## Henning Board Elects Caldwell 6th Member

A 128-128 tie vote June 6th for the sixth seat on Henning's Board of Aldermen, between incumbent John Caldwell and Diann Rigby Mitchell, was settled Monday in Caldwell's favor by a 4-1 voice vote of other aldermen on the new board. Incumbents Barry Dewalt, with 215, Wesley Jennings, with 212, Ronald B. Miller, with 192, and Ella S. Weber, with 181, had been joined on the board by Carolyn Barbee Howard, with 150.

## Crain Notes State Lets Funds Shift

State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, notes that the General Assembly (the state legislature) has amended, for one year only, existing laws which restrict certain funds to specific areas such as textbooks, career ladder extended contracts, etc. to allow school systems to use these funds in other areas of their budget should they need to do so for the 1991-1992 fiscal year only. "Local counties will be able to use these funds to help balance 1991-1992 budgets," he says. Lauderdale County receives the following amounts in restricted funds which may be used

to balance its 1991-1992 budgets, if the Board of Education desires to do so:

"While this amendment does not solve all of our budget woes, it does give local systems some leeway in setting up their budgets," Crain says.

"In fact, the amendment expenditure waivers amount to approximately the amount being cut in state funds."

## Jury Convicts Fincher In Richardson Murder

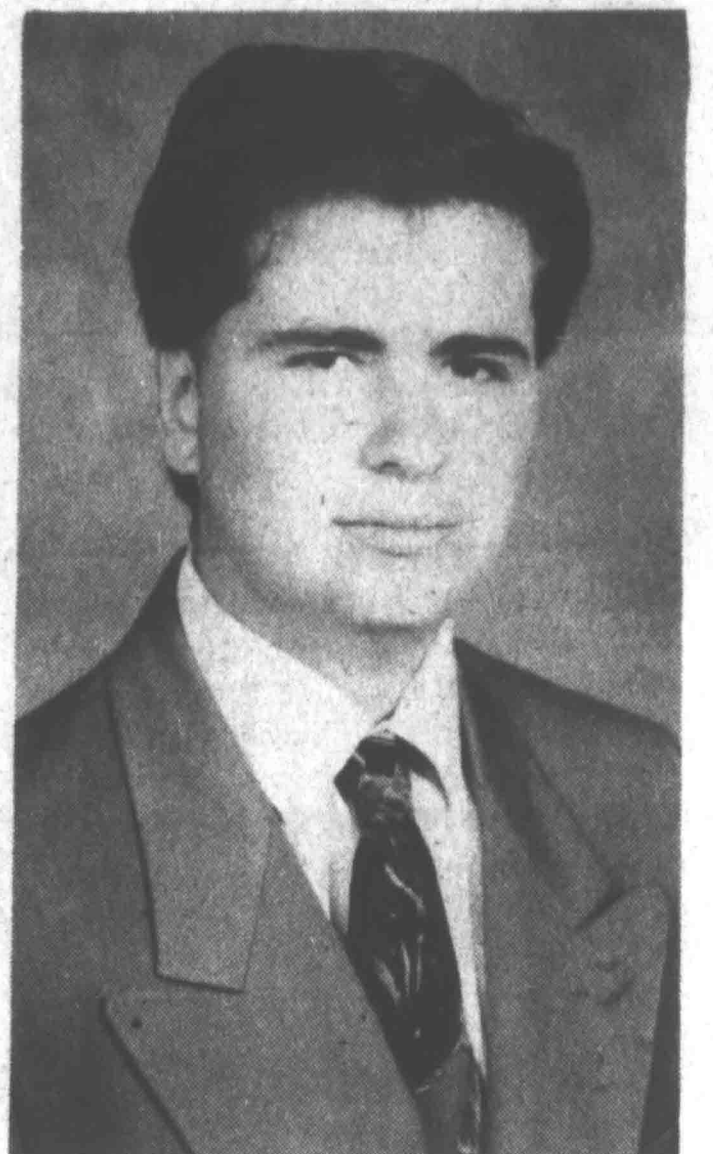
A Circuit Court jury last week found William Eldon Fincher, Jr., 33, of Ripley, known as "One-Eyed Bill," guilty of conspiracy to murder Howard Max Richardson at his home at Mary's Chapel.

He was also found guilty of especially aggravated burglary. Sentencing for Fincher is set for July 17th.

Richardson, 49, who with his brother, Randall, operated Richardson Bros. Construction Co., based at Curve, was found dead just after midnight Jan. 19, 1990, shot in the forehead, next to the door of the garage of his home.

Charged with Fincher in conspiring the murder were Richardson's wife, Sarah, and her brother, Calvin Lane, of Ripley. Their cases await trial.

