It's The Big Crunch For Halls Gridders

It's crunch time in District 14-A.

With Lake County's Falcons already assured a state play-off berth, Halls and Trenton will slug it out Friday for the district's other trip to the play-offs.

But they won't be on the same field.

But they won't be on the same field.

Halls' Tigers will be in South Fulton, where they must win to squeeze out Trenton. That's all it will require.

Trenton will host Greenfield in the hope that Halls loses to South Fulton. In that event, a Tide win from Greenfield would put it in the play-offs.

Both Halls and Trenton were idle last week, when no district games were played.

Greenfield led McKenzie, 11-0, for a 3-6 record. Greenfield remains 0-3 in the district.

Dresden smothered South Fulton, 40-14, with 30 points in the second half.

South Fulton, 5-3, remains 1-2 in the district.

South Fulton's other losses have been to Lake County, 36-14, and Trenton, 36-20.

It has won from Gleason, 40-19, Greenfield, 27-0, Fulton City, 14-6, Murray, Ky., 32-12, and McKenzie, 24-0.

Coming off 2-8 and 5-5 seasons under coach Gwin Wood, SF's Red Devils are lop-sided this season, with a dozen seniors and a dozen freshmen on its squad of 40, which is richer in runners than in blockers.

It planned to exploit its backfield strength from an I-wing and I-power offense, with a 5-3 defense (sometimes 6-2).

There's some air attack there, though. The Devils' junior full-back, Michael Allen (5-10, 186) rushed for his first TD Friday, 44 yards. For his second, he took a 44-yard pass from Dave Barclay.

In all, the Devils, out-rushed 255-117, linked four of 12 tosses for 85 yards, though intercepted twice. Dresden completed two of 10 for 10 yards.

Senior tail-back James Jones (5-10, 180) provided South Fulton's conversion points in the 40-14 loss to Dresden.

He was introduced by Darrell Climer.

