Halls High's Class Of '56 Draws 37 To Re-Union

A large group gathered Saturday evening in the Holiday Inn in Dyersburg around an hors d'oeuures table on which a video had been set up showing scenes from their high school annual. Other tables had displays of former reunions, pictures from the past, and letters from members who were unable to attend, along with other memorabilia from high school.

There was a display table containing many items for the class members to take with them, with bags provided for them which included a class roster with all the addresses of every classmate; many brought their business cards and placed on the table for friends to take. There were dish cloths provided by Trenton Mills, pocket calculators from Union Planters Bank, key rings from Delta Auto Sales, ice scrapers from Dyersburg Fabrics, and many other items to be shared by all the class members.

Class President Bill McLaughlin, a senior vice-president of Union Planters Bank in Memphis, asked James Knox, President of Knox Plumbing Company, to bring the invocation. A 3-course meal was served.

Marilyn Latham Holder reflected on some of the correspondence received during the planning period for the re-union. She then held a memorial service for five class members who have passed

away. Marilyn told the group that she had heard from Carolyn Carter Akin, whose daughter was graduating from high school that weekend. Gordon Moore also wrote to the class. He has been a high school principal in Georgia for many years. This summer, he will enter the race for county school superintendent, and his schedule would not allow him to attend the re-union. The class was told that contact had been made with Sammy Dennison, located now in Gastonia, N.C.

Marilyn told the group that at their 25th re-union the group had been very lucky not to have lost a member of the class of 68. This 10year period, we have not been as fortunate. Five of the class have

The first class member to pass away was Peggy Dew Henderson, the cute little blond with the smiling eyes. She was always pleasant and had added much to the class. After high school, Peggy married was a beautician in and around Ripley. She died at the age of 48 of a malignant brain tumor. She leaves her husband, Roland, a son, a daughter, and two grand-children. Peggy was buried in Ripley Memorial Gardens. Mrs. James Peery, of Apopka, Fla., math teacher in 1956, lit a candle in Peggy's memory.

In 1989, two from the class died. The first was Robert Richardson. who passed away at the age of 50, who passed away at the age of 50, of a malignancy, in Hillhaven Convalescent Center. He was buried in Corcord Cemetery. Most of the class remembered Robert by his nickname, "Sleepy". Robert leaves his mother, two daughters, and two grandchildren. Mrs. Richard Anderson, of Savannah, who taught Robert in his second and third years of high school, lit a

candle for him.

In 1989, we also lost Cary Corlew. Many of the group present started first grade with Cary. He was remembered as being a very good student who became an Army veteran and later returned to Halls, where he taught in the high school. At the time of Cary's death he was employed by Hyatt Regency in Denver, Colo. He was returned to Halls for burial in Halls Cemetery. Cary leaves a son and a daughter. Mrs. H. G. McCorkle lit a candle in Cary's memory. "Mac" did not teach this class in high school, she did have many of the class in her seventh and eighth grade English classes in Halls Elementary School. Just last June, we lost Homer

Sellars, who died of a massive heart attack while mowing his yard. Homer was very quiet. He always buddied with Sammy Jordan and Horace Dugger. After graduation, Homer moved to Memphis and later returned to Ripley, where he resided until the time of his death. He was buried in Ripley Memorial Gardens. He leaves his wife Peggy, one daughter, and a son. Mr. Anderson lit a candle for Homer.

The last person to die from the

class was David Hallman. David was teaching at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Va. at the time of his death. The school sent a wire which touched on some of David's career: "A tragic fire claimed the life of Dr. David Hallman October 30, 1990, in Harrisonburg. Dr. Hallman earned his B.A. degree from Vanderbilt University. He served in Turkey and Germany with the Intelligence Division of the United States Army. David earned his master's degree in English literature from Memphis State University and his PhD. from Duke University. He had been with James Madison University as an associate professor of English from 1969 until the time of his death. Dr. Hallman was an active scholar of literary criticism, contributing many articles and papers on Southern literature. He was working on two biographies for University Press at the time of his death. He leaves his wife, Yvonne, and a son, Roger, of Harrisonburg, and his mother, Ruth Hallman and sister, Alix Travis, of Cleveland Heights, Ohio. Burial was in the Halls Cemetery.' Mr. Peery lit a candle in David's memory.