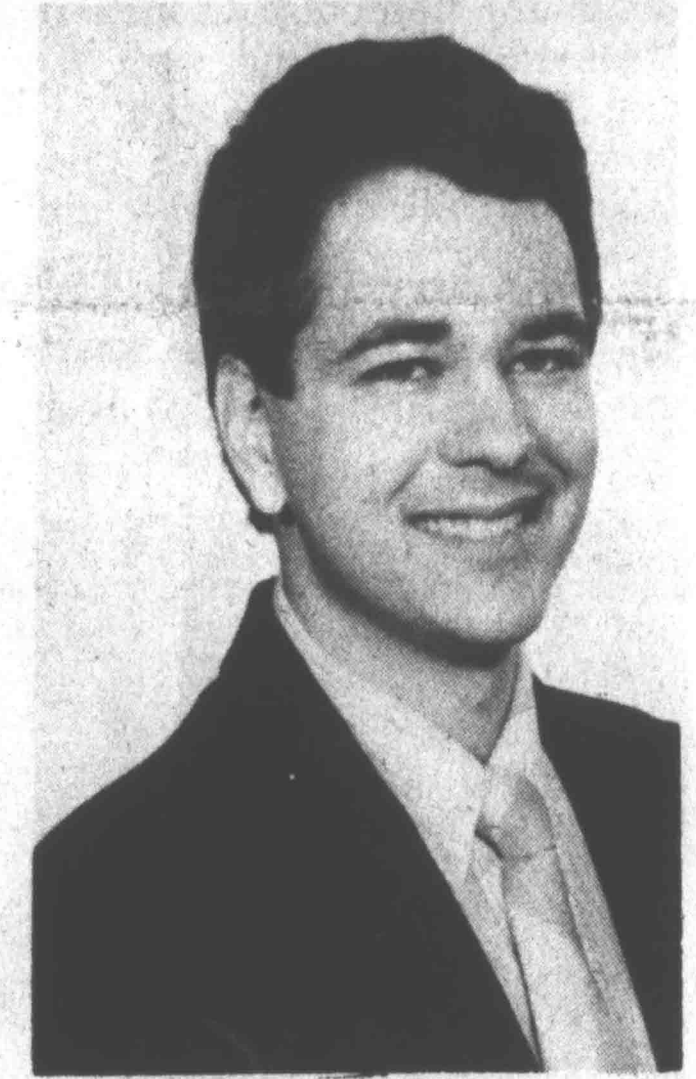

Chuck Danehower, left, has been promoted from assistant area specialist to associate area specialist.

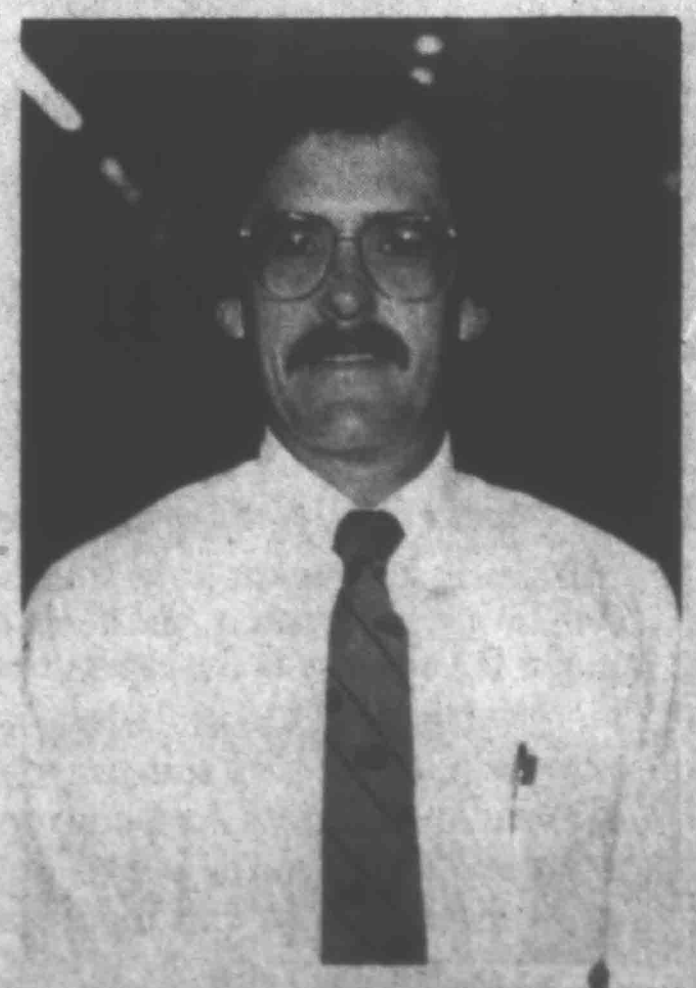
He is a District I farm management specialist. He has been with Tennessee Extension since 1986. Prior to that time he was an agricultural agent in Arkansas.

## Pharmacy Topics



A genetically engineered human protein seems to cut significantly the death rate from septic shock, which is an overwhelming infection of the bloodstream. The drug was given special FDA approval for use in the Persian Gulf war.

Aspirin and alcohol are a bad combination, even on a full stomach, according to research reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Aspirin seems to inhibit the stomach's ability to break down the alcohol, so more of it goes directly into the bloodstream.

Capsaicin, made from hot peppers, seems to offer relief from arthritis pain, say researchers at Albert Einstein College of Medicine. Topical use of pepper-packed cream cut pain by a third for those with osteoarthritis, by more than half for the rheumatoid arthritis group.

