Gallium nitrate, used against Paget's disease, seemed to slow its progress dramatically. Destructive bone process of Paget's often causes pain, deformities and fractures; treatment cut that in half.
Children who had a cold when they got the measles vaccine may not be adequately protected, research at the Army Medical Center in Tacoma, Washington, found. If there's a question, check with your doctor.
New form of interferon presents a specific treatment for chronic hepatitis B. In tests, large doses seemed to cure the disease; smaller doses stopped its spread.
Newer types of artificial knees are getting better long-term results, the British journal Lancet reports. Even younger, more active patients are doing well 10 years after the operation.

Help Your Heart In February, National Heart Month

Facts From The American College of Emergency Physicians

Q. How can I tell if I'm in danger of a heart attack?

Medical research has identified a number of characteristics called risk factors which are likely to be found in heart attack victims. These include a family history of heart disease, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, obesity, sedentary life style, smoking and diabetes. While no factor predicts a heart attack directly, those with several are more in danger than those with none. Your doctor can advise you about your risk and whatever changes in diet, personal habits and medication you should make to minimize them.

Q. What are the warning signs of a heart attack?

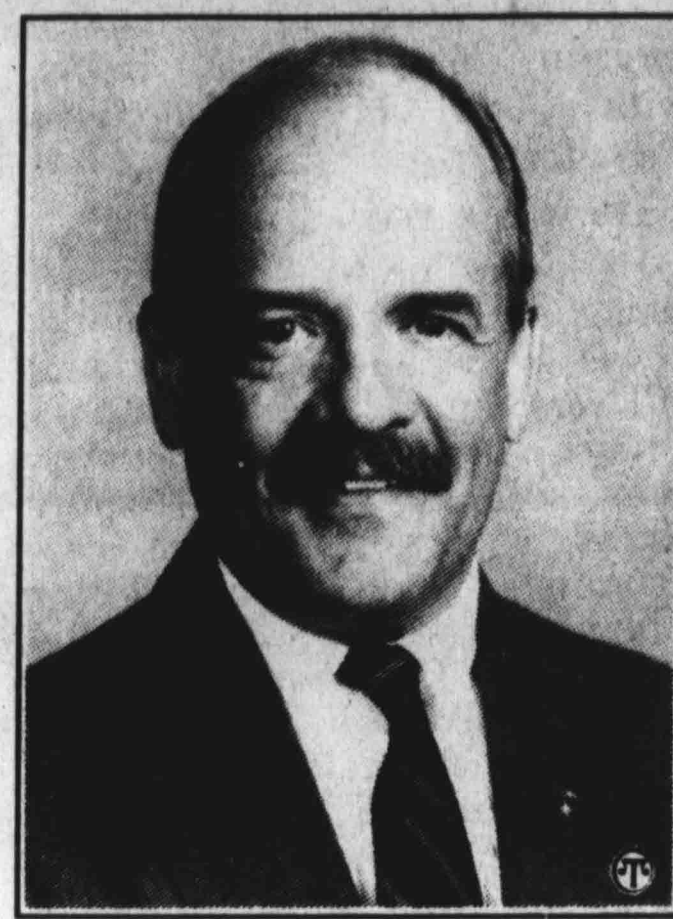
Chest pain or pressure, often spreading to the arm, neck or back is the most common sign. In cases of heart attack, this pain is usually present more than half an hour. Common associated symptoms include shortness of breath, nausea, abnormal sweating, weakness and dizziness. In people with angina, a change in frequency or duration of pain may signal a heart attack. Some people experience no chest pain. In certain cases, sensations of gas pressure or indigestion may be the only symptoms.

Q. When should I call my doctor?

Mild or intermittent symptoms similar to those described above should be reported to your doctor by telephone and soon followed by an office visit.

Q. Is an ambulance really necessary for someone with chest pains?

In cases of severe or prolonged chest pain, an ambulance is the best and safest way to reach the Emergency Department. Most heart attack

deaths occur within two hours of the onset of pain. Paramedic ambulances carry advanced medicines and machinery which can be used immediately should someone collapse or be in distress. Ambulances can also radio to a physician specializing in emergency medicine for further instructions. In most cases, the medic will alert the hospital so necessary equipment and personnel are available when the ambulance arrives.

