

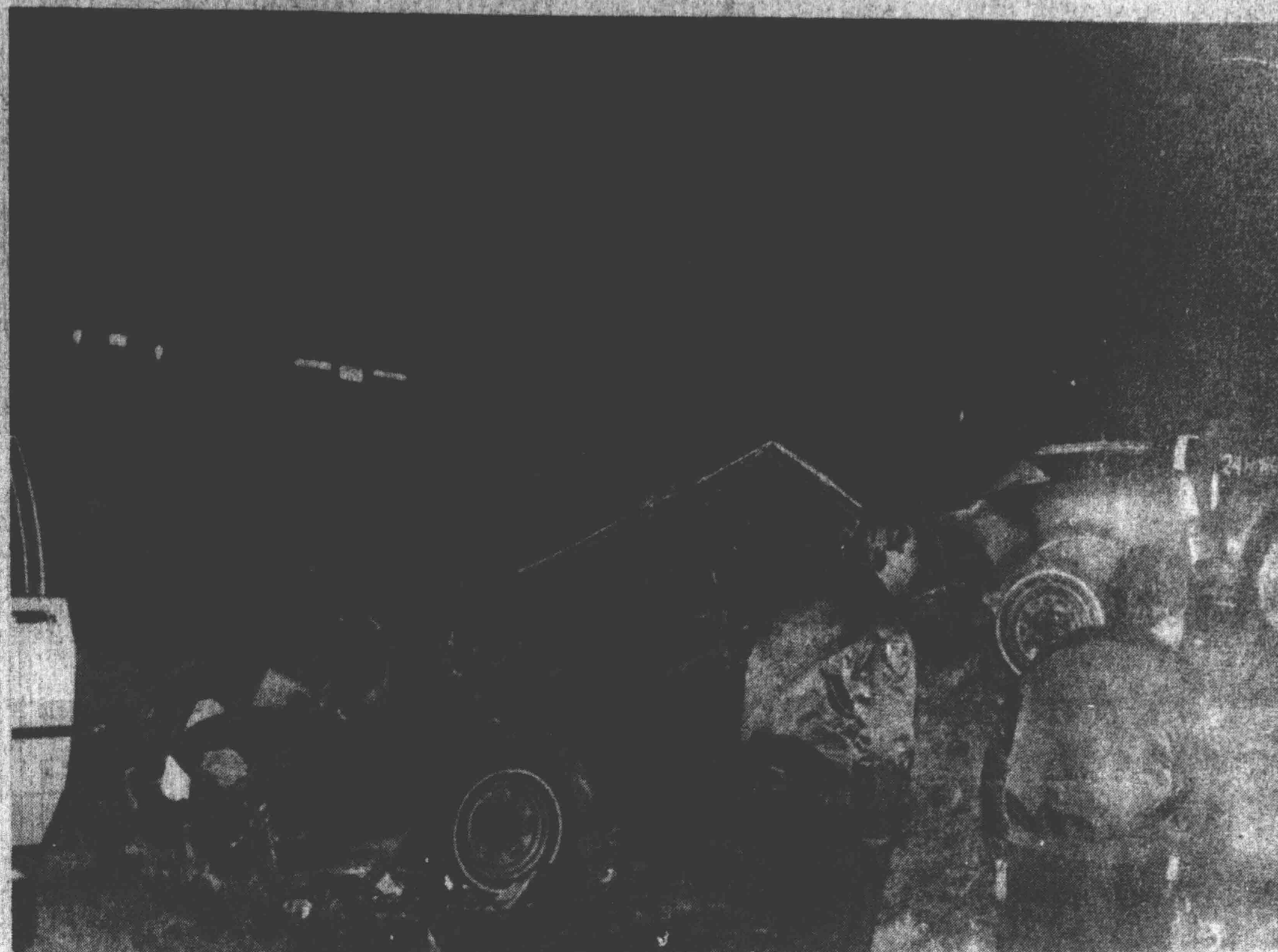

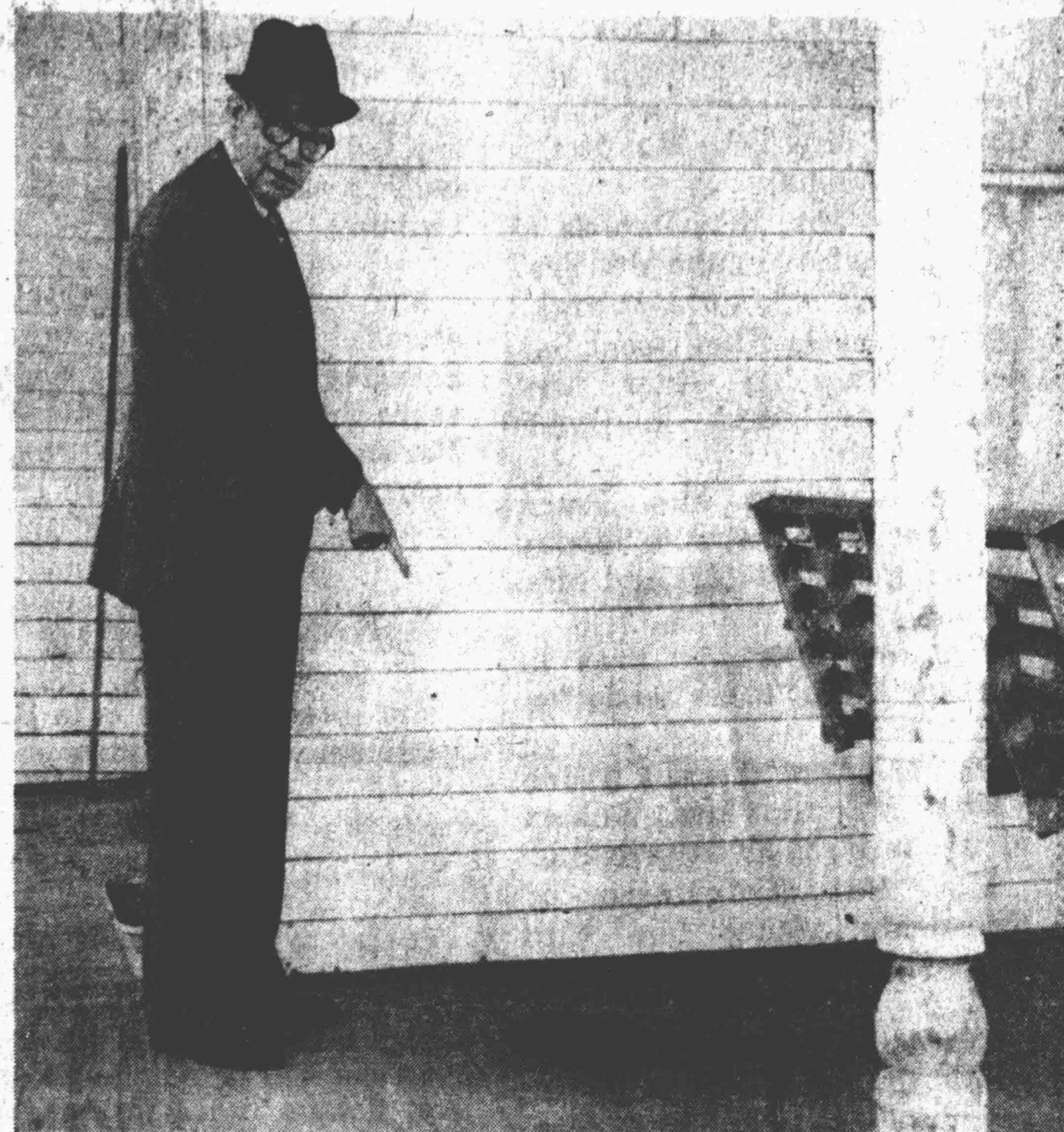
Owners of farm lands in the Lauderdale County Soil Conservation District will vote March 9th to elect three members of its Board of Supervisors.

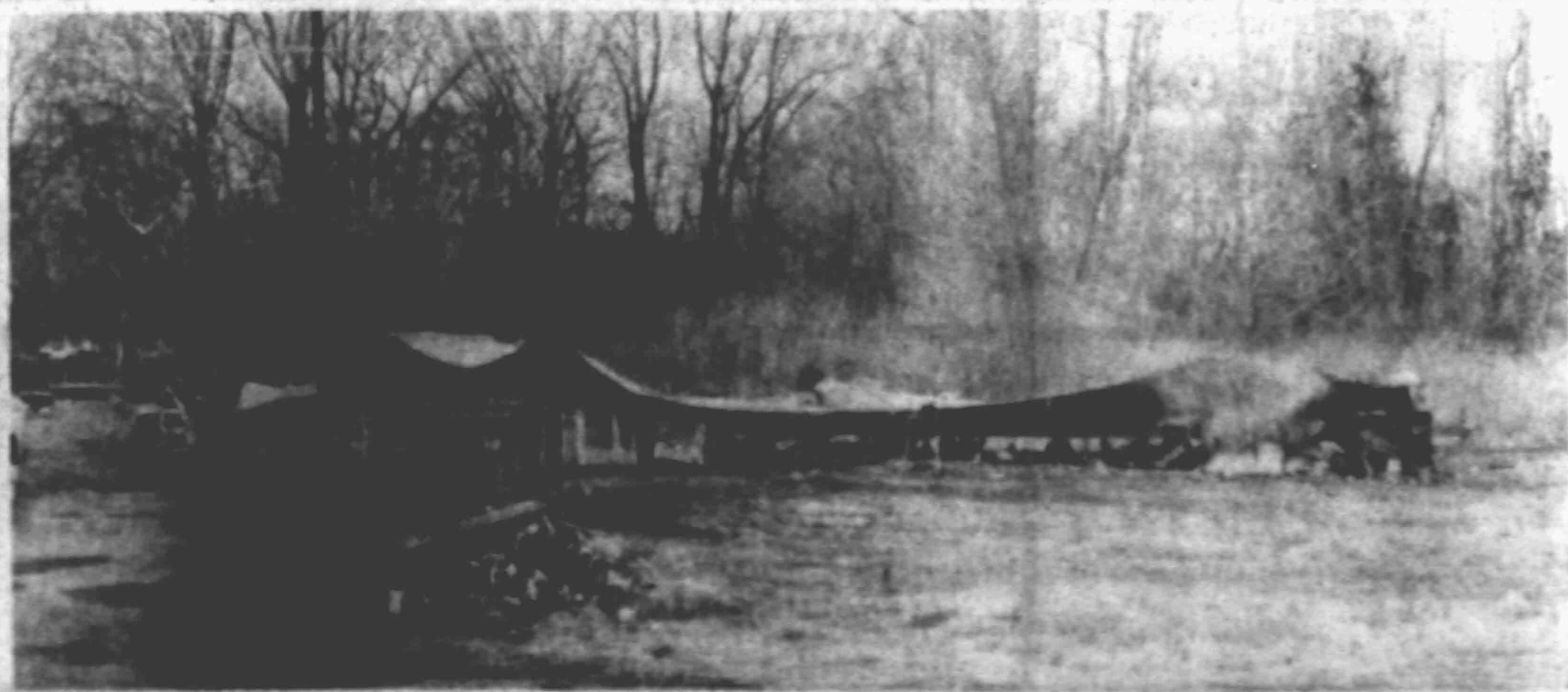

## Market Out-Look

The agricultural economy should fare well in 1989 due to smaller '88 crop supplies, firm demand, higher prices and a growing economy. Most farmers, however, should expect higher input prices including credit. The economic growth we have been experiencing will begin to slow by the end of the year as the result of higher inflation and higher interest rates.

Structural changes in the input markets along with an expected increase in acreage planted points to a general increase in the cost of production for farmers in 1989. After several years of declining acreage, input industries have consolidated and reduced production capacity. This sets the stage for possible shortages of some inputs and a moderate increase in overall price levels.

## Soybean Out-Look

Although supplies will remain tight until the '89 crop is harvested this fall, the market, processors and users of soybeans and soybean products have adjusted to the smaller supply. The adjustment has been easier considering the weak demand situation. Export volume of soybeans is expected to decline about 30 percent this marketing year. The crush of soybeans in this country will decline by 10-12 percent. Soybean product demand is also not faring too well. Soybean oil use in this country will hold about unchanged from last year, but exports will drop about 30 percent. Soybean meal feeding by U.S. livestock producers will probably drop about 5 percent while export volume nosedives 30-35 percent. Ending stocks of soybeans will not be as tight as USDA projected last fall. This is not unexpected, because high prices generally over-ration use in a short-supply year.

