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County Schools Get High Marks

County School Supt. Bobby Webb says a report by the state Commissioner of Education gives county schools high marks:

"Results of last year's newly implemented T-CAP tests (Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Performance) indicates that Lauderdale County students, at all grade levels, for the most part scored as well as all other students across the state.

"This is a significant achievement, since 64% of our students qualify for free or reduced price lunches as compared to a state-wide average of 42%.

"It is a proven fact that on the average, students who come from lower socio-economic families do not score as well on these tests. It is extremely gratifying to learn that even though the majority of our children come from lower income families, most were able to score as well as students from the more affluent school systems in other parts of the state.

"It is apparent that teachers, students, and parents are working extra hard to make certain that all the children in Lauderdale County obtain a good education.

"All students in Tennessee must take and pass a 9th grade proficiency test. This test measures minimum skills in mathematics and language arts. Students must achieve a passing score of 70% correct on both math and language arts in order to fulfill one of the requirements for receiving a regular diploma.

"Teachers and parents should be extremely proud to learn that 86% of the students in Lauderdale County passed both parts of this test compared to a state wide average of 83% passing both parts.

"Other information in this report reveals that the average number of students enrolled in Lauderdale County Schools last year was 4,909. The attendance rate was 94.8% as compared to a state-wide average attendance rate of 93.8%.

"Lauderdale County teachers who have achieved Career Ladder levels II and III are 20.5%, while the state average is only 16.2%. Our local professional salary was \$4,107.56 below the state average.

"Last year, 46.9% of our students were enrolled in some type of vocational class; 14.5% were in Special Education classes; and 39.5% received Chapter I services (Chapter I is a federally funded program to assist students in the areas of reading and math.)

"The total expenditure per pupil in Lauderdale County (including all local, state and federal funds) last year was \$2,781.

"This average is based on all expenditures, including teacher salaries, school buildings, maintenance, utilities, insurance, school buses, bus drivers, school equipment, supplies, etc.

"The state-wide average per pupil expenditure last year was \$3,518 or \$738 greater than Lauderdale County.

"In other words, based on our enrollment, an additional \$3,617,933 in local funds would have been required in order for us to reach the state average.

"Not only parents of school children, but every citizen in Lauderdale County should be proud of the commendable job being performed by our teachers and school support staff. The overall quality of instruction in all our county schools continues to maintain or exceed the state averages even though our local resources remain well below state average."

Other sites are under consideration in Kentucky, Indiana, and Tennessee.

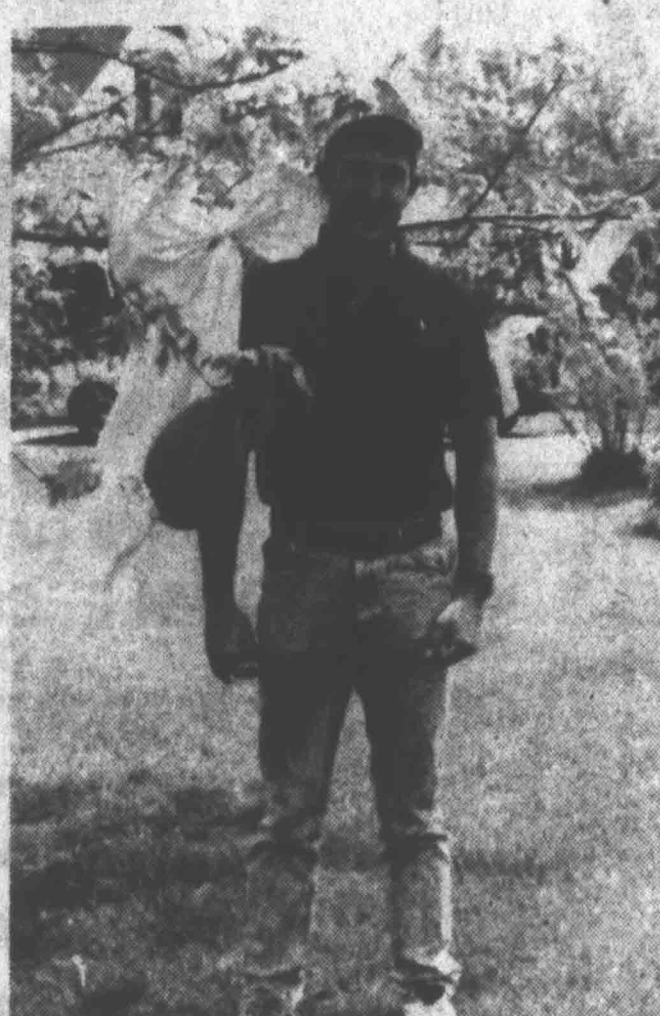

Farmers Choosing Soybean Varieties

By William G. Parker
Farmers who have not already selected a soybean variety for this year have a choice of 50 varieties recommended by the University of Tennessee, according to Dr. Wayne T. Fitchum, UT soybean specialist.

Consider the variety's maturity date, yield potential and disease and nematode resistance. In nematode resistance, several varieties in each maturity group have resistance to races 3 and 4. Cordell is the only variety that's resistant to race 5. If race 5 nematodes are predominant on your farm, we recommend this variety. Know first!

Also select varieties from all three maturity groups (IV, V, VI). Regardless of when the rains come, you have a variety at the right stage to benefit.

The late-maturity soybeans (Group VI) flower over a longer period. They can take advantage of late summer rainfall with additional pod set and filling.

