

### Ripley-Courthouse. Market Out-Look

The agricultural economy should fare well in 1989 due to smaller '88 crop supplies, firm demand, higher prices and a growing economy. Most farmers, however, should expect higher input prices including credit. The economic growth we have been experiencing will begin to slow by the end of the year as the result of higher inflation and higher interest rates.

Structural changes in the input markets along with an expected increase in acreage planted points to a general increase in the cost of production for farmers in 1989. After several years of declining acreage, input industries have consolidated and reduced production capacity. This sets the stage for possible shortages of some inputs and a moderate increase in overall price levels.

Soybean Out-Look

Although supplies will remain ested this fall, the market, processors and users of soybeans and soybean products have adjusted to the smaller supply. The adjustment has been easier considering the weak demand situation. Export volume of soybeans is expected to decline about 30 percent this marketing year. The crush of soybeans in this country will decline by 10-12 percent. Soybean product demand is also not faring too well. Soybean oil use in this country will hold about unchanged from last year, but exports will drop about 30 percent. Soybean meal feeding by U.S. livestock producers will probably drop about 5 percent while export volume nosedives 30-35 percent. Ending stocks of soybeans will not be as tight as USDA projected last fall. This is not unexpected, because high prices generally over-ration use in a short-supply year.

Soybean prices improved in December and early January on the basis of dry conditions in South America. At this writing, the moisture situation has improved considerably in Brazil, but Argentina remains very hot and dry. The final crop report and grain stocks report released Jan. 13th were somewhat negative for soybean prices. The very negative corn reports spilled over into soybeans. Growers who do not plan to hold stored beans into the new-crop growing season will probably find that \$8 cash beans is about all that can be expected. New-crop price offers will probably hold near \$7 until the planting intentions surveys is released on March 31st. Opportunities to lock in \$7.20 or above are worth serious consideration on part of the expected new crop. A combination of a 5% to 10% increase in acreage and a decent growing season could push cash prices this fall to \$6.50 or lower.

In 1819-20, he and David Porter came back to Key Corner. Mr. Rutherford lived near his cemetery and Mr. Porter moved about two miles south and part of his house is still around but has been moved to another location. He gave his name to Porter's Gap.

In 1894 the trustees (W. J. Morton, James H. Meeks, A. B. Murphy) purchased from Mrs. Myra Parr about one acre of land and a meeting house was erected where the cemetery now is. In 1909 Mrs. M.P.W. Parr sold to

the trustees of Antioch Church of Christ (J. C. Meeks, F. L. Sutton, T. L. Meeks, and T. L. Cook) the present location of the meeting



# Public Notice Residents Of Lauderdale County

As you have already noticed, Lauderdale County is in the process of obtaining the 911 Emergency Service Number. Because of the rather large expense to obtain this service EVERYBODY with a telephone is being charged a nominal fee to help pay for it.

The original charge per telephone was \$1.48 per business phone. \$.50 per residential phone. Based on these original charges, your 911 Emergency Service Board felt Lauderdale County could afford the 911 System. Two months after we started to pay for the system, our rates were reduced, hurting our county's ability to pay for the 911 System. The Tennessee Legislature realized rural counties would be hurt by a fee cut, therefore, they passed a bill stating each county could charge a maximum of \$.65 per residential telephone, \$2.00 per business telephone. Your 911 Board felt we could get by with our original estimate. Starting with your April billing, each residential telephone will be charged \$.50, each business \$1.48.

If any questions arise, call 635-2278 or attend YOUR County's 911 Board meeting. We meet every second Tuesday of the month at the Ambulance Station (old hospital).