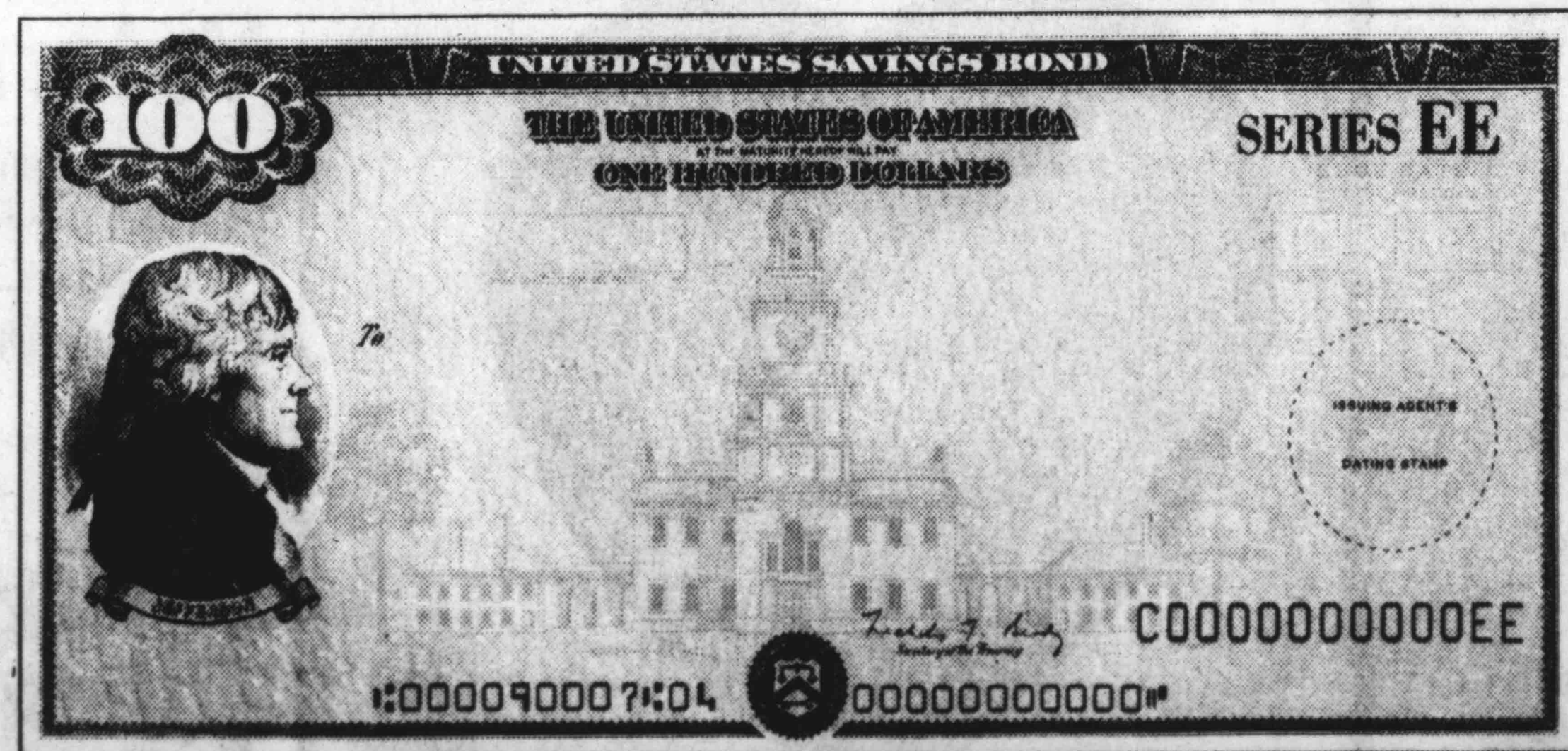

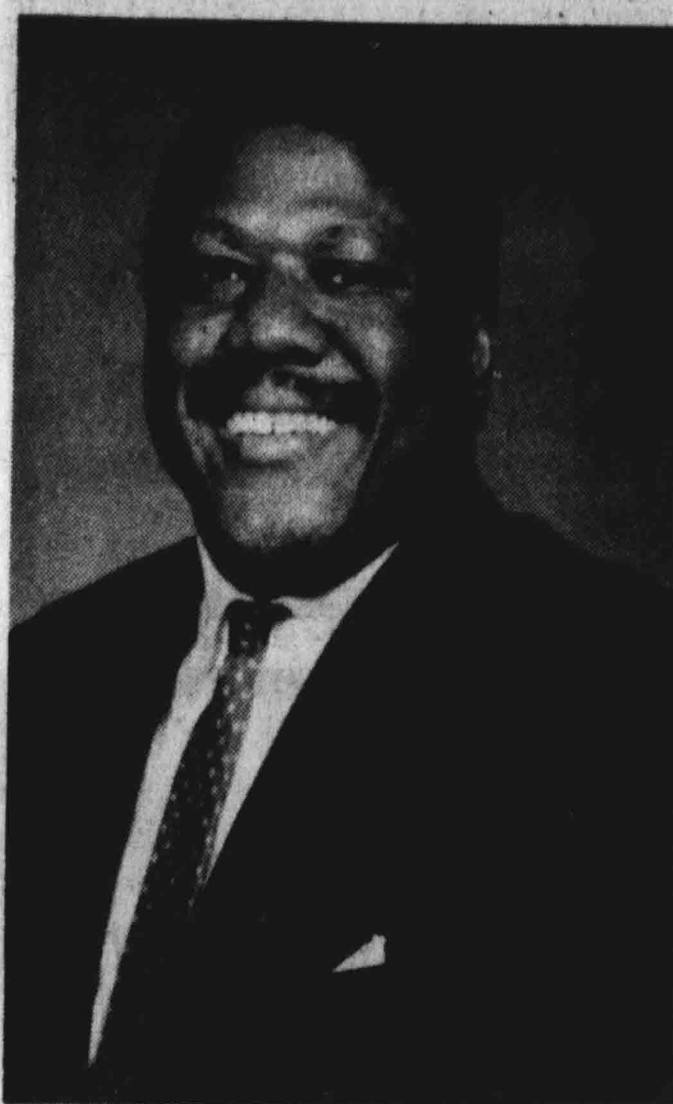

President



DR. JACOB A. RHODES, son of Mr. and Mrs. Franklin A. Rhodes, of Halls, group vice-president of urban services and operations at the YMCA of Greater Houston, became the new president of the YMCA of Greater Rochester January 10th. He graduated from Halls High School in 1967.

Rhodes succeeds Albert B. Hooke, retired president of Rochester Community Savings Bank, who has been serving as interim president since July.

The January 10th announcement was made by David C. Heiligman, board chairman of the YMCA of Greater Rochester and vice-president, secretary and treasurer of Rochester Gas & Electric.

"In Houston Dr. Rhodes has helped the YMCA provide outstanding service to a large metropolitan community, from the suburbs to the center city," Heiligman said. "His experience makes him an ideal choice to help our YMCA meet the diverse needs of the greater Rochester community."

Rhodes is scheduled to take over as president in mid-February. In Houston, Rhodes directly oversees four YMCA branches -- two downtown, one suburban and one he describes as "in between" in one of the city's residential neighborhoods. He recently served as capital campaign director for two branches, raising over \$2 million to fund renovation of both facilities. He also has experience with what he calls "the YMCA's bread and butter," having supervised the aquatics and fitness programs for all of Houston's 28 branches from 1983 to 1990.

Rhodes said he looks forward to coming to a smaller metropolitan area after 13 years in Houston. "The problems are a little more manageable, and I think you have a better quality of life in a medium-sized city like Rochester," he said.

Rhodes also said he looks forward to the challenge of helping the YMCA meet a diverse range of needs.

