Old 51 North Of Ripley Engineered As 3-Lane

A plan to widen, to three lanes, State Hwy. 209 (Old U.S. Highway 51) north of central Ripley has moved into the engineering phase in the state Department of Transportation, State Rep. Floyd Crain reports.

The plan involves 2.1 miles from just south of Northcrest Community Center in Ripley to just north of Industrial Road, serving Birmingham Bolt and the former Maremont plant.

An advance planning report has been completed on a bypass between State Hwy. 19 east of Ripley and U.S. 51 North, Crain says.

State highway projects reported completed include removal of bridges which collapsed across the Hatchie River, on U.S. 51 between Ripley and Covington, and across the Obion River, on State 181 (part of the Great River Road) west of Halls. Contracts totaled \$906,587.

The new north-bound bridge over the Hatchie, to cost \$3,612,176, is scheduled for completion in November.

Other bridge projects are scheduled for completion as follows:

- Hurricane Hill Rd., east of Old 51 between Ripley and Henning, bridge replacement over railroad tracks; this month (\$561,438).
- Butner Rd., bridge replacement over a branch east of Ripley; March (\$113,789).
- State Hwy. 88, repairs to bridge over the South Fork of the Forked Deer River at the Crockett County line; May (\$496,655).
- Lawrence Rd., bridge replacement over Sumrow Creek

- Luckett Rd., over a branch west of Ripley, \$163,086 contract to Ford Construction Co., of Dyersburg, Sept. 14th.
- Espey Park Rd., over the South Fork of the Forked Deer River, southeast of Halls, \$2,439,497 contract to Ford Oct. 26th.

Widening and paving of 3.76 miles of State Hwy. 88 in Halls to north of the Dyer County line, by Ford, is scheduled for completion in May (\$835,493).

Re-surfacing of 7.95 miles of State Hwy. 19 west of Ripley from Gold Dust to Sunk Lake/Mounds Rd. has been completed (\$571,686), as has 4.9 miles from Walnut Grove Road to U.S. 51 (\$318,489).

Widow Among Trio Charged In Murder

Monday's meeting of the county Grand Jury held for Circuit Court trial, on charges of first degree murder and conspiracy to commit first degree murder, Sarah Richardson, widow of the victim, Howard Max Richardson, of Mary's Chapel; her brother, Calvin Lane; and William Eldon Fincher, Jr., of Ripley.

Fincher, known as "One-Eyed Bill," was charged with the murder a few hours after Max, 49, was found dead just after midnight Jan. 19, 1990, with a single wound to the forehead, next to the door to the garage of his home.

Sheriff Jerry Crain says Sarah was arrested Monday evening by Tenn. Bureau of Investigation agents in Nashville, while visiting her sister, Peggy, and that Lane was taken into custody Monday evening in Jenny's Cafe, 103 S. Main, Ripley.

Max, with his brother, Randall, operated Richardson Bros Construction Co., based at Curve.

The victim's wife, Sarah, gave authorities this account: The couple used Mr. Richardson's pick-up to visit relatives, leaving Mrs. Richardson's van in the garage. Returning home, they opened the garage door electronically, and Mrs. Richardson entered the garage while Mr. Richardson parked the truck in a shed.

Mrs. Richardson found the door to the garage into the house locked, when normally left unlocked. Mr. Richardson told her to wait in the garage while he crawled into the house through a wood-box next to the fire-place.

She heard the door being unlocked, then a shot. She ran to the shed and hid until, seeing no one leave the home, she drove in the van, more than a mile, to the home of her son-in-law, Ripley police investigator Steve Sanders on Sky-Line Drive.

Sanders found Richardson near the door to the garage with a single wound in the forehead. He died in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale in Ripley.

Tracks from the home were followed to Sky-Line Sub-Division in Ripley but lost there, on pavement.

In the Richardson bedroom, several drawers had been pulled from a dresser and contents dropped on the floor.

Nothing was noted missing except Richardson's wallet, a .22 caliber pistol and ammunition Mrs. Richardson kept in a nightstand, and a Pringles potato chip can filled with old silver coins.

