Jailed In Covington

Aiding Crashed Motorist, Sheriff's Deputies Slain

Gates Mayor Bobby Nolen, 55, and another sheriff's deputy, Kevin Ward, 31, of Ringer Lane, Gates, were killed early Tuesday after they gave a friendly lift to an 82-year-old man now reported to have a long criminal record in Indiana.

The man has been charged with two counts of first degree murder.

The deputies, close friends who had exchanged Christmas gifts, were found shot from the rear, in the neck, on the front seat of a marked sheriff's car, head-lights on, in a field west of New U.S. Highway 51 near Keller Lane, just inside the north city limits of Ripley.

The deputies' car, north-bound to Ripley, had crossed the median and the south-bound lane to crash into a ditch.

Found unconscious in the caged rear seat (apparently from impact with the front of the cage), Ripley police report, was a man identified as Ule Reynolds, 82, of Gary, Ind., wearing a shoulder holster, with a .357 magnum revolver and several wallets containing about \$1,700 in cash.

He was treated in the Regional Medical Center in Memphis and transferred later in the day to the Tipton County jail in Covington (to guard against mis-treatment by fellow officers of the slain).

A car reported ditched off Highway 87, west of Fort Pillow, at 11:15 p.m. Monday brought the deputies to the scene; a wrecker was called. At 12:27 a.m., they radioed they were returning to Ripley with Reynolds. At 1:18 a.m., a motorist stopped at Ripley City Hall to report the Ripley crash.

Police Sgt. William Akin and Patrolman Donnell Baltimore, first to reach the Ripley crash scene, found with the man in the rear seat a map marking a route from Memphis to Bolivar.

Sheriff Milford Durham could not, at press-time, confirm or deny rumors that the man was seeking relatives in Somerville and/or Bolivar.

"We just don't know yet what he was doing here," the sheriff says.

Authorities do not suggest Reynolds was under the influ-

Teen Asserted Killer, Suicide

Kerry Franklin Hurst, 17, of 544 Hike Avenue, Dyersburg, killed a rival for a girl's attention, Michael Blane Newman, 19, and then himself Tuesday of last week, police report.

Newman was shot four times with a .22 caliber revolver when he answered the doorbell at his home with his mother, Mrs. Brenda Bountry, in the Cedar Grove Sub-Division north of Ripley, police say.

The Newman family described to authorities the pick-up truck in which the gunman fled. The Hurst family had reported to Dyersburg police at 10:13 a.m. that it had been taken from Hurst's grandfather and that some guns were missing.

Gates policeman Greg Medford spotted the truck, north-bound on Old U.S. Highway 51, and pursued it until it attempted a left turn onto Poplar Grove Road, spinning around and ending up with its rear wheels in a small ditch.

Medford says he heard a shot and found Hurst wounded in the head, with a .308 caliber semi-automatic hunting rifle nearby, several shells in his pockets, and a .22 caliber revolver in the truck.

Dyersburg police said the girl's family had reported, about 9 p.m., that several tires on their vehicles has been slashed.

Services for Newman, an employee of Bargain Rental in Ripley, were at 2 p.m. Friday in Yarbrough Funeral Home in Ripley, with burial in Memorial Gardens.

