Halls Victors Visiting U. School Of Jackson

Halls High School's Tigers, who Friday led Crockett County 8-7 after the first quarter and won 34-13, this Friday visit University School of Jackson.

USJ last week blanked First Assembly Christian School, of Memphis, 21-0.

Last season, Halls topped USJ 14-0.

Crockett's Cavaliers drew first blood, but Halls romped back with touchdowns by quarterback Sam Parker (61 yds), Patrick Damppeer (43), Jason Stinson (83-yd. punt return), Damppeer (74), and Stinson (40).

Halls racked up 426 yards rushing, to 122 for the Cavs. Halls' only pass was intercepted.

Johnny Wells (6-5, 205) paced Halls defense with nine tackles.

In addition to his touchdown jaunts, Damppeer (5-10, 160) netted 84 yards on five other carries.

While Halls was winning in Alamo, its foe next week, District 13-AA's Trenton Peabody, lost to McNairy County, 13-12, when Bobcat line-backer Andy Cox sacked the Tide's quarterback on a point-after try in the final quarter.

Trenton was the only team to win from Halls last season, 19-8, until the Tigers lost, in the third round of state play-offs, to Moore County, 21-6.

\$907,000 Earmarked For Quake Detection

A noise and jolt like an explosion startled countians at 2:35 p.m. Wednesday of last week.

It was an earthquake, centered nine miles west of Ripley. Memphis State University registered it as 3.4 on the Richter scale. The National Earthquake Information Service in Golden, Colo., put it at 3.5.

No damage was reported.

It was the second strongest quake since May 1989, in the area along the New Madrid Fault, which runs from Cairo, Ill., to near Marked Tree, Ark.

MSU has 14 seismometers in this area, and St. Louis, Mo., University has 40, in two networks.

These instruments measure vertical motion only. Information is transmitted by line-of-sight radio or expensive leased telephone lines.

Sen. Albert Gore, Jr., who sponsored an addition of nearly \$20,000,000 to federal funds for quake research, says the U.S. Geological Survey has granted \$378,000 to MSU and \$529,000 to SLU to modernize their quake detection systems.

One network of 40 sensors will measure both vertical and horizontal motion and transmit data via satellite.

Still not assured is money to operate the equipment, for the long run. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has been funding the present system, but its commitment ends in 1992.

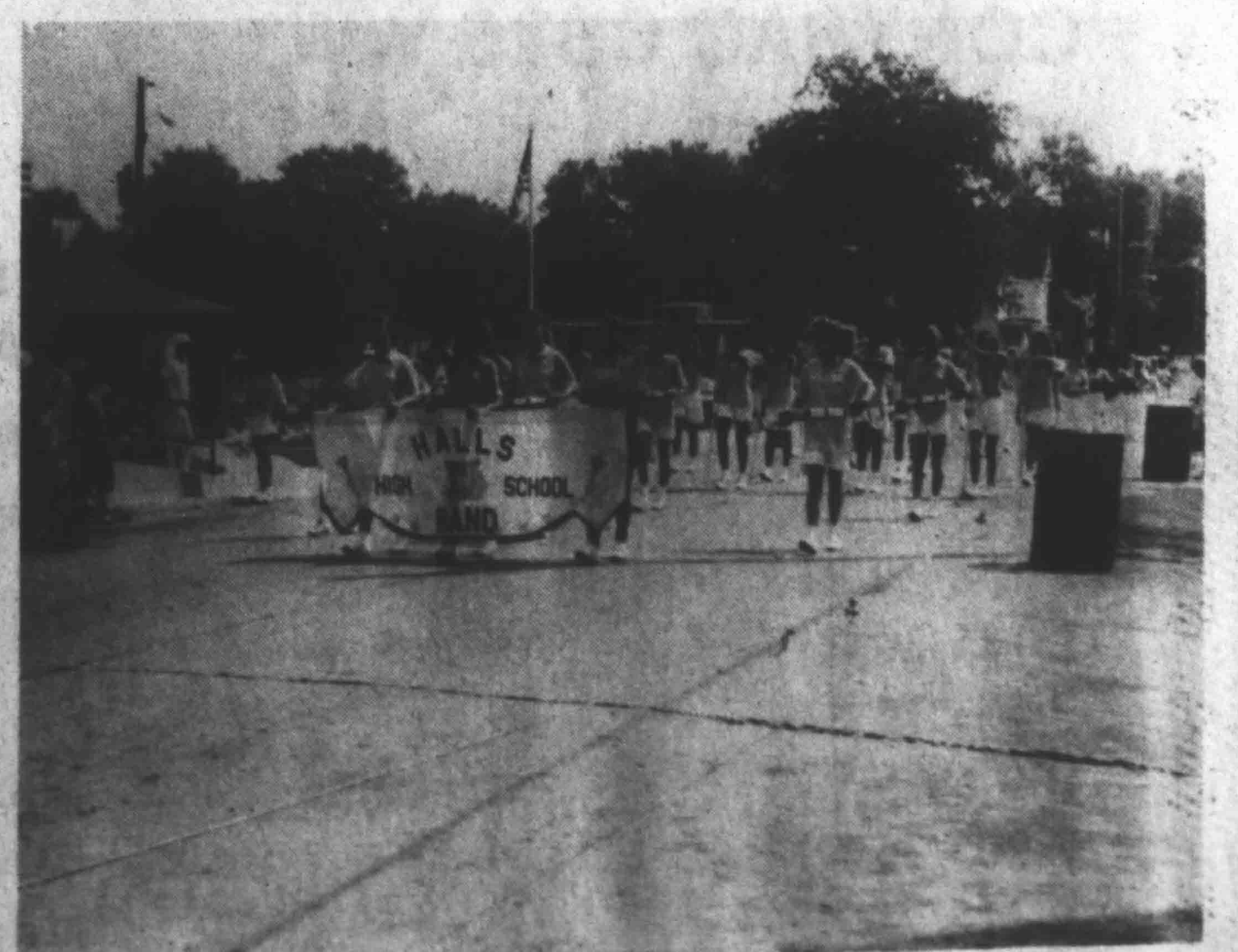

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NEWS OF TRAVEL

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It was President Thomas Jefferson who dispatched Lewis and Clark to explore the Louisiana Purchase and points west to discover an alternative water route to the Pacific and to report to him on the region's plants, animals, climate and geography. Now tracing the routes of Lewis and Clark's explorations during the early 19th century, the 70-passenger, U.S.-flag M.V. Sea Lion and its 70-passenger sister ship the M.V. Sea Bird rediscover the riverway which was vital in the opening of the West—the Columbia and Snake rivers.

The one-week voyages offered by Special Expeditions will travel from Astoria at the mouth of the Columbia, all the way to Hells Canyon on the Snake, more than 450 miles upstream. The ships will pass through some of the country's most scenic areas at a time of year when fall colors are brightening the mountainsides, apple and wine harvests are in full swing, and the summer crowds have departed.

