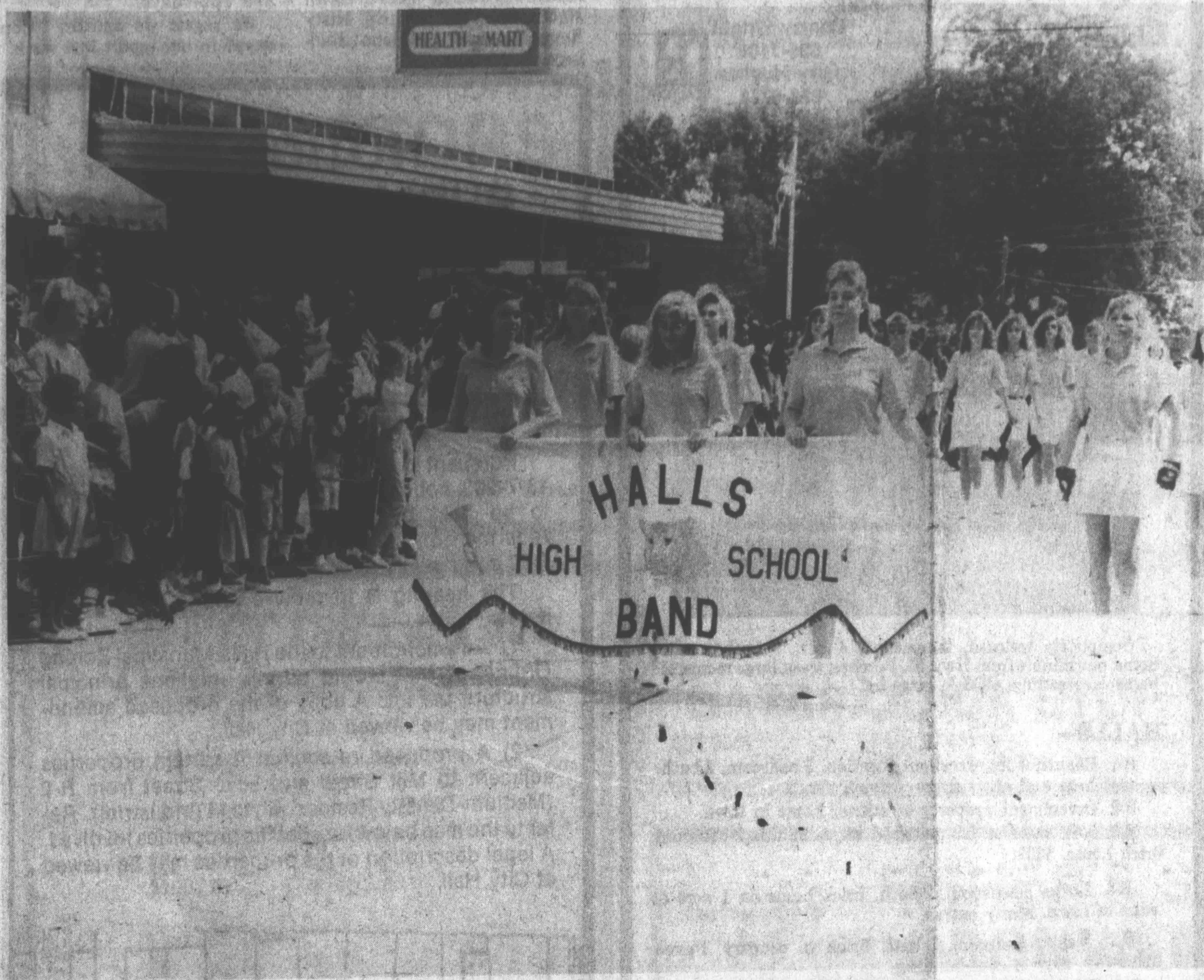

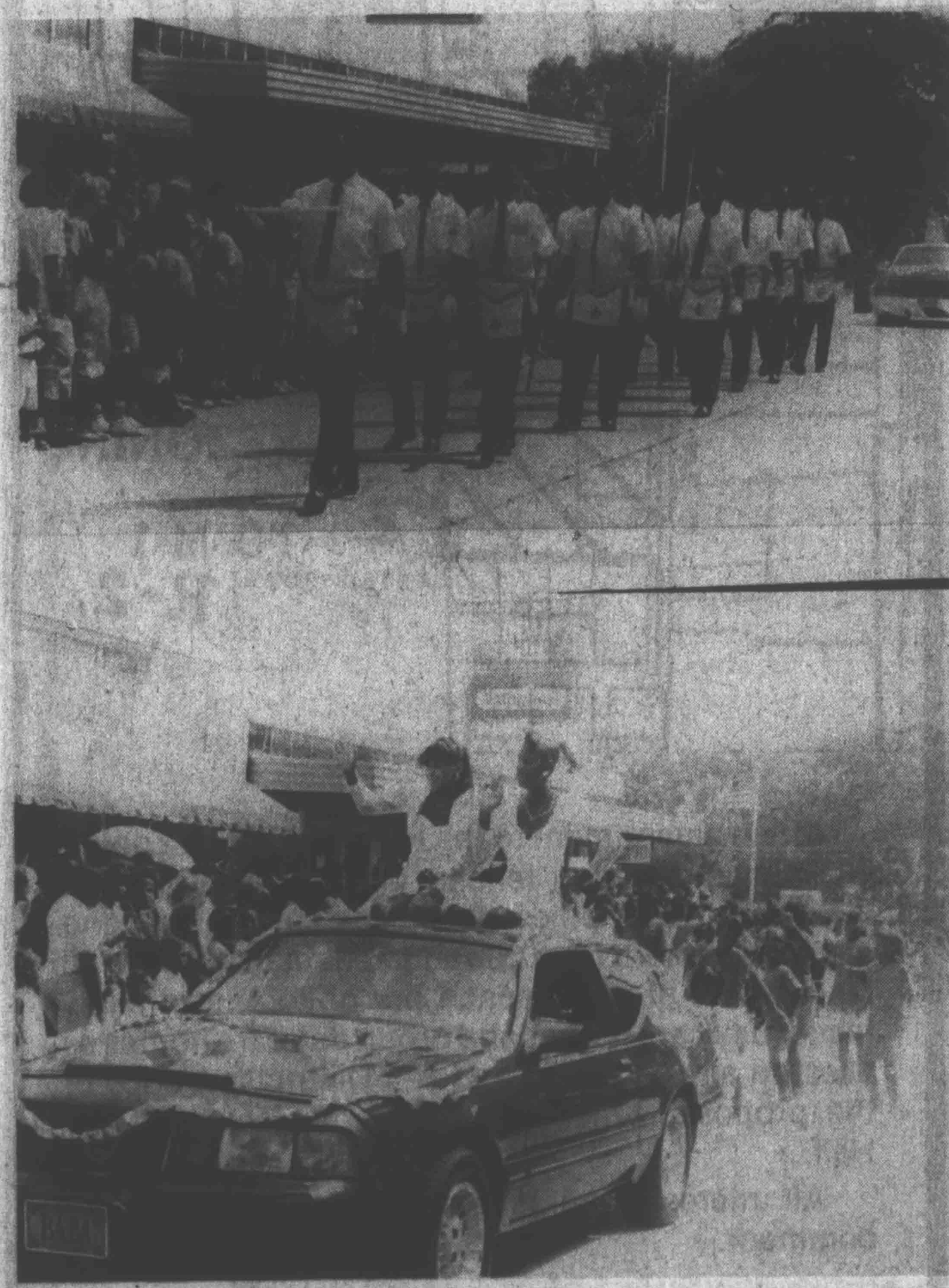

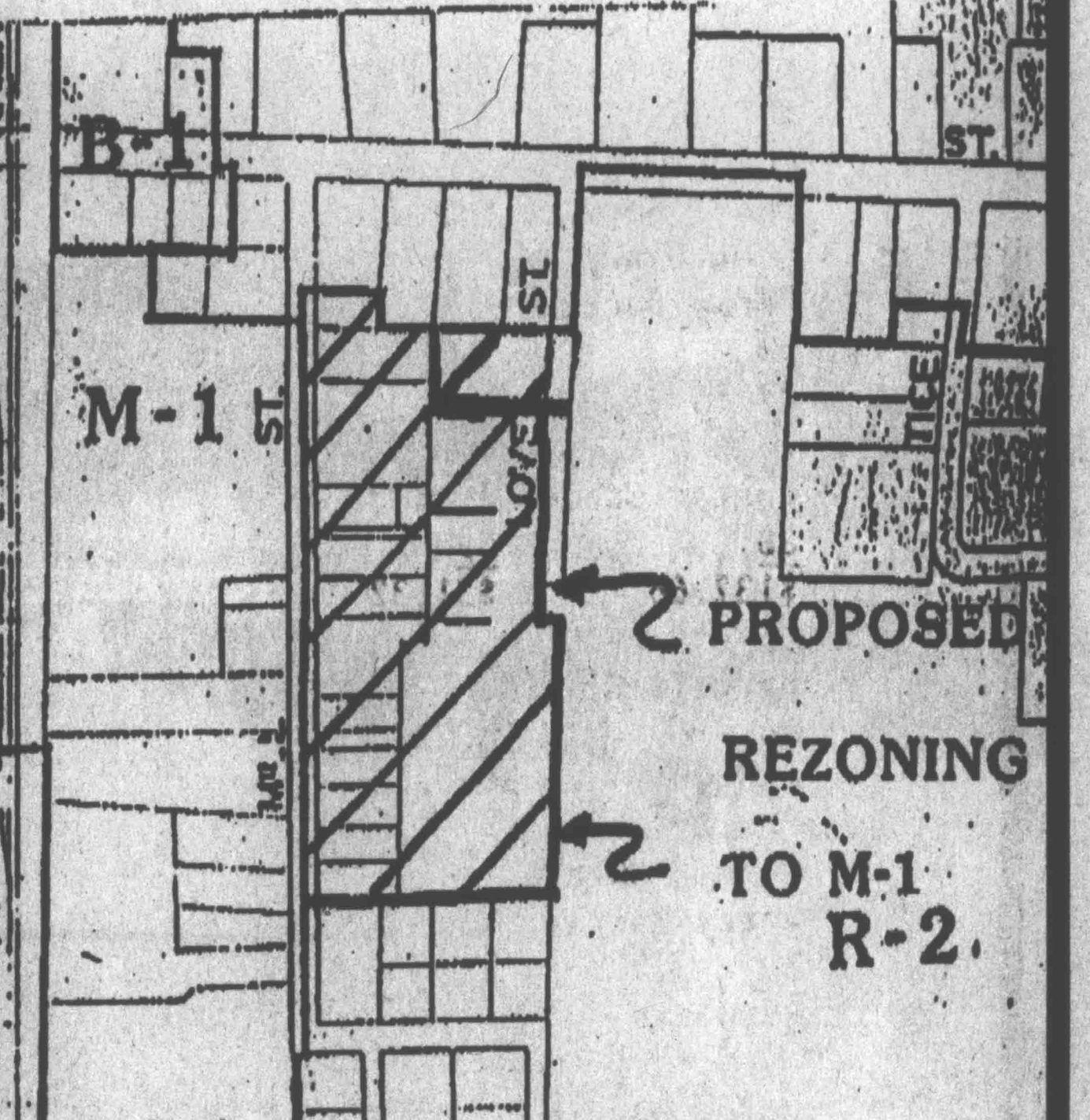

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 13-7-203, notice is hereby given of a public hearing to be held by the Halls Mayor and Board of Aldermen on the 16th day of September, 1991, at 6:30 p.m., in City Hall.

The hearing is to receive public input into 3 items:

- 1) An amendment to the Halls Municipal Zoning Ordinance that would permit only one principal structure per lot. A copy of the proposed amendment may be viewed at City Hall.
- 2) A proposed re-zoning of certain properties adjacent to Mill Street and Love Street from R-2 (Medium-Density Residential) to M (Industrial). Refer to the map below for specific properties involved. A legal description of the properties may be viewed at City Hall.