Soybean prices improved in December and early January on the basis of dry conditions in South America. At this writing, the moisture situation has improved considerably in Brazil, but Argentina remains very hot and dry. The final crop report and grain stocks report released Jan. 13th were somewhat negative for soybean prices. The very negative corn reports spilled over into soybeans. Growers who do not plan to hold stored beans into the new-crop growing season will probably find that \$8 cash beans is about all that can be expected. New-crop price offers will probably hold near \$7 until the planting intentions surveys is released on March 31st. Opportunities to lock in \$7.20 or above are worth serious consideration on part of the expected new crop. A combination of a 5% to 10% increase in acreage and a decent growing season could push cash prices this fall to \$6.50 or lower.

 He told his disciples to wait in Jerusalem till they received the comforter, the power from on high, Luke 24:49. On the day of Pentecost as they were in one place, the Holy Ghost filled them and they began to speak with other tongues and about the third hour of the day Peter stood up and began to speak and accused his hearers of crucifying Christ. When they heard this, they were pricked in their hearts and asked, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" Then Peter who had been given the keys of the kingdom answered, "Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive

the gift of the Holy Ghost." And they that gladly received His word were baptized and were added unto the disciples about three thousand souls. Thus began the Church of Christ.

The apostles continued to teach and the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved, Acts 2:47.  
 The writer of Hebrews records that if we want eternal salvation we must be obedient as Christ was to his Father and he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him.

Therefore, we current members of Antioch congregation of the Church of Christ owe our existence to several people who obeyed the preaching of the gospel of Christ by a preacher at the old Rutherford school house around 1890.

Rutherford school house was located about three hundred yards south of Rutherford cemetery in which is buried Henry Rutherford, the surveyor of part of West Tennessee before and after 1800. In 1819-20, he and David Porter came back to Key Corner. Mr. Rutherford lived near his cemetery and Mr. Porter moved about two miles south and part of his house is still around but has been moved to another location. He gave his name to Porter's Gap.

In 1894 the trustees (W. J. Morton, James H. Meeks, A. B. Murphy) purchased from Mrs. Myra Parr about one acre of land and a meeting house was erected where the cemetery now is. In 1909 Mrs. M.P.W. Parr sold to

the trustees of Antioch Church of Christ (J. C. Meeks, F. L. Sutton, T. L. Meeks, and T. L. Cook) the present location of the meeting house.

When the tornado of 1928 blew the meeting house down, the trustees (T. L. Cook, H. C. Cousins, and T. C. Meeks) paid Mr. V. C. Eskridge \$285 to remove the old timbers, examine, and reuse as much material as possible and to use all volunteer work and credit it to the cost. Since that time four classrooms and two restrooms have been added.

We still believe the work of the church is: 1. To preach the gospel to the lost, Matt. 28:18-19. We do this by supporting local and missionary evangelists. 2. To edify the local members by Bible study, singing, preaching, giving and partaking of the Lord's Supper each first day of the week. 3. Care for widows and orphans and needy. This we do by donating to three U.S. Children's Homes, Thailand Orphanage by sending money and clothes as we can get them. If you have useable clothes and would like to give away (baby and women's size small) call 836-9660, and we will pick them up and forward to Thailand to refugees from Laos and Cambodia and orphan children.

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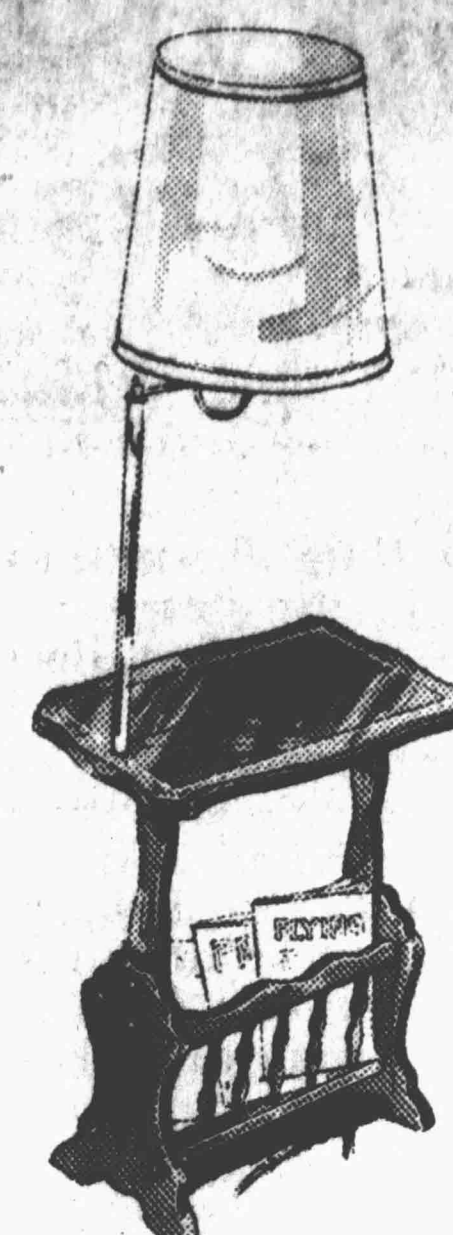
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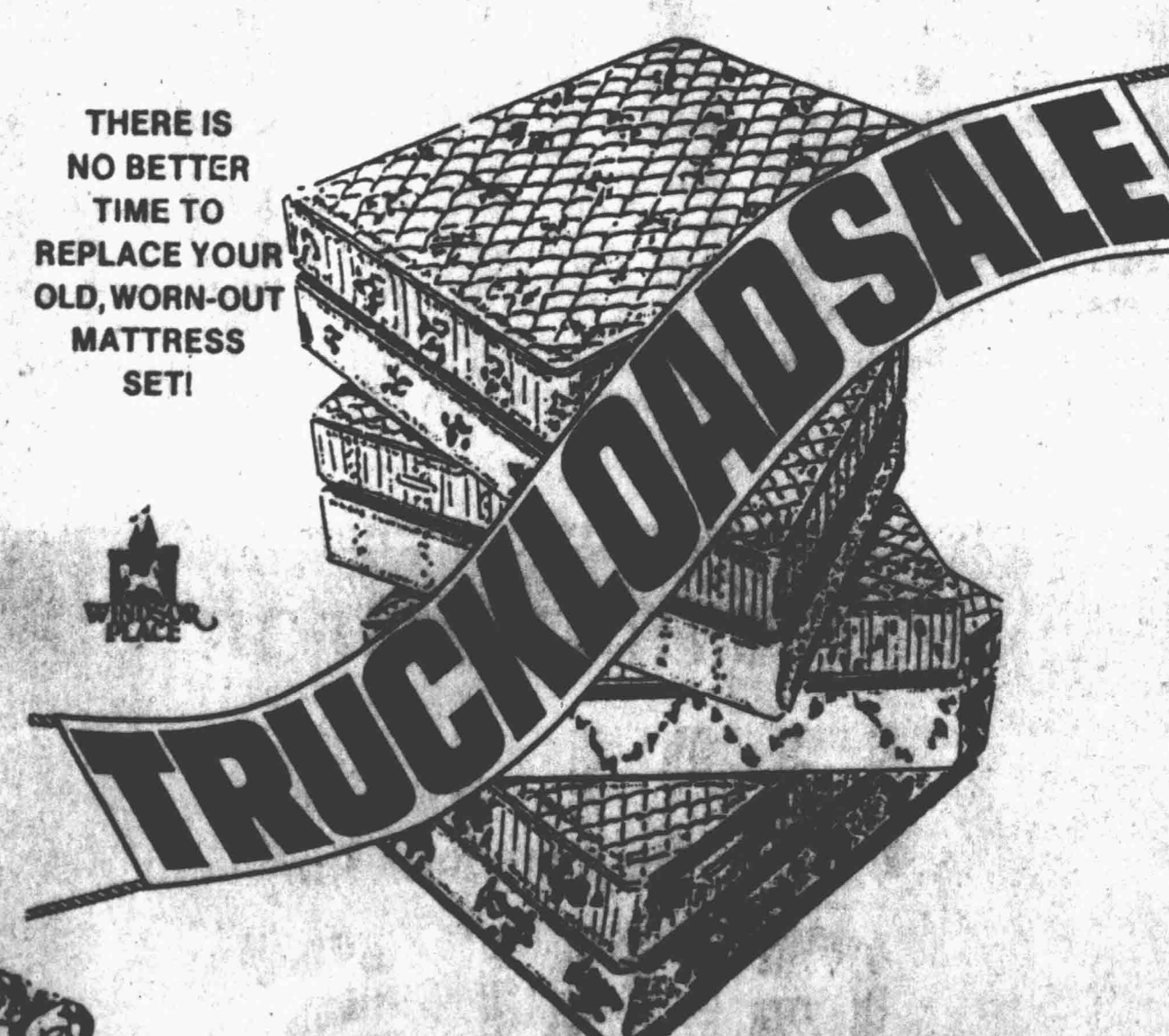