"The Sea Lion and Sea Bird are ideal vessels for this type of leisurely exploration," says Sven Olof Lindblad, founder and president of Special Expeditions. "They have large windows so passengers have wonderful views while dining and lots of open deck space from which to watch the passing scenes from outside." These ships can navigate where larger ships cannot go—

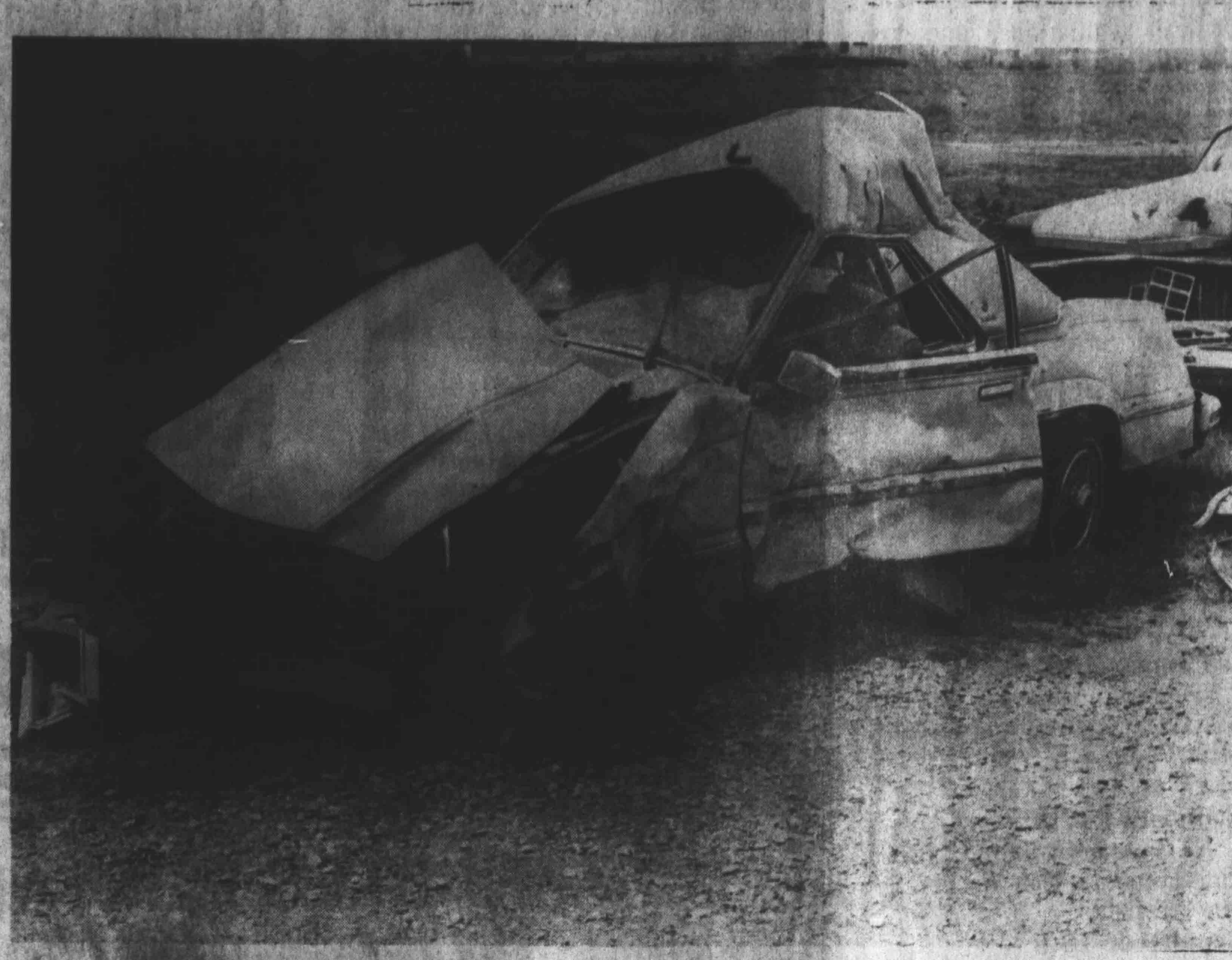

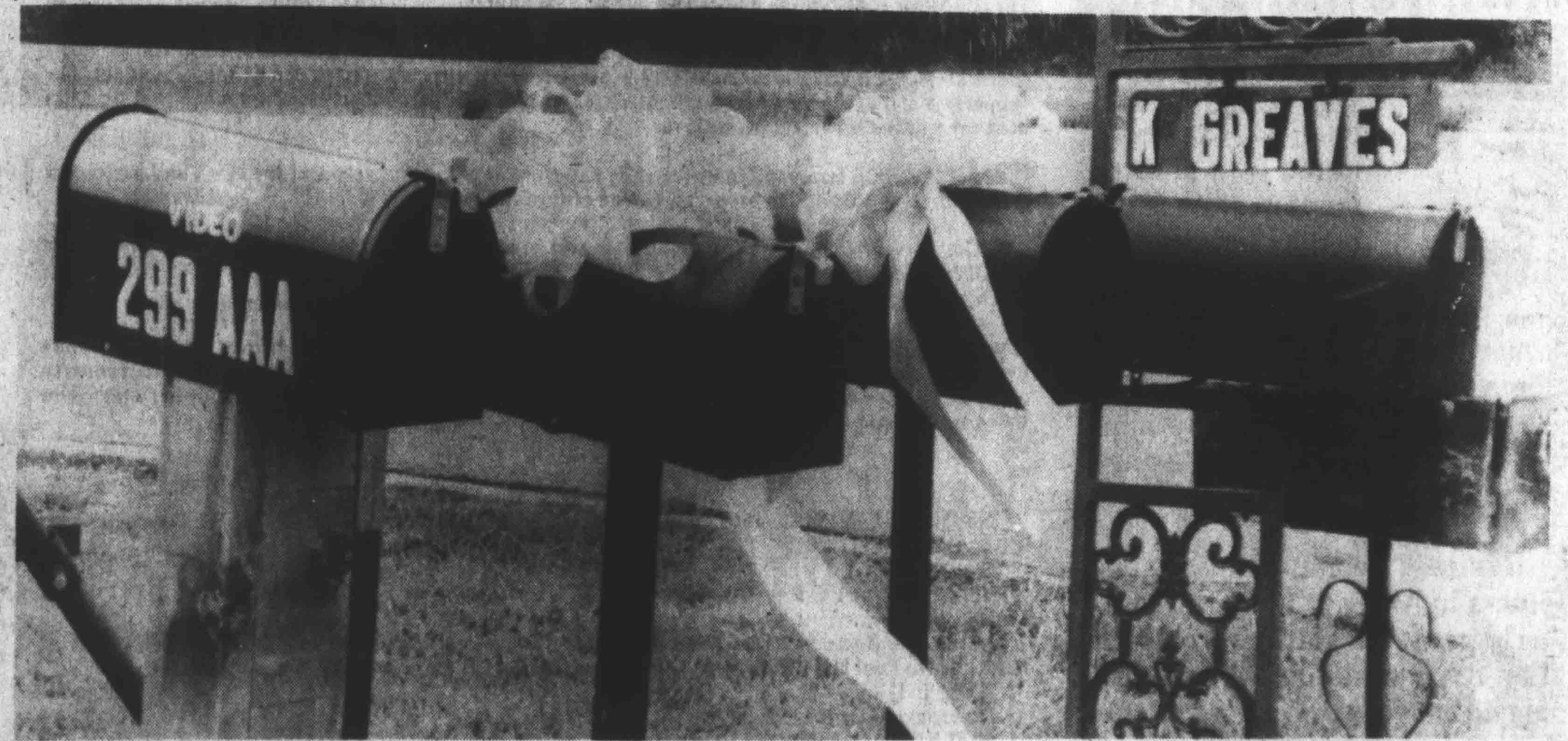

Nothing can bring you closer to a situation such as we are now facing in Kuwait, than to have a loved one there to keep you abreast of the day to day changes in this potentially explosive area.

Such is the case for Onael and the entire Haynie family, and we say "keep your chin up, and be proud of your son—he is doing exactly what he has always dreamed of doing—serving his country. You should be very, very proud of him, and I am sure that you are—and Carolyn, your tears touched me deeply, since there are so many ways that we hurt and suffer for our children, and you are experiencing one of the most traumatic."

