older by Sept. 30, 1988, entering a county kindergarten, or 6 by Sept. 30, 1988, entering a county school (even if previously in a county kindergarten) this August need mumps shots, or a doctor's certification of having had mumps, in their records (physical exam, immunization record from the county health department, and birth certificate or legal proof of age) as they register, between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. —  
• April 29th, at Halls Elementary School.  
• May 6th, at Ripley Elementary School.  
The mumps requirement applies to all students through high school seniors. Cases, 35 to 50 in the state until 1986, jumped to more than 1,400 that year. Last year, more than 600 of about 1,100 cases were in Southwest Tennessee. Bettie Smith, of the county health department, says ages 13-16 get priority for a limited supply of mumps vaccine at a special clinic from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. May 4th, but that parents of any children expected to attend school next year should take advantage of the clinic.

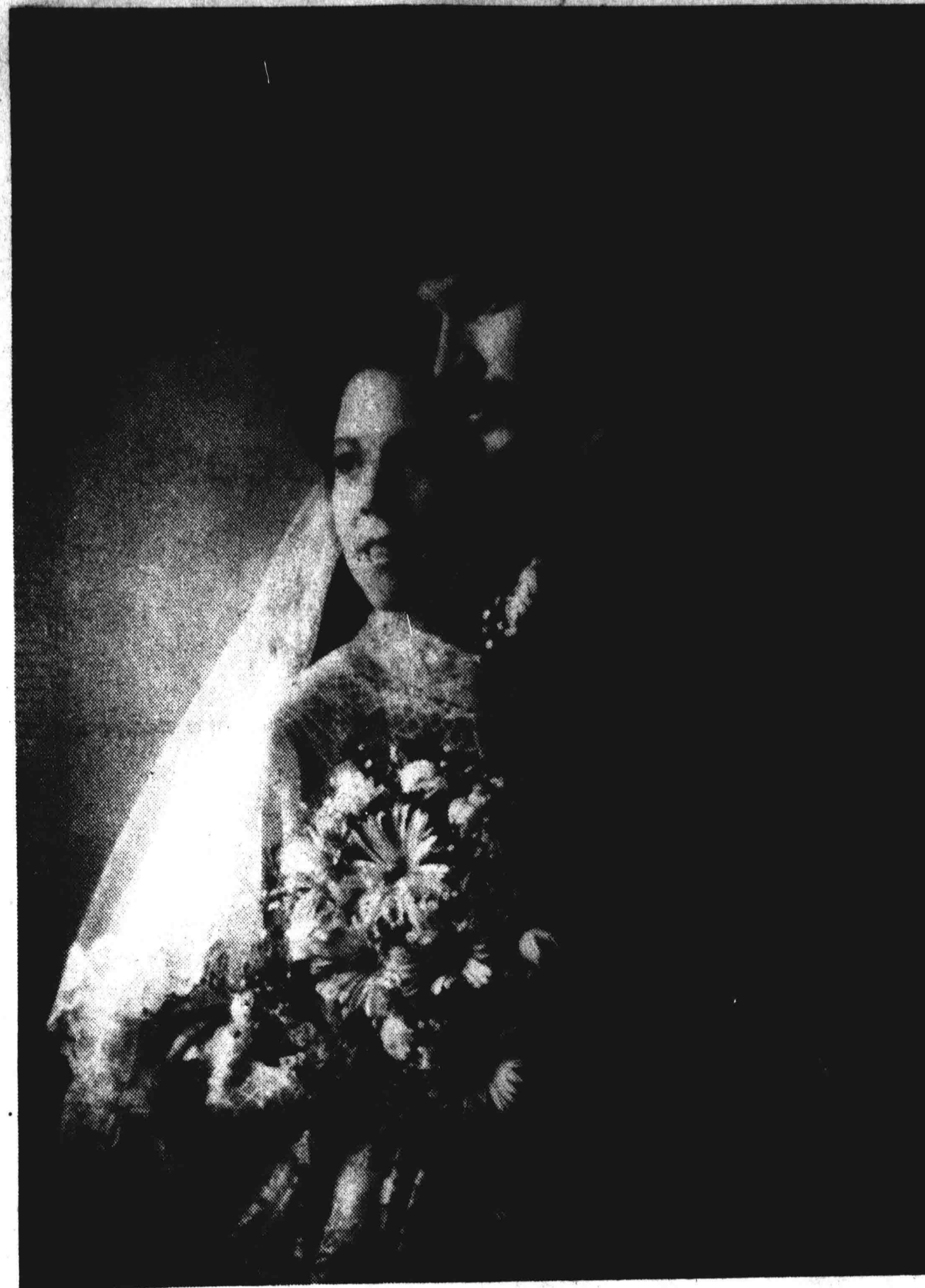

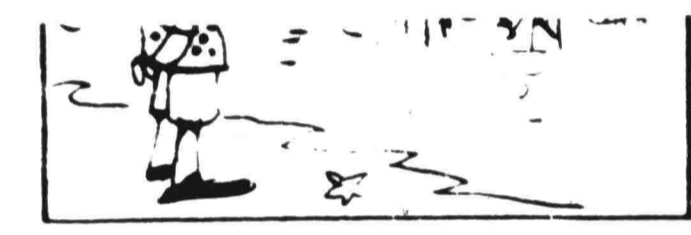

Dear Mrs. Geraldine:  
I didn't know you were sick. I didn't know you were even in Halls. I didn't see your name on the sign in front of Halls Funeral Home. I would have visited you. You were so wonderful as a teacher in Central School all those years ago. You were the first to inspire me to become a teacher. I remember some things so well. You always looked so perfect. Even on a hot August day in a classroom without air conditioning you looked perfect. Never a strand of your blond hair out of place. You always looked cool and calm. You always stayed calm. You were a great reading teacher. This was back during the time when you learned words and to read. No crummy, turn-off workbooks citing fact or opinion or sequential order. I will remember Tom, Betty, Susan and their many adventures. I treasured the little red, green, yellow, and blue books. If we didn't know our new words the next day, you got mad. We didn't want to make you mad. We adored you, and we learned our words. You left in me an appreciation of literature that is still with me today.

