

Halls Man Only Survivor Of Auto's Crash, Hit-Run

Billy Burton, 37, of Halls, remained in Jackson-Madison County Hospital (Room 4117) Tuesday as the only survivor of four occupants of a car which crashed about 12:05 a.m. March 24th.


Highway Patrolman Greg Obie thinks the driver, Manley W. Swindle, 34, went to sleep. The car made no skid marks, Obie says, as it left the east-bound lane of State Hwy. 20 (U.S. 412), which runs from Fowlkes and Alamo to Jackson, and struck a bridge about two miles west of the Crockett-Madison County line.

The trooper says the car, com-ing to rest in the west-bound lane, was struck by a west-bound car which did not stop.

Swindle and his father, Manley N. Swindle, 72, were fatally

Simmons Asking Halls Board Seat

Thomas H. ("Tommy") Simmons has announced his candidacy for alderman in the Halls city election May 2nd:

"A lot of my friends have come to me and asked me to run for alderman in the May 2, 1991, election, as they felt a need for a down-town merchant on the board.

"I will be 60 years old my birthday and will start my 42nd year at the store on May 14, 1991. I think I know what is going on in Halls.

I did not like their manager's air, and if Forked Deer Electric Co-op had gotten it, Halls would have gotten all the sales tax for the electric bills.

Here's a tax break often overlooked by home owners. When you install improvements to your home for medical reasons Uncle Sam says you may write off all or a portion of the cost. The amount you deduct depends on how much your improvements increase the value of your home. Improve ments are deductible only to the extent their cost exceeds the increase in home value. If the value of your home is not increased by the improvement, the entire cost is considered a medical expense and is deductible. Let's look at an example. Suppose you have allergies and your doctor tells you to install air-conditioning in your home. You pay to have central air installed at a cost of \$2,800. After the installation a real estate appraiser tells you that your property has increased in market value by \$1,000. You may deduct \$1,800 as a medical deduction as follows:


Cost of central air-conditioning, \$2,800 Less: increase in value of home after installing air-

Portion deductible of medical purpose, \$1,800

Of course, if you get audited the IRS will almost always request to see your doctor's recommendation to acquire the improvement. Make sure you get a letter from your doctor before the improvements start.







Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the "Tennessee Anti-Rables Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county. All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian

All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored This law also requires that a certificate of rables vaccination in date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rables vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed. In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$4.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rables control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. The rables control officer will be on duty full-time thereafter, picking up dogs without tags.

Lauderdale County Schools would receive a revenue ount of \$534,353 This would be the first time ecent history for the state to cut revenue to local school systems.
