## Time To Battle Alfalfa Weevil

County alfalfa producers are encouraged to take action against the "weevil" before it damages their crops.

Everyone growing alfalfa more than one year knows that the weevil can ruin the first cutting. Later cuttings have been damaged, also.

Damage from the green larvae stage usually starts about April 1st. Noticeable damage occurs about two weeks later.

If you see starlings or blackbirds fly out of your field in bunches, you have already sustained heavy damage.

Spraying Furadan about March 20th to April 1st has given extra hay yields the last couple of years.

If weevils are caught within a week of first harvest, cutting the alfalfa is an alternative to spraying.

If spraying is needed, recommendations include Dimethoate, Diazinon, Furadan, Guthion, Imidan, Methomyl, Malathion, Sevin, and Supracide. Follow label directions. Request alfalfa publications P&SS No. 12 and Publication 1033.

## Pig Producer Rules

Producers selling feeder pigs must once again have brood sows blood-tested for pseudo-rabies. The procedure is the same as in past years.

County producers have generally kept up their certification, and this pays off when one is checked.

Feeder pig sellers in Tennessee are reminded that 1989 marketing cards are valid only one year from issue date.

To receive a card, contact your veterinarian to have the sow herd monitored for pseudo-rabies.

Take the pseudo-rabies test result sheet to the Count Extension Leader, to certify that you are a bonafide producer and do not deal in feeder pigs.

You then take your certification form to the market to receive your new green 1990 marketing card; in some cases, the County Extension Leader may issue the card.

The certification form provides a place to list members of your immediate family in whose names pigs may be sold in 1990. This will accommodate sons, daughters and spouses who have claim to separate ownership of pigs included in a common family herd.

It's hoped that the Tennessee pseudo-rabies program will be amended in 1990 to comply with the national program and include all producers in the state.

## Fruit Spray Time

Homeowners keep the phone hot in spring, calling about spraying fruit and nut trees.

Beat the rush, insects, and diseases, by coming by the Extension Office and picking up Publication 375, "Home Fruit Spray Schedule."

These and many other valuable publications are available to help make your efforts more fruitful.

## To Uganda



**DR. BOB HATHCOCK**—son of Buford Hathcock, of Ripley, and the late Odell Hathcock—a professor of agronomy at the University of Tennessee in Martin, is going, with his wife, Lynda, daughter of Mrs. William Webster, of Ripley, and the late Mr. Webster, to Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, in Africa, in mid-September to serve three months as the second U.S. educator sponsored abroad in a linkage program by the U.S. Agency for International Development and the American Assn. of State Colleges and Universities.

He will teach and research weed science and control, hoping to gain insights into international agricultural needs he can bring back to UTM.

"Sometimes we tend to think everything happens in the U.S.," he says.

Makerere's school of agriculture is "very strong for a third world country," he says.

With UTM 20 years, Hathcock applied for similar service in Central America but was accepted for Uganda, with which Ohio State University has an agricultural contract.

REPORTS TO THE  
**EIGHTH DISTRICT**

In the two months since the 101st Congress ended its first session, the world has witnessed a dramatic unfolding of events in both Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. Citizens of virtually every Soviet block country have peacefully, in most cases, demanded and received democratic reforms. Regimes which were once wholly in the sphere of Soviet influence have now become governments free to act as they choose.

These positive steps toward democracy are a welcome sign not only to the East Europeans who look forward to an easing of economic tensions, but to the West who look forward to an easing of military tensions. Looking behind these developments, however, I am cautious about neglecting the continued Soviet military presence in Eastern Europe as well as in the Third World.

When the President submits his 1991 defense budget proposals, Congress will necessarily reassess the threats that concern us today. Among those threats are continued drug related violence, terrorism, conventional war, and a full-scale nuclear war. In contrast to years past, the likelihood of a nuclear exchange is slim. Rather than a fear of World War Three, the United States has become more fearful of war in the Third World.

