## TYUS CASE PROTEST

Ripley police Saturday escorted a march by about 50 persons, led by Isaac Richmond, of Memphis, from the Willow Creek Apartments on Volz Rd. to the courthouse.

The march protested the fatal shooting Nov. 11th of Willie Gene Tyus, 19, by Police Sgt. Charles "Buddy" Smith, when Smith said Tyus was breaking into his Willow Creek apartment.

Smith has been suspended with pay, pending investigation by the Tenn. Bureau of Investigation. The FBI's findings, if any, have not been made public, nearly a month after the event.

## Holiday Events At Fort Pillow

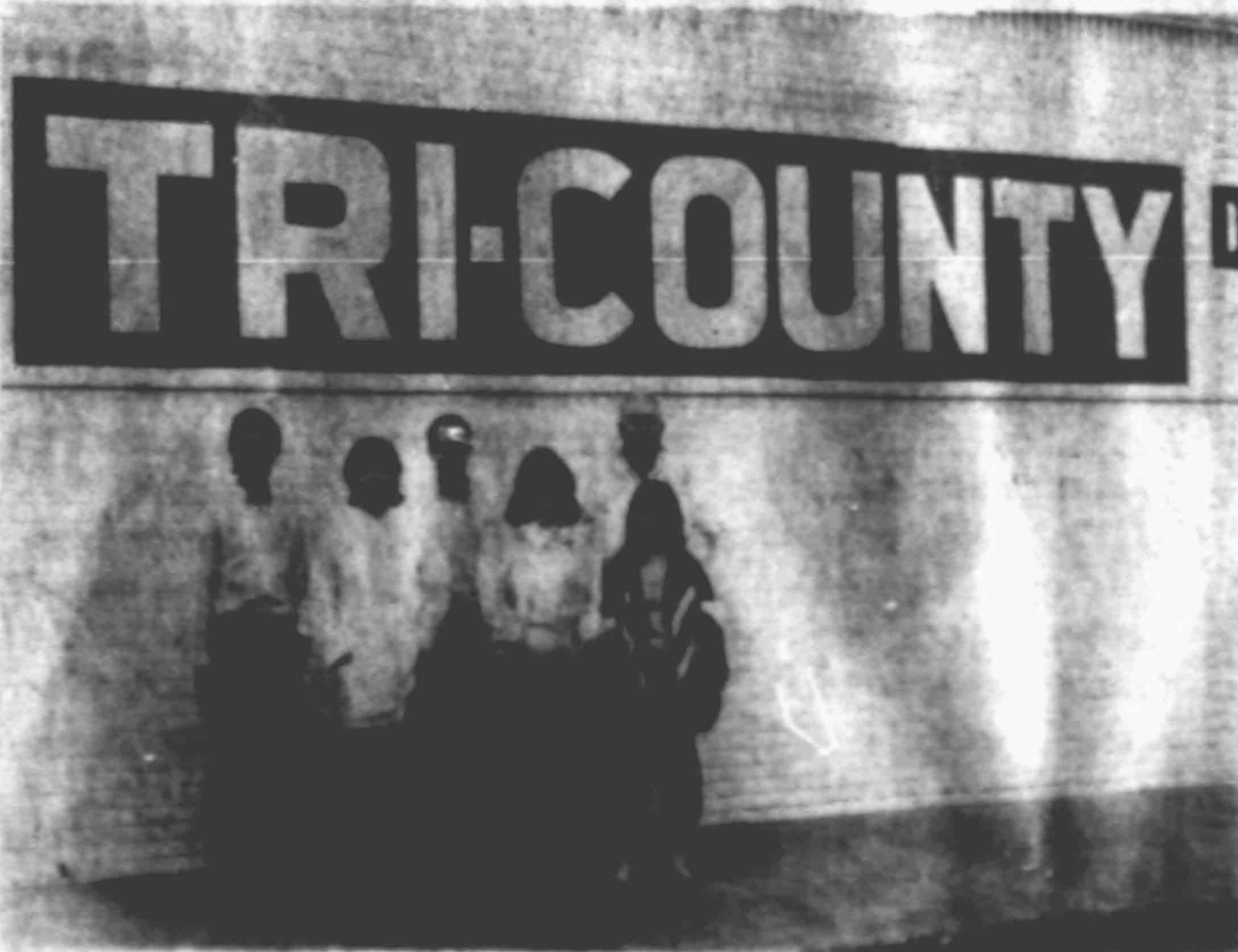

## TBI, Jury Find No Guilt In Tyus Case

The 13-member Lauderdale County grand jury, which decides whether evidence is sufficient to hold a person for Circuit Court trial, heard a Tennessee Bureau of Investigation report and agreed unanimously Wednesday of last week that Ripley police Sgt. Charles "Buddy" Smith "acted properly under Tennessee law" in shooting Willie Gene "Buck" Tyus, 19.

The full text of the grand jury report follows:  
"Charles Smith, 34, lived at Ripley, Tennessee Apartments with his family on November 11, 1989. At approximately 12:50 a.m. the deceased, Mr. Tyus, attempted to break into the apartment of Mr. Smith. The room where entry was being sought was occupied by Mr. Smith's minor daughter. The daughter alerted Mr. Smith who saw a man's arm inside a window attempting to break into his home. Mr. Smith identified himself as a policeman and fired a shot at the intruder and did not hit the individual.

"Mr. Smith went outside of his apartment and saw a man running whom he identified as the burglar, shouted several times for the individual to halt and fired a shot at the man with his personal revolver. The bullet entered the man's neck, and the person injured was identified as the previously described burglar.

"Mr. Smith said that he, prior to shooting Mr. Tyus, saw something shiny. Mr. Tyus, who died several hours later, had a large shiny chain around his neck and a large medallion attached thereto.

"The authorities were immediately called after the shooting. As the investigation continued, the District Attorney General (Paul G. Summers, of Somerville) requested an independent probe by the TBI. Mr. Smith, a Ripley Police Department Sergeant, has not worked as an officer on the department since the shooting.

