Dog Helps Find Victim

Those Before And After Recount Bridge Horror

Tommy Allred, of Cedar Grove Sub-Division near Ripley, and his family were returning Saturday from shopping in Memphis, he says, when they crossed the central span of the Hatchie River bridge on the northbound lane of U.S. Highway 51, at the Lauderdale-Tipton County line, and were bounced against the roof of their vehicle.

Just behind them, Larry Noel, who formerly operated a shop on Hurricane Hill Road near Henning, was even more fortunate, Allred says. Noel's is the last vehicle reported to have crossed the span before it plunged into the river in the nation's third worst bridge collapse ever, in lives lost.

Both drivers stopped at the first available telephone, at the state's road-side Haley Park just over Crutcher Hill north of the bridge, Allred reports. He says he provided a quarter for Noel to place an emergency call.

By the time that call was completed, at least eight lives had been snuffed out by the failure of a bridge completed in 1934, last inspected in September, 1987, and then rated by the state in "poor" condition "due to overall deterioration and alignment."

George Haynie, 54, and his brothers, Clyde, 52, and Oneal, 42, of Ripley, who operate a Gulf Service Station just south of Penny Pantry in Covington, had closed the station about 8 p.m. and were

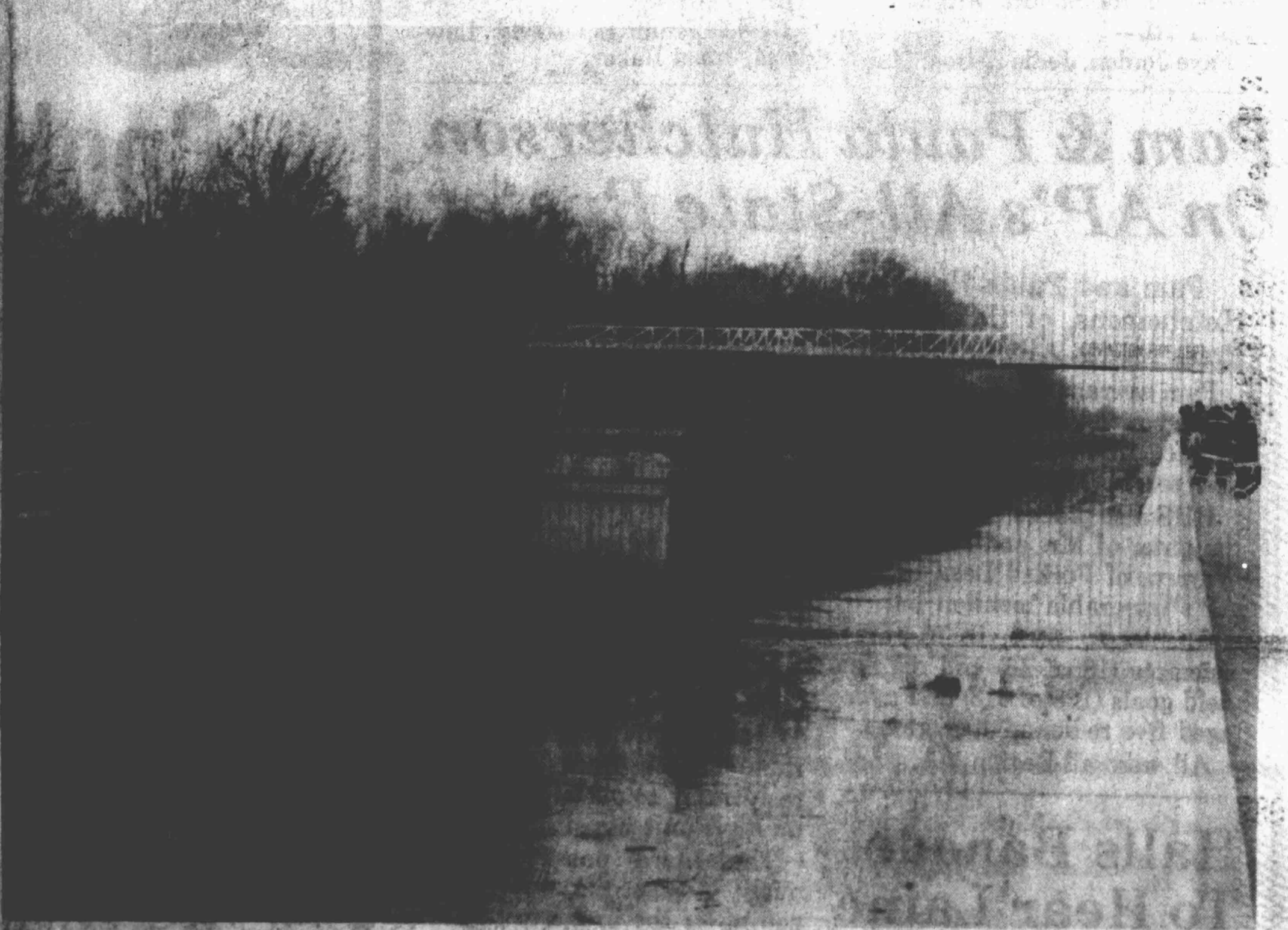
headed home in a GMC van.

Oneal was driving, George beside him, Clyde sitting behind. They say they saw a tractor-trailer ahead pull into the left lane, as if to pass two cars they could see, when its tail-lights jit-

tered. Oneal braked in time to halt the van about 12 feet short of following the other vehicles into the swirling waters of the rain-swollen Hatchie.

The Haynies blocked the road with their van and ran back south on the bridge to wave down 12 or 15 other vehicles, before a Covington police officer arrived.

The tragedy drew media attention world-wide, including a visit by David Fowler, staff writer for *The Civil Engineer*, magazine of the Institution of Civil Engineers, based in London, England.

It seems that almost every day the media carries a story about another example of waste in federal government activities or abuse of government programs. Just recently, the Air Force announced the grounding of all 97 B-1B bombers in its fleet because of a problem with its wings. The problem, as I understand it, is that these airplanes have a swing wing that changes positions as the speed of the aircraft changes. The Air Force decided to ground its fleet of these strategic bombers after the swaging action of one of the airplanes ruptured the fuel system. An investigation has been initiated.

The point is that these kinds of problems with government procured equipment and government programs are sometimes first revealed by people within government who report defects in equipment, abuses within programs, and waste in projects. These people have become known as "whistleblowers." By and large, they are career civil servants who act out of a sense of duty to their country and their government.