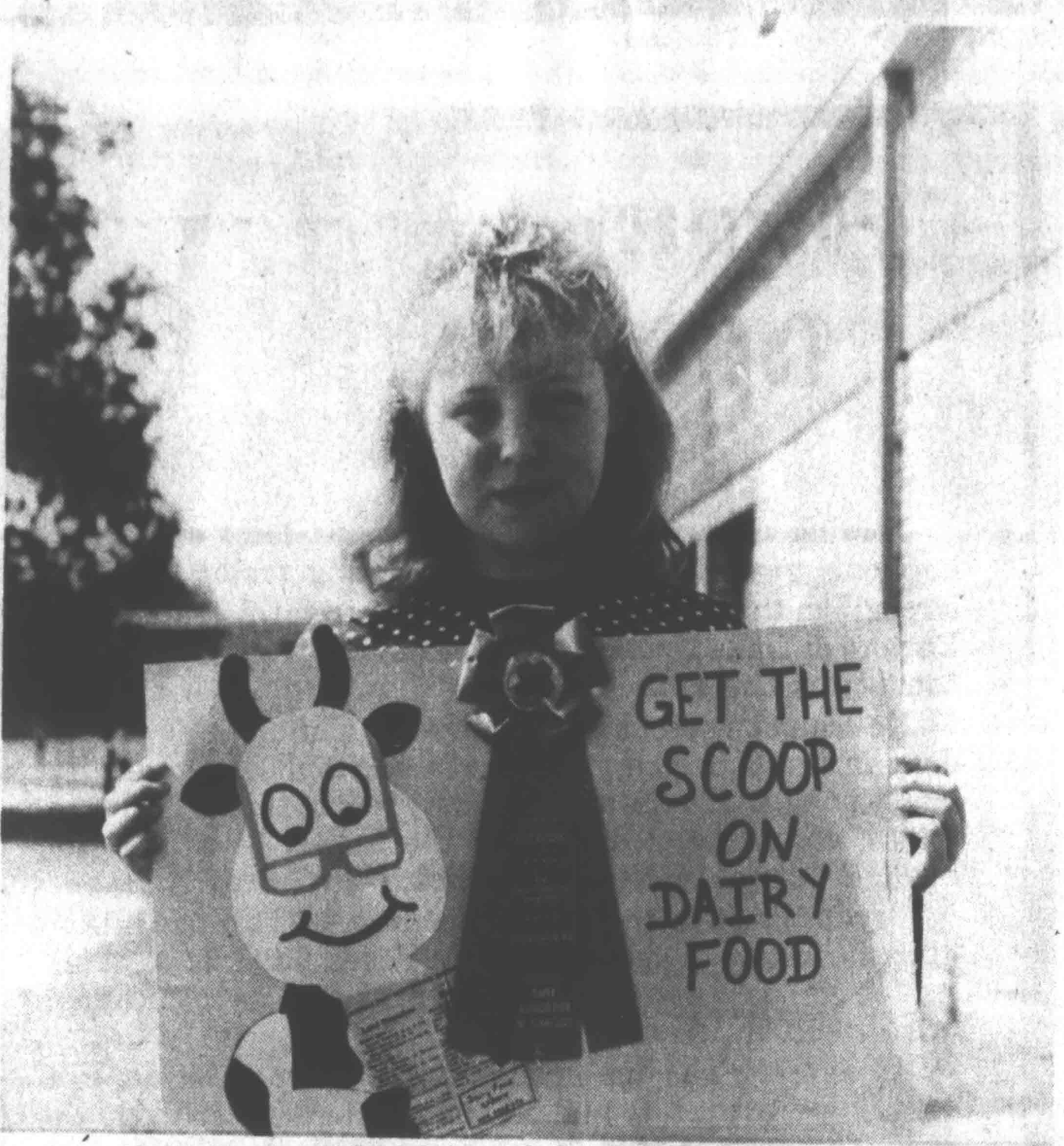
Varieties added to the recommended list for 1991 in Group IV are Avery and Riverside 499. Newly recommended varieties in Group V are Agrow 5408 and Terra-Vig 515.

Recommended varieties added to the Group VI maturity group are N.K. Coker 6955, Agrow 6297, Hyperformer HSC-B2J, Pioneer Brand 9691, Cajun and Riverside 677.

USDA pegs the average value of farmland and buildings at \$682 an acre at the start of the year, up 14% from the low of \$599 an acre in 1987, but still 17% less than the record \$823 an acre set in 1983.

Farm income slip from recent records is expected in 1991, USDA economists say. While cash receipts are expected to remain near record levels, lower direct government payments and slightly higher farm expenses will pull net incomes down.

USDA forecasts net farm income to be 42 to 47 billion dollars, nearly 10% below a year ago. USDA predicts net cash income will be 53 to 58 billion dollars in 1991, compared with 58 billion in 1990.

Pesticides the Environmental Protection Agency has proposed to prohibit from many uses on fruits and vegetables are malathion, valued for its low toxicity to humans and Ethyl Parathion, valued as an inexpensive control for insects in commercial production.

Producers wishing to comment should write EPA or contact their Representative or Senator, according to an EPA release.

Farmers' Markets are planned in several locations, including the AgriCenter in Memphis, down-town Jackson, and Blount County.

Funds have been released for White Pine, and Knox County will break ground soon.

California drought effects on fruit and vegetable supplies this summer are believed by industry analysts to be minimal. They feel any water rationing will be felt in the field crops area.

Crops mentioned that would first feel the impact are alfalfa, corn and cotton before fruits and vegetable acreage is cut.

Large fruit crops in this state are in prospect, and this will have more impact here than the California situation.

Red meat production for the U.S. in March, 1991, totaled 3.08 billion pounds, down 5% from last year, according to the Agricultural Statistics Board.

The January-March red meat production was down 1% from last year.

The percentage changes in production, slaughter, and average weights were: beef-production down 8%, slaughter (head) down 9%, average live weight up 22 pounds at 1,155; veal-production down 7%, calf slaughter down 27%; average live weight up 85 pounds to 353; pork production down 2%, slaughter down 3%, average live weight up 2 pounds to 250; lamb-production up 12%, slaughter up 15%; average live weight 3 pounds to 126.

March, 1991, contained 21 weekdays and five Saturdays. March 1990 contained 22 weekdays and five Saturdays.

Quality hay reduces feed costs, Richard Buntin, Assistant Extension Agent, reminds beef producers "You can improve the quality of hay by harvesting at the proper stage of growth, baling at the proper moisture level, and storing under the right con-

ditions," he says. "Agronomists recommend cutting cool-season grass hays, such as fescue, orchardgrass and timothy, in the early-head stage.

"Cut wheat or rye in the boot to early-head stage. Cutting later will produce more hay, but hay of lower quality. Many times you'll have to feed a supplement with low-quality hay to get the weight gains you want.

"Have you switched to storing your hay in large, round bales? Many producers who have switched have a lower-quality feed for their cattle than when they used conventional bales.

"That's because a lot of producers roll the hay even though the moisture content is too high. This causes mold growth inside the bale.

"Too much moisture in the bale may also pose storage problems.

"The way you store hay affects

the amount of hay you have at feeding time.

"Hay stored outside may have large losses if it's not stored on old tires, pallets or something similar to keep the bale from resting on the ground. Rainfall needs a way to escape.

"You can place bales end to end without problems. But, if you place bales side by side, you'll have a lot of spoilage if the bales touch.

"Don't stack bales on their end unless you plan to cover them.

