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Halls Girls Keep Winning As Boys Turn The Corner

Halls High School's girls' basketball team, 210 after a 56-44 win from West Carroll Friday, Tuesday climbed another notch in the Associated Press state Class A rankings, to second, lagging only Clarkrange, 22-1.

Recovering from flu slowed some of the Halls Lady Tigers down against West Carroll, but Pam Hutcherson had 18 points and her twin, Paula, 14.

Halls' girls breezed past Lake County Tuesday evening, 63-25; Paula Hutcherson scored 16, Pam 14, and Gina Waren, 11. HHS's boys evened their season record, 10-10, with a 68-65 win from West Carroll, and added a win Tuesday from Lake County, 72-68.

Thomas Robinson led the Tigers with 22 points against West Carroll and 20 against Lake

County. Derrick Cliff posted 17 points Tuesday, and Louis Williams had 10.

Halls History

The Halls High School Home-Coming of the Roaring Twenties and Depression Thirties is over, and I know you hope I will never mention it again in this column.

I have never reported how it started: Nearly two years ago, while Fred Whitaker was visiting relatives in this area, he called Emogene Chaney Griffin, Pansy Perry Holtsford, and Elizabeth Nunn Palmer to call members of their Class of 1930 to plan a re-union in 1988. They met in the Hut in Dyersburg (no longer there, but it will never be forgotten by us oldies) for a Dutch treat lunch.

Somehow, Frances Moore Hendren, of Dyersburg, Lois Salisbury Brandon, Charles Rooks, and my husband and I got invited. We were all expecting to see J. B. Ellis, great football player, Marvin Nunn and Henning Andrews, all members of the famous quartet, "The Shirt Tail Rattlers", but Henning was the only one who made it that day.

When any teacher asked her students for a volunteer mother to do most anything, my three children would volunteer me. I managed to keep my mouth shut that day until they began to plan their re-union. I came up with the idea of letting classes in school during the same era meet with them, especially since Frances Moore Hendren's and Charles Rooks' classes had never had a re-union. Members of the Class of 1930 present didn't care if we did, and Fred Whitaker really liked the idea.

I agreed to do the publicity, and Frances, Lois, Charles Rooks, my Charles and I prom-

ised to help anyway we needed to, in order to get the job done.

Being a Methodist, I fell from grace several times in that I promised the class representatives I had secured from each class that I would get different people's addresses for them. I have found several that I got but never gave to the proper representative, as I filed them where I lost them.

Anyway, several people (Lloyd Smith, of Memphis, and several others) never got an invitation. Others were invited so many times they chose not to come, and some that just wrote that they were coming anyway, even though they graduated after 1930.

There was one complaint—that we should not have had a program—as people were there who never saw everybody they wanted to see, and besides there was a football game on television, and Speck Hurt and Marshall Pierce, Jr., had to leave after eating, as no program could come up to that football game.

I got to the school 1½ hours before folks were supposed to get there. The front door was open already, and the whole hall was full of people who had come a distance. The greeters who were supposed to meet and greet and register all were few in number. The maintenance engineer who

was supposed to open the classrooms for us was nowhere to be found. Had David Parrish not known his supervisor, we would have never gotten into those rooms.

After being crammed up in those halls for what seemed like an eternity, the classrooms were opened, but some people never found the room in which their class was meeting. I saw people I wanted to hug and greet and at least know to whom I was talking (Sara Patrick Hayes, Class of 1929, of Humboldt, knows my son, Cary, there).

Finally, I got my breath after trying to help different ones to find their classes, and I asked Pansy what time it was. She told me five minutes till one. I nearly fainted; we were supposed to eat at one. Then Emogene saved my life, she said, "No Pansy that is not right, you asked J. B., and he is on Eastern Standard Time."

Oliver Nunn has closed out the account at the Bank of Halls. Every bill has been paid and the rest of the money (between \$550 and \$600) given to the school's annual staff (sponsored by Nancy Hart) for restoration of old high school pictures.

Paula (Dunaway before marriage), teacher of the commercial department, has between 40 and 50 booklets left over. The entire school staff (with the exception of that guy we couldn't find to open those doors) helped us in every way.