I remember a simple little thing. You didn't like kids to have runny noses. I can still see you taking the tissue off a roll of toilet paper on your desk. You would crush it together several times to make it softer and give it to the offender.

One day, you even saved a little girl's dignity. That timid, shy little girl was at the board working a math problem. She was afraid to ask permission to go to the restroom. She wet her pants right there in line at the board. You simply took the child's sweater from her desk, tied it around her

waist and waited for the bell to dismiss us to go home. Nobody laughed. Some students didn't even notice. I was that little girl. Once when all the children in first and second grade were called out of the room to discover they were invited to go the Shrine Circus. I was left behind. You comforted me and told me that I could go, too, if my mother would come along to help. That day at the circus turned out to be a memorable day in my life. I bought a blue silk umbrella and a souvenir.

Years later I learned that my second grade class was the last group you taught. You did not have a teacher's certificate. Rules had gotten more stringent. You had decided not to go back to school. But I say you had everything you needed to be a teacher—knowledge, a perfect diction, integrity, and love. You were the best. You were the first of many wonderful teachers I had through the years. You were a role model for me. I put you on a pedestal. You see, you loved children.

Just this week, one of my dear students, Melissa Sanders, gave me a beautiful picture. Written in calligraphy are the words, "To teach is to touch a life forever." Miss Geraldine, you touched my life.

**Halls History**

By Mrs. Charles Alsbrook  
Robert Stallings, with Charles Edens and Lynn Stallings Harris, descendants of John Morris, has this copy of his hand-written will, dated 1759:

"North Carolina—Bertie County—in the Name of God Amen

"I John Morris of said county being sick and weak of body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God and therefore calling unto Mind the Mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men to die: do make and ordain this my last will and testament. That is to say: first I give and recommend my soul to God who gave it: and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried at the discretion of my executors. And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me this life I dispose of same in the following manner.

"First I lend and leave unto my loving wife, Rebekah, during her natural life the plantation whereon I now live with all the land thereto belonging: and after her decease I give, bequeath and devise the said plantation and land so far as the main road that leads to Bertie Courthouse unto my son, John, to his heirs and assigns for ever. And the other part beyond the said road I give bequeath and devise unto my son, William, to him, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Secondly I give unto my son, John, my large gun, my son, William, my small gun, to them their heirs and assigns for ever.

"Fourthly I give unto my daughter, Mary Stallings, one sow and pigs to her heirs and assigns for ever.

"Fifthly I give unto my daughter, Ann Holms, one sow and pigs to her heirs and assigns for ever.

"Sixthly I give unto my daughter, Sarah Farmer, one sow and pigs to her heirs and assigns for ever.

"Seventhly I give unto my daughter, Elizabeth Morris, two cows and calves and one pater dish to be delivered when she arrives at the age of twenty one years or sooner if married.

"Eighthly I give unto my daughter, Jane, two cows and calves and one pater dish to be delivered when she arrives at the age of twenty one years or sooner if married.

"Ninthly, I lend and leave unto my loving wife, Rebekah, during her natural life the remainder part of my estate to assist towards raising the children and after her decease I give and bequeath the same to my five sons. Benjn. Mor-

ris, Nathan Morris, Jacob Morris, James Early Morris and Richard Morris, to be equally divided amongst them by my two sons, John and William.

"Tenthly and lastly I appoint and ordain my loving wife and my two sons, John and William Morris, to be the executors of this my last will and testament. Utterly revoking, dissanling and making void all other and former wills or wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty first day of May one thousand seven hundred and fifty nine."

John Morris signed his will with (X) his mark, and it was sealed and witnessed by William Willford, Jacob Stallings (X) his mark and J. Early.

"Bertie County Court 1759. The afore written will was exhibited into court by Rebekah Morris Widow Relick (?) of the said decedent and John Morris, recorded and proved by the oaths of John Early and Jacob Stallings, two of the subscribing witnesses thereto and at the same time? the same Exors. Qualified According to law which was ordered to be certified.

"Test Benjn. Wynns, Clk. Crt." This document was found by Robert Stallings' niece, Charlotte Sprawls, in the State Archives in Raleigh, N.C.

From ship rosters, they gather John Morris came to this country from England in the early 1700s and settled and married in Bertie County, N.C.

He and his wife, Rebekah, had 12 living children at his death—seven sons and five daughters.

Two sons, John and William, were in the Continental Army in the Revolutionary War (5th Regiment, Williams Company, Continental Line, N.C.)

Moses, son of William Morris, settled in West Kentucky. His son, John Wesley Morris, was born near Mayfield, Ky. His daughter, Louisa Morris, is Robert Stallings' mother.

She met her father, John Frank Stallings, while they were attending Primitive Baptist School near Mayfield.

After marriage in 1896, they moved to Lauderdale County and became devout Missionary Baptists.

In 1759, a Jacob Stallings witnessed the will of John Morris, and in 1896, John Morris' great-great-granddaughter married a Stallings.