"I've tried to make my career by providing equality of services without regard to ability to pay," he said. "I've also been successful at fundraising, and at striking a good balance -- a balance between the needs of urban and suburban branches." Rhodes said he has implemented a variety of programs to help urban young people in Houston, including a new mentoring initiative in which minority professionals are paired with teenagers as a way to provide positive role models. "An institution like the Y can't save all the kids," Rhodes said, "but it can create an environment where kids can experience success."

Rhodes received a bachelor of science degree in physical education from Tennessee State University in Nashville, a master's degree in urban planning from the University of Wisconsin and a doctorate in business administration from the Union Institute in Cincinnati.

Rhodes, 42, has a 13-year-old daughter. They presently reside in the Houston suburb of Katy, Tex. Rhodes was chosen by a nine-member search committee headed by two immediate past YMCA board chairmen: Cornelius (Neil) Murphy, a senior vice-president with the management firm of Goodrich and Sherwood Co., and Beth E.



Wilkins, a partner in the law firm of Harris Beach & Wilcox.

"I believe the search committee did a fantastic job in selecting Jacob Rhodes," Hooke said. "After interviewing dozens of candidates from around the country, they have found in Dr. Rhodes the right person with the right experience to lead our YMCA into the 21st century."

The YMCA of Greater Rochester serves a six-county area. In addition to fitness and aquatics programs at its eight branches, the YMCA provides a range of other services. The YMCA is the area's largest child-care provider, for example, and offers education programs, summer and day camps, health enhancement and other services throughout the community.

Haley Returns To Roots In Henning

Alex Haley, 70, whose book and television series, *Roots*, brought national fame to Henning, returns to his "roots" there at 4 p.m. Saturday, when he will be buried, by special permission of the state legislature, in the yard of the Haley Museum in Henning.

Dr. Haley died at 12:04 a.m. Monday in Swedish Hospital in Seattle, Wash., about an hour after its emergency room admitted him with symptoms of a heart attack.

