

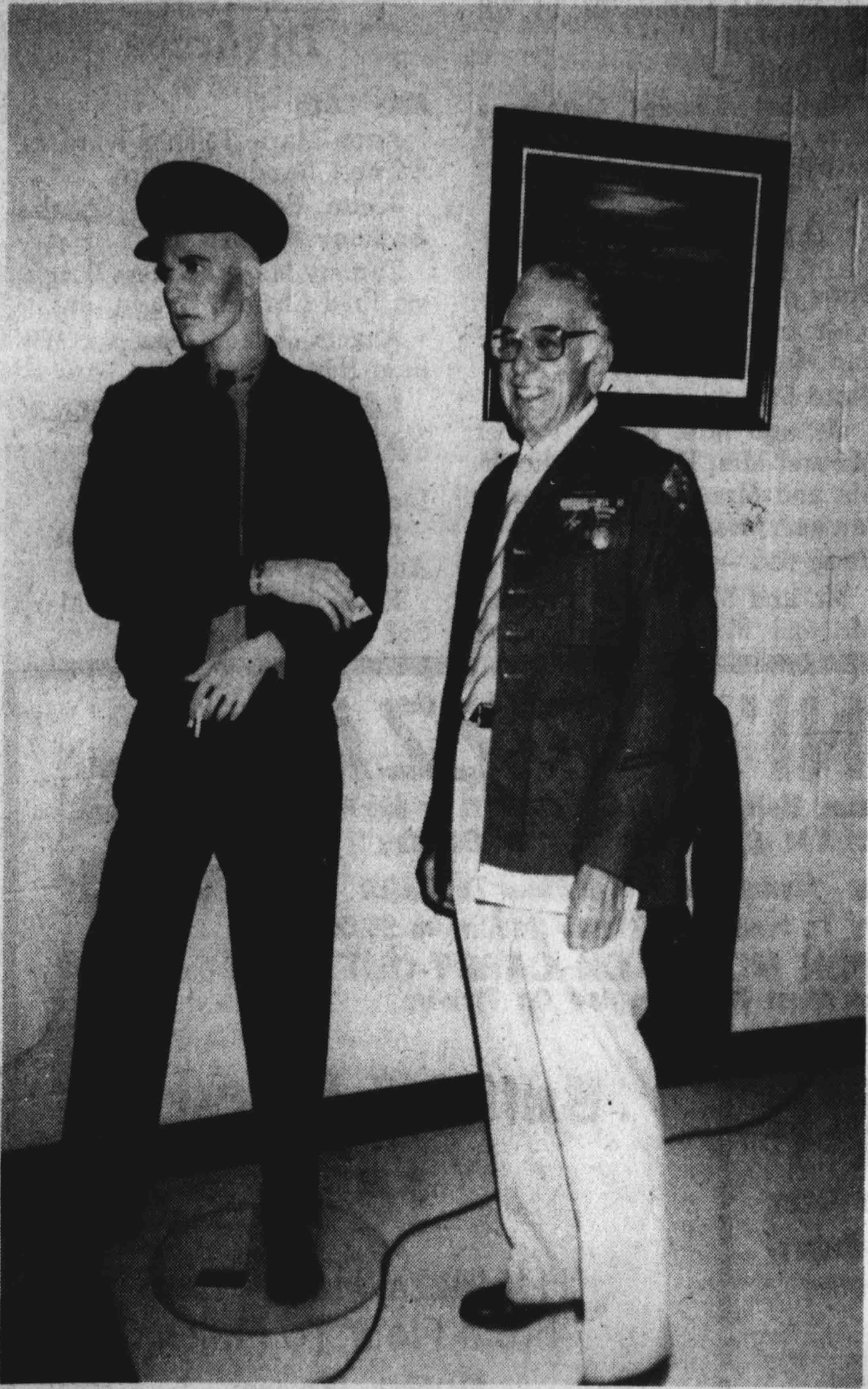

Salute To Vets



RAYBON CHAMBERS, of Halls, a Marine sergeant who survived the Battle of Bougainville, in the South Pacific, in World War II, wore a tunic from Tommy Simmons' collection for a 'Salute to Veterans' May 17th in the Halls High School cafeteria.