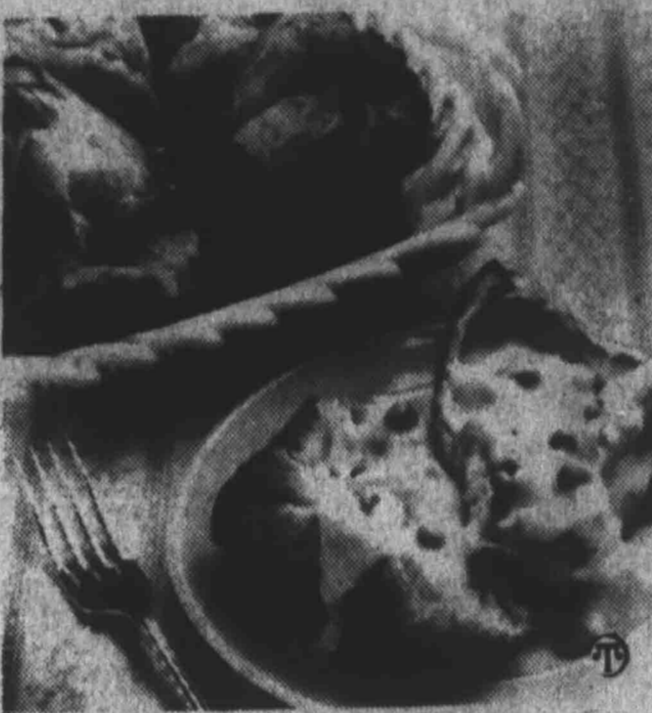

1 refrigerated prepared pie crust for 9-inch pie
 Crumb Topping (recipe follows)

In large bowl mix sugar, corn starch and cinnamon. Add apples and lemon juice; toss to coat well. Unfold crust; place on foil-lined cookie sheet. Press out fold lines. Spoon apples into center of crust, leaving 2-inch edge. Sprinkle Crumb Topping over apples. Fold pastry up onto apples, pinching edge at 2-inch intervals. Bake in 425°F oven 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350°F and bake 35 minutes longer or until apples are tender. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Crumb Topping: In small bowl mix 2/3 cup unsifted flour and 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar. With pastry blender or 2 knives, cut in 1/4 cup cold Mazola margarine just until coarse crumbs form. If desired, stir in 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts or shredded Cheddar cheese.



Popovers

Heat oven to 450°.
 2 eggs
 1 cup Gold Medal Wondra flour
 1 cup milk
 1/2 tsp salt

Grease generously six 6-oz custard cups or 8 medium muffin cups, 2 1/2 x 1 1/4". Beat eggs slightly in medium bowl; stir in remaining ingredients with fork or wire whisk just until smooth (do not overbeat). Fill custard cups 1/2 full, muffin cups 3/4 full. Bake 25 min. Decrease oven temperature to 350°. Bake 15 to 20 min longer or until deep golden brown. Remove immediately from cups; serve hot. 6 to 8 popovers.

1/2 cup sugar
 1 tablespoon Argo corn starch
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 4 cups sliced peeled apples (about 1 1/2 lb)
 1 tablespoon lemon juice

FACTS & FIGURES

The Health Care Crisis
 America's health care crisis affects just about everyone. Consider these facts:

• Health care costs are increasing at rates twice and three times the overall inflation rate. Today, close to 50 percent of corporate profits is spent on employee medical benefits.

• U.S. spending on medical care has doubled in a little more than 20 years to \$500 billion at present or 11.1 percent of GNP.

• Yet fewer people are receiving needed care. 37 million Americans have no medical insurance whatsoever. Many more have inadequate coverage. The cost of providing care to these people is passed on to everyone in higher doctor and hospital bills.

The United Food and Commercial Workers Union (UFCW) and its 1.3 million members is working to bring together labor, management, the health care industry and government to develop a solution to this serious problem.

As a first step, the UFCW believes all employers should be required to provide health insurance coverage to employees and their families. When companies don't provide basic coverage, taxpayers and other businesses wind up paying more. That isn't fair to responsible employers or the workers who are asked to pay higher deductibles and coinsurance.

More sweeping reform of the health care system, including public insurance administered by state and regional boards, may be needed. Such a system already exists in Canada, where medical expenditures are one-third less than in the U.S. even though everyone is covered.

JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT

Disposing of garbage is a problem that faces all local communities, but in the Eighth Congressional District one community is developing an innovative way to deal with it. Humboldt, Tennessee has begun operations at a unique recycling plant that may have the potential of reducing significantly the solid waste that now goes into a landfill.