Louisa's father, John Wesley Morris, volunteered for the Confederate Army. He was assigned to Gen. Forrest's Cavalry, in the Battles of Shiloh, Vicksburg, Baton Rouge, and Corinth, Miss. was wounded, and was distinguished for gallantry.

The Senate recently passed the Proxmire Financial Modernization Act of 1988 which would repeal the Glass-Steagall Act created during the Depression. Passed in the wake of the Great Depression, the Glass-Steagall Act separated banks and securities firms in 1933. Upon enactment of the new law, our nation's financial system will be restructured, allowing banks and securities firms to affiliate with one another once again.

The Senate bill would allow banks to underwrite and sell an extensive range of securities through affiliates owned by federally regulated bank holding companies. If the bill passes the House, several investment activities will be available immediately to the various bank affiliates. Sales of mutual fund and corporate bond dealings by banks would be delayed for another few months.

This bill would also allow opportunities for securities firms to get into commercial banking. Such firms would be allowed to own banks, but congressional approval must be granted before the firms could participate in stock underwriting. In addition, there would be limitations on loans and other financial connections between banks and their securities affiliates to prevent risky investment activities from endangering federally insured bank deposits.

Several new consumer protections may also be considered

within this banking bill, including disclosure requirements for savings accounts and home-equity loans. Banks would be required to seek affiliation with securities firms to meet existing-law conditions on mortgage and commercial lending in low and moderate income neighborhoods.

After an extended time of debate, the Senate was finally able to agree on repealing the Glass-Steagall Act which imposed limitations on the banks and securities firms. That agreement was reached upon realization that regulatory actions had begun to interfere between commercial and investment banks. Most parties involved in this banking bill feel that it is a good compromise.

Another condition of the bill would allow banks owned by holding companies to sell and underwrite insurance only in the home state of the holding company, and only if the state agreed. The measure now comes before the House Banking Committee where a similar bill with more restrictions is being considered.

It is important to carefully consider changes such as these when dealing with the banking system of our country. In an effort to protect our country from economic disruption as in the Great Depression, we should not expose banks to circumstances similar to those in the 1930's.

Delta Commission Would Aid Region

The Mississippi Delta is a region of paradox—it has some of the richest traditions and richest soil in the country. But for generations, it has also had some of the country's poorest inhabitants in terms of per capita income and unemployment. And this poverty has persisted for decades, regardless of the swings of the business cycles or economic trends.

I am co-sponsoring legislation in the Senate which would establish a seven-state commission to study the economic needs and problems of the Mississippi Delta region. The commission will study the region for one year, will suggest appropriate ways to target federal and state aid, and will recommend programs used successfully in other states which would help reduce poverty in the region and encourage economic development.

The bill encompasses 21 counties in West Tennessee, all of them as representative as any of the clear need for this legislation.

In 1984, the national average for per capita income was \$12,772. The average for the State of Tennessee was \$10,400. For the 21 counties included in the Delta Commission study, 19 were below the Tennessee average.

In 1985, the national unemployment rate was 7.2 percent. Tennessee's unemployment rate for that year was 8 percent. And again, of the 21 counties covered by this bill, 20 had unemployment rates higher than the national and state averages, twelve had unemployment rates in excess of 10 percent.

In the years since the New Deal, we've learned much about what government programs can and cannot do.

With the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Tennessee Valley Authority, and some of the water projects in the western states, we have a documented record of successes and failures. We know something about the kind of development strategies that can bear fruit.

This bill seeks to apply the lessons we've learned from experience to the problems of the Delta region. The commission would provide a comprehensive structure for attacking rural poverty in the seven-state Delta region, marking a crucial first step toward enhancing the quality of life for the people of the Mississippi Delta—a first step that I believe, is long overdue.

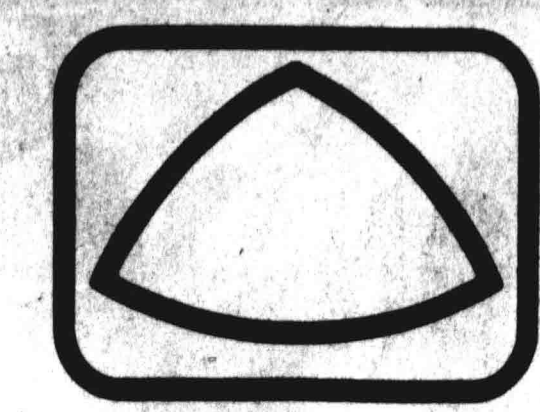
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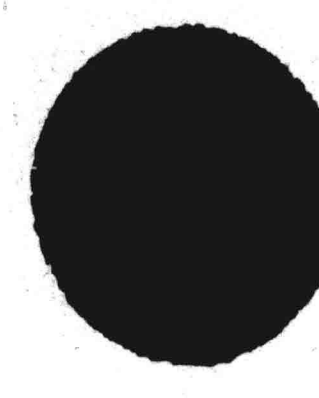

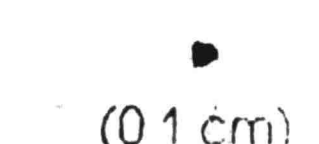

**Natchez Trace:  
Walking Through History**

ON THE NATCHEZ TRACE—From the first buffalo trampling through the wilderness, to the Indians, settlers, soldiers, ministers and bandits who followed, the Natchez Trace provided a 450-mile pathway for a colorful procession of America's frontier history.