From his home in Norris, Tenn., near Knoxville, he was in Seattle to speak Tuesday of this week in a banquet at the Naval Submarine Base in Bremerton, Wash.

It was typical of Haley to fill such a request.

He taught himself to write during 20 years in the Coast Guard, from which he retired, as its first Chief Journalist, in 1959, after which he wrote for magazines and published *The Autobiography of Malcolm X*.

Memphis Rites Precede

Haley's body will lie in state in Greenwood C.M.E. Church at 3311 Kimball in Memphis from 5 to 8 p.m. Friday and from 8 to 10 a.m. Saturday, before services from 10 a.m. to noon, Ford Funeral Home in charge.

Services follow at 3 p.m. in New Hope C.M.E. Church at Henning, of which Dr. Haley was a member.

Burial at 4 on the museum grounds, which Haley requested, was made possible by legislation rushed through the General Assembly by State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, and State Sen. Leonard Dunavant, of Millington.

Legislative approval was required because the museum is an historical site administered by the Tenn. Historical Commission.

On the porch of the home which is now the museum, Haley, born in Ithaca, N.Y., heard from his grandmother, Cynthia (Mrs. Will) Palmer, what she recalled of her heritage, and he sought out more, spurring many others to do the same.

Roots won a Pulitzer Prize in 1977 and a 12-hour television series drew a record 130,000,000 viewers.

One of two novels on which Haley has been working, *Henning*, is near completion, his agent, John Hawkins, reports, and could "probably be finished by the normal editing process and published within the year."

Haley recently completed the script for *Queenie*, a CBS television series about his other grandmother, buried, with her husband, Alex, in Savannah Cemetery in Hardin County.

Alex ran the Savannah ferry for the prominent Cherry family, and some Haley cousins still reside in Hardin County.

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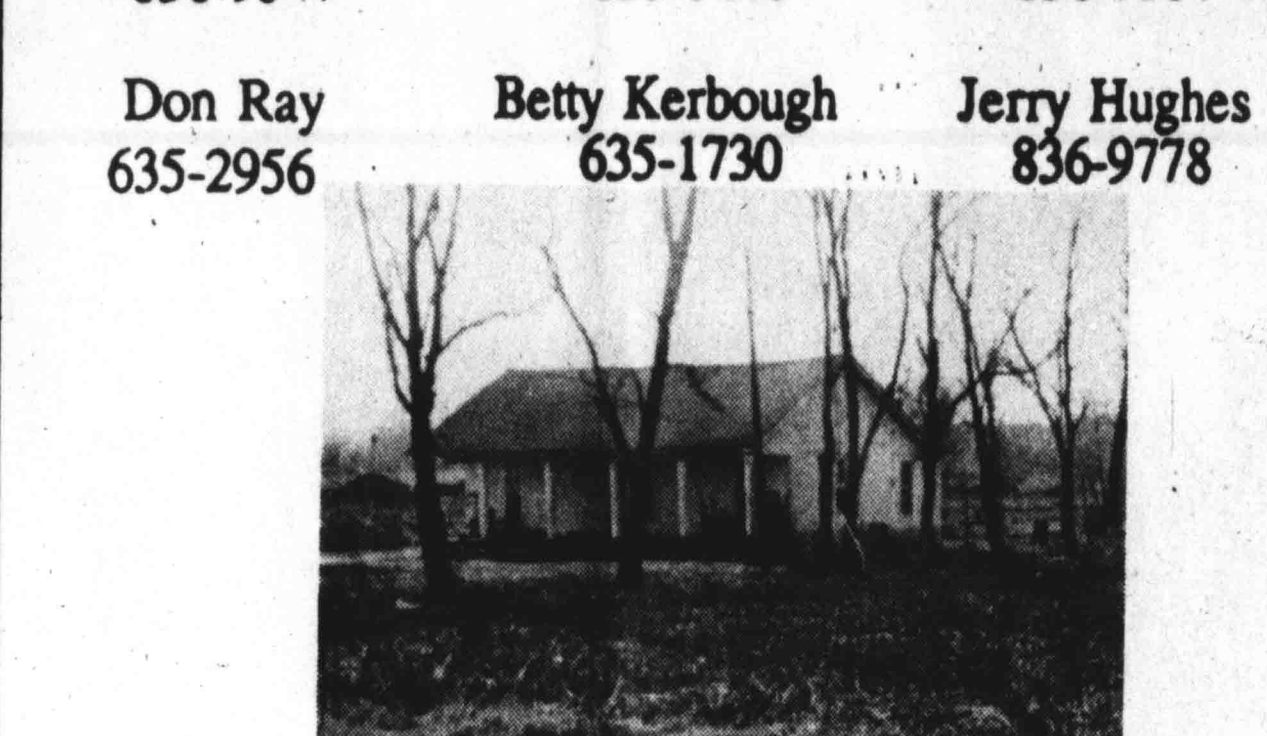

Pharmacy Topics



The National Cancer Institute is sponsoring a study of the drug tamoxifen. Now used to prevent recurrence of breast cancer, drug will be tested to see if it can also prevent it from starting in at-risk women. Other bonuses seem to be protection against heart disease and osteoporosis.