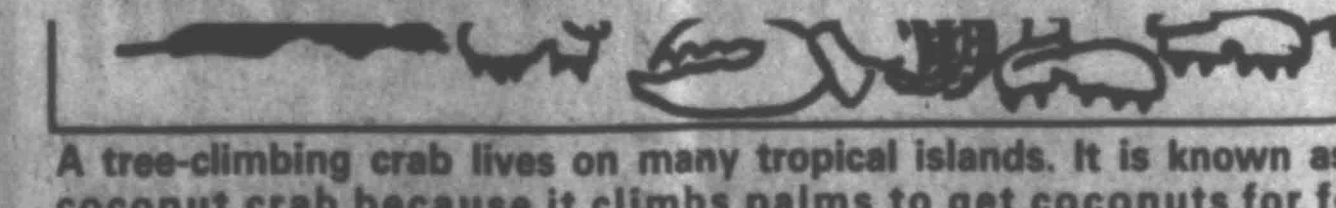

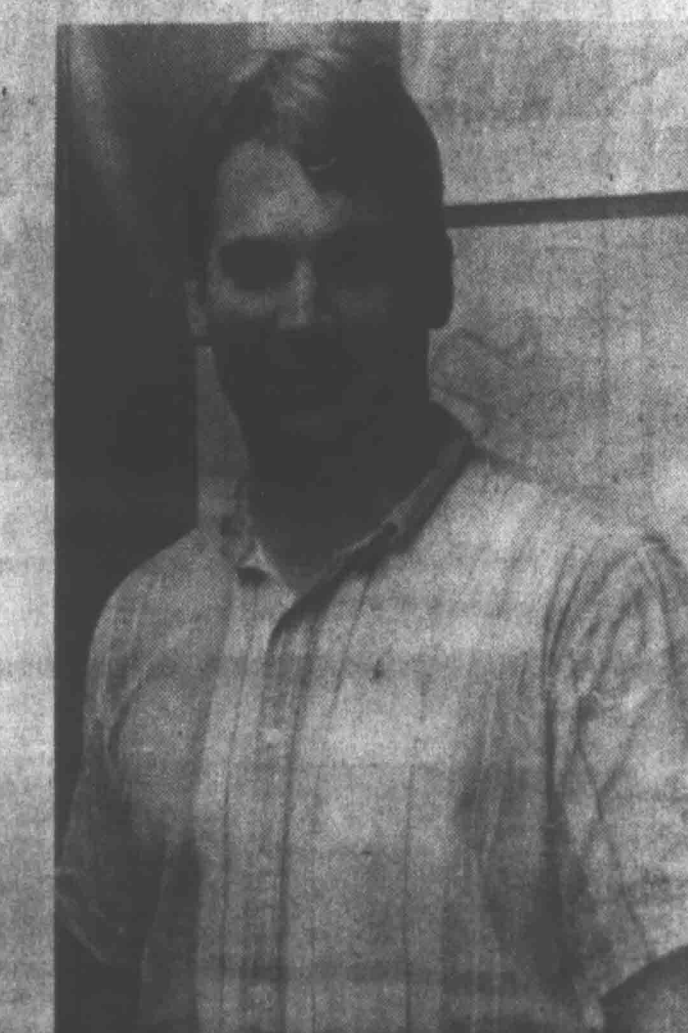

NEWS OF HEALTH Is Our Environment A Threat To You? A group of American and Canadian epidemiologists (medical scientists who deal with the incidence, distribution and control of disease in a population) is investigating possible environmental causes of Parkinson's disease—a progressive neurological disorder marked by tremor and weakness of muscles. It's been found that sometimes an apparently unusually large number of people in a given area may be developing Parkinson's. Epidemiologists are looking into several such

