GWINN MATTHEWS, County Executive, signed a proclamation declaring September as literacy month in Lauderdale County. The Basic Adult Education program is taught by certified teachers with additional help from volunteers. It provides small classes and self paced learning. Classes are located throughout the county and are offered by the State Department of Education, and J.T.P.A. The Ripley Lauderdale County Junior Auxiliary helps provide volunteer tutors. When attend ing the classes the student is tested with standardized testing and evaluation procedures. After the student completes 60 hours of class work he is reevaluated for advancement in the program receiving "Certificates of Accomplishment Achievement." Ultimately the student will advance to the highest level and pass the GED. Lauderdale County in the last few years was reported having an average of 6% unemployment. The county has almost 5,000 people without high school diplomas and approximately 4,000 of those people have less than an 8th grade education. State Representative Floyd Crain, County Executive Gwinn Matthews, and Mayor Rozelle Criner of Ripley, extend their support in Lauderdale County Literacy month and the Adult Basic Education Program. Mayors Randy Harris, of Halls, Fred Montgomery, of Henning, and Booker Nance, of Gates, could not be present, however, they also extend their support in the program. To become a teacher in the ABE Program you must be a certified teacher. Tutors can be anyone who wants to give the gift of helping someone learn to read. Please apply at Ripley State Area Vo-Tech or call 635-3368 and ask for Vickie Stratton. For further information brochures about Adult Basic Education will be located in each City Hall, and flyers will be posted throughout the county in local businesses.