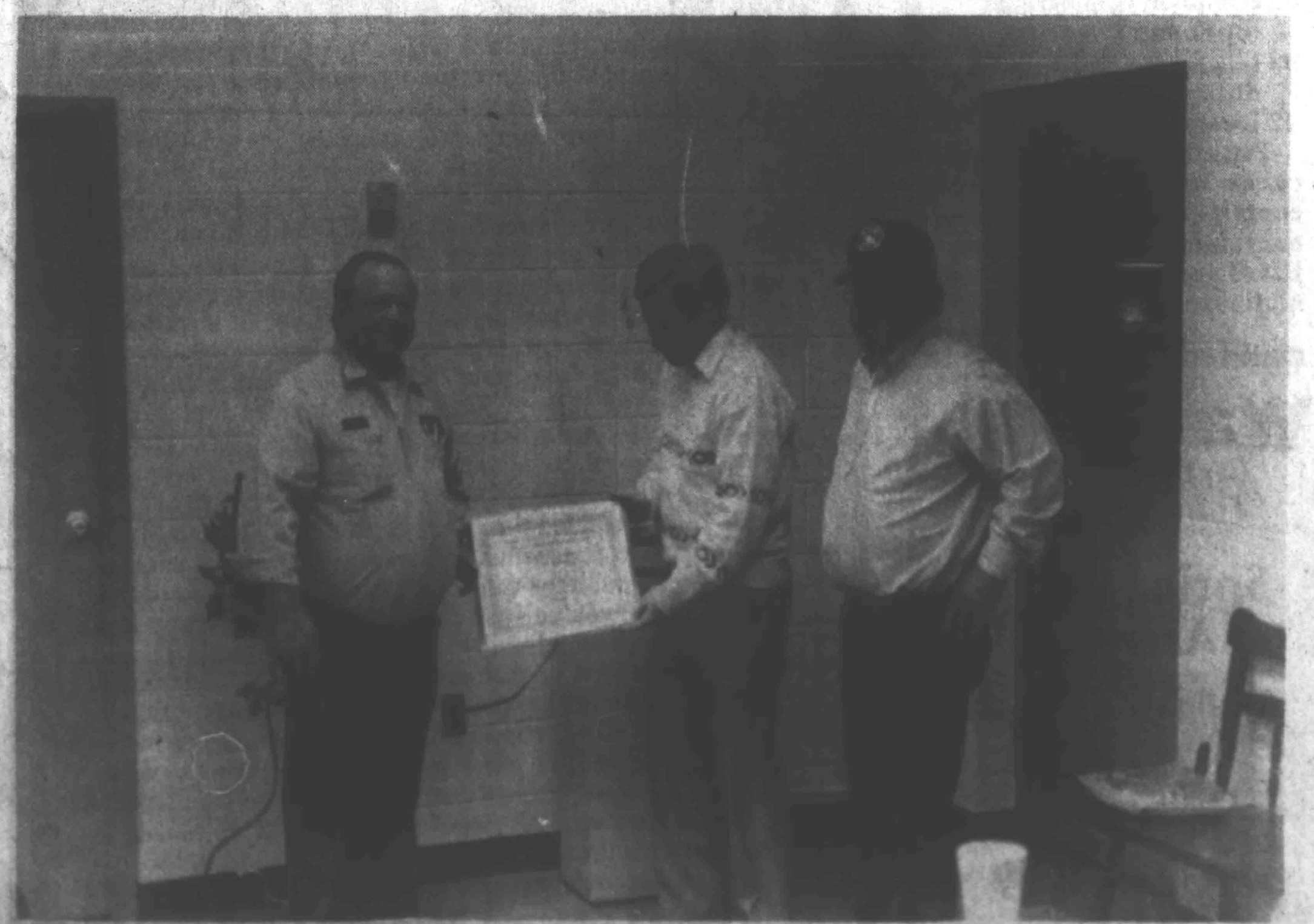

When was the last time you dropped off unused clothing at Goodwill and didn't bother to take the tax deduction? Or cleaned out the garage and didn't want to take the time to have a garage sale so you threw those secondhand items in the trash?

Donate those items, and when you do make sure you deduct the fair market value on your tax return. The tax savings can add up. For example, if you donated items with a fair market value of \$500 and took the deduction for both federal and state taxes, your tax savings could be as high as \$150 or more.