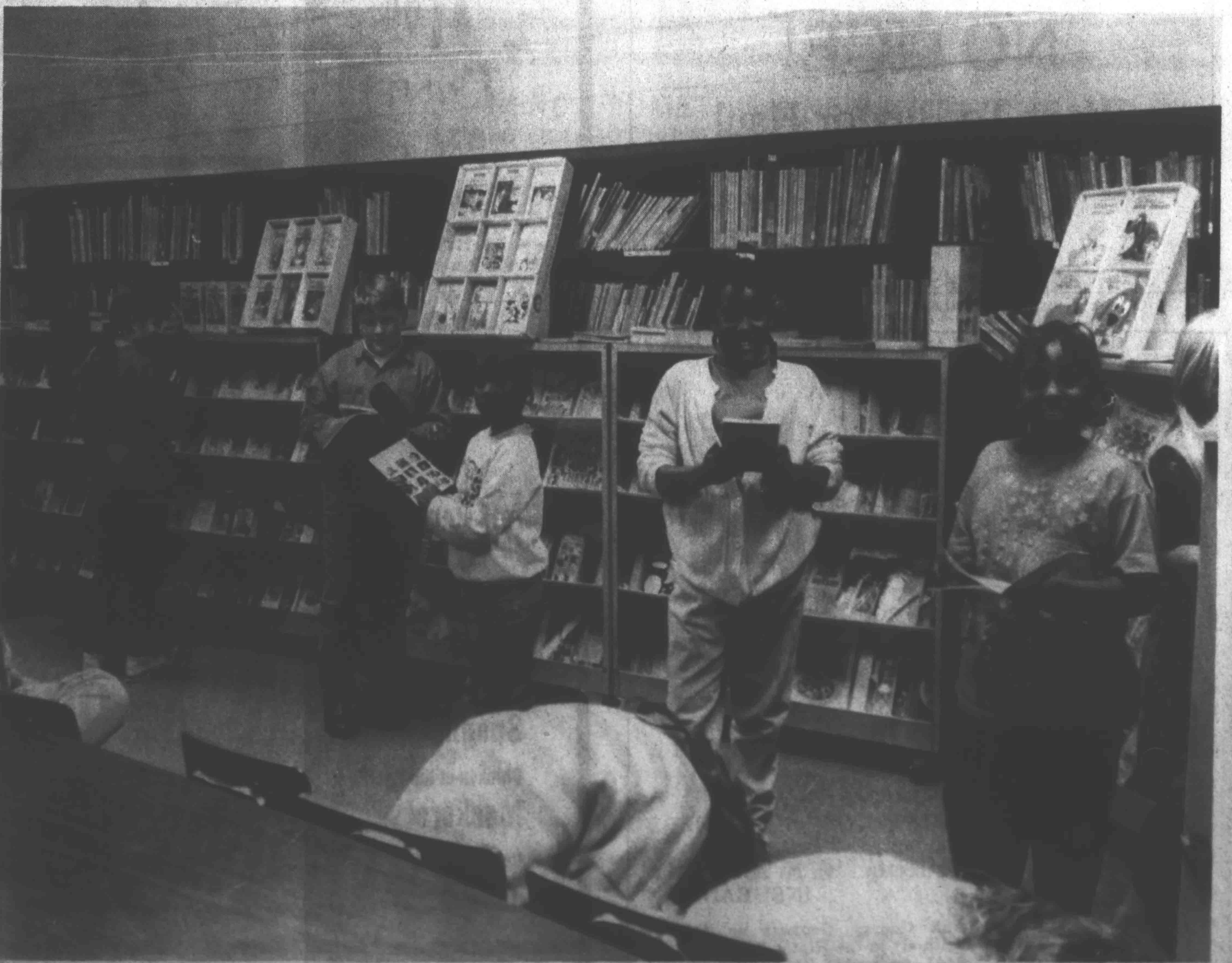
Kellar Lane Houses Set

CATFISH EN PAPILLOTE

1 tablespoon soy sauce
3 tablespoons dry sherry
2 tablespoons chopped scallions
1 clove garlic, minced
1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
4 Mississippi farm-raised catfish fillets, about 6 oz. each, cut into 2-inch cubes
1 red pepper, cut julienne
2 ounces thinly sliced ham, cut julienne
8 lemon slices

Combine the first 6 ingredients in a bowl. Cut 4 (12 x 12") square pieces of parchment paper. Fold each to form a triangle and open. Divide catfish among the four papers. Top with red pepper, ham and 2 slices of lemon per packet. Spoon sauce over mixture. Close each packet to form a triangle, then crimp edges to seal tightly. Arrange 2 packets on a microwave-safe plate. Microwave on High for 6 minutes. Let stand 1 minute. Repeat with remaining 2 packets. Arrange packets on serving plates and open carefully at table. Serves 4.

