Bramlett is a graduate of Memphis State University where he became Honorable Mention All-American in football and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in both baseball and football in 1980.

He played professional baseball two years for the St. Louis Cardinals and seven years in the National Football League on various teams. He was runner-up to Joe Namath for Rookie of the Year in 1965. He also played in two Pro Bowls (1966 and 1967). He was selected to the All-Time Denver Broncos team and was voted New England Patriots M.V.P. in 1970.

He now has a Christian ministry of speaking in churches, high schools, prisons, universities, and corporate groups. He and his wife Nancy have two grown sons, Andy and Don, and make their home in Memphis.

Crain Aids, Dunavant Shuns Sales Tax Jump

State Rep. Floyd Crain, of Ripley, last week aided a 54-45 House vote to approve, for one year, a 1/2% increase in the state sales tax, effective April 1st.

State Sen. Leonard Dunavant, of Millington, who represents this county, voted "No" when the Senate approved the boost, 23-9.

Dunavant had sponsored a state income tax bill last year and did so again at the start of this session. He soon cancelled his sponsorship.

Before the House voted on the sales tax leap, it voted to put on the Aug. 6th primary ballots a proposal to call a Constitutional Convention, with delegates to be elected on the Nov. 3rd general election ballots, to plan future taxation in Tennessee.

That won the votes to pass the sales tax hike in the House.

The convention has not yet won Senate approval.

"I know that many who reside in my district oppose any tax increase," Crain says.

"I respect their opinions, and I appreciate the many letters that I have received; however, in a representative form of government, the good of the majority must be considered.

"I am convinced that my vote was for the good of the majority since it will bring \$1,534,852 to Haywood County schools and \$1,944,101 to Lauderdale County schools which will assure that the schools will stay open and buses will continue to run without a large property tax increase.

"The future of this state is in the hands of the teachers in our schools.

"Without proper financing, that future would be very grim.

"Another school year like 1991-92, with all the negative publicity by national-wide media, should not occur.

"It impedes industrial development, and it denies our young citizens jobs when they complete their education.

"I believe standing by the future generations and their better education will prove that my actions were justified."

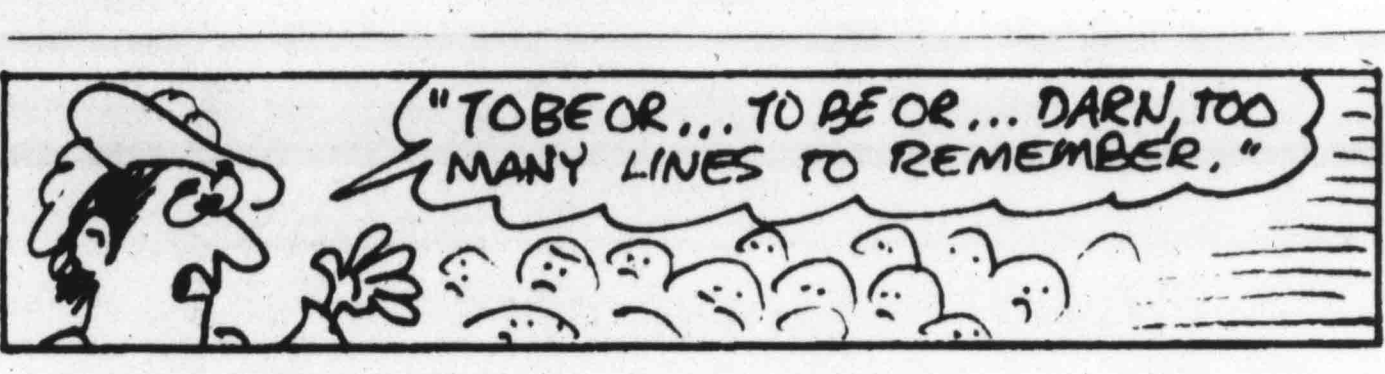

Most Countians Ignore Hyped 'Super Tuesday'

Only 13% of the county's registered voters cast ballots in Tuesday's "Super Tuesday" presidential preference primary, with no surprises in the results. George Bush won about three of four Republican votes, with 315 to Pat Buchanan's 104; David Duke's vote was 25, the "uncommitted" vote eight. Bill Clinton swept the Democratic votes, with 1,122 to 63 for Paul Tsongas and 38 for Jerry Brown.