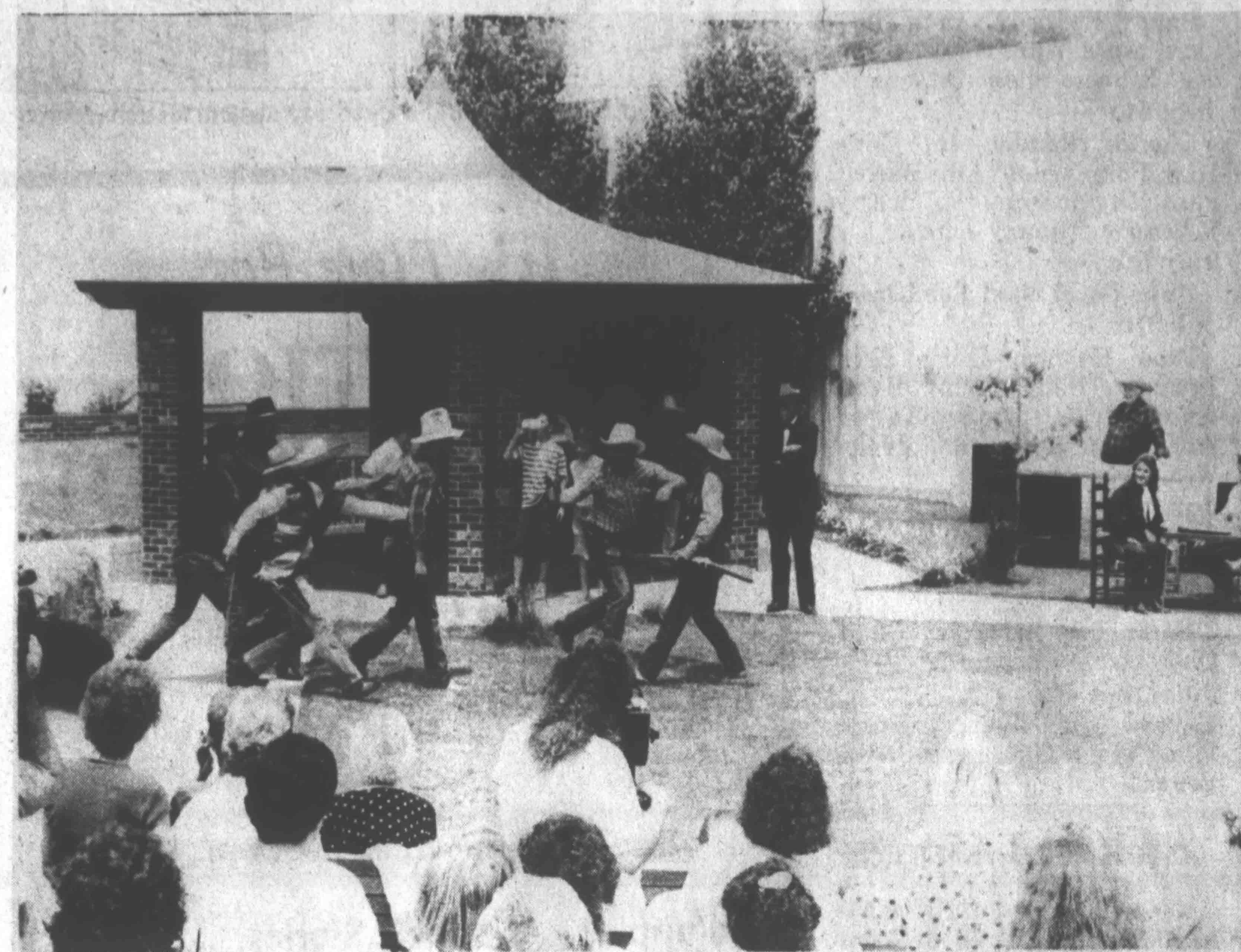

It is definitely the start of a new era for Cup racing.

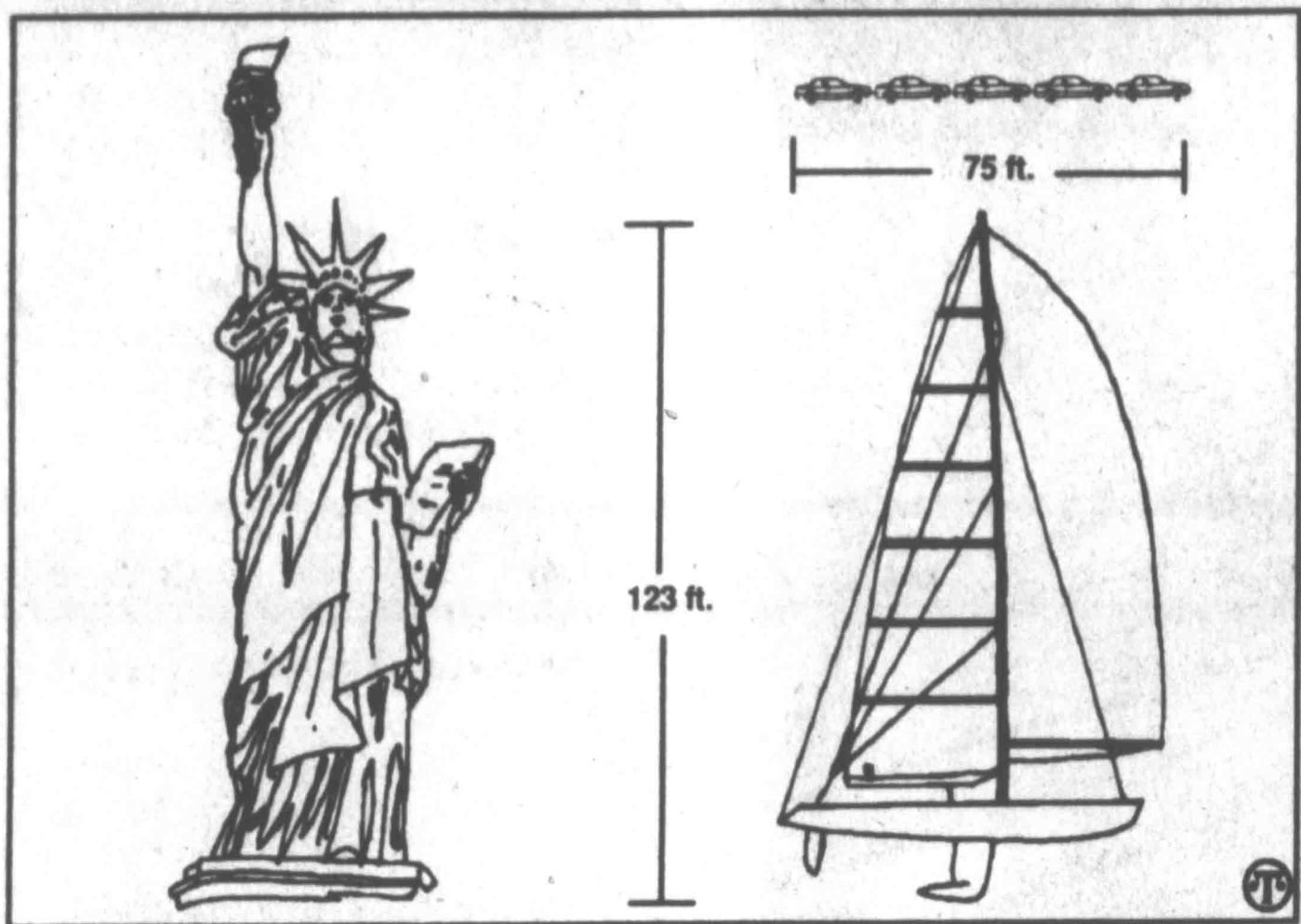
The new IACC boats are 20 percent longer, 50 percent lighter and carry 40 percent more sail area than 12-Meter yachts, which were used in Cup racing from 1988-87. They are fast and fragile, challenging to sail and fun to watch.