- 3) An amendment to the Halls Municipal Zoning Ordinance reducing fenced play area required for family day care homes, group day care homes, and day care centers from 200 square feet of space to 50 square feet of open space per child and to allow family day care homes and group day care homes as uses on appeal in R-3 and R-4 Districts. A copy of the proposed amendment may be viewed at City Hall.

Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 13-4-303, notice is hereby given of a public hearing to be held by the Halls Board of Mayor and Aldermen on the 16th day of September, 1991, at 6:30 p.m. in City Hall.

The hearing is to receive public input into a proposed amendment to the Halls Subdivision Regulations that establishes a minimum of lot width of fifty (50) feet for all new lots created.

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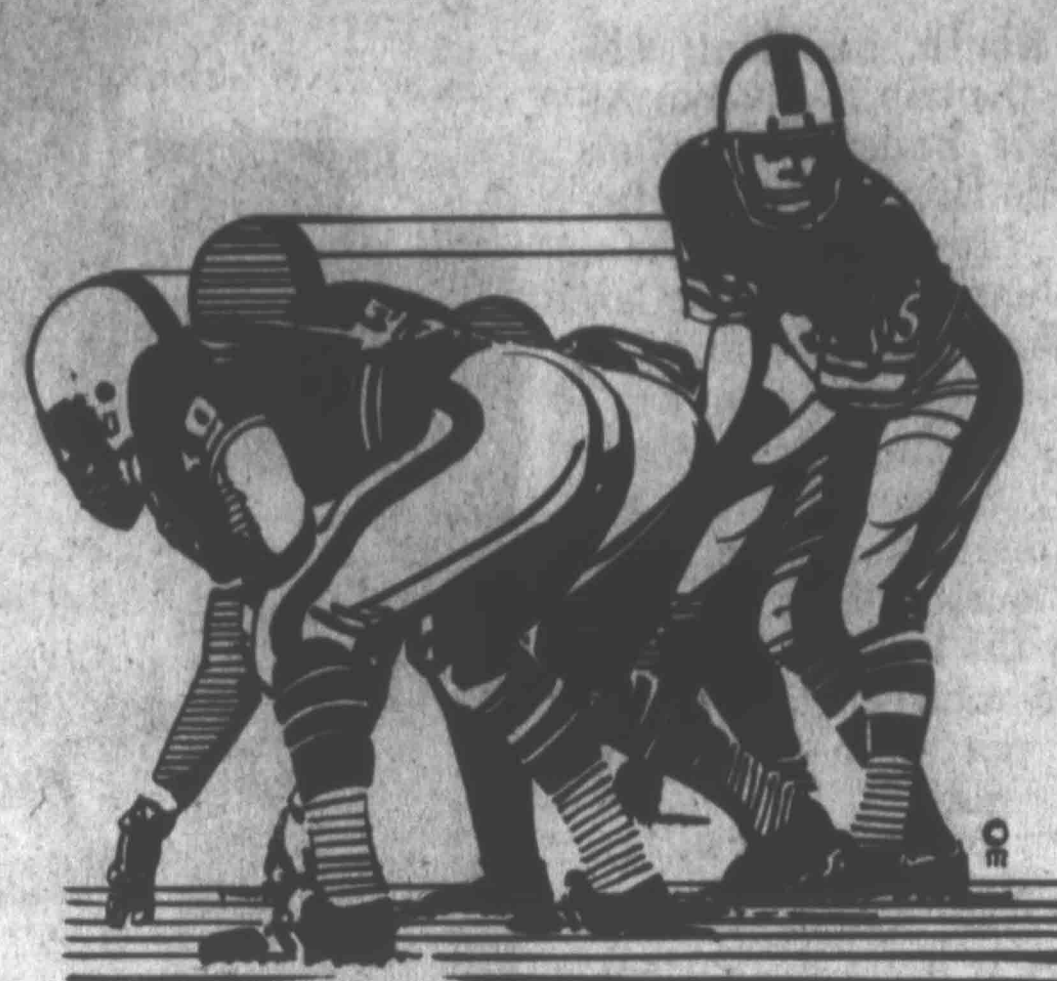