Let's look at some of the rules you must comply with to get the deduction. First, the donation must be made to a qualified charitable organization. A qualified organization simply means that it has applied and been accepted by the IRS as a nonprofit charitable, religious, or educational organization. Secondly, there is a limit based on your adjusted gross income. While these rules can become somewhat complicated, here is a basic rule of thumb. If your donations for the year are 20% or less of your adjusted gross income you're entitled to take the full fair market value of your gifts as an itemized deduction. However, if your donations exceed 20% of your adjusted gross income you should probably get help from your tax professional. Donations between 20% and 50% of your adjusted gross income are deductible based on what you donated and who it was donated to. Donations over 50% must be carried over and deducted in the following year.

Once you've decided that your donation is deductible you must then value the items. Of course, if you give cash or stock which is publicly traded, valuing the donation is no problem. But if you've just cleaned out your garage and you're donating secondhand household items you will need to assign a value to each item. Uncle Sam says you must value these items at fair market value, "the price at which the property would change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller." In other words, you will need to value these items at what you could sell them for if you did have a garage sale. You can also use a professional appraiser to value your items. In fact, if your donated items exceed \$5,000 you are required to get an appraisal by a qualified independent appraiser by a qualified independent appraiser on IRS Form 8283.

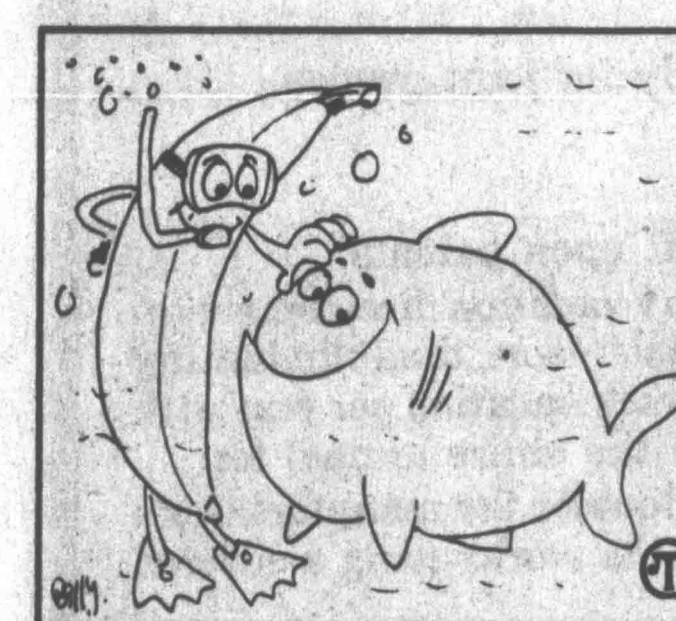

Sauteed Sole Tobago With Bananas, Pecans and Lime

Bananas, America's favorite fruit can be used in many deliciously daring main dishes. Here's one reminiscent of early days in the faraway islands that teams bananas with fish.



Sauteed Sole Tobago With Bananas, Pecans and Lime

- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 8 fillets of sole or flounder
- Flour for dredging
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 cups diagonally sliced bananas (1/2 inch slices)
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1/2 cup fresh lime juice
- 1 cup dry white wine or light stock
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh herb (mint, parsley, coriander, basil or tarragon)

Preheat oil in heavy sauté pan over medium-high heat. Dredge fish fillets lightly in flour. Sauté until golden brown, about 3 minutes each side. Remove to warm platter. Pour off excess oil and wipe down sauté pan. Place pan back on stove over high heat; add butter. When foamy and just starting to brown, add bananas and pecans. Toss and cook for 1 minute. Add lime juice and wine. Cook for another 2 minutes. Add fresh herbs. Pour sauce and bananas over fish. Garnish with additional banana slices and lime wedges.

