Crain's bill has been slowed in the Legislature by environmental interest. 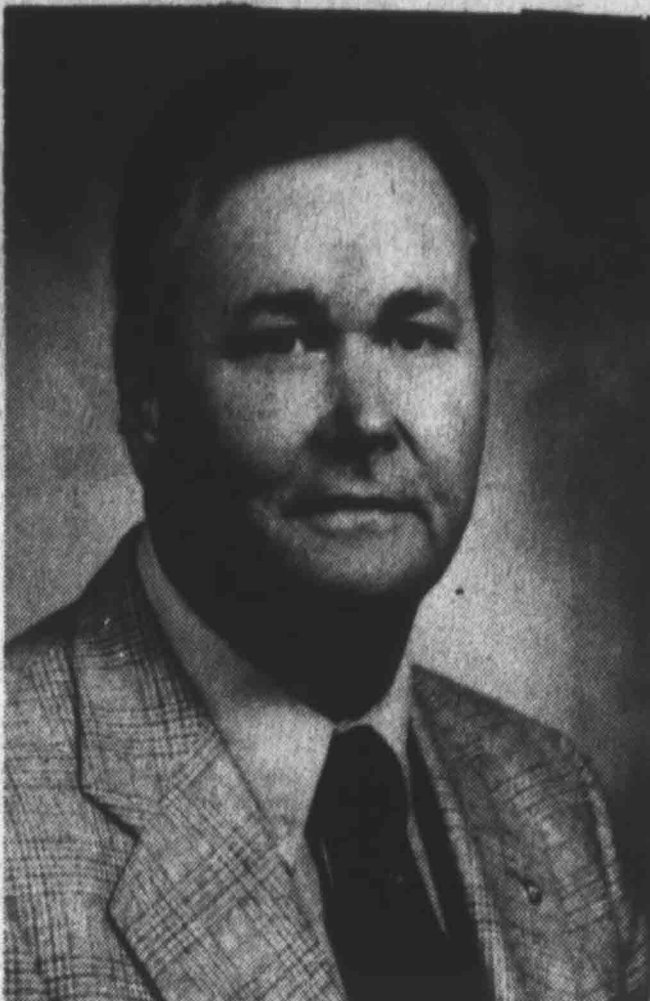

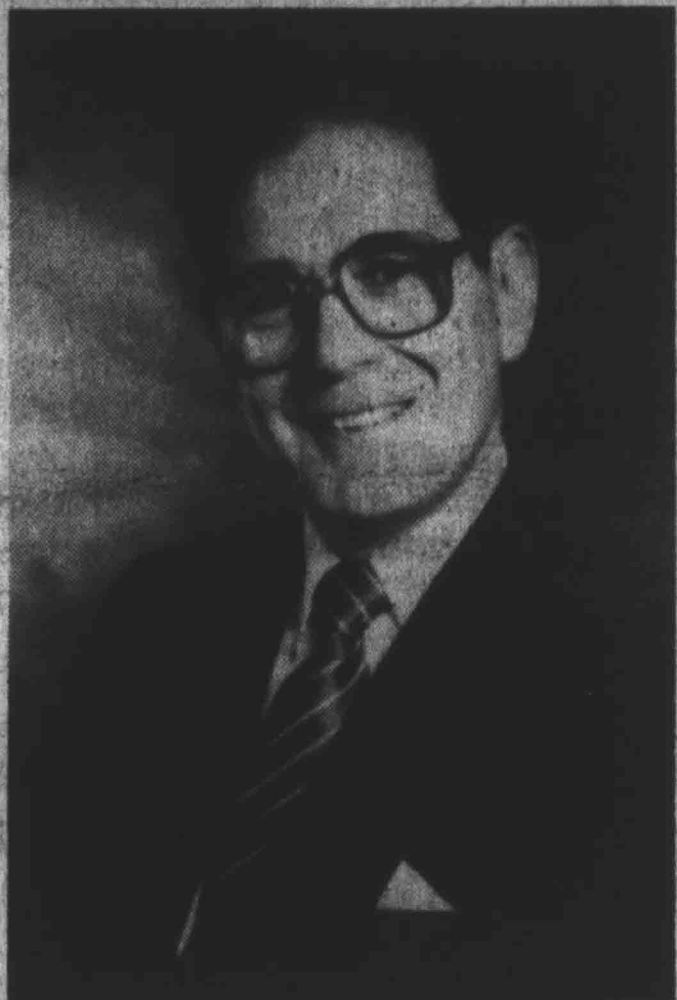

Returning Crain Presses Drainage Bill



DR. REGINALD MALLET, a practicing physician in England, Chief Medical Officer and General Manager of the Cheltenham Dist. Health Authority of Gloucestershire, including the Cotswolds, returns to the U.S. to speak in services in First United Methodist Church in Brownsville at 8:30 and 10:50 a.m. Sunday, April 15th, and 7 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. April 15-18th (coffee at 6:30 a.m., light breakfast at 7:30 a.m. Mon.-Wed.)

