No Charges In Shooting Of James Earl Lewis, 24

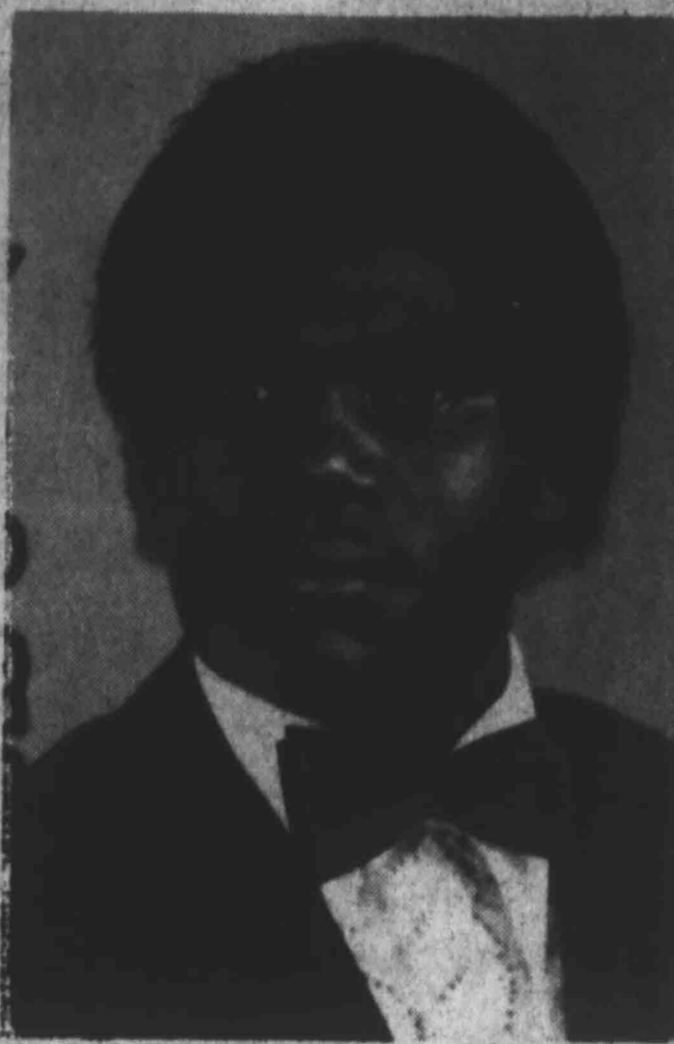
Sheriff Jerry Crain says Mary Currie, of the Gates Apartments, appears to have been justified in fatally shooting, about 4:43 a.m. Sunday, her boy friend, James Earl Lewis, 24, of Ripley.

Lewis is said to have come to her front door and been asked to leave. He came in the back door and was again asked to leave, the woman says; when he refused, she shot at him three times with a .25 caliber pistol, pursued him outdoors, and fired three more shots into the air.

Lewis's body was found 168 yards away, in the yard of the home of The Rev. J. J. Nance.

Services were set for 2 p.m. Thursday in Bethlehem Baptist Church in Millington, with burial in Bethuel Cemetery, Thompson's Mortuary in charge.

He leaves his brother, Mrs. Bessie Blackmore, of Ripley; four brothers, Albert and Billy, of Ripley, and Tommie Lee Lewis and Willie Earl Lewis, of Memphis; four sisters, Carolyn Ann Lewis, Gail Ann Lewis, and Rosie Lee Lewis, of Memphis, and Denise Lewis Smith, of Mexico.

Army Worms Found Here

Farmers who planted wheat or other small grains early for pasture should know that army worms have already eaten up several acres of wheat.

Alfalfa and other fall seeded crops are subject to damage by these worms, which can generally be recognized by an inverted "Y" marking on their foreheads. They have four sets of legs under their mid-sections.

Materials and rates to use are available from the County Extension Office. Check crops now!

Soybean Outlook

Visits to soybean farms show foliage diseases taking a toll on some plantings, and it is too late for help from fungicides.

Insects are evident, especially stinkbugs.

One visit to the Eugene and Steve Pugh farm revealed insect damage, causing stalks to lodge. Some of the beanpods are filled; others are not so far along.

This damage was first thought to be stem canker disease, but a field visit confirmed otherwise. The insect larvae — decetis stem-borers — are the offspring of the long-horn beetle.

Control may include stalk shredding and deep plowing.

Control this fall will help very much in reducing damage next year.

Crop Turn-Out

County producers have generally been surprised by a good yield this year of corn planted earlier in the spring. Late planted corn may not be so good.

Cotton is giving some surprises, both good and bad. Yields are not dragging size, but good cotton land is yielding a respectable harvest.

Soybeans still have a ways to go. Early maturing beans will soon be ready for harvest, with a majority being two to three weeks from harvest stage. Yield potential seems to be fair at this time, on a large acreage.

Brooks Gerrard Adams, 79, of 161 Sinclair, Ripley, retired shoe retailer on the east side of the Square in Ripley, died at 11:30 p.m. Monday in Baptist Hospital in Ripley, after a long illness.

Services were set for 11 a.m. Thursday in Garner's Ripley

Funeral Home with burial in Maplewood Cemetery.

He was born at Palestine, Ill., Feb. 25, 1911, son of the late Chester and Blanche Gerrard Adams.

He was a member of Ripley's First United Methodist Church.

He leaves his wife, Glenna Bailey Adams; three daughters, Mrs. Maxine Phares, of Ripley, and Beryla Adams and Mrs. Arline Yagel, of Atlanta, Ga.; six grandchildren; and a great-grandson.

The county grand jury Monday held for Circuit Court trial 29 persons, including Ruby Steen Atkins, charged with aggravated robbery and murder July 2nd of Mrs. Ada Lee Stowe, 75.