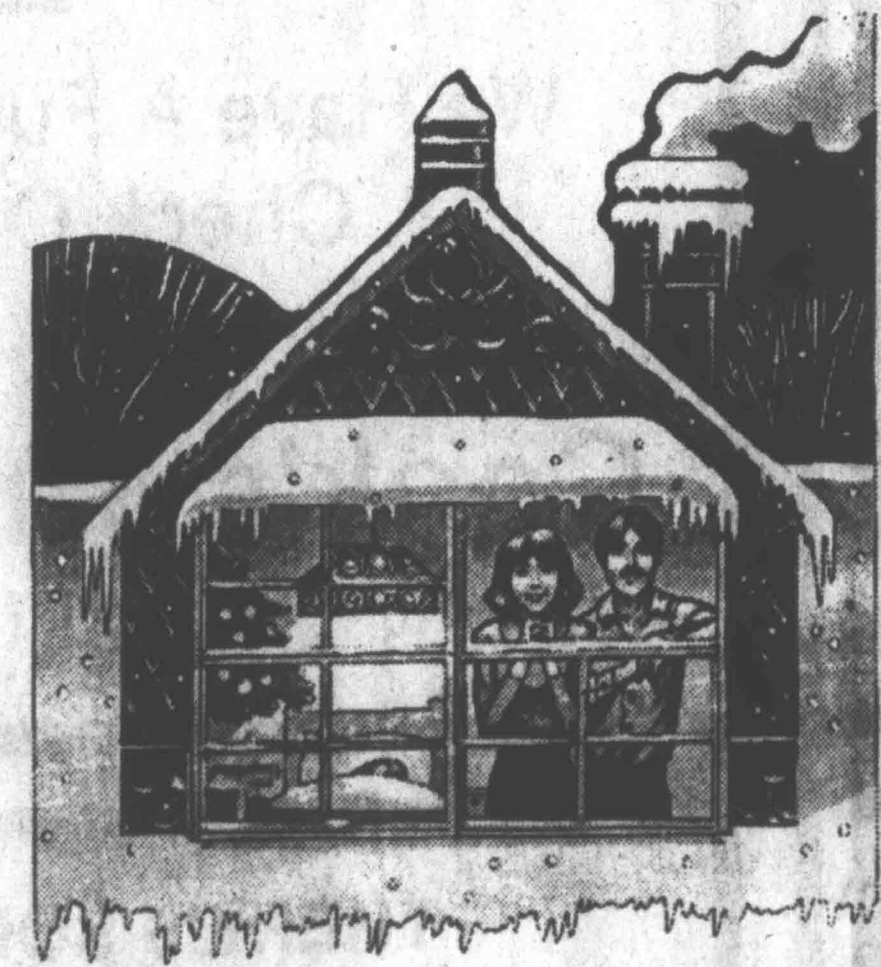

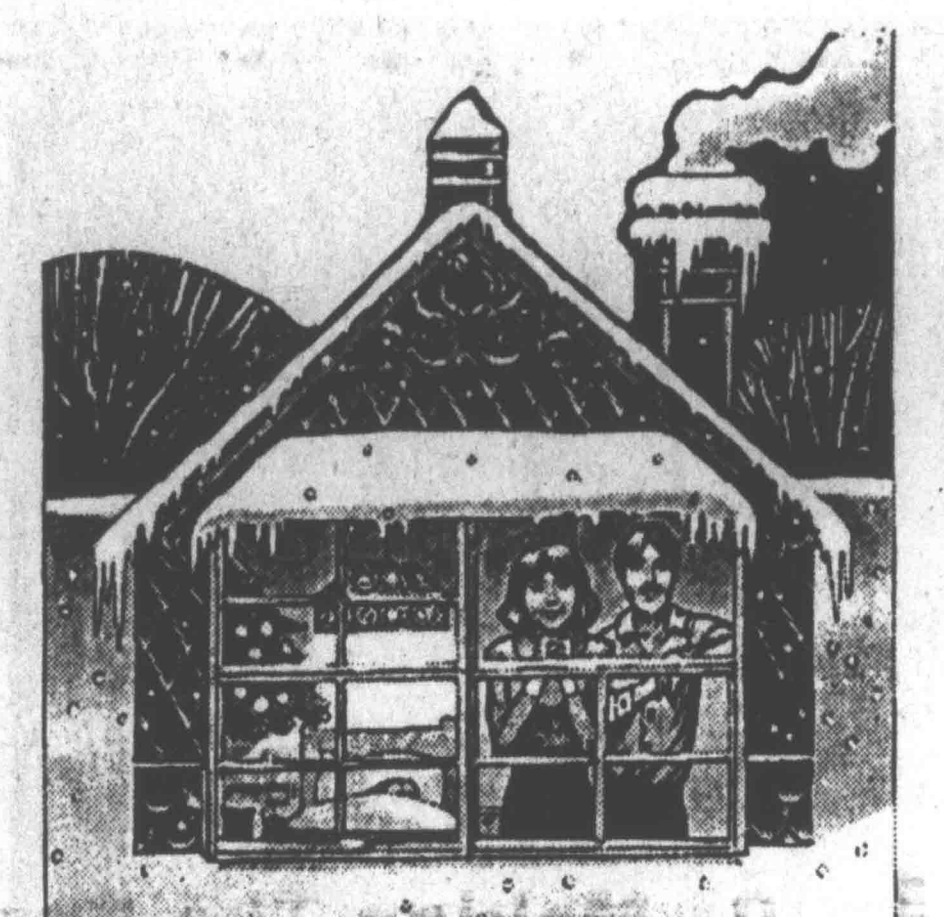

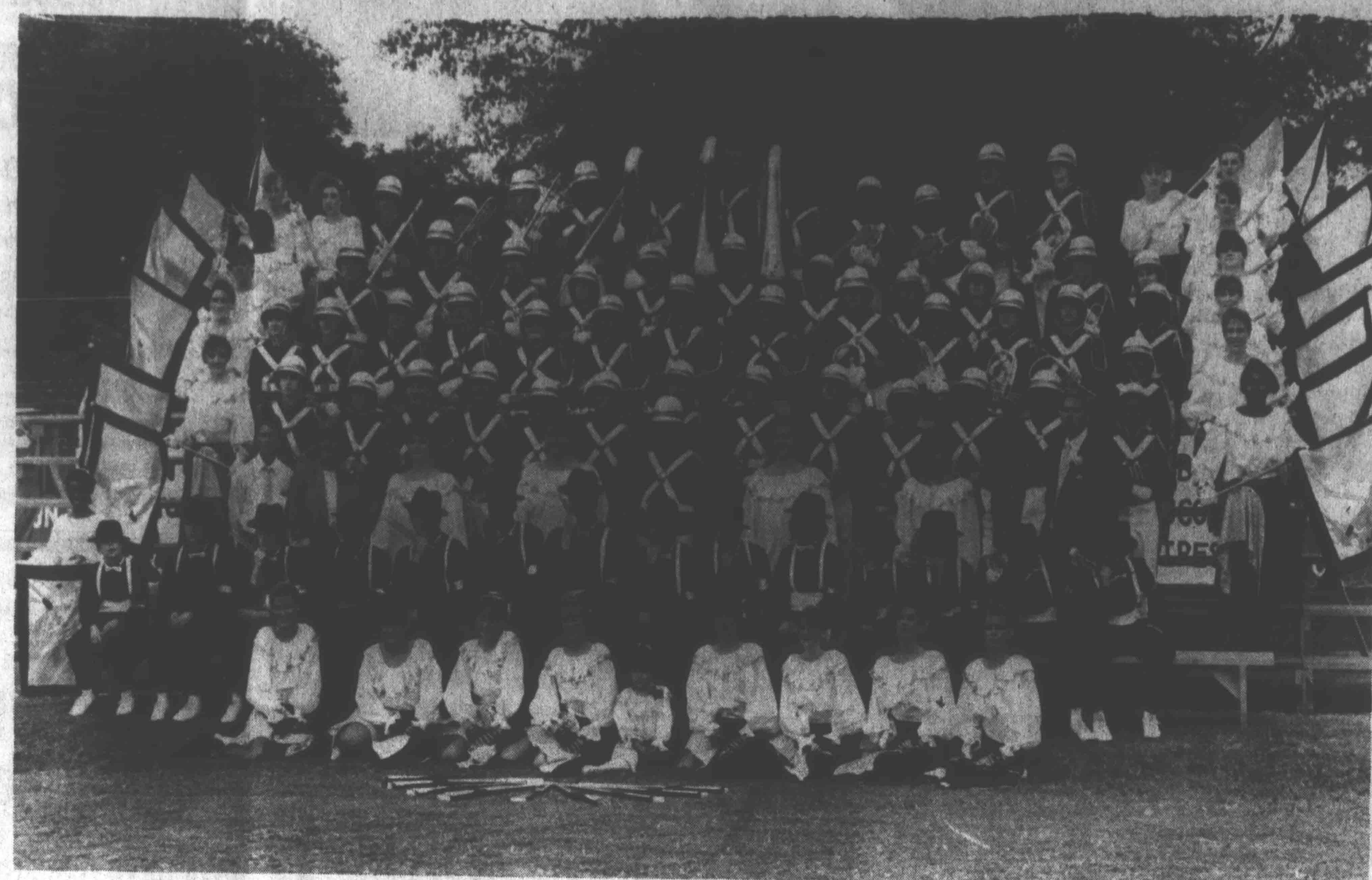

Pharmacy Topics



Now's the time for annual flu shots. Recent studies indicate that current vaccines are no more likely than a placebo to cause side effects. Shots are recommended for those over 65 or otherwise at risk.