Eight votes were cast for candidates who had already withdrawn from the race; 19 votes went "uncommitted."

The county appears to have backed Bush and Clinton more than the state at large. At press-time, The Associated Press credited Bush with 72% of the state vote, Clinton with 68%.

"The \$230,000,000 it will generate state-wide will replace \$700,000 cut to our school system last year," Webb says.

"This money can be used to purchase the text-books we were unable to buy this year, to replace the 12-year-old, worn-out school buses, and will put physical education classes back in our elementary schools.

"The remainder of the \$230,000,000 will be distributed to school systems in a much more equitable manner...based on the number of students in the county, rather than the wealth of the county..."

"There are 139 school systems in Tennessee, and Lauderdale County currently ranks 134th in pupil funding..."

"We will receive a much higher percentage of the 1/2% tax because there are only five school systems in the state operating on less money per pupil than Lauderdale schools..."

"Over 1,500,000 of the \$1,900,000 to our school system will be collected outside Lauderdale County. I know that cities such as Memphis and Nashville were not enthusiastic about the 1/2% sales tax increase, because they won't get to keep all of it, as they have in the past."

"This 1/2% will be distributed equally to all the state's school systems, based on pupil enrollment and local tax base."

Webb says new funds will help county schools expand courses, add computer labs, buy new buses, and maintain buildings.

"We will probably never have the funds to raise local teacher salaries to reach the national average," he says, "but our salary schedule can be more competitive with surrounding school systems..."

"No one favors a tax increase...however, given the option of facing further budget cuts to our school system, it was the least expensive option for our school children and our tax-payers."

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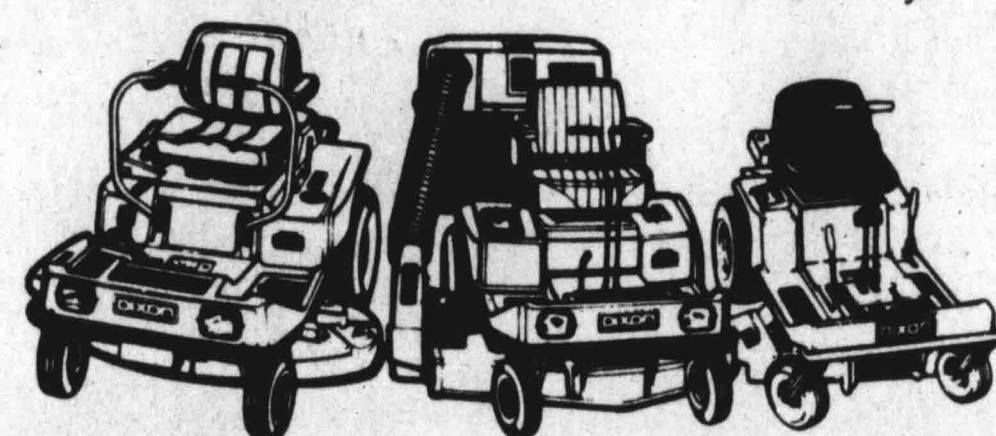

