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

Marvin Windows Begins Expansion

Marvin Windows plans to expand its Ripley plant by 200,000 square feet, adding an estimated 115 to 250 jobs here. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held Tuesday morning with plant and local officials in attendance. The company, whose Ripley plant manufactures patio doors, has headquarters in Warroad, Minnesota, and employs about 3,000 there. Construction is to begin immediately and is expected to be completed in about eight months. This is the third expansion in Ripley and will bring the plant to nearly 500,000 sq. ft. and it currently employs about 400.

Tide Ebbed, Halls Hosts Potent USJ

Halls High School's Tigers, who smacked 10th-ranked and previously unbeaten Trenton with a 15-14 defeat in District 14-A last week, this Friday host University School of Jackson, undefeated and atop District 15-A. USJ scored first last week against Memphis's Bishop Byrne but trailed 12-7 at the half. Eight points in the third period, and a 7-6 performance in the fourth, pushed USJ's Bruins to their first 4-0 season mark since 1987.

USJ blanked Skyview Academy, of Memphis, in its debut, 26-0. 7-7 at the half at Jackson Christian, USJ poured 26 points onto the Eagles to win 33-7.

A 64-yard scoring scamper by USJ full-back Matt Dunham, early in the final period, sealed USJ's win from Jackson South Side, 22-16, in their first encounter ever. It was USJ's first win from a Class AA school since the Bruins defeated Chester County in 1988.

See-Saw In Trenton

Trenton's Tide led 7-0 after the first period, but Matt Henderson hit John Sammons for a 21-yard TD to make it 7-6 at the half.

Henderson's 33-yard field goal, in the third period, put Halls ahead, 9-7, and proved decisive.

Though the Tide scored from the two, in the fourth quarter, to lead, 14-9, Phillip Wells plunged from the one to make it 15-14 and a big night for the Tigers.

RHS In Munford For First Game On Road

Off a 23-0 blanking of Martin Westview last Friday, Ripley High School's gridders hit the road this week, for the first time this season, to visit the lair of Munford's Cougars, who play in District 13-AAA.

The Cougars had their best season ever last fall, 7-4, including a defeat of Haywood County and a win from Covington in the Trenton Elks Charity Bowl.

And Munford has seven starters back this season. The squad includes 11 seniors and 15 letter-men.

There's experience in the offensive line, averaging 205, and in running backs, averaging 182.

But all positions lack depth, and the secondary, line-backers, quarter-backs, and receivers aren't veterans.

Coach Mark Fisher hopes a lot of sophomores come through for the Cougars in the second half of the season.

He uses a wing T offense and a split-4 defense.

Munford lost its opener to Millington, 17-15, after the Cougars were ahead, 15-14, with five minutes left, on a safety and a 26-yard TD run by senior tail-back Kimo Naumann (5-11, 170). A 29-yard field goal by David Milner did the Cougars in.

Naumann returned a punt 88 yards for first blood in Munford's first district win, from a weak Bolivar team, 26-6.

Passing prowess came to the fore in Covington, as junior Ronnie Montgomery (5-11, 160) hit junior Shannon Reed (6-0, 198) for a 6-yard first period tally, to open the scoring.

Covington's ground game led 7-6 after the first period but was answered with Cougar tallies by junior Jelani Woodland (17 yards) and a Montgomery toss to soph Randal Baskin for 63 yards to

make it 20-14 at the half and 20-17 at game's end.

Last week, Munford tied Hardin County, 7-7, at the half, then ran away with a 27-7 win.

The week before, Hardin had posted its first victory in 21 games, topping Wayne County, 28-22.

Schools Use Wee Deliver


Postmaster Eddie Webb and other postal workers in Halls are aiding Halls Elementary School with a student Post Office, called "Wee Deliver."

Collins Expands Real Estate Firm

What You Should Know About 900 Numbers

Don't be misled. Calls to 900 numbers are not free. Unlike toll free 800 numbers, you pay for calls to area code 900 numbers by the call or by the minute.

A single call can cost as much as \$50, even if you're only on the line a little while. Charges for calls you make to 900 numbers are billed to your telephone. The charges usually include the cost of making the call and the information you receive. It's much like paying for a C.O.D. package in the mail.

There are many valid uses for 900 service, and reputable companies usually make charges for the call known up front. It's important to make sure you know the cost before you call. You might also want to talk with your family or employees to make sure they know about 900 service charges.

Services offered through 900 numbers are often targeted to people who need money or who've had problems getting a credit card. Others attract children and teenagers with a chance to "talk" to celebrities.

Some numbers are answered by recordings that refer callers to other 900 numbers for the information they seek. Good advice to keep in mind is that if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

The billing and collection for 900 service calls made from Tennessee are regulated by the Public Service Commission. The Public Service Commission also regulates the provision of in-state 900 services. If you have a complaint against an information service provider, you can call the Tennessee Division of Consumer Affairs, 1 800 342-8385.