The tunic is that of Sgt. Billy Ried Simmons, who fought on Guadalcanal.

Raybon was among residents and visitors from Halls, Gates, Ripley, Dyersburg, and Somerville admiring such exhibits as the mannequin in the photo, from Sonny Higdon's collection, with an A-2 jacket, an airman's bracelet, and a Camel cigarette.

Tim Bivens, of Dyersburg, and Jimmy McCall, of Covington, also displayed collections.

The Warren Nunns shared memorabilia in the Memphis Belle display.

Other displays included Dyersburg Army Air Base items, U.S. uniforms, Japanese and German artifacts, murals and pictures by DAAB artist Ernie Berke, weapons, a WWII CCKW 2-1/2 ton truck, WWII infantry gear, and American and German model airplanes. Veterans shared memorabilia.

After a brief history of DAAB, program sponsor Pat Higdon introduced wives of deceased veterans and all veterans who signed the guest register. Veterans who served in Europe, the Far East, the Pacific, Japan, Saudi Arabia, and Viet Nam spoke about their service. Among the attendees were many DAAB veterans.

Leroy Neal, of Dyersburg, asked what he did in WWII,

quipped, 'I won the war.' The experience made WWII come alive for Halls High students who were stationed at each display and taped the event.

The Halls High Stage Band, under the direction of Tim Graham, delighted guests with music from the 40s as they viewed the displays.

Before leaving, most wanted to view the Homecoming '86 video tape just one more time. Leann Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Johnson, of Gates, and Carla Hamilton, of Halls, were part of the tape, and 6 years later registered veterans for this program. Leann was a HHS Close Up Club member during Homecoming '86, and Carla was in charge of displays at the community center.

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Pharmacy Topics

Travelers born after 1956 would benefit from revaccination against childhood diseases, says a doctor at Long Island Jewish Medical Center in New Hyde Park, New York. Antibodies from vaccination are not as long-lasting as natural ones, say researchers.

New machines to break up painful kidney stones blocking the ureter has been developed at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. The electromechanical impactor works like a tiny jackhammer in the urinary tract, hitting the stone again and again.

Glycolic acid, used against acne scars and age spots, may also work to fade melasma, the discolorations in the face suffered by pregnant women and those who take birth control pills, says a dermatology professor at the UCLA School of Medicine.

Sunscreen on the lips seems to be effective to ward off cold sores, says an infectious diseases specialist at the National Institute of Dental Research in Bethesda, Maryland.

Congressman JOHN TANNER REPORTS TO THE EIGHTH DISTRICT

A MESSAGE FROM THE EDUCATION FRONT: WE MUST BE MORE AGGRESSIVE

In January, government officials are expected to announce that the U.S. economy is no longer king of the hill. For the first time in roughly eight decades or so, the U.S. economy will not be the largest and most robust. Which one will?

The European Community. Some say we may be losing the edge. I don't think so, but certainly we can do better.

Lester Thurow, a Massachusetts Institute of Technology economics professor, has pointed out in recent days that Japan and the European Community all have longer school years than the United States. Their systems accomplish things in K-12 that are "inconceivable" to us here, he suggests.

It's ironic that the United States was the first to put in place mandatory mass compulsory public education. That happened in 1842. We also developed the first system of higher education available to the general public in the world. The problem is that others looked at our system and copied it after World War II, and now do it better, Thurow says.

He's right. But our unwillingness to seek and make concrete changes in our education system to adapt to a more competitive world is in part a factor behind our no longer being the dominant economic power in the world as of January.

For example, our school year has only grown 6 days in the past 60 years. Japanese students attend classes nearly 250 days-a-year in a rigorous program of studies. In Germany it is as many as 240 days. In Korea, it's as many as 250.

In the United States, where school policy and curriculum for K-12 is controlled at the state and local level, it is 178.