Genetically altered mice with more low-density lipoprotein receptors in their liver cells can remove more cholesterol from their blood. Researchers at the University of Texas in Dallas say it may be many years before this success can be achieved in humans.

Young children offered good food eat what they need, a study at the Child Development Laboratory in Urbana, Illinois, found. What constitutes a "meal" varies, but daily caloric intake is constant.

Foot ulcers are a serious problem for diabetics. In a podiatric study at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, diabetics were able to avoid sores by wearing densely padded socks to lessen pressure on vulnerable parts of the foot.

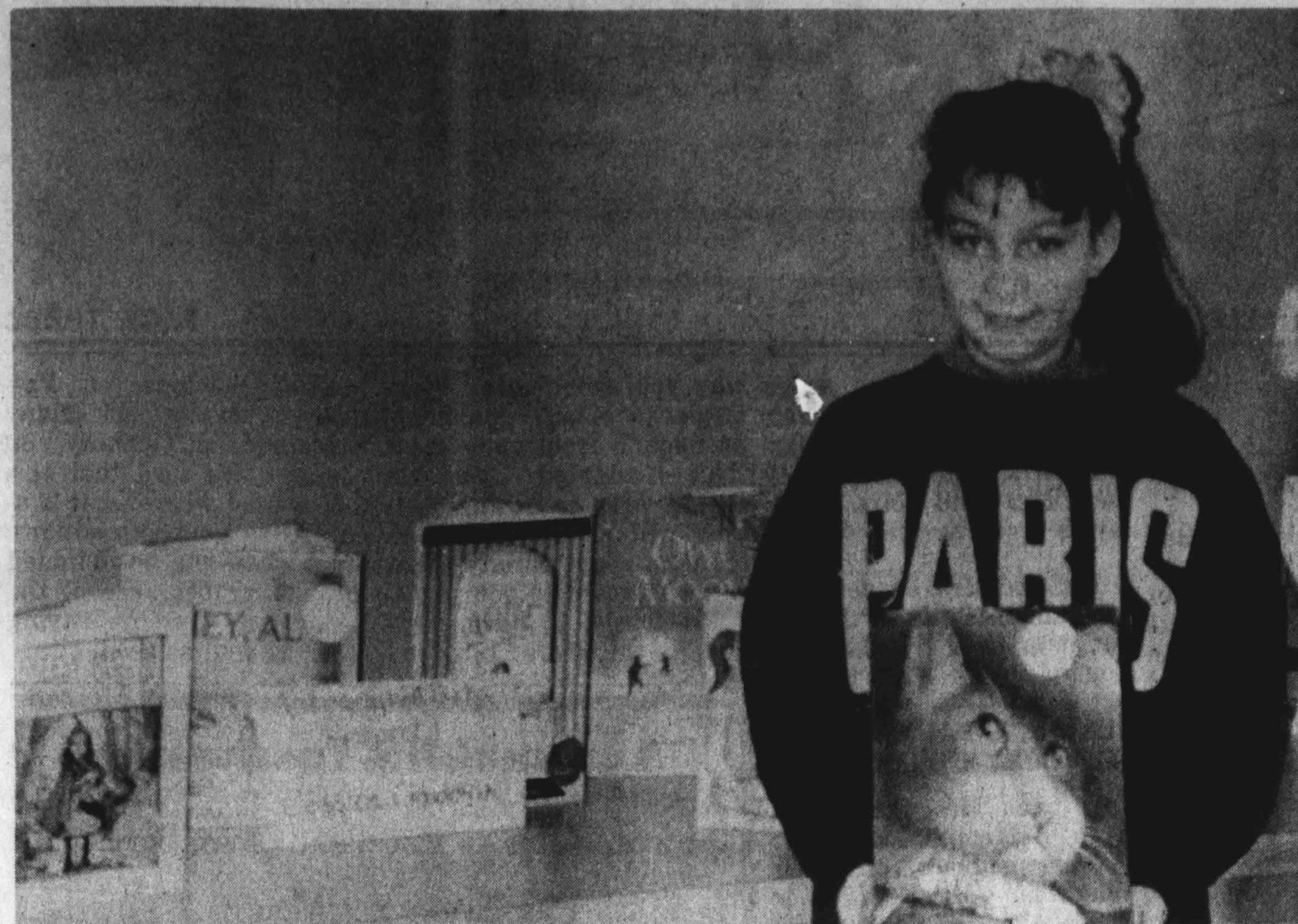

ed to wider spacings up to and including 14 inches. Rates of seeding as well as fertilization were the same in all cases and the results were computed after several varieties were used. Results were based on work done over a period of 8 years. Increased yields resulted in all cases from the fields sown in 7 inch rows.