Even today, a drive along the almost completed Natchez Trace Parkway from Nashville, Tennessee to Natchez, Mississippi intertwines legends and historical accounts of the old Southwest. The modern parkway, celebrating its 50th anniversary this year, resulted from the efforts of Tennessee, Alabama and Mississippi.

By the late 1820s, the once-busy Trace was used only as a path between communities, but in the early 1900s interest in the historic route was renewed. A garden club in Mississippi began marking the path in 1909, and 50 years ago the modern parkway was born.

The road closely follows the old Trace with markers and exhibits depicting the hardships of early travelers through Tennessee and Alabama to the prosperous antebellum plantations of southern Mississippi.

A highlight of any trip along the Trace is the chance to stop and walk the original portions that have been preserved. The old Trace—literally a path—leads away from the sounds of passing cars, and with sunlight streaming through the dense forest, long ago voices seem to whisper in the wind—telling tales of adventures in a new land.

The first national highway of the Southwest, the Natchez Trace served as a buffalo and Indian trail until French and Spanish settlers arrived in the 18th century and began using the crude path. The name "Trace" is French for "trek" or "track" meaning a line of footprints. By 1801 the U.S. government ordered its clearance, and the Trace became the most important thoroughfare from Nashville to Natchez for the next two decades.

To aid travelers, the government sanctioned inns—known as "stands"—at one-day intervals. One such stand in Tennessee was called Shebos Place. An amusing legend tells of a woman operator of the stand marrying a Chickasaw who spoke little English. When travelers asked questions, the Indian simply gestured at his wife, mumbling "She boss."

Natchez Trace served as a military road several times, most notably in 1813 when Andrew Jackson's army

marched on a campaign against the Creek Indians, and again in 1815 on return from the Battle of New Orleans. It was on this tortuous journey that Jackson, earned the nickname "Old Hickory." At nearby Natchez Trace State Park stands what is said to be the world's largest pecan tree. Legends say that the tree was planted by one of Jackson's soldiers on this return trip.

Traveling the Trace was always hazardous, and many travelers fell victim to disease, bandits and Indians. One of the most dangerous passages was past the Natural Bridge near Waynesboro, Tennessee. Claimed to be the only double-span natural bridge in the world, the natural fortification provided a hideout for highwaymen who preyed on unsuspecting travelers.

Also on the Trace famed explorer Meriwether Lewis met a violent death at a stand near Swan Creek in 1809. During the night, Lewis was mysteriously shot—it has never been clear if he was murdered or committed suicide. In the early morning, others at the stand discovered him outside, begging to be shot to escape the pain Lewis died that morning. He was buried at what is now Meriwether Lewis Park. A monument—a broken shaft symbolizing a life ended too soon—marks his grave.

By the early 1820s, the steady stream of travelers who had followed the Natchez Trace for decades vanished as steamboats offered safer and faster transportation.

We are setting aside part of historic America for present and future generations, says park ranger George Herron. "We have tried to preserve the most beautiful parts. We have scenic vistas, nature trails, picnic areas, prehistoric Indian sites and historic sites—a blend covering the whole gamut of the area's history."

Today the Natchez Trace Parkway commemorates the path these courageous early travelers took. The parkway will be completed in Tennessee in 1993 and in Mississippi in 1994, beginning in Nashville and extending 450 miles to Natchez.

The northern entrance of the parkway is located near Columbia, about 40 miles south of Nashville. Entered off Highway 50, Natchez Trace begins as a gently winding road. Stops along the parkway give travelers a chance to adjust from busy highways left behind, breathe the fresh country air and gaze into the valley where silos peek over barn roofs and neatly groomed fields and small ponds create a peaceful setting.