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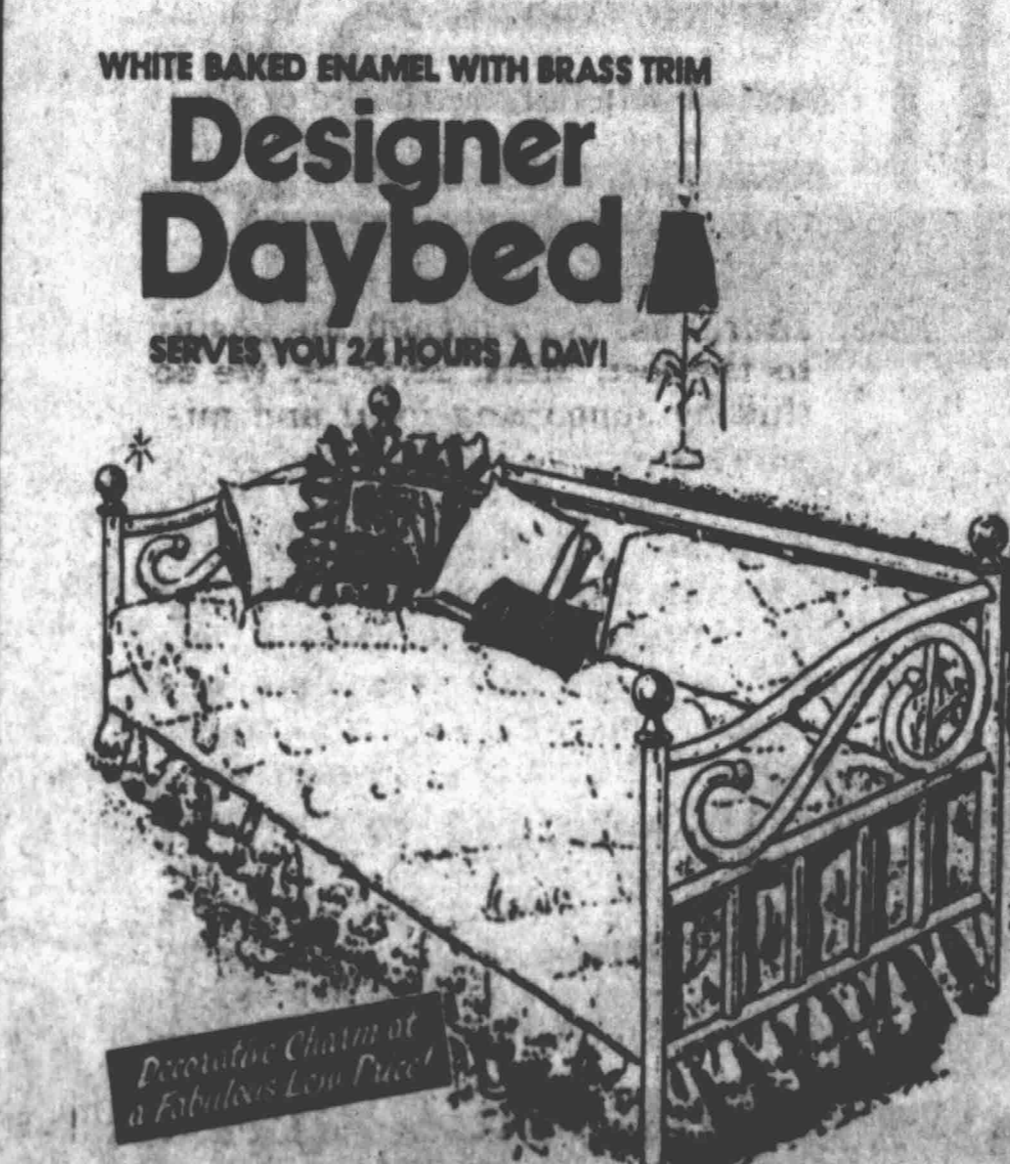
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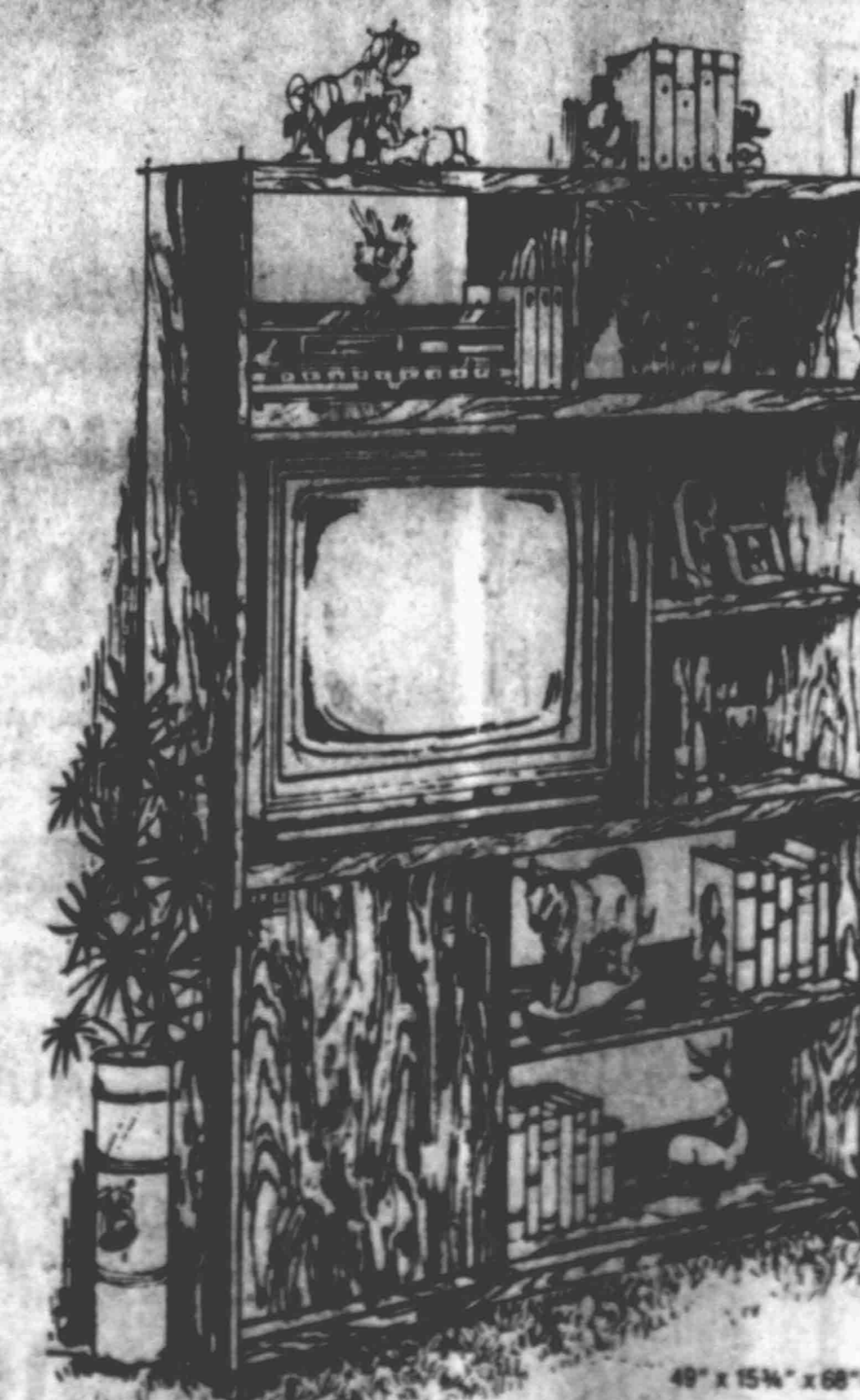
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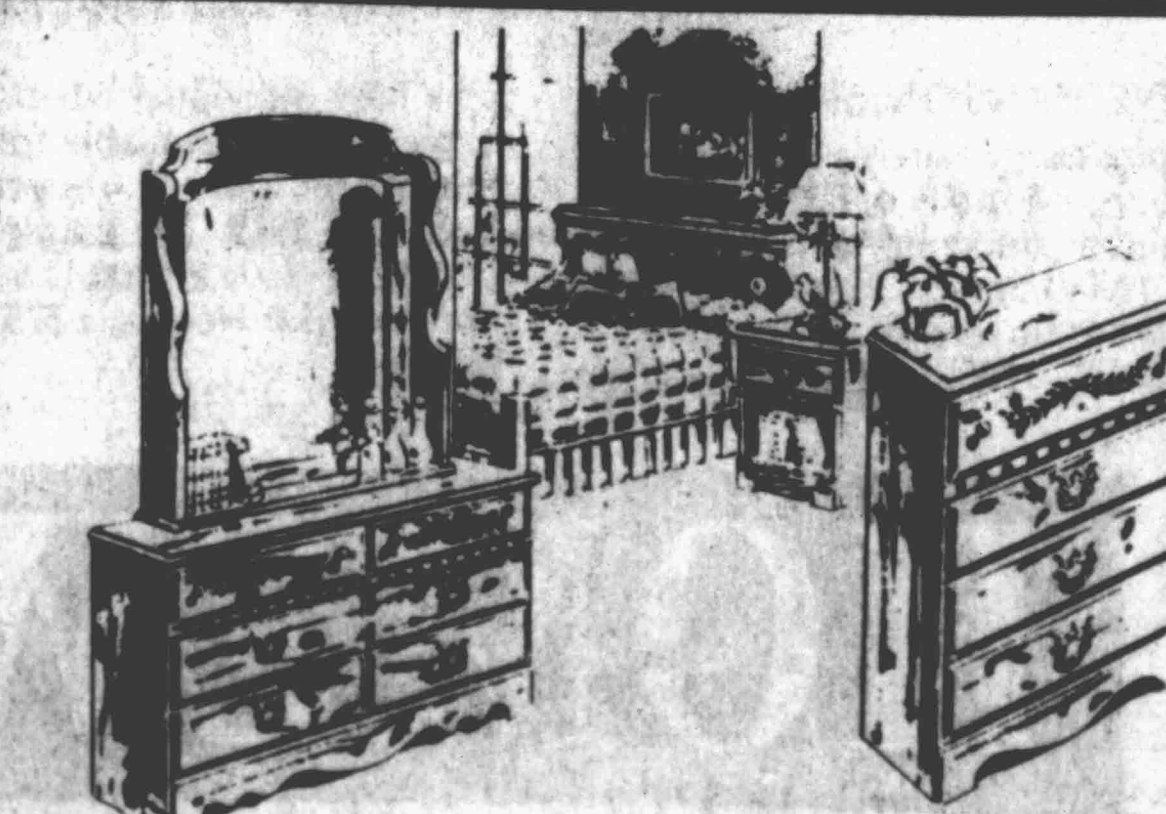


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# Sandy Smith Is Wed To Chris Hutchison

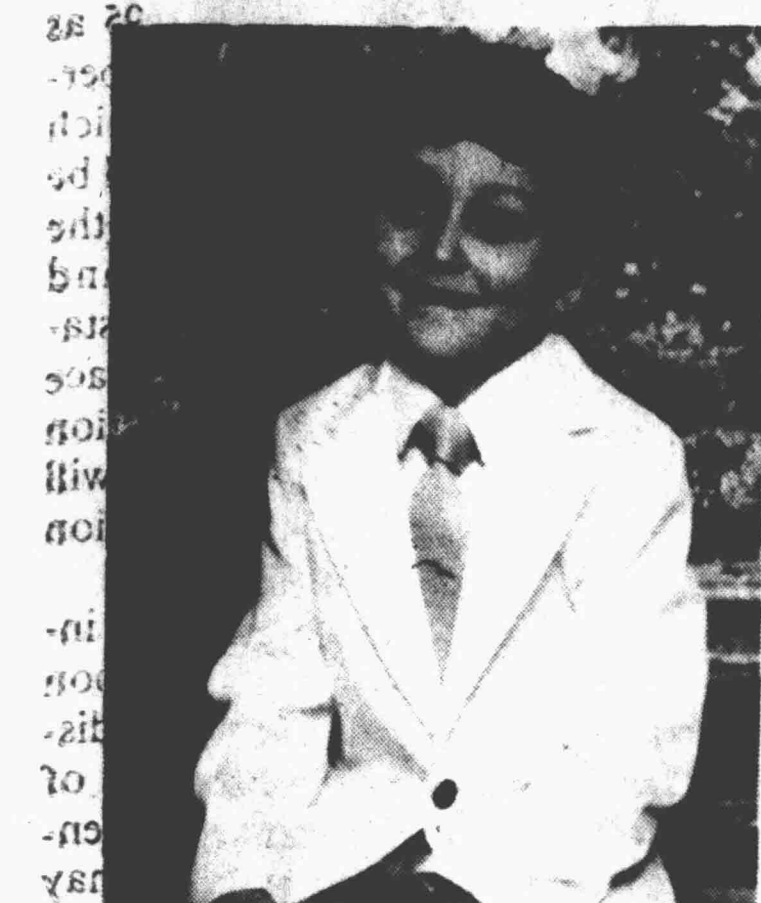

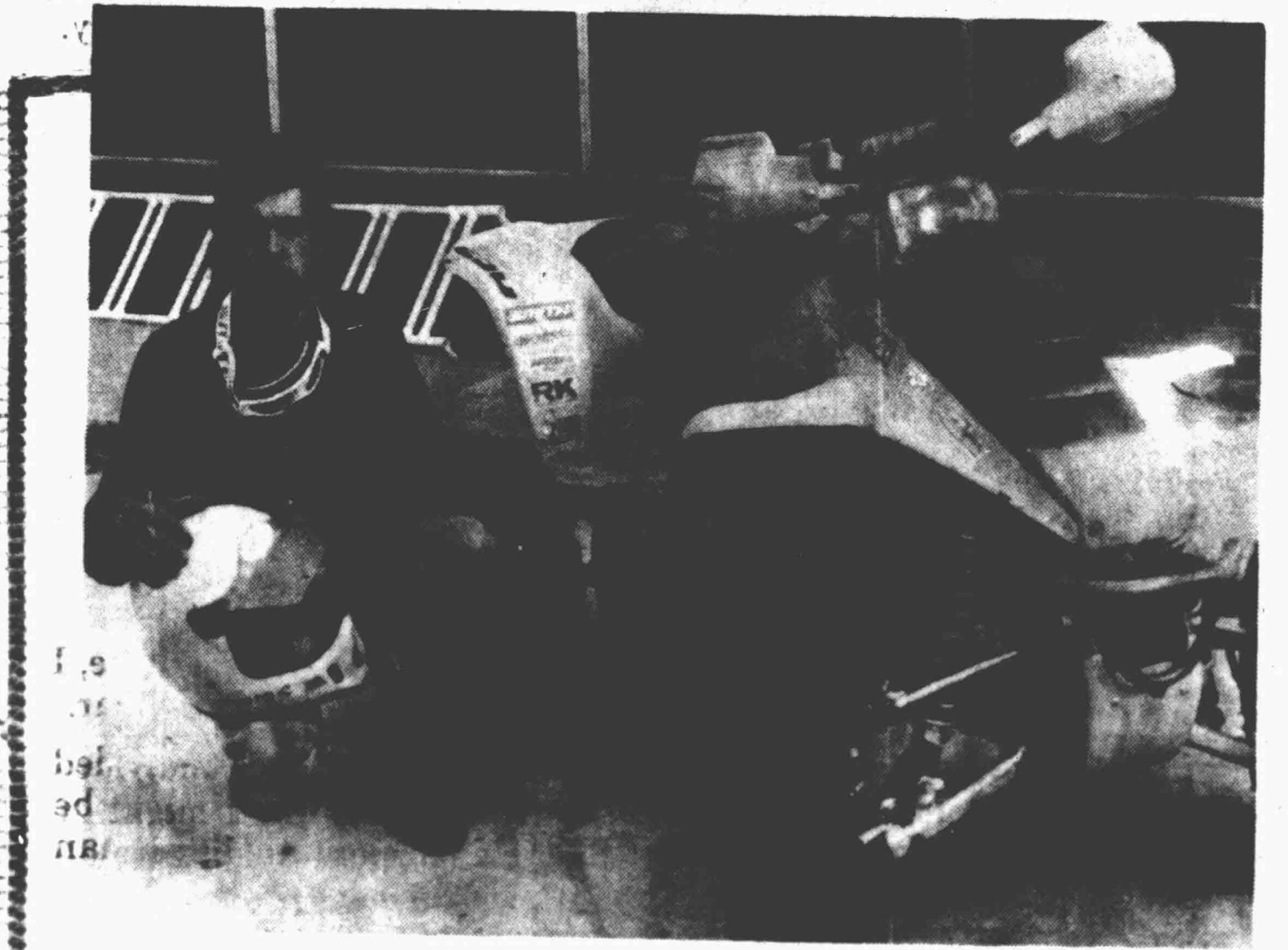

## COOK IT LIGHT

### CHICKEN FETTUCCINE MINUS THE CREAM

Dear Jeanie:  
This recipe appeared in the Star Tribune recently. It's yummy, and we love it, but a quart of heavy cream? Can you help, please?