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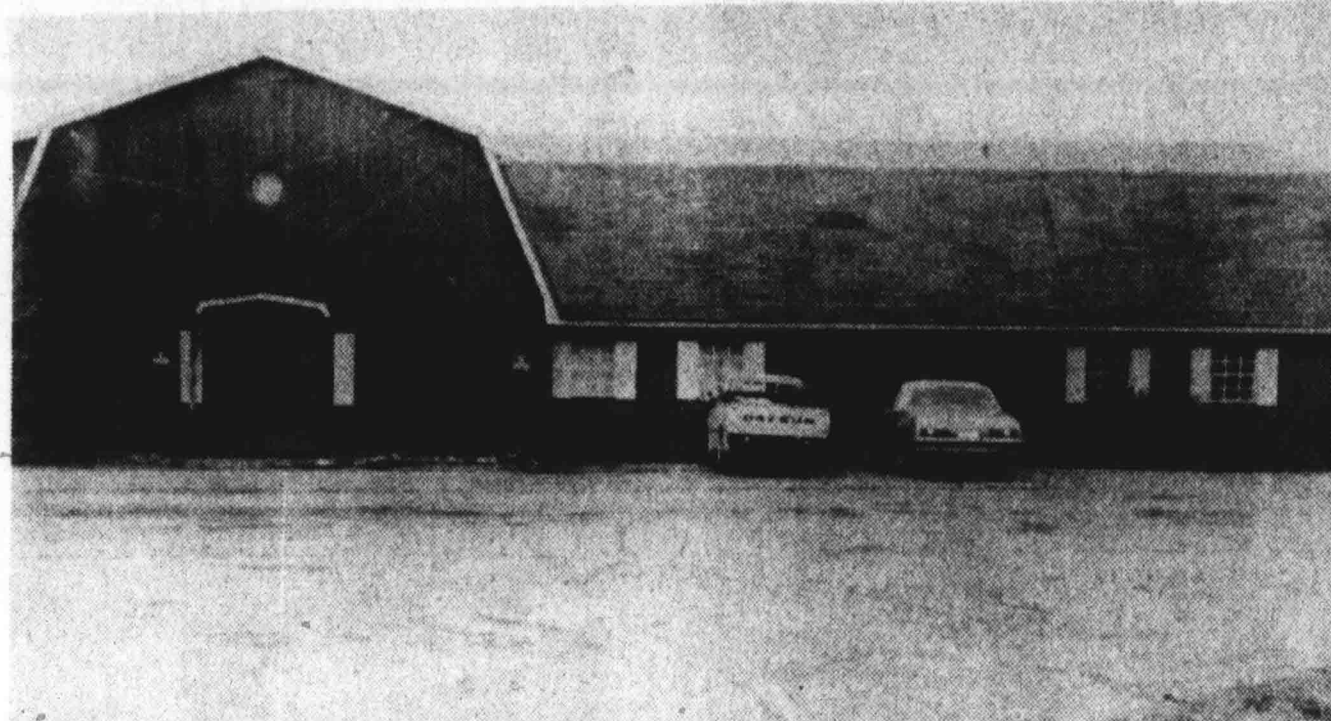

INVENTORY NEEDED

"Simple precautions, such as making a written inventory of your valuables, can help protect you against losses," says Lauderdale County Sheriff Jerry Lynn Crain.

If your home was destroyed by fire, could you list all your valuables? If your home was burglarized, could you determine everything that was missing or could you identify anything that was recovered?

According to the Sheriff, it pays to record the contents of your home and serial numbers of your valuable belongings.

"You should complete a household inventory form for all items in every room of your home," Sheriff Crain added. With an inventory form, you will have a permanent record of the contents of your home and their value readily available. The serial numbers should be listed so that identification of stolen articles could be made more easily.

Should you experience a loss, the inventory of your valuables will be a valuable record for both law enforcement agencies and your insurance agent.

Sheriff Crain recommended taking photographs of every room in your home and of your special or valuable belongings. A copy of the inventory list and one set of photographs of your valuables should be kept in a safe deposit box.

Sheriff Crain also suggested that persons engrave their social security number on items which do not have a serial number to further provide positive identification in the unfortunate event that your property is stolen. "Many times we recover lost or stolen property which is never returned to the rightful owner because positive identification cannot be made of the valuables," Sheriff Crain noted. Taking the small amount of time and effort necessary to complete an inventory is really one of the best "insurance policies" you could ever have.