Blood test results can vary depending on whether the patient sits or lies down, reports the British journal, Lancet. Many blood components—cholesterol, triglycerides, even iron and calcium—test more accurately if samples are taken from a sitting position.

Profoundly deaf people can hear language and even understand words by means of laboratory devices that transmit at high ultrasonic ranges, researchers at the Medical College of Richmond found. More testing is expected.

Test distribution has been approved by the FDA for tacrine, an experimental drug for Alzheimer's disease. Manufacturer can sell the drug at the same time as it is being tested. Advocates seek to speed approval because no other treatment is available.

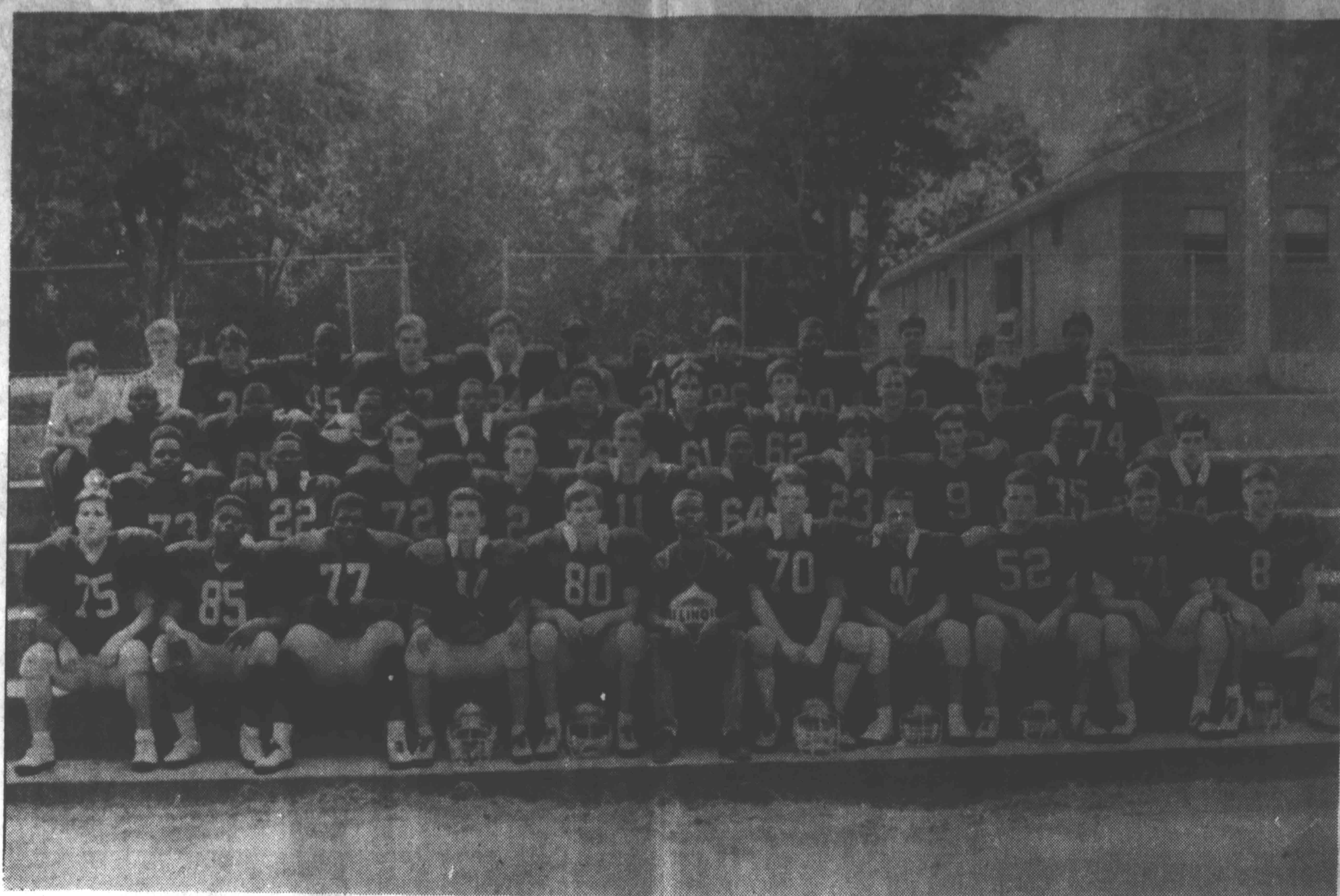

He spoke Monday evening to the Obion County Historical Society, which is displaying this photo and other mementos of WWII in its museum (1004 Edwards St., Union City, open 1-4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays).