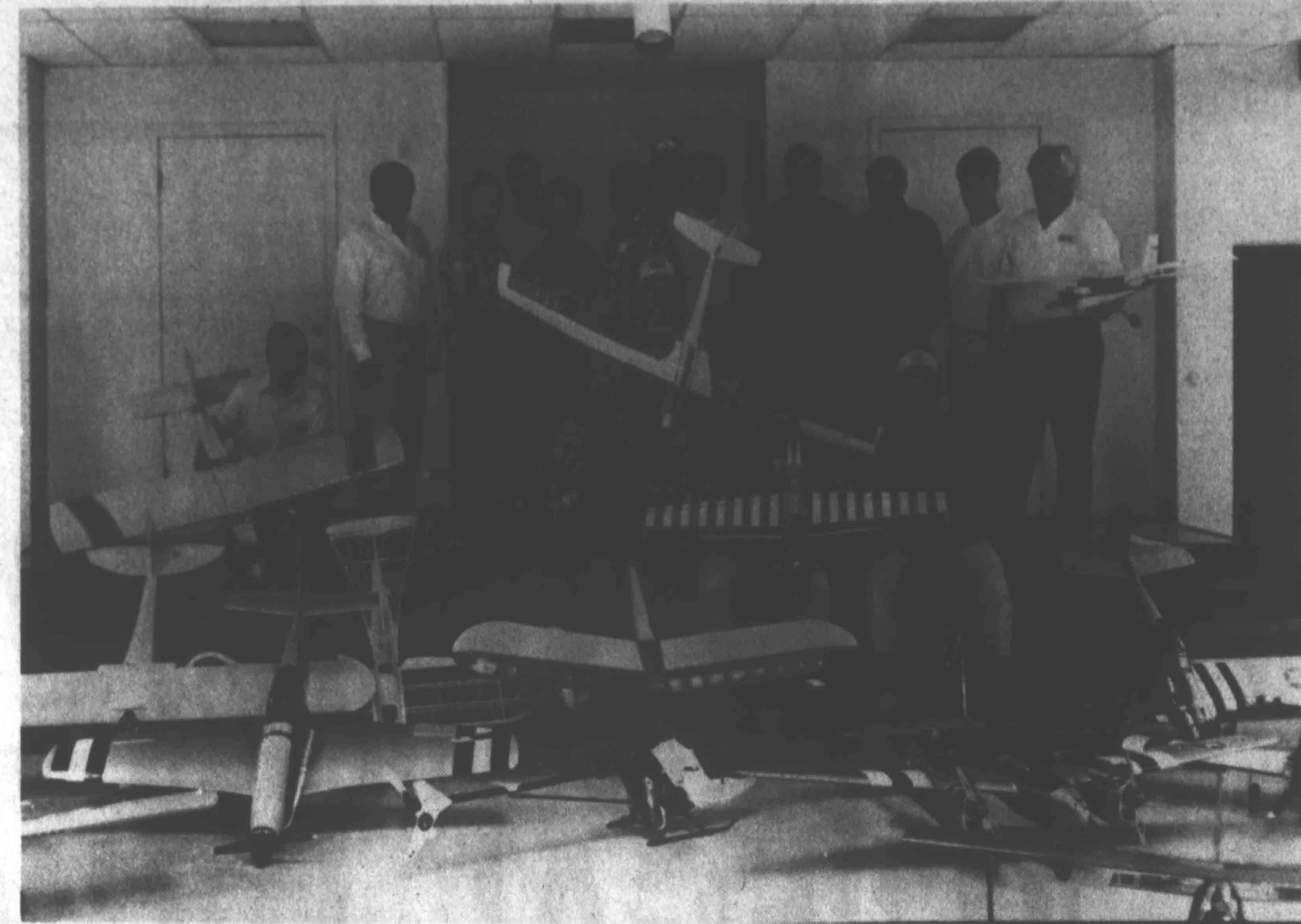

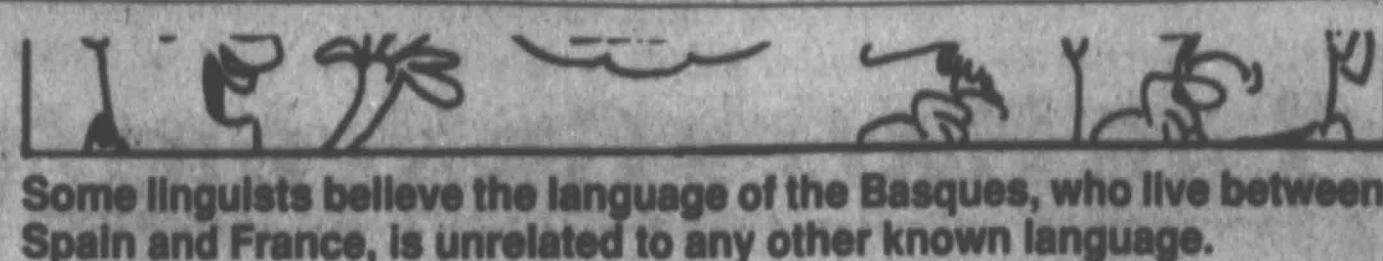

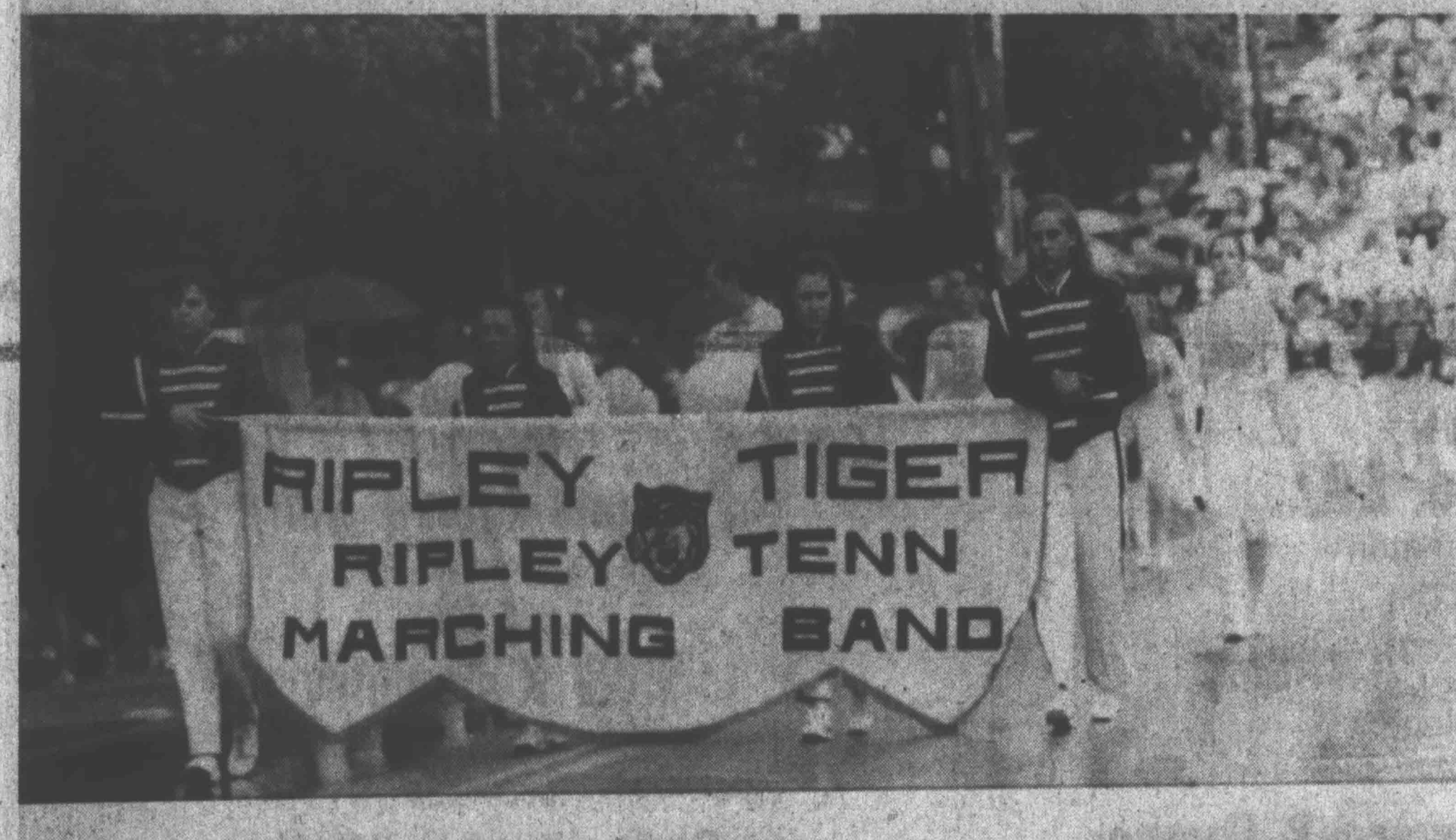

Children's Museum Offers Life Experiences On a Small Scale

MEMPHIS, Tenn.—In the gray stone, maroon-trimmed assembly hall of Memphis' old National Guard Armory, a woman wearing a red apron stands before a crowd of children. Like the military instructors who once occupied this building, she is reviewing the rules of conduct expected of a group of young recruits to one of the city's newest attractions—The Children's Museum of Memphis.

"I've got a place for little babies to play," she tells the excited youngsters. "Are you little babies?" she asks with a smile.

"No!" the children yell in reply. "Great! Then, I've got a place just for you. It's called The Sky-scraper," she declares.

"Yeah!" the children shout in eager anticipation. The Children's Museum of Memphis is a cityscape in miniature—a city for kids. From a mechanics garage to a grocery store to an emergency 911 command center, the museum gives children an opportunity to explore the adult world. In this little city they can descend into a manhole, sit on a policeman's motorcycle and tune a car engine.

"I've got to get the bugs out of this engine," remarks one little boy as he stands over the Plexiglass hood. Dressed in a lab coat and goggles he clutches a wrench in one hand. Behind the steering wheel a boy and girl argue over who will drive to the Mississippi River. The argument is resolved when the girl hears her brother call from the bank. It seems the bank computer is asking a lot of questions about billions and trillions, and he needs her help.

Just around the corner from the bank, a line frequently forms at one of the museum's most popular spots—

the grocery store. Here, kids can push their own grocery cart, choose from the well stocked shelves and check themselves out at the register. This shopping trip also provides a few of life's lessons. The first lesson comes when the children find that—of all the goods on the shelf—they are budgeted to only three items. (Not surprisingly, the plastic lobsters and cartons of ice cream rank high in popularity at the check out.)

Lesson two comes at the cash register when, with the help of an adult volunteer, they must enter the correct prices and make change. "We are a hands-on experience, not a collecting museum," relates Kathy Kavelman, public relations coordinator. "We use collections only as teaching aids and use objects that can be explored by our inquisitive little visitors."

Serious environmental and social issues are also addressed in the hands-on exhibits. At the recycling factory children are shown how aluminum cans are pressed into a "biscuit" used to create new cans. Bright colored plastic bins are also in place so that children can practice sorting trash for recycling. At a play center, toys can be constructed from recycled materials.