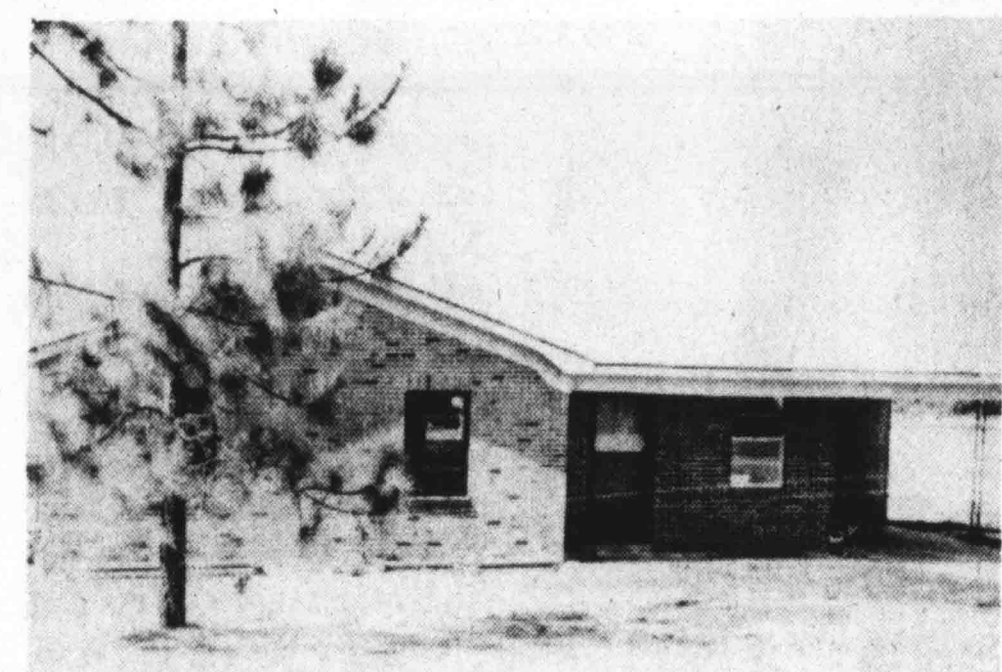

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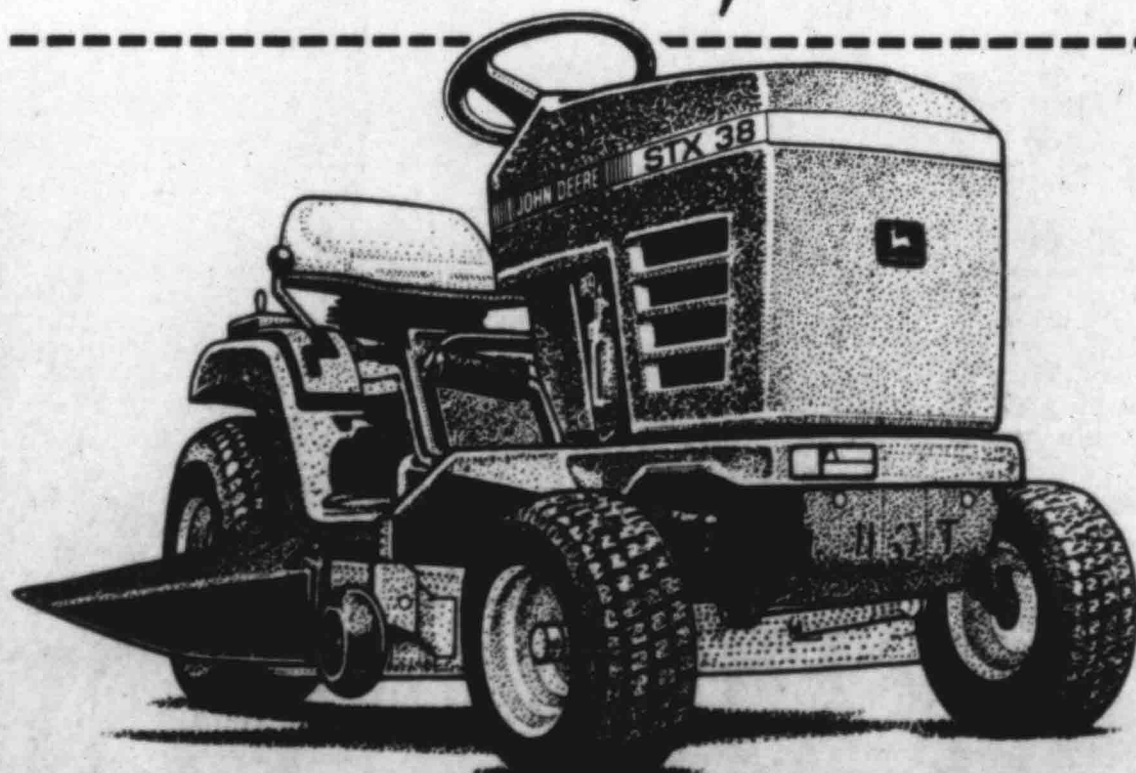

