

Countian Prayed Way Halls Staging Through World War II Yule Parade

BOB McKNIGHT, now 70, of South Fulton, who was graduated from Ripley High School in 1941, is seen in this photo from his World War II service on Bougainville, in the South Pacific, with flags he took from two Japanese soldiers he killed. He spoke Monday evening to the Obion County Historical Society, which is displaying this photo and other mementos of WWII in its museum (1004 Edwards St., Union City, open 1-4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays).

His story has been summarized by John Brannon, in The Union City Daily Messenger, as follows:

"We started training for the next cumpaign. Everybody knew it was Kyushu, the main island of Japan. I had been through four campaigns and been wounded in two of them. I knew I wouldn't make it through his one. I had enlisted in the Marines on Jan. 16, 1942, and I didn't get eave after boot camp. So I hadn't seen my family since then, and

"So I sat in my tent and prayed. I prayed all the time through the Pacific — the 23rd Psalm and the 34th Psalm — 'I seek the Lord and He heard me and delivered me from all my fears.' While I was praying, I asked the Lord to let me come home and see my family and then I'd be ready to go back and face anything. "The next day a company clerk stuck his head in our tent and said,

'Hey, Sargeant, pack your sea bags! You're going home!'"

In April 1945, the Marine Corps gave Platoon Sgt. Bob McKnight, hen 22, a 30-day leave, and he headed for Ripley, his hometown, where he had been graduated from Ripley High School in 1941. At Ripley, he found that like him, his brothers had gone off to war. But he saw his mother and father and a sister, and that was more happi-

ness than he'd known in a long, long time. After the leave, he returned to duty and was a drill instructor at the U.S. Marine Corps Recruit Depot at San Diego, Calif., until he was







This change in planning is largely the result of a disintegrating Soviet Union in the wake of the failed coup thi past August, and the emergence of the United States as the world's lone superpower

Although concerns remain about who actually has control of the estimated 30,000 nuclear missiles spread throughout the Soviet Republics, the Ru Army is no longer the same threa that has dominated war and defense planning for the last 45

The \$291 billion package i ludes money for guard and reserve units, a 4.2 percent pay raise for members of our armed forces, and money for weapon systems including the Strategic Defense Initiative. It orders no additional B-2 'Stealth' bomber beyond the 15 already purchased and continues steps taken last yea toward meeting reductions of 25 percent in manpower and defense spending by the end of FY95

Several items in the bill bear directly on our district. There money for a new armory Covington, and renovations a additions to armories in Unior City and Jackson. Also, there is \$2 million for the construction of logistic supply facility at the Naval Air Station Memphi

All together, the Pentagon's spending bill includes \$1.05 billion for guard and reserve units across the country.



To The Citizens Of Halls:

On Monday night, Dec. 2nd at 7:30 P.M., the Town of Halls Mayor and Board of Aldermen will meet to discuss a very serious change in the Town's Beer Ordinance.

At the present time, the Beer Ordinance reads, "a business cannot sell beer within 1000 feet of a public meeting place such as a church, park, school, community center, etc."

At the October board meeting, Wayne Alley, chairman of the city's Beer Board, recommended that the Beer Ordinance be changed from 1000 feet to 500 feet. This recommendation was due to a businessman wanting to purchase a business in Halls, but the business could not sell beer with the present 1000 foot Beer Ordinance. After much discussion, the Board of Aldermen voted 3 to 2 to pass the first reading to change the ordinance to 500 feet. It takes 2 readings to pass or change a city ordinance.

New Mitchell Grove Baptist Church held a Thanksgiving dinner after services Sunday. Births Barry Britt and myself voted against the motion to change, Noel Sherrod was absent and the remaining 3 aldermen voted yes for the ordinance change.

The aldermen that voted for the change, did so primarily to give the public a chance to voice their opinion at a public hearing.

After some investigating by Alderman Barry Britt, he found that the members of the Beer Board had not met on this issue. So the recommendation did not come from the Beer Board, only from chairman Wayne Alley.

I am against changing this Beer Ordinance for these reasons. Four years ago, I made a commitment, with the Halls Police Department, to the citizens of Halls, that we would activate a program to fight our town's drug problem. This has been a slow and learning process. We obtained information and guidelines. We established a drug fund. We hired an investigator, primarily targeted against drugs. We also receive help from a state drug task force. The Town of Halls has been very successful in the battle with drugs. It has been a joint effort starting with the vote and support of the Board of Aldermen, Halls Police Department, Sheriff's Department, and the State of Tennessee Task Force.

Alcohol is the number 1 drug in the drug problem this country faces today. Even though voting against this ordinance will not stop people who want to purchase beer, it will make it less possible for them to purchase beer in our town.

In order to see both sides of the coin, I will share this information.

The taxes that the Town of Halls received last year from beer sales was approximately \$34,000. That seems like a lot of revenue, but when you consider the Town of Halls is operating with a two million dollar budget, it plays a small part of our town's revenue. Failure of Congress to fund Low Income Energy Assistance Programs for the Delta Human Resource Agency has delayed the Regular Heating Program and the Emergency Heating Program.

Applicants for the Regular program will be notified as soon as possible. Those not approved for that who have received a cutoff notice, or have less than a month's supply of fuel, and have a household member who is handicapped, over 60 or under six years of age, may apply Jan. 2nd for emergency aid.