Unfortunately, these "whistleblowers" have too often been harassed, passed over for promotion, or reassigned to less responsible positions. In short, because they brought attention to a shortcoming in a federal program, their careers were placed in jeopardy in a variety of ways.

Congress just passed needed legislation aimed at protecting these people from retaliatory actions by their superiors, or coworkers. Frankly, it is rather disappointing to realize that legislation of this type is needed.

Government workers who point out program deficiencies, who report instances of waste and abuse in government programs deserve to be treated with respect not degradation. Nonetheless, those who have reported these kinds of problems with the government have found that their actions resulted in serious problems for them personally rather than enhancing their reputation as dedicated public servants.

The legislation passed by Congress and sent to the President for his signature seeks to correct this terrible inequity through the establishment of an Office of Special Counsel in the Merit Systems Protection Board. Unfortunately, this is the second time Congress passed this legislation because President Reagan vetoed an earlier version prior to his leaving office.

Federal employees who step forward to expose mismanagement, abuse, and waste in federal programs deserve these protections. The truth has always been a valued commodity in our society and we, as public ser-

vants, should take actions to insure that it is also valued in the service of our country.

Hopefully, this new statute will provide federal employees the incentives and protection they need to work diligently to assist Congress and the administration in making sure government functions properly.

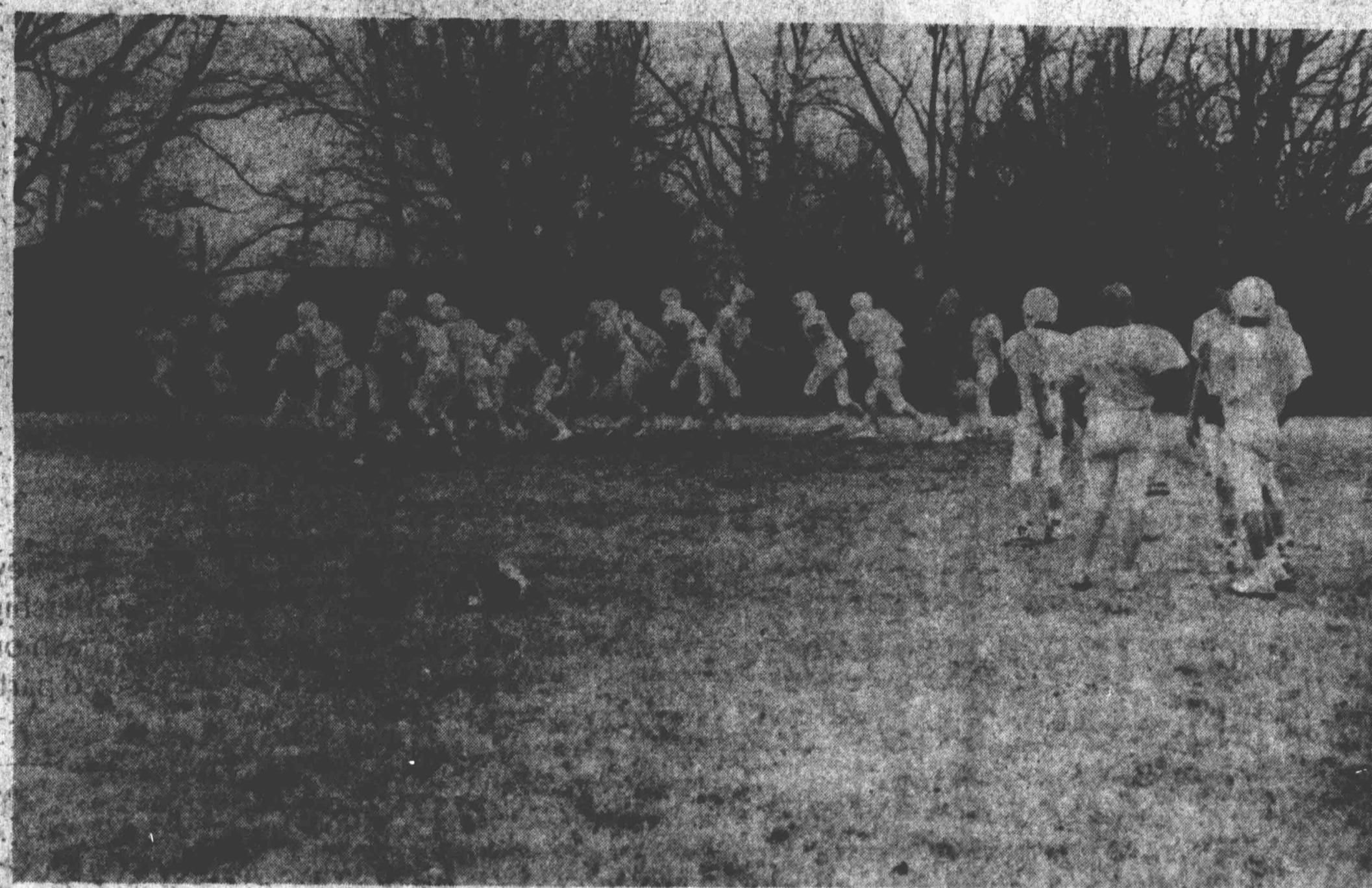

BURRITOS FOR A FIESTA

Several years ago I developed a wonderful burrito recipe for the Mexican menu at the Scripps Memorial Hospital in San Diego. It contains no dairy products, contains no added fat, and it is vegetarian.

I like to use whole-wheat flour tortillas for my burritos because of the excellent flavor and added fiber they provide. For people who have no problem with dairy products, cheese

can be added along with the bean mixture, if desired. Even people with dairy allergies might find they can tolerate a little of an aged cheese, such as a wonderful aged Cheddar.

This recipe is a fun, easy and inexpensive way to celebrate a fiesta, such as Cinco de Mayo, in your own home. Serve these burritos with shredded lettuce and chopped tomatoes or your favorite salsa.

