Halls Man Only Survivor Of Auto's Crash, Hit-Run

Billy Burton, 37, of Halls, remained in Jackson-Madison County Hospital (Room 4117) Tuesday as the only survivor of four occupants of a car which crashed about 12:05 a.m. March 24th.

Highway Patrolman Greg Obie thinks the driver, Manley W. Swindle, 34, went to sleep. The car made no skid marks, Obie says, as it left the east-bound lane of State Hwy. 20 (U.S. 412), which runs from Fowlkes and Alamo to Jackson, and struck a bridge about two miles west of the Crockett-Madison County line.

The trooper says the car, coming to rest in the west-bound lane, was struck by a west-bound car which did not stop.

Swindle and his father, Manley N. Swindle, 72, were fatally injured. The other passenger, Ida Bell McDonald, 40, of Friendship, died March 26th in Jackson-Madison County Hospital.

Noel Sherrod Asks Board Seat Again

County Sophs Score Highly

Lauderdale County sophomores scored significantly above national averages in their first P-ACT Plus testing in October.

They scored 2.5 points higher in math, 2.2 points higher in English, 1.2 points higher in reading, .3 point higher in science reasoning, and 1.5 points higher in their composite scores.

More than 100,000 sophomores in 399 schools across the U.S. taking the test included 74 from Ripley High School and 50 from Halls High.

Simmons Asking Halls Board Seat

Thomas H. ("Tommy") Simmons has announced his candidacy for alderman in the Halls city election May 2nd.

"A lot of my friends have come to me and asked me to run for alderman in the May 2, 1991, election, as they felt a need for a down-town merchant on the board.

"I will be 60 years old my birthday and will start my 42nd year at the store on May 14, 1991. I think I know what is going on in Halls.

"In 1987, when I was elected to the board, I ran on my own. I was not backed by any one person or any special interest group. I am still that way in 1991.

"When I was on the board in 1987-88, I did not always vote as the other aldermen and mayor did, as I felt it was not in the best interest of the town.

"When the Ripley Power & Light co. contract came up, I did not want to vote to give them this contract, because they had never treated Halls right, throughout the years. I did not like their manager's air, and if Forked Deer Electric Co-op had gotten it, Halls would have gotten all the sales tax for the electric bills.

"There is one more matter I want to get clear. I was the one who brought up for the town buying the Caboose. I am proud of it and the park we have by the Depot. The railroads have very few cabooses to sell now, and they have gone up \$2,000 to \$3,000. The money that was spent for the Caboose was grant money to be spent for up-grading down-town, not to be spent on streets and sidewalks. All the aldermen any Mayor Hidgon voted with me in buying the Caboose.

Several Grand Lodge officers and Past Grand Masters will be in attendance.

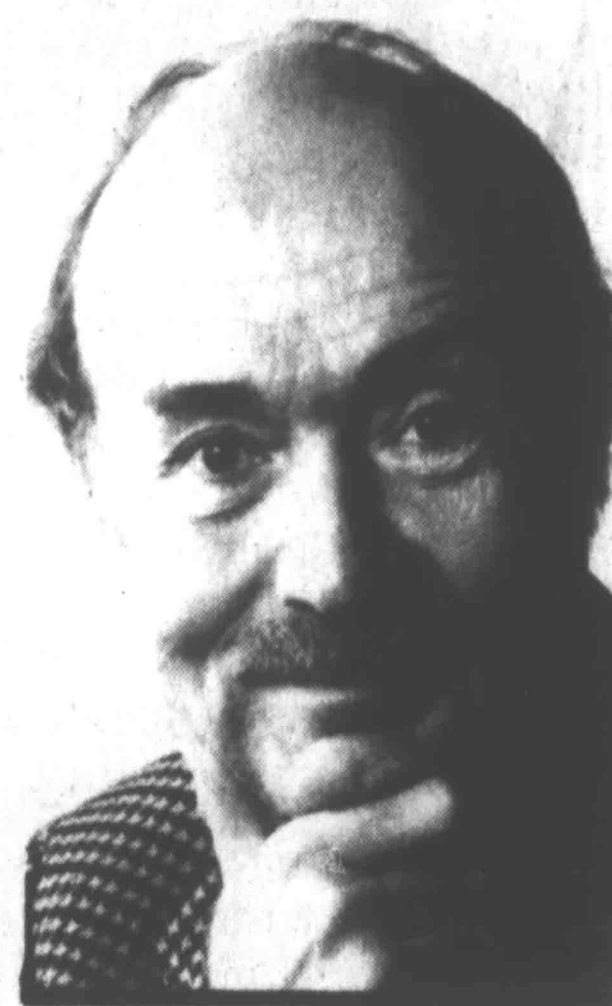

Drake has written four short story collections — *Amazing Grace*, 1965; *The Single Heart*, 1971; *The Burning Bush*, 1975; and *Survivors and Others*, 1987. He has also authored a memoir, *The Home Place: A Memory and a Celebration*, and a book of criticism, *Flannery O'Connor*.

