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Doctorate For Dr. Alice Scott

Dr. Alice Malone Scott, daughter of Susan Partee Scott, of Ripley, and the late Dr. J. S. Scott, has received a doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Maryland in Baltimore.

She conducted her doctoral research in conjunction with a genetic linkage study of manic-depressive illness at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. Her subject included examining the association between social function and manic-depressive illness in family systems with genetic vulnerability to develop some form of manic-depressive illness.

Dr. Scott's interest in the area of depression and manic depressive illness began 16 years ago when she co-ordinated a teaching-research clinical program for individuals with the illness at the University of Tennessee, where she was on the faculty in psychiatry.

She resides in Baltimore, where she and her husband are in the private practice of individual and marital psychotherapy. Dr. Scott specializes in providing counseling in conjunction with biological interventions for both psychiatric and medical illnesses.

County Water System Is Hiking Its Charges

The county Water Board has voted to increase its rates, board member Anthony Fisher reports.

"The subject has been discussed over the last three years, but never any action taken," he notes.

"It has been over five years (1985) since the system had its last rate increase. The cost of gasoline, pipe, trucks, valves, machinery, electricity, phone bills, chemicals, engineering fees, and all other materials that we use have greatly increased in price. The water system's finances are now extremely limited. I

"Yearly, the state auditors complain that we must increase our retained earnings (net profits accrued over the years).

"Lauderdale County water customers are aware that our lines are over-extended in length. We serve more customers than the lines can adequately accommodate. We operate at times very close to maximum pumping and filtering capacity.

"Our customers have mandated that we improve our lines and service to give them adequate water and pressure twenty-four hours a day. We know this by the constant phone calls telling us they don't have water to: flush the toilet, run clothes or dish washers, shower, bathe, wash cars, water lawns, flowers, or gardens, fill pre-merge and post-merge tanks, etc.

"We have taken measures to alleviate some of these problems. We have put an in-line pump at our plant to increase pressure and amount of water leaving our tanks. We have put another in-line pump in our line on Highway 19 West at the foot of the hill below Arp.

"Topography is also an enemy of ours. There is very poor pressure at the top of the bluff on Highway 19 West. Several hundred yards further we have had to put a regulator valve in the line for at Ashport, Open Lake, and below, the pressure is so great it is blowing their lines out.

"We hope, through our rate increase, to generate enough capital to renovate our existing lines over a period of a relatively few years, but not to extend lines until our present customers are

This arrangement allows employees to make sure that they have the insurance coverage necessary to meet their individual needs at the lowest possible cost.

For \$100,000 worth of group term insurance, an employee's yearly cost could typically range from \$145 to \$240 a year, depending on age. And with many employers paying a portion of the premium, "group term insurance is the kind of security you can't afford not to have," Kenness said.

For further information on group life insurance, Kenness suggested that employees check with benefit managers where they work.





New birth control pill is being studied in the Netherlands. Because it contains no estrogen, it is said to have fewer side effects.

Gallbladder removal by laparoscopy — operating with microtools and a scope through small holes in the abdomen — speeds recovery because muscle tissue is not cut. Patients can be back to work in a week.

Children of parents with allergies are more likely to develop asthma, according to a study reported in the *New England Journal of Medicine*. Research noted a correlation between the dust-mite allergen in the home in infancy and childhood and the risk of asthma.

Toxic chemicals may be dangerous to would-be fathers as well as to pregnant women, the *Western Journal of Medicine* reports. Harmful substances can reduce fertility and may damage sperm, too.


Drug Free Alliance Meeting Is Held

Pointers For Parents

Don't Be Caught Napping When It Comes To Baby Safety!

New parents can sometimes feel overwhelmed by the responsibilities of raising a baby. However, proper preparation, and some common sense rules will help them avoid accidents and enjoy their little ones.

September is Baby Safety Awareness Month. For safety all year, the Juvenile Products Manufacturers Association (JPMA) recommends that parents look for the safety-approved certified mark when selecting high chairs, play yards, carriages, strollers, walkers, gates, expandable enclosures, full-size cribs and portable hook-on chairs. This mark on the product or packaging tells you that it was built and designed with child safety in mind.

JPMA also offers the following safety reminders:
• Many older products, which may be found at garage sales or in second-hand stores, were made before current safety standards were in effect. Be careful and think twice before purchasing older items or using family heirlooms. Although many of these products may look safe, they may not meet today's safety standards.
• Never use a crib with corner posts higher than 1/16" above the end panel. Babies can strangle if their clothes become caught on these corner posts. If possible, unscrew or saw the end panel very smooth. Cribs that can't be repaired should be replaced.

• All child safety seats are not the same—be sure the one you purchase fits correctly in your car and is easy for you to use.

• Babies should never be allowed to lie face down or sleep unsupervised on cushions, pillows, plush rugs, etc.

In addition, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission offers the following tips:

• Mesh playpens and portable cribs should never be used with a side left down. They can pose a serious hazard to newborns and infants because the mesh forms a loose pocket into which an infant can roll and suffocate.

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Prepared whipped topping, optional

Each school and office of Superintendent (Central Office) has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of the adult household member and the adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number. Applications selected for verification must provide social security numbers of all adult members in the family (or members may indicate that they have no Social Security numbers).

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy the principals in each school will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.
