### **County Schools Get High Marks**

County School Supt. Bobby Webb says a report by the state Commissioner of Education gives county schools high marks:

"Results of last year's newly implemented T-CAP tests (Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Performance) indicates that Lauderdale County students, at all grade levels, for the most part scored as well as all other students across the state.

"This is a significant achievement, since 64% of our students qualify for free or reduced price lunches as compared to a statewide average of 42%. "It is a proven fact that on the average, students who come from lower socio-economic families do not score as well on these tests. It is extremely gratifying to learn that even though the majority of our children come from lower income families, most were able to score as well as students from the more affluent school systems in other parts of the state. "It is apparent that teachers, students, and parents are working extra hard to make certain that all the children in Lauderdale County obtain a good education. "All students in Tennessee must take and pass a 9th grade proficiency test. This test measures minimum skills in mathematics and language arts. Students must achieve a passir. score of 70% correct on both math and language arts in order to fulfill one of the requirements for receiving a regular diploma. "Teachers and parents should be extrememly proud to learn that 86% of the students in Lauderdale County passed both parts of this test compared to a state wide average of 83% passing both parts. "Other information in this report reveals that the average number of students enrolled in Lauderdale County Schools last year was 4,909. The attendance rate was 94.8% as compared to a state-wide average attendance rate of 93.8%.



### **First Ripley MPs Back From Gulf**

"Lauderdale County teachers who have achieved Career Ladder levels II and III are 20.5%, while the state average is only 16.2%. Our local professional salary was \$4,107.56 below the state average. "Last year, 46.9% of our students were enrolled in some type of vocational class; 14.5% were in Special Education classes; and 39.5% received Chapter I services (Chapter I is a federally funded program to assist students in the areas of reading and math.) "The total expenditure per pupil in Lauderdale County (including all local, state and federal funds) last year was \$2,781. "This average is based on all expenditures, including teacher salaries, school buildings, maintenance, utilities, insurance, school buses, bus drivers, school equipment, supplies, etc. "The state-wide average per pupil expenditure last year was \$3,518 or \$738 greater than Lauderdale County. "In other words, based on our enrollment, an additional quet. \$3,617,933 in local funds would have been required in order for us to reach the state average. "Not only parents of school children, but every citizen in Lauderdale County should be proud of the commendable job being performed by our teachers and school support staff. The overall quality of instruction in all our county schools continues to maintain or exceed the state averages even though our local resources remain, well below state average."

**ROBIE BRASFIELD, of Madison**, brother of Eveyln (Mrs. Lynn) Hendren, of Curve, Saturday celebrated the fifth anniversary of his new heart by cooking fish for dozens of guests, including other heart transplant patients.

Brasfield received his donor heart during transplant surgery on May 24, 1986, at the Texas Heart Institute at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston. The donor was a 25-year-old truck driver

from Missouri "I believe he was from St. Louis, but we don't know anything about his family. I wish

we did." Brasfield said. "I am one of the lucky people in the world. got the heart after being evaluated and

waiting for only three weeks. "One man I know has been lying in a hospital bed waiting since 1989.'

Brasfield was quite sick prior to getting new heart. He suffered from. cardiomyopa thy, a heart disease for which there was no known cure, he said. "I was in and out of the emergency roo for two years," he said.

"I didn't do as well the first year (after getting the heart), but I feel pretty good now. I am now taking the minimum dose

the rejection medicine. I was taking two three times this amount to start off and the medication does have its side effects.

Brasfield said he has not gained a great deal of weight nor does he look puffy in the face. Both are common side effects from the medication he must take, he said. "I weighed 183 pounds when I had the sur-

gery and I weigh between 160 and 165 pounds Brasfield said he first went to Barnes Hos-