I have known Bill, or Billy to me, for so many years, I can't remember when I did not know him.

His parents lived just in front of the old Helen's Bluff School House in Crockett County. Billy, Bobby and Gerald attended school there. Gerald said he was not old enough, but he went along with Billy and Bobby anyway.

The other children all started school in Halls and attended Halls Schools, graduating from Halls High, except Darrell, who was killed while riding his bicycle in front of their home near Halls.

Bill went to Halls schools until his senior year in Halls High, when he transferred to Castle Heights Military Academy in Lebanon.

During Billy's school days in Halls, he and Johnny Talley (now Dr. John Talley, a dentist, in Dyersburg) were best friends and still are.

Bobby, Gerald, and Mickey are the only three left of this family now living in Halls. These three men are all still farmers and dealing in livestock.
Gerald is probably the most noted, as he is also an auctioneer, working for many years at the stock yards in Memphis and now in Maury City. Gerald has always had a problem of stuttering. Who knows, that may be the reason he has been so successful as an auctioneer? Nobody can understand what they are saying, anyway.

Charles told me one time that I was the only person he had ever seen who raised their own bird. It was when the Hobbs Jewelry Store in Dyersburg went out of business.

McKinley Cherry was a Methodist, and the children all attended the Methodist Church in Halls after they moved here. 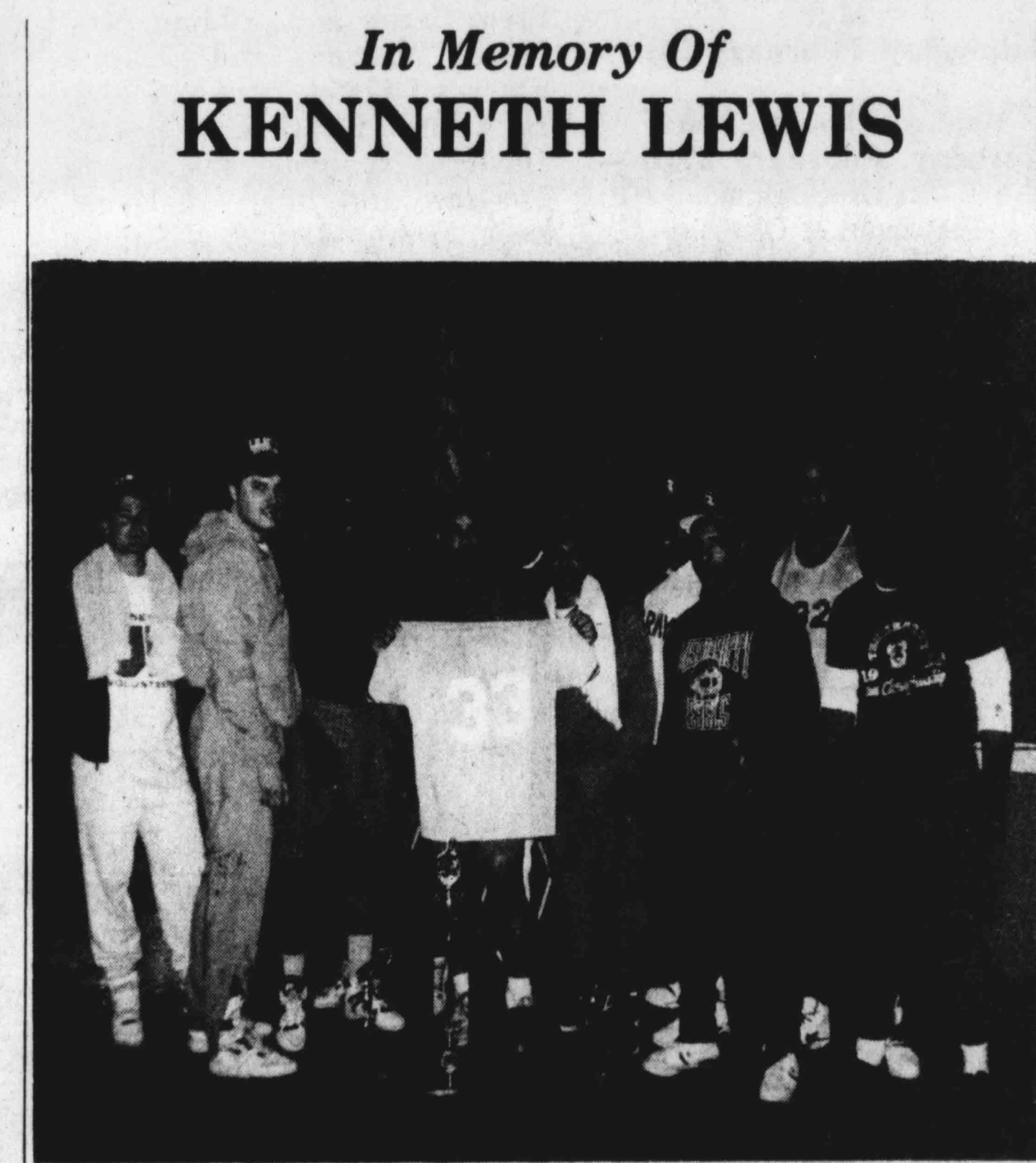