From January through April, the foreign challengers will race among themselves to determine who moves on to the Cup Match. At the same time, two strong defense teams—America's Cup '92 and Team Dennis Conner, led by the three-time Cup winning skipper from San Diego—will go head-to-head for the right to be the Defender in the best-of-seven Cup Match.

American Cup '92 will have a television audience unprecedented in the history of sailing. Races could be beamed to 28 countries. In the U.S. alone, ESPN will telecast more than 100 hours live—and ABC will show the opening race of the best-of-seven Cup Match live, another Cup first.

But then, that seems fitting as the Cup sails into its newest era:

### America's Cup Sailing Into New Era



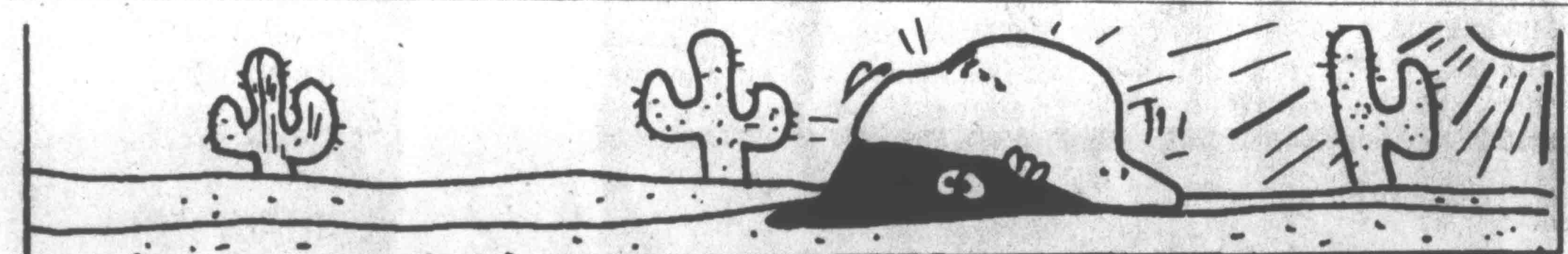

Sailing fans from across America and around the world are looking to San Diego these days. That California city has been invaded by the vanguard of a fleet of sleek, new boats and hard-driving crews as America's Cup '92 comes into view on the horizon.

Long before the foreign Challenger and San Diego Yacht Club Defender square off on May 9, 1992

for the oldest continually contested trophy in international sport, San Diego's waters are alive with sailing activity.

The IACC World Championship was recently held with five countries participating. "The World Championship is sort of like Spring Training in baseball," said Tom Ehman, Executive Vice President/General Manager of the America's

## SCIENCE NOTEBOOK

### Mastering The Mysteries of Aging

Unraveling the mysteries of aging by pinpointing those genes which play a role in triggering the onset of age-related diseases—a research area, which shows a great deal of promise for the future.

Dr. George M. Martin, a University of Washington Pathologist and Alzheimer's Disease Research Center Director, says he and his team of colleagues, are probing the aging process, "using genetic methodologies and genetic concepts to investigate basic mechanisms of aging and age-related diseases."

"The major emphasis is upon the discovery of why some individuals appear to be susceptible to particular age-related disorders," Dr. Martin said. Alzheimer's falls into one category. In a second category is a host of disorders including hardening of the arteries, diabetes, cancer, osteoporosis, cataracts, premature greying and loss of hair, premature loss of fertility, and atrophy of fat and skin.