**JEANNE'S CHICKEN FETTUCCINE**  
Liz Doering  
Mississippi, Minn.  
2 pounds fettuccine noodles  
2 1/2 cups grated Parmesan cheese (imported, fresh if possible)  
4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cubed  
1 ounce butter or margarine  
Garnish: freshly chopped parsley

- 1. Cook noodles according to package directions; drain and cool.
- 2. In a sauce pan reduce cream by one-quarter on low heat. While reducing, add garlic, powdered chicken base and white pepper, stirring occasionally.
- 3. When reduced, add cheese slowly while whipping with a wire whip until sauce has the consistency of a shake or milk.
- 4. In a large non-stick saute pan, saute chicken meat in butter or margarine on high heat. Stir and break up pieces. When outside of chicken is cooked, add sauce, then turn to medium heat and add noodles. Stir for 5 to 10 minutes or until hot (be careful not to scorch).
- 5. Portion out on plates or serve in casserole dish. Garnish with parsley. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Dear Liz:  
I agree, a quart of heavy cream is excessive — and the fat and cholesterol can be dangerous! There are some other problems with this recipe, however. When I made it I realized that it yields about 16 cups, which means that if you are feeding six people each one would have to eat almost three cups! I think a more realistic number of servings for this recipe would be 10 to 12. You will notice the difference this makes in the bottom line figures when you compare the original recipe as figured for six servings and the revised figured for 12 servings.

Another change you might want to make is to cut the recipe in half unless you are planning to serve it for company. You might also find that you can make the recipe without the noodles, then serve it as a sauce over pasta and keep the unused portion of sauce in the freezer.

I substituted low-fat milk for the cream and eliminated the chicken base altogether since it contains sodium and MSG. I also reduced the amount of cheese called for to help lower the calories and fat, as well as sodium. This revision will not taste as

5 garlic cloves, chopped (1/4 tablespoons)  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon ground white pepper  
6 ounces imported Parmesan cheese, freshly grated (1 1/2 cups)  
1 pound boned and skinned chicken breast halves, cubed  
Chopped fresh parsley, for garnish

- 1. Cook noodles according to package directions; drain and cool.
- 2. Melt the margarine in a sauce pan. Add the flour and stir over medium heat for 1 minute; do not brown. Add the chicken stock, low-fat milk and garlic. Using a wire whisk, stir the mixture over medium heat until it comes to a boil. Add the salt and white pepper and continue to cook for 1 minute more.
- 3. Slowly add the grated cheese to the sauce, whipping with the wire whisk until the sauce has the consistency of a shake or milk.
- 4. In a large non-stick skillet, saute chicken meat on high heat. Stir and break up pieces. When outside of chicken is cooked, drain water from the skillet and add sauce. Turn to medium heat and add noodles. Stir for 5 to 10 minutes or until hot. Be careful not to scorch.
- 5. Portion out on plates or serve in casserole dish. Garnish with parsley. Each serving contains approximately:

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# Congressman JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT

Throughout this week, school achievements we have accomplished in Tennessee Space Week. This is the third year that this program has been jointly sponsored by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and the Tennessee Education Association. It is designed to bring into the classroom the wonders of space and the technology of the future.

It is appropriate to use such educational materials in our schools. In doing so, sponsors of the project provide the young people of today with a glimpse of how our world may look in the future. It can engender the untapped interest of our young children in science and space exploration, and as yet undefined horizons that each hold.

What America has accomplished in space is truly astonishing. It was a little over thirty years ago that we were able to successfully launch our first communications satellite. In the intervening years, we have gone from launching a manned rocket in the Mercury space program to producing and flying a reusable space craft in the Space Shuttle program.

The benefits — so-called "spin-offs" — of the space program have been enormous. We now depend on satellites for a wide array of communication technologies. New metals developed through NASA research are even used to make better dental braces. Technology developed at NASA has been adapted to provide better medical diagnosis and treatment, and space technology has changed forever the face of electronics. As Americans, we can all be proud of these achievements. We can be even prouder that the quest for

new discoveries has not ended. The achievements we have accomplished have spurred us to greater heights and instilled in us greater determination to achieve even more. NASA has had its share of problems since the Challenger Shuttle tragedy. It has worked hard to identify the problems it faced in the shuttle program. Hopefully, its redoubled efforts will assure us of a shuttle program that will continue to be successful. But it has not stopped with just trying to reacquaint its former preeminence. It has now turned its attention to the next century and what it may hold.

Amazingly, the goals NASA has set for itself and our country are not so far flung. They have set 1995 as a target date for constructing a permanent space station in which research into numerous areas will be conducted. They expect to have the space station operational and manned by the end of 1996. This station will be built in stages with space shuttles carrying the construction materials to it. The space station will set the stage for possible exploration of deep space in the future.

That kind of exploration will include additional flights to the moon and even to Mars in the not so distant future. Future generations of Americans will come along in an environment in which space travel may not be so rare.

That is why Tennessee Space Week is an important part of the school year. It is NASA's single largest educational project because that agency recognizes that our children will one day live and work in space and we should be preparing them educationally for that eventually.

## Procrastination Celebrated

National Procrastination Week — "to promote the benefits of relaxing by putting off until tomorrow everything that needn't be done today" — is scheduled for the first week of March but will be delayed until March 5-11. Procrastination Week is in its 15th year. It is sponsored by the Procrastinators' Club of America, an organization with 6,500 members worldwide and, according to its president, Les Waas, "millions more who haven't gotten around to joining yet."

Waas has been "acting" president ever since the organization's founding in 1956. As soon as a time can be arranged, the group will meet and a new president elected. Until that time, Waas said, "The members of this club will continue to plan more inactivities for the coming year."

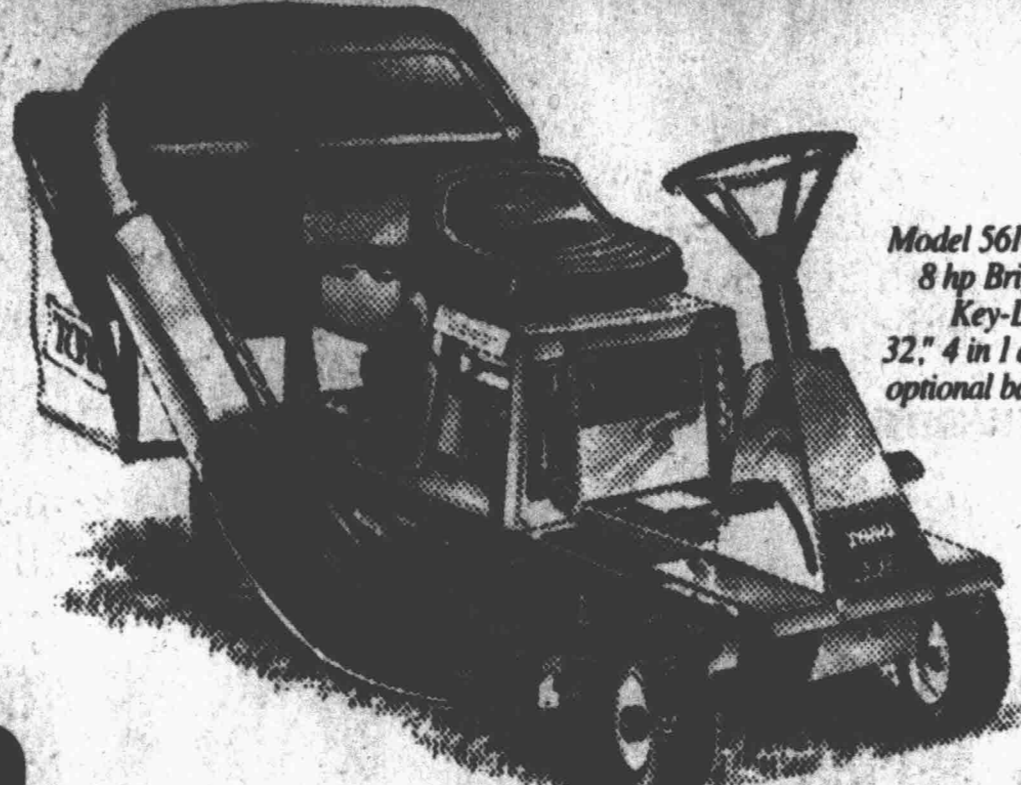

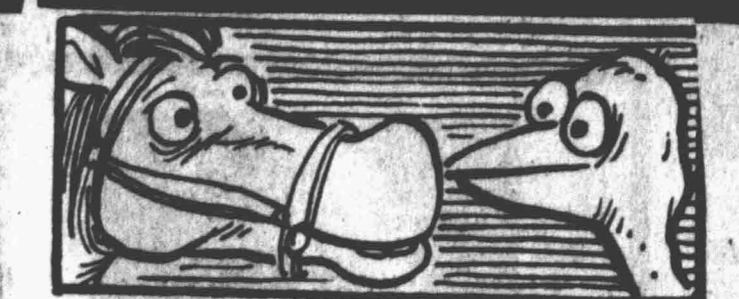

The dictionary defines whiplash as "an injury to the cervical spine caused by an abrupt jerking motion of the head, either backward or forward." Before the days of high speed travel with the inevitable sudden, jerking stops, the term whiplash referred to the action of a horse whip—the quick undulating crack, set in motion with a snap and within seconds going slack once more.

But in the case of the human neck as whip, the snap in that wrenching split second may cause long-term damage. Picture sitting in an automobile, the body motionless within the moving vehicle. Then comes the sudden impact or the extra sudden push when struck from behind.

The weight of the body, through the law of physics called inertia, resists the impact and remains essentially motionless. But the weight of the head atop the highly mobile neck snaps backward, with severe strain placed on the delicate mechanisms of the neck and upper spine. The generic term for any of the several resulting injuries we call whiplash.