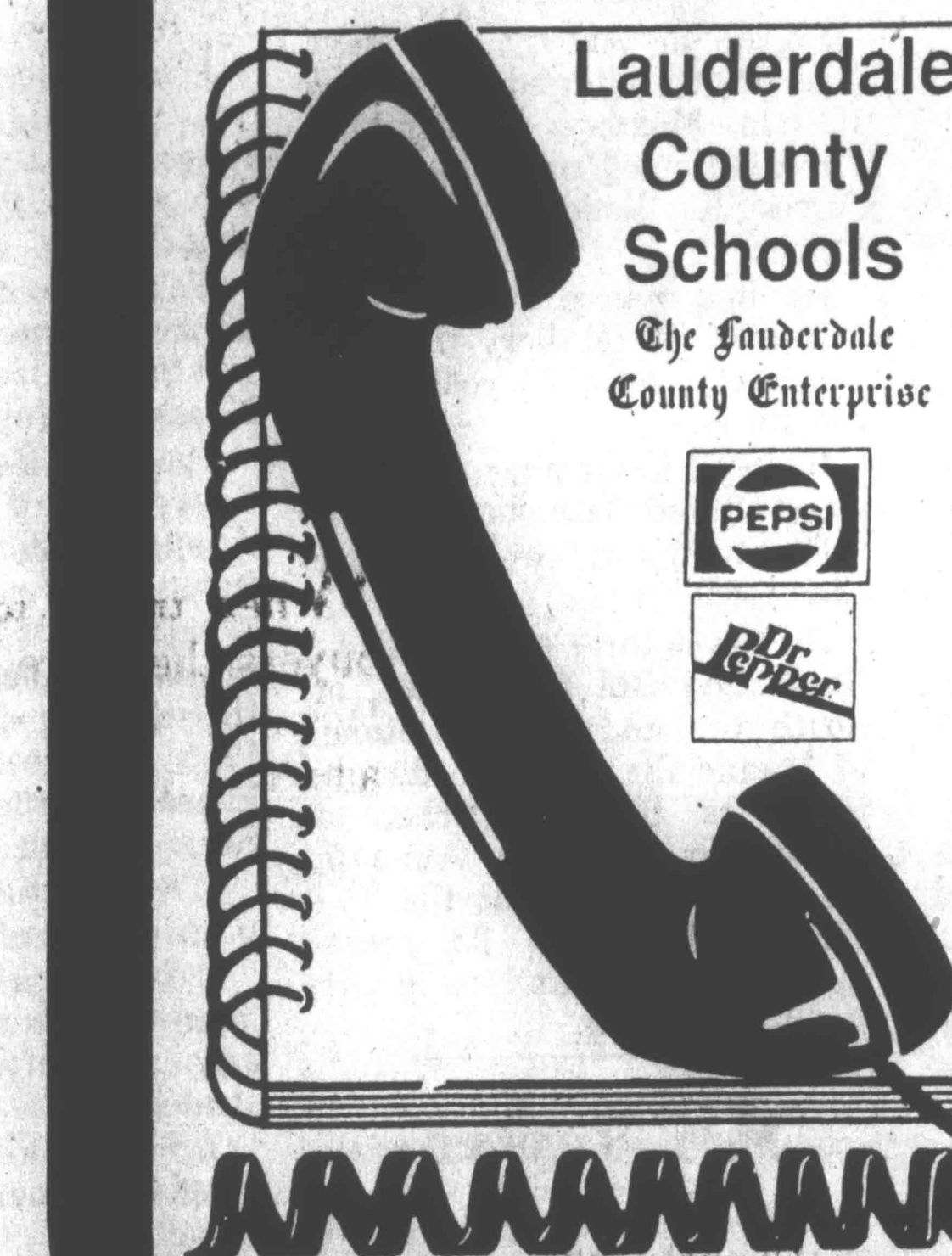

Joe Hardy, driver, is pictured above with the newest lift van (internal lift) operating in the county. This van is equipped to carry two wheelchair patients along with seven additional passengers. Within the past year two new lift vans have been purchased to serve the county. The other lift van (external lift) serves dialysis patients who go to The Dyersburg Dialysis Clinic three days per week. This same van also transports seniors to the Halls Senior Center daily for meals. Lucille Moore, driver, says she enjoys the people with whom she has contact driving this van. Our third van in the county is a fifteen passenger van driven by Bertha Duval.

Out of town services to Dyersburg, Covington, Jackson, and Memphis have also been provided. Transportation is available for anyone regardless of age, sex, race, religion or income. The fare structure for non-medicaid clients is as follows: \$5.00 one way (\$1.00 round trip) and \$.05 per interim stop within Lauderdale County. Out of county fares are \$1.50 one way (\$3.00 round trip) with \$.05 per interim stop. Medicaid clients should contact the Department of Human Services at 635-4141 for approval before riding the van.