- BEAN BURRITOS**
 1 1/2 cups dry pinto beans
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1 clove garlic, minced or pressed
 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
 2 quarts boiling water
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 1/2 cups chopped onion
 3 cups chopped tomato
 1/2 cup finely chopped cilantro
 1/2 cup chopped canned green chilies
 1/2 teaspoon cumin
 1 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
 8 whole-wheat flour tortillas
- The day before serving:
 1. Place beans, 1/2 cup onion, garlic and black pepper in a heavy kettle. Cover with boiling water. Simmer, covered, over medium heat for 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 hours, until beans are tender. Add additional boiling water as needed to ensure ample broth.
2. When beans are tender, salt to taste and let cool. Store in refrigerator.
- The day of serving:
 1. Drain beans, reserving 1 cup broth. Place beans in food processor. Add reserved broth and process until consistency of refried beans (chunky-smooth).
 2. In a non-stick pan, cook 2 1/2 cups onion and tomato until soft. Add beans, cilantro, chilies, cumin and chili powder. Cook, uncovered, over medium heat, stirring occasionally until liquid is reduced and beans do not run when spooned onto plate.
 3. Wrap tortillas in foil and warm in 375 F oven for 10 minutes. To serve,

Hospital Adding Doctor's Offices

Construction has begun on a 6,000 square foot Physicians Office Building on the grounds of Baptist Hospital Lauderdale.

The one-story building, with space for four physicians, is scheduled for completion July 31st, according to Bill Torrence, Jr., Hospital Administrator.

Occupying space in the modern facility will be Dr. S. M. Fern already in the practice of general medicine and surgery in Ripley, and Dr. Ron Rogers, surgeon, who will be moving here from Louisville, Ky., in time for the completion of the building.

"We're talking with several physicians in internal medicine and are very optimistic that one of these physicians will be joining us here," said Torrence. "Very likely, we'll have at least three of the four offices filled by the time the building is completed."

The POB, situated at the northeast corner of the hospital will be adjacent to the outpatient department and connected by a 70-foot covered, heated, and air-conditioned walkway of smoke-grey glass and metal.

Two separate entrances will allow patients to enter the POB from either of the hospital's two parking lots. A large common waiting room will service each of the four reception desks. Each physician will have four examining rooms.

Allen Searcy Building Contractors, of Union City, was awarded the contract on the building, at a cost of \$48 per square foot.

"The building will be paid for by the hospital," explains Torrence. "Each doctor will rent the space used for his office."

The POB will aid us tremendously in recruiting and keeping high-quality doctors to add to our already well-qualified staff," he says. "We want to continue to offer the very best to this county."

Trustees of the hospital—Warren Nunn, Powers Smith, Earl West and Henry West—along with the medical staff and administration, have felt the need for such a facility, Torrence says.

"The construction of the Physicians Office Building is an important part of the hospital's comprehensive marketing and service delivery plan," explained Torrence. "We want Lauderdale Counties to receive their treatment here at home."

Having access to the resources and facilities at the world's largest privately owned hospital is another definite plus, the administrator feels.

A 75-square foot helicopter pad, meeting Federal Aviation Administration requirements, is also under construction on the

east side of the emergency department of the hospital.

Within 14 minutes after leaving BMH-Lauderdale, a critically ill patient will be at the larger hospital in Memphis.

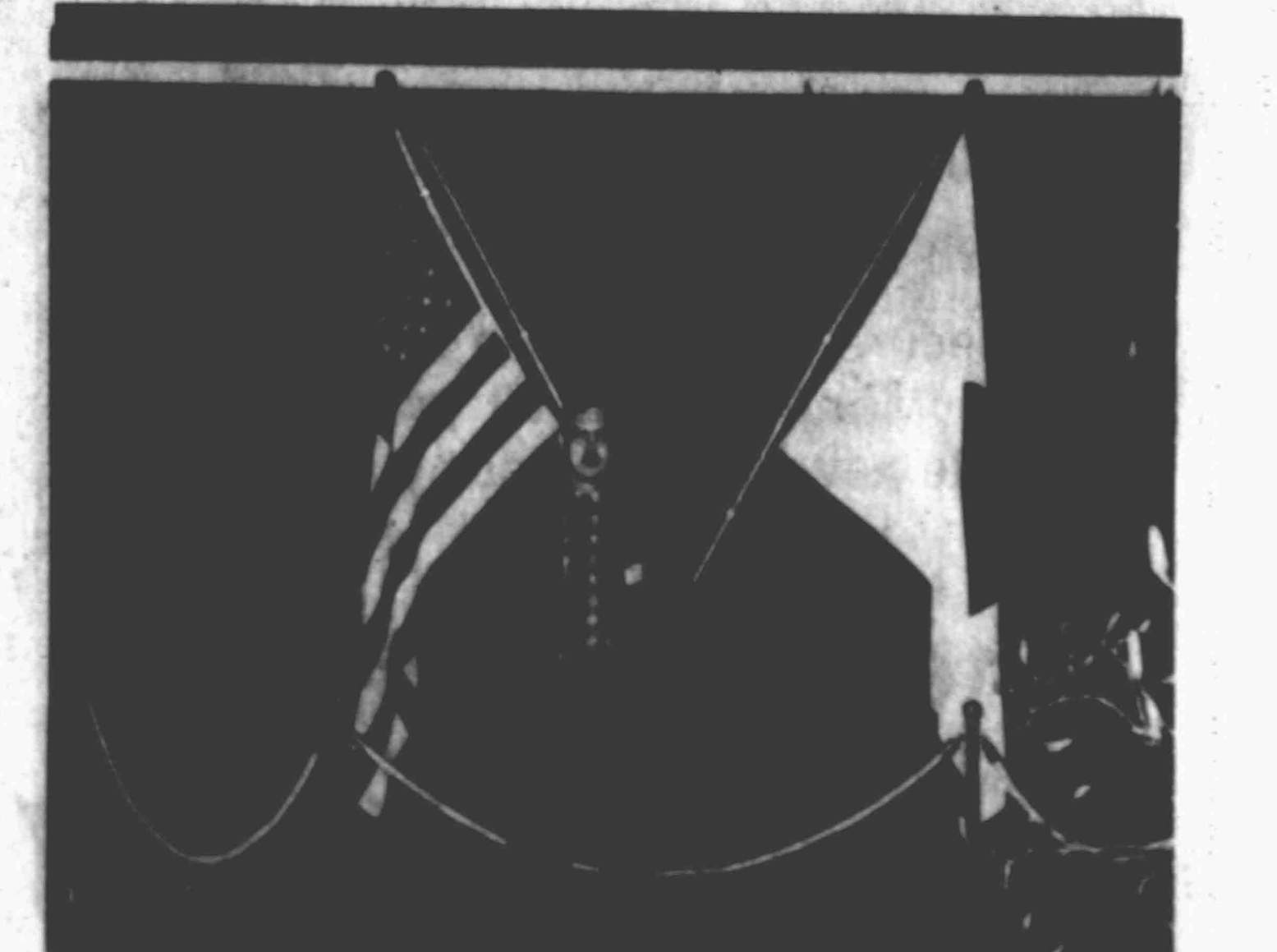

A Report for Tennesseans

THE WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTION ACT: TOWARD A BETTER GOVERNMENT