This plant removes recyclable materials such as paper, glass, aluminum and the like and processes the remaining wastes into pellets. The pellets are being considered for use as Refuse Derived Fuel or RDF for short, in electric generating plants. The recyclable materials can be sold to firms that use them to produce new products.

Last week, I was able to have waste technology experts from the Tennessee Valley Authority visit the Humboldt plant. The purpose was to show how garbage is sorted and processed into the pellets which could be used in combination with coal in TVA steam plants. The utilization of these pellets in conjunction with recycling at the plant could reduce the wastes going into landfills by as much as 75 percent according to some experts.

This visit by myself and TVA officials was undertaken to support a joint effort by the Tennessee Congressional Delegation to encourage TVA to start a pilot program to burn RDF pellets in one of its steam plants. The idea is to start this project to see if RDF materials can be used effectively to generate electric power. If such a pilot program is successful, RDF pellets could presumably be used more extensively throughout the TVA system thus reducing solid wastes that must be put into landfills.

The Humboldt plant has all of the elements of an imaginative way to handle solid wastes. It incorporates recycling while also converting other garbage into a

useful product. However, some questions remain to be resolved if RDF is to be part of the answer to the growing problem of solid waste management. Disposal of the ash from steam plants as well as air quality questions are still being reviewed.

Nonetheless, it is important that every possible consideration be given to this idea. Landfills in Tennessee, and throughout the country, are quickly filling up. Authorities report that half of the landfills currently in use in the state will be full in four years. TVA, and private utilities throughout the country, can be of great assistance to local communities by testing this concept as soon as feasible.

Recycling has already become an essential part of solid waste management in many areas. That effort must be continued and expanded. Using that part of the garbage that is not recyclable as fuel could become an integral part of disposing of solid wastes.

Readers Speak

Editor:

As Lauderdale County tried to come to grips with the deaths of Bobby Nolen and Kevan Ward, many thoughts have gone through the minds of family and friends. As Iuta Nolen and Audrey Ward accepted the American flags that draped their husbands' caskets, we are reminded of the friendship these two officers shared. Working side by side, they were more than just co-

workers. They probably shared food, life experiences, family anecdotes, disappointments, and victories on a daily basis. As with other people, those who work closely each day usually become good friends.

Bobby Nolen and Kevan Ward were laid to rest this past week. They will be remembered and missed by their families and friends and also by people who didn't even know them. There are no comforting words that will relieve our grief. But, both men will always be remembered for their kindness to other people, their willingness to help people in need, and their bravery for the duties of a sheriff patrol and all its dangers in the line of duty.

It is said that memories keep people alive—and it will be the memories of these two men that keep them alive in the hearts of many.