A veteran of three decades of genetic research in the aging process, Dr. Martin said he and his "group" are attempting to map (on the chromosomes of man), to clone, and to characterize the genes responsible for these two types of disorders.

They have determined that, with hereditary Alzheimer's, different genes may be responsible in different families. Identified already are 28 different "pedigrees" associated with this pattern of inheritance, "most of which exhibit a comparatively early onset of the disease," Dr. Martin said.

In other disorders Dr. Martin studied, cultured cells "undergo more rapid senescence (aging) and exhibit an unusual susceptibility to chromosomal types of damage, es-

pecially the deletions of genetic material."

This deletion of genetic material serves to predict "the accumulation of particular forms of mutation during aging," Dr. Martin said, adding that he is researching some "rare mutations" in an effort to utilize "the experience of nature." Just what triggers the mutations which accelerate the onset of these age-related diseases is still under investigation by Dr. Martin and his associates.

He is, however, researching the tissues of mammals of contrasting life spans "in order to test various theories of aging that predict the accumulation of particular forms of mutation during aging." The role chromosomal damage to the genetic material plays in precipitating aging was demonstrated in his study of laboratory mice.

Asked about current gene-alteration techniques and how they may be relevant, Dr. Martin said, "This type of genetic engineering doesn't change the germ (family) line, and can be used in a small number of cell-to-cell transfers successfully, by replacing genetic material." He said "phenotypic" or "sensible" medicine is more appropriate in the treatment of age-related diseases than gene alteration right now.

Dr. Martin's studies of the genetics of aging include locating the genetic marker on a DNA molecule—the framework of the human genome—and linking it to a specific set of biochemical reactions which trigger the onset of the disease. During the progress of his research, he has "ruled out substantial sections of the genome," while searching through some billions of genes for the culprits.

Regarding how his research compares with larger genome projects, Dr. Martin said there are certain facets of his research which overlap with the research of oth-

ers. By pooling their results, they may succeed in adding pieces to the DNA puzzle—the biochemistry of life.

The immediate goal, Dr. Martin said, is "to continue investigating why some people are more susceptible to age-related illnesses earlier than others, and to develop methods to prevent the early onset of these diseases so people can live better and more productive lives."

Funding for Dr. Martin's research he describes as "adequate," with thanks to the National Institute on Aging (NIA) for its help. But he added, "Only one-tenth of one percent of the money spent on Alzheimer's is for research and development, while 99.9 per cent is used for care of patients," a figure he considers disproportionate.

Two of Dr. Martin's many achievements was founding and serving as the first director of the Medical Scientist Training program, and his establishment of the first NIH pre- and post-doctoral training program, "that strives to develop investigators to study the biology of aging using the concepts and methods of genetics." He has been a faculty member of the University of Washington Department of Pathology since 1957 and in 1964 established the first clinical cytogenetics laboratory in the region.

This profile of Dr. Martin produced by the National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, is one of a series paying tribute to the scientists working to understand the aging process and to prevent and/or alleviate the ills often associated with growing old. Research such as this holds the promise of making one's retirement a truly golden period.

However, much more needs to be done—particularly in the funding of such research. Our population is aging. Research now can forestall monumental problems in the decades ahead.

## Schools Budget Sliced, County Weighs Taxes

The county Board of Education's meeting at 5:30 p.m. Thursday is expected to send to Monday's County Commission meeting a budget about \$385,000 above anticipated revenues.

Commissioners have estimated they could cover the gap by doubling the annual wheel tax, to \$30, and increasing the real estate tax rate by 20¢ per \$100 assessment, to \$2.43.

A 5% cost-of-living increase for all county employees (including local funding for school employees) would bring the tax rate increase to 25¢.

## Pros And Cons Weighed

The present \$15 wheel tax is split equally by the county general fund, the county highway department, and the schools. It is proposed to pay the \$15 increase in wheel tax into a fund for school transportation.

The state doesn't require school buses, so this fund wouldn't be tied up in state restrictions and would count toward local effort in matching future state funding.

A problem is that if the County Commission increases the wheel tax, 10% of the county's registered voters could force a vote of the people on it.

This would prolong the budget crisis (with school openings five weeks away) even if the popular vote proved favorable.

Commissioners also warned Sheriff Jerry Crain that more enforcement of the wheel tax would be needed.

## Ax Wielded Carefully

The \$556,270 in cuts proposed by the Board of Education's budget committee include no loss of jobs, except for vacancies not being filled.

The state requires 180 days of school a year, with minimum class sizes, requiring about the same number of teachers.

Cuts proposed include:

- No new school buses or other capital outlays.
- No free bus use except to and from school. Field trips, athletic teams, and bands must reimburse bus expenses.
- At most, only \$2,000 for new text-books to assure each child a book; new science books planned this year to be cancelled, students to use books years old.
- No new library books.
- No new special education equipment.
- No replacement for Carolyn (Mrs. J. E.) Ammons, retiring as vocational supervisor.
- No replacement for Joe Clendenin, vocational instructor resigned from Halls High School.
- Classroom teachers to supervise physical education in K-5; four former physical education teachers to be re-assigned to other duties in the system.

## And Down The Road?

"Schools will open this fall, and football games will be played Friday nights," School Supt. Bobby Webb assured Ripley Rotarians Tuesday.

But he warned that schools are making 1-dime, 1-year adjustments, with special permission from the state to juggle some accounts to ease the impact of the state budget.