"The Grand Jury heard testimony from Special Agent Edward Simpson, TBI, and Police Chief Bob White. After hearing testimony under oath and reviewing all of the investigative facts, the Grand Jury finds as follows:

"1. Charles Smith was acting as a police officer when he fired the shot.

"2. He followed police standard procedure as directed by the Ripley Police Department.

"3. He has never fired his weapon before this shooting except during training exercises.

"4. Mr. Tyus was burglarizing Mr. Smith's home. Mr. Tyus has previously been convicted of burglary, and Mr. Smith was an arresting officer.

"5. Several burglaries and rapes have recently been reported in the area where the shooting occurred. Mr. Smith gave warning of his being a police officer and warned that deadly force might be used.

"6. Mr. Smith had probable cause to believe Mr. Tyus committed a felony involving the threatened infliction of serious physical harm.

"7. Mr. Smith had probable cause to believe Mr. Tyus posed a threat of serious physical harm either to himself or to others in the community unless Mr. Tyus was immediately apprehended.

"8. Under the circumstances the Grand Jury finds Mr. Smith acted properly under Tennessee law."

The report was signed by Ben Emerson, foreman, and members Charles E. Fuchett, Lynn Kennedy, Kaye Fuller, Rhonda Neek, Jerry G. Eiker, Phyllis R. Sealand, LeWanda D. Roberson, Matthew G. Joyner, Richard Johnson, Mary Joan Patton, Davis S. Spiller, and Sherri B. Harrison.

Saturday, 11 adults and six seniors, led by Isaac Richmond of Memphis, began a protest march from the death scene, the Willow Creek Apartments on Vels Road, to the courthouse. They were arrested when they

refused to leave South Washington, near the Pizza Hut, where sidewalks begin, to continue via sidewalk.

## Unusual characters abound in old Christmas legends

In today's America, with street corner Santa the norm, and children across the country growing up charmed by TV versions of Santa's story, it may be hard to believe that there is a multiplicity of demons and other frightening apparitions associated with the Christmas season, as well.

But, in fact, in the Yule legends of a myriad of countries, these figures have their place, part of the mystery and excitement that have their roots in the pagan past, and which infused Christianity as Christianity itself changed to absorb and accommodate the diverse peoples to whom it reached out, and whose lives it strove to change.

