

Water Project **Loans Offered**

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds available to help drought-stricken farmers put in wells, canals, and other water projects, says Harriet Smith, county supervisor (635-4331).

Under a guarantee program, FmHA guarantees a percentage of a loan, (\$300,000 maximum) made by a commercial or cooperative lender. The loan ceiling for direct loans is \$200,000.

Loans funds may be used to put in wells and water supply systems for home use, irrigation and livestock;' to purchase pumps, sprinklers and other equipment; to put in ponds tanks, ditches and canals for irrigation; and for other purposes. Consult the FmHA office located at 109 E. Jackson, Ripley.





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

Congressional Arrogance

One would almost feel sorry for Rep. Jim Wright, Democratic Speaker of the House of Representatives, and his troubles if he accepted any guilt for the ethics violations with which he has been charged

Wright denied all wrong doing but resigned as Speaker and as a member of the House of Representatives in a bitter speed before the House of Representatives Monday of last week. He blamed special prosecutor Phelan, the media, and admitted only bad judgment.

We cannot understand why Mr. Wright did not continue his fight to clear his name if he felt no guilt. He should not have been willing to sacrifice a thirty-four year career and leave under a cloud unless he knew that he is guilty of some of the charges and expected the ethics committee to reprimand or

Typical of the arrogance which has built up in Congress is the reaction of some of Rep. Wright's supporters. For instance, Rep. Larry Smith on a nationally televised TV program maintained that Wright had been lynched by the media and that the charges should have been left to the ethics committee and are not the business of the general public. Other members of the House have indicated similar feelings.

It seems to us that a large majority of the members of Congress have reached the arrogant conclusion that they are no longer responsible to the people. This is particularly true of the members of the House because congressional districts have been gerrymanded so that representatives are almost totally assured of re-election. More than 99 percent of the House of Representative members seeking re-election were returned to office in 1988.

Legislation Targets Need of Rural Tennesseans

The rural areas of our country truly represent the heart of our nation. But as more industrialized areas of our country have been booming, our more rural areas, and the people who live in them, the farmers, small bussinessmen, and their families, have been largely neglected.

Tennessee is still, by and large, a rural state. Indeed, at the beginning of the decade, the University of Tennessee's Center for Business and Economic Reasearch estimated that Tennessee was almost 40 percent rural in population compared to a national average of about 26

Recently, two major bills, which I am co-sponsoring, were introduced in the Senate, which will aid rural areas, both in terms of economic development and growth, as well as in the area of health care

First, the "Rural Partnerships Act of 1989" will provide some \$300 million in rural development aid funding across the country. The funds should help rural areas build a strong and sound business and communications infrastructure to take them into the future, and boost rural America's economic development efforts at all levels -- from business investment to telecommunications to water and sewer infrastructure to nutrition and education and job training

Further, the bill includes a provision for the establishment of a Rural Partnership Development Board to oversee and distribute a fund of \$100 million for each of the years 1990-92 to state agencies which will establish revolving loan funds for new and expanding businesses.

In addition to this rural economic development legislation, the Senate has also introduced a measure directed toward meeting the health care needs of families in rural areas. Much of the problem stems from areas which are underserved or understaffed by physicians.

The "Rural Primary Care Incentives Act" is designed to attract physicians to work for up to five years in areas that are without adequate medical care availability.

Notice To All Rural Residents Of Lauderdale County

Effective January 1, 1989, enforcement of the Lauderdale erdale County Zoning Resolution and the Lauderdale County Sub-division Regulations became the responsibility of the Lauderdale County Building Inspector. The co-operation of the public has made the program successful so far.

This notice is a reminder that before commencing the construction, alteration, or relocation of a building, or before changing the use of a building, other than farm buildings, contact the office of the Lauderdale County Building Inspector to determine the need for a building permit. A permit is required by law under the provisions of the County Zoning Resolution. Failure to comply is punishable as a misdemeanor. Inquiries regarding permit fees, as well as any questions concerning when a permit is needed, should be directed to Mr. Billy Webb at 635-0712. The Lauderdale County Trustee's Office will handle all calls and supply information regarding the issuance of a permit.