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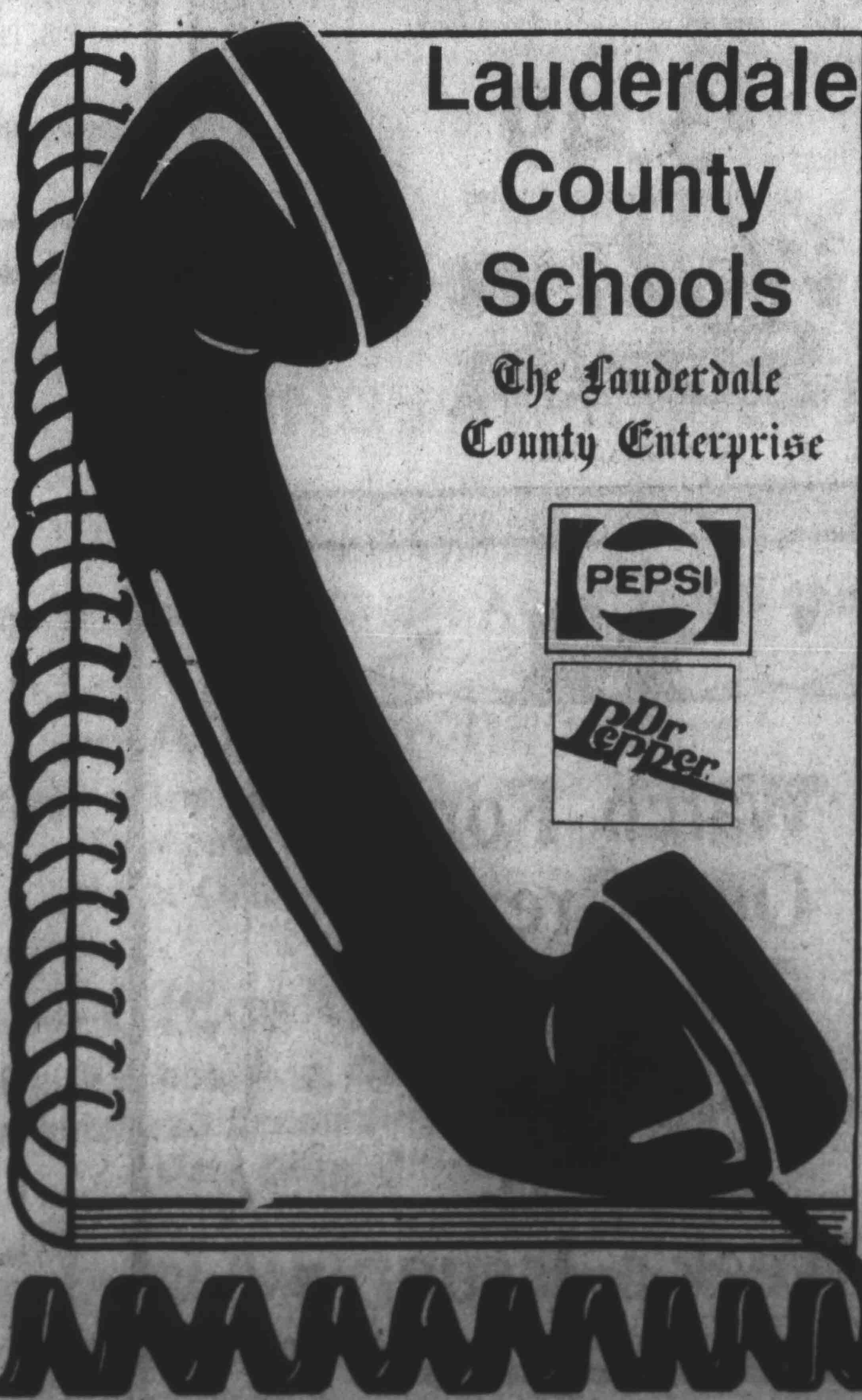

## Held For Stabbing Murder, Charged With Another Try

Arthur Alford, Jr., 29, of Route 6, Ripley, indicted Monday by the county grand jury for first degree murder and aggravated robbery in the stabbing death of Robert Cashel, 64, faces an added charge of attempt to commit first degree murder in stabbing Walter Vowell, 24, of Ripley, in the county jail in Ripley.

Vowell, serving a sentence for receiving and concealing stolen property, was found by Deputy Jailer Willie Whitelaw about 1:56 a.m. Saturday, bleeding from four stab wounds in the chest and side, in a cell shared with Alford, Leon Booker, of Dyer County, and 19 other prisoners. Vowell is expected to recover in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale in Ripley.

County investigator Lynn Gould says Vowell told him Booker invited him to the floor before Alford stabbed him. Booker is also charged with attempt to commit first degree murder.

Gould says Whitelaw found a lock-blade pocket knife with a 4-inch blade wrapped in a pair of shorts and concealed in a garbage can in the cell.

Alford had been allowed in the cell to give him access to bath and sanitary facilities.

Alford has been jailed since Nov. 4th, when he was arrested by Ripley police investigator Steve

Sanders and Sgt. Charles (Buddy) Moore for the death of Cashel, a part-time security guard at the Upperware plant in Halls.

Cashel was found dead about 6:30 a.m. Nov. 2nd, on the floor of his trailer at 207 Orange Ripley, with 38 stab wounds.

Neighbors had noticed lights on and the trailer door open after Cashel would normally had left for work.