As a society it appears we may have gotten a bit complacent, and, yes, maybe even lazy over the past 10 years or so in terms of education. That should change. It must change. We have several programs in Tennessee aimed at improving the skills of our workforce. We cannot stop with Teamwork West Tennessee and School-To-Work programs though.

To have the best teachers, it seems reasonable that we should consider paying them commensurate with their role in our society. And parents must be more active than ever before in the education of our children.

Phylloxera's Back As Pest On Pecans

Phylloxera has returned! Phylloxera are small, delicate insects, which are closely related to and resemble aphids. These pecan pests overwinter in the egg stage in protected places on the branches. Young appear in the spring about the time the buds unfold.

The insect inserts its beak into the new growth and while feeding it is presumed to inject a substance into the plant tissue which act as a growth regulator. Shortly after feeding begins, a gall develops and envelopes the entire insect. The phylloxera matures within the gall and lays a large number of eggs.

The young insects hatch from the eggs and envelop into winged forms. In late May or early June, the gall ruptures and releases the insects.

The galls and swellings are produced on the leaves, leaf-petioles, shoots, or nuts early in the season. Where gall infections are heavy, the twigs appear knotty. Damaged shoots become malformed, weakened and finally die. Infested nuts usually fall prematurely.

This pest is found in most pecan growing areas. They cause serious damage in Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Texas. They usually occur on about a three year cycle, depending on the control by predators and pesticides.

Insecticides

Control of this pest may be accomplished by sprays of malathion, Lindane, Thiodan, or dormant oils. Application of dormant oils should be made prior to bud break. The other materials should be applied shortly after bud break or before two inches of new leaf growth occurs. If malathion or Thiodan are used, two applications at 7-10 day intervals are required. One application of Lindane is adequate. Lindane is a restricted use pesticide and only certified applicators may purchase it.

Where cattle are pastured near sprayed orchards, it is advisable to use Lindane or malathion. Thiodan (Endosulfan) is highly toxic to cattle.

When phylloxera are a problem, it usually requires two seasons to effectively control populations.

By controlling phylloxera, most growers unknowingly control or reduce populations of the hickory shuckworm.

These early emerging moths (prior to nut formation), lay their eggs on the pecan foliage and the galls of pecan stem or leaf phylloxera. Shuckworms hatching from eggs deposited on the foliage generally die before completing their life cycle.

However, larvae developing within phylloxera galls are able to complete their life cycle. Therefore, effective phylloxera control may control or greatly reduce subsequent shuckworm populations.

July 3rd also features gospel singing, 2 to 4 p.m., a talent contest at 5 (information from Angie Terry, 836-7342, after 5 p.m.) and a street dance at 8, featuring "Southern Edition."

Food booths and exhibits will be open all day. On the Fourth, radio-controlled aircraft will be demonstrated on the air base from 4 to 6 p.m. At 8, fireworks will decorate the sky over the air base as area churches meet in Crinfield Park to celebrate freedom with song. Sponsors invite all to enjoy these events.

Family Life School Topic

Over four years ago, the Lauderdale County Board of Education appointed a committee to recommend a family life curriculum for the Lauderdale County School System. Based upon the committee's recommendation, the "Sex Respect" curriculum was approved and put in place. The "Sex Respect" curriculum was chosen primarily because it teaches abstinence and self-esteem. It is an excellent program which has been taught for these past four years by certain teachers who were trained to teach it.

Since then, the Tennessee Legislature adopted a state law (Tennessee Code Annotated 49-6-1301), which stipulates that beginning with this school year, "...every local education agency...shall locally develop, adopt, and implement a program of family life instruction in conformance with the curriculum guidelines established for such programs by the state board of education."

The law goes on to state: "The locally devised and implemented program of family life education shall emphasize abstinence from sexual relations outside of marriage, the right and responsibility of a person to refuse to engage in such relations, basic moral values, as well as the obligations and consequences which arise from intimacy. The program shall also include a component which specifically addresses the nature and prevention of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases."