Not replacing busses more than 10 years old, and science textbooks years old, are last-resort measures, Webb said.

The system's 43 busses already run six or eight routes a day to deliver children, from three or four routes, an hour before or long after school, he said.

## And The Wild Card?

The wild card is the decision, expected any day now from a Chancery Court in Nashville, in a suit by small school systems, like this county's, on the state's formula for distributing its school system funds.

Webb thinks a favorable decision might put \$3,200,000 into county school funds.

And that would be much like winning a lottery. But not overnight. The decision would be subject to appeal, and the state legislature, which has created the current mess, is not due to meet until 1992, when it might simply complicate things further, with new laws for court challenge, appeal, etc.

Meanwhile, schools open in five weeks, and county officials are struggling to assure they do.

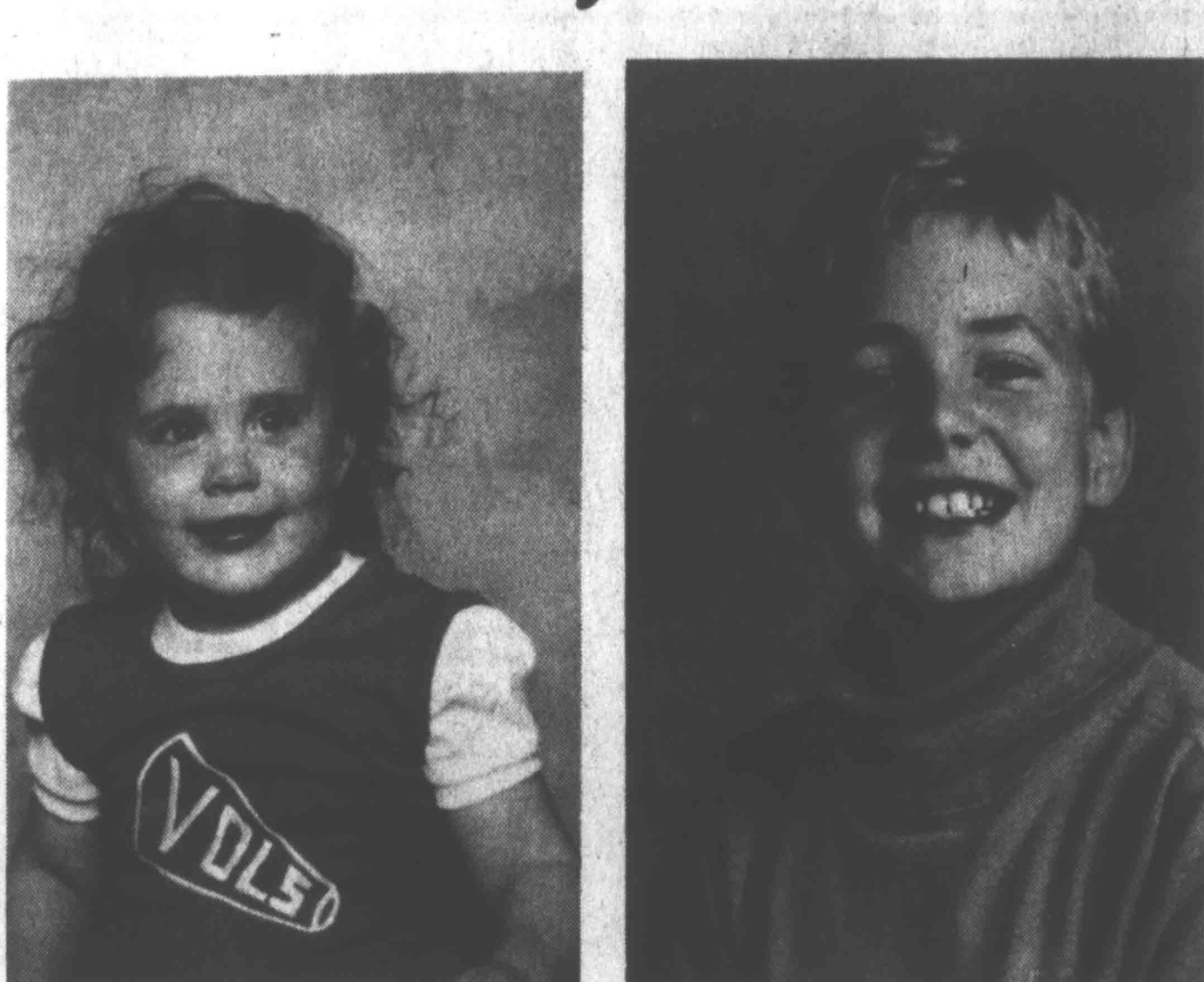

### County Ups Real Estate Rate 10¢, Wheel Tax \$10

The County Commission approved Monday evening a 10¢ increase in the real estate tax rate and a \$10 increase in the wheel tax, all of the wheel tax increase to finance operation of school buses.

Of the new real estate rate of \$2.33, schools and buses will get \$1.41 (up 16¢), the General Fund 57¢ (down 7¢), and the Highway Commission the same 35¢ as last year.

The real estate tax is expected to provide \$2,536,900 toward a total county budget of \$19,490,354.

The balance comes from sales taxes, federal and state funding, fees, etc.

Commissioners stood by an earlier decision not to award cost-of-living increases in the new budget.