He had retired after 25 years with Siegel-Roberts

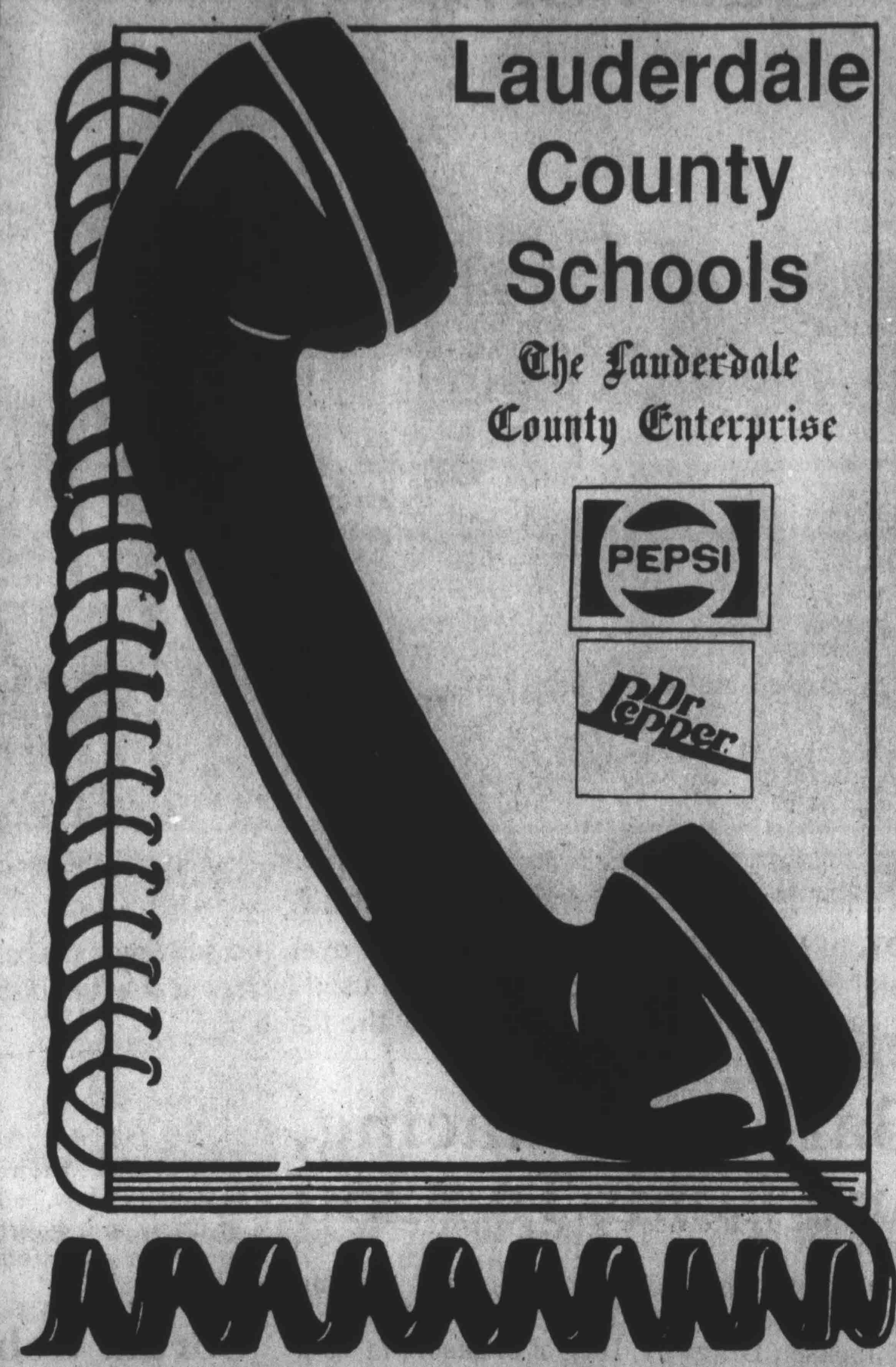

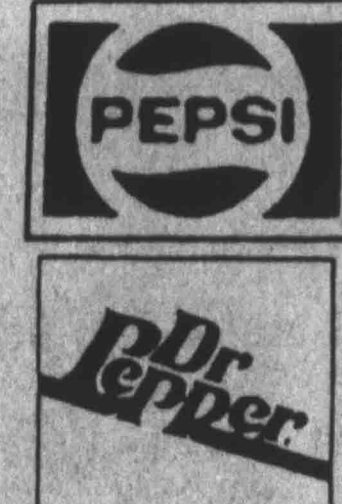

### Growers Nearing Fertilizing Wheat

By Jerry Parker  
Producers will begin fertilizing wheat soon. Wheat fertilized this past fall should receive an additional 30 to 60 pounds of nitrogen between Feb. 15th and March 15th. Use the earlier date if the stand is thin. This will promote tillering. All nitrogen should be applied before wheat develops the first joint.

Nitrogen sources don't matter if the nitrogen is tied to the soil within two to three days.

### Fruit Varieties

Winter's the time to think about ordering small fruits, such as strawberries and blackberries. This year you have several new small fruit varieties you may wish to try.

Lester is a new mid-season variety of strawberries that has a lot of promise. If you'd like to add a late strawberry variety, consider Lateglow. Tristar and Tribute are productive everbearing strawberries.

A recently released thorned blackberry is Choctaw. This variety bears earlier and has smaller seeds than other thorned varieties.

A new thornless blackberry variety is Chester.

Seedless grapes are becoming more popular with home gardeners. The University of Arkansas has just released a seedless variety called Saturn. It's similar to western grapes which have skins that adhere to inner fruit flesh.

New raspberry varieties also are available. Titan is a summer-fruited red raspberry. If you prefer fall red raspberries, Ruby is a good choice.

## Little Dissent For Governor

Governor Ned McWherter has submitted his major proposals for the 1990 session to the leadership of both the state House of Representatives and the state Senate.

House Majority Leader Jimmy Naifeh (D-Covington) is elected by the House Democratic Caucus to sponsor and solicit support for the governor's legislative package and said the 1990 proposals should receive wide support.

"I've had no shortage of interest in finding sponsors for the governor's agenda for the final session of the 96th General Assembly," Naifeh said. "The governor is interested in a wide array of issues this year and all of his proposals should pass with relative ease."

The following is a brief synopsis of the governor's major proposals for 1990:

**Hazardous Waste Reduction**—This legislation is aimed at reducing industrial and business-generated waste by 25 percent by 1995. The law would require waste generators to prepare a waste reduction plan prior to receiving a new permit.

Plans for fully-regulated or large generators would be required in 1992 and small generators would require plans in 1994. Waste generators would also have to complete an annual progress report to demonstrate progress in reducing waste.

House Conservation and Environment Committee Chairman I.V. Hillis, Jr. (D-Sparta) said the legislation does not require sanctions for generators which do not implement plans, but said the Administration is hoping that the planning process will identify cost savings for waste generators.