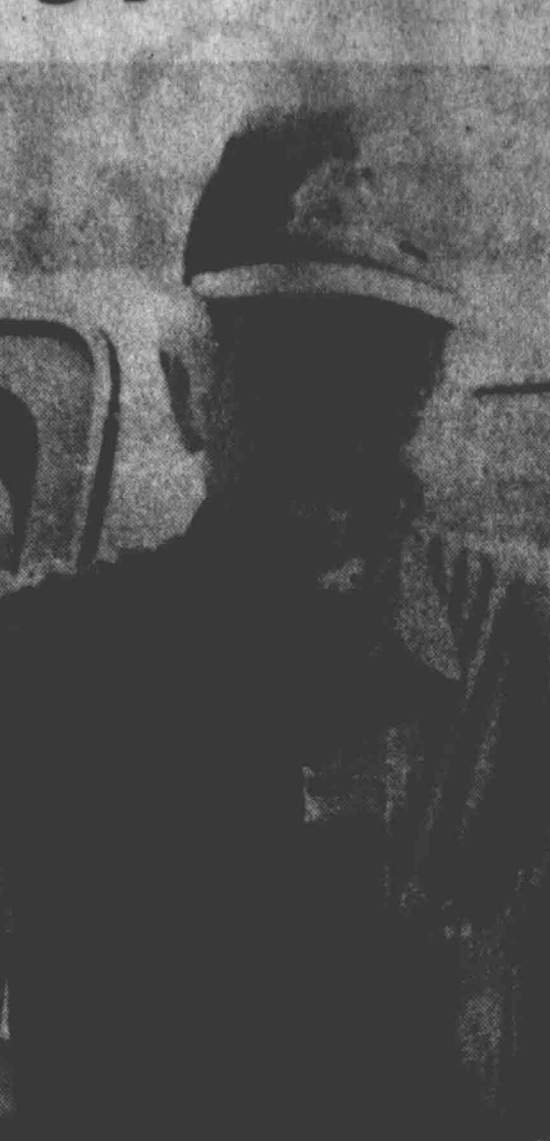
Last month, Congress approved the Whistleblower Protection Act, a bill designed to improve protections for federal workers who blow the whistle on government waste, fraud, and abuse. I am proud to be an original cosponsor of this urgently needed legislation. Many federal employees have information about an incident of waste, fraud, or mismanagement that could help correct the situation, but are reluctant to report it. In fact, a recent survey showed that 60 percent of employees observing abuses remained silent out of a sense of resignation that nothing would be done, and 37 percent remained silent out of fear of reprisal.

Unfortunatly, these fears have been well founded. In 1978, the Office of Special Counsel was created as a part of the Merit Systems Protection Board to investigate civil service law violations and protect employees, including whistleblowers, from agency reprisal. Instead, the special counsel adopted a policy of protecting the civil service system against employees, rather than the other way around. For instance, rather than investigating allegations on an employee's behalf, the special counsel has in effect required the employee to prove his case at the outset.

To make open disclosure even less likely, agencies often retaliate against employees who blow the whistle, and here again, the special counsel has come down on the side of the agency rather than the employee it was designed to protect. In fact, up to 99 percent of alleged reprisal cases have been closed by the special counsel without disciplinary or corrective action against the agency. The Whistleblower Protection Act would address these problems by making several critical changes in the existing system. For example, it makes the Office of Special Counsel an independent agency so that it will be freer to protect employees. It also specifically clarifies that the special counsel's primary obligation is the protection of individual employees. Further, "this legislation" will make it more difficult for agencies to retaliate against whistleblowers. First, it prevents the special counsel from disclosing the name of a whistleblower unless it is necessary to protect the public health and safety. Second, the bill modifies the burden-of-proof provision both so that it is less cumbersome for the employee to show that he has been retaliated against, and so that, conversely, the agency must provide more evidence to prove that any reprisals taken against a whistleblower would have occurred even without his whistleblowing.

These are a few of the specifics of the Whistleblower Protection Act, which I believe will go a long way in protecting federal employees who seek to correct waste, fraud, and abuse around them. The Whistleblower Act is another way in which we are working to improve the federal government for the citizens it serves, and I will encourage President Bush to sign it into law as soon as possible.

Jim Peery Reflects On HHS Re-Union

Dear Family Friends:

Apopka, Fla. is my home town, but Halls, Tenn. is my home, hometown and the place where I finished high in May, 1967.

During the early part of 1988, several people in Halls began to discuss and plan a re-union for the graduating students of the classes of the years of the 1920s and 1930s so they decided the day of the gathering and meeting would be Saturday, October 29, 1988.

A member of one of the early graduating classes of the 1930s suggested the date of October 29. I suppose many of the former students would not really notice too much why that date was used. J. B. Ellis, who lives in Knoxville, Tenn., and attended the University of Tennessee.

After finishing high school at Halls and playing football at HHS and UT, he noticed that the Vols had an open date and were not playing a game of football on October 29, 1988. So, what better time to have a class re-union at Halls. Anyway, thanks J. B. and thanks community of Halls for organizing a very appropriate get-together.

So for several months I spent time planning my trip to West Tennessee. Yes, Mary Ann, my wife of 40 years was part of the traveling.

Now, rather than drive from Apopka to Halls and back to Apopka in the manner that we usually had, I developed sort of a tour and visitation trip.

We planned to leave Apopka early in the morning of Thursday, October 20, with reservations previously made at a Hampton Inn at Birmingham, Ala. In and around Birmingham, I had addresses and phone numbers for two of the football players who had played on the first high school team at Halls in 1946 that I had coached.

Too, plans called for Halls High Tigers to play a football game on Friday, October 21. But before the game time, the Band Club was sponsoring a soup supper and I wanted to make each of the events, which I did. I also had a chance to talk with several people while I ate soup and watched the game afterwards and walked around and talked. It was all very enjoyable.

Another important aspect of this trip was that the UT Vols were playing Memphis State the next day, Saturday, October 22, at the Liberty Bowl.