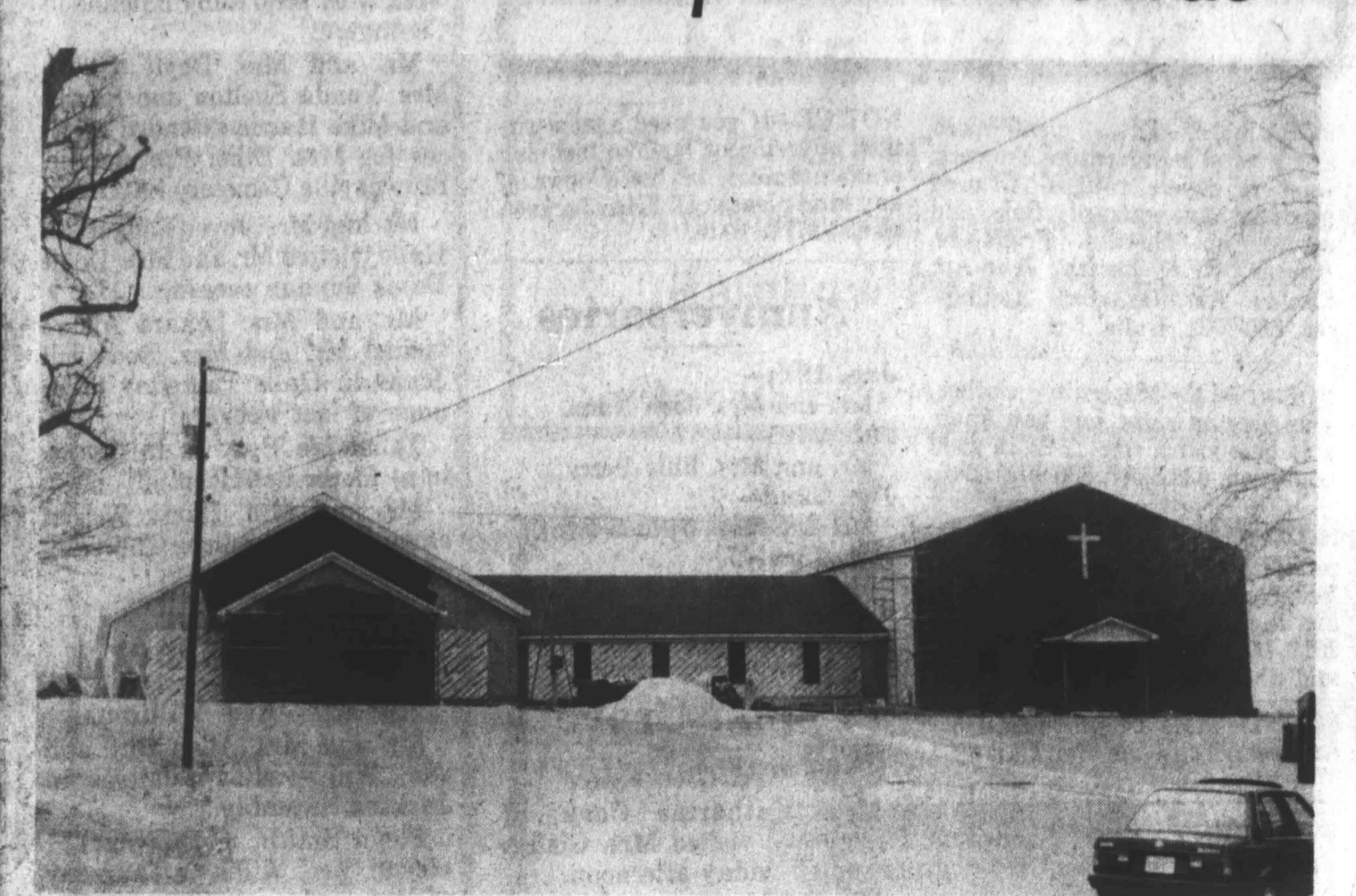

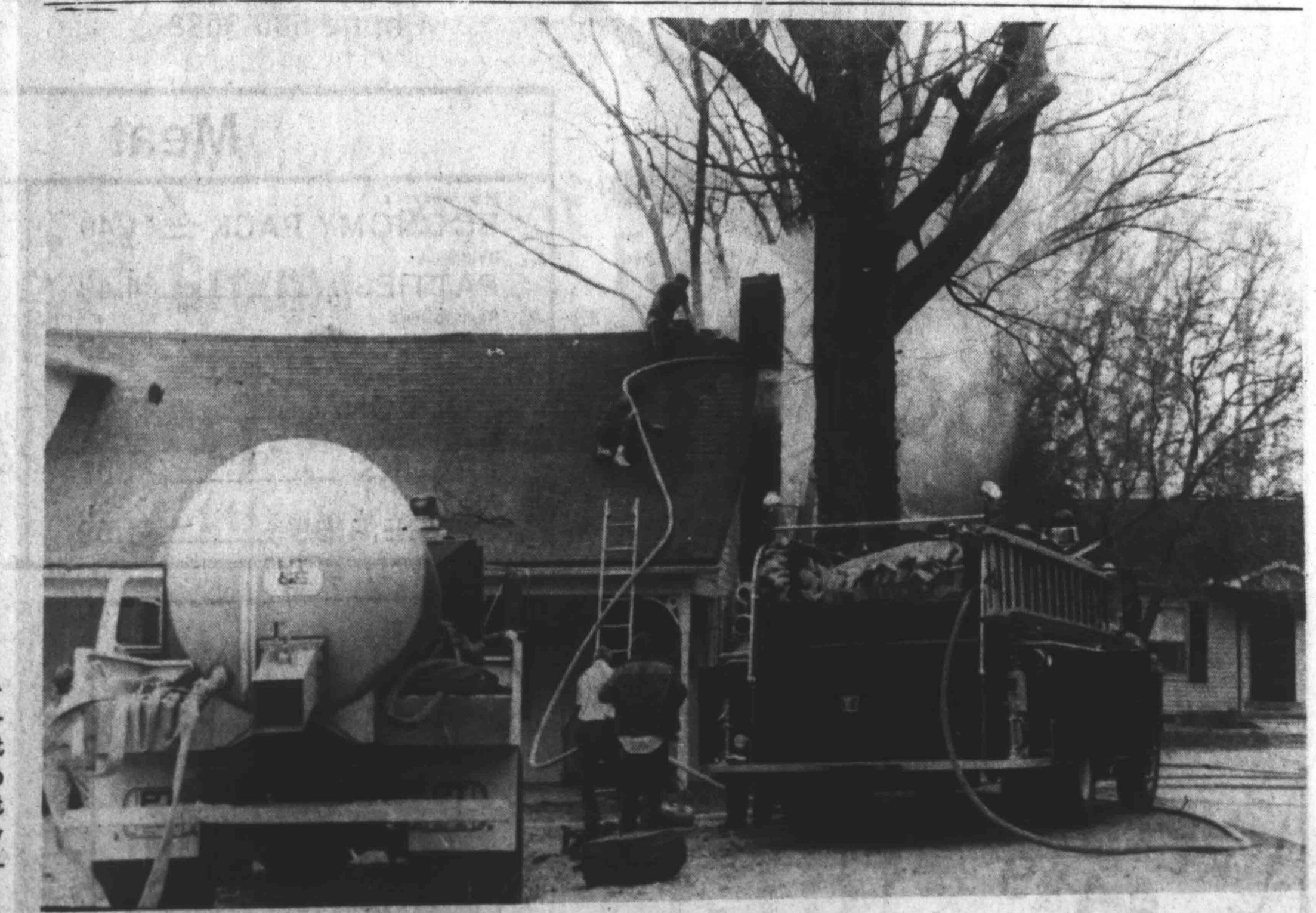

Halls Residents Adjust To New Garbage Cans

Mayor Randall J. Harris reassures Halls residents that monthly residential sanitation fees (\$5) do not require the city's new garbage containers to be rolled to the curb—though garbage pick-up workers will be grateful to those who assist them (and cut city expenses) by doing so.
The city has provided containers for each home (numbered and guaranteed, with proper use, for 10 years) and will pick up ordinary garbage only from such containers, in order to automate the process and sharply reduce garbage collection time.