Apple Plum Crisp

4 cups pared, cored, sliced, tart apples
2 cups sliced, pitted plums*
1/2 cup "I Can't Believe It's Not Butter" melted, divided,
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, divided
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon flour
3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon, divided

Preheat oven to 375°F. In large bowl combine 1/4 cup melted "I Can't Believe It's Not Butter", 1/4 cup brown sugar, lemon juice, flour and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Add apples and plums; toss to coat well. Place in an 8 x 8 x 2 inch baking pan. In small bowl combine oats, remaining 1/4 cup "I Can't Believe It's Not Butter", remaining 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and ginger until well blended. Sprinkle over fruit. Bake 30 minutes or until fruit is tender and topping crisp and browned. Makes six servings.
* Or if preferred, use 2 cups pitted, sliced peaches or nectarines.

Ripley's Gridiron Victors Host Memphis Ridgeway

Ripley High School's Tigers, having crushed Gibson County last week, 54-0, in their District 13-AA debut, this Friday host Memphis Ridgeway.

Ridgeway's Roadrunners were District 16-AA runners-up in 1985 and 1986.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

John A. Marks, of Memphis, told about 50 members and guests of the Lauderdale County Historical and Genealogical Society, meeting Sunday in the Farm Bureau Building in Ripley, of his 30-year study of the Civil War.

Born in Giles County, on a farm which was the site of a Civil War skirmish, his life-long interest in the war grew more intense in the 1960s, when he began exploring old encampments and locating artifacts left there.

"I became hooked on my first find," he said. "It was very exciting to think that I was the first person who had touched that item since it was thrown away, more than 100 years before."

His searches in Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi, and Alabama have netted 8,568 minnie balls, 711 uniform buttons, 126 belt buckles, an 1861 Springfield rifle, and many other items. He displayed a selection.

Mrs. Doyle Craft, of Ripley, introduced Mr. Marks, a chemical engineer retired from the Corps of Engineers.

He was accompanied to the meeting by his wife, Dorothy, the James Cravens, and the Ray Vandergriffs, of Memphis.

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

Sufferers of Gaucher's disease improved greatly when given doses of the enzyme lacking in those with the genetic disease, say researchers at the National Institutes of Health, in Bethesda, Maryland. The Food and Drug Administration is expected to approve the treatment soon.

Young women who do not ovulate with each period may be at increased risk of osteoporosis, the New England Journal of Medicine reports. Stress and too much exercise may be the cause; progesterone supplements may be the cure.

Vitamin deficiency may leave a person at risk of emphysema and bronchitis. A Johns Hopkins University study found that a lack of vitamin A seems to affect the growth and development of oxygen pathways to the lungs, much as smoking does.