Thus, from the snow-clad lands of the distant north, to the sun-kissed Mediterranean, demons peek out of Christmas lore, instilling glimpses into all-but-forgotten traditions, which in turn invite us to inquire into a past even farther removed.

One of the most persistent legends, in a myriad of countries, is of a demon who accompanies Saint Nicholas on his travels.

In Holland, it is Black Peter who goes along with Saint Nicholas when he makes his gift-giving rounds, carrying for Saint Nicholas his sack of presents, and making sure that the appropriate gifts are sent down the chimneys of each home, and into the waiting shoes of the children of each household.

Not frightening but merely playful is the Danish imp and trickster, the Julenisse, who is rewarded for the practical jokes he orchestrates.

He can usually be found in old farmhouses, often in the attic, dressed in his traditional costume which incorporates gray clothes, white clogs, and red cap and hose. How anyone has determined his attire remains a mystery, as no one but the family felix has ever encountered him.

Danish farmers show their wisdom by making peace with the Julenisse; this they accomplish by feeding him rice pudding on Christmas Eve. In return, the Julenisse guards their animals.

In Czechoslovakia, Black Peter's role is taken by Cert, Garbed entirely in black and carrying chains and a whip, Cert follows behind Svaty Miklas (Saint Nicholas) as he makes his rounds.

While Svaty Miklas rewards the good children with gifts, Cert uses the tools he carries to punish those who have erred.

In some parts of Austria, Cert's counterpart is the Klausbaum, who accompanies Saint Nicholas on the visits he makes on his holy day, December 6th.

More a beast than a man, the Klausbaum has horns, a furry coat, a black visage, burning eyes and a tongue as lengthy as it is venomous. Wearing only rags and restrained by chains, his appearance is usually sufficient warning for children who have been tempted to misbehave.

Elsewhere in Austria, the Klausbaum's role and responsibilities are assumed by Krampus, who threatens naughty children with the whip he holds. He never gets to put his threats into practice, however, because of Saint Nick's benign and timely intervention.

Hans Trapp, a German demon, is another character of this type. He, like the Klausbaum, is bestial in nature; his face is bestial and his outfit is a bearskin. It is the Christkind (Christ child), rather than Saint Nicholas, whom he is believed to precede, on his journey to distribute presents.

Needless to say, Hans Trapp's role in the legend is to frighten the children he encounters; this behavior continues until he is sent off by the Christkind's arrival at the scene.

In France, Pere Fouchette, whose name derives from the word for the birch rod he carries, accompanies Father Christmas on his rounds.

However, while Pere Noel rewards with presents those children who have behaved all year, Pere Fouchette uses his rod when necessary, and has even been known to cart off, on occasion, the very worst boys and girls in a basket which he carries for this very purpose.

Even more threatening are the Greek Kalikantzaroi. Like many figures out of ancient Greek mythology, the Kalikantzaroi are only half-human.

These evil creatures spend their miserable lives underground, dedicated to the dubious work of destroying the roots of the tree which, legend says, holds up the earth. However, at Christmas, their labors end in failure, as the tree is revitalized by Christ's birth.

In their fury, the legend continues, the Kalikantzaroi emerge from the depths of the earth to assault their anger, which they do through a series of often cruel practical jokes.

They can be discouraged, however; methods for accomplishing this feat range from suspending the jawbone of a pig in the chimney or on the door, to keeping the Christmas log burning merrily on the hearth, to throwing old shoes or salt onto the fire, in the hope that the resulting odor will repel the evil ones.

#### MOLASSES GINGERBREAD CUTOUTS

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vegetable shortening
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 4 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- Sugar

In large mixing bowl, cream together sugar, shortening and egg at a medium speed until fluffy. Add molasses, mix until combined. Stir together flour, salt, and spices. Add to mixing bowl and mix at a low speed until well combined. Refrigerate 2 hours.

Roll out on floured surface to 1/4" thickness. Cut with shaped cookie cutters. Place on greased cookie sheet. Sprinkle top of cookies with sugar.

Bake in preheated 375°F oven for 10 minutes. Cool on wire rack. Decorate as desired.

Yield: 3 dozen cookies.