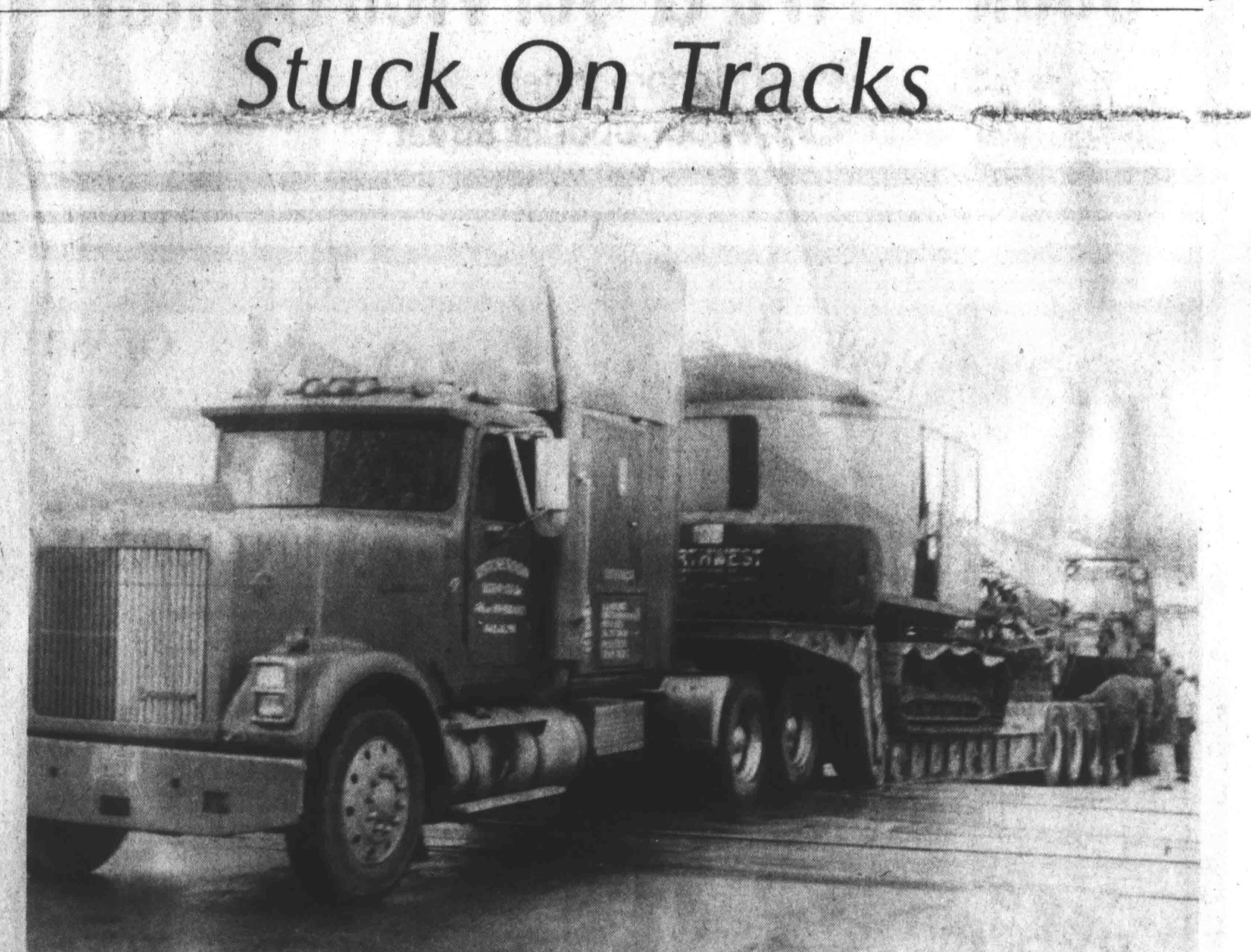

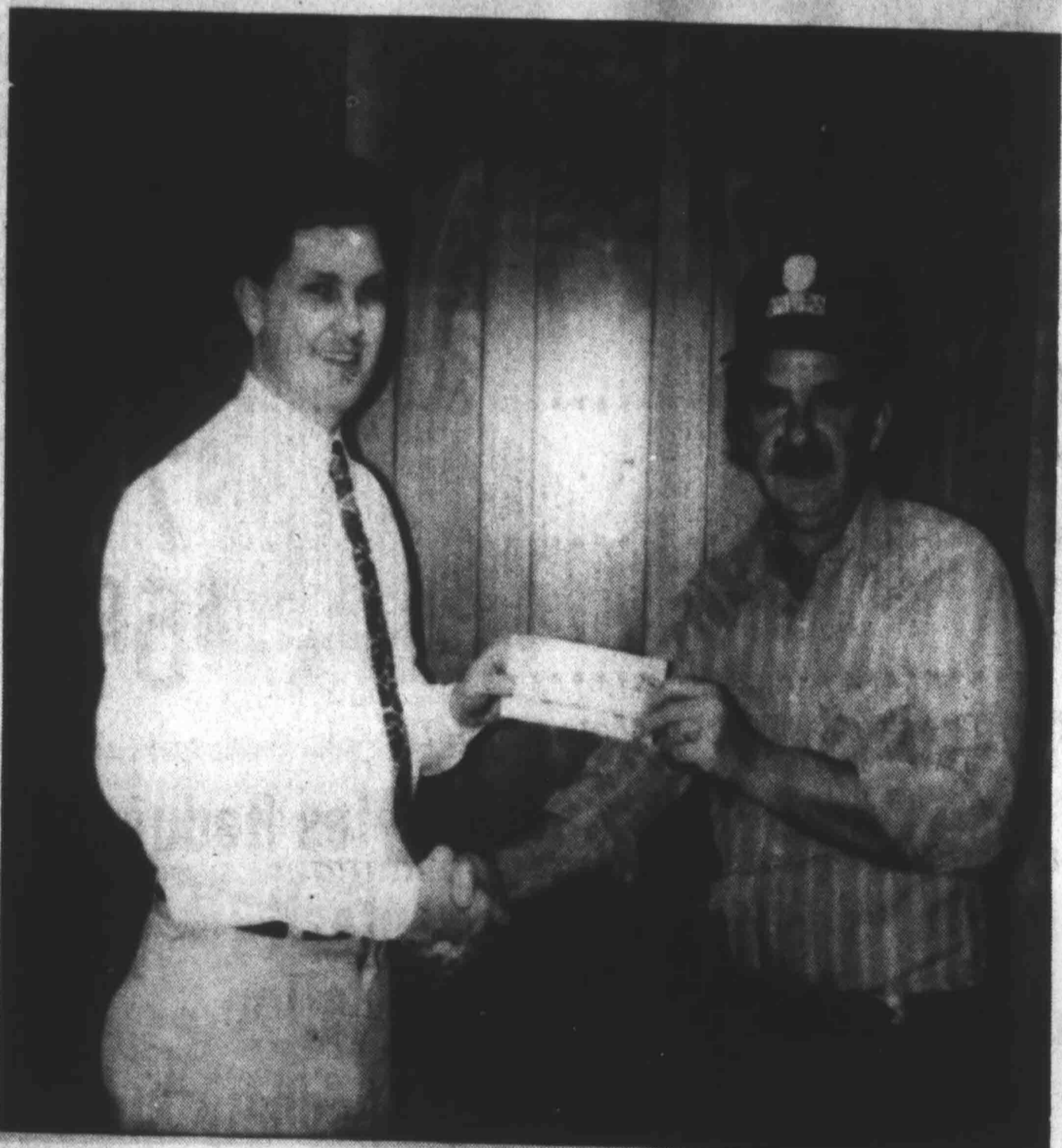

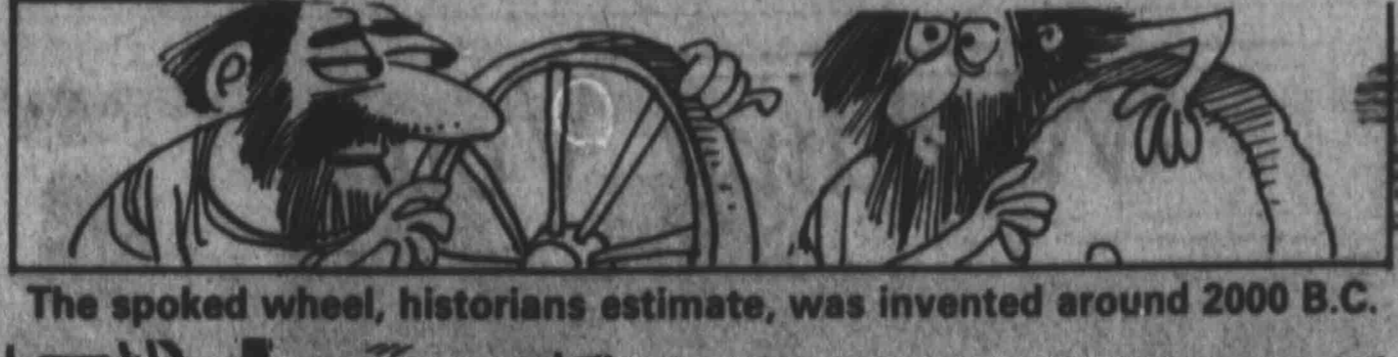

A PEACHY MIRACLE OF REDUCTION

Dear Jeanne:

The recipe which follows has been a special favorite of my family for a long time, but in the past few years I have been reluctant to make it. Can you work one of your miracles of reduction of all the no-no's without sacrificing the delicious taste? — Josephine Farnia, Newtown, Pa.

PEACH KUCHEN

2 cups all-purpose flour; 1/4 teaspoon baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 cup brown sugar; 1/2 cup butter; 12 peach halves; 1 teaspoon cinnamon; 2 egg yolks; 1 cup heavy cream.
Preheat oven to 400 F. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and 2 tablespoons sugar together. Work in butter with 2 knives until mixture looks like cornmeal. Pile into an 8-inch ungreased square pan. Pat an even layer over bottom and halfway up sides of pan with your hands. Place peaches over pastry, sprinkle mixture of cinnamon and remaining sugar over peaches. Bake for 15 minutes. Slow mix egg yolks and cream together and pour over baked mixture. Bake 30 minutes longer. Serves 8.

Dear Josephine:

