


Jailed In Covington-

Aiding Crashed Motorist, Sheriff's Deputies Slain

Gates Mayor Bobby Nolen, 55, and another sheriff's deputy, Kevin Ward, 31, of Ringer Lane, Gates, were killed early Tuesday after they gave a friendly lift to an 82-year-old man now reported to have a long criminal record in Indiana.

The man has been charged with two counts of first degree murder.

The deputies, close friends who had exchanged Christmas gifts, were found shot from the rear, in the neck, on the front seat of a marked sheriff's car, head-lights on, in a field west of New U.S. Highway 51

near Keller Lane, just inside the north city limits of Rip-

The deputies' car, north-bound to Ripley, had crossed the median and the south-bound lane to crash into a ditch.

Found unconscious in the caged rear seat (apparently from impact with the front of the cage), Ripley police report, was a

man identified as Ule Reynolds, 82, of Gary, Ind., wearing a shoulder holster, with a .357 magnum revolver and several wallets containing about \$1,700 in cash.

He was treated in the Regional Medical Center in Memphis and transferred later in the day to the Tipton County jail in Covington [to guard against mis-treatment by fellow officers of the slain].

A car reported ditched off Highway 87, west of Fort Pillow, at 11:15 p.m. Monday brought the deputies to the scene; a wrecker was called. At 12:27 a.m., they radioed they were returning to Ripley with Reynolds. At 1:13 a.m., a motorist stopped at Ripley City Hall to report the Ripley crash.

Police Sgt. William Akin and Patrolman Donnell Baltimore, first to reach the Ripley crash scene, found with the man in the rear seat a map marking a route from Memphis to Bolivar.

Sheriff Milford Durham could not, at press-time, confirm or deny rumors that the man was seeking relatives in Somerville and/or Bolivar.

"We just don't know yet what he was doing here," the sheriff says.



**Teen Asserted** 

Kerry Franklin Hurst, 17, of 544 Hike Avenue, Dyersburg, killed a rival for a girl's attention, Michael Blane Newman. 19, and then himself Tuesday of last week, police report.

Newman was shot four times with a .22 caliber revolver when he answered the doorbell at his home with his mother, Mrs. Brenda Bountry, in the Cedar Grove Sub-Division north of Ripley, police say.

The Newman family described to authorities the pick-up truck in which the gunman fled. The Hurst family had reported to Dyersburg police at 10:13 a.m. that it had been taken from Hurst's grandfather and that some guns were missing.

Gates policeman Greg Medford spotted the truck, northbound on Old U.S. Highway 51, and pursued it until it attempted a left turn onto Poplar Grove Road, spinning around and ending up with its rear wheels in a small ditch.

Medford says he heard a shot and found Hurst wounded in the head, with a .308 caliber semiautomatic hunting rifle nearby several shells in his pockets, and a .22 caliber revolver in the truck.

Dyersburg police said the girl's family had reported, about 9 p.m., that several tires on their vehicles has been slashed.





Humboldt, Tennesse has begun operations at a unique recycling plant that may have the potential of reducing significant ly the solid waste that now goes into a landfill

This plant removes recyclable naterials such as paper, glass luminum and the like and rocesses the remaini into pellets. The pellets are being Derived Fuel or RDF for short, electric generating plants. recyclable materials can be sold to firms that use them to produce new products.

Last week, I was able to have waste technology experts from the Tennessee Valley Authority visit he Humboldt plant. The purpos was to show how garbage is sorted and processed into the pellet which could be used in combin ion with coal in TVA steam lants. The utilization of these pellets in conjunction with re cycling at the plant could reduce the wastes going into landfills by as much as 75 percent according o some experts

This visit by myself and TVA officials was undertaken to support a joint effort by Tennessee Congressional Delega tion to encourage TVA to start a pilot program to burn RDF pellets in one of its steam plants. The idea

is to start this project to see if RDI materials can be used effectively generate electric power. If such pilot program is successful, RDI pellets could presumably TVA system thus reducing solid