#### CRANBERRY ORANGE NUT BREAD

- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup orange juice

- 1 tablespoon grated orange peel
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 cup whole pecans or walnuts
- 1 cup fresh cranberries, sliced

Preheat oven to 350°F. In large mixer bowl, combine dry ingredients. Add juice, peel, shortening and egg, mix at a low speed until well blended. Stir in nuts and cranberries.

Put into a greased 9x5x3 inch pan. Bake 55-60 minutes. Cool slightly before removing from pan.

Remove from pan and finish cooling on wire rack.

Yield: 1 loaf.

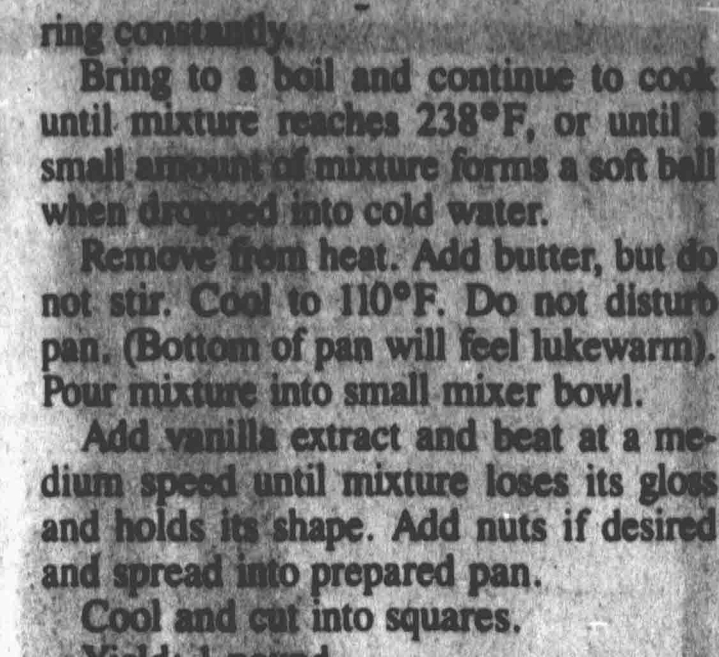

Add vanilla extract and beat at a medium speed until mixture loses its gloss and holds its shape. Add nuts if desired and spread into prepared pan.

Cool and cut into squares.

Yield: 1 pound.

A person that is dead is dead. Beer or whiskey cost all of us tremendously. If may even cost us our life! Get the picture?

We've all heard, I am sure, the old adage, "Actions speak louder than words." Apply this to illegal drugs and beer in Lauderdale County.

There are those who say, "We need the tax from beer." It is reported that for every one dollar a county gets from the tax of beer, it costs that county three dollars. - 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup flaxo light or dark corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 unbaked (9-inch) pie shell

In medium bowl stir eggs, sugar, corn syrup, margarine and vanilla until well blended. Stir in pecans. Pour into pie shell. Bake in 350° oven 50 to 55 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean. Cool on rack. Makes 8 servings.

**Chocolate Pecan Pie:** Reduce sugar to 1/3 cup. Melt 4 squares (1 or each) unsweetened chocolate with margarine.

**Kentucky Bourbon Pecan Pie:** Add up to 2 Tbsps bourbon to filling mixture.

### Ole Man River Is Claimed Hiking Death Rates Here

Mississippi River pollution is being blamed for killing more than fish and wild-life.  
Human death rates in counties along the river, from Cairo, Ill., to the Gulf of Mexico, average 14% higher than in the rest of the nation.

A 2-year study by Greenpeace, an organization for environmental protection, included a voyage down the river from St. Paul, Minn., to the Gulf, The Associated Press reports.

The Greenpeace ship, *Beluga*, found pollution increasing downstream, especially below large poisonous discharges from St. Louis, Mo., Memphis, and Louisiana. Human death rates along the river reflect the variations in pollution rates, the Greenpeace study says.

Greenpeace says:  
The river carries 218 million pounds of poisonous chemicals per year past New Orleans, La., which draws drinking water from the river.

Beginning at river's mouth, the Gulf contains a 2.4 million acre "dead zone" which cannot support sea life.