Pvt. Haynie has always wanted to be in the Army of the United States, and could hardly wait to graduate from Ripley High School to begin his lifelong dream.

He graduated in May, 1988, and left for training July 17th. He was with the 162nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg when he shipped out to Saudi Arabia on August 7th of this year.

since he left, but with each letter, he seems to be adjusting a little better to his hot and dry surroundings.

When they first heard from him, he was not receiving full rations, and a mother is bound to worry when her son is not eating properly. As each letter has arrived, Carolyn has felt a little more reassured that her son is adjusting to his surroundings—these surroundings consisting of 120 degree daylight temperatures and 90 degree nighttime ratings.

Another adjustment has been even harder for all the young men who left so suddenly for foreign soil. They are only allowed a 12 oz. "care package" from home, and there just isn't too much you can send that weighs such a little amount. The boys only had time to grab the bare essentials, and shaving cream, razors, deodorant, etc. weighs much more than the set limits.

To Carolyn, Onael and the entire Haynie family, we say "keep your chin up, and be proud of your son—he is doing exactly what he has always dreamed of doing—serving his country. You should be very, very proud of him, and I am sure that you are—and Carolyn, your tears touched me deeply, since there are so many ways that we hurt and suffer for our children, and you are experiencing one of the most traumatic."

All the yellow ribbons found around town are so exciting—just a small gesture to let our country know that we care, and to let all our young men know that we appreciate the sacrifice they are making in defense of our country.

None can hang any higher or wave any stronger than the one that hangs at the home of Onael and Carolyn Haynie in Ripley.

Export Processing Zones are industrial parks designated by a government to provide tax breaks and other incentives to export processing firms. They account for more than 1.2 million jobs worldwide. Over 45 countries in the developing world have them to stimulate industrialization and export promotion.

Business people and their customers in America and around the world may be glad to know that the West African nation of Togo is setting up the first private operated duty-free export processing zone in sub-Saharan Africa.

The zone in Togo will give American businesses, which opened there, duty-free access to the European common market in 1992. It will be opened with help from the Overseas Private Investment Corp. (OPIC), a U.S. government agency. OPIC offered its aid for several reasons: skilled workers are paid \$10 per hour; Togo has excellent transportation, communication and banking; an efficient seaport, and one of the most modern airports in West Africa. President Gnassingbe Eyadema and his government have created what's been called the type of political, economic, and social environment for the project to be a success.