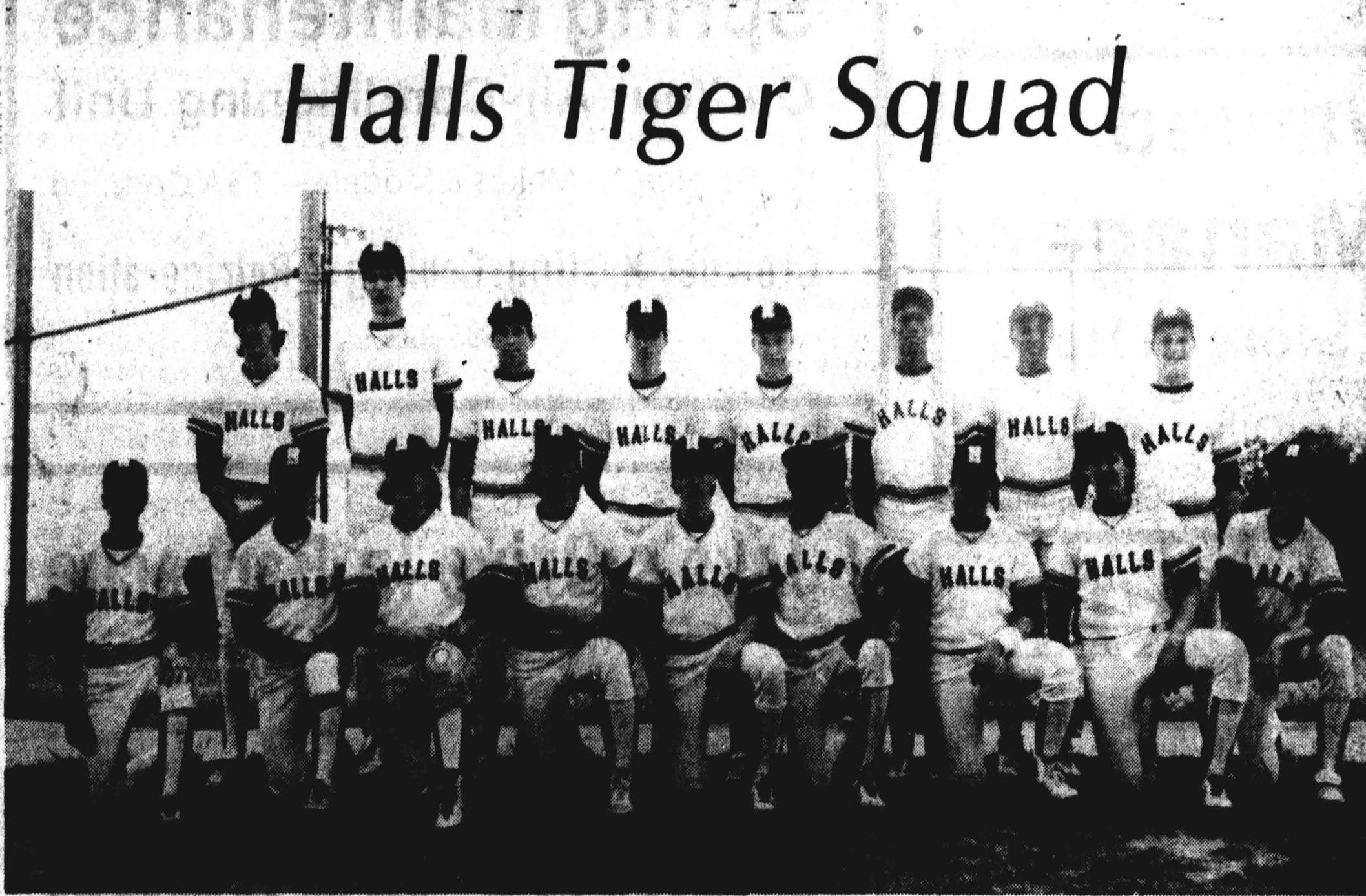

# Empson Walker Family History

The Haywood County Historical Society's history book project is well underway and the group is soliciting family histories from all past and present residents.

Brochures describing the procedure to submit family histories are available at the library, the court house and the Brownsville States-Graphic.

The following is an example of one local family's history.

Completed histories are to be sent to the Brownsville-Haywood County Historical Society, Box 183, Brownsville, TN, 38012.

Empson Walker (October 5, 1803-September 30, 1876) married Martha Currie (1803-September 14, 1865) in 1825 Orange County, North Carolina where Aaron and another brother were born. After living in Orange County from 1825 to 1842 Empson moved to Haywood County, Tennessee. When Aaron was fourteen years old. On this thirty-three day wagon trip they stopped for a short visit with General Andrew Jackson at the Hermitage. They were welcomed while Aaron and his brother were impressed with his manner and appearance. Martha Currie was a strict old time Presbyterian who trained her children in the faith. Aaron joined Union Presbyterian Church August 16, 1846 and was baptized by Brownsville minister, Reverend J.W. Strother. Aaron married Martha Hannah, daughter of John and Mary Williams, on December 13, 1854.

He settled two miles Northwest of Brownsville where he lived until he died July 22, 1902 separated from his wife by four hours. A double funeral was conducted at Brownsville Presbyterian Church. Aaron distinguished himself with bravery in the 14th Tennessee Cavalry during the Civil War. An amusing incident happened when Aaron was recuperating from gunshot wounds in his arm at his Brownsville home. His brother Jim stopped to check on Hannah and the children one night. Aaron heard a noise in the night, fearing a carpet-bagger, he drew a bead on the shadow outside the window. At this moment Jim said "Aaron". When Aaron realized what he almost did, he became ill and had to lie down. Aaron submitted to the inevitable and was true and loyal to the government. Ordained Presbyterian Elder Aaron also served as chaplain which the men respected.

One of eight children, Empson (October 17, 1855-April 29, 1932) married in 1891 Eula Estelle Greaves (April 22, 1867-August 1, 1960) after his first wife, Emma Wilkes died in childbirth. Eight children were born—Empson, William, Aaron, and Lewis the boys, Alice, Gladys, Lellie, and Estelle—the girls. This Walker family lived in the Nut Bush area their entire life. Of these eight children, William, Lellie, Lewis, and Estelle are still living. All married having one to three children and all respected citizens who are loyal to the government. The professions they pursued are judges, school teachers, doctors, ministers, farmers, businessmen, each becoming well known in his field. Uncle Charles Walker was a judge in the Oklahoma territory while later Mark Anthony Walker was judge of the Criminal Court of Appeals. Aunt Patsy's daughters were school teachers and Estelle was school principal in Jackson, Tennessee. James Walker was a Methodist minister. Vernon Moore is doctor in Greenwood, S.C. Empson, William, Aaron, and Lewis were farmers. Gladys and Lellie were school teachers. Empson, William, and Lewis were business owners. Of the grandchildren Empson Jr. had three girls and one boy while Joan Hoffman had three boys and one girl. Ann Walker married George Jackson a banker. Susan Scott now teaches in Holland near "The Hague". Aaron Jr.'s wife Sammie is well known in public. Virginia Walker Embrey was in the furniture business and has one son and one daughter.

