Rate Plunges The state estimates Lauderdale County's unemployment rate dropped from 8.6% in October to 7.5% in November, leaving 800 people seeking work.

Only six other counties in the state were rated with better drops--Gibson (3.1%), Montgomery (2.3%), Cocke and Poll (2%), Decatur (1.6%), and Campbell (1.5%).

Estimates dropped for 49 other counties, compared to 39 increases. Haywood was down .9% but is

Gov. Unveils Plan To Boost Revenue

Gov. Ned McWherter is asking the legislature, when it meets Jan. 14th, to cut the state share of sales tax 1/2%, to 5%, and begin a 3% state income tax.

He also wants to cut the Hall income tax (on income from in vestments) in half, to 3%, and to nearly double property tax refunds to low-income and disabled ome-owners.

His plan would raise \$928,000,000 a year for schools plus \$100,000,000 to aid cities and counties.

Lawmakers are reacting coolly to these ideas.

Driver In Younger Poll Nixes Income Tax, Death Held Again Bd. Of Ed. Pick Of Supt.

Through Tuesday's mail, readers responded to our poll 66-7 against any state income tax, and by the same vote that "there is enough money for education now, if wisely spent."

The vote was 58-12 to continue to elect the county Superintendent of Schools by popular vote, instead of election by the Board of Education.

Our poll was by no means scientific nor conclusive. but daily newspapers are reporting national polls (for presidential candidates) based on 800 or fewer telephone interviews, of a U.S. population reported in the 1990 census as 248,709,873; our response easily topped that level.

A major difference is that the telephone interviews are said to be conducted at random (random when, where, and how?) while our poll required effort (and 29¢) to respond, and might be expected to earn response from those most involved in the

Of our respondents, 56 said they were not "in education as vocation or as a student. They said 50-20, that education has no improved in Tenn schools in the last 10 years. They said, 52-14, that they fa-

Hist. Soc. Recalls Rep. Jere Cooper

Jere Cooper, Congressman from the 8th Congressional District of Tennessee from 1928 to his death in 1957, was the topic at the meeting of the Lauderdale County Historical and Genealogical Society meeting Sunday. Jere Bradshaw, former County Court Clerk of Dyer County, was the guest speaker at the meeting which was held in the Farm

Bureau Building in Ripley. Mr. Bradshaw described Cooper, the only Dyer Countian ever to serve in the U.S. Congress, as a man who 'recognized the beauty of work and importance of education,' characterized by the press during his life as the 'loneliest man in Washington' because of his dedication to work. Through his service on the House Ways and Means Committee, the Flood and Irrigation Committee, and the Tariff and International Trade Committee, the former congressman influenced legislation on many issues vital to his district including taxes, social security, and flood control.

Among the items of memorabilia on display were Cooper's World War I uniform and diary. He joined the war effort as a private in the National Guard and mustered out as a captain, decorated for his part in the capture of a German stronghold. It was his work with veterans' groups that led to his entry into politics.

In the business session, plans were made for the Society's biennial meeting set for March when there will be election of officers and presentation of awards.