Ruby, 33, was residing at 127A Chapel Circle, a Ripley Housing Authority project, July 2nd when a neighbor, Mrs. Stowe, of 155B Chapel Circle, was found dead in her living room, with multiple stab wounds.

Five of the Jury's 30 indictments named Jeffery and Sandra Ditto for aggravated burglary and theft (of over \$1,000 in three cases, of over \$500 in two).

Disposing of mortgaged property — Louis Hudson III.

Driving under influence — Thomas E. Bryant, Roger James Johnston; by allowing, and second or subsequent offender, Bobby Reed Harding; William W. Green, plus second or subsequent offender and driving on revoked license; Jerry L. Kilzer, plus driving on revoked license, possession of marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia; Don A. Smith, prior previous conviction, third offense.

Introduction of contraband into penal institution — Toya M. Ryan.

Theft under \$500 — Alonzo L. Gayden, Michael E. McAlister.

Three indictments named defendants not in custody at press-time, whose names are withheld, pending arrests.

Alcohol In Fatal Crash Is Traced

Lauderdale County Sheriff Jerry L. Crain was assisted by Joe Pursell, Juvenile Investigator, and the Highway Patrol in a recent meeting with survivors of the Sept. 7, 1990, accident on Highway 209 (Old U.S. Hwy. 51) north of Ripley which claimed the lives of three Lauderdale County youths.

Sheriff Crain said they met with the youths in order to gather information regarding how the youths illegally obtained alcoholic beverages which played a big part of this accident. During the investigation, it was discovered that the alcoholic beverages were obtained by other parties. The youths said that they did not know who purchased the beverages nor where they were purchased.

Sheriff Crain said that more information was expected and that the investigation would continue as needed.

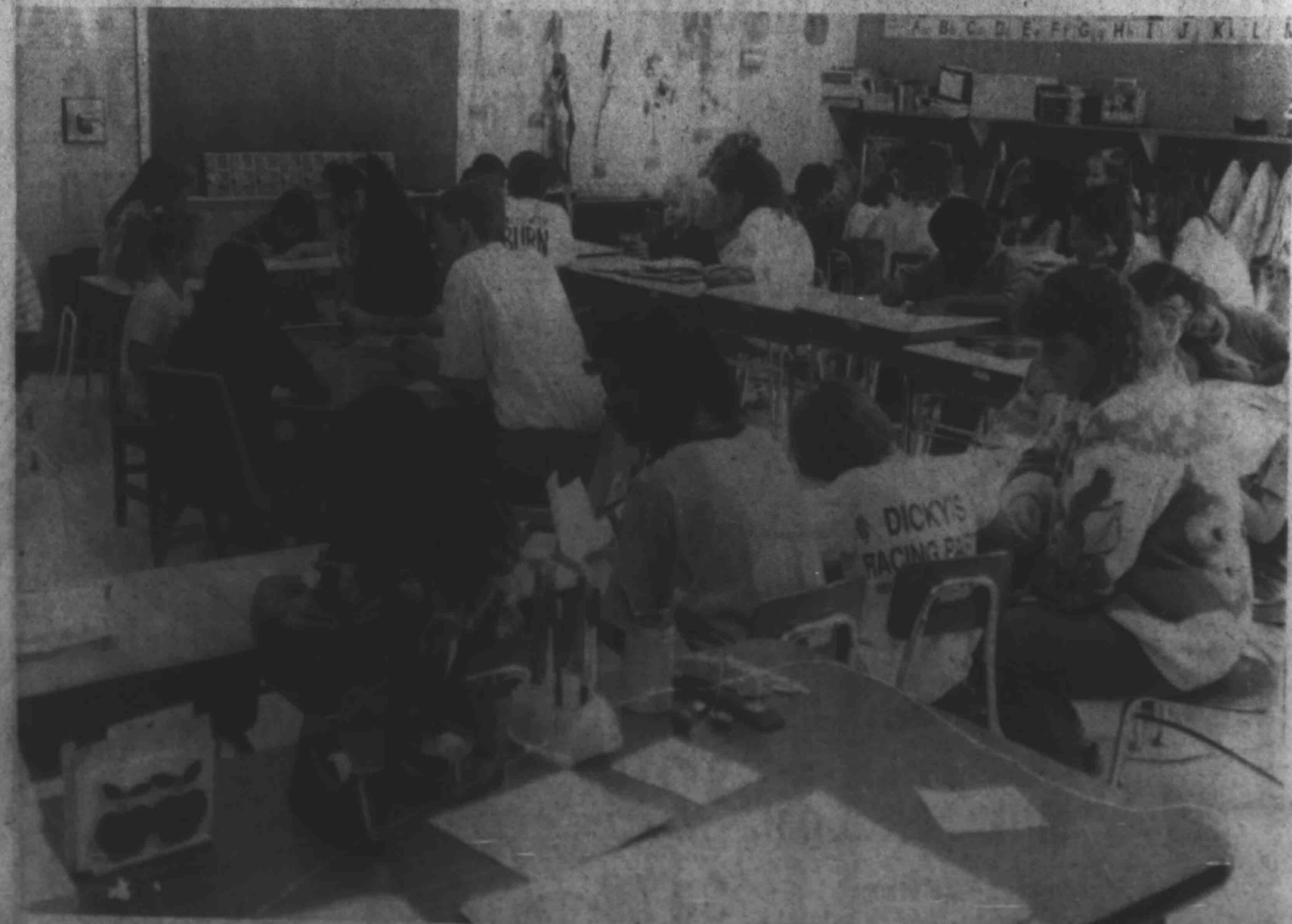

IRAQI CRISIS CALLS FOR
ENERGY SECURITY TO BE NATIONAL GOAL

American dependency on imported oil to satisfy our energy needs has risen quickly in the last decade. In fact, the United States now imports roughly 50% of the oil it consumes compared to only 28.1% in 1982. Therefore, any disruption in the oil market, like the crisis which now confronts the Middle East, directly affects not only the price of gasoline in America, but our whole economy. In order to insure energy security for our future, calls for a national commitment to develop practices and policies which enhance our domestic energy sources have been renewed. Increasing the production and use of alternative fuel sources can play a significant part in this goal.