"We don't want to use a heavy hand in trying to bring about a reduction in waste," Hillis said. "We believe that when the Department of Health and Environment contracts with these waste generators they can provide them with assistance that will help them reduce waste and be eager to reduce waste as a cost effective measure."

**Criminal Injuries Fund**—The governor, along with State Treasurer Steve Adams, are proposing an increase in the awards made to victims of crime authorized under the current laws allowing for victim compensation.

The legislation also calls for a \$1.5 million fund for victims of child abuse. This money would be used for counseling and treatment of children victimized by child abuse.

Interest drawn from the Criminal Injuries Fund surplus would be used to provide one-time grants through the state department of Human Services to establish additional spouse abuse shelters in all 95 counties.

The current maximum of \$7,500 would be increased to \$10,000 and the maximum award for victims of drunk drivers would increase from \$2,000 to \$10,000.

The program, administered by the state treasurer, awards \$4 million annually to victims of crime.

**Child Pornography**—The Administration is trying to crack down on laws relating to the sale, distribution or possession of child pornography.

Under the McWherter proposal, using a minor in photographs or videos would open a criminal to a penalty of up to 30 years in prison. Transporting child pornography into the state or distributing pornography would be punishable by up to 12 years in prison. Possession of child pornography would be punishable by up to six years in prison.

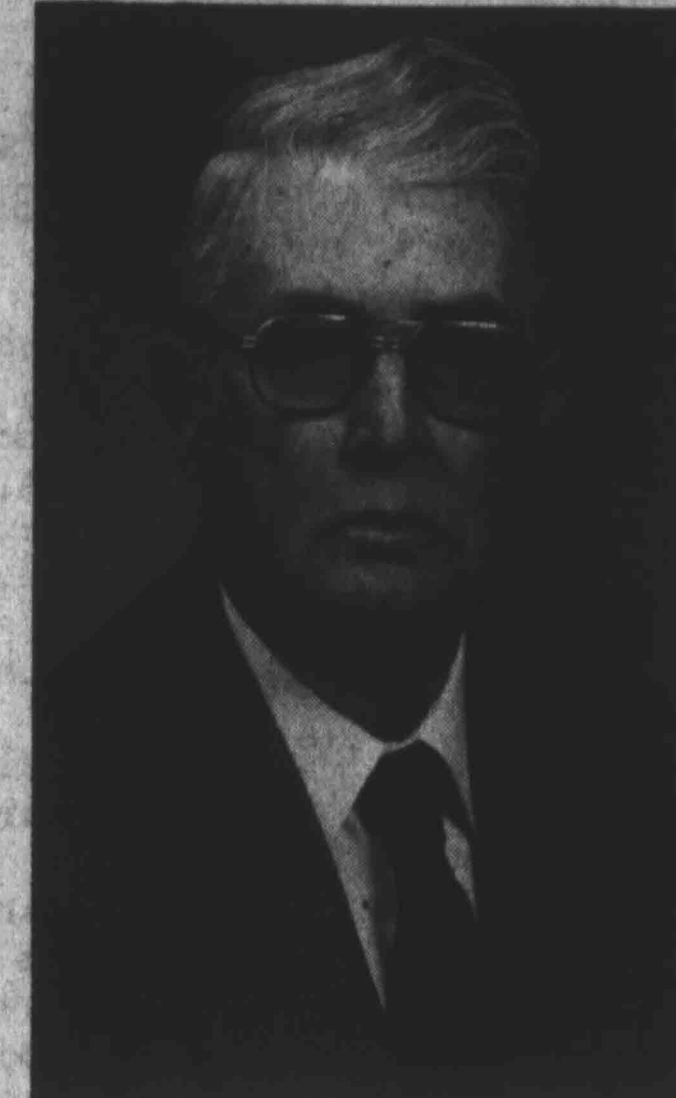
The legislation would also allow juries to apply community standards, rather than a state-wide standard in determining whether the material is harmful to minors.

Naifeh said the most significant change would involve changing the legal standard from "utterly without merit" to "lacking serious merit."

"We really have no tolerance for these types of materials being sold and distributed in our state," Naifeh said. "If we can reduce child pornography, increasing prison terms will be doing children everywhere a favor."

licenses revoked for other causes would also be required to certify that their fines had been paid.

The certification would be accompanied by a \$3 filing fee payable to the state Department of Safety.

**School Drop-Outs**—In an effort to reduce the number of students dropping out of school, the governor is proposing legislation revoking driver licenses for people under 18 who leave school without graduating.

The legislation calls for superintendents to notify the Department of Safety when students accumulate 15 unexcused absences or 10 consecutive unexcused absences in a semester. The state would then notify the student that unless proof of enrollment is provided within 30 days, the student's driver's license will be revoked.

Waivers for revocation may be made by the school superintendent.

Students requesting a revocation hearing would be allowed a hearing with the state, but the only grounds for not revoking the license would be proof of enrollment in school or a GED program.

A license could be restored upon successful completion of an entire semester of school. Expulsion from school or the person's residence in a juvenile development center would not exempt a person from this law.

Naifeh said the law, which has passed in other states, would go into effect in 1991.