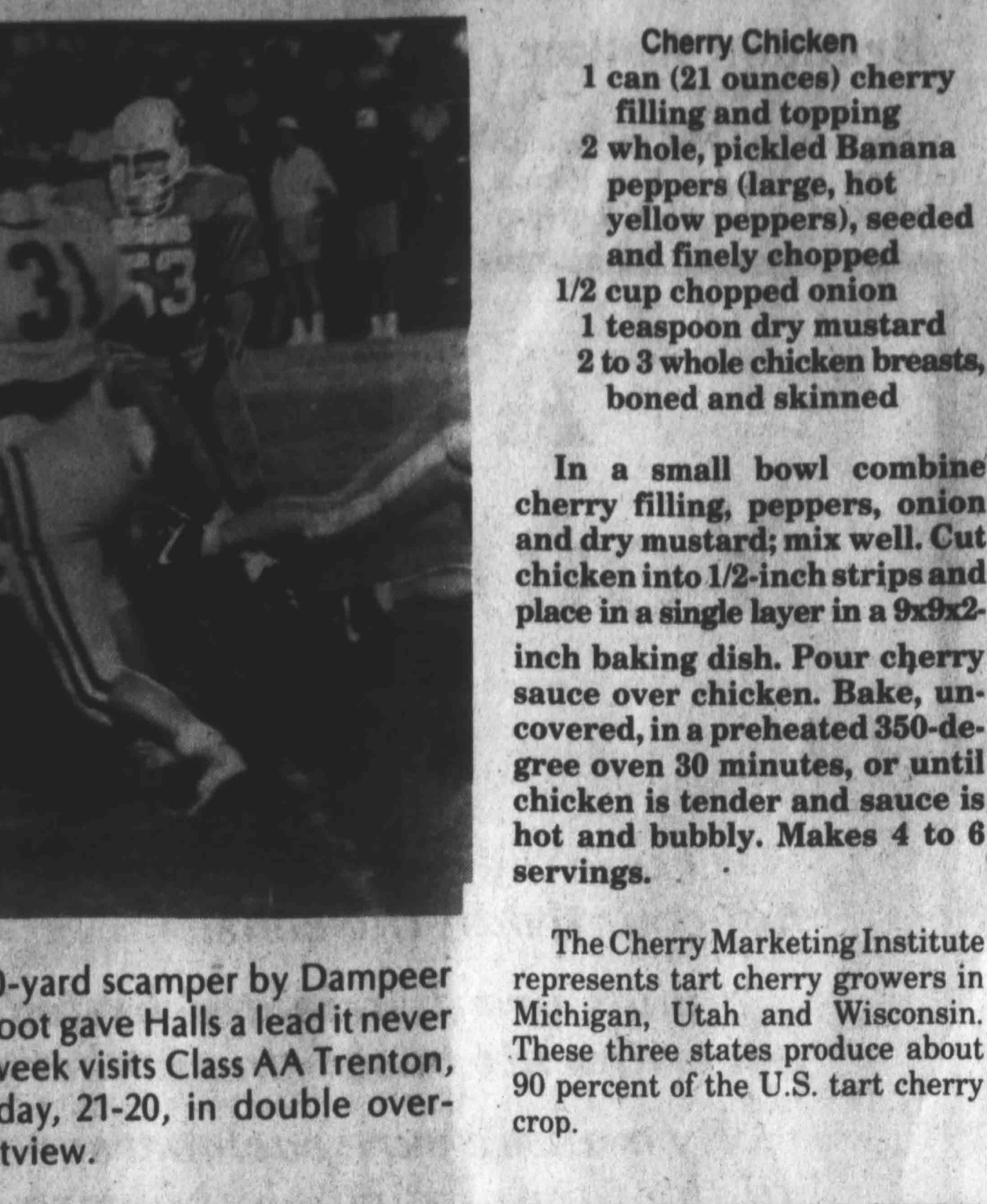

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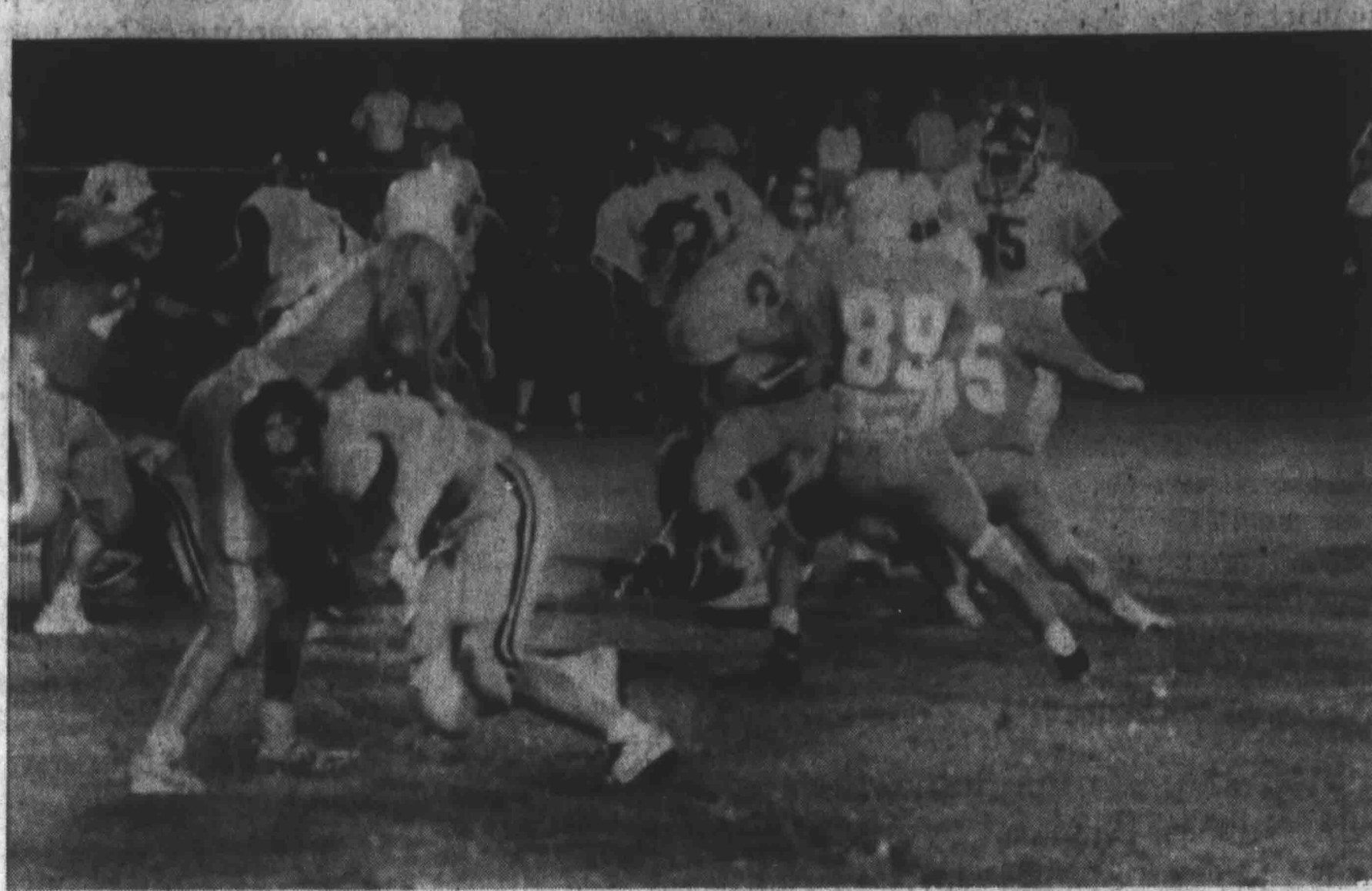
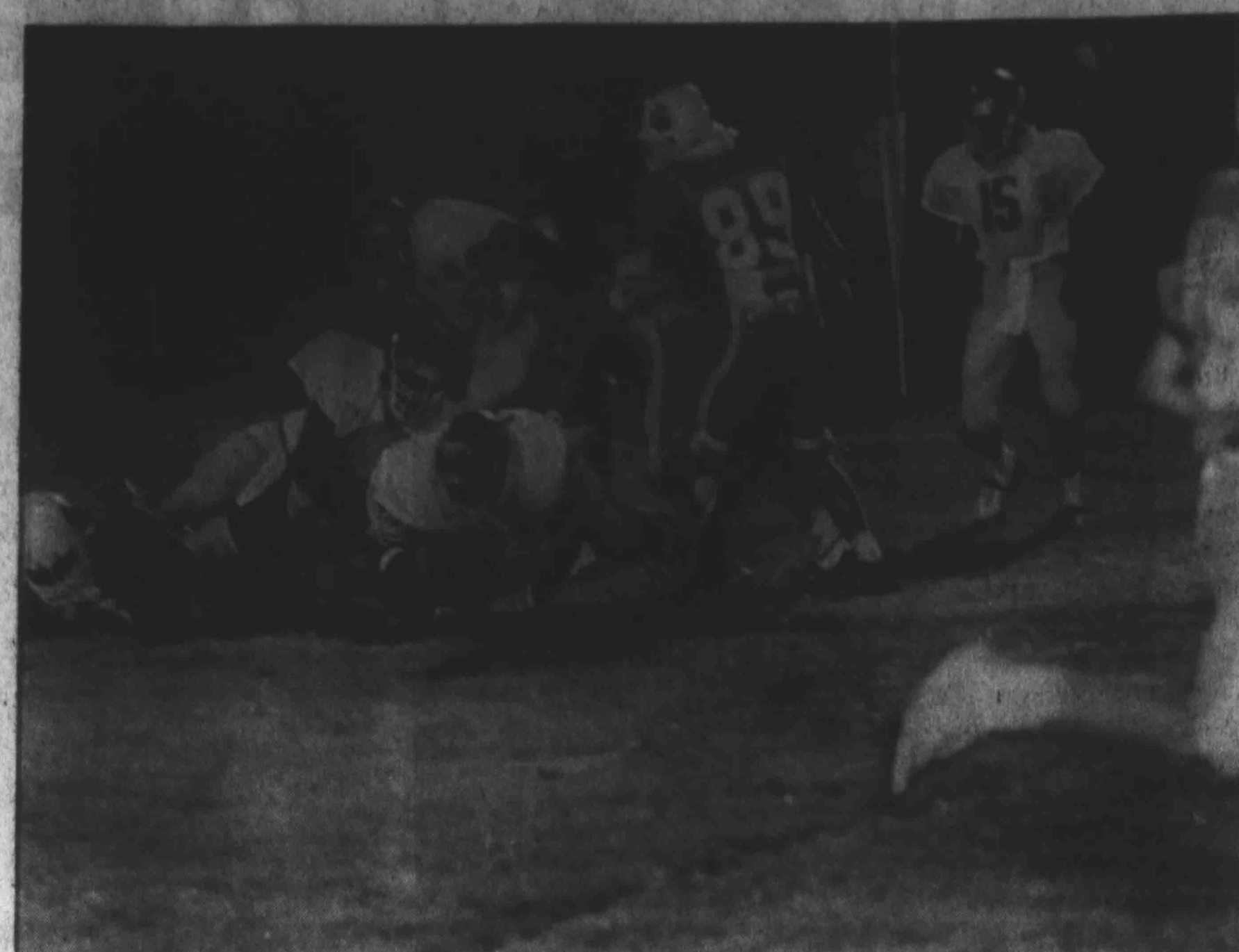

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Fort Donelson: "Unconditional Surrender"

DOVER, Tenn. — The Cumberland River winds gently through fertile farm land on its way from Nashville toward its meeting with the Ohio River a few miles to the north in Kentucky. A few miles to the west, the Tennessee River parallels the Cumberland, also on its way to the Ohio.

The area is known today as TVA's Land Between The Lakes Recreation Area, but in the winter of 1862, as Union and Confederate armies faced each other along the Tennessee-Kentucky border, the close proximity of the two rivers had a much greater importance.

"The rivers served as important highways during the Civil War era," explains National Park Service ranger Jimmy Jobe of the Fort Donelson National Battlefield. "The Cumberland River was a direct route into the important Confederate capital of Nashville. The Tennessee River led into the heart of the Confederacy in northern Mississippi and Alabama. To protect these river highways, the Confederacy built a pair of forts: Fort Henry on the Tennessee River and Fort Donelson on the Cumberland."

From the high ground along the riverbank at Dover, Fort Donelson offered commanding views of the Cumberland River. Unfortunately for the Confederacy, Fort Henry was built on low, swampy terrain along the banks of the Tennessee River. "There was a diversionary Union raid along the Tennessee River in early January of 1862 during which Union commanders noticed that Fort Henry did not appear to be as strong as previously believed," Jobe says. "General Ulysses Grant then

proposed a plan to his superiors calling for a joint army-navy raid along the rivers. The plan was first rejected, but approved a few weeks later. Grant set out in February from Cairo, Illinois, with a fleet of troop transports and gunboats under the command of Flag Officer Andrew H. Foote."