In working closely with the Department of Human Services Medicaid recipients have been able to keep much needed appointments for medical attention within as well as outside of their residence.

The Public Health Director for Lauderdale and Tipton Counties, Joe Linder, has generously provided office space in both counties. Mr. Linder has worked with MIFA to see that services for both counties is not interrupted.

The drivers for Lauderdale County are always ready and willing to provide transportation and help with other matters. However the overwhelming response to this new service has created a necessity of calling at least five to seven days before appointments to be assured of having a reserved seat on the van. The office hours in Ripley have been extended to include Monday, Tuesday, and Friday, from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. The phone number is 635-9066. The Covington office is open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. and the number there is 475-1269.

Crain Not Sold On State Income Tax

Despite Gov. Ned McWherter's estimate that two out of three Lauderdale County households would pay less in state taxes under his plan for a state income tax, State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, just re-elected to a third term as Majority Floor Leader for McWherter's Democrats, says McWherter's plan currently has only "10 to 15 votes" of 99 in the House.

For Haywood County, which Crain also represents, McWherter says 68.57% of households would save under the first year of his proposal.

Crain calls McWherter's proposal "a brave and bold step for the Governor, and I commend him for his beliefs and his dedication to help education...."

"As time goes on, support for the new tax structure may gain momentum.

"I, personally, will be taking a long look at the proposed education program to see if it will, indeed, lead to better education.

"I would also like to have some input into changing parts of the program.

"I, along with several other legislators, will be conducting a survey to find out exactly how my constituents feel about this matter.

"At the present time, I feel 90% of my district is against any type of new taxes.

"Due to the recession and the crises in the Persian Gulf, most feel we are paying as much in taxes as we can."

Crain will be conducting his survey within the next few weeks and asks that everyone participate so he will have an accurate idea of how his 82nd District feels on key issues in this legislative session.

McWherter's plan was carefully crafted to promise initial (though probably temporary) tax reduction to households in 27 of 33 state Senate Districts and 75 of 99 state House districts, and to 59% of all households state-wide.

Highlights of the governor's funding proposal include:

- A 4% income tax with an exemption for each family based on family income and the number of people in the family. A family of four earning \$28,000 would pay no tax.
- Repeal of the sales tax on food and basic home utilities.
- Reduction of the state's 5.5% sales tax to a maximum of 4%. Local sales taxes would be capped to 2% down from their present top of 2.75%, but all local governments would be held harmless by the state from any revenue loss.
- Repeal of the 6% Hall Income tax on dividends and interest.
- A 20% reduction in the corporate franchise tax.

Another 48% of the revenues, about \$291,000,000, would be paid by Tennesseans who could then deduct the full amount of their payment from their federal income tax, McWherter says; state income taxes are fully deductible, but Tennessee's current sales tax is not.

"What this means is that most of the new money for our schools would come from funds we're now sending either to other states or to Washington. By keeping our money at home, we can get \$1 in new education for every 42 cents in new taxes paid by Tennesseans," McWherter says.

While these individuals use Tennessee services while commuting and at their work places, they are not required to pay any Tennessee taxes.

A prime reason most Tennesseans would pay less taxes is that nearly 10% of the new tax burden — about \$58,000,000 — would be paid by out-of-state residents who work in Tennessee.

McWherter says this is needed to keep Tennessee competitive in attracting new industry.

Crain says he is not sold on the plan. "I don't think the plan is as good as the Governor says it is," he says.

TBI Agent Shot Before Vehicle Struck Bridge

Bureau of Investigation agent in Dyer and Lake Counties, who joined the TBI in 1975 to work in Lauderdale and Tipton Counties, shot himself in the heart with a shot-gun seconds before his car slammed into a concrete bridge abutment on Bynum Rd., about five miles south of Dresden, at 4:45 p.m. Thursday of last week, *The Weakley County Press* reports.

His vehicle was being pursued by others, alerted by a message he had left.

He had been on sick leave for a week, suffering from depression, TBI supervisors said.

He was a Martin police officer before he joined the TBI.