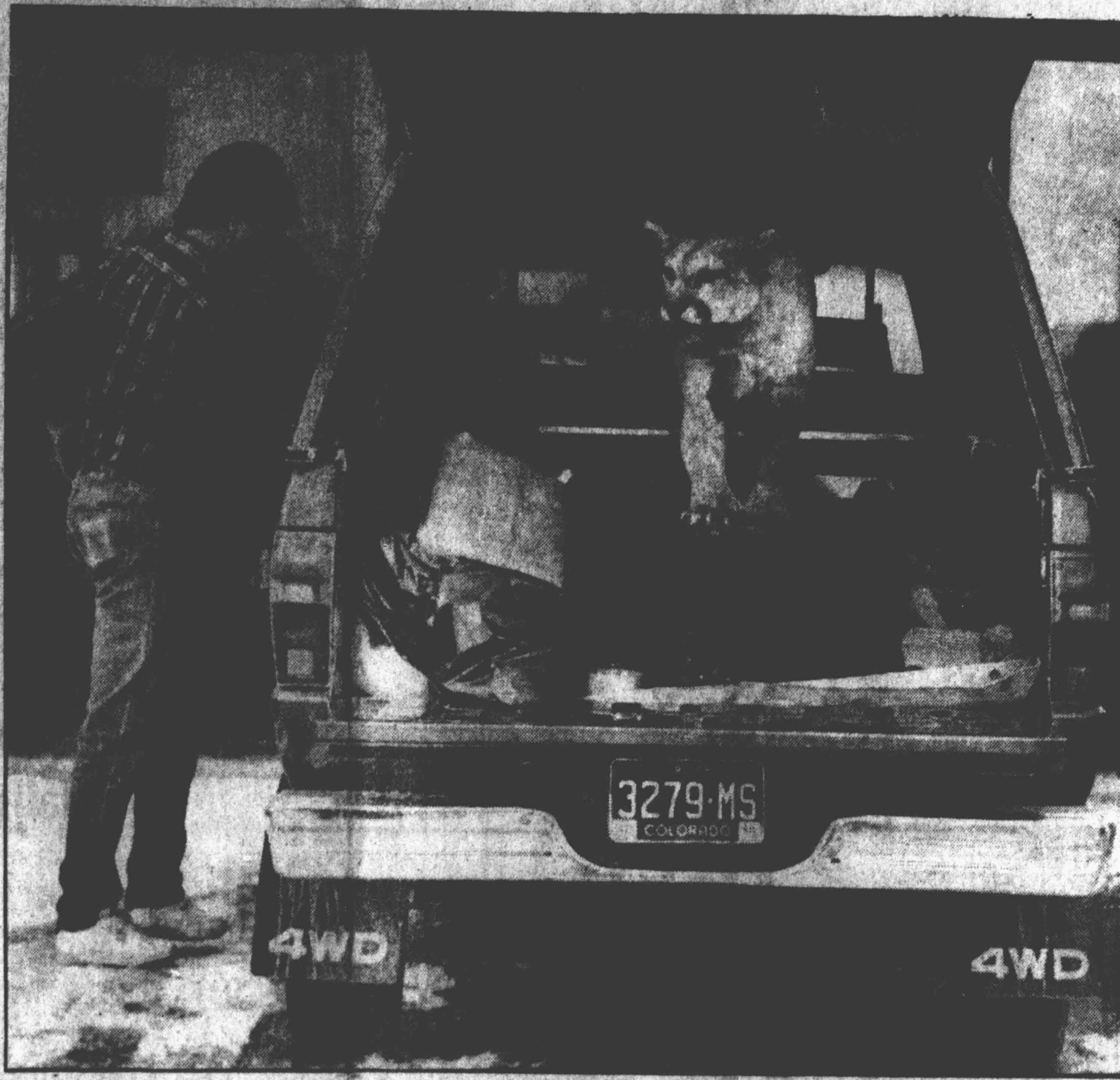

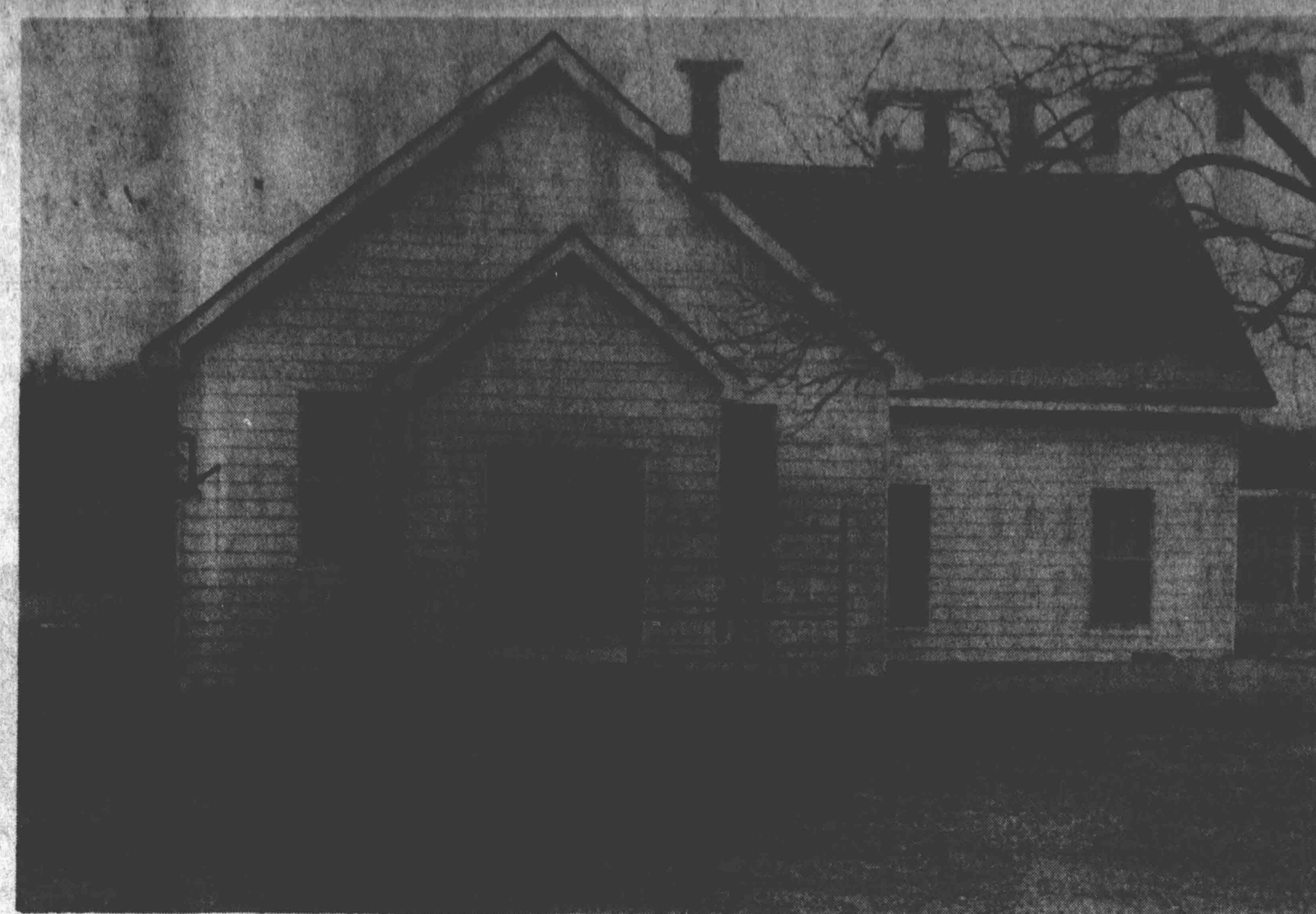

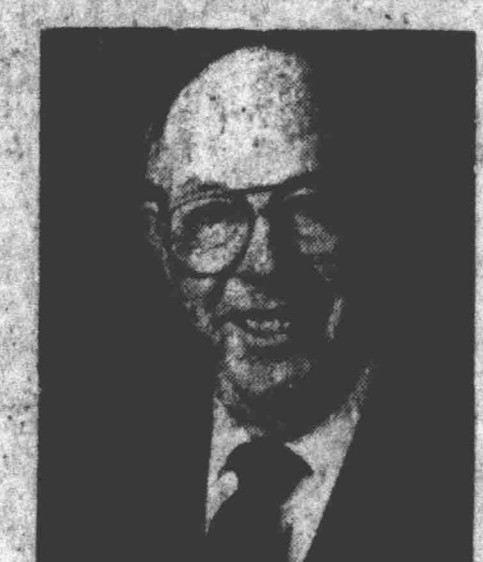

## Congressman JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT

Last week, the House and the Senate met in a Joint Session to commemorate the Bicentennial of the Congress of the United States. It was March 4, 1789 that the first Congress convened under the provisions of the Constitution adopted only two years before in 1787.

Meeting in that first session of Congress were 65 elected to the House of Representatives and 26 elected by their respective state legislatures to the Senate. Unfortunately, history tells us it was not until April 1, 1789 that enough Members arrived to declare a quorum.

Furthermore, the meeting quarters of the first Congress were still under construction on the First Day. Carpenters were still banging away and painters were still hard at work putting the finishing touches to the facility known as Federal Hall, which was located in New York City, a city of 29,000 in those days. The Congress met in New York for only its first seventeen months whereupon it moved to Philadelphia for the next ten years. It moved to Washington in 1800 when it became the permanent seat of our government.

Not all issues before the First Congress were so herculean. One that may sound trivial today was the matter of how to address the President of the United States. There was much debate over a number of proposed titles. Some wanted to refer to the President as "His Excellency"; others preferred "His Elective Highness" or "His Highness the President of the Rights of the Same." To the credit of the House of Representatives which originated it, the First Congress finally settled on the simple yet dignified title of "Mr. President" which prevails to this day.

While the Congress has changed and grown just as our nation has changed and grown, its First Term dealt with many issues that were basic to our democratic form of government. It created the first executive departments: the Departments of State, Treasury, and War, and established the Office of the Attorney General. It also passed the Judiciary Act of 1789 which gave substance to Article III of the Constitution setting up the Supreme Court and the federal judicial system.

The most important task of this First Congress was implementing the words on the parchment known as the Constitution. Certainly, those first Members of Congress had no model to use as a reference guide. The form of government established in the Constitution had no precedent. Even today, it is referred to as the great experiment in self-government.

The point is that the men of 1789 had to not only pass laws by which to govern, they had to fashion those laws to conform with the principles of individual freedom expressed in the framework of Constitutional government. After 200 years, it is apparent that their work was well done.

It also acted on passing the first ten amendments to the Constitution which our country has come to cherish as the Bill of Rights. It had to come to grips with the need to pass laws relating to copyrights, patents, the postal system, and the Bank of the United States. Ironically, through its tasks were large in putting into effect the Constitution, the First Congress spent much of its time dealing with the national debt, an issue that remains a high priority even 200 years later.

**CHOCOLATE SWIRL CHEESE-CAKE** (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 1/4 cups graham-cracker crumbs  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 cup butter, melted  
2 (8-ounce) packages cream cheese, softened  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Combine over hot (not boiling) water, chocolate chips and 1/4 cup sugar; heat until chips melt and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat; set aside.

2. In small bowl, combine graham-cracker crumbs, 2 tablespoons sugar and melted butter; mix well. Pat firmly into 9-inch springform pan, covering bottom and 1/4 inch up sides; set aside.

3. In large bowl, beat cream cheese until light and creamy. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar. Add egg, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Divide batter in half. Beat cocoa and additional 1/4 cup sugar into first half. Pour into crumb-lined pan; cover with plain batter. With a knife, swirl plain batter with chocolate batter to marbled effect.

4. Bake cheesecake for 60 minutes or until only 2- to 3-inch circle in center will shake. Cool at room temperature; refrigerate until ready to serve. Makes 16 servings.





## Halls Approves RPL Franchise

Meeting Thursday evening of last week, the Halls Board of Mayor and Aldermen approved on second reading, 5-1, a 20-year contract with Ripley Power & Light Co. Alderman Randy Harris voted "No."

The Board approved full-time employment of Ralph Newman, a part-time city policeman for several years.

The Board employed Carmichael, Enoch, and Associates, Certified Public Accountant, of Dyersburg, to do the annual city audit.

**Matthew Zion Baptist Church**

234 Pearl Street  
 Halls, Tennessee

Matthew Zion was started in the home of Bro. Henry White as a church school, under the leadership of Bro. Saul Koonce, about the year of 1866.

A few years later, a plot of land was purchased and a Bush Harbor was built on it. They worshipped in it until 1874. Then a small frame church was built, still under the leadership of Rev. Koonce.

After Rev. Koonce came Rev. W. M. Channey in 1889. In 1901, an addition was added on to the present church building, under Rev. Channey's leadership. Rev. Emi Loving followed the Rev. Channey. He served a few years.

In 1904, Rev. Romey Johnson was called to the pastorate. Under his leadership the stone church was erected on the same plot of land beginning in 1910 and was completed in 1911. He was a fine preacher. I. M. C. D. Coleman, became a member under his administration. He passed on to his eternal home in May of 1919, after serving fifteen years, leaving the church without a pastor.

In early 1920, Rev. Cash Perkins was called. He served until April, 1923. Under his leadership a choir room was added to the building. He served well. He was a great leader and showed much interest in the choir, making it a fine choir, for which we give God thanks. The present piano was paid out under his administration.