Mercer University Press re-issued *Amazing Grace* last year in celebration of its 25th anniversary.

Before joining the UT faculty in 1965, Drake taught at the University of Michigan, Northwestern University, and the University of Texas in Austin.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the Modern Language Association, the South Atlantic Modern Language Association, the College English Association, and the Society for the Study of Southern Literature.

He received a bachelor's degree from Vanderbilt University and a doctorate from Yale University.

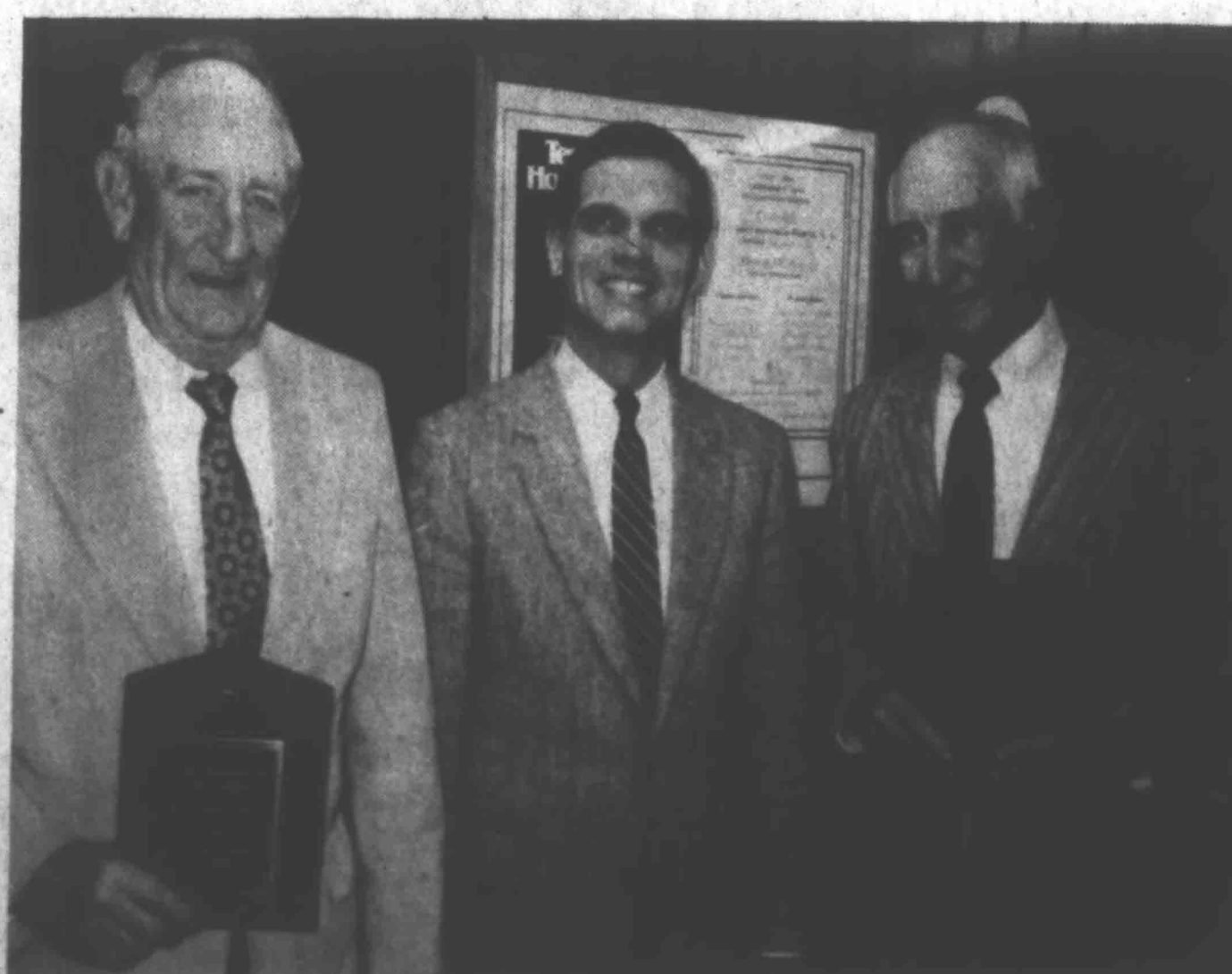
"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, play an important role by assisting in the processing of loan applications and reviews," says Harriet V. Smith, county supervisor.

CAN IMPORTS THREATEN NATIONAL SECURITY?

When the subject of electronics comes up, brand names most often mentioned are from the Far East. Japanese, and increasingly Korean, companies have become the suppliers of the televisions, VCRs, and stereo systems found in American homes. While that may have long term economic implications for our country, it has not been viewed as a threat to our national security — at least until now.