There are two booklets—Halls High School, 1911-1912 and Halls High School—Home-Coming Classes, 1920's-1930's, for sale at Halls High School.

I don't know what they are charging for them, but in my opinion they are worth more if you ever attended Halls Schools.

I will close with this one last story:

Parker Cherry was sitting across the table from me and asked if Bibbie Zelma Crittendon was there; he wanted to see her, as she had been his sweetheart in the third grade. I looked around and thought I found her and hollered to the one next to her to punch her. They did, and I asked her if she remembered Parker Cherry, she said, "Yes, he was my sweetheart in third

grade." I had already told Parker where she was, and he was on his way for their re-union.

THE 101st CONGRESS: TIME FOR HOUSING LEGISLATION

Having a decent and affordable place to live is one of our most important priorities in this country. Homes provide stability, both economic and personal. Home is where our families gather together, where our children grow up, and where we form friendships with our neighbors.

Unfortunately, too many Americans are shut out of the housing market. Some are homeless, some can only barely afford to pay their rent, and others who want to buy a home can't afford to make the downpayment. The upshot is that we need to address a whole spectrum of housing issues that face our citizens, and the sooner we do so, the better.

I am extremely hopeful that legislation addressing these issues will be passed in the 101st Congress. The need for such legislation is becoming more and more pressing, and consequently we in Congress are working hard to create a bill that is acceptable and useful to everyone.

The Senate Subcommittee on Housing, on which I serve, is deliberating on a bill called the "National Affordable Housing Act". This bill will address a wide variety of housing issues such as rental housing, housing for the elderly and handicapped, and the problem of homelessness.

As part of this effort, I am introducing my own bill designed to help young homebuyers purchase their first home. Statistics show there has been a 20% drop in the number of persons ages 25-34 around the country who own homes. Unfortunately, Tennessee is affected by this trend as well. For example, statistics show that the percentage of first-time homebuyers in Nashville is much smaller than it is in other parts of the country.

The reason behind this decline is that while most new homebuyers can afford to make monthly payments on a house, they have trouble accumulating the large lump sum of cash necessary to make a downpayment.

The Homeownership Assistance Act that I plan to introduce empowers the Federal Housing Administration to insure mortgages with downpayments that are below those required under current law. In addition, the Act will increase the FHA's ability to insure adjustable rate mortgages, and will guarantee that homebuyers have equal access to an FHA mortgage no matter where they live. Lastly, the bill provides for two demonstration projects to meet the special needs of first-time and low-income homebuyers.

Of special importance is that this program does not draw on already limited federal revenues -- in fact, it generates money in the form of mortgage premiums. This preserves other federal funds for low-income renters and the homeless.

When taken together, the changes proposed in this bill will make it a great deal easier for young people in Tennessee and all across the country to purchase a first home for their families.

Owning a home is an important socioeconomic goal for most young Americans, and I plan to do everything I can to see that they can reach that goal. I am extremely hopeful that this Congress will successfully pass legislation that will help enable all Americans to live in affordable, decent homes.

COOK IT LIGHT JEANNE JONES

TAMED-DOWN WILD RICE SOUP

Dear Jeanne:
The enclosed recipe is really delicious, but it is loaded with fat, calories and cholesterol. Since my husband and I must both watch what we eat, is there any way you can modify this Wild Rice Soup for us? Thank you for your help.

WILD RICE SOUP
1 cup wild rice
3 cups water
1/2 cup butter
1 pound onions (2 medium), chopped
1 pound celery (4 ribs), chopped
1 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced
1 cup flour
8 cups chicken broth
1 pound cooked turkey, chopped (4 cups)
1 pint half and half
1 teaspoon salt (or to taste)
1/2 teaspoon pepper

1. Cook the rice in the water over low heat, covered, for 40-45 minutes, until tender. Rinse well in warm water. Set aside.
2. Melt butter in a large pot and saute vegetables until tender. Add the flour and chicken broth, the cooked rice and chopped turkey.
3. Cook 30-45 minutes over medium-high heat. Stir often as mixture will stick. Just before serving, add 1 pint half and half. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
Makes 16 cups.

