



Finding German Cuisine In A Tennessee Hollow

Cumberland Mountains. Roger discovered the perfect place to enjoy


But once the German-born chef settled in and the aroma of his homemade hams, sausages and bread began to fill the hollow, word spread of his culinary talents, and the result was inevitable

Before long Salomon began constructing a rustic building of local wood and stone, and soon restaurant, Beggar's Castle, was open and drawing guests from hundreds of miles away

"For more than 400 years, members of my family have been chefs and innkeepers, so I thought ald go back to the family tradi-Salomon said.

Salomon's ancestry is reflected in the European-style menu which features German specialties. Using only fresh herbs and organic meats vegetables, he relies on a collect tion of more than 1,200 European recipes dating from 1100 to 1400. His remarkable skill at interpreting ancient recipes has been acclaimed by food critics from the New York Times to the Washington Post.

"I am going back to recipes that predate modern society," Salomon "I'm not preparing exotic said. recipes. I have an appreciation for dishes that have existed for hundreds of years and for the food that

my mother prepared." Salomon combines his recipe co lection with memories of his mother's cooking in Germany before World War II and his training as a chef in the South of France to create

"I remember the smell and color of foods that I had as a child, so I work at it until I've got it," he said. "I try like a rabbit sticking his nose out of a hole and hoping you don't

Salomon also experiments continuously to create his own specialties such as a wine and cheese sauce that he serves over sausage.

The ever-changing, made-from scratch menu includes such choices as Weiner Schnitzel, Sauerbraten, Bratwurst, Salmon Steamed in Wine, German Meat Pie and

Smoked Pork Loin with Sauerkraut and Spiced Apples. Dessert choices may include cheesecake with homemade strawberry preserves, chocolate mousse or black walnut pie, a local specialty. Meals are served with an appetizer, soup, homemade German bread and vegetables. A large selection of German beers is also available.

"I don't like processed foods," Salomon stressed. "All of our food is organic, and we make 99 percent of what you eat here. I have one assist tant who helps me cook. I have a local farmer growing veal according to the way I want. Somebody down the mountain grows fresh herbs with no chemicals, and the black walnut pie is made with walnuts harvested here."

Although Salomon's restaurant is widely acclaimed, when he moved into the hollow, going into business was the last thing on his mind.

"I always had a dream to retire. I lived in San Francisco and New York, and I hated living in the city," Salomon said

Traveling across the country in the early 1970s, Salomon spotted the valley from the highway. "I fell in love with Tennessee; it is a beautiful state," he said. "And thought it would be fascinating to

Hale Springs Inn

Carl Netherland-Brown and his wife, Janet, bought the old Hale Springs Inn in 1982, the once proud little hotel's classic Federal and Georgian architecture and rich history were hidden under layers of old paint, years of deterioration, and more than a century's worth of 'renovations

"It was somewhat shabby, but still structurally sound," Janet Nether land-Brown says candidly

Built in 1824 in the days when **Rogersville** was a thriving hub on the main stagecoach line from Virginia, and Tennessee's state capitol had only recently moved from the "metropolis" of Knoxville to the emerging city of Nashville almost 200 miles to the west, the Hale Springs Inn is Tennessee' oldest continuously operating lodging establishment.

"In those early days, the inn was known as McKinney's Tavern after John McKinney, the prominent lawyer and judge who built it," Janet Netherland Brown says. "Back then the inn hosted al! sorts of dignitaries, including presidents Andrew Jackson, James K. Polk and Andrew Johnson.

Hotel records show that Johnson. who was from nearby Greeneville. stayed at the inn frequently while he was practicing law in Rogersville.

"We know that he usually stayed on the third floor, but we don't know which room," Janet says. "We also know that President Polk stayed here, but the records don't show which room he used either. We do know which room President Jackson used on at least one occasion, though. He stayed here in 1837 during his final trip home to Nashville from Washing on, and we have an eyewitness account of that **visit** written by a man n**amed** Henry Clay Crawford who was about 10 years old when he met President Jackson here at the

Crawford's account of the great event describes Jackson as a man whose "form was as elect and straight as that of an Indian chief. His face was deeply marked with lines, but they appeared to be more the result of mental worry care a **rritation**, than old age. His hair

was very coarse, was almost white and stood up as stiff as a shoe brush remember wondering how he could possibly keep his hat on." The popularity of the Hale Springs Inn declined steadily after

those heady days of the 19th century when presidents visited Rogersville and stayed at the hote The large, elegant rooms were dividinto smaller rooms and new wings were added until the Netherland-Browns acquired the old hotel in 1982 and began their restoration of the historic old

"We started by demolishing most f the later additions to the original ouilding," Janet says. "The original hotel had ten rooms. Most of those original rooms had been divided up into smaller rooms. Ir the Andrew

Johnson Room, for example, th was a wall which bisected

tains the original ten rooms of th hotel, all furnished with authent antiques or period reproduction There are working fireplaces in eac president; Jackson, Polk and ohnson :ever knew - noder

The Netherlands-Browns added a dining room to the ground floor of the notel in 1987 which serves such traditiona period me ds as prime rib and Yo kshire pudding. There is also a dessert specialty aptly mained "Chocolate Decadence" which cortains such delights as trandy, whipped cream and raspt erry puree.




"Carl's mother was a member of the prominent Netherland family," Janet says. "Richard Netherland for example, built the Netherland Inn in 1818 at William King's boatvard on the Holston River at what is now the City of Kingsport, so innkeeping sort of runs in the family. Carl's mother was the one who got him interested in restoring both Rosemont and Hale Springs

For both Janet and Carl, the deci-sion to buy and restore the old inn was a major departure from their established way of life.

"Carl was, and is, a harbor pilot" Miami," Janet explains. "He works three or four weeks at a time and then has three or four weeks off so he can return to Rogersville frequently. Our son, Louis, and I now ive at Rosemont permanently and Carl joins us whenever he can. When he retires in a couple of years, he will also come back to Rogersville permanently. Earthquake experts from federal and state government testified. These witnesses were scientists, engineers, seismologists, and emergency response experts. They addressed a wide variety of issues associated with earthquake research in general and the New Madrid Fault in particular.

Among the information they shared with the committee is the woeful lack of funding that has been devoted to the federal Nation- cantly impact on our ability to conal Earthquake Hazards Reduction tinue research aimed at gaining a Program (NEHRP). This program was enacted in the late 1970s to begin focusing federal attention on areas that are particularly vulnera? ble to earthquakes. Through NEHRP, federal agencies and research centers with special expertise examine actions that could be taken to reduce earthquake hazards. For the most part, it consists of geophysical and seismological research into the nature of earthquakes. However, it also includes funds to develop educational materials for the general public in earthquake-prone areas, to develop better emergency management techniques, and improve the

seismic safety of federally owned facilities. Several federal agencies share the funds available under this program.

Unfortunately, one of the major points of this hearing was that funding for this important program has declined to a level that is equal to only 60 percent of what it was in 1980. That is a level that needs to be re-examained and, if possible, increased. By comparison, Japan spends \$2 billion per year in a similar program. That is 30 times the amount dedicated to this effort by the United States, despite the earthquake threat in many areas in our country like New Madrid with the potential to cause billions of dollars of damage.

A continued erosion of funding in this program will signifibetter understanding of earthquakes. It will ultimately reduce the number of siesmographs available to monitor earth tremors and minor quakes. It will prevent our country from modernizing a seismic reporting network that we are told is out dated.






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