The fleet arrived at Fort Henry on February 6, and the fort surrendered after a river battle which lasted about an hour.

"The Tennessee River was high and most of the fort was under water," Jobe explains. "Most of the men had already been sent overland to Fort Donelson just 12 miles away. The Union Navy actually sailed right through the sally port to accept the surrender."

Grant's men and gunboats reached Fort Donelson a few days later, but that fort did not fall quite so easily.

"The river battle for Fort Donelson took place on Valentine's Day — February 14, 1862," Jobe says. "The fort was pretty well defended by a dozen big guns in its shore batteries. Many of the Union gunboats were hit and disabled, but Grant was receiving reinforcements daily. His land forces were steadily tightening a siege around the fort. There was indecision among the Confederate generals defending the fort. Despite their success in driving off the gunboats, they decided to surrender."

In one of the most bizarre episodes of the war, ranking Confederate General John Floyd turned command of Fort Donelson over to his subordinate, General Gibson Pillow, and departed for Nashville. Pillow

promptly turned command over to General Simon Buckner and also headed south, leaving the unfortunate Buckner to negotiate the terms of surrender with Grant.

"Buckner and Grant had been classmates and friends at West Point," Jobe notes. "As a matter of fact, Grant had borrowed money from Buckner, so when Buckner asked for terms of surrender and was told by Grant 'no terms except immediate and unconditional surrender,' Buckner was both hurt and angry."

The Union victory at Fort Donelson after a long stalemate in the war was greeted with great joy in the north. Grant became an overnight hero, launching his climb to overall command of the entire Union army and eventually president of the United States.

General Simon Buckner spent several months in a Union prison camp before being exchanged. He returned to fight for the Confederacy in later battles, and after the war served as Governor of Kentucky.

"The Union captured more than 13,000 Confederate prisoners at Fort Donelson," Jobe says. "Most of them spent seven or eight months in prison before being exchanged for Union prisoners held by the Confederacy."

Among those Confederate prisoners was Jobe's own great grandfather.

"His name was Elbert Sexton," Jobe explains. "He was a captain in the Confederate army, and spent seven months in the Union prisoner of war camp at Johnson's Island in Lake Erie off the Ohio coast before

Among the most impressive of the landmarks remaining today at the modern Fort Donelson National Battlefield is the old Dover Hotel, on the banks of the Cumberland River in the city of Dover. Known today as "Surrender House," the hotel served as General Buckner's headquarters during the 1862 battle, and it was here that the unfortunate Buckner formally surrendered his command. It was also from here that most of the Confederate prisoners boarded Union steamboats on their way to prison camps in the north. Inside the old hotel a National Park Service audio/visual presentation gives visitors some of the details of the battle and the fort's surrender.

A short distance away, the earthwork remains of Fort Donelson itself still stand guard over the grounds. Monuments and plaques describe the events that occurred here during that cold February of 1862.

Society Sees Early Maps

Members and guests of the Lauderdale County Historical and Genealogical Society met Sunday afternoon in First United Methodist Church in Halls for a program on rare maps, presented by Murray Hudson, who deals in antiquarian books and maps from his shop on Church St. in Halls.

His program, emphasizing the development of Mississippi River cartography, featured maps pre-dating the discovery of America and others up to the end of the 19th Century. Many of the latter showed details of Lauderdale County including streams, roads, railroads, and towns.

Several of the town names—like Abernathy, Rutherford and Canton—which appeared on maps of various dates are no longer in use.

Of particular interest to the group was a map of the 1870's which erroneously showed the partially-completed railroad (later the Illinois Central) running to Double Bridges. Mrs. Hudson assisted her husband with the program.

Mrs. Billy Spence, vice-president of the Society and historian of Halls First United Methodist Church, extended a welcome and briefly described the church's growth from its founding in 1888.

In the business session the group voted to return funds which had been collected for a proposed county history book, with the expectation, however, that the project will be resumed in the next few years.

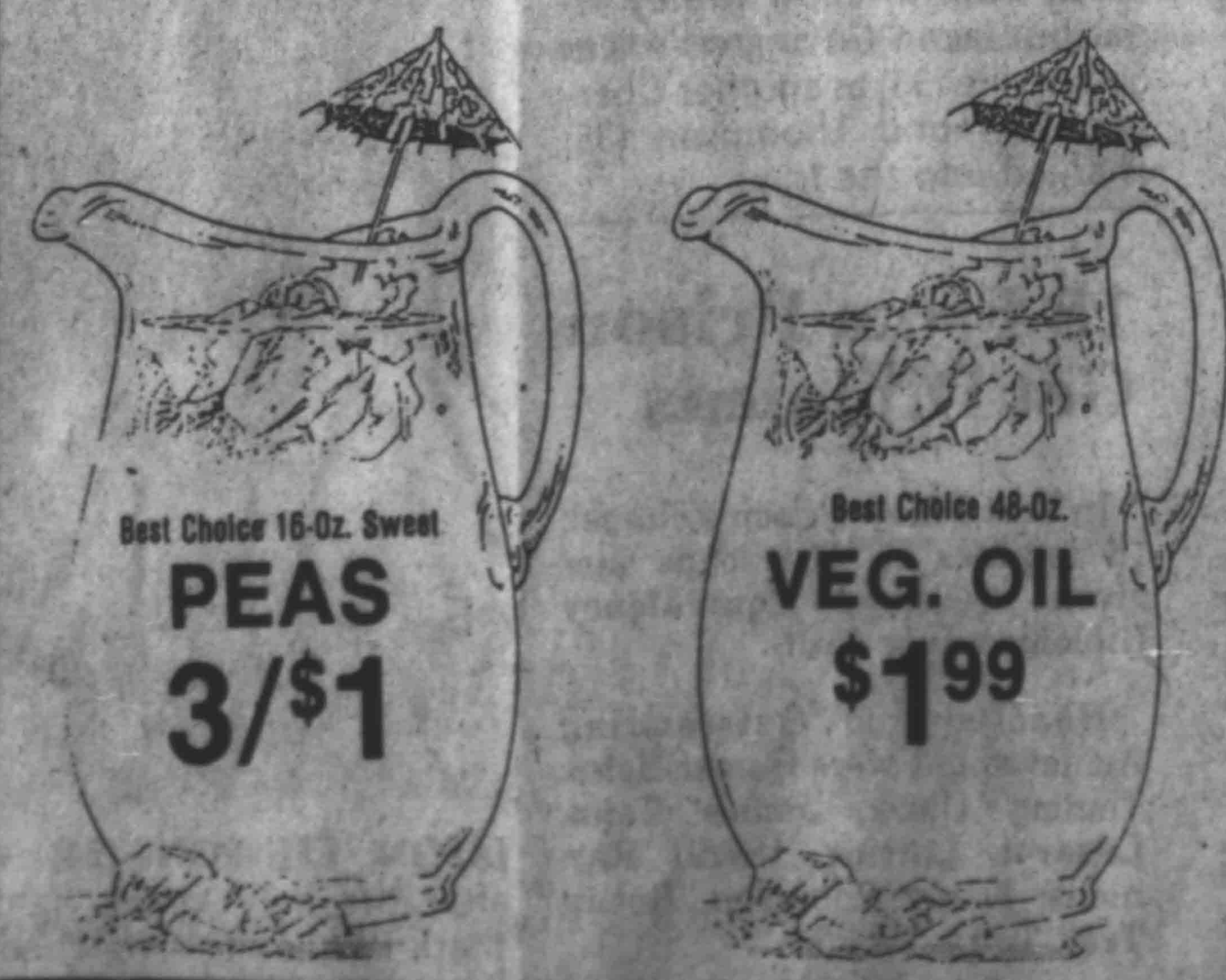

This recipe for Giant Overnight Cinnamon Rolls features sweet dough flavored with cinnamon, chopped nuts and raisins. Prepare the rolls ahead and refrigerate overnight, then bake them the next morning.