On May 12th, 1992, our school system received a letter from assistant state commissioner, Tom Cannon, informing us that the "Sex Respect" Curriculum does not conform to this new state law and that our board of education must adopt the State Board Family Life Curriculum or a locally developed curriculum which includes the objectives outlined by the state board.

In order to be in compliance with this state law, the Lauderdale County Board of Education recently adopted the State Board Curriculum. Even though the law allows us to develop our curriculum, it still must address each of the objectives addressed in the state curriculum and must be reviewed and approved by the State Department of Education.

The School Board members and I have some very strong objections to certain terminology and references found within this state curriculum. Therefore, the board of education voted to continue using the "Sex Respect" curriculum as the basis of our Family Life instruction. According to Assistant Commissioner, Tom Cannon, the majority of school systems across Tennessee have adopted the State Family Life Curriculum to be used in conjunction with the "Sex Respect" or a similar abstinence based curriculum.

Even though we were required to adopt a state approved family life curriculum, we have absolutely no intention of allowing certain parts of this state curriculum to be taught in our classrooms. We plan to appoint another community based committee to try to locate or write an alternative family life curriculum which omits these objectionable parts but still conforms to the new state law.

We will hold public meetings before school begins this Fall to fully inform parents of the details concerning the school system's family life curriculum. After reviewing this curriculum, any parent may request that their child be excluded from any part or all portions of the family life instruction.

When a more suitable family life curriculum can be written or located which is approved by the state, I am confident that our board of education will be in favor of replacing that state curriculum.

Cool And Low In Fat

A low-fat diet is not a fate worse than death! It need not be bland or boring; nor does it mean that your lips will never again touch a "real" dessert. With appropriate substitutions, even rich creamy dessert recipes can be modified.

This strawberry and cream crepe recipe required a minimal amount of modification to convert it to an acceptable low-fat dessert. Yet, the savings in calories, fat and cholesterol is rather significant. As far as taste is concerned, the low-fat version comes very close to the traditional version. Strawberry and Cream Crepes (Low-Fat Version)
Crepes
Egg substitute equivalent to 1 egg
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 cup skim milk
Filling
1 cup low-fat cottage cheese (1% or less)
3 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 cups sliced strawberries

To make the crepes, place egg substitute in medium bowl. Add flour and sugar, mixing well. Add milk gradually and beat with a whisk or electric beater until batter is smooth.
Heat 7-inch crepe pan or non-

stick skillet. Pour in 2 to 3 tablespoons of batter, then lift pan above the heating unit and tilt in all directions, allowing batter to coat bottom of pan. (This must be done quickly, before batter sets.) Return pan to heating unit and cook on medium heat until lightly browned on bottom and dry on top. Carefully loosen edges of crepe and flip it over. Cook on opposite side for about 20 seconds. Remove crepe from pan and place on paper towels to cool. Repeat until all batter has been used up. Makes about 8 crepes.

For the filling, combine cottage cheese, sugar, and vanilla, and whip with electric mixer until smooth and creamy. Fold in strawberries. Place a crepe on plate and spoon filling along center of crepe. Fold on side of the crepe over filling. Then fold over the other side so that it overlaps the first. Fill remaining crepes in same manner. Serve immediately or chill until ready to serve. Makes 8 servings.

Public Notice

As part of Halls Water Department ongoing efforts to provide the highest quality water service, we routinely collect and analyze individual home water samples. The federal government recently added lead to the list of substances we must measure in drinking water at the customers' tap. Since lead does not occur naturally in our water source, we typically find that lead is introduced into the drinking water by home plumbing systems installed with lead solder. Solder and other metals from these systems can dissolve and cause undesirable levels of lead to appear in the drinking water. All available information suggests that homes built after 1982 with copper pipe joined by lead solder or homes containing lead pipes are the most likely to see elevated lead levels.

Halls Water Department is obligated to do some additional sampling in high risk homes within our service area in order that we may determine the extent of the problem, if any, and determine if Halls Water Department must modify its water treatment techniques to reduce the corrosion of its customers plumbing systems.