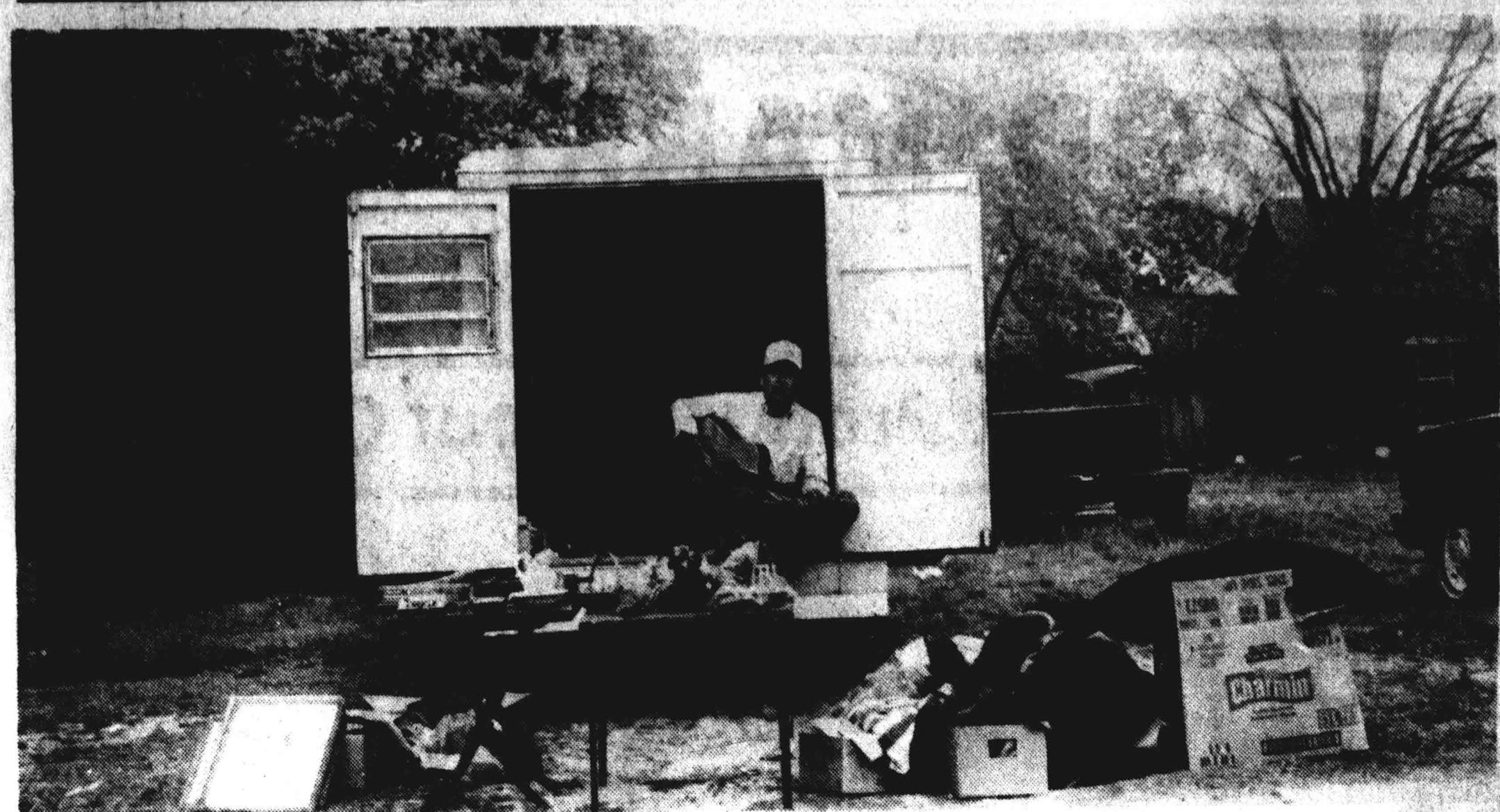

The Senate recently passed the Proxmire Financial Modernization Act of 1988 which would repeal the Glass-Steagall Act created during the Depression. Passed in the wake of the Great Depression, the Glass-Steagall Act separated banks and securities firms in 1933. Upon enactment of the new law, our nation's financial system will be restructured, allowing banks and securities firms to affiliate with one another once again.

The Senate bill would allow banks to underwrite and sell an extensive range of securities through affiliates owned by federally regulated bank holding companies. If the bill passes the House, several investment activities will be available immediately to the various bank affiliates. Sales of mutual fund and corporate bond dealings by banks would be delayed for another few months.

This bill would also allow opportunities for securities firms to get into commercial banking. Such firms would be allowed to own banks, but congressional approval must be granted before the firms could participate in stock underwriting. In addition, there would be limitations on loans and other financial connections between banks and their securities affiliates.

to prevent risky investment activities from endangering federally insured bank deposits.

Several new consumer protections may also be considered within this banking bill, including disclosure requirements for savings accounts and home-equity loans. Banks would be required to seek affiliation with securities firms to meet existing-law conditions on mortgage and commercial lending in low and moderate income neighborhoods.

After an extended time of debate, the Senate was finally able to agree on repealing the Glass-Steagall Act which imposed limitations on the banks and securities firms. That agreement was reached upon realization that regulatory actions had begun to interfere between commercial and investment banks. Most parties involved in this banking bill feel that it is a good compromise.

Another condition of the bill would allow banks owned by holding companies to sell and underwrite insurance only in the home state of the holding company, and only if the state agreed. The measure now comes before the House Banking Committee where a simi-

lar bill with more restrictions is being considered.

It is important to carefully consider changes such as these when dealing with the banking system of our country. In an effort to protect our country from economic disruption as in the Great Depression, we should not expose banks to circumstances similar to those in the 1930's.