For entrance to the Halls game, I just happened to meet Dorris Rodgers, one of my former football players, and he worked us into the game. He was always good at getting the correct things done. Before leaving that night to go back to Alamo where Mary Ann was with

her mother and we would be there for a few days, he was telling that I was going to see the Vols play to bring them good luck. Anyway, Tennessee won that game and four more for the fall of 1988.

Now, back to Birmingham and my conversations with the two football players of 1946. I did not know the person who lived in the city of Birmingham first and his wife, the former Martha Bell Yarbro, answered. We talked a few minutes, then guess who, Bobby Wells, her husband and I talked for at least 45 minutes. We patted, we passed, we ran touchdowns, we got penalized but we won most of the games that year. Because of getting to talk with Bobby, when I got to Dyersburg, I had the opportunity to talk with Bob and Alene Moseley, who is Bobby's sister and brother-in-law. Bob always took an interest in the ball teams at Halls.

The second person and former player at Birmingham lived outside the city and was long distance. He was Wesley Johnson who played guard. I supposed I hadn't seen Wesley and Bobby since 1947 at graduation which was about 41 years ago. Wesley said he left Lauderdale County rather soon after graduation and had lived in Alabama practically all this time. He enjoyed my time on the phone with Wesley. He and Van Doyle Sanders played the same guard position and as Henry Murchison labbed that time, were messengers, who delivered the plays to Wymond Stallings to call in the huddle. Worked well, too.

I have seen James "Casey" Jones from time to time. He and I talked with him a few times in the last three or four years. I had promised him if I ever had a chance to visit him in his home and his wife, Freda, in their home.

So, on Wednesday, October 26, the time had come. I left Alamo that morning but before getting to Florence, where I had to stop but right at Savannah to see Pete Anderson at Savannah High School, a man I had worked with at Halls High School for about five or six years. Pete coached boys basketball and was the assistant football coach most of the time. He was head football coach for one year.

One day during Pete's early tenure, several men were having afternoon coffee in the drugstore. They were very interested sports supporters. Farnsworth Pugh said to Pete, "Coach, we don't care too much about boys basketball around here, just girls. In fact, after the girls game, everybody gets up and leaves." I thought Pete was going to fall under the table.

Another day that year, the Baptist preacher said, "Coach, I understand you are the type of coach who can take your players today and beat mine and then tomorrow you can take mine and beat yours." Pete really beamed about that. Too, he was a winner and still is! (We did have more than coffee breaks at Halls).

Pete is now the athletics director at Savannah. I had lunch (another freshie) and spent three or four hours with him which was most

hadn't seen for a period of time. Murray Blorton and I who had played football for Halls together (then he attended Memphis State on a football scholarship and played tackle for those "Tigers" while I was at Union University playing football for the "Bulldogs" and going to school on a football scholarship) had some conversation and coffee for a short while in Dyersburg.

Marion Carroll, who lives in Newbern and Trimble, and I had breakfast in Dyersburg one morning and visited for three or four hours. This was time well spent. Marion played guard at Union, again, I had to try to make touch-downs. While at Union, Marion and I took our first airplane ride together on a small plane one bright sunny afternoon at Jackson, a place with scenery to Eric can learn to be, maybe a farmer, work and build up those muscles to play ball.

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Pete is now the athletics director at Savannah. I had lunch (another freshie) and spent three or four hours with him which was most

enjoyable. From Savannah, I rode that road to Florence to locate Casey Jones, the man who as a football player at Union University played the same position I did. He came there as a freshman when I was a junior in college. When I was a senior and Casey a sophomore, I have all these years said I am happy that I didn't have another year to play because I know I would have had to sit on the bench and I did not like that. Casey made All-America at Union. He was an outstanding football player for Union!

Casey's brother, Ralph, who played end for Union for a few years, was around, too. These Williford, who went to Union one year is still around Florence and telling everyone what a great player he was. He could have been if he stayed around. Anyway, my visit to Florence and spending time in Casey and Freda's home was most appreciated.

When I left Florence, I took the road to Collinwood. I had never been on that road, neither had I been to Collinwood. Again, this was part of my planned trip last October. In fact, I still have the note her brother, Dr. Hutson McCorkle, my dentist in Orlando, Fla., wrote her home telephone number and Bank of Collinwood phone number on. Her name now is Carolyn Brewer, wife of the banker, Jasper Brewer, there and she has a position in the Wayne County School System. She rides around in a big car. She told me what her title is with the school system but I have forgotten. We had a very interesting conversation for several minutes. Most of the time was spent talking about the basketball teams she played with during her high school days and I was fortunate enough to be their coach for three years. Ah! did they work to succeed and I can imagine each one of them have been successful in their adult lives.

Many people after they have visited different parts of the country and states speak about the scenery of the landscape. Remember, this was the last week of October 1988, people think about changing of the leaves, etc. I must say much of the surrounding countryside from Savannah to Florence and from Florence to Waynesboro, is the most beautiful spot I have ever seen. Trees with golden brown and orange leaves, a few green spots and large fields with green vegetation. Just beautiful!

So, on my way back to Alamo, Halls and Dyersburg to prepare for the re-union, I must go. But before leaving Waynesboro, which is north of Collinwood on Highway 64, I had to stop at a convenience store for a Milky Way and Pepsi to refresh myself for the trip to Lauderdale County, Tennessee, that is, Casey, not Alabama.

How should you prepare yourself for a few hours to be with a group of people, who some may have been associates of yours, in some form, which in this case had spent a few years of our lives attending the same school system, no one really knows. But it is an aspect which everyone should have the opportunity of once in a lifetime. As I told the group while assembled in the auditorium, I had been to conventions, reunions of family groups, my Army branch, college get-togethers, high school classes I had attended and classes I had helped at their graduation but I believe this was the finest of the fine and had to be a pinnacle for me.

I talked with people I had never known and I spoke with those I had to study out before I could recall who they were 50, 60 years ago. Others, I did not get to speak to.

Now, I hesitate to try to name each one I was fortunate to just speak with but some I would like to mention.

One person, about two years younger than I am who engaged in conversation with me, was B. W. Jordan. Also, his brother, Aubrey, shot me with a B.B. gun and hit me in the buttock as I was delivering the Press-Scimitar when I was in seventh grade.

Again, I thank each one of you who spoke to me and I was very happy to have the chance to see as many of you as I did.

Again, thank all of you for helping a good time to end in a happy time.