He first visited the U.S. in 1963, as a member of the Executive Committee of the World Methodist Council. He has since packed churches wherever he has spoken, including Ripley's First United Methodist Church.

Representative Floyd Crain called for the immediate passage of a drainage bill which he has co-sponsored with Representative Harold Holt, of Dyersburg. The bill would exempt certain flood-relief projects from the state's now permitting requirements.

"This bill is aimed at draining artificial wetlands - not true wetlands - which have been created by streams becoming clogged by debris and beaver dams," said Representative Crain. "It simply allows landowners to reclaim flooded timber and crop land" Crain continued.

The bill is supported by 20 of 21 West Tennessee County Executives, the Board of Directors of the Obion-Forked Deer Basin Authority, and the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation. "The fact that nearly all of the rural West Tennessee Representatives have co-sponsored the bill further demonstrates the need for this action," Crain added. "The bill has nothing to do with channelization. This is an issue of property rights. I believe landowners should be able to protect their timber and crop land to the point that continuous flooding from streams will not turn their land into swamps. Landowners need to be able to protect their assets - valuable timber and crop land," said Crain.

Chocolate Almond Gateau

One 12-oz. pkg. (2 cups) Nestlé Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels (reserve 1 cup for Gateau Glaze) 3/4 cup sugar 2/3 cup butter, softened 3 eggs, separated 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/2 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 cup milk 2/3 cup ground toasted almonds Gateau Glaze (see recipe below) Preheat oven to 350°F. Melt over hot (not boiling) water, 1 cup Nestlé Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels; stir until smooth; set aside. In large mixer bowl, beat sugar and butter until creamy. Beat in melted morsels, egg yolks, vanilla extract and salt. Gradually beat in flour and milk. Stir in almonds.

In small bowl, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form. Fold into chocolate batter. Spread in greased 9x2-inch springform pan. Bake 25-30 minutes. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pan. Cool completely. Spread glaze over cake, covering top and sides.

Makes 8-10 servings Gateau Glaze 3 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons light corn syrup 1 tablespoon water 1 cup Nestlé Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels, reserved from Chocolate Almond Gateau In small saucepan, combine butter, corn syrup and water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly. Bring to a boil; remove from heat. Add remaining 1 cup morsels. Stir until morsels are melted and mixture is smooth. Cool to room temperature.

Hot Cross Buns Two 1/4-oz. pkgs. active dry yeast 1/2 cup warm water 1 cup milk, warmed 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened 1/2 cup sugar 3 eggs 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 5 cups all-purpose flour 1 cup raisins 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon One 12-oz. pkg. (2 cups) Nestlé Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels Sugar Glaze (see recipe above right)

In small bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. In large bowl, combine milk, butter, sugar, eggs, salt and vanilla extract. Add yeast. Stir in flour, raisins and cinnamon. On lightly floured board, knead dough 2 minutes. Add Nestlé Toll House semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Knead until smooth and elastic, about 3 minutes. Cover with plastic wrap; let rise in warm place 2 hours. Punch down, cover and let rise 30 minutes. Shape into 24 buns. Place in two greased 13x9-inch baking pans. Cover and let rise until double, about 45 minutes. Preheat oven to 350°F. Bake 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 5 minutes; remove from pans. Cool slightly. Drizzle glaze over each bun, forming a cross on each bun. Makes about 24 buns Sugar Glaze 1 cup confectioners' sugar 2 tablespoons milk In small bowl, stir confectioners' sugar and milk until smooth.