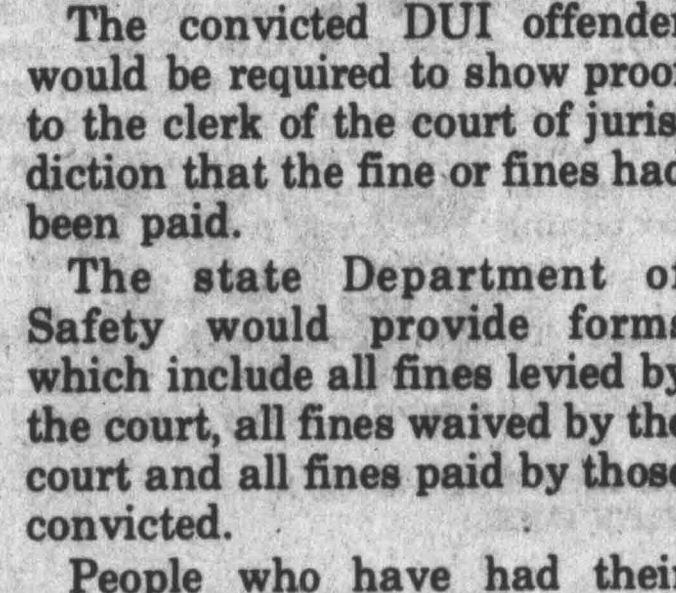
"We are taking an aggressive approach to education in Tennessee," Naifeh said. "Student drivers must realize that driving is a privilege in our state—not a right. This law is modeled after similar programs in Arkansas, Florida, West Virginia and Wisconsin and those states are having greater success in keeping children in school through graduation, largely because of this program."

**County Bridge Program**—In response to serious problems facing the state's bridges, the Administration is establishing a ten-year, \$100 million program to aid counties in the improvement of bridges.

The program is based upon a formula of 70 percent state funds and 30 percent funding by the counties, up to 50 percent of a county's share can be in-kind funding.

The state portion of the program will be funded from the

Joe N. Lemay, administrator of Hillhaven Convalescent Center in Ripley, will join the Legislative Conference of the Tenn. Health Care Assn. (265 nursing homes) in Nashville Feb. 19th-21st to urge legislators to increase the \$40.89 maximum per day now paid for Medicaid patients (70% of all nursing home patients).

More than half of the 27,000 Medicaid beds in Tenn. nursing homes have costs above \$40.89, LeMay says.

"We know the state's budget is limited," he says, "but we also know that new federal nursing home requirements and the increase in the minimum wage are making our operations more expensive."

"Since most of our patients are dependent on Medicaid, we must have additional support from the government to continue to provide the quality care expected of us."

## Hay Crop Valuable

For the first time since 1920, hay ranks as Tennessee's number one valued crop. Farmers, in 1989, produced a bumper hay crop worth an estimated \$175,000,000.

Soybeans followed closely in value at \$172,600,000.

The state's five most valuable crops—hay, soybeans, cotton, tobacco and corn—account for 87% of the total value of Tennessee's principal crops, which in 1989 was \$916,900,000, down 4% from 1988 but up 9% from 1987.

All major crops except hay and corn were valued lower than in 1988 as a result of generally poorer prices and reduced production.

Soybeans accounted for 19% of the total value of all crops. Value was down because of sharply reduced prices and production. Prices averaged \$5.80 per bushel, down \$1.84 a bushel.

The combined value of cotton and cottonseed was \$182,300,000, compared with \$177,400,000 in 1988. Lower production was partially offset by higher prices.

The total value of corn production jumped to \$136,000,000 from \$106,400,000 in 1988. Tennessee corn growers produced the most valuable corn crop since 1984, primarily as a result of increased production. Corn prices averaged \$2.40 per bushel, compared with \$2.75 in 1988.

Less wheat was produced in 1989, but wheat prices were the best since 1980. The 1989 crop value was \$69,900,000, compared with \$74,000,000 in 1988.

The 1989 Tennessee grain sorghum crop again showed a decline in value. Production decreased 11%; total value decreased 13%. The 1989 crop value was \$4,800,000 compared with \$5,500,000 in 1988.