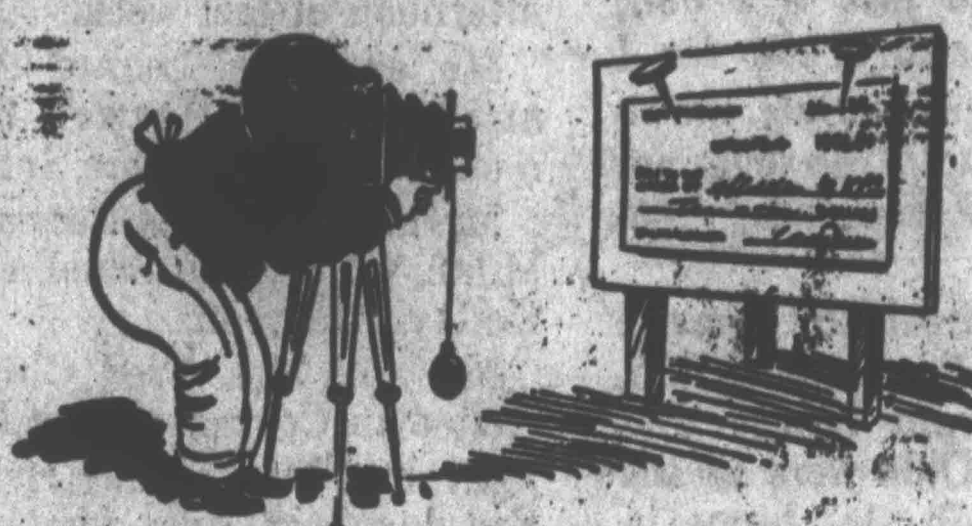

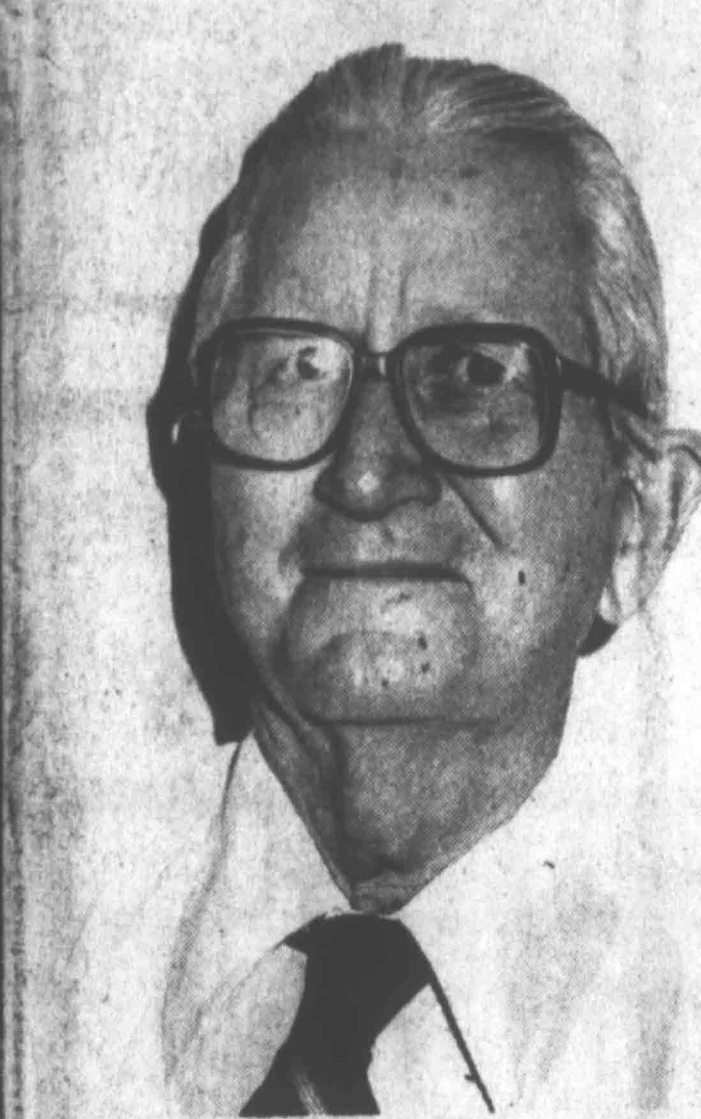
Maurice Gaines Arlington Mayor

TANNER BLASTS FLAWED FOOD SURVEY

The principal federal survey used to track the changing appetites of Americans was so poorly managed that it cost nearly \$1.5 million more than budgeted. In fact, its completion was delayed at least two years and it is still riddled with flaws so bad that an expert panel of independent scientists agreed the survey was "poorly executed" and urged against the use of the survey's results.

A new congressional report, produced by the General Accounting Office (GAO) at the request of the chairman of the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology, has raised serious questions about how our country's nutrition monitoring system has been operated.

The results from the Nationwide Food Consumption Survey conducted in 1987 and 1988 are not useable and, at the very least, reflect inadequate oversight of the \$7.6-million survey on the part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Indeed, some government agencies like the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have wisely decided to ignore this latest survey.

It is particularly perplexing to me that with the results of this survey, generally viewed as vital information about nutritional trends, we now find ourselves in the uncomfortable position of being told they are largely worthless.