On the other side of "the city," children learn what it means to be handicapped. In one exhibit a child can ride in a wheelchair while a companion tries to maneuver over uneven surfaces. Other exhibits teach that a handicap is neither an illness nor a punishment.

It is the philosophy of The Children's Museum of Memphis to encourage curiosity and imagination while demystifying the arts, sciences, humanities and technology that make up everyday life. Adult companions

are encouraged to share in this learning experience, and programs for joint participation are a regular part of the museum's workshops. There are also special classes such as "Young Chefs" and performances of storytelling, music and mime scheduled throughout the year. The museum also has a resource room for adults containing the latest information on child rearing and parenting.

The museum also has changing exhibits, including the very popular "Little House Under Construction" from a museum in Cleveland, Ohio. In that exhibit, children had the opportunity to be involved with house building from blueprint design to brick laying.

The Children's Museum of Memphis is a never-ending look at the experiences of daily life in the city. From driving a fire engine to talking on a pay phone, it is the kids' city, and they make all the decisions.

The Children's Museum of Memphis is located at the corner of Central Avenue and Hollywood beside the Liberty Bowl Stadium. The museum is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is \$4 for adults (\$3 for seniors) and \$3 for children 12 and under. All children must be accompanied by an adult. For group reservations call (901) 458-2678. Because the museum is located on the grounds of the Liberty Bowl, it is suggested that visitors also call ahead to confirm hours during home football games. 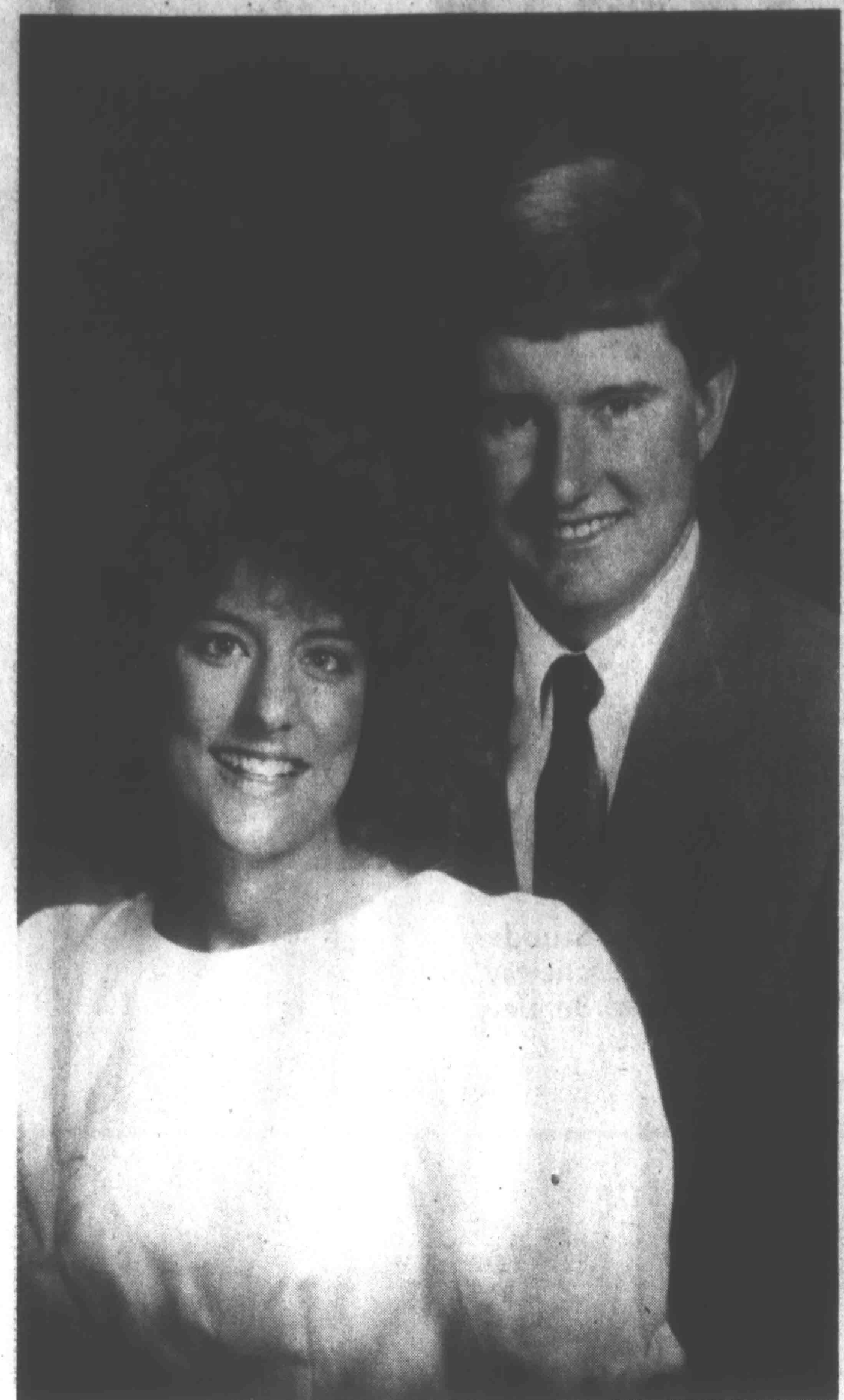

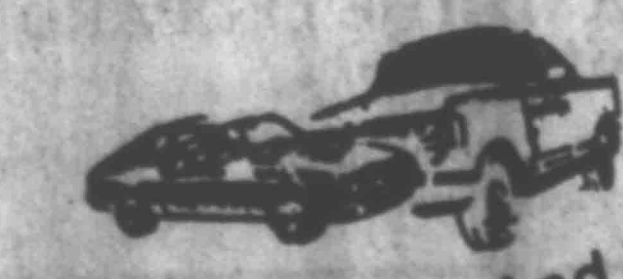

"Josephine Williams" delighted members and guests of the Lauderdale County Historical and Genealogical Society at their meeting Sunday in the Farm Bureau Office with stories of her childhood in the West Tennessee wilderness in the 1820's.

Mrs. Ned Rooks, of Brownsville, very convincingly portrayed the female counterpart of Joseph S. Williams, who in 1873 wrote "Early Times in West Tennessee". The book, now out of print, is being republished by the Fort Prudhomme Chapter of DAR, Mrs. Janice Craig and Mrs. Rufus Smith are chairmen of the project.

Mrs. Rooks, wearing a long calico frock typical of a 19th Century matron, talked about the "Western District" fever that gripped settlers: "Folks thought there would be fruit hanging on the trees just begging to be picked; that the soil was so fertile, crops could be planted without work; and that hogs were running around, ready-roasted, with knives and forks sticking in their backs."

She described the isolation of the early settlers, stating that their nearest neighbor was twelve miles away and that few homes between Covington and Brownsville that travelers often stopped for meals and lodging.

The Williams, it is thought, settled on Leagon Creek about ten miles west of Brownsville.