As a member of the House Subcommittee on Natural Resources, Agricultural Research, and Environment, I have supported efforts to expand America's ethanol industry. This domestically produced fuel, which is derived from corn, could reduce by 12.5% America's crude oil imports if used to replace just 10% of the nation's gasoline. This would virtually replace all of the gasoline we now import from Iraq.

There are other benefits to increasing the production of this alternative fuel besides its potential for increasing our energy self-sufficiency. Economically, it is estimated that ethanol creates almost 2,250 new rural jobs for each 100 million bushels of corn used to produce it. Just as significant are the environmental benefits ethanol presents. Ethanol blended fuels, which have been on the market for seven years, have been proven to decrease carbon monoxide emissions by 25-30%.

The long-term benefits of a national energy policy which promotes the development of alternative energy sources, like ethanol, range from energy security to a cleaner environment. The crisis in the Middle East may indicate it is time to make this kind of a commitment.

LOCAL FIRMS ALREADY MAKING A DIFFERENCE
At least two companies in the Eighth Congressional District are doing their part to contribute to the energy security of the United States.
West Tennessee Public Utilities, based in Huntingdon, has converted much of its service fleet to operate on natural gas.
Natural gas is an abundant, inexpensive world-wide source of energy. Like ethanol, it burns cleaner than regular gasoline and reduces the effects of greenhouse gases already in the air.
In Milan, the Army Ammunition Plant has an energy efficiency and conservation program in place which has recently been recognized by the Department of Energy for its excellence.
I commend companies like West Tennessee Public Utilities and the Milan Army Ammunition Plant which have acted on the commitment to a cleaner environment and to America's energy security.