Your service will not be disconnected for nonpayment of 900 service charges. If you dispute a 900 service charge on your bill, talk with a South Central Bell service representative. You can also request free blocking service to prevent 900 number calls from being made from your phone. Call our residence service center, 557-6500, or our business service center, 557-6000.

Halls Jr. High Houses Models

This writer, who firmly believes that our loved ones are aware of things happening down here when they go to heaven, feels certain that George Niles is now a contented man.

The 'hobby' to which he had devoted most of his life, has now been placed in a permanent home—a home that will enable hundreds of children to view his handwork each year. This new home was made possible, in part, by the efforts of Phillip Jackson, Ripley resident, and principal of Halls Junior High School.

It began with a phone call from Mrs. Virginia Cloys Wells, Mr. Niles' niece, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Cloys, former Riplians and teachers in the Lauderdale County School System for many, many years. I personally will never forget the valiant effort made by Mrs. Cloys to teach me the fundamentals of Algebra I, and succeeding at this amazing feat, going on to attempt Algebra II, and, once again, succeeding, while ignoring my constant resistance to this knowledge that I considered so unimportant.

Mrs. Wells informed Phillip that she had several boxes of her uncle's prized possessions—the products of his favorite pastime—building model planes, trains, boats, cars, trucks, tanks, jeeps, etc. He was told that if he could find no use for the toys, then he was to dispose of them as he saw fit.

When Phillip opened the first box, he soon realized the treasure that he had received. Each of the 317 models was lovingly wrapped, much as a butcher wraps an expensive cut of meat. Each had been gently placed in the boxes with tender care, and the contents marked on the outside of each box. The reason for this was soon apparent to Phillip and to Brenda (Mrs. Jackie) Newman, former school library aide.

Each model is complete...each model has working parts, some as many as 100-150 individual pieces. The words lovingly, gently, and carefully, will all be used many times in this article, but it is the only way to describe the care that Mr. Niles gave each of his models.

George Niles was born in Union City on March 1, 1915. The

son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George H. Niles, Sr., he graduated from Union City High School. He was employed with the Peoples Drug Store in Washington, D. C. before entering the U.S. Army during World War II. He served in Europe until late 1945.

Several years before his retirement, Mr. Niles worked in a local drug store, and made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Cloys. He died June 14, 1989 and is buried in East View Cemetery in Union City. He leaves another sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Niles of Pensacola, Florida; his niece, Mrs. Wells; two great-nieces, Mrs. Michael Zakroff of Boulder, Colo., and Mrs. Lucio Todini of Rome, Italy; one great-great-niece, Norma Zakroff of Boulder, and one great-great-nephew, Marc Todini of Italy.

Also found in a box were individual medicine bottles containing tiny tires and hub caps, mufflers, and even the instruction sheets for each of the models, and the most personal touch of all, Mr. Niles' 'wish list'. Written in his own intricate handwriting, he wishfully listed all the models he wanted or needed to complete a set or collection.

Phillip, Mrs. Newman, and several junior high students began the careful task of putting back some of the very delicate pieces that had come off the models since they had apparently been stored in an attic. They had feared better than anyone would ever dreamed, due, in part, to the way they had been wrapped for storage.

If you are interested in seeing this interesting display, get in touch with Phillip Jackson. He'll be glad to show it to you, and you'll come away feeling that you have shared a major part of a man's life.

In going over the display with Brenda, she was able to point out some interesting observations. First, noting the earlier models and their paint jobs, you could



Bob Mays Passes; Shot Down in War Komatsu Dresser Expanding Plant

Robert Leland Mays, 75, of Ripley, World War II pilot who escaped to Spain after having been shot down over Nazi-occupied France, died Wednesday of last week in Baptist Hospital in Memphis, after long illness.

Services were at 10 a.m. Saturday in Garner's Ripley Funeral Home, with burial in Maplewood Cemetery.

Mays, who enlisted in 1942, was on his second mission over France on Dec. 12, 1942, when his B-17, "The 1 O'Clock Jump," was hit by enemy fire and crashed with several casualties.

Reported dead, he had parachuted from the bomber and in four days made his way to Spain, on public transportation, dressed as a French farm boy, with the aid of several Frenchmen.

In a train compartment with German soldiers, he kept his feet on the floor because his rubber soles were imprinted "U.S."

A year later, he was assigned to the Air Base in Halls, to train B-17 crews, and married Robin Tucker, daughter of the late William Tucker III, of Ripley.

After the war, he was employed by the military in Europe and North Africa, as an engineer.