"Lessons learned" in Operation Desert Storm are flooding in, and one of them illuminates an unsettling American reliance on

foreign made spare parts for some of the systems that were so critical to our success in the Persian Gulf. Special battery packs for command and control computers used by forces in the field, for example, had to be acquired from companies in Paris and Tokyo.

Transistors for electronic transponders had to be acquired from a French company. To make matters worse in that particular case, the U.S. government was forced to use diplomatic channels to insure speedy delivery, an action necessary on at least 30 occasions during the war.

INDUSTRIAL BASE SHRINKING

This reliance on foreign firms to provide critical parts illustrates the serious problems that have arisen as more and more American companies simply get out of the defense business.

In recent testimony before the Armed Services Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Joint Chiefs

of Staff pointed out that there are only two manufacturers of aircraft engines remaining in the U.S. In other areas of defense manufacturing — airborne radar, aircraft landing gears and navigation systems, and high tech items like optic coatings — the number of domestic producers is two or less.

NEW COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENT

That is why I am looking forward to working with other members of the Armed Services Committee who have been named to a newly created Defense Industrial Base Panel. This panel is charged with the responsibility of looking closely at our ability to produce the materials we need to adequately equip and maintain our military forces.

While it does not have the status of a subcommittee, it does have the expertise to examine thoroughly a subject that is vital to a national defense that can deter, and if necessary defeat, any threat to our national security. I am hopeful that the work of this panel will contribute to a revitalization of American industrial capability.

PROTECTING SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

Every month more than forty million Americans, including hundreds of thousands of Tennesseans, depend on Social Security benefits to make ends meet. Social Security recipients include retirees, members of families in which the worker has died, and workers who have suffered illnesses or injuries that keep them from working for a year or longer.

In recent months, the Social Security Administration has faced serious problems in providing efficient, quality services. Several factors, including administrative budget shortfalls and increased applications generated by the recession, have contributed to this problem.

In an effort to address these problems and prevent an unnecessary disruption in claims processing and receipts, I joined with several of my colleagues in February to ask the Bush administration to release several million dollars in contingency funds to the SSA. These contingency funds were set aside for just such an occasion, to keep the SSA working for Americans who depend on it.

I am very pleased to say that in

mid-March, the Bush administration agreed to release \$100 million from the contingency fund. Our letter helped to remind the administration how much retirees and disabled individuals depend on the services that SSA provides. With these funds, the SSA should be able to stay right on track in distributing benefits.

I'd like to remind those of you who are Social Security recipients that the Social Security Administration has a toll-free telephone number, 1-800-234-5772. By calling this number you can, among other things, order publications, verify the amount of your benefits, or talk to a Social Security representative. This service is available weekdays from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and the best times to call are early in the morning or late in the afternoon, Wednesday through Friday.

Social Security provides important protection for Americans both while they work and after they retire, and it's critical that our citizens get the benefits that they've earned in a convenient, timely manner. I plan to continue to do my part to see that this goal is met.

5 cups rice flour
1 cup small red beans
1 tbs. cinnamon
3 cups boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
pine needles (optional)

1 tbs. grated orange peel
1 tbs. sesame seed oil
3 tsp. white wine oil for deep frying
Sift flour. Add sesame seed oil. Mix well. Add honey, wine and grated orange peel. Mix well. Use cookie cutters or roll dough into a cylinder and slice into 2" circles.

Heat oil in deep frying pan. Add cakes and turn frequently. Remove cakes when the dough is golden brown. Brush with honey or sprinkle with pow-

New birth control implant is said to be far more effective than other methods. Small, soft plastic tubes are implanted in a woman's arm, where they release a contraceptive hormone for five years. Fertility can be restored in days by removing the tubes.

Warfarin, a drug available since the early 1950s but rarely used today, may be able to reduce the risk of new heart attacks, stroke and death among people who had previously suffered coronaries. New research was reported in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

There's been an increase in the number of cases of rheumatic fever reported by pediatric cardiologists in the United States. Best treatment, they say, is prevention: prompt and effective therapy against strep infections.

Adhesive patches that release nicotine slowly through the skin seem to help smokers kick the habit with fewer side effects than nicotine chewing gum, say researchers at the Francis Scott Key Medical Center in Baltimore. FDA approval is expected soon.

GRILLED SPRING CHICKEN

Marinated in Herbs and Bordeaux Blanc

3 large chicken breasts, boneless and skinless

- Marinade:
- 1 Tablespoon fresh sage, chopped (1/2 Tbsp. if dried sage)
 - 1 teaspoon chili powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon curry powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 Tablespoon minced garlic
 - 1/2 cup minced onion
 - 1/2 cup olive oil
 - 3/4 cup dry white Bordeaux wine

- Mix the marinade ingredients in a medium size bowl. Trim the chicken breasts and halve them to make 6 portions. Marinate the chicken for 1-2 hours.
- Pre-heat grill to medium high.
- Place the chicken on the grill and cook for 5 minutes. Develop grill markings by rotating the breasts 90°, leaving them to cook on the same side. Spoon marinade over breasts while cooking. Cook an additional 3-5 minutes.