His story has been summarized by John Brannon, in The Union City Daily Messenger, as follows:

"We started training for the next campaign. Everybody knew it was Kyushu, the main island of Japan. I had been through four campaigns and been wounded in two of them. I knew I wouldn't make it through this one. I had enlisted in the Marines on Jan. 16, 1942, and I didn't get leave after boot camp. So I hadn't seen my family since then, and that was one of the things that bothered me.

"So I sat in my tent and prayed. I prayed all the time through the Pacific—the 23rd Psalm and the 34th Psalm—"I seek the Lord and He heard me and delivered me from all my fears." While I was praying, I asked the Lord to let me come home and see my family and then I'd be ready to go back and face anything.

"The next day a company clerk stuck his head in our tent and said, 'Hey, Sergeant, pack your sea bags! You're going home!'"

In April 1945, the Marine Corps gave Platoon Sgt. Bob McKnight, then 22, a 30-day leave, and he headed for Ripley, his hometown, where he had been graduated from Ripley High School in 1941.

At Ripley, he found that like him, his brothers had gone off to war. But he saw his mother and father and a sister, and that was more happiness than he'd known in a long, long time.

After the leave, he returned to duty and was a drill instructor at the U.S. Marine Corps Recruit Depot at San Diego, Calif., until he was discharged Jan. 20, 1946.

The Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941, prompted thousands of young American men to join the armed forces. McKnight hitchhiked to Memphis and joined the U.S. Marine Corps.

After boot camp training and combat infantry training at San Diego, he was a member of the original platoon that opened Camp Pendleton, Calif., the well-known Marine training camp. It was at Camp Pendleton that he saw President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who came for dedication ceremonies.

"We thought FDR was the greatest thing that ever was," McKnight said. "I was on Guam when he died. I'd just been transferred by hospital ship from Iwo Jima. I cried like a baby, felt like I'd lost part of my family."

From California, he went with the 3rd Marine Division to New Zealand for more training in preparation for the island campaign. In the close-in jungle fighting of Bougainville, Guadalcanal, and Guam, he became known as "The Nightfighter," because of his command skills in giving the Japanese a dose of their own medicine. A war correspondent heard about him and came for an interview and pictures, and his story was told in The Commercial Appeal and The Sun and Stripes. He became something of a celebrity.

In a soft tone of voice, he said he did it not for medalism, but for survival. It was jungle warfare and he had flamethrowers. We didn't have any "smart bombs" that could be guided right into a concrete bunker.

Both attend the University of Tennessee in Martin, where Kelly is majoring in animal science and Jennifer in agriscience.

He is retired now and spends his days in his workshop and his nights reading. He still has a full head of hair, although it's silvery-white, not the jet black of a young Tennesseean.

Other World War II memorabilia. He was a combat infantryman with Company B, 9th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, that fought in the Battle of Iwo Jima February-April 1944. Of the 256 officers and men assigned to Company B when it went ashore, only one officer and six EM were alive at the end of the fighting.

"Very heavy fighting, a lot of deaths," he said. "The Japs had heavy artillery and mortar and were holed up in concrete bunkers. Iwo was supposed to be a three-day battle. It turned out to be the biggest battle in Marine Corps history. We lost 6,000 lives on Iwo Jima in five weeks time. Desert Storm in five weeks didn't lose 200 people. That's the difference 50 years make."

He has been 50 years since the Pacific campaigns of World War II, but the memories are still strong for McKnight. That is especially true for the day he spoke the prayer in the tent on the island of Guam in 1944, he said.

"I asked the Lord to just let me come home and see my family," he said. "Gone bumps came up all over me and the hairs on my arms stood up. I was raised in the Methodist Church, but this was my first real experience with the Holy Spirit. I never forgot it, and I still live it every day."