He leaves his wife, who has retired from service with the Lauderdale County Board of Education; five sons, Robert, Jr., of San Antonio, Tex., Bruce and Tom Mays, of Memphis, and Richard Mays, of Memphis; and Michael Kirkpatrick Mays, of Atlanta, Ga.; a daughter, Mrs.

Pharmacy Topics



Someday scientist may be able to spot signs of cancer in ordinary urine tests. So far, researchers at Johns Hopkins University, using molecular diagnostics, have been able to spot mutated genes linked with bladder cancer in cells naturally shed in urine.

Patients with life-threatening asthma can be helped with large doses of triamcinolone, say researchers at Albert Einstein College of Medicine—Montefiore Medical Center, Bronx, New York. The drug is given over three days and the effect lasts six to nine months.

New CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) technique is getting good results, say doctors at Seton Hall University School of Graduate Medicine. Pressure is applied to the upper abdomen (in addition to standard CPR) to move arterial blood back toward the heart.

Powerful drug against migraine and cluster headaches—dihydroergotamine—once only available by injection, is now being formulated as a nasal spray. Clinical trials will conclude soon.



Pointers For Parents

Talking To Your Teenager About Drinking

Although parents can be among the most influential people in a young person's life, the U.S. Surgeon General reports that too few parents take time to talk with their children about alcohol and alcohol abuse.

Here are just some of the things you can do to make it easier for you to talk successfully to your teenage children about drinking:

- Be honest with yourself first. Explore your own behavior about alcohol before you talk to your teenagers. How much do you drink? How often? Are you a good role model? Remember, teenagers have a well-developed nose for parents' hypocrisies.
- Pick a calm moment. Discussions should never follow immediately after a family argument or a problem situation related to alcohol use.
- Be ready for some tough questions: "Dad, did you drink underage when you were in high school?" "Mom, did you ever get drunk when you were a kid?" Also, when it comes to facts about alcohol and its use, if you don't have the information, say you'll try to find it; don't pretend.
- Be honest with your children. They deserve it.
- Be calm, patient and non-judgmental. Nothing will turn a teenager off more quickly than to be promised understanding, and then to be scolded when he or she tells the truth.
- Have a generous spirit. Recognize that adolescents are not always able to control the situations they find themselves in. Instead of condemning mistakes, see if you can figure out how a given situation might have been handled differently. Give credit when they exercise good judgement.

Remember, as parents, you carry the major responsibility to create the kind of communication that produces positive results. Your greatest allies in helping your children avoid alcohol abuse are your personal example, sound information and firm and consistent discipline. That is especially important in respect to drinking and driving.







Down on the Farm

With ED JONES

There has been an upsurge in the interest among farmers who feed hogs in recent weeks. There were a number of farmers who had almost reached the point of "throwing in the sponge" so to speak, selling all brood sows, gilts and every hog that remained on the farm. However, the advent of spring grasses and legumes, and a slight increase in market prices of hogs, some have begun to take added interest in their brood sows and feeder pigs.

Last week, I found farmers inquiring about tankage, cotton seed meal and supplement in feed stores. They also wanted worming medicine and delousing materials and from all indications they are getting ready to give their hogs some added attention.

In the April issue of the Breeder's Gazette, the following information is given and I quote, "Stick to your hogs; get rid of any small litter or chuffy sows, but don't throw in the sponge. The hog production cycle is turning. Better days are ahead. In the last 45 years, cycles in the corn hog ratio average slightly over three years from high to low. Varied from 2 to 4 and 5 years. In the present cycle, the ratio dropped from the highly profitable peak of 18.3 in April 1984 to the money losing 9.38 last December—20 months after the high and probably the low point of the cycle. So, the ratio is likely to be quite favorable again in 1987. And if it should continue unfavorable for a longer time, the rise is likely to be all the greater when it does occur."

Thus, I have quoted from the world's greatest authority on hogs.

More Information About Termites

No Limit On Corn Acreage; Hybrid Seed Corn Called Far Superior In Yield

Every farm in this county has an acreage allotment of corn, but farmers should understand that there is no penalty for growing any amount of corn, and it can be sold or fed or handled in any manner.

If a farmer wanted to get price support on his corn next fall, he would have to plant within his allotment, but otherwise the allotment has no effect.

More About Termites

Spraying the wood surfaces under a house with some foul smelling chemical has nothing to do with controlling termites. No reputable termite control operator attempts to control subterranean termites by spraying the surface of infested wood.

Some companies drill holes in the wood in part of the foundation timbers and force an oil solution in these with the idea of controlling termites, but termites are controlled by drying the soil under a house, ventilating that space to keep it dry, seeing that water drains away from the house, and destroying any termites present by poisoning the soil where the colonies are.

It is never possible to impregnate all the timber in a foundation with poison, and if there are wet spots under a building where termites can get water, they can easily build shelter tubes over the treated timber to reach the untreated wood, unless termite shields between the masonry foundation and wood sills prevent this.