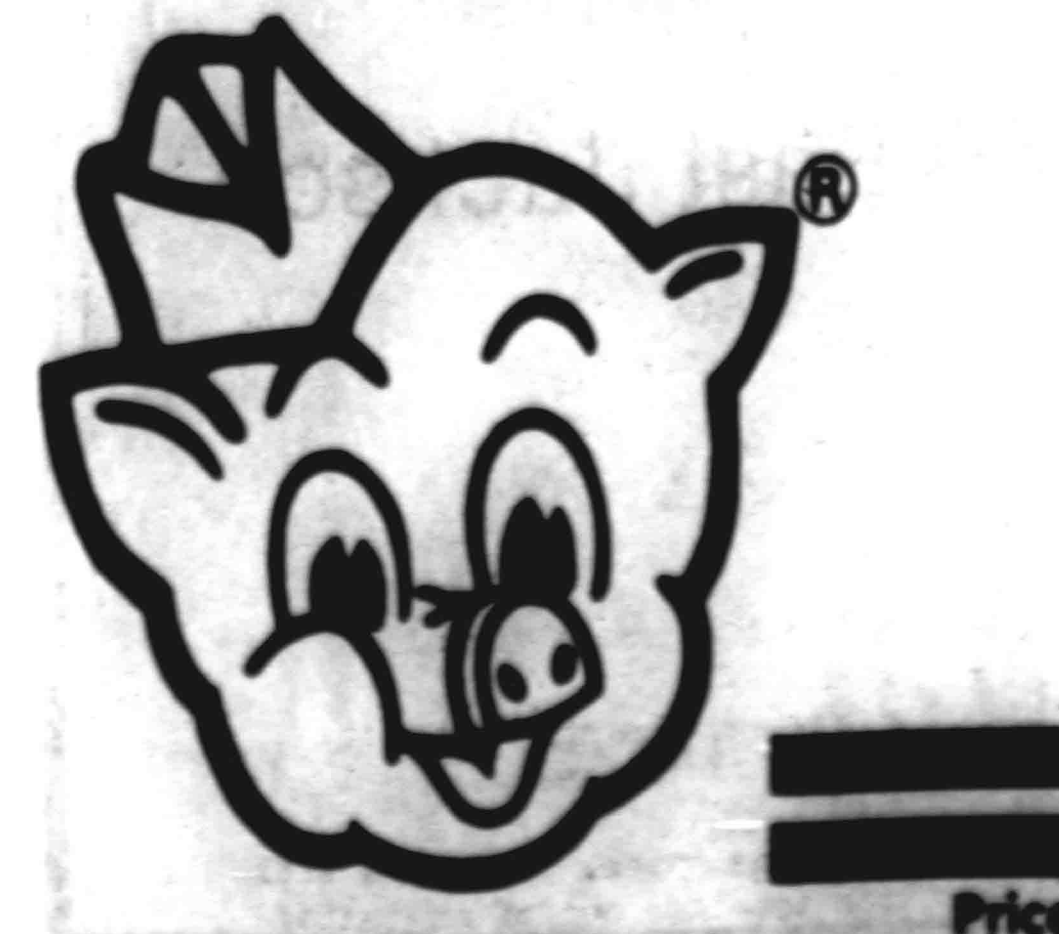

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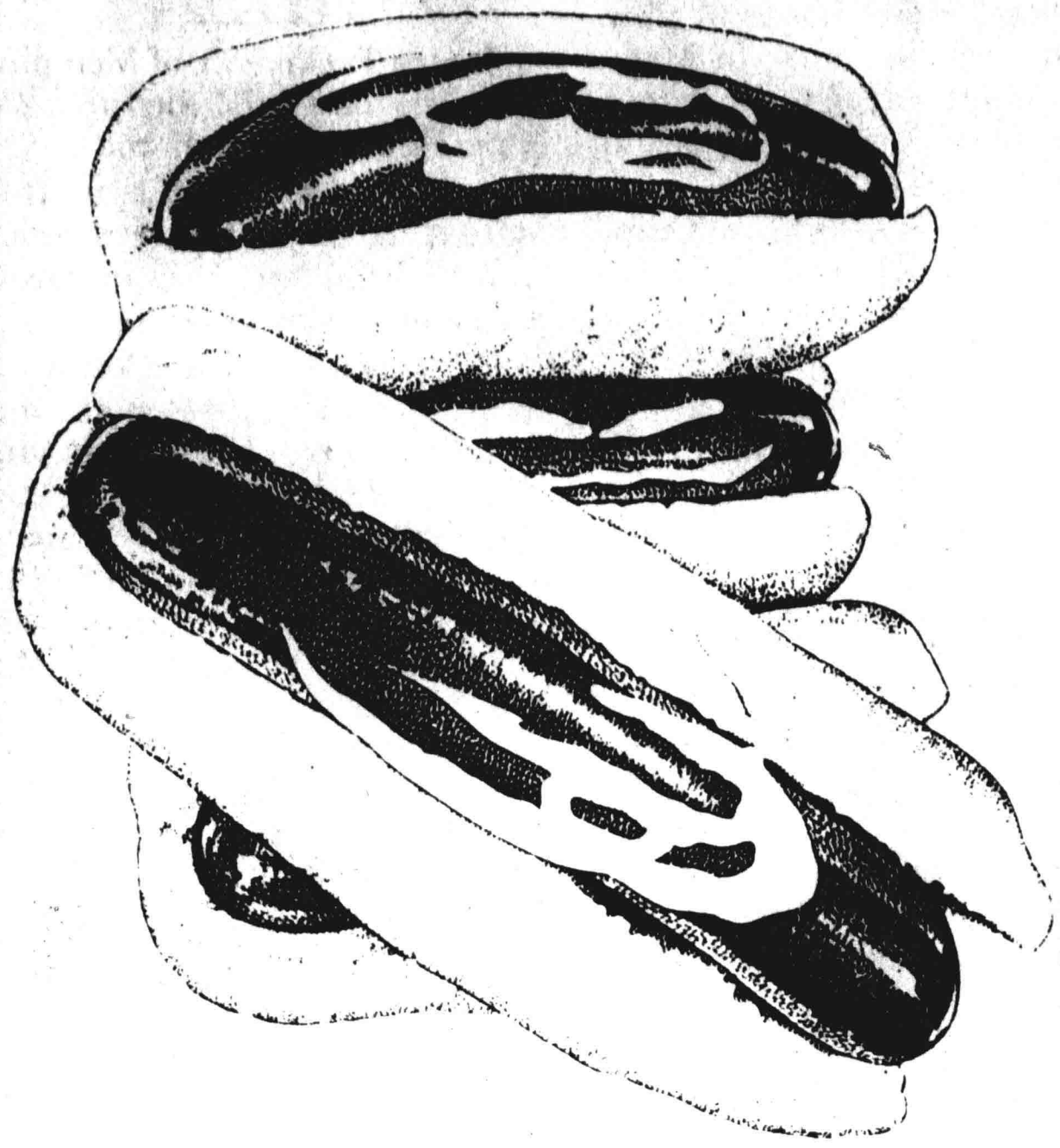