GIANT OVERNIGHT CINNAMON ROLLS

- ROLLS**
- 1 pkg. Pillsbury Hot Roll Mix
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1 cup water heated to 120 to 130°F.
 - 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, softened
 - 1 egg
- FILLING**
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter, softened
 - 1/3 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 cup raisins
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped nuts
- GLAZE**
- 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
 - 1 tablespoon margarine or butter, softened
 - 2 to 3 tablespoons milk
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Grease 13x9-inch pan. In large bowl, combine flour mixture with yeast from roll packet and 2 tablespoons sugar; blend well. Stir in hot water, 2 tablespoons margarine and egg until dough pulls away from sides of bowl. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface. With greased or floured hands, shape dough into a ball. Knead dough for 5 minutes until smooth. Cover with large bowl; let rest 5 minutes.

On lightly floured surface, roll dough to 15x10-inch rectangle. Spread 1/4 cup margarine evenly over dough. In small bowl, combine 1/3 cup sugar and cinnamon; blend well. Sprinkle evenly over margarine. Sprinkle with raisins and nuts. Starting with 10-inch side, roll up tightly, pressing edges to seal. Cut into 6 slices; place, cut side down, in greased pan. Cover loosely with plastic wrap and cloth towel. Let rise in warm place (80 to 85°F.) until almost doubled in size, about 30 minutes.

Heat oven to 375°F. Uncover dough. Bake at 375°F. for 20 to 30 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from pan. Cool 10 minutes. In small bowl, blend all glaze ingredients, adding enough milk for desired drizzling consistency. Drizzle over warm rolls, 6 rolls.

TIP: At this point, dough can be covered with plastic wrap and refrigerated overnight. Dough may rise in the refrigerator. If necessary, let dough stand at room temperature before baking until almost doubled in original size. Bake as directed above.

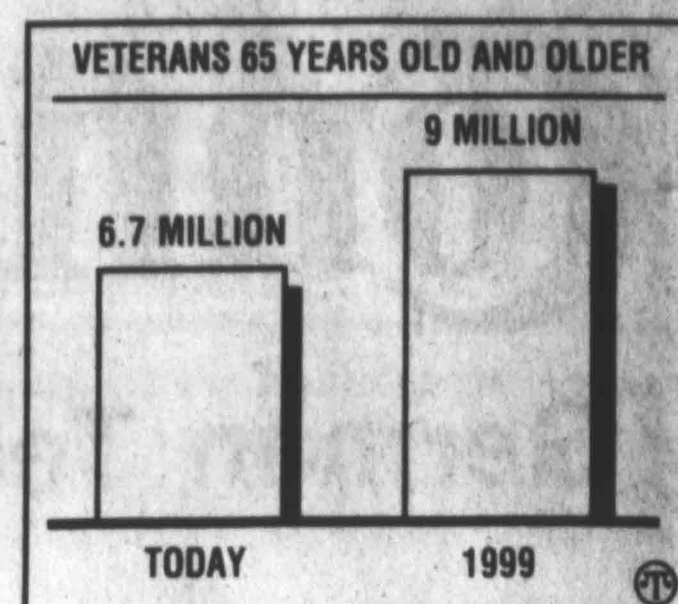

Use Extension Aids!

In October, seed recommended wheat varieties (list available at the county Extension office).

Use 30 pounds of nitrogen at planting, if possible. This always pays dividends.

Have seed treated with a fungicide and don't broadcast and disk in, if on corn ground or other heavy residues.

Disking in wheat works well on clean, firm ground. Otherwise, use a grain drill.

The Extension office can check sorghum-sudan hybrids for high nitrate content which can be toxic to cattle.

New Crop Reports

Charles Farmer, University of Tennessee Agriculture Economist, gives these crop comments:

Corn: A record yield of 121.7 bushels/acre is indicated in the crop report. The production figure of 8.12 billion bushels was above the upper end of trade estimates and is bearish for prices. almost no one doubted that we had an 8 billion crop, but I am surprised to see USDA indicate so this early. Good crops tend to get better. Does this mean that if this late crop escapes most frost damage that we will end up with production of 8.25 billion bushels? Some argue that the Sept. estimate is on the higher side and will be lowered in October and November. I would not be surprised to see the December futures contract slip to the \$2.20 level or below between now and late fall. If the market holds above \$2.50, on the other hand, it would strongly indicate that the seasonal price lows have already been established.

Soybeans: The production estimate was near the middle of trade estimates. Some folks expected an acreage loss in Iowa to reflect flooding in May-June, but USDA reported almost no acreage changes from last month. Yield losses in southern states were offset by yield

Environmentalists Protest Cribfield

Several environmental groups want Gov. Ned McWherter to revoke his appointment of Talmadge Cribfield, Jr., of Ripley, to the state Water Quality Control Board, the Associated Press reports.

"Through this appointment, the administration once again shows a lack of concern for the water that we drink and the rivers and streams we fish and swim in," the AP quotes Martha Kettle, vice president of the Tennessee Environmental Council.

The AP report adds: "The act that created the seven-member Water Quality Control Board specified at least one member have conservation interests. Ray Norris, a retired Vanderbilt University professor, was the environmentalists' choice. But Talmadge Cribfield, a Lauderdale County farmer and board member of the Obion Forked Deer River Basin Authority, was appointed."