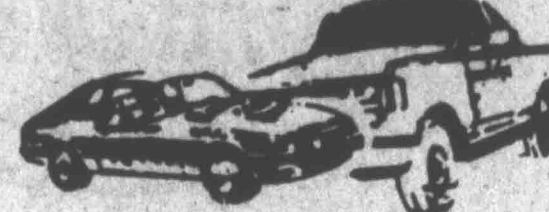

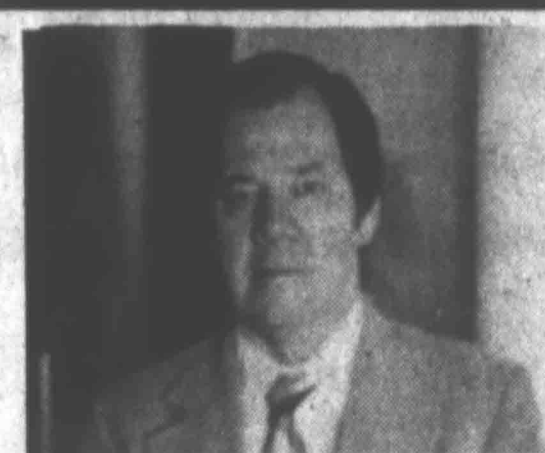

High-resolution ultrasound can detect ovarian cancer early, say doctors at King's College School of Medicine and Dentistry in London. Vaginal probe is being used on high-risk patients, those with a family history of the disease.

NEW METHOD TO CALCULATE AUTO DEDUCTIONS

If you use your personal vehicle for business and take the standard mileage rate, you'll be glad to hear of some new changes for 1990. To start with, the IRS has increased the rate from 25 1/2 cents to 26 cents per mile starting January 1, 1990. But that's not the only change. The two tiered system has been dropped and replaced with a simpler, single rate, system.

Remember under the old rules you could only deduct 25 1/2 cents (1989 rate) for the first 15,000 miles per year or 60,000 total miles. Thereafter only 11 cents per mile was allowed. Under the new single rate system, 26 cents per mile is applied to all business miles driven during the year. The depreciation portion of this rate is 11 cents per mile for 1990.

Not only is the new method easier to compute but it will provide additional annual tax savings to high mileage drivers.