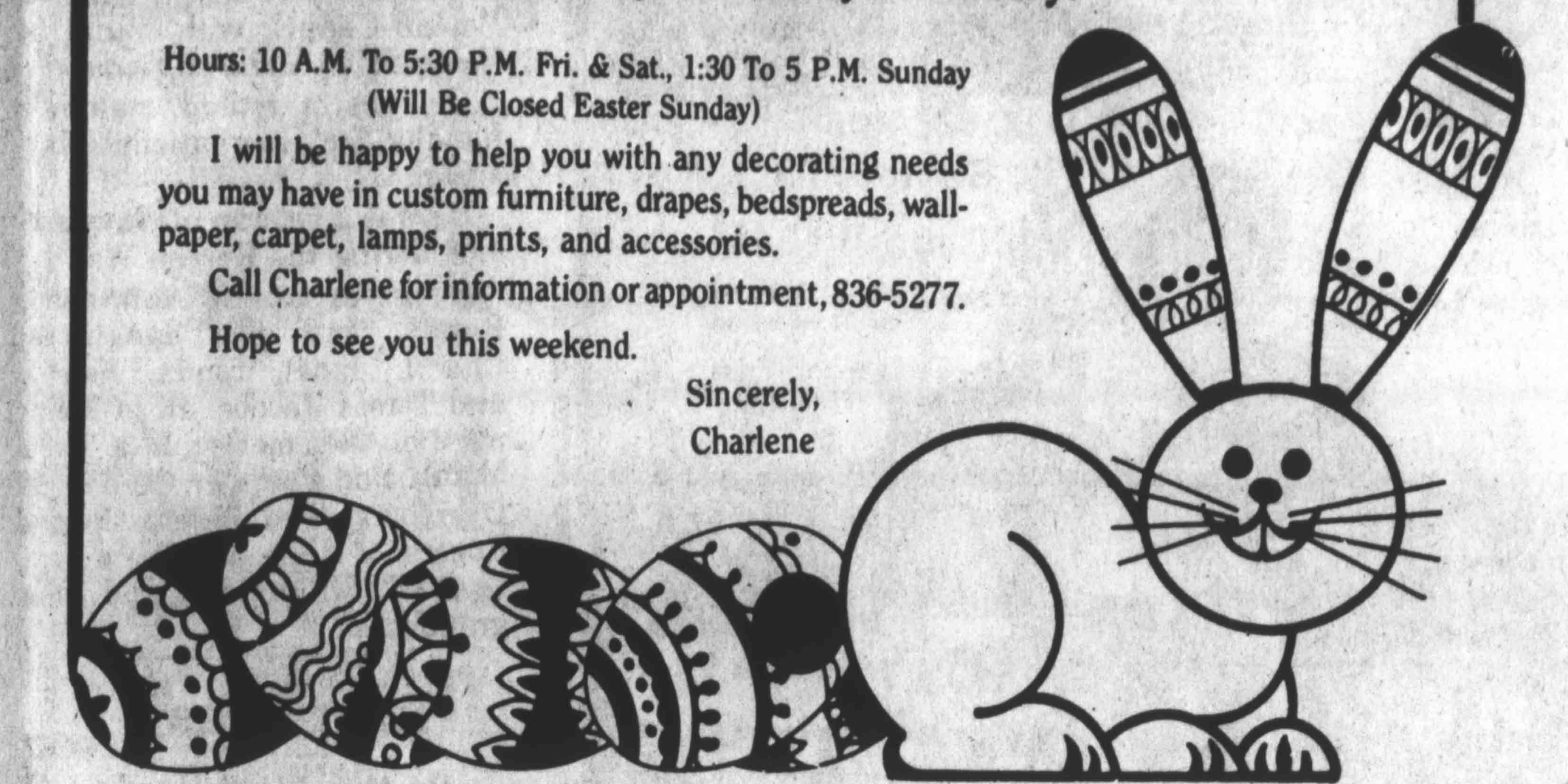

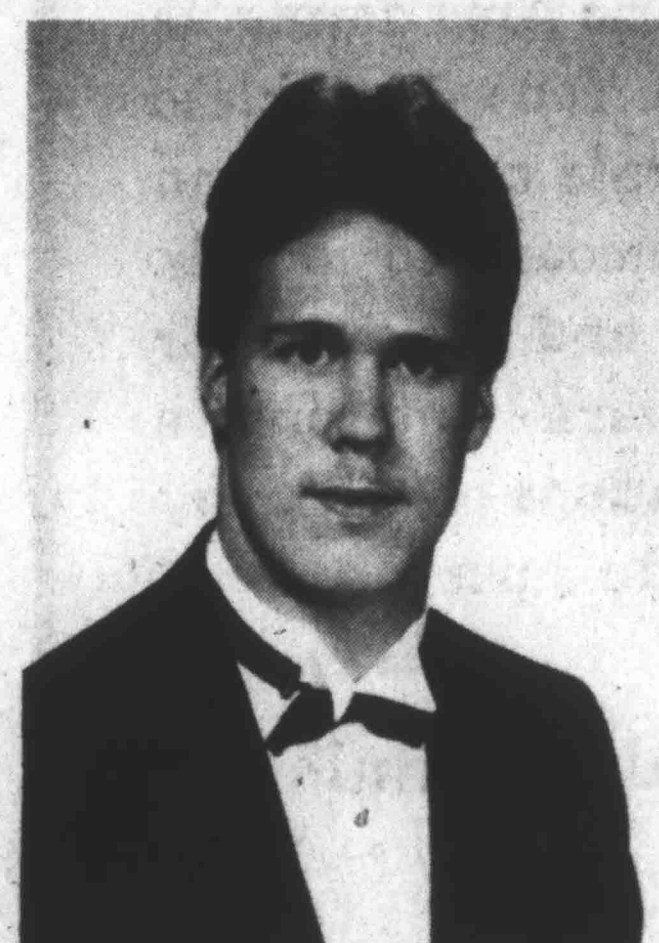

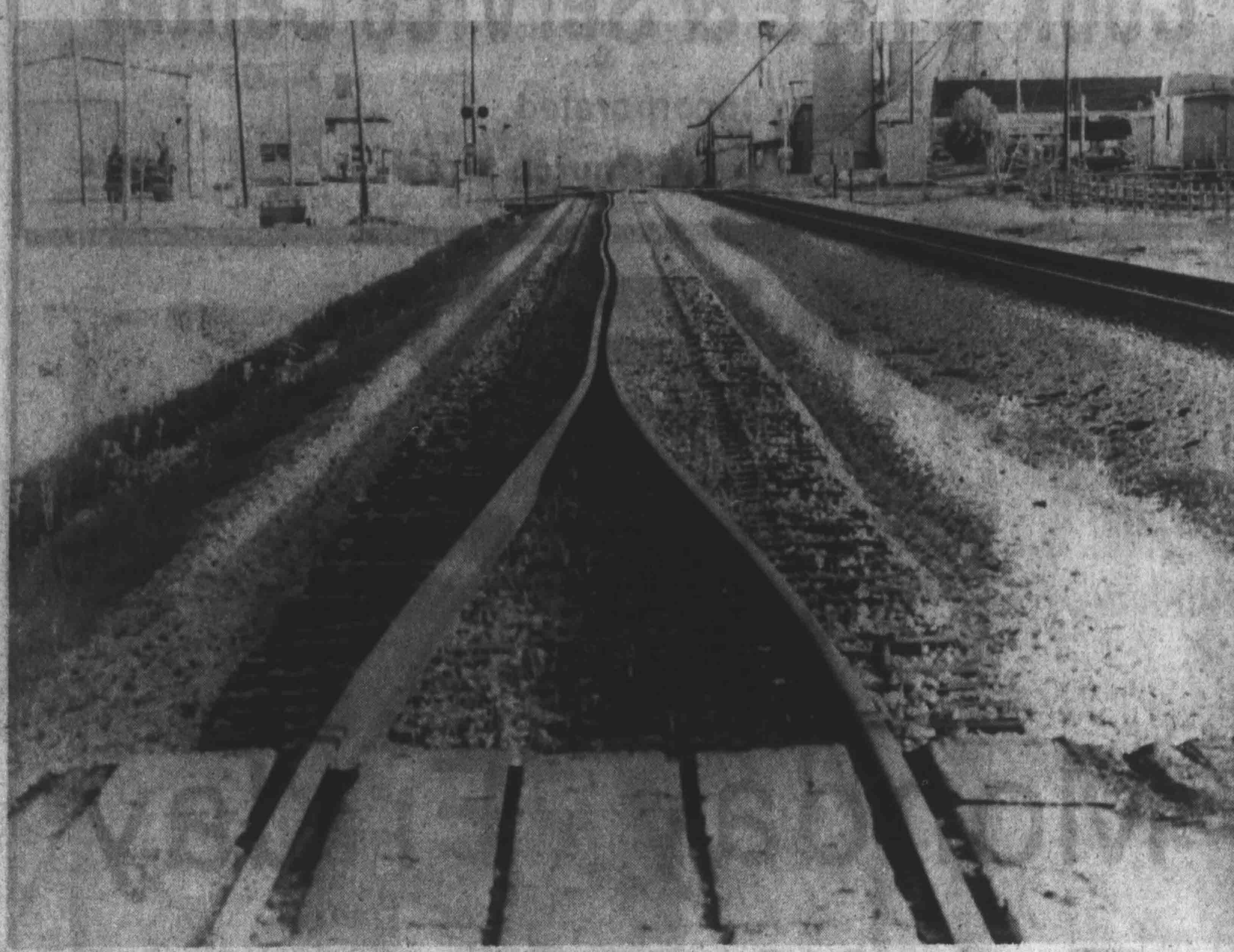

A New Tradition on Jackson's Square



JACKSON, Tenn. — Twenty years ago Clark Shaw's father looked at the fading downtown that was once the center of Jackson society and dreamed of opening a turn-of-the-century style restaurant to spur revitalization of the area.

In 1989, he decided the time was right. "I'm a member of several groups which are working on downtown. There is a strong feeling of anticipation about the future of downtown," Shaw said. "With the Jackson Main Street Program and investment groups like Jackson Centre, Inc., we are working toward economic revitalization."

The downtown already has several advantages. Some 70 to 80 percent of the buildings date to the late 19th century and much work has already been done on landscaping.

Shaw took the first step in a new business venture by opening his downtown restaurant, hoping that others will follow. "We want to be a strong catalyst toward positive change in a historical theme," Shaw said. "I hope that as the development continues downtown will become a major focus for Jackson."