Thank you for sharing this family favorite. I have scaled down your recipe for those who have smaller families and wouldn't want so much soup around.
My revised soup is perfect for people with wheat allergies because I used some of the rice as the thickening agent instead of flour. This keeps it wheat-free and also eliminates the calories from the flour -- not to mention the possibility of hives! It did result in slightly less yield in volume, however.

Your original recipe tasted much like cream of chicken soup with rice. I think my revision, while not exactly the same in taste and texture, has a much fresher taste with the flavors of each ingredient standing out more. I would normally use non-fat milk instead of low-fat milk in this recipe.

however, in this case I specify low-fat because it more closely resembles the original flavor of your soup.
I hope your family will enjoy my version of your Wild Rice Soup.
WILD RICE SOUP
1/2 cup wild rice, rinsed
well in warm water
3 cups water
1 tablespoon corn-oil margarine
1/2 pound onion, chopped (1 1/2 cups)
1/2 pound celery, chopped (1 1/2 cups)
1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced (3 cups)
4 cups defatted chicken stock,

heated to simmering
1/2 pound cooked turkey, chopped (2 cups)
1 cup low-fat milk
1/2 teaspoon salt (omit if using salted stock)
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

1. Combine the rice and water in a sauce pan and bring to a boil. Cover and cook over low heat for 40-45 minutes or until rice is tender. Drain off excess water.
2. Melt the margarine in a large pot. Add the onions, celery and mushrooms. Cook until vegetables are crisp-tender, about 5 minutes. Add water if necessary to prevent scorching.
3. In a blender container, combine 1 cup cooked rice and 1 cup hot chicken stock. Blend until completely smooth. Add to the vegetable mixture along with remaining stock, rice and chopped turkey.
4. Cook 30 minutes over medium heat, stirring often to prevent sticking. Add the low-fat milk, salt and pepper just before serving.



Election Is Near

In a little more than two months the bi-annual election of the Town of Halls will be held on May 4th. Qualifying time for candidates is, we believe, 60 days prior to the election.

At this time we have no knowledge of any person or persons who will seek the office of mayor or on the six member board of aldermen. Only about two weeks remain before qualifying petitions must be filed.

The next board of mayor and aldermen can expect some difficult times with even less federal funds expected to be available. State and local governments apparently will be expected to take over some of the load which has been paid for with federal funds.

Money which had been available for many local projects must be locally funded if federal funding is cut. For that reason many items will be deleted and others will be cut back but the need for the maintenance for streets, sidewalks, gas and water systems will still exist. Local voters should be seeking answers from candidates as to what steps they will expect to take to finance these programs.

The Pay Raise Fiasco

Tuesday of last week Congress voted and President Bush signed a bill ending the proposed 5½% pay raise for members of Congress, federal judges, the President, and other high executive officials after a storm of protests by voters. Congress had attempted to avoid voting on the proposed pay raises but public opinion forced a vote.

It seems to this writer that some pay increase is needed because of the high cost of living in Washington, D.C. and the need to maintain two homes by members of Congress. Perhaps federal judges and other officials also need pay increases but a 5½% hike was unreasonable with the continually growing budget deficits and the efforts of congressmen to avoid a vote on the issue left a bad taste in the mouths of voters.

We are almost sorry that the pay raise was defeated.

It would have been interesting to see just how long is the memory of the average voter and how many would have lost their congressional seat if the pay raise had gone into effect without a vote. Each election 98% to 99% of members of Congress seeking re-election are returned to office. We wonder if this average would have been maintained.



QUALITY EDUCATION: OUR FUTURE DEPENDS ON IT

(THE FOLLOWING IS EXCERPTED FROM A SPEECH GIVEN THIS MONTH BY TENNESSEE SENATOR JIM SASSER AT THE NATIONAL SCHOOL BOARDS ASSOCIATION'S ANNUAL CONFERENCE ON FEDERAL RELATIONS. SASSER IS CHAIRMAN OF THE SENATE BUDGET COMMITTEE.)

Recently the Senate Budget Committee heard very compelling testimony from the Council of Competitiveness, an organization of leaders from industry, labor, and higher education whose goal is to improve the ability of American companies and American workers to compete in the global economy.