Following Rev. Perkins, Rev. Love, of Memphis, was called. Rev. Love served about three years and was called to a church in St. Louis, leaving the church under his wife's care. Mrs. Love, who was a fine christian woman. Each Sunday she saw to it that we had someone to fill the pulpit, until Rev. Bowen, of Mississippi, and his fine family took over the leadership.

Rev. Bowen's family was a great asset to the church and choir. Lenten Bowen, a very fine musician played a beautiful part with the choir's music. Rev. Bowen was a prepared minister, under his leadership the church took on new life. He served four or more years.

In 1929, the Rev. A. Terrell, of Memphis, was called. He served only one year. He to was a fine worker and had the welfare of the church at heart.

Early in 1930, A. B. Rogers was called. Rev. Rogers was a wonderful prepared minister. He brought the church out quite a bit. He served until 1933.

Rev. Sammy Harris was called in 1935. He served a very short while. Rev. Harris was a soul stirring minister. We regreted to lose him.

Rev. L. D. Livingston was called to serve until November of 1939. Rev. Morgan Holloway followed Rev. Livingston.

Rev. Holloway was a season minister and each Sunday he brought helpful and soul stirring messages. The present church lot was bought and paid for and building fund was started under his leadership. He passed on to his eternal home in March of 1945.

In the early part of 1946, Rev. L. Johnson, of Humboldt, was called. He only served one year.

In 1947, Rev. Phennessee, of Humboldt, was called. He served until 1950. He was interested in the building fund continuance.

The first Sunday in April of 1950, Rev. William Morgan was installed as pastor of Matthew Zion. Under his leadership, the present building was built in 1952. The third Sunday in December of 1952 we moved in and dedicated the new building. It was financed by Dr. C. D. Coleman. The note was paid off in 1960, giving Matthew Zion full ownership.

Rev. Morgan passed on to his eternal home in January, 1967.

Our present pastor, Rev. T. L. Mabins, was called in October of 1967 and installed as pastor of Matthew Zion, December 31, 1967. Under his leadership we are going on. To date we have made great improvement in our church worship. On Feb. 11, 1968, we began full time church worship or service. We are all happy to have Rev. and Mrs. Mabins as part of our church services. They have proved themselves great workers for God and

man. The junior choir was organized the first of this year 1968, under his leadership.

This 17 day of March 1968, we see them in action with Mrs. Mabins and Mrs. Gentry Lacey as youth leaders. Thank God for them and all of those who have been a part of this great church and for the service they have rendered. May God's blessing be upon them all.

Under the leadership of Rev. Mabins, new members are being added and the annex to the church is in progress. We hope to build it in this year 1968. The out look for Matthew Zion is on the trend. We thank God for Rev. and Mrs. Mabins. Our prayers are that God will bless and keep them in his care with a long and happy life. And that under his leadership, Matthew Zion will become a greater church, second to none in a small city. May God's blessing be upon all of us and His guidance guide us until life shall end. Under the leadership of Rev. Mabins the annex was completed in 1968 and paid for in 1968.

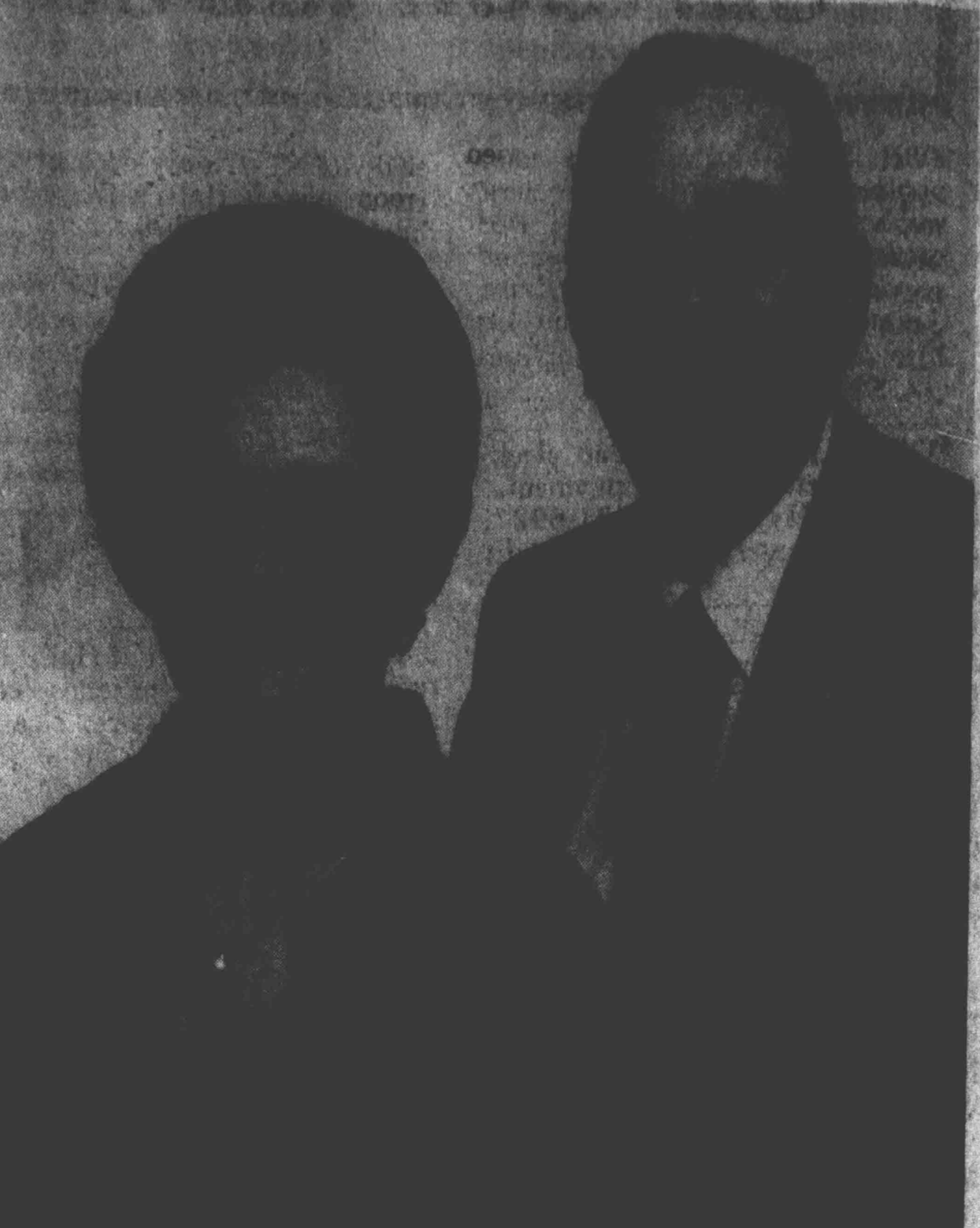

## Easter Menu Tips Offered

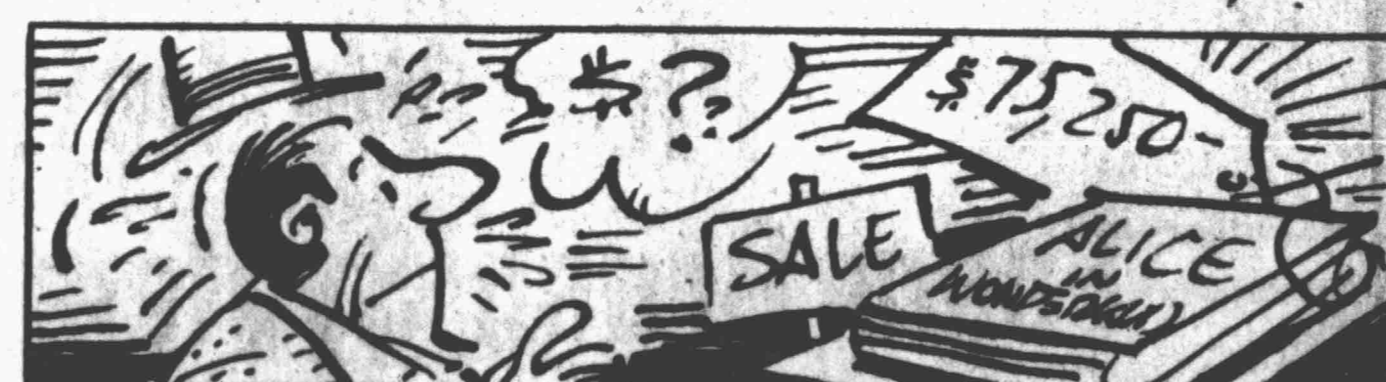

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

All dog owners are hereby notified that the Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county. All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Transfer Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored. This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed. In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$4.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

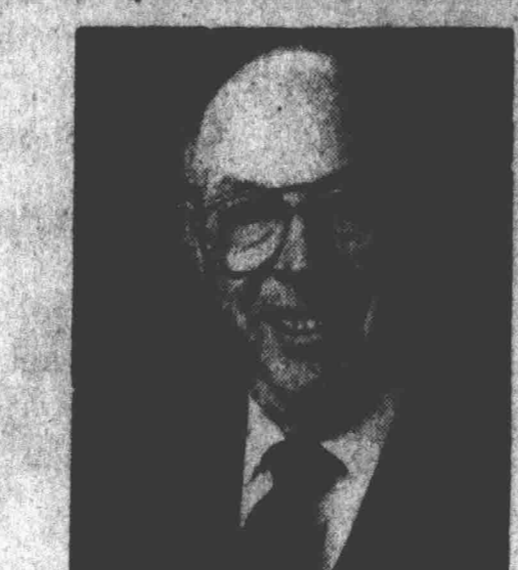

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Honoring America's Providers

An upbeat outlook

As in 1988, they're generally upbeat, at least that's true for the forecasts coming from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Annual Outlook Conference in Washington during late November and early December.

Here's a summary of the outlook for U.S. agriculture, according to reports released during the conference.

Production-U.S. production of wheat, corn and soybeans is expected to rebound in 1989 in response to higher prices from drought reduced harvests. For some crops, the government also has eased its marketing requirements for subsidy programs. In general, global grain and soybean stocks were down about one third in 1988, with reserves good for about two months of use for grains and 1 1/2 months for soybeans.

Exports-U.S. export values should rise by about \$1 billion to \$36.5 billion in fiscal year 1989, while volumes are forecast to decline by 8 percent to 136 million metric tonnes. The U.S. share of world grain trade is expected to slip to 46 percent from 50 percent in 1988.

Prices-World prices for wheat, corn and soybeans are expected to be at their highest point since 1985. Food prices are forecast to climb 3 percent to 5 percent, which compares with a 4 percent rise this year

that included the effects of the drought. Income-Net farm income, which includes rising values of inventories of commodities, will increase by about 20 percent to between \$4 billion and \$48 billion in 1989. Cash farm income is expected to fall about 10 percent to \$48 billion to \$52 billion. Higher production costs and lower direct government payments will draw down cash gains from rising farm prices.

Now for some details: The global agricultural outlook for 1989 will be highlighted by smaller crops and higher prices but near-record meat supplies, a senior U.S. Department of Agriculture official said at the opening of the USDA Annual Agricultural Outlook Conference. James Donald, chairman of the World Agricultural Outlook Board, said demand for both crop and animal products will be firm next year and crop prices will be strong. Expanded crop production is likely by the second half of the year.

Supplies of animal products will continue to be large, dampening livestock price increases, he said.

Small-scale agriculture

Small-scale agriculture implies people utilizing alternative systems to sustain gainful employment. Small-scale agriculture, sometimes referred to as "small farms," constitutes a significant number of the Nation's 2.2 million farms, as noted in the 1988 Fact Book of Agriculture introduction.

When farms grossing less than \$40,000 annually are defined as "small," then more than 7 out of 10 U.S. farms are classified as small.

Awareness is growing that small-scale farmers make a significant contribution to economic development of both agribusiness and consumer industries of rural communities throughout the United States. Some say such people are the "motor" providing rural communities with social and economic strengths.

USDA's Office for Small-Scale Agriculture was created as part of the Cooperative State Research Service to increase and improve the flow of information about small-scale farming to agricultural producers and consumers. It is a focal point for distribution of USDA resources on this subject.

The office functions as a liaison to other USDA agencies such as the Extension Service and the Agricultural Research Service in identifying and directing research and educational programs to improve usefulness of information received by all small-scale farmers and others wishing to join their ranks.

