

When the price of food goes up, it seems to attract headlines, and often on the front page. However, when food prices decrease, there is little said about it. It may be because of this over sensationalism that consumers seem to see food prices as the major cause of inflation. That, grocery store more often than to most any other type of business.

An article in a recent edition of Farmline Magazine, produced by Agriculture, points out that in 14 of the past 22 years, the consumer price index (CPI) for food rose at a slower rate than the CPI for all goods.

Economist Ralph Parlett of USDA's Economic Research Service says that since 1970, housing has been the major contributor to inflation. He notes that the percentage change in the price of housing between 1970 and 1991 was about the sam percentage as the change of the price of food. However, since housing accounts for a much arger proportion of consumer spending, the housing price increase contributed considerably more to overall inflation.

When you take everything that the consumer normally buys, or he total CPI "market basket". nousing accounts for 41.5 percent. Transportation makes up 17 percent, food 16 percent, energy 7.4 percent, medical care 6.7 percent, apparel 6.1 percent and entertainment 4.4 percent. Housing, medical and energy

costs increased more than food from 1970 through 1991, while I and apparel costs increased less.

The rates of increase have

varied considerably by category.

For example what cost a dollar in medical services in 1970 will cost you \$5.21 today. The clothing

dollar has only gone up to \$2.17.

Looking at food alone, fresh
fruit increased more than any other category. A dollar's worth of fruit in 1970 costs \$5.45 today. since fresh fruit makes up only 5.9 percent of food expenditure at the document to the second to the sec