"Eventually we hope there will be other restaurants, shops, antique stores and tearooms compatible with a historical design," he said. "We also envision a residential community of studio apartments and condominiums in the upper levels of many buildings."

In selecting a building for lunch right now and are available for private banquets in the evening," Shaw said. "But I foresee us being open in the evenings as the downtown is revitalized."

Plans also call for an outdoor patio next to the restaurant with a bricked wall, lots of flowers and tables with colorful umbrellas overhead for dining out in warm weather. Hours for breakfast are 7 to 11 a.m. Lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. The restaurant is open Monday through Friday.

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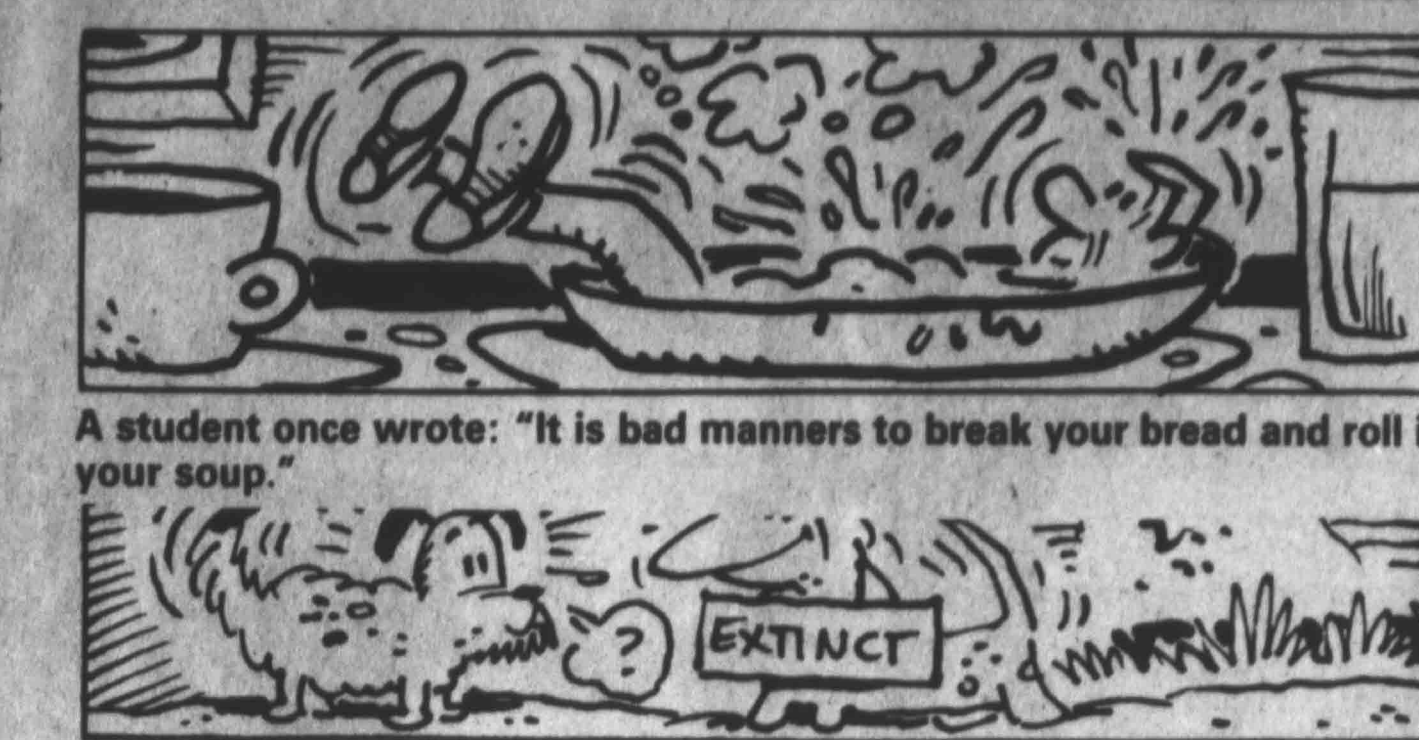

