Grand Jury To Get Tyus Death Report

As this issue went to press, District Attorney General Paul G. Summers, of Somerville, was scheduled to meet Wednesday with the county grand jury and present it with a report by the Tenn. Bureau of Investigation into the fatal shooting about 1:30 a.m. Nov. 11th of Willie Gene "Buck" Tyus, 19, by off-duty Ripley Police Sgt. Charles "Buddy" Smith, 34, who said Tyus was breaking into his apartment at 107E Willow Creek Cove in Willow Creek Village.

Summers said he would leave it to the jury whether or not to bring charges against Smith. He said this was customary proce-dure when officers are involved in deaths, to avoid any suspicion of partiality on his part in favor of officers with whom his duties require him to work closely.

The jury's deliberations are not open to the public. It does not conduct a trial; it only decides whether evidence sufficient to justify trial in Circuit Court.