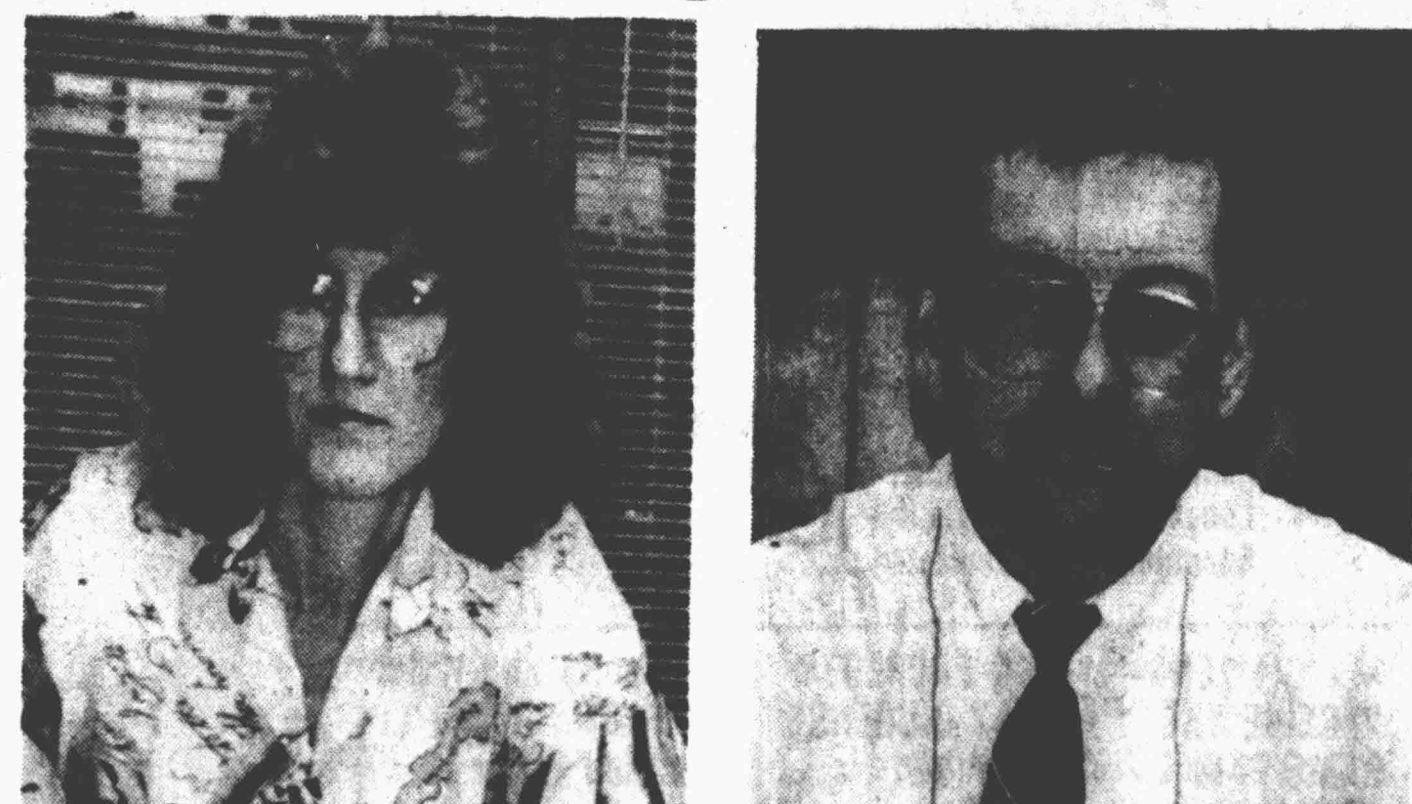

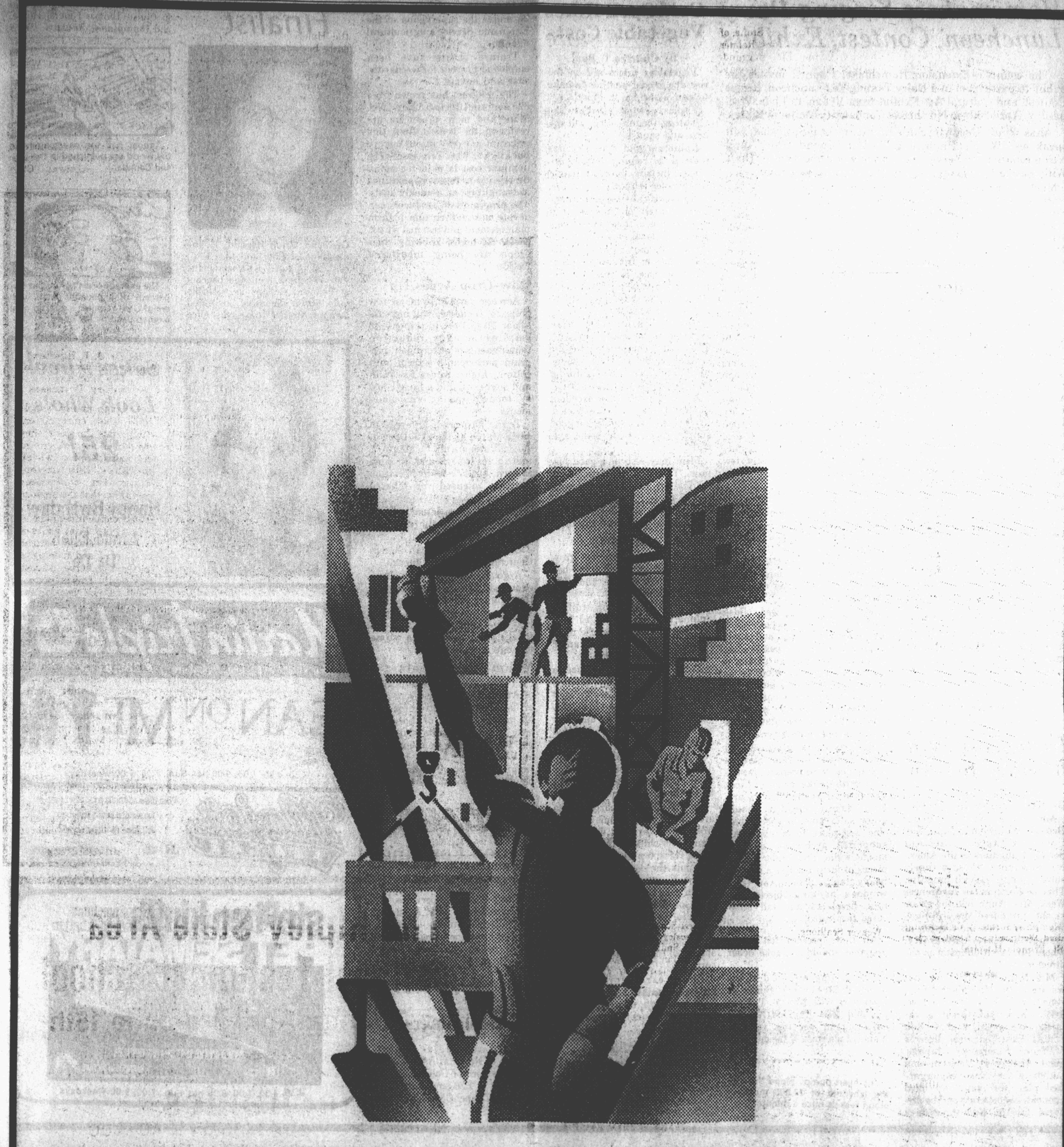

Earthquake Peril Reported To DAR

Mrs. Oliver Nunn, National Defense chairman of the Key Corner Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, chose a timely subject for the March program. This is Earthquake Awareness Week. Mrs. Nunn told the group as she introduced Mrs. Jill Stevens, of the Seismic Center at Memphis State University, where Mr. Arch Johnson is the director.

Mrs. Nunn told the group that she is in the New Madrid fault zone (Cairo, Ill., to Marked Tree, Ark.) where "the threat of an earthquake is real," said Mr. Ron Collins, West Tennessee director of Tenn., Emergency Management Agency in Jackson and author of the three year organization plan for state and local agencies to cooperate and be prepared for the first three days

Cold Spell Hikes Vegetable Costs

Vegetables prices are on the rise due to cold weather damage to new plantings in Florida.

Typical crops effected are tomatoes, beans, corn, cucumbers and squash.

California and Arizona crops seem to be coming down a bit. These include broccoli, cauliflower, and lettuce.

No significant freeze damage has occurred on tree fruit. If weather holds, there should be a very good local crop.

Carrots may be specially priced due to freeze damage of other produce. Florida, California and Texas all have large supplies. The best buys will be cellophane wrapped.

Spring onions are also expected to be specially priced. They will be coming from the Rio Grande valley in good volume until late April. The California crop is expected in mid-April.

An ample supply of excellent quality pineapples is expected. Prices have been stable, but good supply could create some specials.

Meat may also be a good buy now. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has come out with the best buy for three ounces of lean meat in December, Turkey and ground beef head the list.

Plant Corn Early
Plant corn early to grow stronger stalks which stand better, have less disease, and yield more grain or silage.

In experiments on rolling upland soils, corn planted May 1st produced 30 bushels more corn per acre than when planted in the same area June 1st.

Early planted corn produces a shorter stalk than late planted corn if the late planted corn isn't stunted by drought. Also, the stalks will be larger in diameter and stronger when planted early.