EDUCATION FOR THE FUTURE

State government leaders in Tennessee are devoting great effort this year to improving our state's system of education. Like our counterparts on the state level, Congress and the President have begun debating how federal education policy can be changed to complement the hard work that is striving to provide a better education for our children.

We all know the many valid reasons for carrying on the American tradition of trying to make education more productive and more effective for succeeding generations. One conclusion of a recent study vividly illustrates why it is so important to continue the commitment to improving education.

That study projected that people with less than a high school diploma will be able to fill only 14 percent of all jobs by the year 2000. Today, people who quit school before high school graduation are able to fill about 40 percent of all jobs.

That means that workers in the not-so-distant future will require higher skill levels to compete for available jobs requiring the accomplishment of more complex tasks. Providing those skills must be among the highest priorities of education at all levels.

Those goals include insuring that all Americans are literate, increasing the graduation rate among high school students to 90 percent, and insuring that American students become the leaders of the world in math and science.

These goals will not be easily attained. Once adopted, long term effort so that the children of the United States are fully prepared to meet the challenges that are sure to confront them as they lead America and the world through the 21st Century.

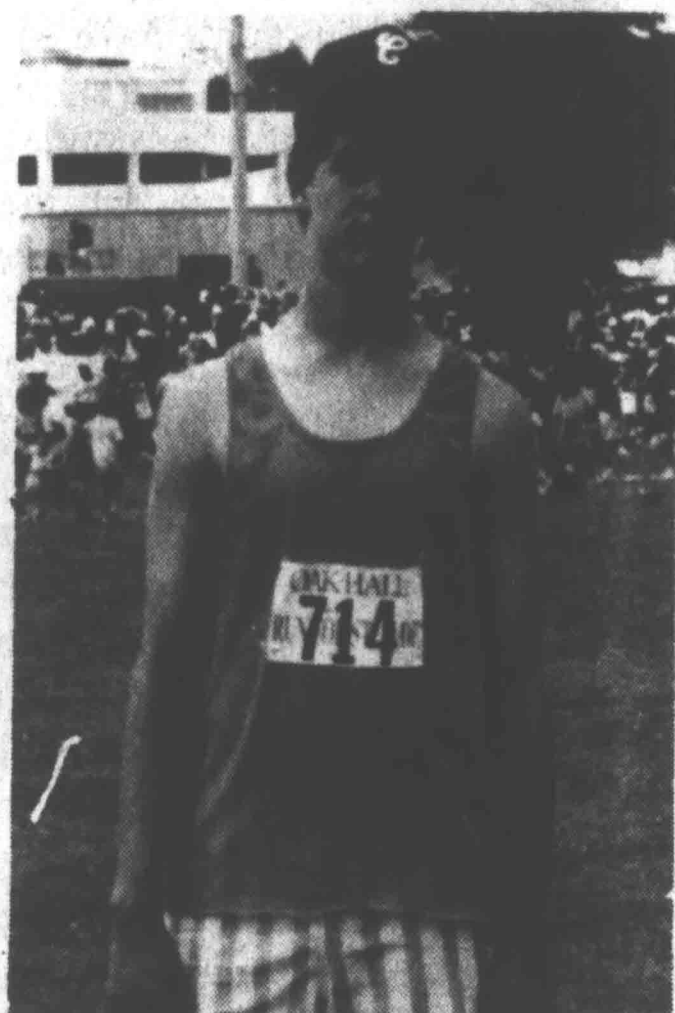

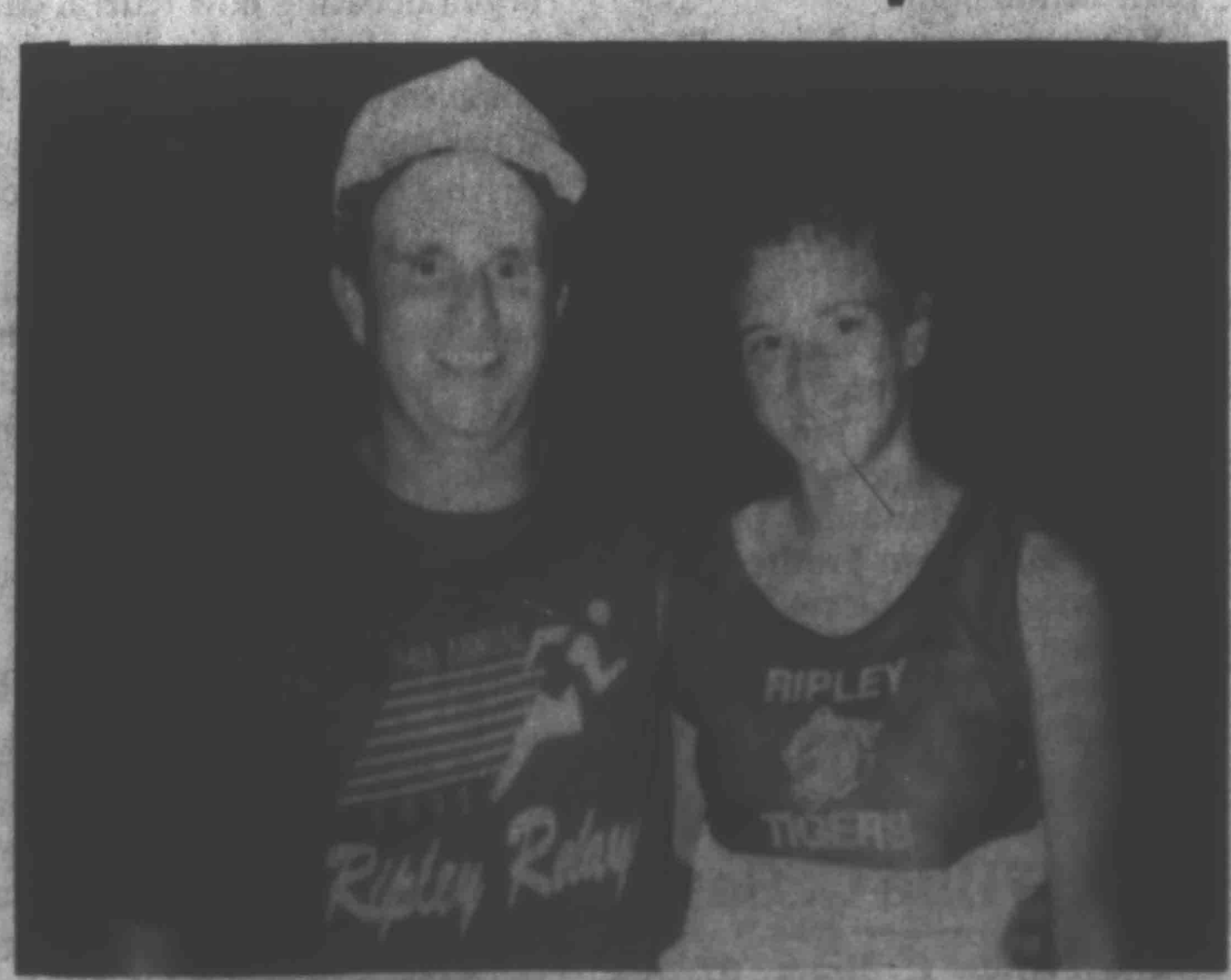

At 66, Heart's 5 Years Old



ROBIE BRASFIELD, of Madison, brother of Eveyln (Mrs. Lynn) Hendren, of Curve, Saturday celebrated the fifth anniversary of his new heart by cooking fish for dozens of guests, including other heart transplant patients.