Their testimony was most sobering. They noted that our massive budget and trade deficits have transformed us from the world's largest creditor nation to the world's largest debtor nation. But even worse, the Council said this has come at a time when we, as a nation, have been unable or unwilling to make the investments we need to boost our long-term productivity and thereby maintain an increasing standard of living for our people.

Clearly, if we are to become a more productive nation, we have to have a strong commitment to education.

And, unfortunately, most indicators on the education front show that we are falling behind on the education challenges before us.

How are we to respond to these problems [including a future lack of teachers, lack of affordable child care, and an enormous high school drop-out rate] during a time when we also have to watch every dollar and bring down the federal budget deficit?

First, I believe we need to identify and support those programs which have both a positive impact on future economic growth and on reducing public sector costs in the future.

For example, it is estimated that for every \$1 that we invest in Head Start preschool education programs, we can reduce by nearly \$5 future costs incurred in special education and public assistance costs.

Second, the Budget Committee, over time, I believe, will be seeking from all agencies of government more information on the pay-offs of their particular programs so that we can reduce funding for ineffective or outmoded programs and apply our scarce budget resources to those federal programs that are the best and brightest in terms of their economic and social payoff.

We can have a leaner and meaner budget. We can both reduce the budget deficit and still maintain the programs — education and otherwise — that are the investment for a better tomorrow.

To quote the Council on Competitiveness: "It [education] is laying the foundations for an increasing standard of living and for our own international competitiveness well into the future. ... We have to close the gap between the skills needed for future jobs and the capabilities of our current work force."

So we must continue the commitment to effective education programs at the federal level.

But we can not do it alone.

We need help from state and local governments as well.

Since the 101st Congress convened, the single largest issue by far has been the pay raise recommended by President Reagan in his last budget. This raise was initially recommended to the President by the Quadrennial Commission on Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Salaries.

This commission was formed in 1967 to review every four years the salaries paid to federal legislators, executives, and judges. The commission's responsibility is to review the level of those salaries relative to persons with similar responsibilities in the private sector.

Prior to making any recommendations for adjustments in federal pay, the Commission holds hearings and compiles information on salary levels in the private sector. It then submits its recommendations to the President. The President then has several options. First, he can ignore the Commission's recommendation and refuse to submit them. Second, he can change those recommendations, raising them or lowering them. Finally, he can endorse them and recommend them to the Congress.

President Reagan chose the last option and presented them to Congress in the Budget he submitted on January 9. President Bush endorsed his predecessor's action in a recent news conference.

Under present procedures, Congress then has the responsibility of taking action on whatever the President recommends. It takes votes of disapproval by a majority of both the House and the Senate to reject the President's recommendation.

The Senate voted against the pay raise first, and the House followed suit last week by an overwhelming vote of 380-48.

Since being sworn in as a Member of the House of Representatives, I have voiced my opposition to this pay raise repeatedly. Furthermore, I felt it demanded a vote by the House. There was some question about whether or not such a vote would be taken. Quite frankly, the overriding majority of members of the House felt that there should be a vote as well. That strong sentiment resulted in a vote being taken.

Just as I voiced my opposition to the pay raise, I cast my vote in favor of the resolution disapproving it. Several days prior to that vote, I also introduced legislation that would require a vote in the Congress on any future pay raises. That legislation also requires that should a pay raise be approved by the Congress, it would not take effect until the next succeeding Congress.





Hectic Minutes

There were several hectic minutes shortly before eight Saturday morning at the Murchison home.

The ceiling heater in the bathroom began to smoke and was thought to be burning. The fire department was called, and it was determined that dust and lint on the coils of the electric heater was causing the smoke, with no damage to the heater or the house.

We must compliment the members of the Halls Volunteer Fire Department for their prompt response and the business-like manner with which they handled the supposed fire. Even though there was some confusion about the name and house number when the call was made to report the supposed fire there was no delay.

Acted Too Quickly

At the regular February meeting, Halls Board of Mayor and Aldermen approved an application by Larry White for re-zoning of a lot at the rear of H&H Service Station on West Tigrett St., to erect a car wash. A permit was issued, and White began erecting the necessary building.