4. Turn breasts over and cook until done, about 5-8 minutes more.

Note: The chicken breasts can also be cooked in a broiler or in a cast-iron skillet on top of the stove. Remember to preheat so the chicken will develop color. 5. Serve with fresh asparagus or snow peas, baby carrots and new potatoes. Serves 6.

Oriental Vegetables

- 2 tablespoons peanut oil
- 1 cup diagonally sliced carrots

- 3/4 cup chicken broth
- 2 teaspoon grated fresh ginger
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce

- 1/2 cup roasted peanuts, chopped

Coat a wok or large nonstick skillet with peanut oil; place over medium-high heat until hot. Add vegetables and stir-try 3 to 4 minutes or until shiny. Combine chicken broth, ginger, garlic, soy sauce and cornstarch in small bowl, stirring well. Add mandarin oranges and peanuts to vegetables. Pour broth mixture over vegetables, stirring constantly, and cook until mixture is thickened and thoroughly heated. Yield: 6 servings

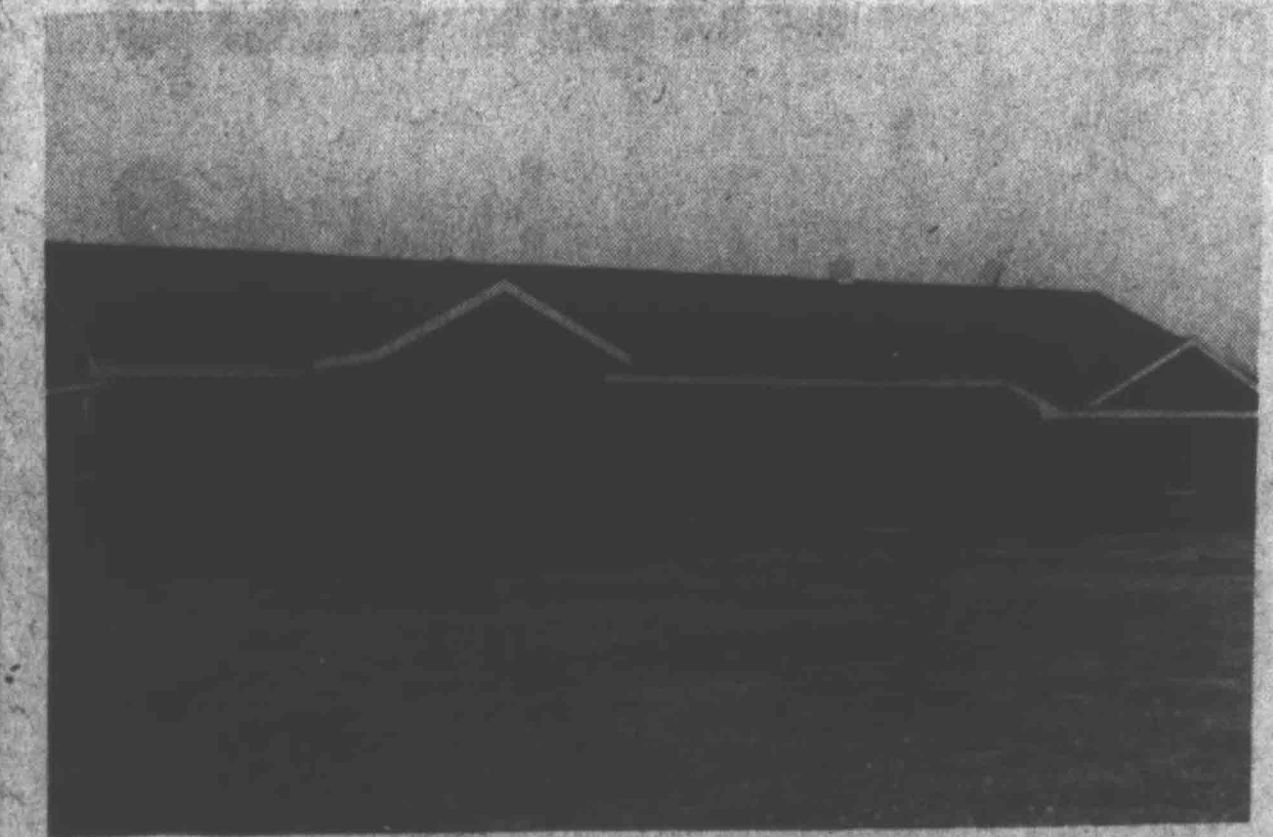

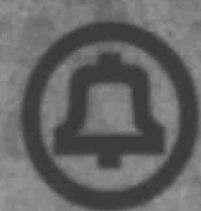

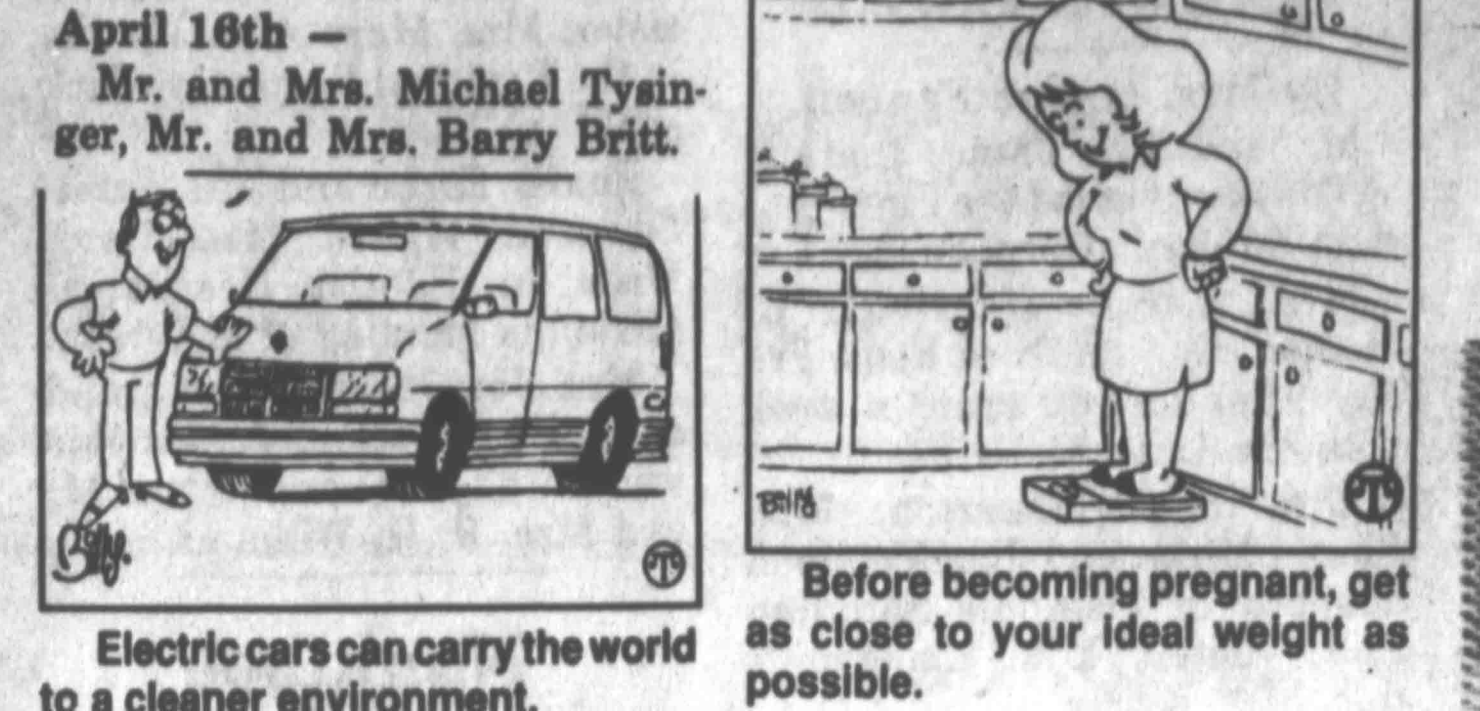

Here's a tax break often overlooked by home owners. When you install improvements to your home for medical reasons Uncle Sam says you may write off all or a portion of the cost. The amount you deduct depends on how much your improvements increase the value of your home. Improvements are deductible only to the extent their cost exceeds the increase in home value. If the value of your home is not increased by the improvement, the entire cost is considered a medical expense and is deductible. Let's look at an example. Suppose you have allergies and your doctor tells you to install air-conditioning in your home. You pay to have central air installed at a cost of \$2,800. After the installation a real estate appraiser tells you that your property has increased in market value by \$1,000. You may deduct \$1,800 as a medical deduction as follows:
 Cost of central air-conditioning, \$2,800
 Less: increase in value of home after installing air-conditioner, 1,000
 Portion deductible of medical purpose, \$1,800

Of course, if you get audited the IRS will almost always request to see your doctor's recommendation to acquire the improvement. Make sure you get a letter from your doctor before the improvements start.