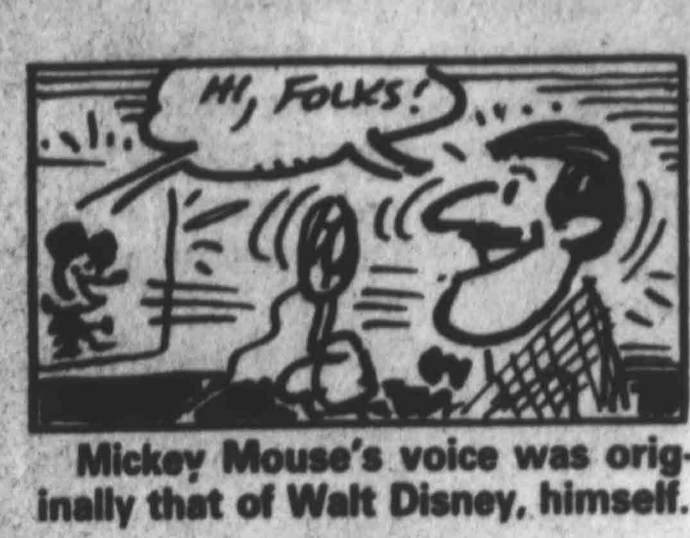

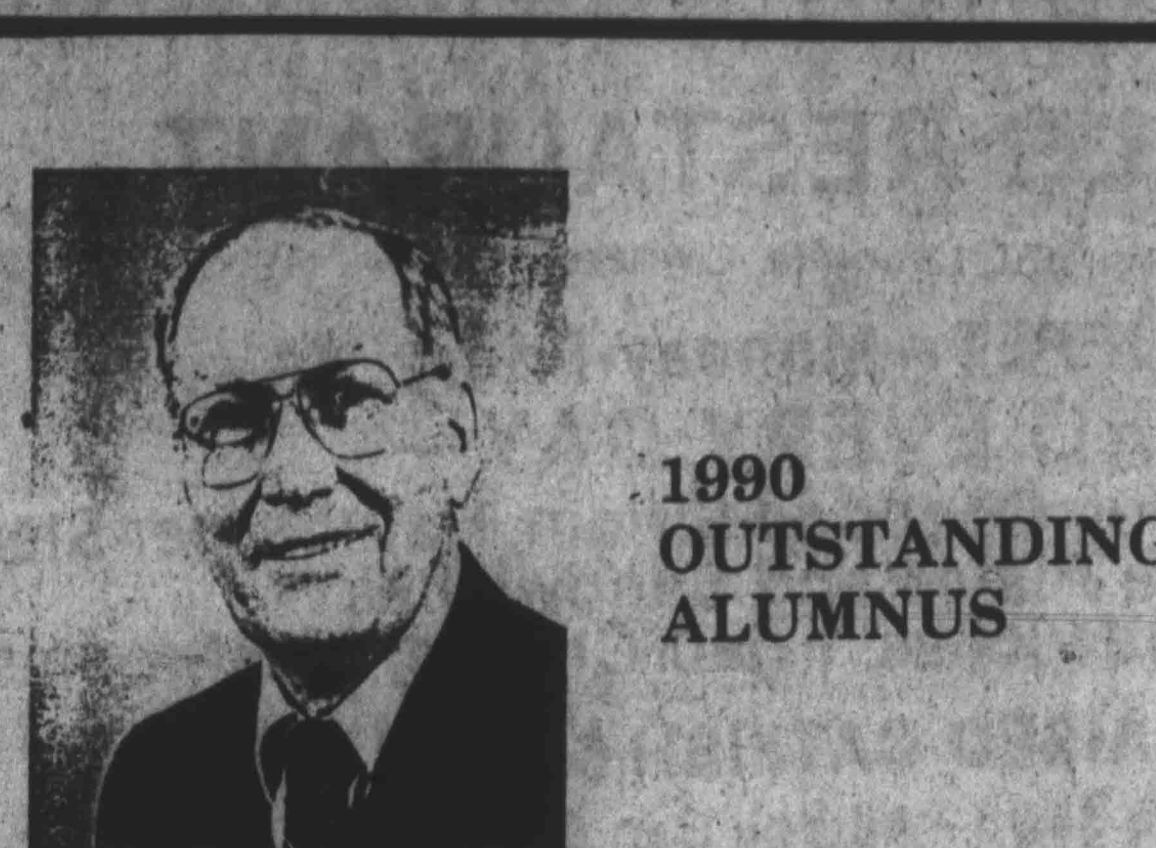

Bd. Of Education Asks Cities' Aid

In a letter dated Thursday of last week, Bobby G. Webb, county school superintendent, advised the county's four incorporated cities that in the Board of Education's meeting Sept. 13th, it "unanimously voted to ask each municipality to re-implement the original pledge to relinquish your pro rata share of the 1/2 ¢ Local Option Sales Tax which was approved by a voter referendum on May 25, 1976.

"As you are probably aware," Webb wrote, on August 4, 1986, "the voters of Lauderdale County approved a 1% local option sales tax increase, and each municipality pledged its pro rata share of said sales tax to Lauderdale County for school construction purposes for a period of 20 years. This agreement expired in 1986.

"On May 25, 1976, the voters of Lauderdale County passed a 1/2 ¢ Local Option Sales Tax Referendum which read in part:

"Shall all that portion of the one-half percent additional tax allocated to the county to be used solely for the construction, repair, renovation, and maintenance of school buildings?"

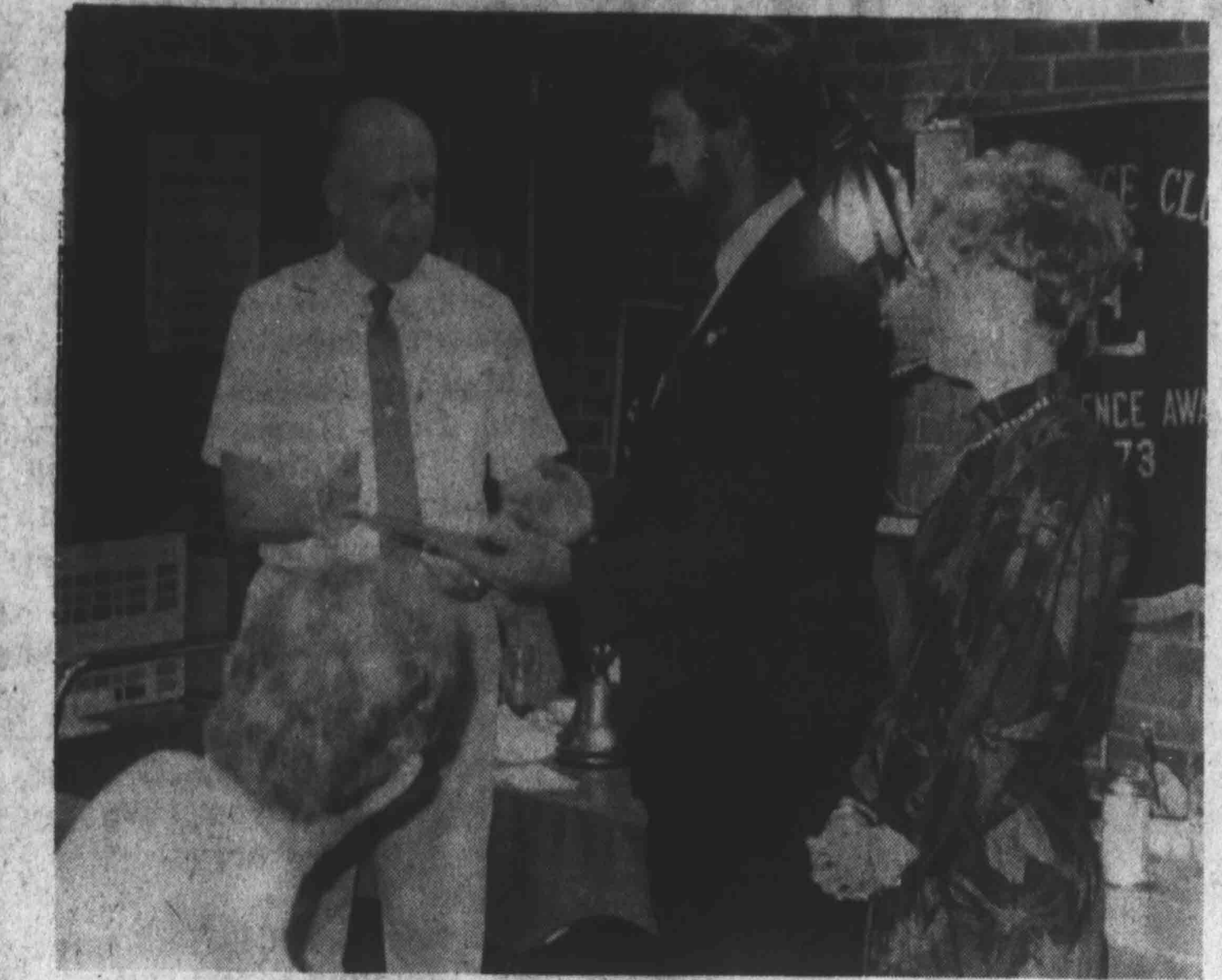
"Again, all the cities pledged their pro rata share of this 1/2 ¢ sales tax increase for a specified period of ten (10) years. This agreement with the cities also expired in 1986.