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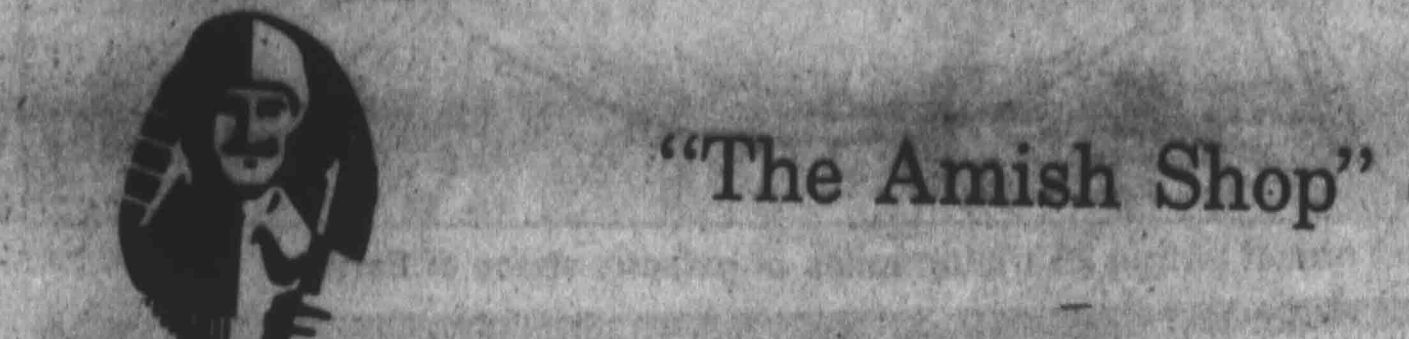
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"The Amish Shop" of Tennessee

ETHRIDGE, Tenn. - Down winding chert roads, past two-story, white farmhouses, little handmade signs lead travelers from all over the world to Faye Henson's Amish Shop. The road is plainly marked, and the route is dotted with the Amish in buggies and buckboards, dressed in the simple, dark clothes that denote their life of separation from the modern world passing by them.

To Faye, these Amish neighbors are her partners in commerce as she deals in their handmade goods and country crafts, selling them to the public they themselves often avoid.

"I found that I had time in my retirement to make a little money, but I wanted to have fun doing it and stay at home. The Amish were all around me, also in need of money, and very talented. So, when I opened this shop next to my house, I began to sell the items that no one could get by knocking on their doors."

"The Amish craftsmen produce doll furniture, kitchen aprons, and miniature hats that I have designed exclusively for this shop. I also sell their traditional crafts like rocking chairs, quilts and baskets."

A quick tour of the one-room shop is overwhelming with every wall and shelf used to display a wealth of crafts ready for this season's buyers. Eye straw hats in miniature,

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Dutch and some German. Religious services, weddings and funerals are also private affairs. "Church services" are held in homes every two weeks. They do not attempt to convert nor do they have revivals. Members of the community are expected to attend services unless sick. Hymns are sung in slow, wailing rhythms, as they have been for generations.

The lifestyle of the Amish represents the values they have cherished for hundreds of years—devout religion, a love of land and a commitment to family and community. For this they suffered persecutions in Europe and migrated to America by invitation of William Penn, a Quaker and founder of Pennsylvania. Today, no Amish communities exist outside the United States.

The Amish Shop is located off of Brewer Road in Ethridge, Tennessee, off U.S. Highway 43, approximately six miles north of Lawrenceburg. Watch for the Amoco station on the left and turn right at the Dickson Feed Mill and follow the signs to the shop. It is best to call ahead (615) 829-2723 to be sure the shop is open.

The Amish who bring their wares to the Amish Shop are members of the Swartzentruber group, named for the bishop who originally led them. This particular group is known for their deep commitment to "the old ways," permitting no change in lifestyle or worship as have other groups of Amish in other parts of the country.

Their history in Lawrence County began in January of 1944 when three families arrived from Mississippi. Searching for better farmland at cheaper prices, they settled west of Three Oaks. Much to their sorrow, a local lady, who directed one family to their new home, told them that they had come to a poor land. But being well-versed in the ways of successful farming, and without the modern constraints of time, they stayed and founded a community that has grown to approximately 150 families, with an average of three to seven children per family.

In the fifty years that followed the community's founding, the Amish have improved the soil where they have farmed and have lived off the land with great skill.

"I have never known them to experience a crop failure," remarked Faye Henson, "even when people around them were having problems. You will never hear them complain about the weather, either. I may say, 'We need rain,' but they will say, 'If we needed rain, the Lord would have sent it.' I guess we don't need it after all."

Visitors to the area will see the Amish at work in their fields raising a variety of crops. What they will not see is the children idle in their yards, for when not at work with the parents, they are in one of the five schools run by the Amish community. School is mandatory until the eighth grade or until age 14. Courses are offered in the basics of reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling. They also learn three languages—English, Pennsylvania

Postal Pointers

If It Seems Too Good To Be True—It Probably Is...

None of us would intentionally allow ourselves to be "taken in" by a fraudulent scheme. Con artists use the latest selling techniques to make their product appear attractive, irresistible and at times, "almost too good to be true" in an effort to trap the unwary. Some of these same selling techniques are also used by honest business people, that's why it's sometimes very difficult to separate the bad buys from the good buys.

There are several popular schemes to be wary of, for example: charity frauds that play on an individual's sympathy, home improve-

ment schemes that sound attractive to the pocketbook, and work-at-home opportunities that sound easy and profitable.