Pollution comes chiefly from chemical makers; the makers and users of pesticides; pulp and paper mills; sewage treatment plants; and hazardous waste disposal facilities.

The Louisiana Chemical Assn. says its members in 1988 cut waste they are required to report to the Environmental Protection Agency's Superfund 9.1% to 89 million pounds.

No one knows how much more pollution did not require reports.

Critics say Greenpeace matching of death rates to pollution doesn't take into account many other factors in the counties along the river—poverty, urban locations, and smoking and drinking habits.

But Joe Thornton, who wrote the Greenpeace report with Pat Costner, a former industrial chemist, says "We're seeing an obvious pattern."

Mortality rates in counties along the river are higher than in the rest of the nation and tend also to be higher than the rest of counties in Mississippi river states.

**Record Corn Yield Set**  
Lauderdale County corn growers are boasting about the finest yielding corn crop ever produced.

Many producers here made 140 to 150 bushels per acre and some even more.

Timely June rain and plentiful July rain helped fill ears. Good weather and good September and October harvesting weather helped.

The crop will go on record not only as the one with the best yield per acre but also the largest state total since 1985.

**Cotton Acreage**  
The price outlook for cotton is much more favorable than it was a year ago because of tighter supplies and very strong demand.

Supply for the marketing year ending next July 31st is down about 11% from a year ago.

The 1989 crop was about 22% smaller than the huge 1988 crop, but old-crop carry-over stocks were large.

Cotton usage is expected to do extremely well, probably reaching 16,000,000 bales, a 14% increase from last year and the largest in 30 years. Both U.S. mill use and exports will gain ground.

Domestic mill use will probably increase 3% to 5% despite new-crop cotton textile imports. The gain in use is occurring primarily because of lower textile inventories and increasing demand for denim. Generally favorable economic conditions provide a good foundation for mill use.

Exports will probably jump

about 25% to the highest level in 10 years. Foreign production is about unchanged this year, but foreign mill use is increasing.

China is expected to be a net importer of cotton this year. U.S. cotton will satisfy about 80% of its import needs.

Cotton prices have climbed nearly 20% during the past nine months because of tightening world supplies and strong demand. Most of the price increase expected in this price cycle has already occurred. Although cotton prices are rather high and therefore vulnerable, no sharp crash is likely into late spring. By then, new-crop prospects will begin to dominate.

The 1990 crop will be larger than the 1988 crop, maybe much larger. Acreage may increase close to 20% because of a lower program set-aside and higher price. If weather cooperates and fields and abandonment levels are near average, crop size could increase nearly 30%. This might be enough to push spot prices next fall to the 66¢ to 68¢ range.

Opportunities to contract 1990 crop cotton at 65¢ or above are worth consideration.

### UT Martin Is Popular

The University of Tennessee in Martin draws 57.8% of West Tenn. students in the UT system (and 73.3% of those from other counties than Shelby).

UT Knoxville gets 27.6%, UT Memphis and UT Nashville share 15%.

UTM has students from 30 states and 34 countries.

The quality of students continues to rise: the average ACT score for the freshman class of 1989-90 was 19.5, up a full point from the 1988-89 class, and the high school grade point average of this year's freshman class was 3.01.

Of UTM's 1989 graduates, 93% found jobs or were accepted into graduate school within three months of graduation.

UTM successfully prepares more students for the Health Science Center in Memphis than any college in Tennessee." In 1988, all of UTM's nursing school applicants—and all of its veterinary school applicants—were accepted.

Pre-registrations for the 1990 spring semester are 9.51% ahead of those for 1989.

### Bass & Turkey Rules Revised

The state Wildlife Resources Commission has set a 15-inch limit, creel limit 3 per day, for bass caught from Reelfoot Lake, after February, when an angler anywhere in the state may possess only the daily creel limit while afield, and no game fish so altered that its species or body length cannot be determined.

This does not include blue-gill or other trout used as cut bait.

The turkey season (March 30-May 7) allows hunters to kill two bearded turkeys on a Wildlife Management Area and two during the state season, but the total bag or possession limit cannot exceed four per season.

Turkey taken on Fort Campbell or the Land Between The Lakes fall juvenile hunts, will not count toward bag limit.