Most Tennessee counties will have to raise property tax rates substantially if last year's cuts in state funding for public education are not restored by the legislature, a University of Tennessee report says.
The Lauderdale County tax rate, now \$2.44, would have to be raised approximately 77 cents to restore the county's school budget to the 1980-81 level, the report from UT's County Technical Assistance Service says.
The CTAS report shows the average property tax increase for all Tennessee school districts to be 62 cents. County schools systems need almost \$94 million in additional money next year to restore the educational budget programs to the 1980-81 level, the report says.

"We have found that it's going to require a substantially increased tax effort on the part of county governments to replace the state's share of educational funds," said Bob Wornale, executive director of CTAS. "Some counties will find it difficult to open the doors to their schools if property taxes are not increased."

CTAS based its study on the amount generated by an additional one cent of property tax because it is the main source used to raise money without approval by the state legislature or a vote of the people.

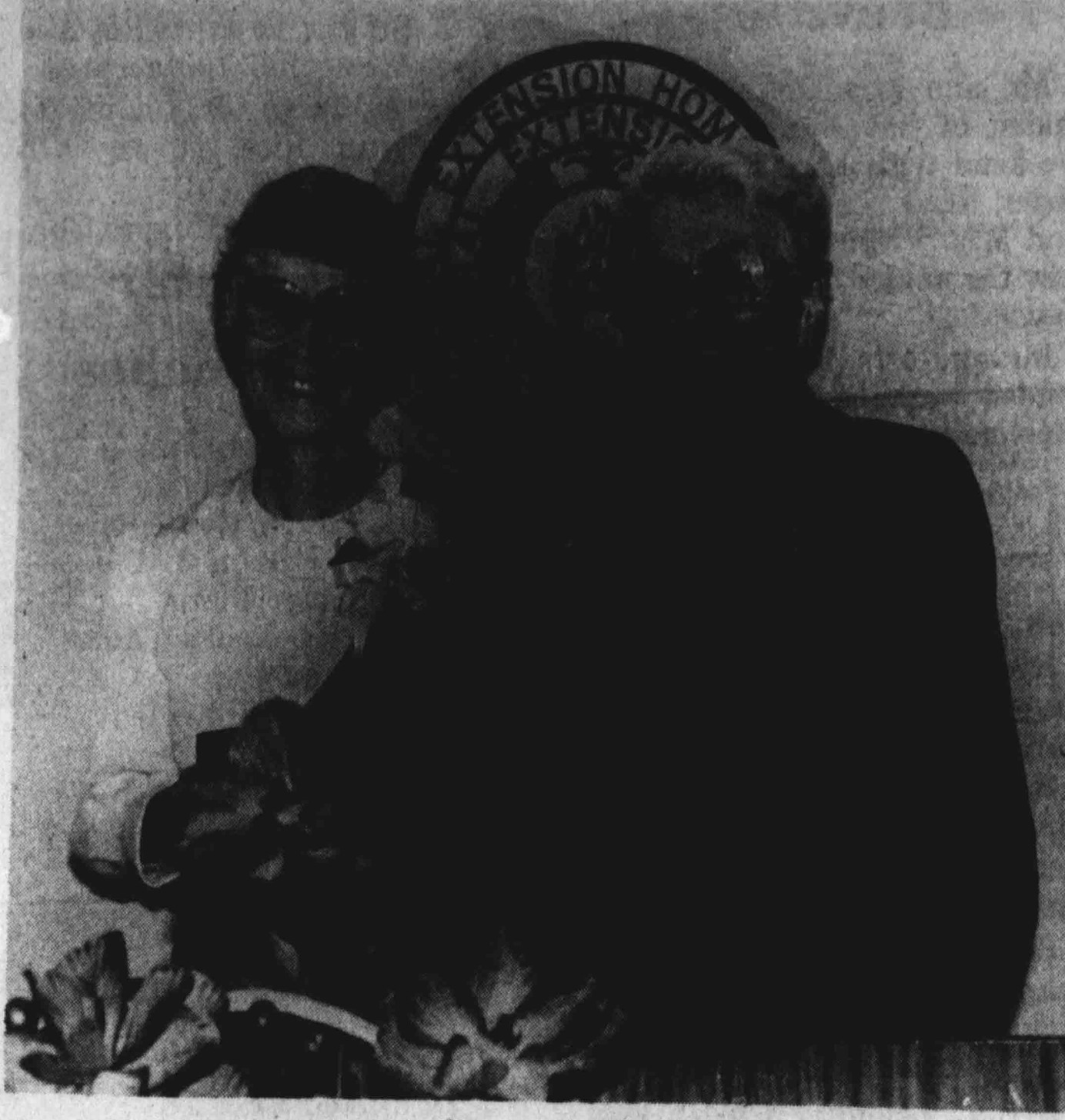

Swedish Rice Pudding
3 cups 2% lowfat milk
1 large stick cinnamon