Ongoing and planned activities of the office include: • A bimonthly newsletter on small-scale agriculture; • Factsheets on small-scale agriculture; • A national directory of small-scale agriculture contacts;

\*An assessment of all ongoing USDA research and educational efforts that target on small-scale agriculture; •Continual monitoring and/or implementing of conferences on small-scale agriculture.

\*The food and fiber industry alone generates approximately 20% of the nation's Gross National Product and 20% of the national employment.

Farmers are consumers as well as producers Like everyone else, the U.S. farmer is a consumer and a taxpayer, as well as a producer.

Farmers pay about \$3.7 billion in farm real estate taxes annually, and \$474 million in personal property taxes.

In 1986, farm operators spent about \$122 billion for goods and services to produce crops and livestock. They had available \$37.5 billion in personal income from production activities and government payment and \$44.7 billion from nonfarm sources to spend for personal taxes, debt reduction, investments, and some of the same things that city people buy.

Farmers' 1986 purchases included the following: • \$6.4 billion for farm tractors and other motor vehicles, machinery, and equipment; • \$9.5 billion for fuel, lubricants, and maintenance for machinery and motor vehicles used in the farm business; • \$19 billion for feed and seed; • \$5.8 billion for fertilizer and lime.

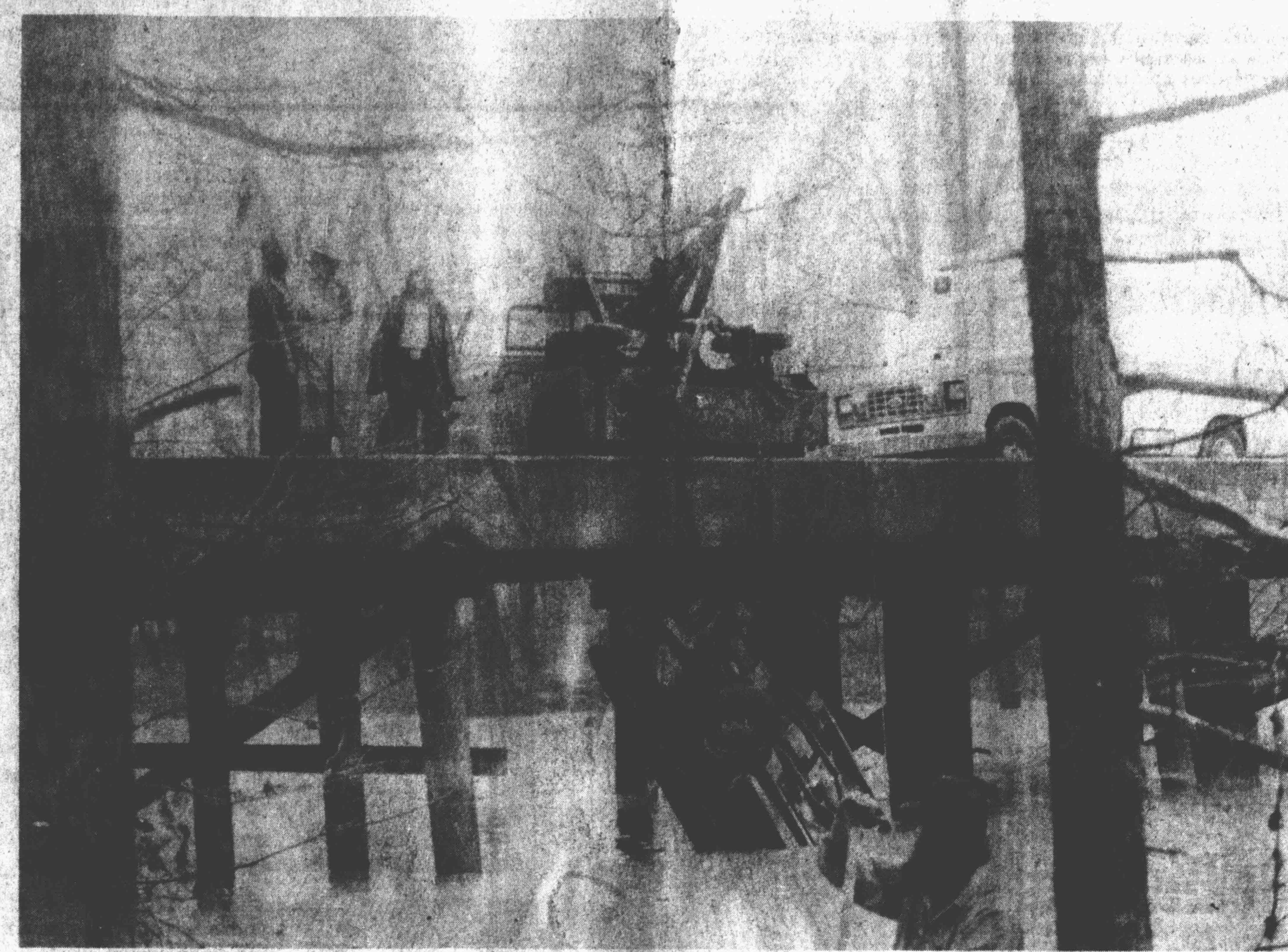

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

**COOK IT LIGHT**

**MOLASSES BROWNIES MAKE GREAT BITE-SIZED SNACKS**

My "snack of the month" column has become so popular that I am getting hundreds of letters from readers suggesting their own favorite snacks for me to revise. My snack for April is a molasses wheat-germ brownie, one of the most frequently requested revisions.

All of the original recipes I received have been slightly different. Some called for whole eggs and others for egg substitute. Some contained only wheat germ while others added oat bran as well. However, they all had oil, molasses, sugar, vanilla, nontart milk powder and nuts. Also many people said they loved the taste but didn't like the texture. They complained about how the brownies crumbled and fell apart when cut into squares.

The first time I made this recipe I used egg substitute and had the same problem. I then tried using only egg whites and that solved the texture problem — no more hunks of crumbs! Then I started reducing the amount of fat and found that I could cut the oil down to 1 tablespoon from ¼ cup and still have a moist texture by increasing the molasses from 2 to 4 tablespoons. This increase in molasses added enough extra taste and sweetness so I eliminated the sugar.

To add still more taste I toasted the chopped walnuts to increase their flavor before adding them to the batter. The end result is a real winner. You can either cut your molasses treats into 16 2-inch brownie squares or into 64 1-inch squares for bite-sized snacks.

**MOLASSES BROWNIES**  
 ½ cup chopped walnuts

3 egg whites  
 1 tablespoon corn oil  
 ¼ cup molasses  
 2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
 ¼ cup wheat germ  
 ¼ cup oat bran  
 ¼ cup dry non-fat instant milk powder  
 ¼ teaspoon baking powder  
 ¼ teaspoon salt

1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Toast walnuts in preheated oven for 8 to 10 minutes, or until golden brown. Watch carefully, as they burn easily, set aside.  
 2. Combine egg whites, oil, molasses and vanilla; mix well.  
 3. Combine all remaining ingredients and mix well. Pour the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients.

**JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT**

The idea of using the resources of America's armed forces in the nation's war on drugs is not a new idea. It has been proposed, and passed, several times in the Congress in varying degrees and forms.

Two years ago, the Congress passed legislation to authorize the use of the military's resources for drug interdiction. Consequently, Navy and Air Force equipment is being used by federal law enforcement agencies such as the Bureau of Customs and the Coast Guard in a cooperative effort to detect and apprehend drug traffickers.

Air Force and Navy pilots support the law enforcement agencies in military surveillance aircraft. Navy ships take on law enforcement personnel periodically while at sea to stop boats and ships suspected of carrying drugs illegally to U.S. destinations. In addition to those resources, about \$300 million in military equipment is on loan to law enforcement agencies charged with the primary responsibility of fighting the war on drugs.

In 1988, Congress went even further. It assigned the military forces of America a specific role in the detection and monitoring of aerial and maritime smuggling of illegal narcotics into the United States. Overall, \$100 million was allocated for this purpose, \$40 million of which was specifically set aside for the National Guard to support state sponsored interdiction of drug trafficking.

Developing an effective plan to use the resources of the military for these specific tasks has been difficult. Supporting the work of the law enforcement agencies and taking an

active role in detecting and monitoring drug trafficking are two different missions. The latter requires the use of a great deal of intelligence information, some of it sensitive. Committing military intelligence resources to law enforcement functions can pose problems if proper care is not taken.

Nonetheless, the Department of Defense needs to resolve those difficulties and become a full partner in this nation's war on drugs. The Armed Services Subcommittee on Investigations, of which I am a Member, has already begun holding oversight hearings on how the military is progressing in its implementation of the mission Congress has assigned it.

At this point, that effort is going to demand continued Congressional pressure on senior armed services leaders if there is going to be an effective military component of the war on illegal drugs in this country. The reluctance of those leaders to become deeply involved in what has heretofore been law enforcement functions may be understandable, but it is not acceptable. They are, after all, assigned the mission of insuring our national security and waging war, the nature of which is not always complementary to law enforcement functions.

However, the overriding point is that the military represents an enormous resource of equipment and people that could be utilized to supplement the efforts of agencies such as Customs, the Coast Guard, the Drug Enforcement Administration and others. With thorough planning and commitment on the part of

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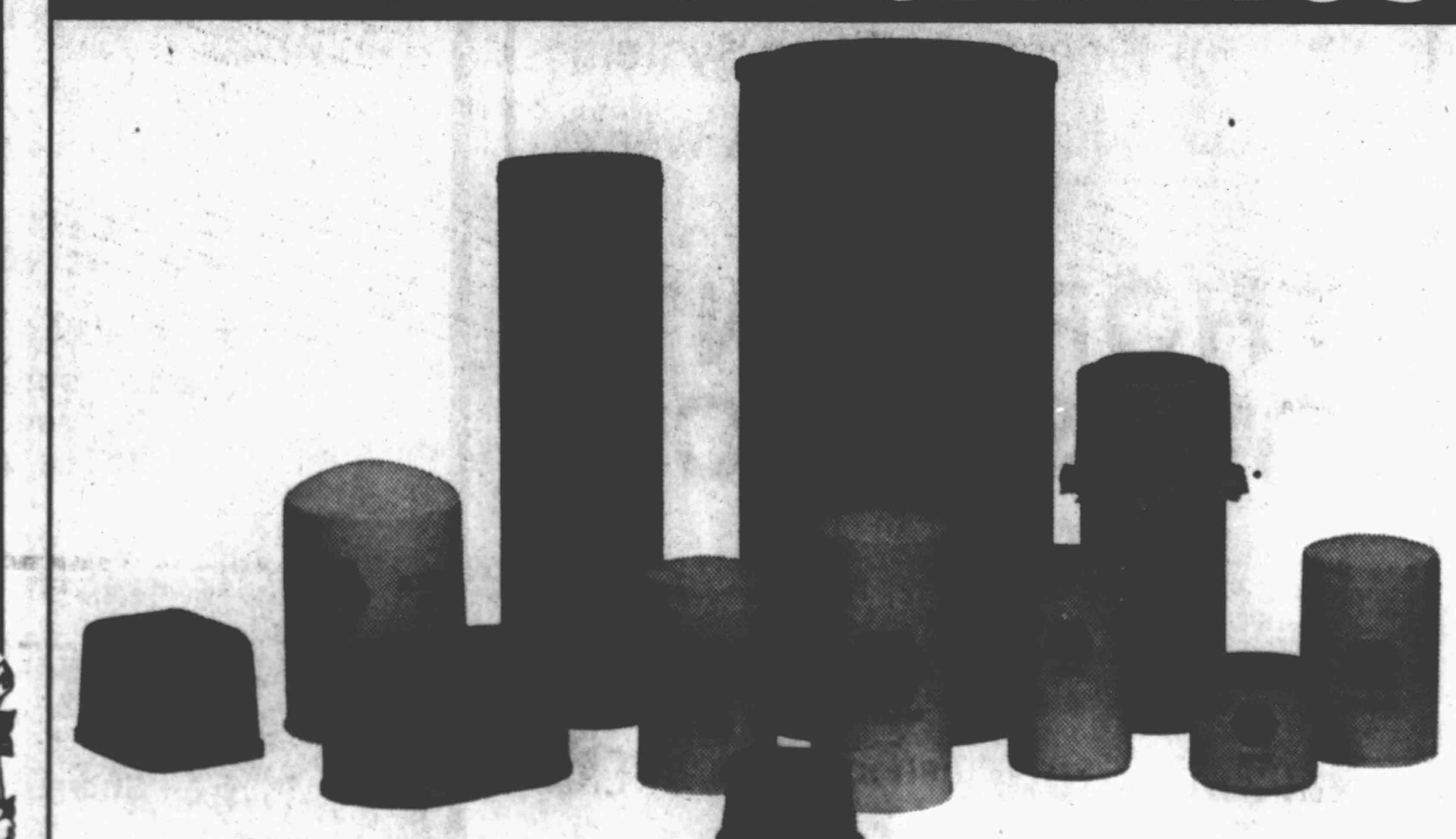

### IMPORTANT NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

All dog owners are hereby notified that the Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county. All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Toller's Office on or before the first day of May each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county and a charge of \$4.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

As an early riser I have always liked daylight saving time but now I find it more difficult to adjust. Since I can no longer work in the yard and take part in other such activities the change doesn't help.