Considered the government's leading source of nutritional trends in America, the survey is done only every 10 years. Its results are used by officials at many state and federal agencies to set policies on issues as diverse as school lunch programs and food labeling.

The EPA, for example, relies on the information to help it regulate human exposure to pesticide residues on foods. We all remember the Alar-apple scare; without the survey data EPA cannot judge how seriously to take this threat. The data taken from this survey also is used to help establish nutritional guidelines for the nation's \$24 billion domestic food assistance programs. The results are critical to the USDA's development of the Thrifty Food Plan, the guideline for benefit levels in the nation's food stamp program.

As a member of the Committee's investigations and oversight panel, I am keenly interested in how the money appropriated by Congress is spent for projects that directly affect the American people. I am deeply disturbed when the GAO tells me that the USDA's handling of the survey's contract "demonstrates how a federal contract should not be managed."

The survey's contract was awarded to Philadelphia-based National Analysts in September 1986 at a cost of \$6.2 million and was expected to be completed by March 1989. However, because the USDA failed to exercise its oversight obligations, its completion was delayed until April 1991 and ended up costing \$1.4 million more than the company initially said it would.

Some of the GAO's findings are shocking. Many details of the survey were flat left out by the surveyors. The questionnaire itself was mammoth: it took homeowners three hours to complete, for which they were paid only \$2. No wonder, then, that 66 percent of the households contacted never responded. This non-response rate raises serious doubts about whether the data are at all representative of national — let alone regional — food trends. The data are further compromised because the original survey design, which called for an equal number of households to be interviewed in each season of the year to detect seasonal shifts in eating habits, was never followed.

National Analysts cut corners whenever possible. The company cancelled a dress rehearsal that would have revealed potential bugs in the survey. Two months into the survey, already behind schedule, it slashed the training period for survey-takers to save time. Most incredible of all, despite assurances by National Analysts that it had done follow-up surveys of non-respondents as required by the contract, a later GAO probe revealed that this essential follow-up was never done.

USDA officials concede the survey was problem-plagued and agreed to publish a cautionary note as to the accuracy and reliability of the survey. The Department has also agreed to make changes in the way the survey is conducted before it seeks money for the next survey.

That's fine for the 1997 survey, but it won't help us now. The GAO report notes that "only a portion of the survey's data has been released to date," and "it is difficult to predict when the complete survey will be available to the public . . . and even then its data may be questionable." Clearly, changes must be made in the way the survey is conducted in the future. And it seems pertinent to suggest that there ought not be a next time for National Analysts.

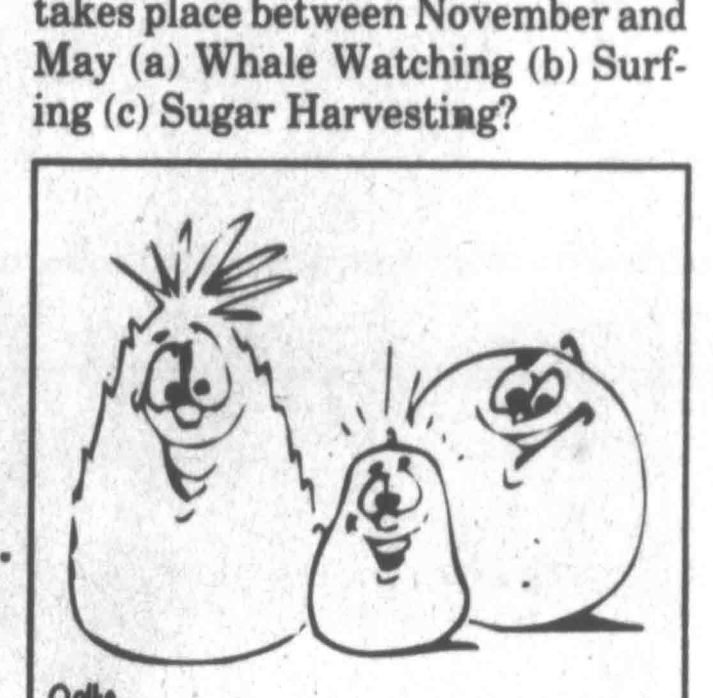