The real estate tax is planned to provide about 17% of the cost of schools and buses and about 15% of the Highway Commission budget.

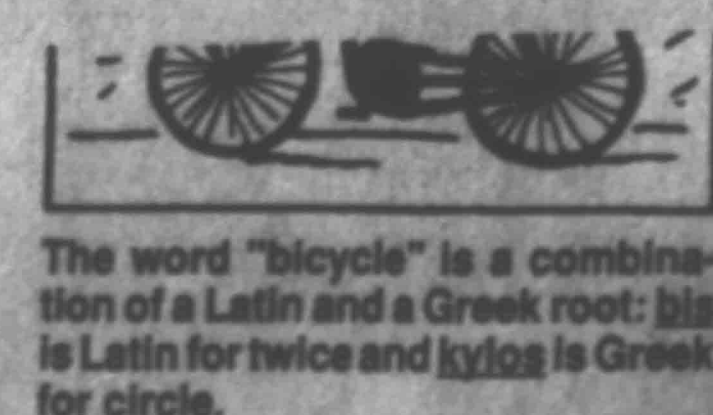

# Congressman JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT BOAT USE TAX REPEAL BILL

Boaters across Tennessee and the nation will soon be assessed a new user fee on their recreational boats unless the House is able to overturn the provision.

Not only recreational boaters and fishermen like Tommy Bradberry of Dresden and Paul Steele of Paris, but also canoers throughout the Eighth Congressional District and the rest of Tennessee, will be affected. The tax would raise only \$127 million and would not guarantee any specific Coast Guard service in return.

Tennessee boaters already pay enough in motorboat fuel taxes and registration fees to be strapped with additional fees at a time when local economies are still being squeezed. Some even suggest that Tennessee could feel even more of a pinch from another boater tax because Tennessee ranks among the top 10 states with active boat manufacturers and another tax could hurt sales.

About 6 million licensed boat owners across the country already pay a motorboat fuel tax that was raised five cents last year and raises \$149 million annually. Moreover, this same boat user fee was overwhelmingly defeated on the House floor four years ago by a vote of 287 to 119.

The trade group Boat Owners of the United States has said the user fee amounts to nothing more than a federal personal property tax and we would agree.

The tax is based on the boat's length. So if you have a Bass boat that is between 16 and 20 feet long like Mr. Bradberry's, you face a user tax of up to \$25 annually, according to the bill's sponsors.

If your boat is between 20 and 27 feet, you face a user tax of up to \$35. Finally, while a boat owner with a vessel between 27 and 40 feet would be subject to a fee of up to \$50, anything larger than 40 feet is subject to a tax of up to \$100.

Many of us in the Eighth Congressional District, particularly now that the summer vacation season is in full swing, enjoy boating and fishing on the Kentucky Lake near Paris, the Tennessee River, Reelfoot Lake in Northwest Tennessee, Lake Graham in Madison County and Beech Lake near Lexington every weekend.

We don't want it to become any more difficult to fish and duck hunt than it already is now and we're hopeful this unnecessary tax won't stand.

More than 205 House members including myself have signed on as co-sponsors of the bill that would repeal this boat user fee.

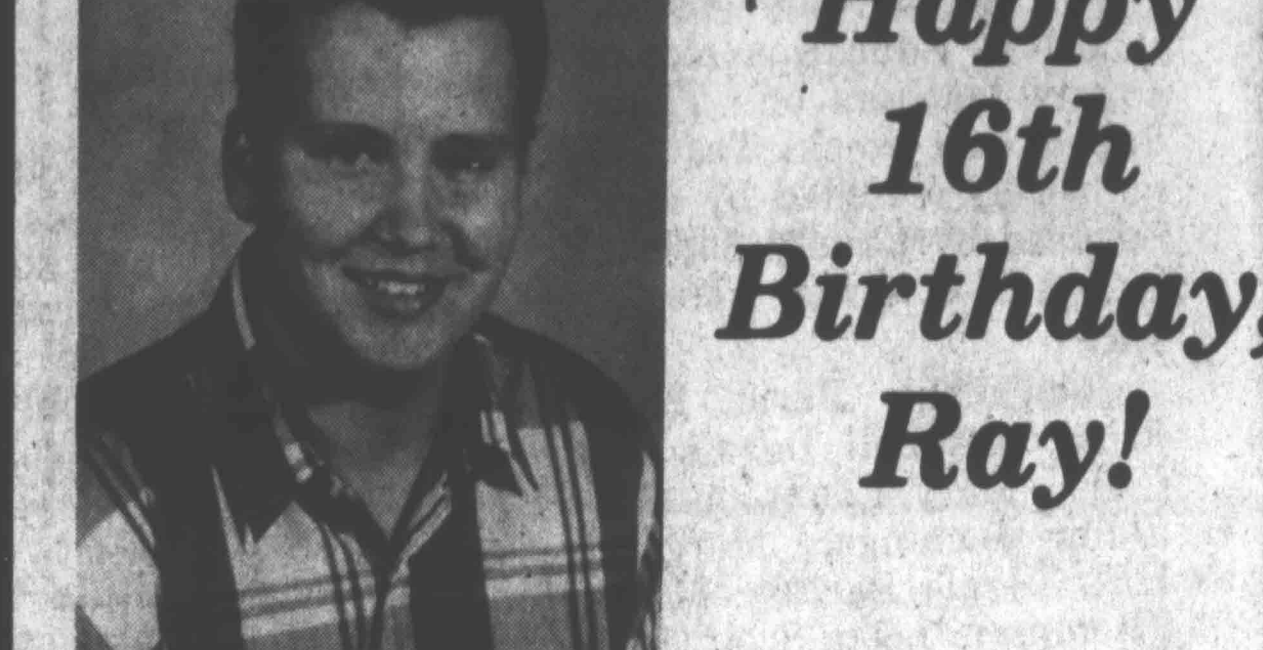

## MAINTAINING TENNESSEE'S CORPS OF ENGINEERS

The recent decision by the Base Closure and Realignment Commission to delay action on proposed restructuring of the Army Corps of Engineers is good news for Corps offices in Nashville and Memphis.