To help us in this effort, we would appreciate you notifying us at 836-9654 if you have plumbing that you suspect meets the higher risk category. If you choose to participate with us in this sampling effort, a water department employee or you would collect a small water sample from your home twice a year for analysis. You would be provided a copy of the analytical results.

Your involvement in this study is strictly voluntary. There are no costs involved, and you may elect to discontinue your participation at any time. This study is important in determining the quality of drinking water in our area and we encourage all applicable homeowners to participate.

In addition, the organization will serve to organize communication and activities of veterans and other interested persons relating to DAAB.

Acting officers for the organization are Pat Higdon, President; Tim Bivens, Vice-President; and Martha Crites, Secretary/Treasurer. Assignment to a classification will be based on 1992 enrollment figures.

County-Wide Trash Pick-Up Coming (& Bigger Bills, Too)

Lauderdale Countians can expect better trash disposal by the end of 1994, including county-wide pick-up, but can also expect to pay more for it.

That was the forecast Tuesday from Charles Cutlip, of Ripley, new manager of the county land-fill, addressing Ripley Rotarians.

The land-fill is managed by a Consortium whose board includes the County Executive, Gwinn Matthews; two County Commissioners, Mack Curtis and Lawson Elder; Ripley Mayor Richard Douglas; and Aldermen George Glynn, of Gates, Noel Sherrod, of Halls, and Ronald Miller, of Henning.

The county faces tightened state and federal regulation of trash disposal, but Cutlip believes it is better prepared to meet the new standards than many counties in the state.

For example, Crockett County does not have a land-fill, and Fayette County is scrambling to meet even current requirements.

Lauderdale County already owns 100 acres adjoining its land-fill, of about 30 acres, at Dry Hill, on which to develop better usage, and the clay soil here resists penetration of polluted surface waters into water supplies deep underground, Cutlip noted.

He stressed that he was only setting into his work and learning every day, but he threw out some ideas on how the land-fill might cut volume 25% as the new regulations require.

• Re-cycling, such as wood pallets, need not go to the land-fill — can be used to fill gullies or to go into smaller land-fills not required to meet high standards.

• A compactor can cut trash volume 50% (but costs about \$180,000), offsetting that cost would be savings in the cost of bulldozers now doing some clumsy compacting much less efficiently.

• Re-cycling is useful for a few materials but is not practical for most; costs mainly far outweigh the savings.

Cutlip said frankly that meeting new requirements to safeguard underground waters will cost countians more.

"I'll just do my best to hold those added costs to the minimum," he said.

Business dumpers now pay \$2.25 per cubic yard (\$9 per ton), plus a flat \$54 tipping fee.

Others, having already paid for service through their taxes, pay no fee.

Private Dump Pends

Meanwhile, a plan by Wiley Hutcherson, owner of Hutcherson Scrap in Halls, to develop a 150-acre land-fill near Double Bridges has run into unanimous opposition from the County Planning Commission, after an out-burst of citizen protests.

CPC Chairman Don Ammons, of Ripley, says the rejection was not based on any dangers to the environment, which the CPC did not judge, but to the lack of adequate roads, water supply, and fire protection for the zoning requested, an industrial zone in

which someone "could build a steel mill."

Hutcherson is expected to appeal the CPC decision to the County Commission if he can clear the project with state and federal regulators.

Should the CC turn him down, he could then file suit in court to over-turn the local rulings.