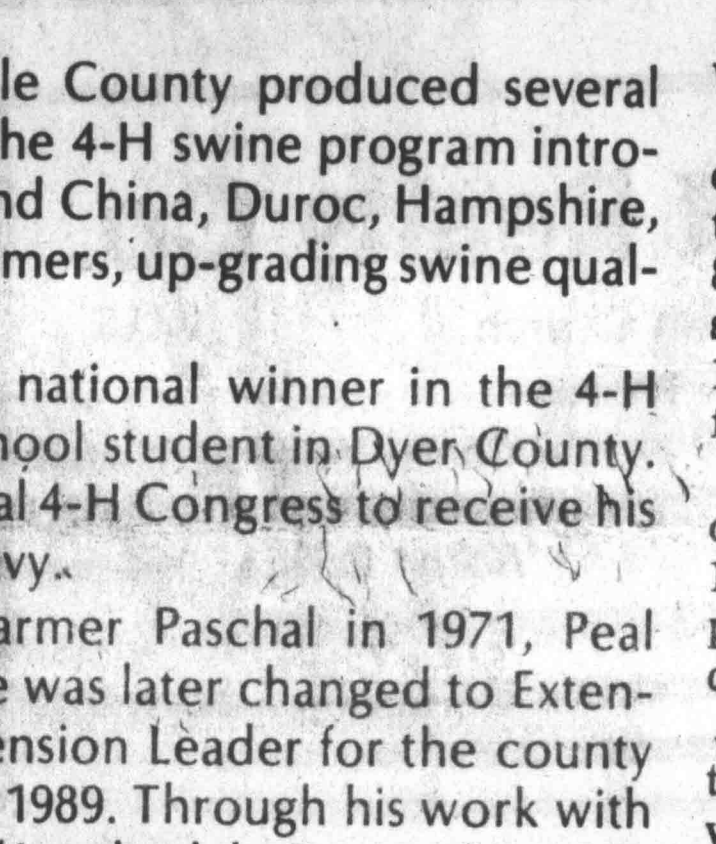

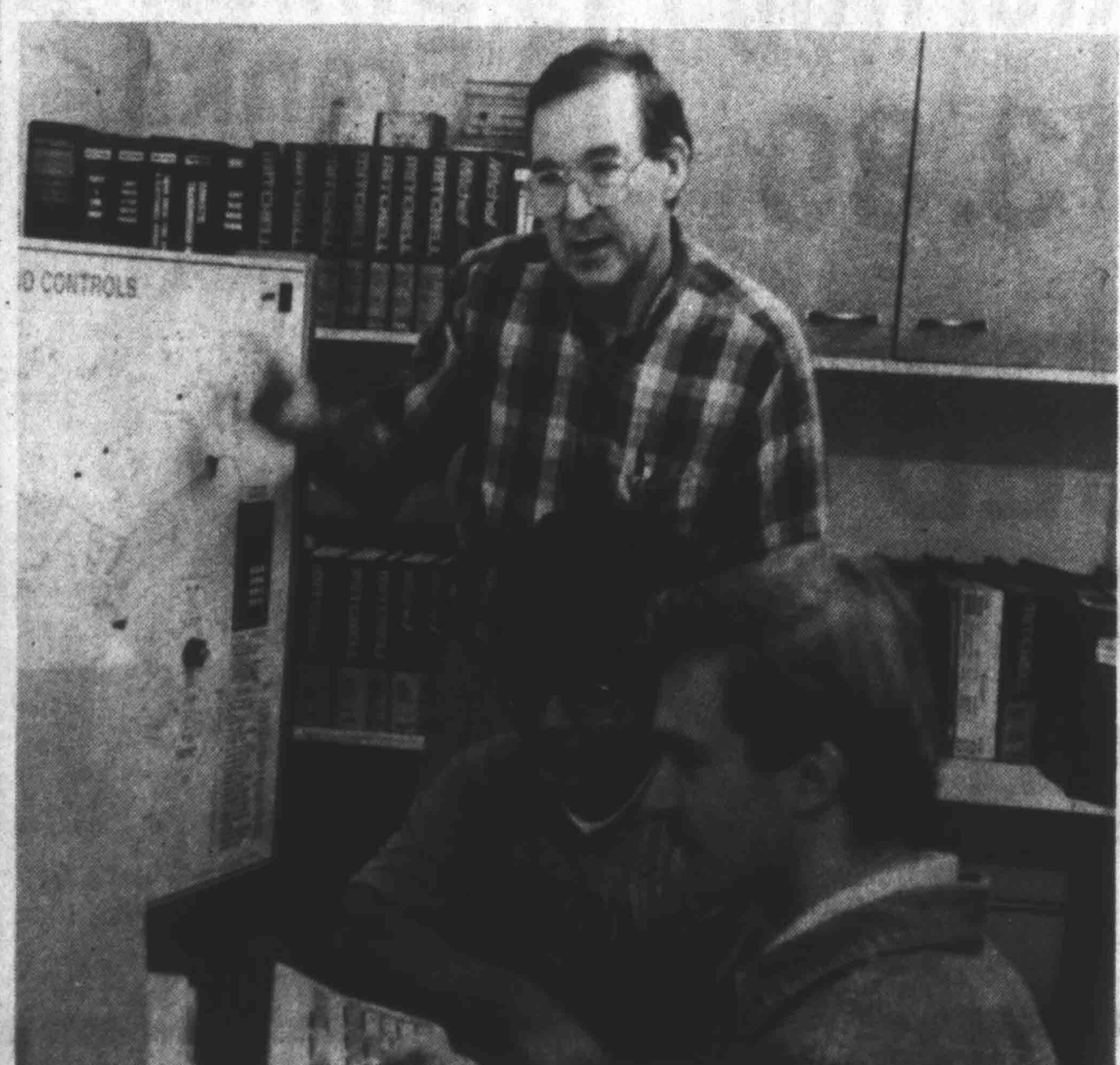

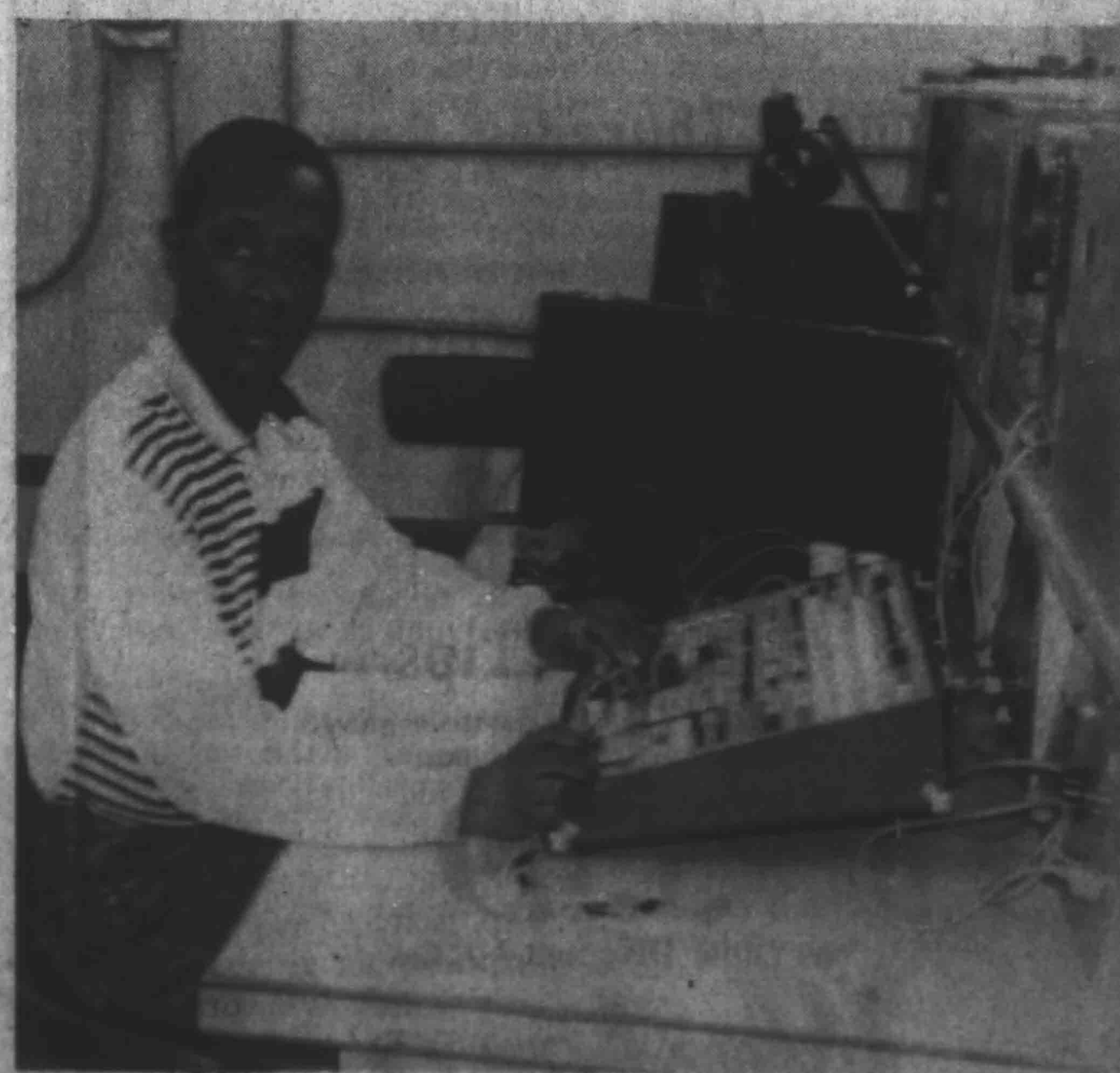

## Cross Country Skiing on Roan Mountain

ROAN MOUNTAIN, Tenn. — This 6,313-foot mountain, one of the largest peaks in the eastern United States, is best known for the largest natural stand of rhododendron in the world — 600 acres which bloom each year in mid-summer.

While the annual display of rhododendron is a major summer attraction, Roan Mountain also draws large numbers of winter visitors as well. With an average annual snowfall of more than 100 inches, the park is an ideal spot for winter recreation, particularly as a location for cross country, or Nordic, skiing.

"There are some major differences between Nordic and the more familiar downhill type of skiing," explains park ski instructor "Jeep" Barrett. "It's much easier to learn, for one thing. If you can walk, you can cross country ski. It's a terrific form of exercise, but you can set your own pace to make it as strenuous, or as easy, as you like."

Roan Mountain State Resort Park, located about 30 miles southeast of Johnson City, Tennessee, boasts its own ski center and school operated by High South Nordic Guides. The center offers equipment rentals, instruction and guided tours into the snowy heights of the mountain known locally as "The Roan."

"Most people can learn basic techniques of Nordic skiing with about an hour of instruction," Barrett says. "The basic movement is an alternating kick and glide, sort of like scooting your feet as you walk. The skis are lighter and narrower than downhill skis, and the boots and bindings provide much more freedom of movement. The skis are attached only at the toes so the heel can lift during the kick and glide movement. Since the rest of the foot is free to move in any direction, the danger of a sprained or broken ankle is minimized."