"When both of these agreements expired in 1986, the cities began to receive their portion of the sales tax which had been used by the county for school construction, repair, renovation, and maintenance. Unfortunately, necessary school repairs, renovation, and maintenance did not expire in 1986 with these agreements. In fact, as our school buildings get older, more and more major repairs are required. For example, the entire Ripley High School roof had to be replaced this past summer at a cost of \$185,000. The air conditioning/heating systems at Halls High and Ripley High are not functioning properly and will need to be replaced in the near future at a tremendous cost.

"I realize that state law provides for the municipalities to receive 1/2 ¢ of the local option sales tax collected within the municipality; however, the school board believes that the majority of citizens who voted for the 1976 sales tax referendum thought that all the additional 1/2 ¢ would go to the schools for construction, repair, renovation and maintenance of buildings. They believe that when the voters approved the referendum, they were not aware that the cities were giving their share of this new sales tax money for only a specified length of time. When the referendum was passed on May 25, 1976, the agreements with the cities had not yet been put in writing. The actual agreements were signed on June 30, 1976, approximately one month after the referendum.

"Even though all county schools are located within the city limits of Ripley or Halls and are therefore, more convenient, located for the citizens of these two towns, the Board of Education does not receive any part of the cities' property tax. Unlike Dyersburg, Covington and other

surrounding cities, Ripley and Halls are benefitting from having school systems in their cities without the expense of funding city schools from city property taxes. The schools in Lauderdale County serve the children who live inside, as well as those who live outside, the four municipalities. Providing a quality education for every child, whether he/she lives inside or outside the city limits of Ripley, Halls, Gates or Henning, requires the combined efforts of county and city governments.

"We are, therefore, asking that you re-affirm your commitment to support our schools by your consent to once again give the schools your pro rata share of the 1976 1/2 ¢ sales tax as you

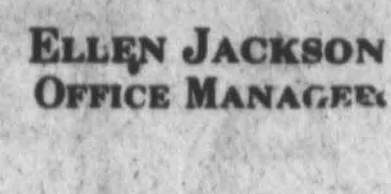

HEALTH SERVICE CORPS SERVES AREAS WITH HEALTHCARE SHORTAGES

Ten out of fifteen counties in the Eighth District have a health-care manpower shortage. Twelve have been designated as medically underserved. These and similar rural areas across America may soon feel relief from the declining availability of health care in their communities. Congress has revived the National Health Service Corps which sends desperately needed doctors to hundreds of rural and inner-city communities. Created 20 years ago, the Corps lures medical professionals to underserved areas by offering scholarships to students who agree to work in these areas after

for those in need are often not available. The National Health Service Corps is being revitalized in an effort to alleviate some of these problems. In 1989, there were 56 health-care providers in Tennessee participating in the Health Service Corps program. With 59 counties designated as having a health manpower shortage, the need exists for Corps medical professionals in communities across the state. People in our rural communities can not afford to suffer from inaccessibility to adequate health care. The Rural Health Service Corps, reauthorized by Congress until the year 2000, provides the vital medical attention rural Americans have been losing.

Ripley Mayor Responds With Open Letter To School Board

Dear Superintendent Webb:

I am writing in response to your letter of October 4, 1990 from you and the Lauderdale County School Board.

You are correct, the voters of Lauderdale County did pass a 1% local option sales tax in 1986 at the request of the Lauderdale County Commission. After this referendum passed, the City of Ripley contracted with the Lauderdale County Commission for twenty (20) years to pay for school construction.

You should be aware also of another referendum in 1973 asked for by the Lauderdale County Commission to be used for teacher salary increases. This referendum also passed and the City of Ripley again gave their portion of this tax for teacher salary increases. There is no mention of this in your letter and we have been advised by the Trustees of Lauderdale County this fund balance no longer is carried, as such, on the Trustee's books. We would ask you and the Board to give us an accounting of this fund and tell us why there is not a separate fund for this purpose in the Trustee's office.

You are correct, the Board of Education and Lauderdale County Commission agreed again in 1976 to go to the voters on referendum for a 1.2% local option sales tax increase. Once again, the City of Ripley contracted with the Lauderdale County Commission to give the City of Ripley share of this tax for ten (10) years to build and renovate our schools as the program was presented to the City of Ripley.

When you stated these contracts expire in 1986, you are evidently not aware of a 1985 contract agreement. The Lauderdale County Commission came to the City of Ripley in 1985 with another building program for our schools and asked the City of Ripley to contract with the Lauderdale County Commission for this program. The City of Ripley did again agree to contract with the Lauderdale County Commission to give all the funds necessary to pay the cost of the building program as presented to the City of Ripley, taking up to fifteen (15) years to pay. We are now in the midst of this contract with the Lauderdale County Commission, the Superintendent, the Lauderdale County School Board, and the Towns of Gates, Halls, and Henning.

We also mention the City of Ripley was called on once again in 1990 to support a 1/2% increase in local option sales tax by the Lauderdale County Commission for teacher salary increases. The City of Ripley has agreed to support our schools and school teachers by agreeing to give any portion of this increase to the Lauderdale County Commission for teacher salary increases at that time.

You mentioned, in your letter, the Lauderdale County Board of Education does not receive any part of Ripley and Halls property tax and you are correct. As you know, the Lauderdale County

Commission has the responsibility of funding the operation of the Lauderdale County Schools with property taxes and you failed to state the City of Ripley and the Town of Halls property owners pay property tax to Lauderdale County for operation of Lauderdale County Schools. You mention Dyersburg and Covington and failed to mention they have separate city and county school systems.