I found I could reduce the flour to 1 cup, which helps reduce the calories since I only needed about half as much of the other high-fat and high-calorie ingredients to balance out the recipe. Margarine instead of butter and liquid egg substitute in place of the egg yolks help eliminate much of the fat and nearly all of the cholesterol in your kuchen. I also found that evaporated skim milk substitutes beautifully for the fat and calorie-laden heavy cream.
Try my Light Peach Kuchen and see if you aren't as pleased with the results as I am.

LIGHT PEACH KUCHEN

1 cup unbleached flour
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup corn-oil margarine

12 peach halves, canned or fresh, or 2 (15-ounce) cans juice- or water-packed peach halves, drained
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup liquid egg substitute
1/2 cup evaporated skim milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 400 F. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon and 1 tablespoon of the sugar. Work in margarine with 2 knives or pastry blender until mixture looks like cornmeal.
Pile into an 8-inch square pan sprayed with non-stick vegetable coating and pat an even layer over bottom and halfway up sides of pan. Place peaches on top of pastry. Combine remaining sugar with 1 teaspoon cinnamon and sprinkle over peaches; bake 15 minutes.
Combine egg substitute, evaporated skim milk and vanilla. Pour over baked mixture and bake 30 minutes longer. Serves 8.

LOWER-SODIUM SAUERKRAUT

With all things German becoming increasingly popular as we celebrate the opening of the Berlin Wall, sauerkraut is making a major comeback. I have received numerous letters asking for sauerkraut recipes, many of them also expressing con-

cern about the high sodium content of this salt-cured cabbage.

Here is a wonderful Sauerkraut Salad recipe which is equally good with fish, poultry or meat. It is also good served warm as a side dish. Remember it for summer, too. It's perfect for picnics because it packs so well. The sodium content of the sauerkraut is lowered dramatically by rinsing it well before using it in this or any other recipe.

SAUERKRAUT SALAD

2 cups sauerkraut, rinsed and well drained
1/4 cup grated carrot
1/4 cup minced celery
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1/4 cups seeded and chopped green bell pepper
1/2 cup seeded and chopped red bell pepper
1/4 cup white vinegar
1/4 cup sugar
Dash freshly ground black pepper

Combine all ingredients. Refrigerate all day or, preferably, overnight before serving. Makes 6 cups, twelve 1/2-cup servings.