On the following Tuesday night, at the recommendation of Tim Roach, of the Tennessee Planning Commission, the Halls Planning Committee rescinded the re-zoning action by the City Board. Roach said that re-zoning was unnecessary, since there already existed a business on the lot.

It seems to us that the City Board should not take any action on re-zoning requests prior to recommendation by the Planning Committee. The Board has been placed in an embarrassing position, and White's building plans may have to be altered.

If the City Board doesn't have, it should have the power to overrule the Planning Committee when it is deemed necessary, but it should not take over the duties of the Planning Committee.

All of the confusion and misunderstanding could have been avoided if the re-zoning request had been handled in the correct way. A direct ruling on how re-zoning requests are to be handled is needed and should be followed without exception.

Halls Continuing RP&L Franchise

In a called meeting Thursday evening of last week, Halls' Board of Mayor and Aldermen approved on first reading a 20-year renewal of Ripley Power & Light Company's franchise to serve Halls.

Though RP&L had agreed to change the name of the Halls service to Halls Power & Light, Halls officials decided that when the lights went out, they wanted customers to call RP&L, not Halls City Hall, for faster service...so the service will remain RP&L.


The board approved:

Jury Convicts Peat Of Murder, Assault

A Circuit Court jury Thursday of last week found Robert Peat III guilty of murder in the second degree (of Paul Porter, of Ripley) and guilty of aggravated assault on Cheryl Cates, in Halls, March 6, 1988.

Peat is jailed in Ripley pending sentencing March 20th by acting Circuit Judge Herman L. Revere, of Ripley.

He could be sentenced to 15 to 40 years on the murder conviction and two to six on the other conviction.

SPICY BLACK-EYED PEA STEW — HIGH IN SOLUBLE FIBER

Last month I was at a New Year's Eve party where some of my friends were discussing traditional "good luck" foods which should be eaten on New Year's Day. I couldn't resist inviting some of them over to my house the next day for a good-luck dinner, Texas style.

My mother's parents were both born and raised in Texas and they firmly believed that eating black-eyed peas on New Year's Day ensured good luck throughout the coming year. The only problem with their belief was that the way my grandmother prepared her black-eyed peas certainly did not guarantee good health along with the good luck. She cooked her black-eyed peas with lots of pork fat! Since there weren't any markets open, I had to improvise using ingredients I had on hand. Everyone raved so much about my Black-eyed Pea Stew that I decided it would be fun to share the recipe with all of my readers.

This easy-to-make, inexpensive dish is not only tasty, it is also very high in soluble fiber and therefore helpful in lowering cholesterol. As I explain in my pamphlet, Tasty and Healthy Oat Bran Recipes, ½ cup of cooked black-eyed peas has the same amount of soluble fiber as ½ cup of oat bran, and soluble fiber is the kind that has been shown to be effective in reducing blood cholesterol levels when made a part of the daily diet. When served over rice, this stew is an entrée for any time of the year.

BLACK-EYED PEA STEW
 1 pound (2 cups) dry black-eyed peas
 6 cups water

 1 bell pepper, seeded and chopped
 2 carrots, scraped and chopped
 2 large tomatoes, chopped
 1 teaspoon oregano, crushed
 1 teaspoon thyme, crushed
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 ¼ teaspoon sugar
 ¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
 ¼ teaspoon crushed red pepper

1. Combine all ingredients and bring to a boil.
 2. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 1½ to 2 hours, or until peas are tender.



The sudden jarring crack of whiplash may cause injury, from moderate to severe, to the intricate bones and muscles of the cervical spine.

When the bones of the neck move out of normal position, it causes a restriction in the opening between them, where the nerve and blood vessels are passing through. This may result in an irritation to the nerves and interference with nerve transmission and blood supply vital to body function. This so-called pinching of nerves may cause reduced function, or, depending on severity, complete dysfunction of the area of the body governed by the impulses from the affected nerve.

If the whiplash causes constriction of the blood supply to any area of the body, a variety of problems may result. Indeed, pinched nerves and/or constricted blood supply may masquerade as a number of illnesses; in this case, the organ supplied is signaling its distress.