It is also good news for the respective communities.

The Defense Department had proposed consolidating Corps offices across the country into a smaller number of regional offices. Under the plan, Nashville and Memphis were slated for closure.

As chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, I am very sensitive to the need to cut costs whenever possible.

However, the Corps reorganization plan does not pass muster on a number of counts.

First, the Nashville and Memphis offices perform almost exclusively civil functions. They include projects like flood control, navigation, hydropower and, increasingly, environmental engineering.

Second, the reorganization plan proposes that these jobs will not be eliminated, but simply moved to another state.

While such a move would be a boon to the new host cities, it would have serious repercussions in Nashville and Memphis.

According to the Chambers of Commerce in these cities, Nashville would lose about \$29 million and Memphis \$35 million in payroll should the Corps be moved.

The chambers also predict the potential loss of contracts worth millions of dollars to local and regional business.

These are just some of the reasons I opposed the Corps reorganization plan being included in the military base closure package. I am very pleased that the base closure commission heard my arguments and opted not to put the Corps plan in the package.

The Congress will no doubt examine the need to streamline the Corps of Engineers in the coming months. I am hopeful that a plan can be developed that saves money, but at the same time, preserves the ability of the Corps to carry out its mandate effectively.

Halls will have a new air conditioned post office ready for occupancy February 1, 1997.

The Post Office Department has awarded D. E. Walker a contract to erect a modern brick-on-cinder block building, Postmaster E. J. Shannon announced this week.

**Dyer Brothers Lumber Co.** will build the new post office on the Dr. Miller lot on Highway 61 just two doors south of the present office at an approximate cost of \$20,000.

According to Mr. Shannon, the building will be in line with the department's new improvement policy and will be the most modern post office in this area. It is understood that only McKellar Station in Memphis will compare with it, he said.

The new building will contain 2041 feet of floor space and feature the new type counter lines which replace the older style screens. It will also feature the split lobby so designed that a section can be kept open twenty-four hours a day so patrons may pick up and mail from their boxes and mail that he will appreciate the support and influence of everyone.

The building will have continuous fluorescent lighting, hot and cold running water and an electric water cooler. The floor will be asphalt tile, with plaster walls, celotex ceiling and plywood wainscot.

A combination package unit will be installed for heating and air-conditioning with natural gas for winter heat and electric power for air conditioning in summer.

There will be a private gravel-surfaced driveway along the south side of the building and a gravel parking and turning area at the rear to allow access to the mail door from Church street.

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### New Problems For Cotton Farmer From Spots In Lint

**Army Worms, Cotton Insects Already Creating Some Problems In County**

F. H. Fashal, County Agent

Tar spots in lint cotton are causing great losses to cotton mills and providing another excuse for further conversion to synthetic fibers. This is one problem which producers can solve to a great extent.

The American Cotton Manufacturers Institute recently stated that box cars, warehouses, reworked jute bagging, and asphalt coated pick sacks are the main sources of contamination by tar.

Cotton producers are being urged to use this year only plain duck, plastic dot, or plastic coated pick sacks. Retailers are being urged to buy only these types of sacks.

Current Cotton Insects

A. J. Rains, Henning, Joe Barfield of Fort Pillow, Judith Hunt of Edith, and quite a number of other cotton growers are this year applying dust or liquid spray to cotton as the first two seed leaves spread, which is about seven days after the cotton comes up, and then will make another application seven days later to control thrips, flea beetles, and aphids on cotton.

Cost of poison is 50c to 80c per acre for each of these first sprays or dusts, after which the cotton is not sprayed again until it begins putting on squares. Farmers using these sprays should request the newest cotton insect spray schedule which is free on request.

A maximum of five applications of spray material will usually control all insects except boll weevils, and we have been fortunate in not having enough weevils to hurt us very much in the last few years. We always have some late in the season, but it is not usually possible to control these with poisons.

**Army Worms in Oats**

Joe Barfield reported army worms in destructive numbers in a field of oats on Fort Pillow Farm this week. He applied a poison spray when the worms began to feed and when he could count three to five per square foot.

This outbreak should serve as a warning to all of us to check carefully in fields of crimson clover and oats and other grain and in fescue and ladino pastures. It is necessary to get down real close to the ground and look carefully in order to find these worms before they get large enough to do a lot of damage before they can be brought under control.

One of the most effective poisons against army worms is 30 per cent toxaphene dust at 20 lbs. per acre or toxaphene spray 1.5-4 gals. per acre of the 60 per cent emulsion with whatever amount of water the sprayer will apply on an acre. Follow this math made by mixing 100 lbs. of wheat bran with four pounds of Paris green dry and then adding about 12 gals. of water to make a mist. Use at 100-150 ft. (Continued on page 6)