Many turkey season changes include increased quotas and a second non-quota hunt in Shelby Forest. Get a free brochure, after March 1st, from license agents or the state.

The award is based on academic achievement, service to the community, leadership in extracurricular activities and potential for continued success.

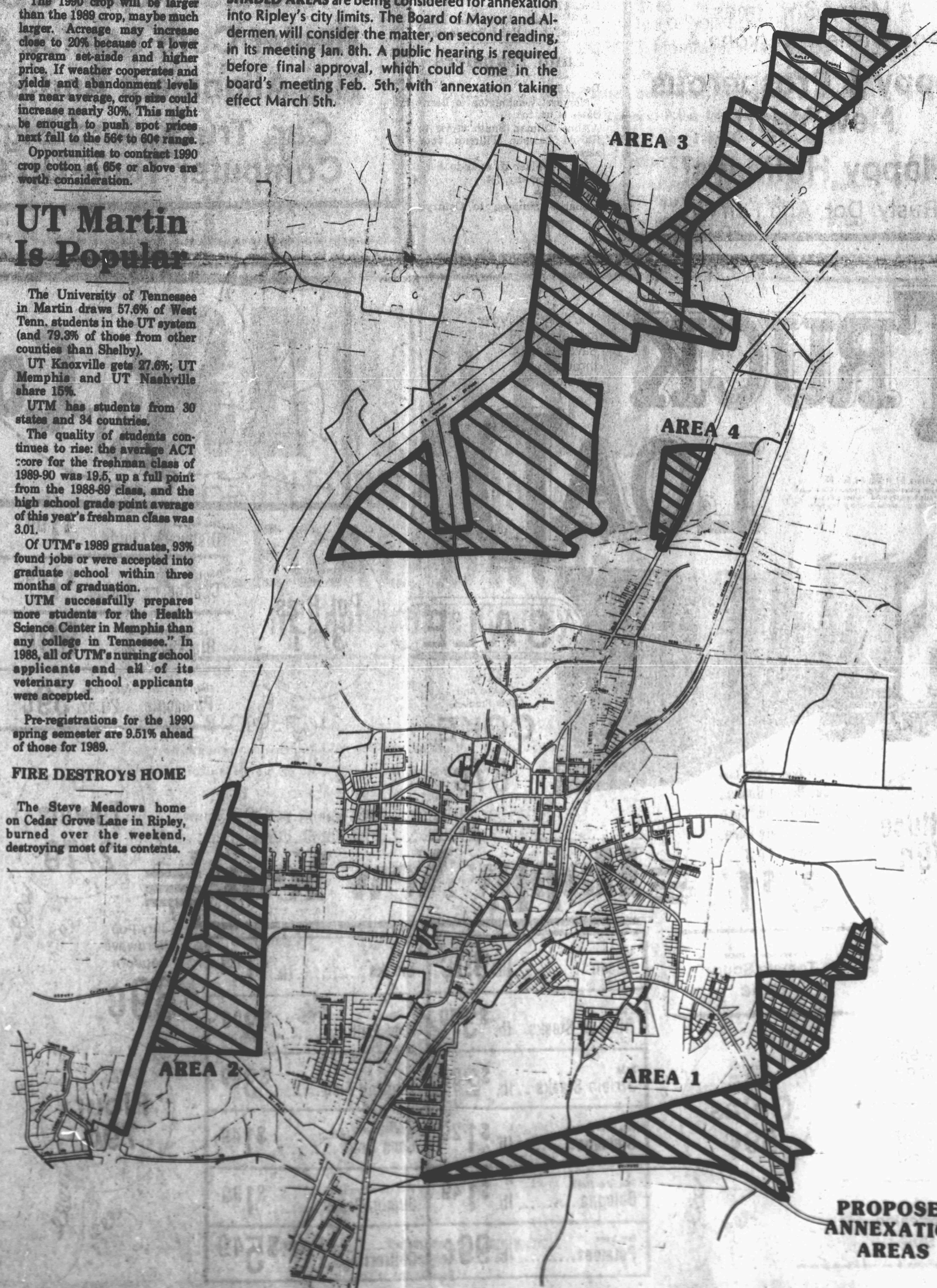
### SHOAF'S FERRY SANK