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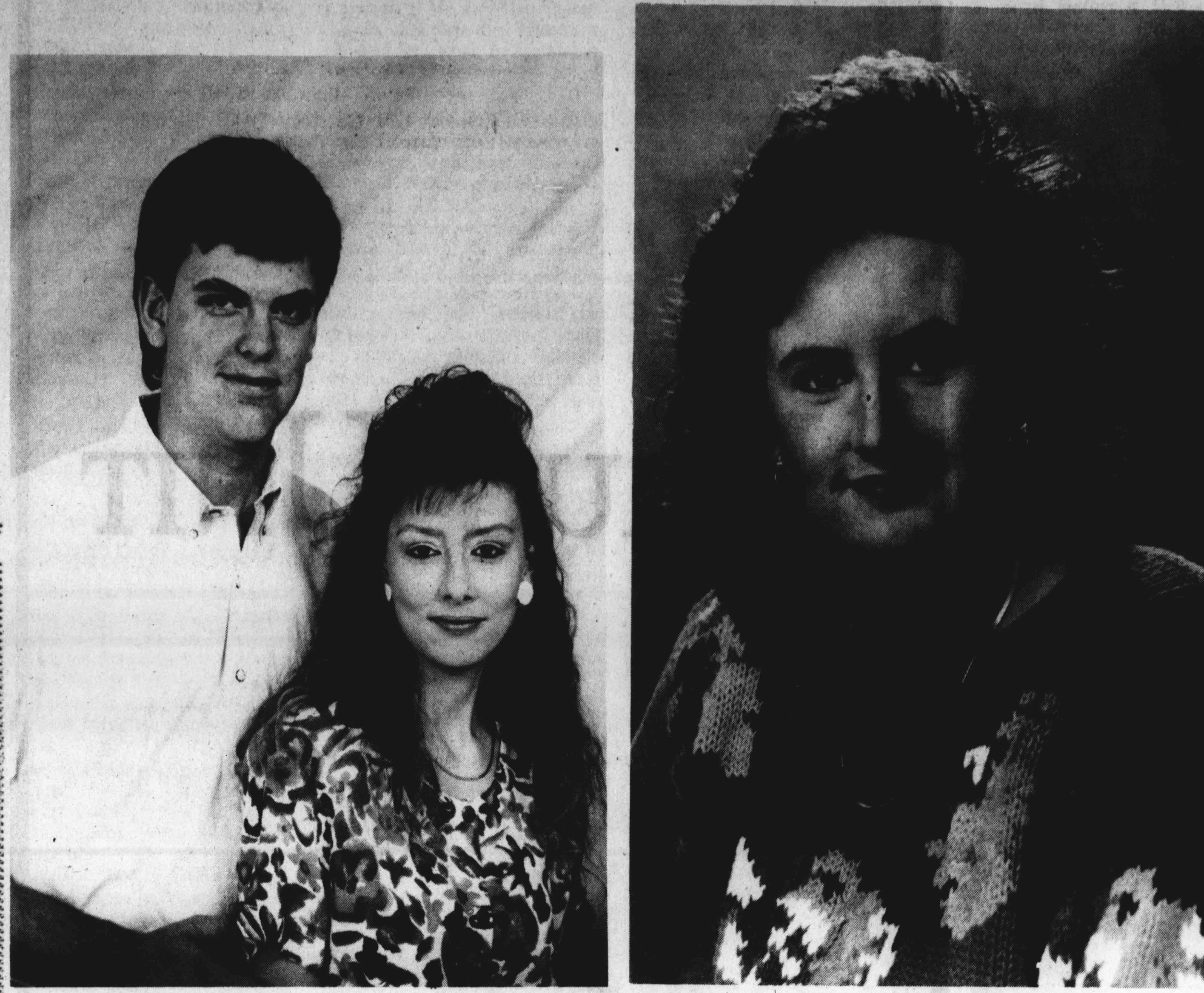