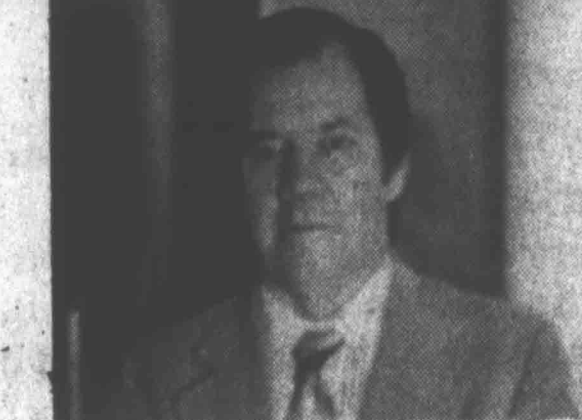

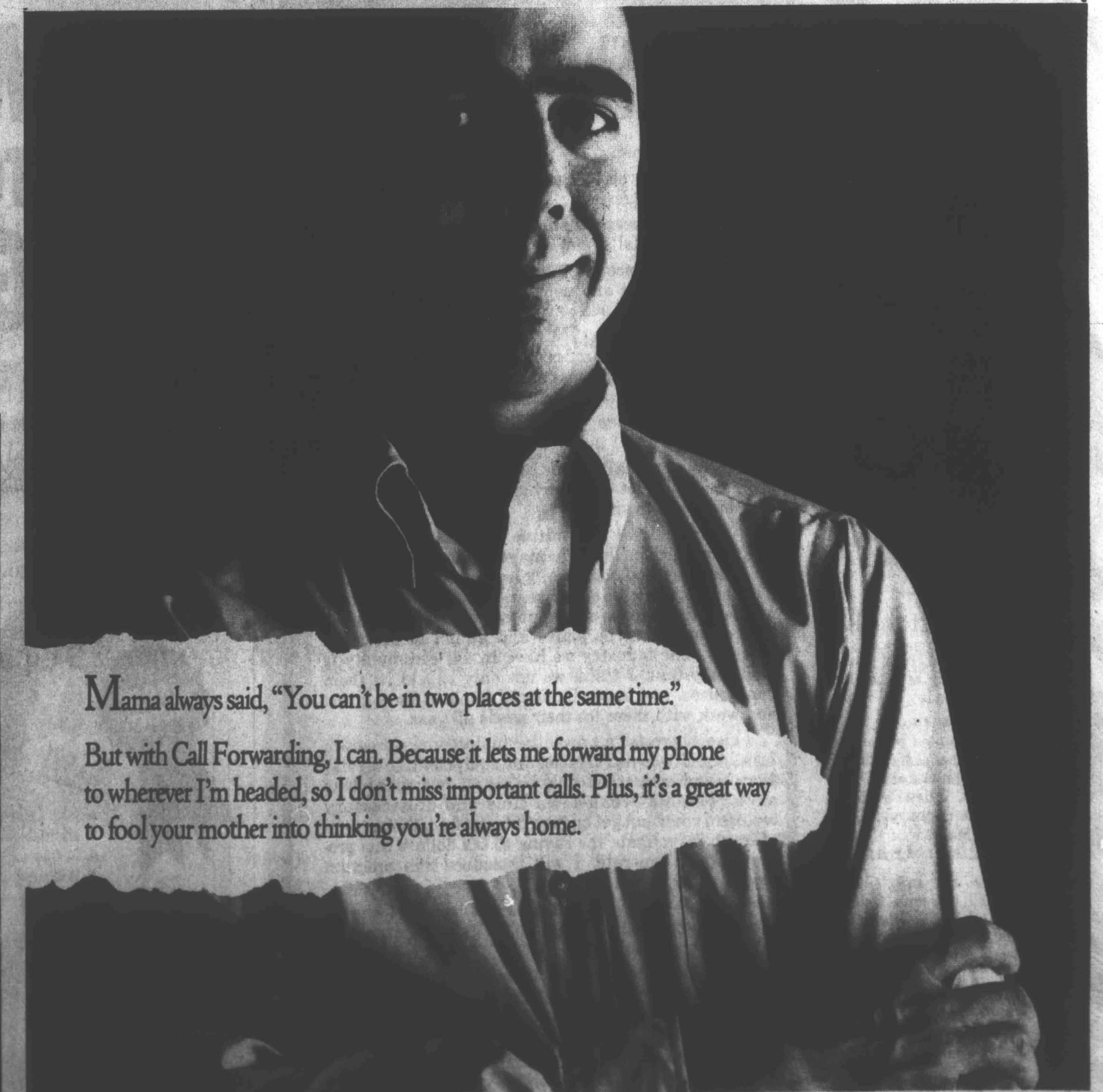

\$247,500 Grant Aids Todd Firm

Gov. Ned McWherter has announced approval of a \$247,500 grant under the Tennessee Industrial Infrastructure Program to assist in infrastructure improvements for Todd Uniform Inc. at Henning.

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1987 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county.