Each member provided some information on themselves. To some, like Thomas Hendren, it was true confession time, as he finally admitted it was he and not Dale McCaslin who had placed the water bomb over the doorway which nearly drowned Mr. Peery.

Vanda Davis Shelton said the benevolent fund had sent flowers or some type of memorial to each of the class members who had died and to a former teacher, Jasper Taylor, who died in 1989.

members with her warm reflections on her years with the group. Mr. Anderson related how he was approached concerning the reunion. He is now retired from teaching and works some at the Pickwick Golf Course. Bill McLaughlin called, saying he was from the Social Security Administration and was checking on how many hours he worked each week. Mr. Anderson recalled some of the many ball games played during his coaching the boys' basketball team and the championship trophies they won.

He remembered telling the team, when they were one point ahead during the last minute of a ball game, that whatever they did, not to shoot the ball. That minute seemed an eternity, as Kenneth Tucker dribbled under the goal His foot caught the boundary line, and the other team got the ball and went on to win by one point. Kenneth has never let Mr. Anderson forget that had he been allowed to shoot, the outcome would have been different.

Mrs. Anderson reflected on her days with this class and, like others, remembered them as being a very close group that cared for one another.. Mrs. Peery also shared her feelings about the group and parents with whom she recalls tra-

veling to ball games. Mr. Peery, with several sheets of Mr. Peery, with several sheets of paper in hand, addressed the group from notes he had written. This was quickly put aside as he continued to share so many things he had remembered about the Class of '56 and especially his days as coach of the girls basketball team their sophomore, junior and senior years, while they won the District championship each of those years. It was unbelievable how he and Mr. Anderson could recall scores and plays from both football and basketball games that happened over 35 years ago! happened over 35 years ago!



Star Grad Halls Aldermen Adopt Tax Increase To \$1.56

Halls aldermen Monday evening approved on first reading a \$2,398,237.52 budget proposed by Mayor Randall J. Harris, including a tax rate of \$1.56 per \$100 assessed valuation, up from the \$1.16 rate held for the last 12 years.

Mack Stanley, who offered the motion to approve the budget, says the jump is to catch up years of low taxes and to face losses of state and federal funds.

Barry Britt and James Tyus joined him in approving the new budget. Noel Sherrod abstained from voting. Eugene Pugh and Stan Young did not attend the board meeting.







ERWIN, Tenn.— The town of Erwin in Unicoi County, Tennessee has been described as lying in the center of a teacup with the Cherokee and Unaka Mountains forming the rim. It is a fitting description since Erwin in the 1900s was the home of Southern Potteries, creators of the brightly colored, floral tableware known as Blue Ridge. For 40 years the pottery employed the women of Appalachia and taught them the art of decorative painting. By today's standards, the hand-Colonel John Tipton; and it was

painted pottery is valuable, and collectors flock to Erwin each October during the annual Apple Festival to buy, swap and reminisce about the days when the clatter of dishes and the laughter of the "girl painters" echoed through the pottery.

In Erwin, one of the painters still plies her craft. Negatha Peterson owns and operates the Erwin Pottery, turning out her own version of Blue Ridge pottery as well as making reproductions from some of the original molds.

Cross Plains Drugstore Retains Old-Fashioned Flavor

CROSS PLAINS, Tenn.—At Thomas Drugs, in rural Cross Plains, Tennessee, visitors will always find a warm welcome as they enter one of the town's oldest businesses. Located on the northeast corner of Main and Cedar Street, the drugstore is known for its old-fashioned interior and friendly service. But its main attraction is the antique soda fountain where "soda jerk" Arthur Allen specializes in vanilla Cokes, cherry Coke floats, sundaes and other flavorful ice cream treats.