A May 1st or earlier planting date prevents heavy damage from girdling of the corn stalks by the Southwestern corn borer.

By planting corn early, planters are able to escape some damage from corn stunt virus. Corn stunt virus over-winters in Johnson-grass rhizomes, and early planting puts the corn ahead of the Johnson grass. The insects which take the stunt virus from Johnson grass to corn aren't as plentiful in the early spring as they are in late spring. Their small number limits the early spread of corn stunt virus to the corn.

Plant early for shorter, stronger stalks, higher yields, and less corn stunt virus and Southwestern corn borer damage.

Pest Management
The county's Extension pest management control program will soon be underway, Jerry Parker, associate Extension agent, reminds county farmers.

Trained scouts have been employed to scout for weeds, disease and insects.

The program has grown from 825 acres in 1978 to 5,825 in 1988. More and more producers are realizing the benefit from this program not only in our county but all over West Tennessee.

The nominal cost is paid for many times over as insect populations are monitored on a weekly basis.

The program's 36 producers can devote more of their time to farm management and not just a little easier at night, knowing their crops are being monitored weekly.

Row-Crop Acres Up
Acreage devoted to major row crops in Tennessee will increase about 2% in 1989, in response to smaller acreage reduction requirements of government program participants (except with cotton), higher prices for grain and soybeans, and a huge boost in tobacco quotas and allotments.

Tenn. farmers surveyed in early March by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture intend to plant 7% more acres to soybeans, 3% more to corn, but 17% fewer to cotton. Acreage intended for tobacco may rise 10%.

In recent years, actual acreage hasn't been greatly different from the survey results.

Of course, farmers can change their minds after the survey. A good example is corn. If as expected, the corn acreage intentions figure is interpreted as bullish by the market, corn prices may rise compared to soybean prices and encourage some acreage shifting.

Melon Assessments
In February's referendum, 52% of watermelon growers and 56% of handlers (accounting for 73% of melons grown or handled) approved assessments of up to 2¢ per 100 lbs. on both the grower and handler, by Jan. 1, 1990, to finance promotion under a 29-member National Watermelon Board.