All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$4.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rabies control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

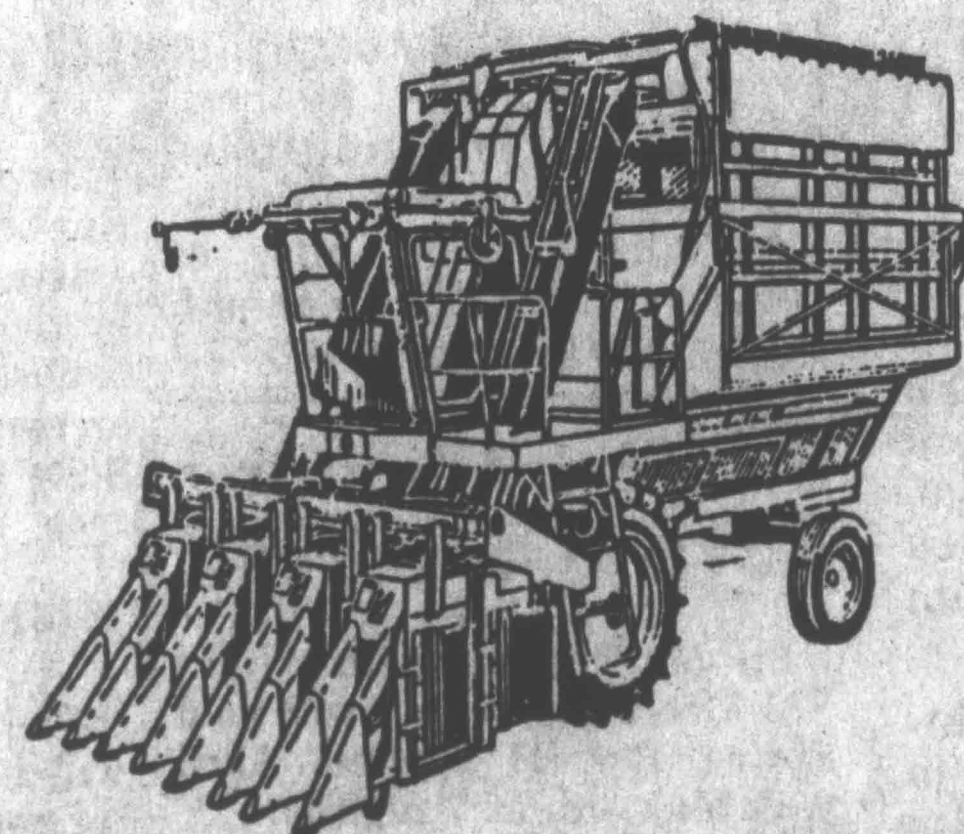

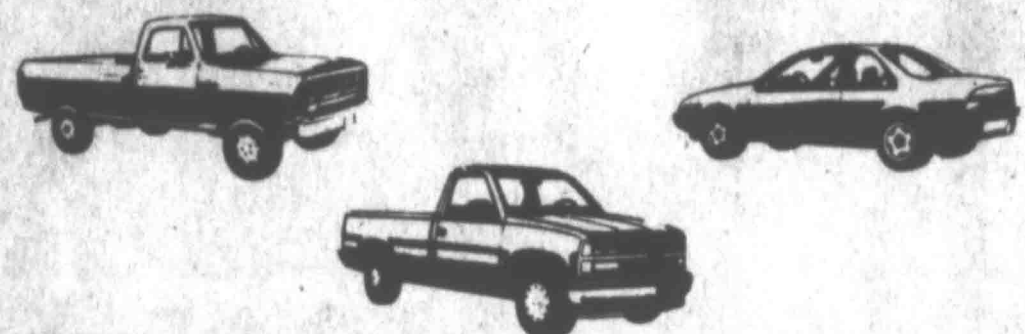

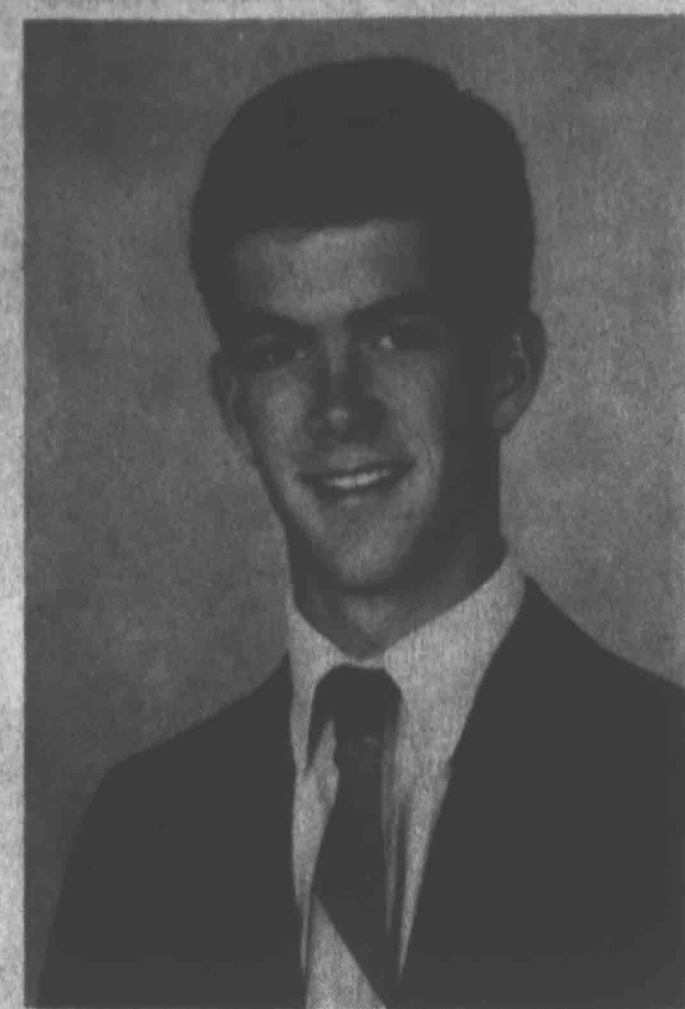

She was the widow of John Gaines.