Most mail solicitations for charitable contributions are legitimate appeals by reputable organizations. Unfortunately, some are not. Use the following guidelines to see that your contributions go to the needy, not the greedy.

First, give only to charities you know. Check with the Better Business Bureau regarding charities you have never heard of, or those with names similar to well-known charities. Second, be suspicious of charities that only accept cash. Fraudulent operators don't want you to be able to stop payment on a personal check when you discover the charity is a phony.

Now let's take a look at home repairs. Home repairs and improve-

ments can be costly, so beware if somebody mails you a brochure offering to do an expensive job for an unusually low price. Additionally, many legitimate companies offer to do free inspections of your home; however, this is also a favorite trick of dishonest home repair firms. "Free" inspections sometimes turn up expensive repairs that are not really needed. Once you sign a contract and put some money down, you may never see the repairman or your money again.

Use the following precautions when considering home repair: Get several estimates for each repair job and compare prices and terms.

Ask your friends for recommendations, or ask the firm for references and check them out.

Contact your Better Business Bureau or state or local consumer protection office to verify the company's reputation before you authorize any work.

The promise of earning easy money at home causes people to lose millions of dollars each year to unscrupulous promoters.

Watch out for scams that are aimed at the elderly, the unemployed, and the housebound who might want to supplement their incomes by stuffing envelopes, making baby booties, and other specialty products for which there is little or no market.

One thing to remember in all of those examples, or whenever ordering something through the mail, never send cash. Always make your check or money order payable to an organization, never to an individual.

If you feel you have been victimized, or have information about questionable advertisements or "opportunities," contact your local post office or nearest Postal Inspector (listed in the phone book under U.S. Government).

Remember, if it seems too good to be true, it probably is.