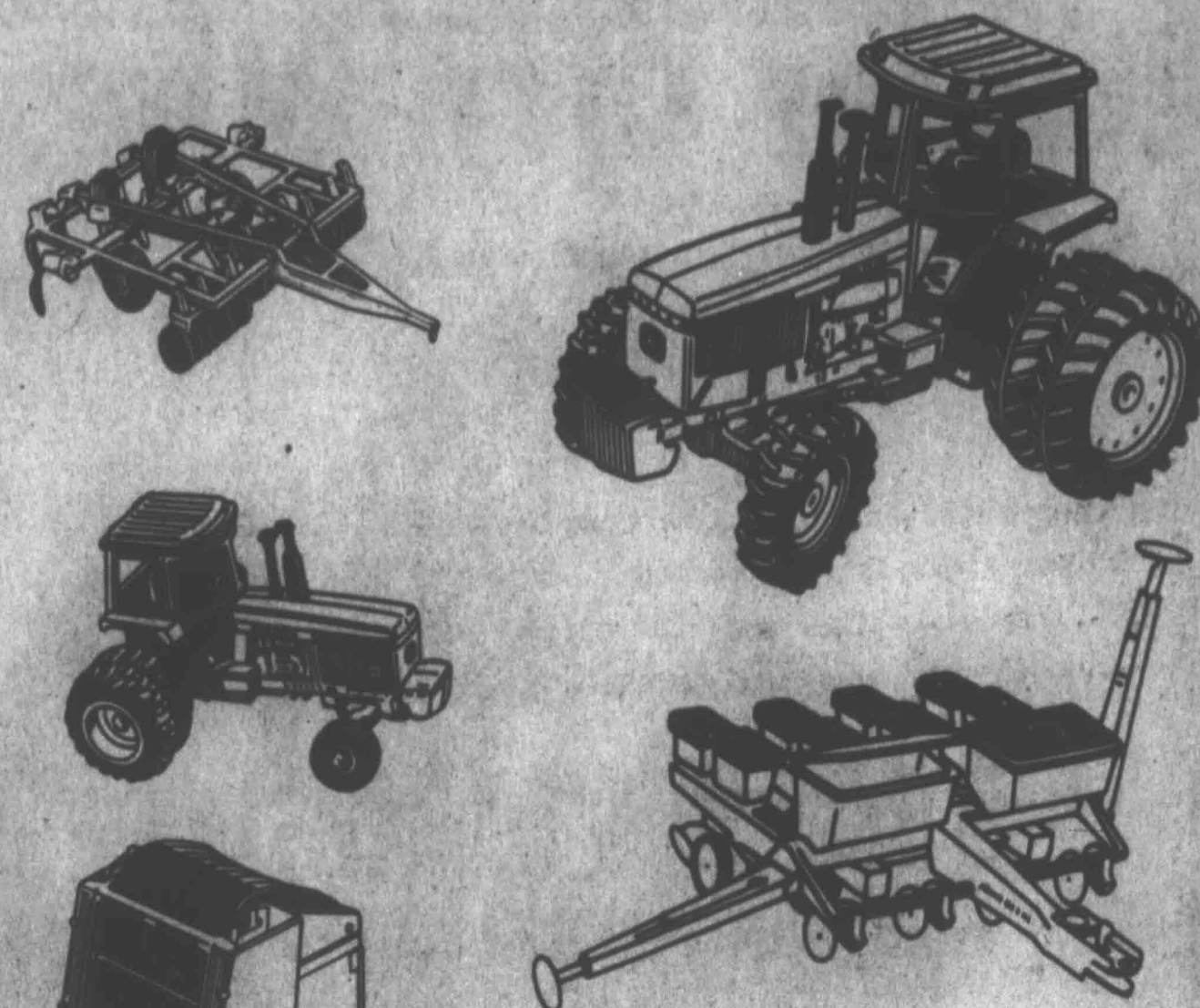

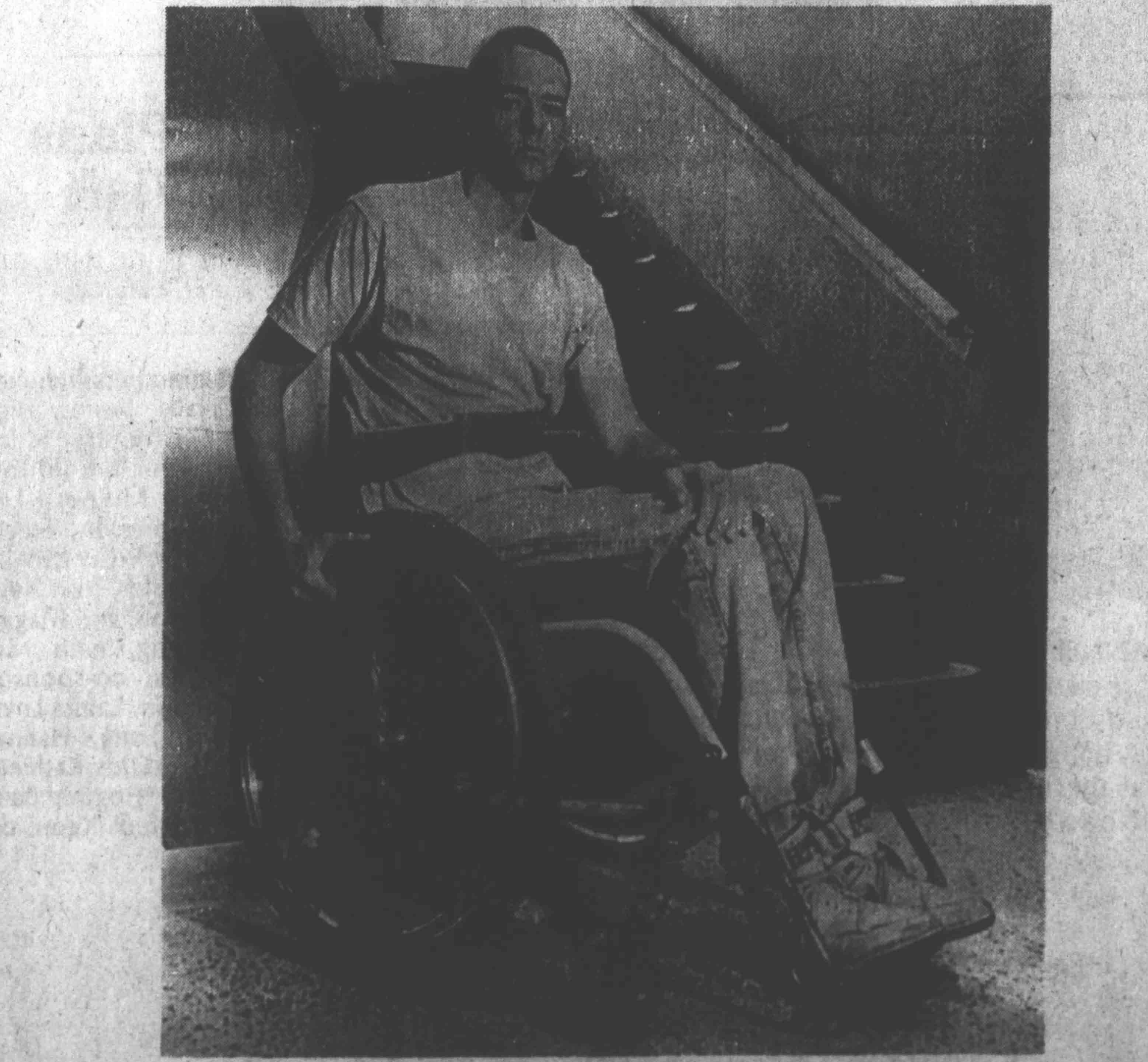

HOUSE APPROVES 1992 DEFENSE BILL

No New B-2 Bombers; Money For Local Armories

The House last week overwhelmingly approved the FY92 defense authorization and appropriation bills that reflect spending limits set by last year's budget agreement and paves the way for the Congress and the Pentagon to focus our defense plans on regional conflicts such as the Persian Gulf War. This change in planning is largely the result of a disintegrating Soviet Union in the wake of the failed coup this past August, and the emergence of the United States as the world's lone superpower.

Although concerns remain about who actually has control of the estimated 30,000 nuclear missiles spread throughout the Soviet Republics, the Russian Army is no longer the same threat that has dominated war and defense planning for the last 45 years.

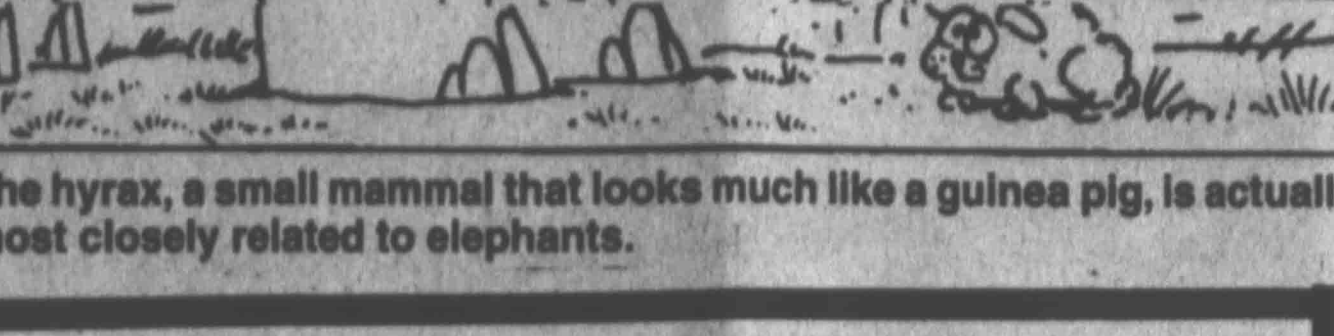
The \$291 billion package includes money for guard and reserve units, a 4.2 percent pay raise for members of our armed forces, and money for weapons systems including the Strategic Defense Initiative. It orders no additional B-2 'Stealth' bombers beyond the 15 already purchased, and continues steps taken last year toward meeting reductions of 25 percent in manpower and defense spending by the end of FY95.

Several items in the bill bear directly on our district. There is money for a new armory in Covington, and renovations and additions to armories in Union City and Jackson. Also, there is \$2 million for the construction of a logistic supply facility at the Naval Air Station Memphis.

All together, the Pentagon's spending bill includes \$1.05 billion for guard and reserve units across the country.

The compromise defense bill is not, however, without controversial issues. It does set aside money for one additional B-2 bomber, but only if approved by both the House and Senate. That action virtually stops the troubled program in its tracks. Questions remain about the plane's stealthiness and it still lacks roughly five years of performance testing required to ensure there are no bugs in the plane. Three of the 15 B-2s ordered so far have been delivered.

As a member of the joint House-Senate Conference Committee, I could not justify paying \$865 million a copy for the B-2