Brasfield received his donor heart during transplant surgery on May 24, 1986, at the Texas Heart Institute at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston.

The donor was a 25-year-old truck driver, from Missouri.

"I believe he was from St. Louis, but we don't know anything about his family. I wish we did," Brasfield said.

"I am one of the lucky people in the world. I got the heart after being evaluated and waiting for only three weeks.

"One man I know has been lying in a hospital bed waiting since 1989."

Brasfield was quite sick prior to getting a new heart. He suffered from cardiomyopathy, a heart disease for which there was no known cure, he said.

"I was in and out of the emergency room for two years," he said.

"I didn't do as well the first year (after getting the heart), but I feel pretty good now. I am now taking the minimum dose of

the rejection medicine. I was taking two or three times this amount to start off and the medication does have its side effects."

Brasfield said he has not gained a great deal of weight nor does he look puffy in the face. Both are common side effects from the medication he must take, he said.

"I weighed 183 pounds when I had the surgery and I weigh between 160 and 165 pounds now."

Brasfield said he first went to Barnes Hospital, St. Louis, in an effort to get a new heart.

"They refused to talk to me. They said I was too old; that the cutoff limit for heart transplants was 55 and I was 61," he said.

Brasfield's sister lives in Houston and her husband had undergone open heart surgery about that time.

"She talked with the doctors there and they said to have me come down. My sister flew up here and took me and all my records back to Houston."

"I took some extensive tests for three weeks and they evaluated me and they said they could do it."

"I waited for another three weeks at my sister's house until they called to say they

A landmark home in Halls was destroyed by fire recently, during an electrical storm.

Frances and Carmon Belton owned the house, having bought it from the Zona and Clarence Dyer heirs a number of years ago.

Frances and Carmon were at Kentucky Lake, and Frances said how lucky they really were as one of them could have been killed or seriously injured. Neighbors, friends and the fire department were able to get everything out of the house, most of which was water and smoke damaged. Frances said she had not yet found one piece of her china, crystal, or furniture broken. They are living in a house they own at Edith and are not in any hurry to decide what they will do about the house. It is only a hull now.

About the landmark home, the Dyers moved from Summerville to Gun Flat, and then bought this lot in town that ran from college Street to Hazel Street and Buffalo (now Locust) Street on the south.

The three ill children were moved to Grandma Dyer's house and all were dead and buried before their mother could be told about it as she was so near death herself. Gusta and Neil had two sons after losing their first three children.

One of their sons, Gilreath, married Evelyn Vaden Smith and they built a house directly behind Gilreath's parents' facing College Street. Evelyn died a few years ago and Gilreath lives there with his children and grandchildren in and out keeping him company.

Evelyn's daughter Susan married Bobby Phillips and they live in the Dyer house on the corner.

Gusta and Neil's other son, Neil Augustus, married Mary Martha Hemby, and they built a house on Lover's Lane and had the road renamed Mitchell Lane after Mary Martha's grandparents.

Grandma Dyer's son Clarence married Zona Smith from Dyer, Tenn. who came to Halls to teach school. After their wedding they moved in with Grandma Dyer and also added the second story after

Ross, Virginia and Mary were born. Margaret (known as Pip) and Clarence (known as Beany) were born later.

Ross married Agnes Moss of Gallatin. Ross was a highway pa-

trolman when patrolmen rode motorcycles. They had one son, Tommy. After Ross graduated from law school, they moved to Halls and first had an apartment upstairs in his parents' home. They later bought the Sam Seigel home seven doors down the street from where Ross was born and they live there today. Ross was once mayor of Halls, executive assistant to Gov. Buford Ellington during which time he was appointed to the state supreme court. Later, he became the chief justice. He also served in World War II.

As I told you Margaret was known as Pip and that is what I will call her during the rest of my story. I boarded in Halls, but my home was in Frog Jump in Crockett County and I did a lot of eating and sleeping at Pip's house. "Miss" Zona was in Texas for her health, so Grandma Dyer did the cooking and housekeeping.

When Ross came home from college he completely ignored me. I had met him for the first time when Charles Rooks' mother, "Miss" Julia, had a bridge party for Charles and Ruby and Lucille Smith, who boarded with her from Forked Deer. I boarded across the street with my friend Marjeline Harward's parents.

After the bridge party if I asked, "Pass the biscuits please," he would do it and not wait for the next closest person to the biscuits to do it. Grandma would always whisper to me when I came to eat, "Mary talk to Ross."

Then as now the most important or fun thing for a teenager to do was ride in a car. One night Pip's daddy told her she could have the car, but she would have to get it from Ross up town. He was spotted at Pedro's and Pip and Jane Brown went in to get the keys from him. When she told him, as usual, he didn't hear her but left through the back door going on in the back door of Andrews Drug Store and out the front door on

across the street to Connell Drug Store with Pip and Jane following along behind. It was there that he gave up and gave the keys to Pip before the girls had to take the keys away from him.

Grandma died and "Miss" Zona returned from Texas. This was when we watched the movies with Joan Crawford, Katherine Hepburn and Bette Davis always looking so glamorous smoking a cigarette. Along with some other teenagers, we wanted to look glamorous, too. We would bow the horns in front of Connell Drug Store. Will Cherry would look out the window, bring us a nickel's worth of cigarettes and bottles of Coke (as Coca-Cola was called) and pick up the bottles or glasses after we had ridden down the highway looking glamorous, drinking those Cokes and smoking.

Anyway, by this time Virginia had gone to Lambuth College. On a visit home her freshman year Virginia was sitting on the front porch looking glamorous, smoking a cigarette in front of God, her family, and all f College Street to see. I thought she had gone hog wild and just didn't care who knew it, when I came by to see Pip and her. I can't remember if she took up the habit, but that cigarette was for her asthma.

When I look at the hull of that stately old house and think of all the happiness, sadness and fun that has taken place in it. I do wish someone would give it a face lift, even though they say it just isn't worth it. But as I told someone the other day I just dream of it.