1 cup uncooked rice
2 cups water
1/2 teaspoon salt
Peel of an orange or lemon
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup seedless raisins
2 tablespoons dark rum

Heat milk and cinnamon over medium heat in small saucepan until milk is infused with flavor of cinnamon, about 15 minutes. Meanwhile combine rice, water, and salt in 2- to 3-quart saucepan. Bring to a boil; stir once or twice. Place orange peel on top of rice. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 15 minutes, or until rice is tender and liquid is absorbed. Remove and discard orange peel. Strain milk and stir into cooked rice. Add sugar and simmer 20 minutes, or until thickened, stirring often. Add raisins and rum; simmer 10 minutes. Serve hot. To reheat, add a little milk to restore creamy texture. Makes 6 servings.

Each serving provides 297 calories, 6.4 grams protein, 2.6 grams fat, 62.5 grams carbohydrate, 0.6 grams dietary fiber, 259 milligrams sodium, and 10 milligrams cholesterol.

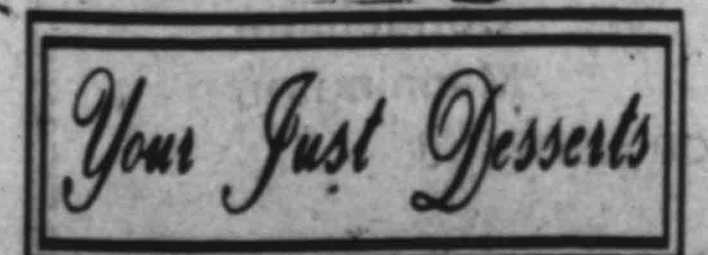

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/3 cup light molasses
- 3/4 cup packed dark brown sugar
- 3 cups fruit and fiber cereal

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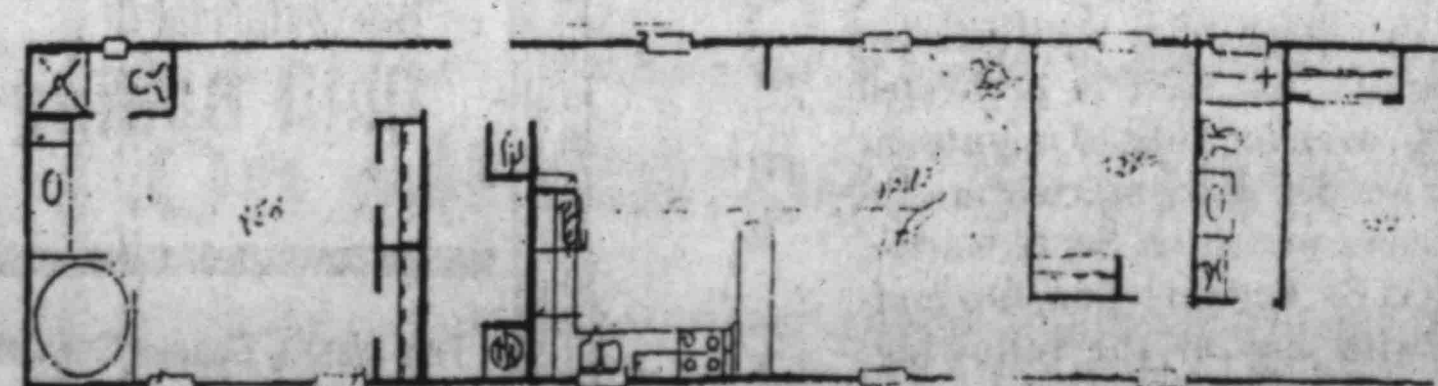
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