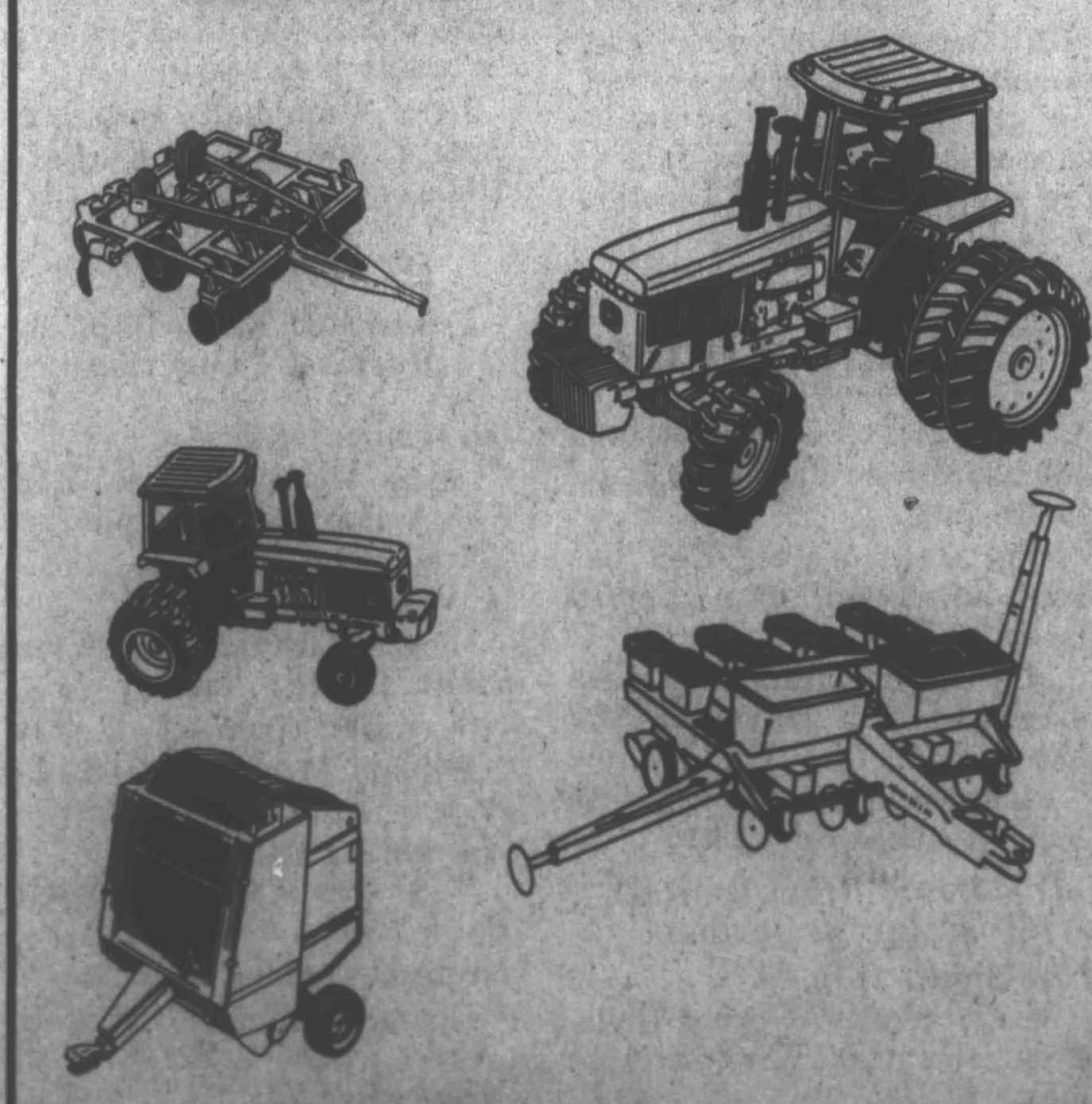

To The Citizens Of Halls:

On Monday night, Dec. 2nd at 7:30 P.M., the Town of Halls Mayor and Board of Aldermen will meet to discuss a very serious change in the Town's Beer Ordinance.

At the present time, the Beer Ordinance reads, "a business cannot sell beer within 1000 feet of a public meeting place such as a church, park, school, community center, etc."

At the October board meeting, Wayne Alley, chairman of the city's Beer Board, recommended that the Beer Ordinance be changed from 1000 feet to 500 feet. This recommendation was due to a businessman wanting to purchase a business in Halls, but the business could not sell beer with the present 1000 foot Beer Ordinance.

After much discussion, the Board of Aldermen voted 3 to 2 to pass the first reading to change the ordinance to 500 feet. It takes 2 readings to pass or change a city ordinance.

Barry Britt and myself voted against the motion to change, Noel Sherrod was absent and the remaining 3 aldermen voted yes for the ordinance change.

The aldermen that voted for the change, did so primarily to give the public a chance to voice their opinion at a public hearing.

After some investigating by Alderman Barry Britt, he found that the members of the Beer Board had not met on this issue. So the recommendation did not come from the Beer Board, only from chairman Wayne Alley.

I am against changing this Beer Ordinance for these reasons. Four years ago, I made a commitment, with the Halls Police Department, to the citizens of Halls, that we would activate a program to fight our town's drug problem. This has been a slow and learning process. We obtained information and guidelines. We established a drug fund. We hired an investigator, primarily targeted against drugs. We also receive help from a state drug task force. The Town of Halls has been very successful in the battle with drugs. It has been a joint effort starting with the vote and support of the Board of Aldermen, Halls Police Department, Sheriff's Department, and the State of Tennessee Task Force.

Alcohol is the number 1 drug in the drug problem this country faces today. Even though voting against this ordinance will not stop people who want to purchase beer, it will make it less possible for them to purchase beer in our town.

In order to see both sides of the coin, I will share this information.

The taxes that the Town of Halls received last year from beer sales was approximately \$34,000. That seems like a lot of revenue, but when you consider the Town of Halls is operating with a two million dollar budget, it plays a small part of our town's revenue.

There will be a public hearing before the board meeting at 6:30 P.M. on Dec. 2nd. Please make an effort to attend and let the Mayor and Aldermen know your feelings.

My Christian beliefs and dedication to fight drugs will not allow me to vote to change this ordinance to 500 feet.

We tell our children to say "No" to drugs. It is time for the adults to stand up and say "No" to drugs.