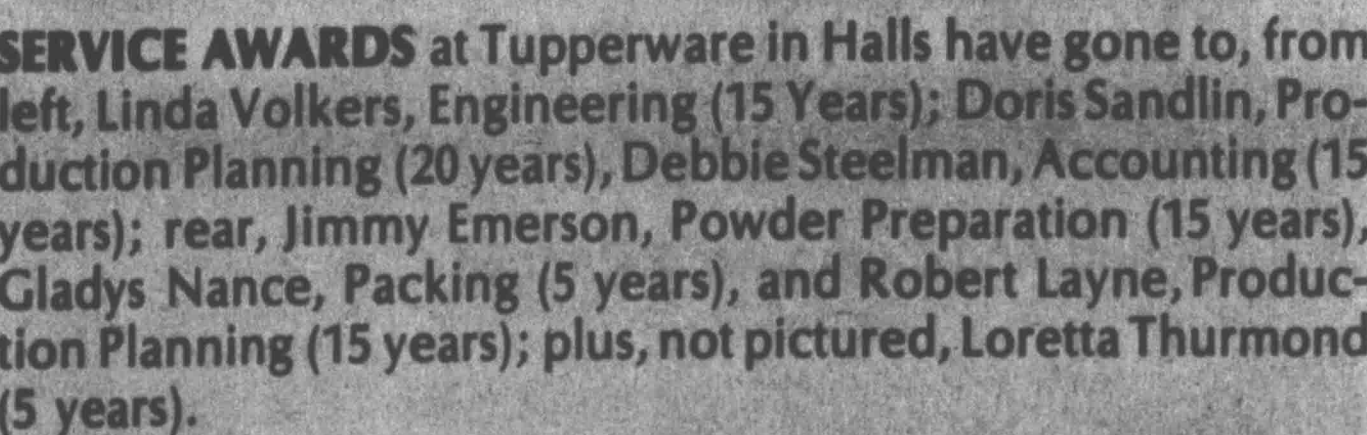

JOB CORPS EXPANSION CAN MEAN OPPORTUNITY

Among Tennessee's citizens are approximately 114,000 poor youth according to recent Congressional testimony. These are our state's most "at-risk" young people. They are the youngsters in our towns and communities who, without a helping hand, face a bleak future of possible drug addiction, crime, or unemployment. In many cases, they are kids who simply need education and training that will allow them to take advantage of opportunities that exist in their own community. One of the more successful

programs at providing that opportunity to disadvantaged young people between the ages of 16 and 21 has been Job Corps. It is the largest and oldest of our country's residential education and training programs. Its results speak for themselves.

Research shows that 84% of Job Corps graduates throughout the country are placed into jobs, pursue further education, or enter the military. In addition, studies point out that \$1.46 is returned to society for every \$1.00 invested in the Job Corps program.

TENNESSEE UNDERSERVED

Our state is woefully underserved by this program. Currently, only 1,231 or 1.08% of Tennessee's disadvantaged youth are served by two Job Corps Centers located in the far eastern part of the state. That is why a proposal to expand Job Corps has such appeal to not only those of us who represent Tennessee but a wide range of business, labor, and non-profit organizations.

Currently, efforts are underway to expand this program so that 50% more needy young people are served and 50 additional centers are established statewide. What makes this important is

that Job Corps can make a significant contribution to training the work force of the future just as it has in the past.

A recent commission study reported that more than 70% of all jobs in the U.S. will not require a college education by the year 2000. Our present system of education including academic and vocational programs will, of course, continue to shoulder the lion's share of preparing our young people for the workplace.

Programs like Job Corps can also play a role in offering a chance to succeed to those in need.

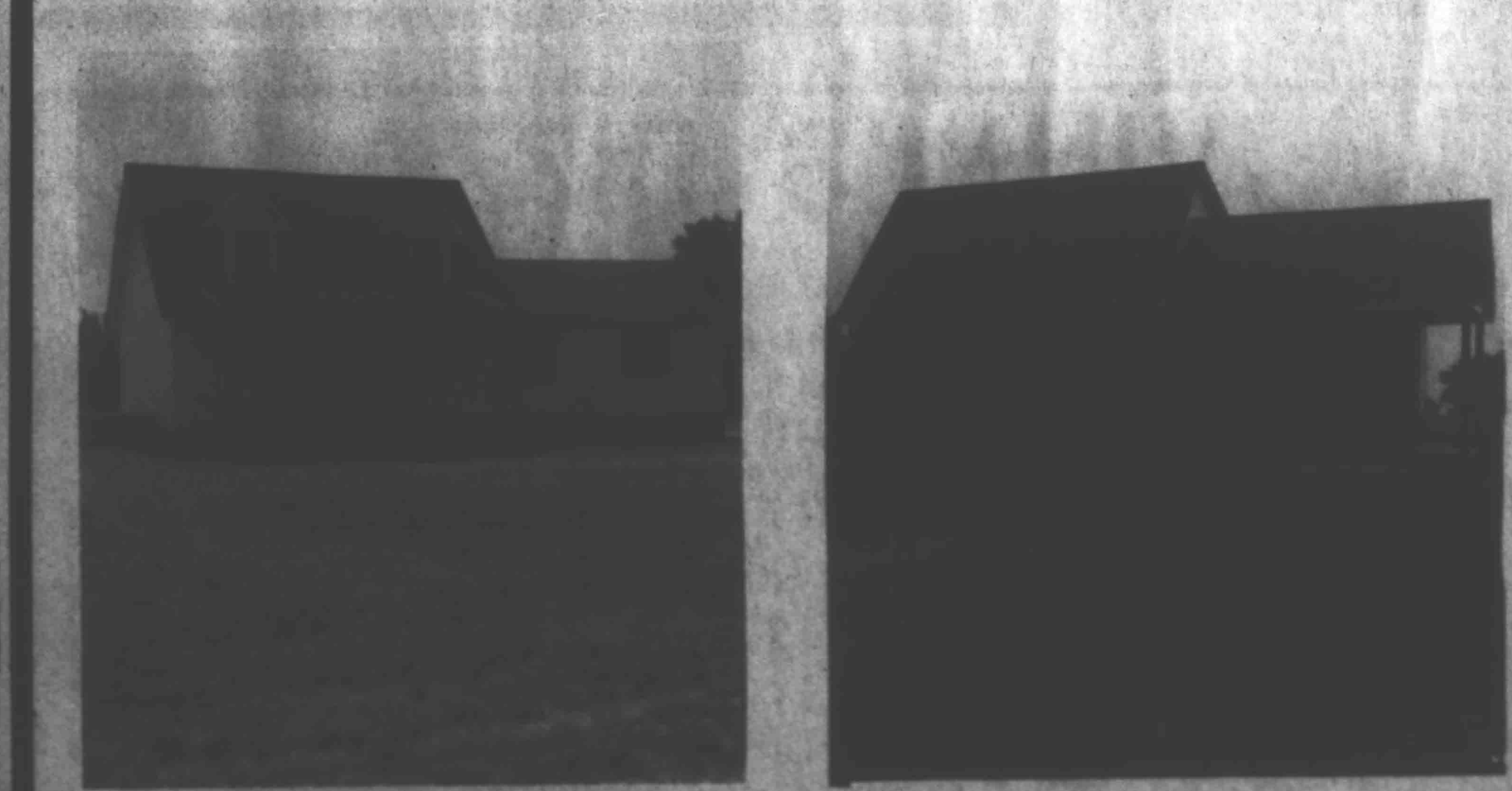