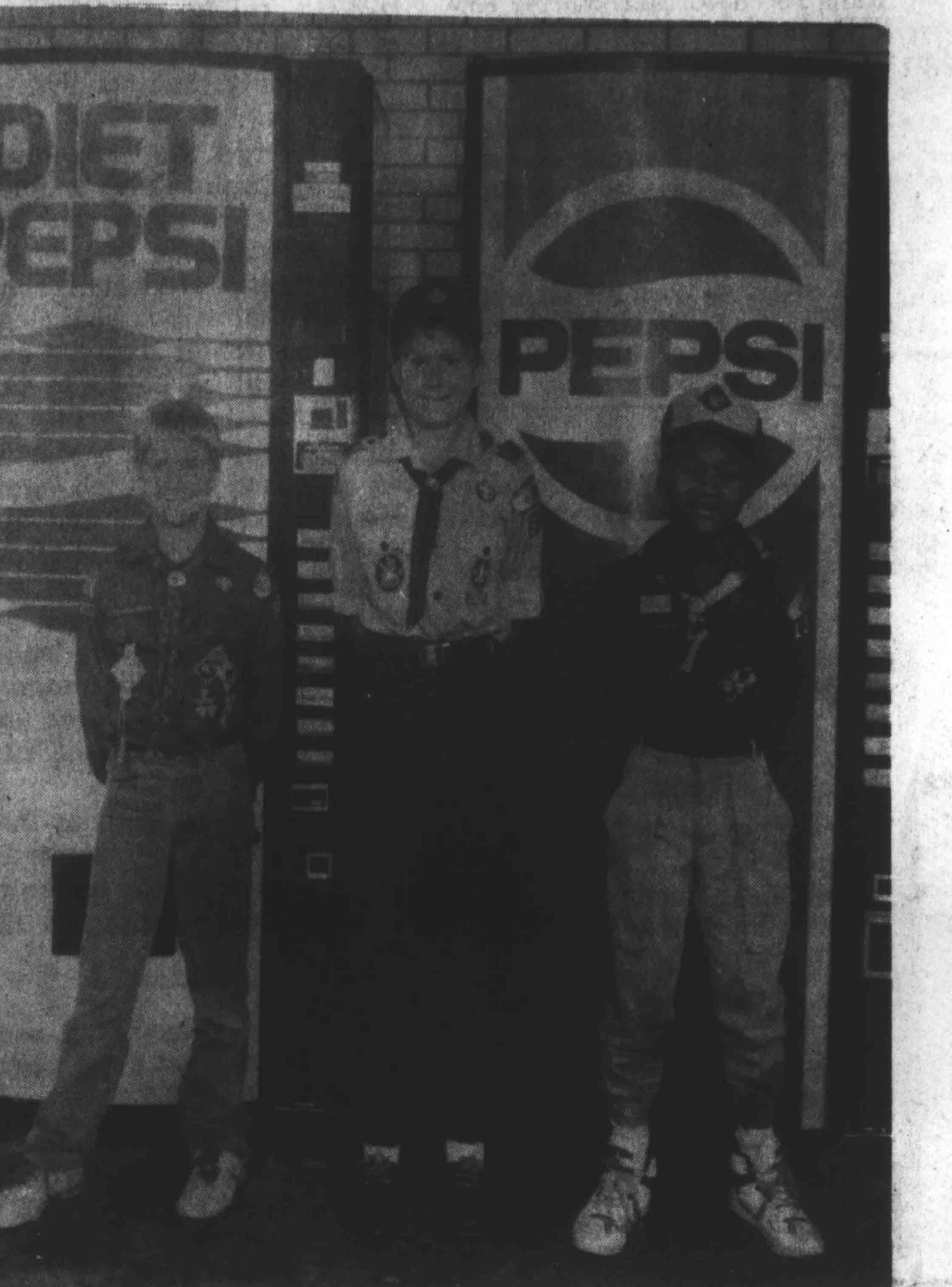
"The groups calling for the withdrawal of Cribfield's appointment include the TEC, Tennessee Sierra Club, Tennessee Scenic Rivers Association, Wildlife Management Institute, Tennessee Citizens for Wilderness Planning and Cumberland Harpeth Audubon."

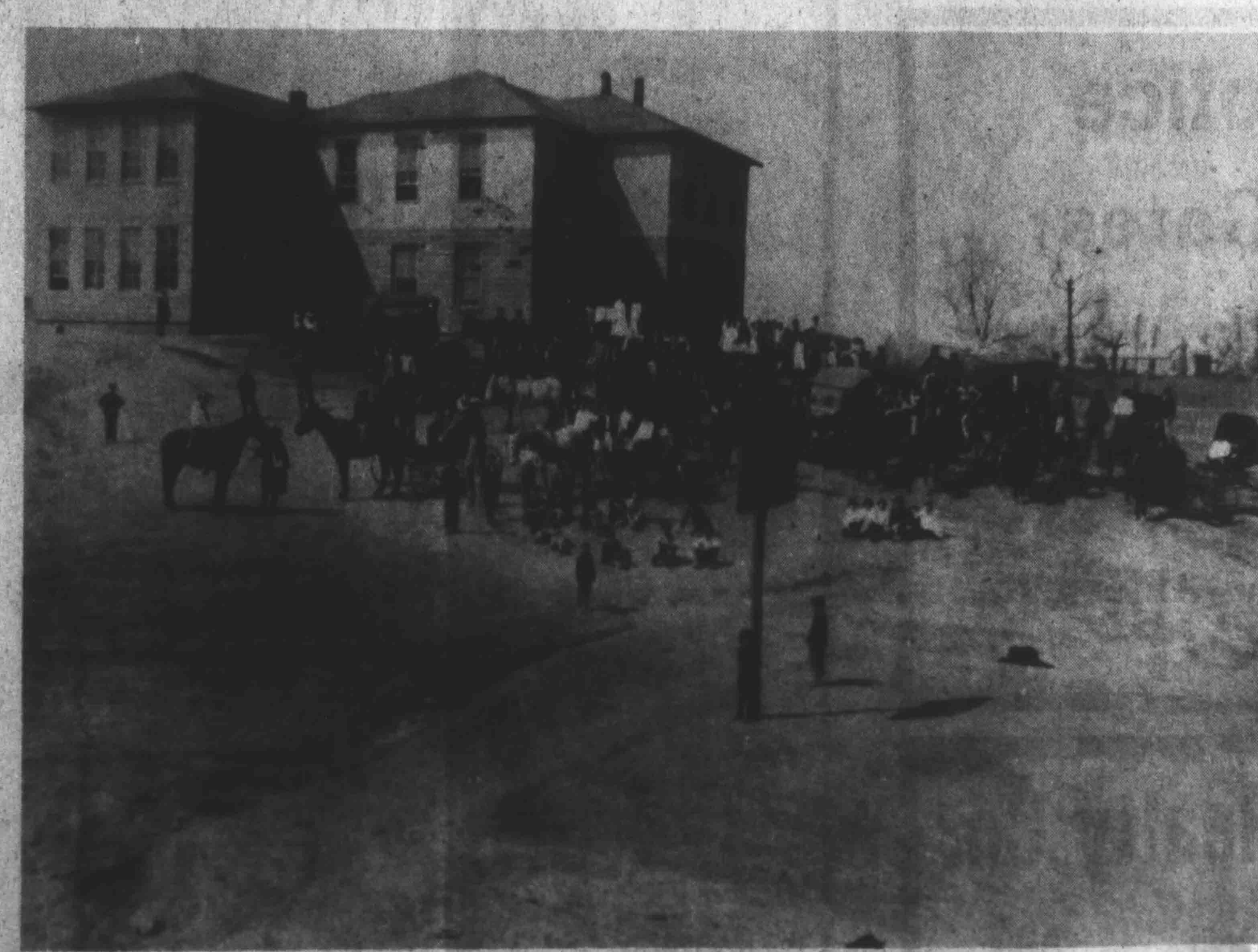

increases in Illinois, Iowa, and Indiana. The report should be neutral for soybean prices. However, the soybean market is not in a vacuum and will probably be pulled lower with corn and wheat, especially with soybean meal competing with cheaper feeds. Also, spotty rains on drought-stressed Southern beans could place additional pressure on prices. Longer term price prospects for soybeans are rather positive. USDA lowered the beginning stocks figure from 265 to 250 million bushels and raised usage a little. This means that ending stocks next August 30 were reduced from 225 to 200 million. As a percentage of usage, this carryover is almost as tight as it was at the end of '88-'89 marketing year when beans averaged about \$7. With any help from South America, cash prices should reach \$7 sometime during the next 9 months — most likely during the January-July period.

Cotton: The production figure should be neutral to positive for prices. Heavy rains in parts of the Delta have stopped early harvest and may damage grades and yields. Heavy rains after 40 days without rain and 70% of the crop open are not welcome. The National Weather Service forecast for most of the Mid-South area, including Tennessee, through Sept. 22 is for above-normal precipitation. With stocks so tight, look for cotton prices to closely follow weather conditions and increased carry over by 100 million bushels. Wheat for export (FOB Gulf) is being priced as low as \$1.90 (after EEP bonus). Significant bearish reaction to these new numbers could give us a bottom in this program appears to be more and more likely. On September 1, Secretary Yuster spoke strongly against a 20% setback. Also, late on Sept. 11 the Senate passed an amendment, proposed by Sen. Doyle, calling for a 15% setback.