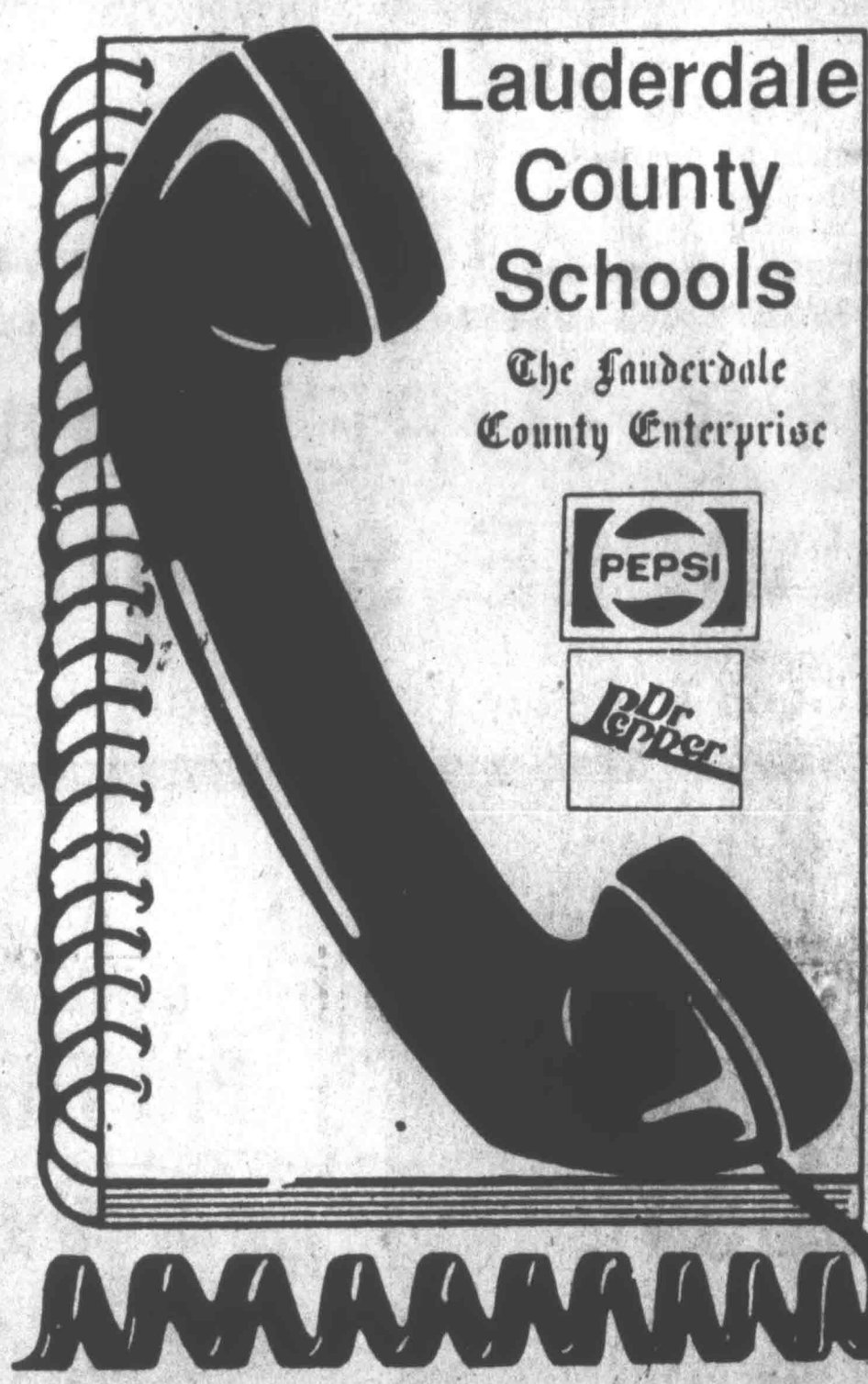

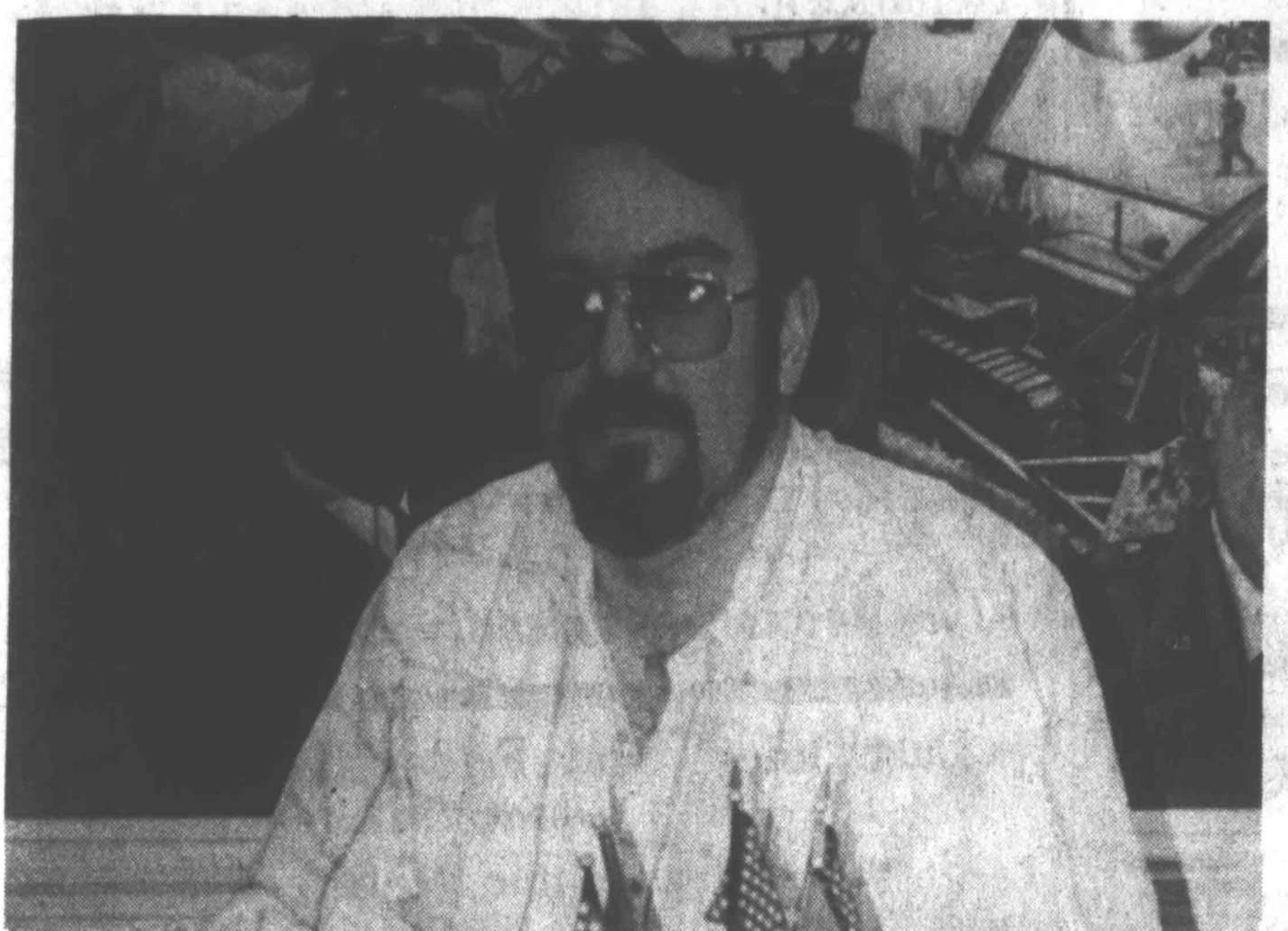

GULF CRISIS RENEWS INTEREST IN ENERGY ALTERNATIVES

A by-product of the conflict in the Persian Gulf has been renewed interest in a sound, viable national energy policy. Despite the serious impacts of the several energy crises in the 1970s, energy policy was basically ignored during the past decade.

Since our country first experienced energy disruptions and

price increases, we have had mixed results in our effort to become more energy independent. Emphasis on energy conservation and unanticipated improvements in conservation technology has actually reduced energy demand since 1973 in spite of a robust 35% growth in the economy.

GOOD NEWS, BAD NEWS

That good news is matched with some bad news. Oil production in the U.S. has declined by about one million barrels per day according to industry sources. Furthermore, our reliance on foreign oil sources has increased from 30% in 1962 to about 45% in 1990. Prior to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, 27% of our oil came from the nations of the Persian Gulf. Research and development into alternative, renewable energy