Falls are common for beginners, but serious injuries are rare in Nordic skiing. The winter scenery on The Roan can be spectacular. "The cross country ski trails at Roan Mountain are not designed specifically for skiers," Barrett says. "They are simply trails and roads which lend themselves wonderfully to this purpose."

The Roan Mountain ski trails also come in a variety of styles suitable for any level of ski expertise.

The Meadows Trail, for example, winds along the banks of the Doe River. It is an easy trail over gently rolling and flat terrain and is suitable for beginners.

The Forest Trail winds along an old logging road. The road is narrow

and contains several steep grades and sharp turns which should be attempted only by experienced skiers.

The Mountain Trail leads over a wide, paved road from Strawberry Bald. The road is closed to vehicles during the winter, but it contains several long, extremely steep grades with sharp curves and no runoff at the bottom. It, too, should be attempted only by skilled, experienced skiers.

"One thing any skier should remember is that weather conditions can change rapidly in these high elevations," Barrett warns. "Skiers should always dress accordingly. Wool clothing is ideal because it retains body heat when it is wet. It's best to wear several layers of light clothing rather than one bulky coat. That way you can shed or add layers as you need them. A warm cap and a good pair of gloves are essential, and you should also bring along a pair of sunglasses or goggles. If you plan to ski for any distance, it is also important to carry some drinking water and some high energy snacks. A lightweight 'fanny pack' is ideal for carrying gear, food and emergency items such as dry socks."