Halls Tigers Hosting Unbeaten Choctaws

Halls High School's Tigers, who breezed over Skyview last week, 45-6, to stand 3-1 for the season, this week host the unbeaten Choctaws of Dyer County High School in Newbern.

The Choctaws, assigned to District 13-AA but not competing for the state play-offs, have led Chester County 25-7, Dreadsden 39-14, Crockett County 33-12, and Greenfield 12-0.

Of Dyer County's victims, Halls has played only Crockett County, in its opener. Halls won, 34-13.

Choctaw Coach Harry Tignor (54-33, 621) is in his fourth season in Newbern, after five years as head coach for Gibson County. A 1967 graduate of Chester County High School, he was graduated from the University of Tennessee in 1971. He was an assistant coach in Milan six years and in Trenton two years.

Last fall, when Dyer County ended the season 8-2, after two 9-1 years, Tignor started or swapped 12 sophomores.

They are key Indians this year, among six seniors (only two of whom played last fall), and 17 juniors.

Vet, Rookie Click

Beck is a veteran of last fall's campaign, quarterback Ross Maldonado (6-0, 152).

Coming through for him has been an all-new offensive line, founded on tackles Marcus Bernard (6-2, 280) and Wade Willis (6-2, 271), towering over guards Donnie Davidson (5-8, 155) and Daryl Fenton (5-5, 154).

But the news from Newbern this year is one of those four seniors not playing last year—Mike Price (5-6, 145), running from a split backfield.

Against Dreadsden, he took Maldonado's toss for 23 yards and a touchdown in the game's first 24 minutes; built on Maldonado's 4th-down run to the 18 to set up Jason Mayfield's score from the three; ran 83 yards to make it 19-0 with 7:47 in the first half; plunged for a yard with :58 on the clock to close the half 32-0; and intercepted a screen pass in the third quarter to romp 90 yards into pay dirt.

Mayfield, a tight end last season, got more of the spot-light as the Choctaws led Crockett 33-0 after three periods. In the first period, Mayfield tallied from the 18, converted for two points, and kicked one. Price posted TDs of one and 38 yards for a 21-0 first period spree.

Last week, Mayfield got 121 yards in 27 carries, including a 21-yard first period TD, to help hand Greenfield its first loss. Maldonado hit junior end Scott Foster (6-0, 183) for 15 yards and the Choctaws' other touchdown, in the third period.

Pugh's Lads Ready

Halls Coach Andy Pugh (111-50-1, 689 in 15 years in Halls)

will have his troops ready for Dyer County.

Andy often says he worries about the schedule "one game at a time."

But never believe everything any successful football coach says.

Of course, Pugh made sure the Tigers were more than ready for Memphis Skyview, but that wasn't too hard.

In Tiger practices last week, Andy surely gave a few thoughts to Dyer County.

And he has the fire-power.

Again, this season, his durable knack for quickly spotting what's wrong and fixing it, from limited resources, has breezed the Tigers through three games, with a loss (25-6) only to Trenton, now tied with Union City for leadership in District 13-AA.

Pugh's answer to Price is senior Patrick Dampier (5-10, 160), who rushed for more than 1,000-yards last season and is well on his way to topping that this year, with 540 in only four games.

He has 201 from Halls' opener with Crockett; 150 (in 14 carries, TDs of one and 80 yards) over University School of Jackson; 41 (in 10 carries) against Trenton; and 148 (in 10 jaunts) against Memphis Skyview.

That requires lots of support from his team-mates, and some of it was visible in last week's win from Skyview.

Tigers Share Feast

Sophomore Frank Gooch blocked a punt and returned it 18 yards for Halls' first score.

Senior fullback Tim Dewalt (6-0, 230) scored from the three before Dampier posted a 69-yard TD.

Senior Sam Parker scored from the 15, Jason Stenson from the 34, and Todd Pennington from the three.

Freshman Cedrick Taylor scored from the six and picked up 75 yards in five other carries.

Parker ran two points after. Mark Bentley booted one.

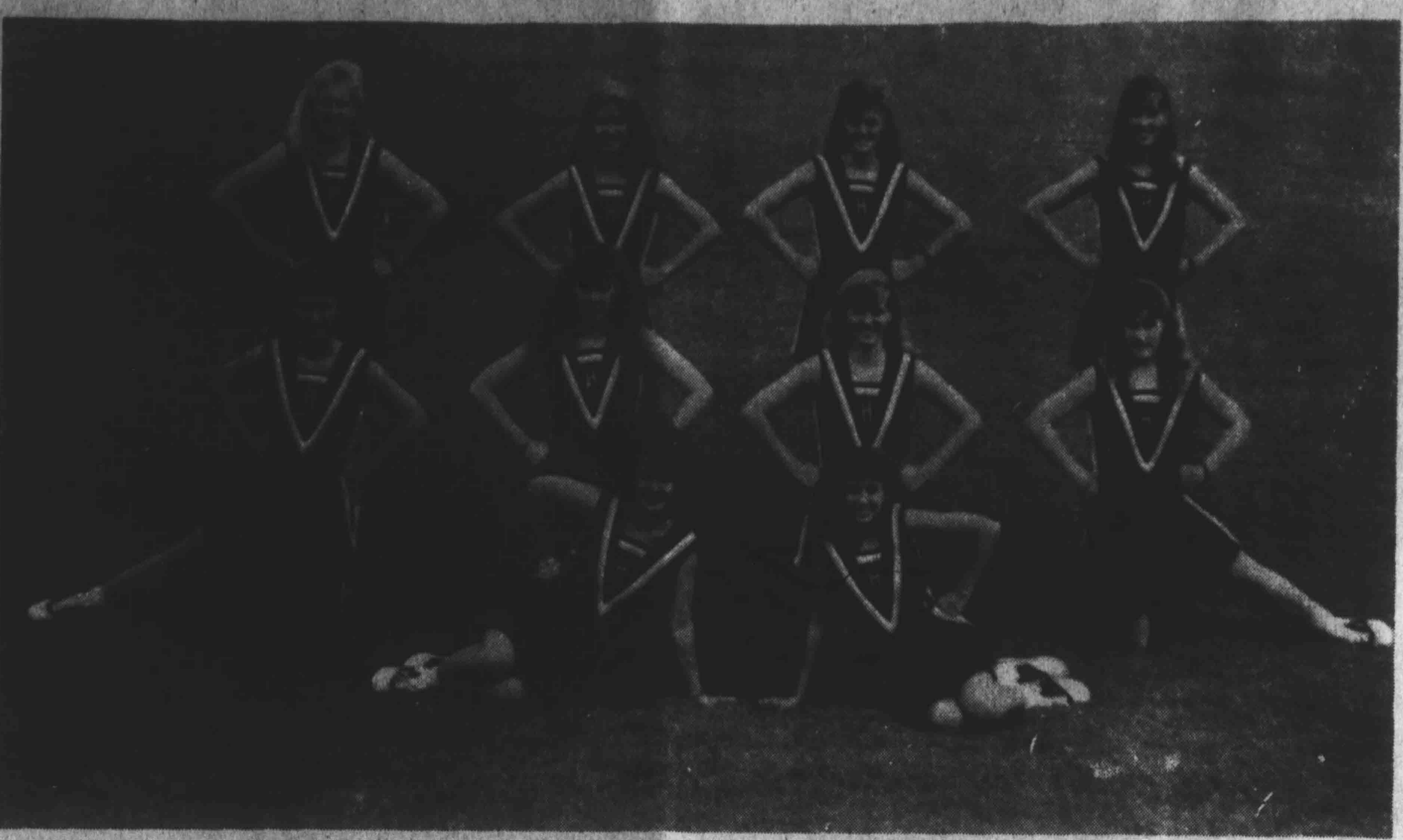