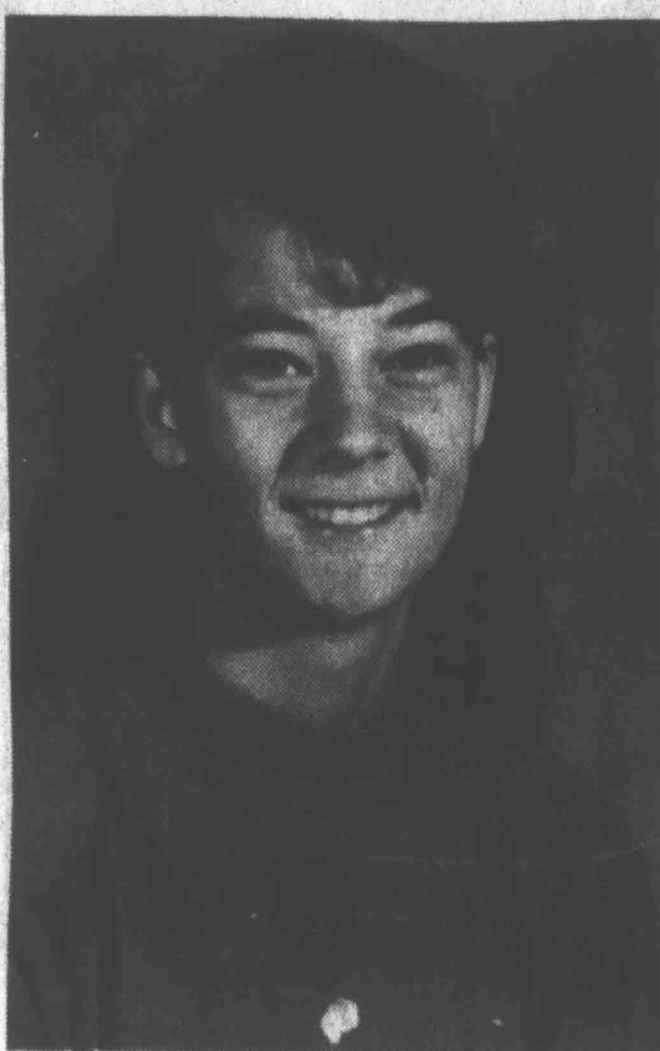

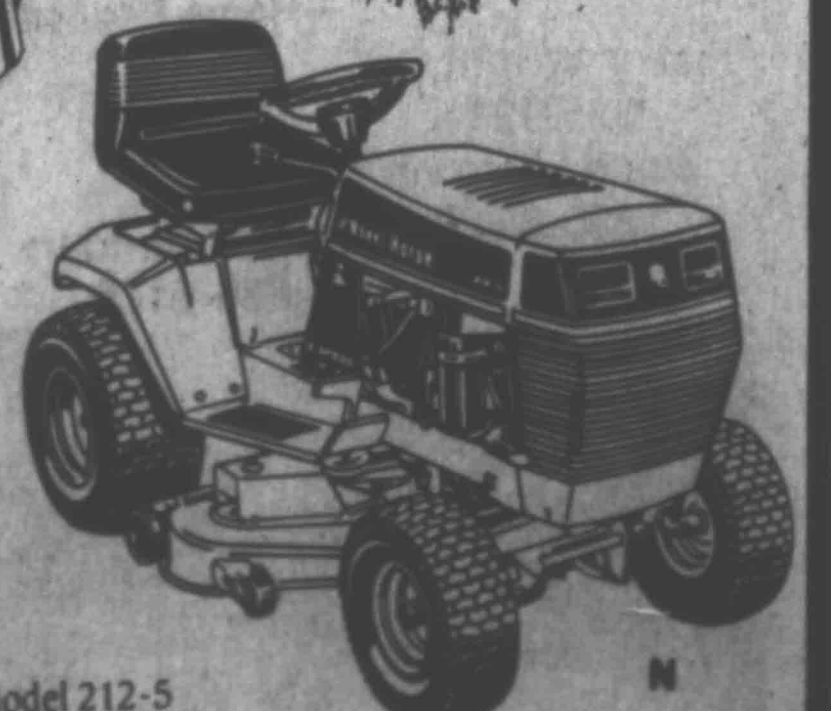