sources has dropped by 89% over the past ten years. In addition to how this reduced scientific effort affects our energy supply, it has also cost the U.S. its technological leadership in such areas as wind power, photovoltaic cells and the like. Danish companies now hold a large share of the U.S. wind power market. Germany and Japan have taken the lead in photovoltaics.

PRIVATE-PUBLIC STRATEGY NEEDED

Obviously, the solution to the energy problem is not going to be solved by simply throwing more government money at it. However, it is just as obvious that America's energy future cannot continue to be ignored.

President Bush's decision to submit a proposed energy strategy to Congress is a good first step. Now, the Congress has the opportunity to examine his proposal, make perfecting changes, and enact it. The Committee on Science, Space, and Technology of which I am a member will be

closely involved in the development of a national energy policy during this Congress.

Deployment of military forces in a hostile situation should never be a prerequisite to the adoption of a energy policy that moves America closer to energy independence, a stated goal of every administration since the 1970s.

America must become more than a leader in energy consumption, it must endeavor to be the preeminent world leader in new energy technology.

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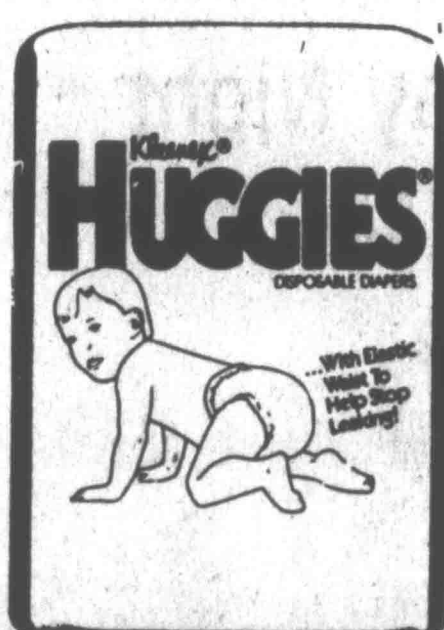