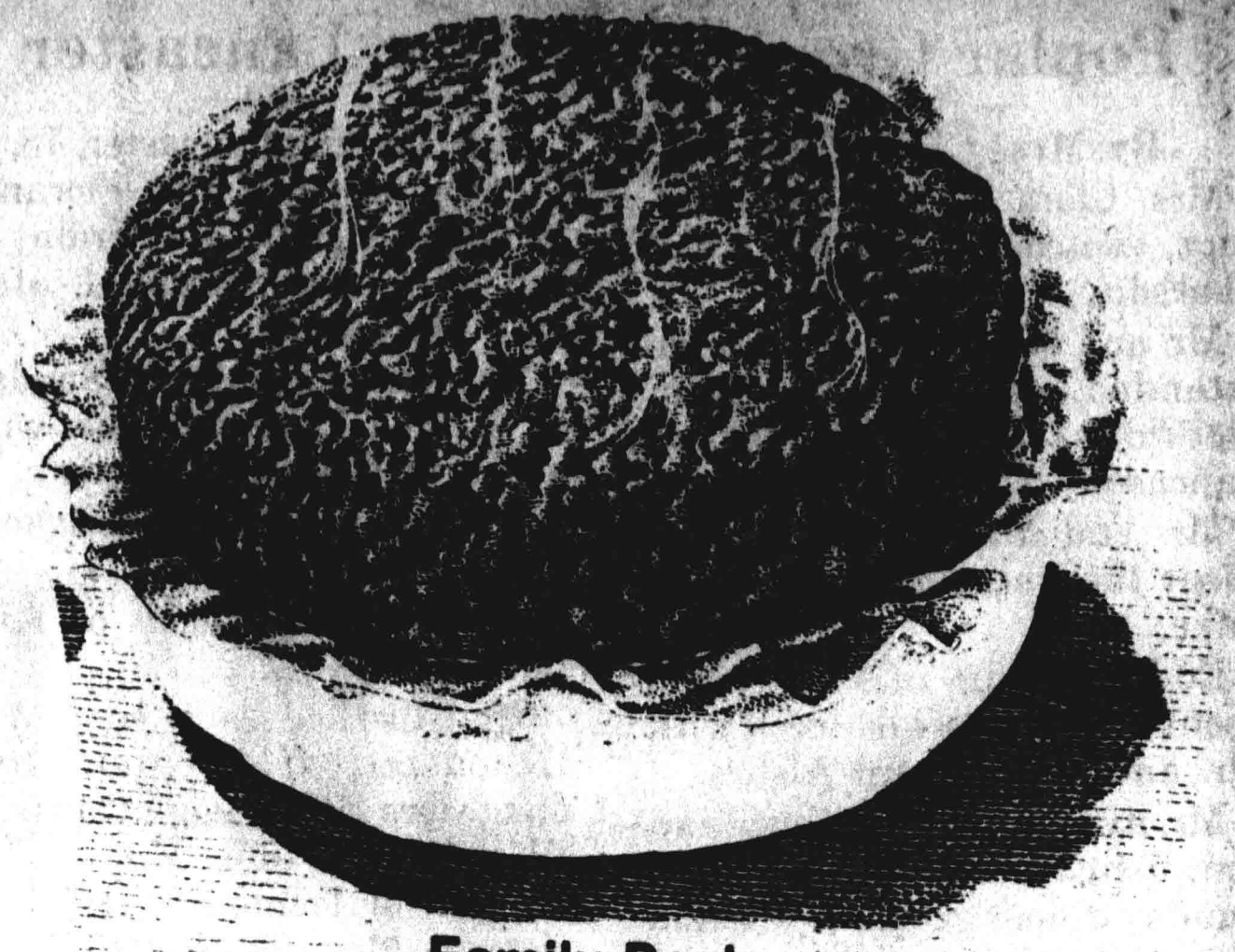