Poisoning the soil in wet spots under a house costs very little. When ten gallons of oil solution can be made for as little as \$4.50 or ten gallons of water solution can be made for \$1.25, it just does not cost much to protect a home against termites.

Your Department of Agriculture has prepared an excellent bulletin which explains just how to do the job. It is free on request.

Wheat Allotments

Every farmer who has wheat now which he plans to harvest for grain in June should report that fact to the County ASC, telephone 387, right away.

Every farmer is allowed to grow as much as 15 acres of wheat for grain, but he will need to get a marketing quota card from the County ASC in order to market any of that wheat. For that reason, he should report the wheat now in order that the wheat can be measured and the marketing card issued without any expense or delay. Wheat allotments now have no effect on cotton allotments to the same farm.

Plant Hybrid Corn

The right highest yielding full season hybrid varieties of corn tested by the Tenn. Experiment Station for the last three years averaged 80 bushels per acre, with the highest averaging 82.7 bushels.

At the same time the highest yielding full season open pollinated corn averaged only 80 bushels. Hybrid seed corn costs about \$10.00 a bushel which plants about 7 acres.

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

Halls, Trenton Open Before Dist. Crunch

Halls and Trenton, tied for second (and thus for a play-off berth) in District 14-A, both have open dates this week, before next weekend's decisive contests.

Then, Halls must win from South Fulton (5-2), to join Lake County in the play-offs.

If Halls loses in South Fulton, and Trenton tops Greenfield (2-5), in Trenton, Trenton joins Lake in the play-offs.

The play-off race comes down to the wire because previously unbeaten Lake lost last week to Trenton, 21-10.

Had Lake won, Halls' victory over Greenfield last Friday would have provided the Tigers a play-off berth.

Despite three starters on the bench (Richie Belton, Blake Moore, and Wayne Moody), Halls led the Yellow Jackets 12-0 at the half on tallies by tail-back Jason Stinson, from the three and the one.

Quarterback Matt Henderson went nine yards for the night-cap in the third.

He connected on four of six passes for 70 yards and was intercepted once.

The Jackets completed seven of 11 passes for 78 yards and were intercepted twice.

The ground game was all Halls - 15 first downs to nine, 196 yards to 100.

Halls was also aided by five penalties, for 50 yards, against Greenfield. Halls caught only three penalties, for 20 yards.

U. S. agriculture exports more than any other nation - one seventh of world exports, and 50 percent more than second-place France. Farmers receive about 24 cents from each dollar spent on U. S. grown food. The other 76 cents goes for processing, packaging, transportation, and marketing. (In 1980, farmers got 30 cents). The average cow produces enough milk each day to serve 25 people.

Direct government payments make up only 6 percent of farm cash income.

With a win, Dyer County can nail down a post-season play-off berth.

Covington's win from Ripley last week, in second overtime, 20-13, also tied the Tigers and the Chargers at 4-4 overall.

Ripley led 7-0 at the half, on Loren Vaughan's score from the one, but Brian Smith loped 73 in the third to tie the game.

In the first overtime, Shaun Bonds scored for Ripley, from the three, and Smith for Covington, from the nine, but both kicks failed.

Smith went 10 yards in second overtime to put the game away.

Ripley had led the Chargers with 16 first downs to four and completed 12 of 22 passes for 121 yards. Covington's only serial failed, and it lost two of three fumbles.

The Chargers, however, led on the ground, 169 yards to 124.

Dyer County's Choctaws are in district action this year for the first time since 1984.

They didn't care for the schedule which district competition would have required.

They did compete - vigorously - in district basketball.

This year, the Tenn. Secondary Schools Athletic Assn. won't allow that. To compete in district basketball, a school must compete in district football.

Another shake-up in Newbern this fall was the departure of head grid coach Harry Tignor (35-5 in four seasons of independent play), three days before 2-a-day practices began, to become a vice-principal in Greenfield. Coach Frank Hodges followed him to Greenfield to become girls' basketball coach.

Tignor's assistant last fall, Russ Fulwood, took the Choctaws' helm with 19 seniors on the squad, including 10 returning starters on offense and eight on defense.

Easy to spot at tackle was Marcus Bernard (6-5, 285), flipping to nose guard in a 5-3 defense.

Behind senior quarterback Ross Maldonado (6-1, 170) in the split back-field, senior Jason Mayfield (5-11, 185), last fall's leading rusher for the Choctaws, hasn't let up a bit and boots reliably.

Maldonado tossed scoring strikes to split-end Jason Butler (5-9, 160), for 70 yards, and tight-end Scott Foster (5-1, 185), for 12, to begin the Choctaws' 33-30 victory over Westview last week.

Dyer County led Covington 52-13. Its two losses have been narrow - to Chester County, 14-13, and Union City, 17-14.