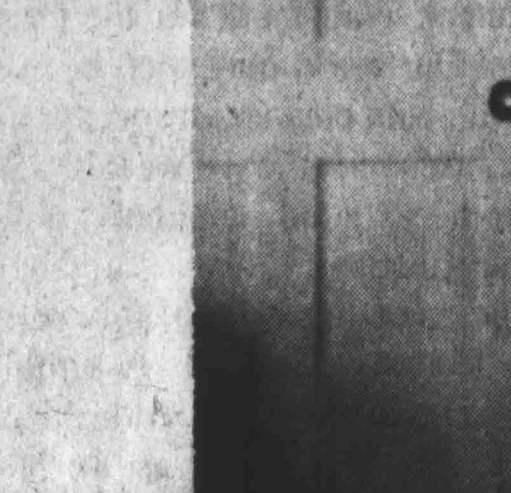

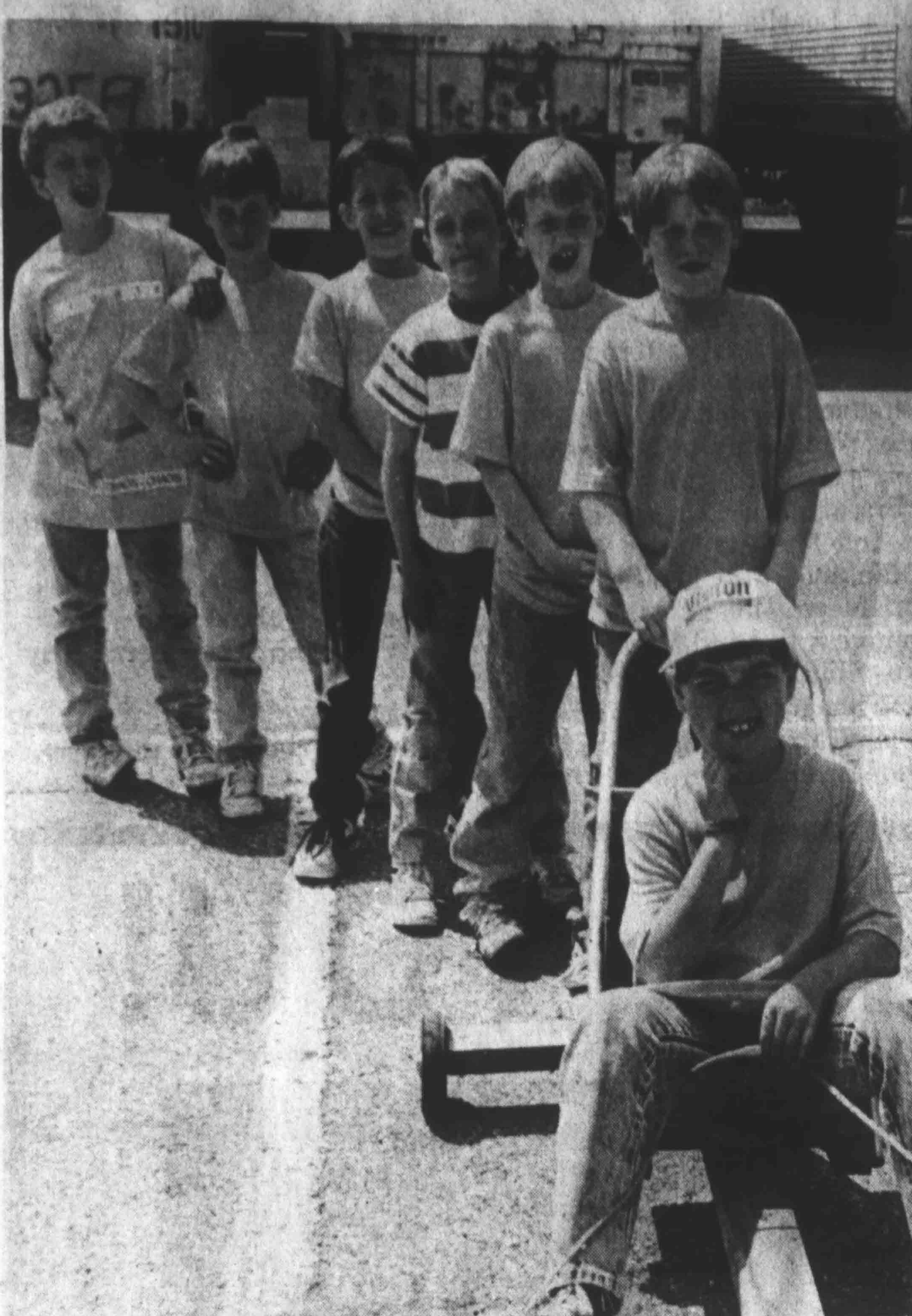

Protecting Our Environment

On the Way: A Cleaner Planet?

Polluters: Watch out for the Green Helms! Our world may soon be more wonderful, with cleaner air, oceans and land for all of us to enjoy, if we take a few hints from our good neighbors in Europe: the Austrians.

At the recent opening of this year's United Nations General Assembly, Austria's Foreign Minister, Alois Mock, put forth this idea: "Just as we have become accustomed to the Blue Helms of the U.N. peacekeeping operations," he said, "we hope that in the foreseeable future U.N. Green Helms may engage in the protection of the environment."

According to the Austrian Foreign Minister, a system should be created to help countries prevent or settle environmental disputes. It could also facilitate investigations into situations the U.N. considers a threat to international peace and security or to "the global commons."

"As the interdependence of nations grows and environmental problems threaten the very survival of this planet, the challenges to international law-making will considerably increase," the Austrian Foreign Minister says. Perhaps the U.N. "Green Helms" could be an environmental police force around the world guarding the planet's most precious natural resources!

Halls History

by Mrs. Charles Alsbrook Kenneth Jerre Trabue Jordan was buried Wednesday April 1990, in Halls Cemetery. Few people knew him by any name but Jerre.

While he was in the Merchant Marines the people in command called Kenneth Jerre Jordan many times, and Jerre never moved a muscle. That is how the pronunciation of Jordan (Jer-dan) was changed to Jordan by his family.

When Jerre was Mayor of Halls 1955-67, I was City Recorder. I also thought of myself as his secretary.

My husband, Charles, grew up on South College Street as Jerre did. Most all the residents owned their homes; the boys played baseball and football in the Mitchell cow pasture, learned to swim in Sumrow Creek and played croquet in the Grover Parrish's side yard. Caleb Crittendon also formed a tennis club with the court located in Mammy Jordan's (Jerre's grandmother) yard on East Tugait Street.

I only knew Jerre from the time I entered Halls High School. After we were both married, we were neighbors and our children were friends and played together. However the twelve years we spent in the Mayor's Office, were most meaningful for both of us.

Jerre made me feel good about myself, as he did many other people. That was a special talent he had. Lynn Harris, Louise Thurmond and Maireba Thompson all said the same thing about him. Bro. Kim Kallow said at the Halls First Methodist Church 10 a.m. funeral service, Jerre was the kind of person you went to see and wanted to help him feel better (he was very ill the past few months) and you came away feeling better about yourself. Faye Currie, a cousin, said in time of sickness, death or trouble Jerre would be the first to come and help in any way he could.

I remember when we were in the Mayor's office, citizens would come with a problem or for political support. He listened, treated them with courtesy and whether the person was the Governor of Tennessee or someone unable to pay their gas and water bill, he respected them and helped them if he could.

Jerre will be missed by his wife, Naulena, his children, Matt and children, Jordan and Alex, of Pensacola, Fla.; sisters, Carol Crumpler and Dorothy Moore, of Dyersburg; Edna Budda, of Shreveport, La; and his brother, Bruce Jordan, of Collierville; their families and Naulena's family and friends and other relatives.