Standing behind the black and chrome counter, Arthur flips an ice cube over his shoulder and into the air. The ice gleams for a moment in the mirrored backdrop, then tumbles down into a glass as a customer smiles in anticipation of the concoction about to be whipped up.

The front door opens with the jingle of a brass bell as a man in overalls enters. He has come looking not for a milkshake, or even a prescription, but for an ax handle. Thomas Drugs has several in stock and, after some debate, the right one is found. Satisfied with his purchase, he orders a strawberry milkshake to go. On his way out, he opens the door for three more customers headed for the prescription counter.

"We're in business to dispense the finest in prescription and overthe-counter medications," says owner and pharmacist Dan Green as he fills the orders. "But we've put a new twist in an old business by reopening our antique soda fountain and offering hot lunches during the week," he adds with a smile—the same smile that greets visitors and home folks alike.

So, why is Dan Green's store called Thomas Drugs?. That mystery is solved when one knows the history of the place. It has to do with maintaining tradition.

Thomas Drugs was founded in the mid-1800s and moved from its original site to the corner dry goods store in 1930. In those days, Burgess Thomas was the druggist and the soda fountain became the local meeting place.

"My wife and I knew that Mr. Thomas was well-loved. People dropped by the store for talk and refreshment as much as they did for prescriptions. We felt committed to continuing the same style of friend-liness and good service that Burgess began," Dan adds, "and we saw no reason to change the name."

That good service is especially evident when Debbie Green and Linda Buntin set to work on the day's lunch menu. From 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, the lunch counter dispenses hot beans and corn bread, homemade chicken soup, vegetable soup and an array of sandwiches from chili dogs to ham and cheese on wheat. A chalkboard behind the counter always lists the

specials, and the prices are low to tolerable.

Black and chrome tables, surrounded by wooden booths, provide a little privacy and an old-fashioned setting for customers. Across from the booths, oak display cases contain an array of country crafts, crockery and coverlets for sale.

Throughout the store, Tennessee jams and jellies, reproduction antique toys and books and collectors pieces vie for a shopper's attention along with metal wash tubs, school supplies and spray paint. Much of

the merchandise sits in oak cabinetry and curved glass display cases that still have their 1915 shipping

The drugstore windows and store cases also contain the handiwork of local artisans when available. A recent window exhibit featured the stained glass works of Mack Wood of Cross Plains.

"We are always looking for local artists who work in historical and fine art mediums, "said Dan Green.
"Future exhibits will teature water-color prints, white oak baskets, folk art birdhouses and metal working. The exhibits help us promote the arts and provide some very interesting items for local people and tourists to purchase," he added.

The drugstore in Cross Plains is located in Robertson County's oldest white settlement. The town was founded in 1778 by Thomas Kilgore of North Carolina. The area "across"

the plains," with its abundant game, fresh water springs and seasonal beauty, drew settlers like a magnet, just as it had the people of the Shawnee, Cherokee and Chickasaw nations before them.

Much of the town's architecture predates the Civil War and is enhanced by elaborate Victorian mill work created in the 19th century. From President Andrew Jackson to the outlaw Jesse James, people from all walks of life have been coming to the town of Cross Plains for over 200 years. And for almost 150 of those years, give or take a decade, they've stopped to do business with Thomas

mas Drugs are: Monday through Friday—8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with hot foods served 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Saturday—8 a.m. to noon with no hot foods served.

Thomas Drugs is located on Highway 25 in Cross Plains, Tennessee at the northeast corner of the four-way stop. From Nashville and Kentucky take I-65 to exit 112 and travel west approximately 3.5 miles. From I-24 to Springfield take Highway 49 North to Highway 25 East and travel approximately 10 miles.