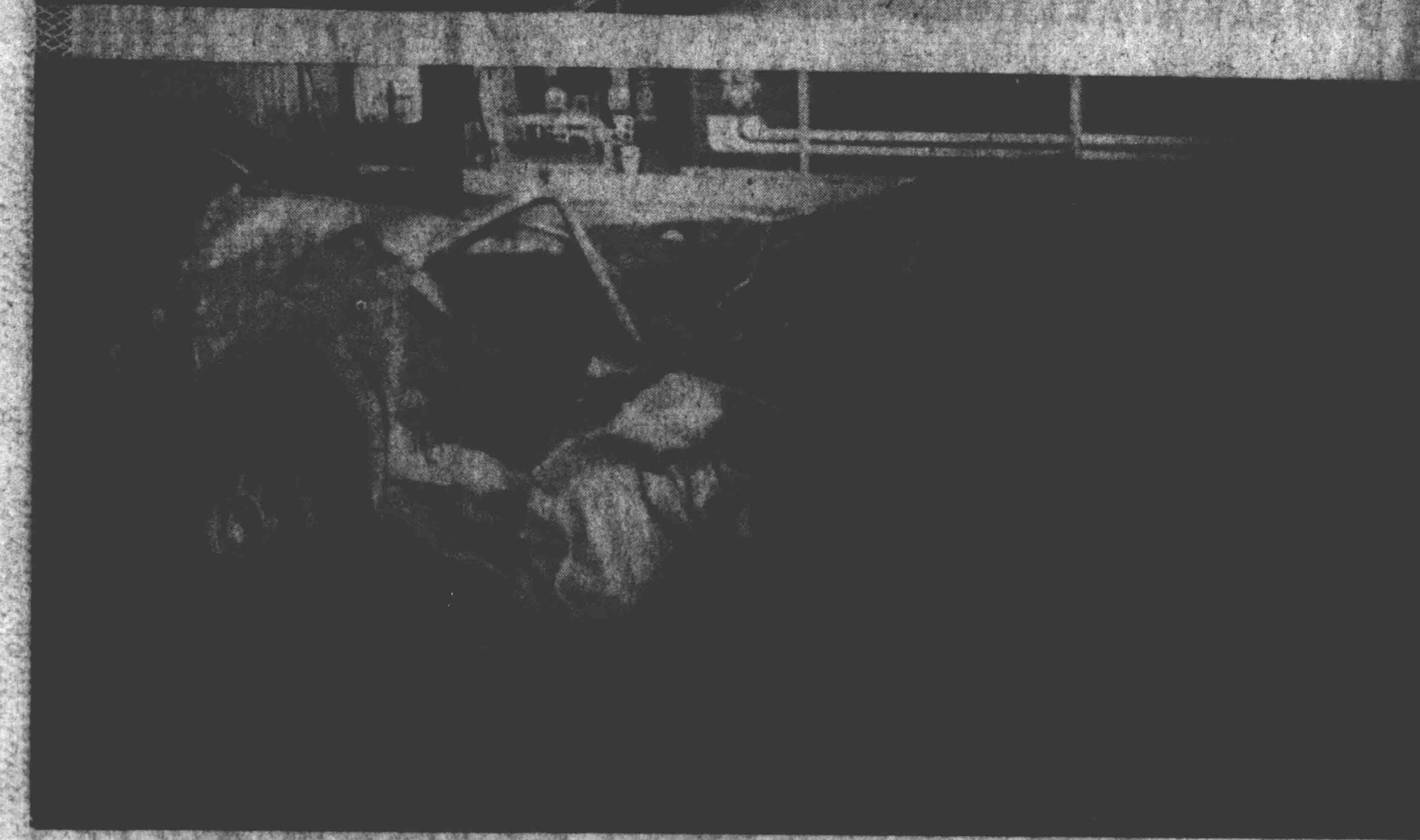

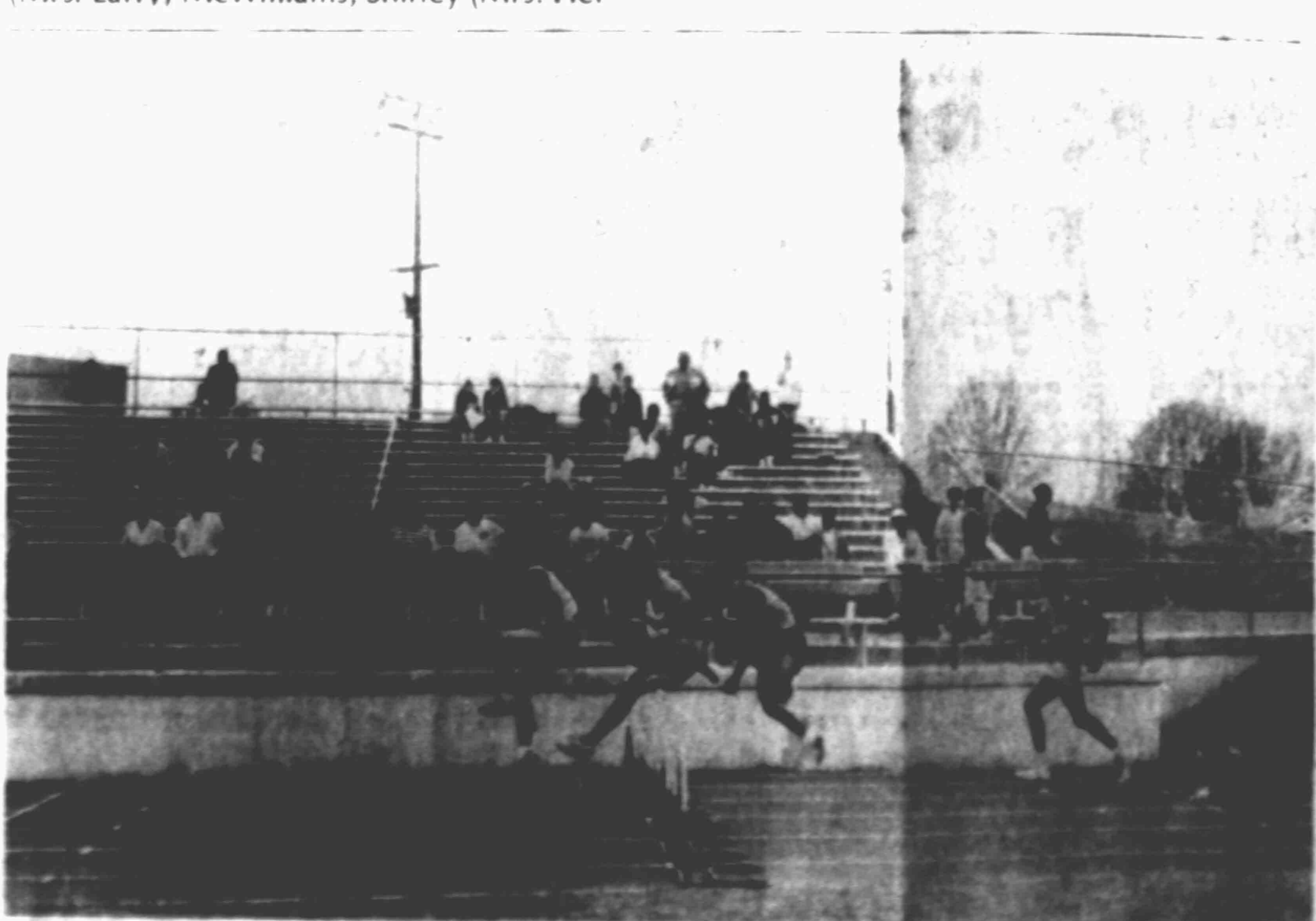