We ask you to continue to work for the betterment of our school system and to help our teachers. The City of Ripley has always supported the Lauderdale County Commission in its endeavors to build schools, raise our teachers salaries and our record shows this to be true.

We thank you for the opportunity to share with you our concerns for the quality education for every child in Lauderdale County. The City of Ripley has always put education as the number one priority of our government and we will continue to do so.

We look forward to an early reply to our desire to know about the 1/2% local option sales tax passed in 1973 for teacher salary increases.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE 2, SECTION 210, OF THE GATES MUNICIPAL CODE AND BEING ORIGINALLY ORDINANCE NO. 57, SECTION II (5) AND THE AMENDMENTS THERETO...

A. No beer permit for on premises consumption shall be issued for any business or person to sell beer in any location within the corporate limits of the Town of Gates, Tennessee, not included in the following zones:

Zone 1: Beginning at the concrete bridge on old Highway 51 crossing Tiedale Creek; thence south along the right-of-way of old Highway 51 to the city limits.

Zone 2: Beginning at the intersection of Highway 88 and the Concord Road; thence south along the Concord Road to the city limits.

B. No permit authorizing the sale of beer will be issued when any business for consumption on or off premises would cause congestion of traffic or would interfere with schools, churches, or other places of public gathering...

School Officials Provide Details On Tax Sharing

Bobby G. Webb, Superintendent of Schools, and Bob Ennis, chairman of the Board of Education, responded Tuesday to Ripley Mayor Rozelle Criner's letter to the Board, published last week, as follows:

"In reference to your concern about the teacher salary increase referendum of 1973 and the accounting of this fund, this fund was set up and continues to be collected and accounted for by the County Trustee's office. The exact revenue from this 1 1/2% tax is reported to the Board of Education monthly and allocated for local teacher salaries.

"As set forth in the agreement, this revenue is allocated to all county teachers for salaries over and above the amount paid from other county revenue. Every teacher is allocated a local supplement based on their years of experience and college degree. Any amount left over each year is placed into a designated reserve account (No. 34290). This account, along with all school accounts, is routinely audited annually by the state Comptroller's office to verify that all funds are properly accounted for."

At this point, the letter references an attached year-by-year account for the last five fiscal years, providing these figures:

"Sales tax money received for the teacher salary supplement as designated and collected through the County Trustee's office"—1985-86, \$332,040.03; 1986-87, \$376,302.81; 1987-88, \$404,228.23; 1988-89, \$403,656.50; 1989-90, \$414,068.00.

"Total local salary supplements not including the \$500 per teacher paid from other county revenue. (This figure varies from year to year depending on the number of teachers employed and the degree of their individual training and experience.)"—1985-86, \$337,838; \$436,750; \$413,445; \$489,625.

"Adjustments made by the auditor from the state Comptroller's office"—86-87, \$25,277.14; '87-88, \$3,753.03; '89-90, \$36,005.13.

"Ending balance as of June 30th each fiscal year in the teacher reserve fund"—84-85, \$127,860.64; '85-86, \$113,905.67; '86-87, \$126,499.62; '87-88, \$90,194.82; '88-89, \$80,405.32; '89-90, \$40,853.45.

The letter continues:

"We are grateful for the past co-operation of the cities to improve teacher salaries but as you can see by these figures, the actual amounts paid to our teachers from this fund for the past 5 years have exceeded the revenue generated from this 1 1/2% local option sales tax for teacher salary increases.

"As you pointed out, the cities' commitment to give their share of this 1 1/2% did not expire in 1986 as originally agreed. The terms of the 1985 agreement nullified the existing contracts between the municipalities and the county, pertaining to the distribution of the 1 1/2% local sales tax. This 1985 agreement is basically a guarantee that if the county's share of the sales tax is not sufficient to pay the annual school bond indebtedness, the amount needed would be taken from the cities' share. Since 1976, the county's share has been more than adequate to pay the debt service on these school construction bonds. Therefore, the cities began receiving their pro-rata share of this 1 1/2% sales tax in November of 1987.

"According to records from our County Trustee, the cities have collected the following amounts from their share of the 1-1/2% sales tax (these figures do not include any interest paid to the cities):

- "1987, \$114,868.50.
- "1988, \$384,958.70.
- "1989, \$497,303.65.
- "1990, \$515,734.39.

"We are not asking that the cities give back any part of the money already received, the school board is simply asking that the cities allow these funds to be used for the purpose for which they were originally intended, which was for the construction, renovation, and maintenance of all Lauderdale County Schools. We hope that you will agree to carry out the wishes of the voters which were expressed in the referendum of 1966 and 1976 by giving the schools all of the future sales tax revenue.

"We are grateful for all your past support for our school system and we are truly encouraged to read of your commitment to continue to place education as the number one priority of the city government.

"Thank you in advance for bringing this matter before your board and for giving it your utmost attention."

Henning Native Provoost Of 'National Cathedral'

The Rev. Sanford Garner, Jr., who was born in Henning when 12 years old, has been named interim provost of the Cathedral of the Episcopalian Diocese of Washington, D.C., supervising 150 employees, 700 volunteers, and three schools.

The cathedral welcomes all faiths and is known as the "National Cathedral," with state flags lining the nave.

In it, Martin Luther King, Jr., preached his last Sunday sermon, and President Dwight Eisenhower's funeral was held.

President Woodrow Wilson's tomb is here, as is that of Helen Keller (with a memorial in Braille-raised dots which blind persons, like Keller, can read with their fingers).

The building, the length of two football fields, is of 14th-century English Gothic style, its 150,000 tons of Indiana limestone supported by flying buttresses, without steel support.

On 53 acres, it is the second largest cathedral in the nation and the sixth tallest in the world (at 301 feet and three inches).