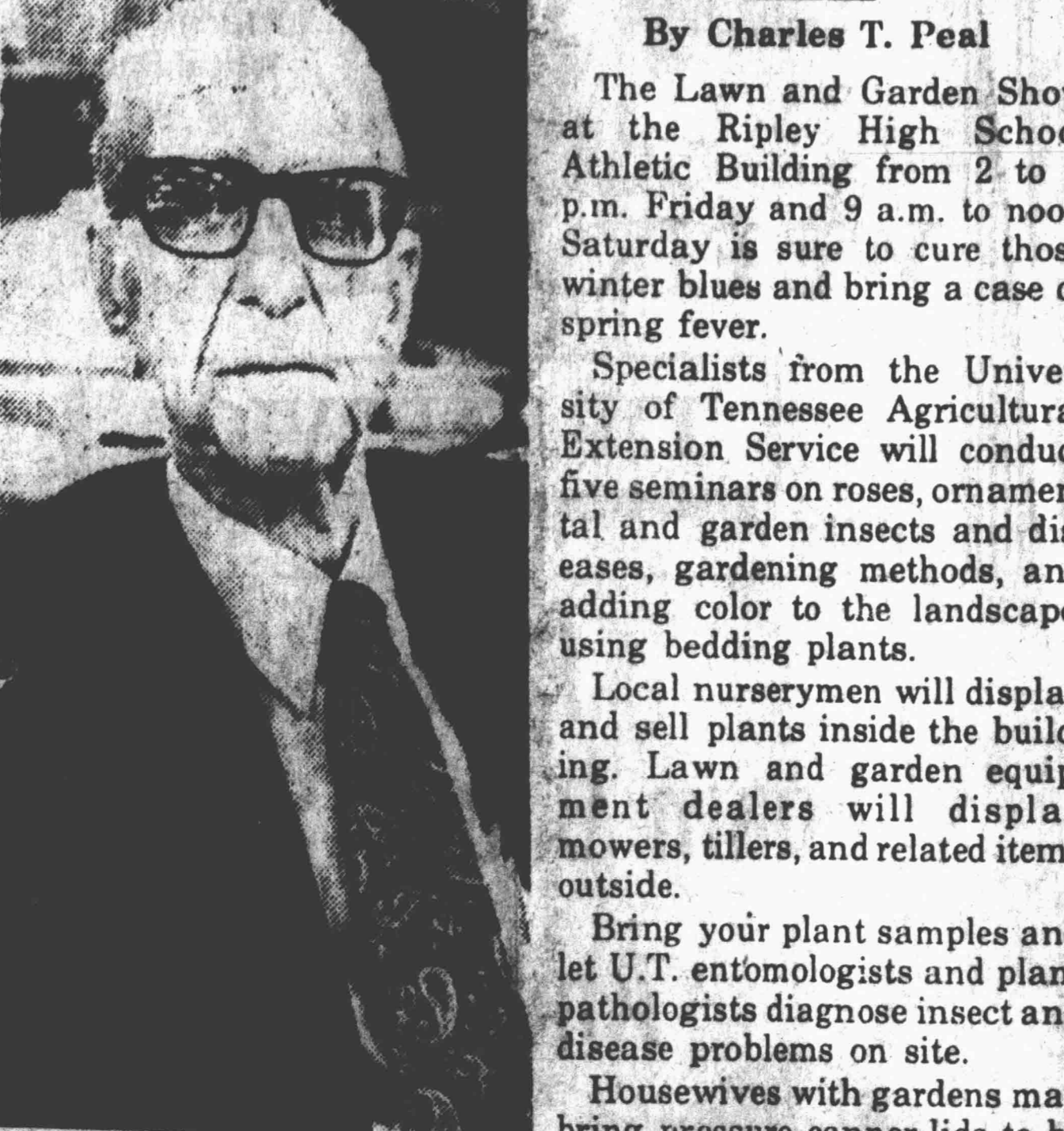

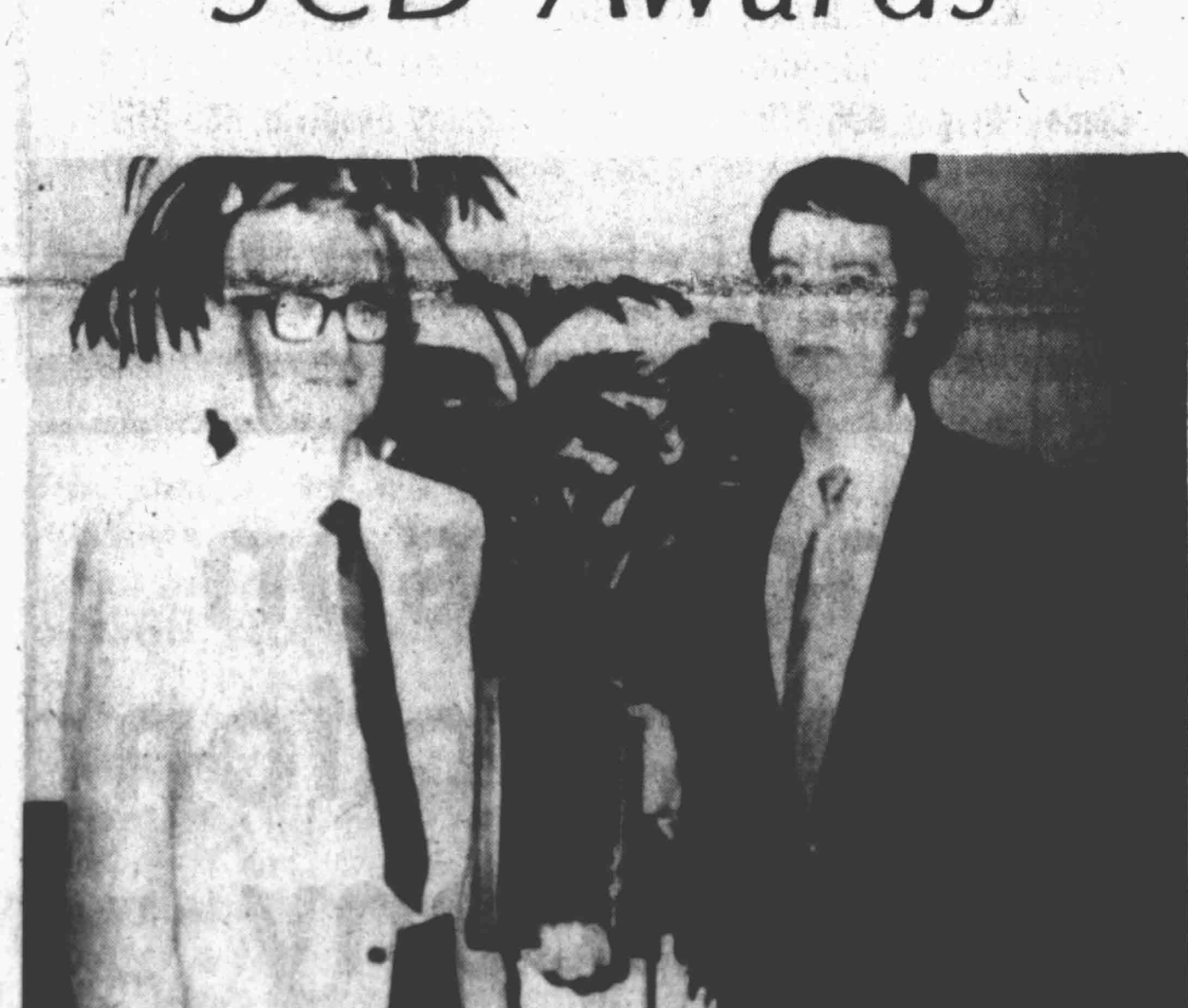
**Murder Verdict Earns 20 Years**

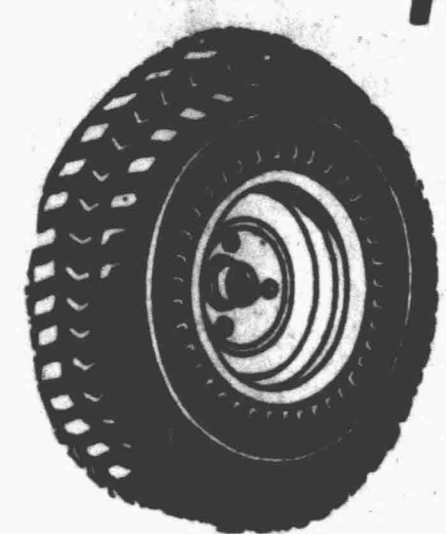

The original charge per telephone was \$1.48 per business phone. \$.50 per residential phone. Based on these original charges, your 911 Emergency Service Board felt Lauderdale County could afford the 911 System. Two months after we started to pay for the system, our rates were reduced, hurting our county's ability to pay for the 911 System. The Tennessee Legislature realized rural counties would be hurt by a fee cut, therefore, they passed a bill stating each county could charge a maximum of \$.65 per residential telephone, \$2.00 per business telephone. Your 911 Board felt we could get by with our original estimate. Starting with your April billing, each residential telephone will be charged \$.50, each business \$1.48.

If any questions arise, call 635-2278 or attend YOUR County's 911 Board meeting. We meet every second Tuesday of the month at the Ambulance Station (old hospital).

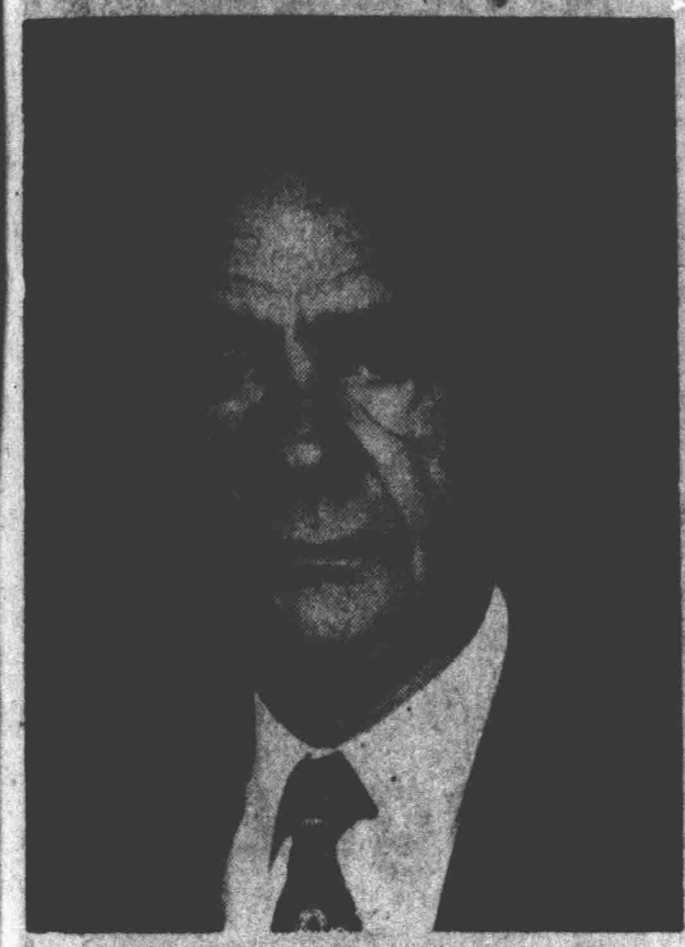