Doctors at Boston University School of Medicine suggest that a good example is important. Exercise paired with estrogen replacement therapy enables postmenopausal women to increase bone density. 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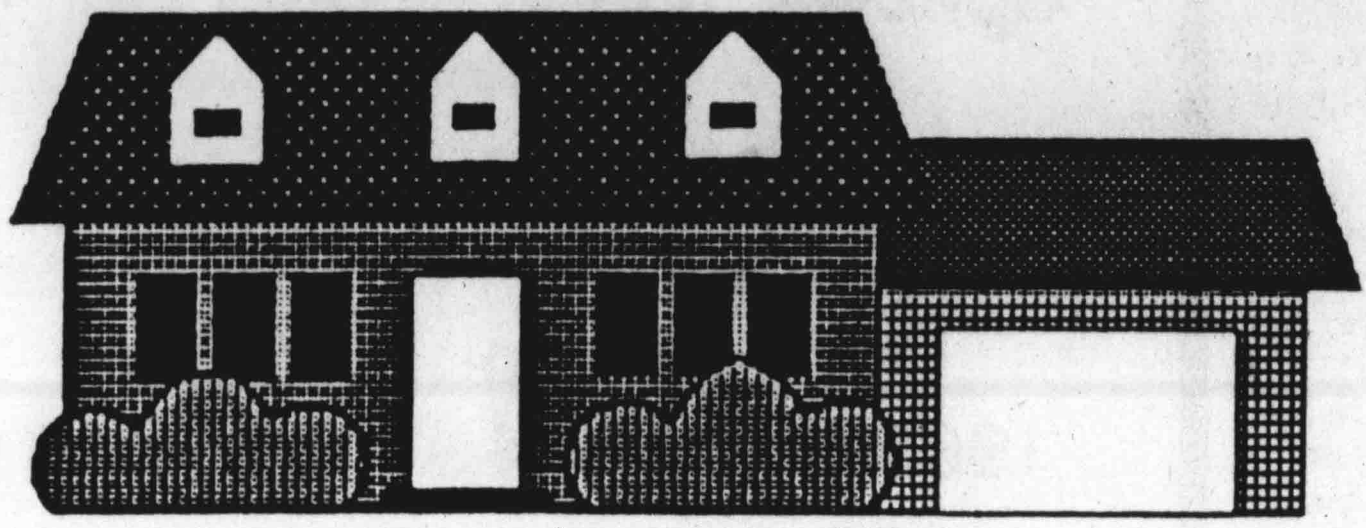

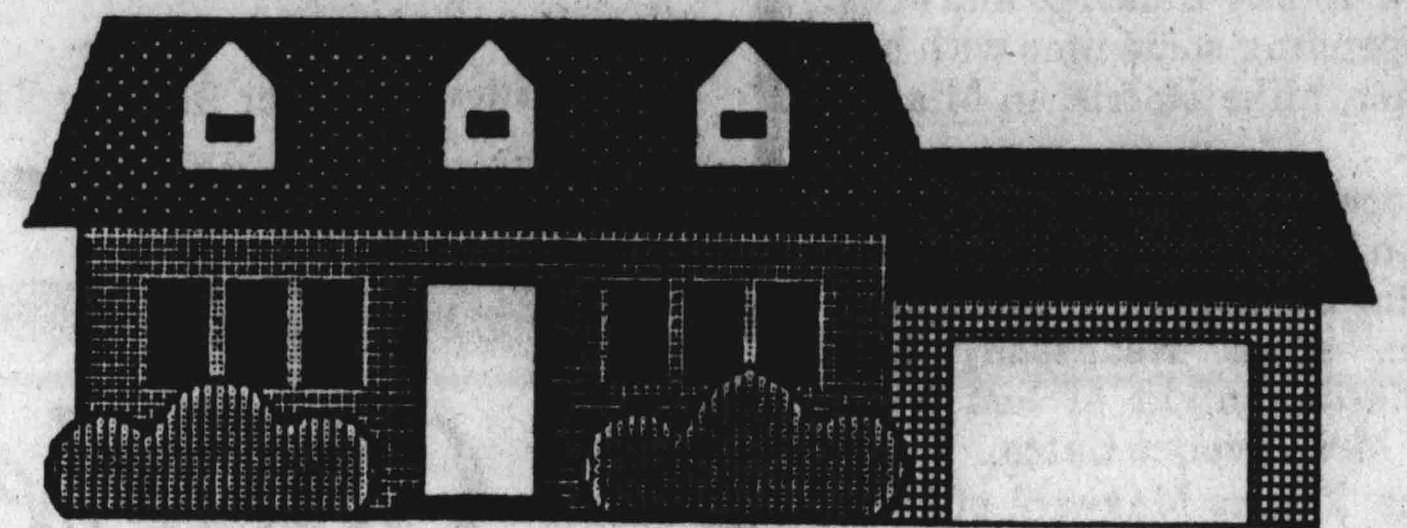