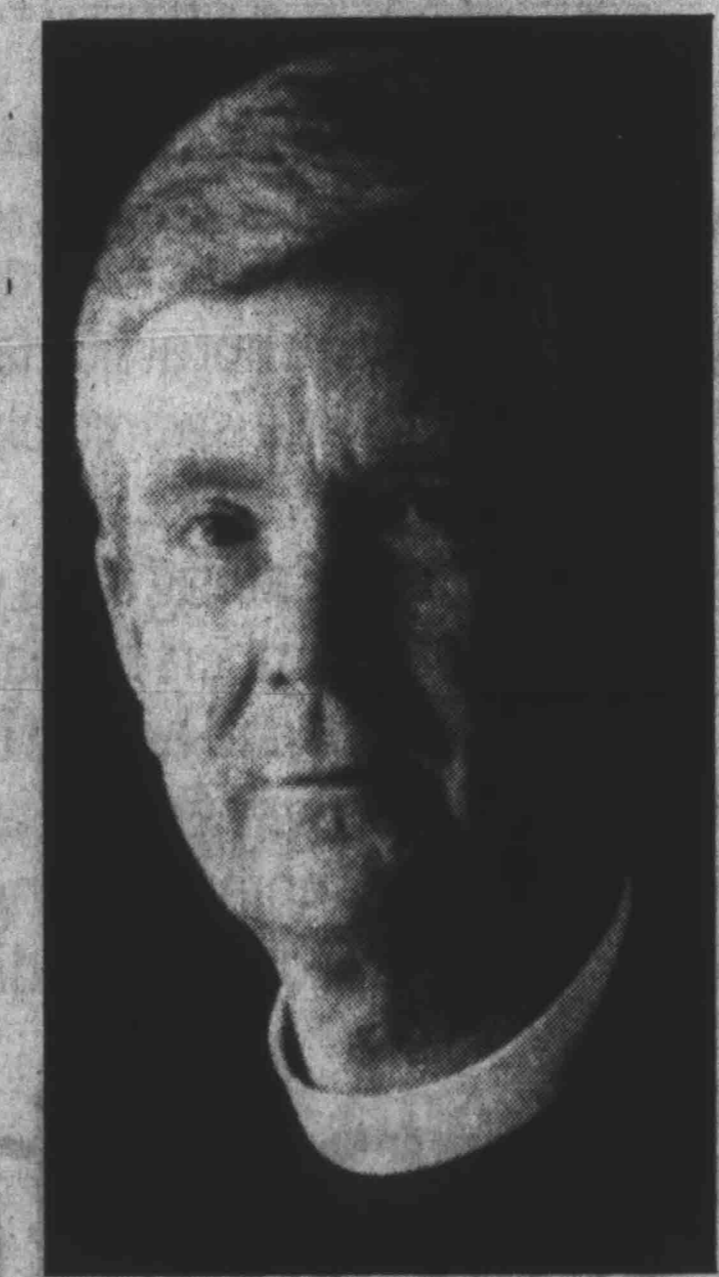
President Theodore Roosevelt laid its cornerstone in 1907, after Congress created a Foundation for it in 1893.

Seven bishops and five architects later, the last stone was put in place last month.

The building crew never exceeded 54; it averaged 20.

The total cost of \$65,000,000 included no public funds.

It can seat 4,000, to hear an organ with 10,500 pipes.



Frances died June 8, 1909, less than four months after her book was published. It has now been re-printed 51 times.

Garner was graduated from Byars-Halls High School in Covington in 1942. He took degrees from UT-Knoxville and the University of the South in Seawane and a diploma from St. Augustine's College in Canterbury, England.

He and his wife, Mary, have three sons, Sanford III, James, and Robert.

His mother, Elizabeth Mann Garner, has moved to Washington from Cookeville.

Pumpkin Treats
By Jane H. Connell
Corn stalks surrounded by pumpkins and glowing jack-o'-lanterns are traditional reminders that autumn has arrived. But pumpkins aren't just decorative or for Thanksgiving pie; this versatile vegetable can be used in many easy and delicious recipes.

While you can find canned pumpkin in any grocery store year-round, this fall why don't you try cooking and using fresh pumpkin in your favorite recipes?

If you are cooking fresh pumpkin for the first time, there are a few things you should know. For example, the biggest pumpkin may make a great jack-o'-lantern, but it's not always the best choice for cooking. Sugar or pie pumpkins taste better than the traditional jumbo field pumpkins that are generally sold for jack-o'-lanterns. Smaller pumpkins have more tender flesh and have less water than large pumpkins. As a rule, a 5-pound pumpkin will yield about 4 1/2 cups of cooked pulp.

Also, pumpkins can be stored and used later in winter. At 68 degrees, pumpkins will keep about a month. They will last two to three months when stored in a refrigerator.

Cook or microwave a fresh pumpkin and use the pulp in one of these easy-to-prepare recipes.

Cooked Fresh Pumpkin
Select a small pumpkin; wash well. Cut pumpkin in half crosswise. Place halves, cut sides down, in a 15 x 10 x 1-inch jelly-roll pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until fork tender. Cool for 10 minutes. Peel pumpkin and discard seeds. Puree pulp in food processor or mash thoroughly. Cover and place in refrigerator. Cooked pumpkin should keep for 4 to 5 days.

Microwaved Fresh Pumpkin
For a 5 to 6 pound pumpkin, cut pumpkin in half crosswise, remove seeds and set aside. Peel and cut pumpkin into 1-inch cubes; place in a shallow, 2-quart dish. Cover lightly with heavy duty plastic wrap; fold back a small edge of wrap to allow steam to escape. Microwave at high for 20-25 minutes or until tender, giving the dish a quarter turn every 5 minutes. Puree pulp in food processor or mash, if desired. Yield: About 3 to 4 1/2 cups mashed pulp.