These basic survival tactics are emphasized by the park's ski school operated by High South Nordic Guides, the first cross country ski school in the South to be certified by the Professional Ski Instructors of America. In addition to lessons, the school also offers guided tours.

"The Day Tour is the most popular option for beginners," Barrett says. "It includes rental of all the necessary equipment, a morning instruction session, a hot lunch, and a guided afternoon tour."

Prices for the Day Tour range from \$36 per person on weekdays to \$40 per person on weekends. Basic equipment rentals range from \$12 on weekdays to \$15 on weekends.

In conjunction with the guided tours, Roan Mountain State Resort Park also offers a Ski Package which includes all of the above, plus two nights lodging in one of the park's comfortable rustic cabins.

Package prices range from \$87.50 per person for two people to \$63.10 per person for groups of six.

For many visitors, relaxing around a fire in the wood burning stove is an appropriate reward after an active day on the ski trails.

The large, two-story cabins sleep as many as six and come complete with firewood, linens, cookware and modern appliances. Everything but the groceries is provided.

If the park's 20 cabins are booked, motel accommodations may

be found in such nearby cities as Erwin, Elizabethton, Johnson City and Mountain City.

Much of Tennessee's unique frontier history is also worth exploring in the area around Roan Mountain. Nearby Elizabethton, for example, is the location of Sycamore Shoals State Park and the reconstructed Fort Watauga whose original residents included the famous frontiersman Daniel Boone.

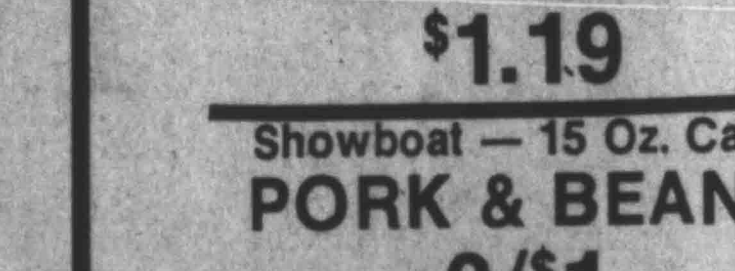
Portions of Boone's original Trail to Kentucky can still be found around Mountain City and the old trading grounds on the North Carolina border at the aptly named town of Trade.

Jonesborough, just south of Johnson City, is Tennessee's oldest town, and retains much of its historic character. Walking tour guides to the historic district may be obtained at the city's visitor center and museum.

Just north of Johnson City is Rocky Mount, the original capitol of the Territory of the United States South of the River Ohio from which portions of 11 states, including Tennessee, were carved almost 200 years ago.

William Eldon Fincher, Jr., 32, of Ripley, known as "One-Eyed Bill," has been charged with murder of Howard Max Richardson, 49, about 12:30 a.m. Sunday in his home at Mary's Chapel.

Max, with his brother, Randall, operated Richardson Bros. Construction Co., based at Curve.

The victim's wife, Sarah, gave authorities this account: The couple used Mr. Richardson's pick-up to visit relatives, leaving Mrs. Richardson's van in the garage. Returning home, they opened the garage door electronically, and Mrs. Richardson entered the garage while Mr. Richardson parked the truck in a shed.

Mrs. Richardson found the door from the garage into the house locked, when normally left unlocked. Mr. Richardson told her to wait in the garage while he crawled into the house through a wood-box next to the fire-place.

She heard the door being unlocked, then a shot. She ran to the shed and hid until, seeing no one leave the home, she drove in the van, more than a mile, to the home of her son-in-law, Ripley police investigator Steve Sanders on Sky-Line Drive.

Sanders found Richardson near the door to the garage with a single wound in the forehead. He died in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale in Ripley.

Tracks from the home were followed to Sky-Line Sub-Division in Ripley but lost there, on pavement.

In the Richardson bedroom, several drawers had been pulled from a dresser and contents dropped on the floor.

As college costs steadily rise students increasingly depend upon financial aid awards to be able to afford a higher education. However, according to President Bush's budget proposal, the number of financial aid awards is expected to decline in 1991, continuing the decade-long decline in high-ability, low-income high school students attending college.

One of the most important programs which the budget indicates will not receive an increase in funding is the Pell Grant program. The Administration also proposes to limit the number of low-interest Perkins loans available for students in need of assistance.

Eighth District residents who are thinking of attaining a post-secondary education should begin the process of applying for financial aid as soon as possible. The funds are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis based on need.

Initially students should contact the financial aid office of the college which they are interested in attending. The officers will be able to identify the exact forms which need to be completed, as well as

any special scholarships or loans available specifically to their students.

When completing the forms, applicants should be sure to indicate an interest in receiving a Pell Grant. Students will also need to supply income tax information; therefore, the student's or his/her parents' completed income tax return is important to have on hand.

Federal financial assistance is not the only source of aid for the needy student. For adult students, employers often offer scholarships for the education of their employees. Additionally, national trade organizations usually have funds available for students studying in their field.

Should any student like more information regarding financial aid, I have application forms as well as some scholarship information available in each of my district offices. The education of Eighth District residents is a most important goal for me as the 1990 Session of Congress begins, and making financial aid available to those who need it most is a vital aspect of this goal.