Pumpkin-Nog Pie
Pastry Shell and Filling:
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup shortening
1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
3-4 Tablespoons cold water
2 eggs
1 can (1 lb. 2 oz.) pumpkin pie mix
1 cup prepared egg nog
Combine flour, salt and pumpkin pie spice in a mixing bowl. Cut in shortening using a pastry blender or 2 knives until mixture is the size of small peas. Sprinkle water over mixture, a tablespoon at a time, while tossing and stirring with a fork. Add water until dough is just moist enough to hold together. Roll out on lightly floured board. Place in 9-inch pie pan.

In another mixing bowl, combine eggs, pumpkin pie filling and egg nog. Beat until thoroughly blended. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Bake at 400 degrees for 45-50 minutes until knife comes out clean when inserted near center. Cool. Just before serving, spoon Egg Nog topping around edge of pie.

Egg Nog Topping:
1 envelope whipped topping mix
1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup prepared egg nog
1 teaspoon vanilla
In small, narrow-bottomed bowl, combine all ingredients. Beat at medium speed until peaks form.

TIP: Use pumpkin pie mix with sugar and spices added. You add eggs and liquid.

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup oil
1/2 cup water

Congressman JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT

DEFICIT REDUCTION DEBATE CAUSES TENSION

During the past five months of often-strained talks, negotiators representing Congress and the President attempted to create a budget to significantly reduce the federal deficit. The difficulty of those negotiations illustrated the need to reform our nation's budget-making process.

The federal debt, which has increased from \$800 billion to over three trillion dollars in just the past ten years, is more than a problem to be addressed. It is a crisis to be solved. Congress and the President began working in May to fashion a package of revenue sources and spending limitations that would cut the

deficit by \$500 billion over the next five years. Unfortunately, these discussions often stalled as those involved in the negotiations sought to achieve their individual versions of "budget fairness."

Partisan and ideological differences between individual Members of Congress, and tensions between the executive and legislative branches, made an already difficult legislative task even more difficult. Regrettably, some legislators on both sides of the political aisle have allowed this budget process, which is vital to our country, to deteriorate into an exchange of partisan political rhetoric.

BALANCED BUDGET MAY EASE FUTURE DEADLOCK

The fiscal deadlock which occurred during this debate reaffirms my support for a constitutional amendment calling for a balanced budget. A compulsory balanced budget would help restore a financially responsible framework to future budget debates.

In the past, Congress has been able to postpone difficult fiscal decisions from year to year. By requiring a balanced budget and allowing deficit spending only when specifically approved by the House and Senate, a constitutional amendment would demand that Congress and the administration set annual spending priorities. Perhaps then we could avoid the fiasco of this year's budget debate.

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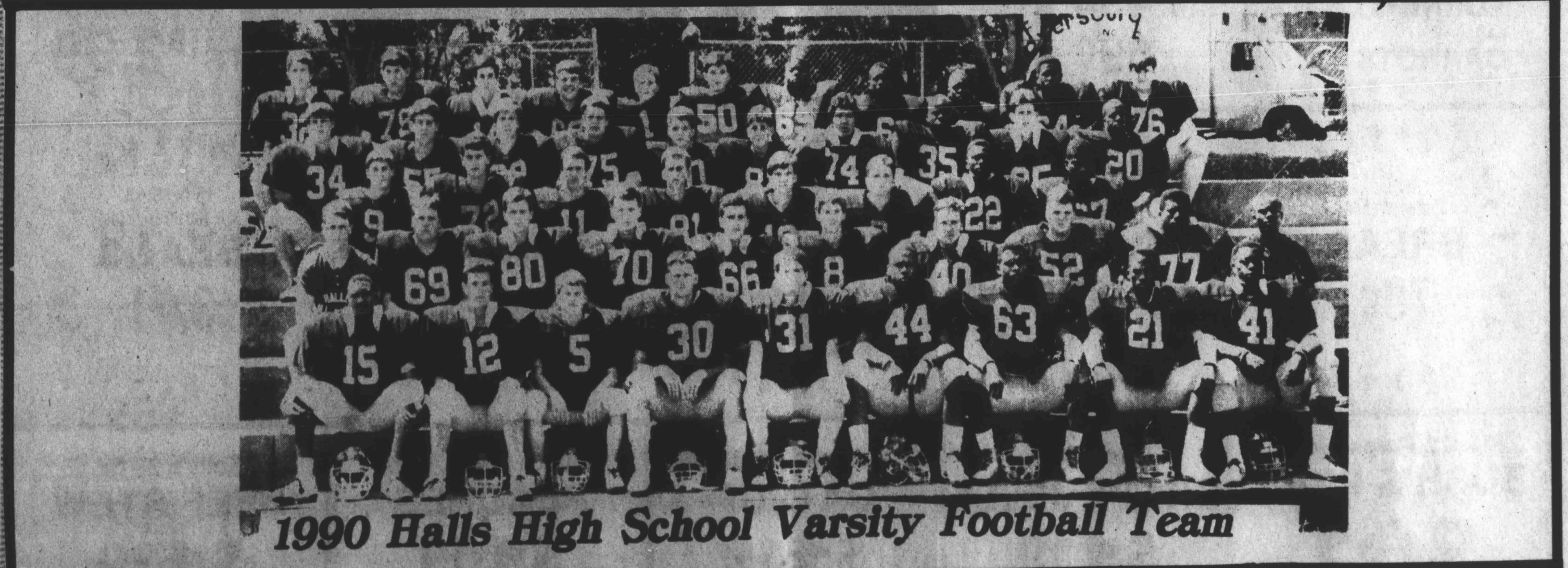