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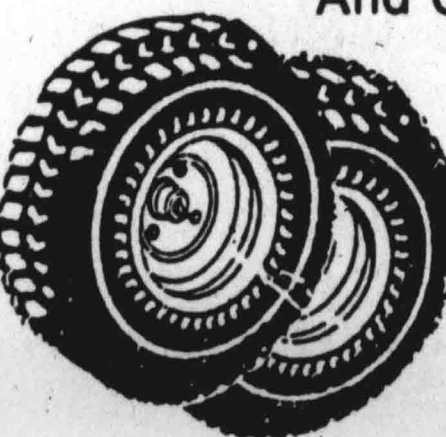

Pharmacy Topics

Aspirin with caffeine was 23 to 44 percent more effective than aspirin alone for patients with sore throat due to acute tonsillitis, in a study reported in *Archives of Internal Medicine*. The sweet smell of heliotropin, similar to vanilla, seems to relax patients so that they can more easily stay still for a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) test, doctors found at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York. Vitamins and minerals should be locked up, just like other drugs. Children are at risk for accidental-overdose poisoning from them. Three ounces of oatmeal, or two of oat bran - every day - do help cut cholesterol, when used as part of a low-fat, low cholesterol diet, the *Journal of the American Medical Association* reports. Women who take estrogen after menopause can cut their risk of heart disease almost in half, a large-scale, long-term study at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston found. of July, the fertilized egg remains static, almost, and a partially developed cub attaches itself to the mammary gland. The tiny cub weighs just one pound, later to grow to 800 to 1,200 pounds.

The population of bears is decreasing, and they are being influenced by the presence of people. 'Teen-age' bears, Michael says, are often put temporarily in 'Bear Jail'—a Quonset hut—for coming close to town in search of food while awaiting the freezing of the Bay.

During his stay, Michael counted 61 bears—26 in one particularly fruitful day. The males, in particular, are curious about anything strange invading their space, and often got up on the vehicles and peered inside. Michael's ability to describe their awesome size and power indicates his love and respect for them. 'I've written to the Canadian government about my concern for the bears,' says Michael. 'It seems to be little realization about what is happening to this unique species, and the pressures of the economy are much greater there. There is less of an ethic here we have to preserve such a treasure.'

There is more than a little irony in the presence of so many researchers at the site, Michael says, or they create their own kind of influence on the bears. 'Still, if we didn't let the world know about the situation, it would never be questioned,' he adds. 'But the added pressure of the tourist may be just too much. I think surely it is true we can love something to death. Maybe we're going to have to be content with pictures and films and reading about polar bears in 'National Geographic'. We are in danger of killing what we treasure most.'

Forest Plans Earning Aid

The Federal Government has funded a new cost share program aimed at non-industrial private forest landowners. The program is called the Stewardship Incentives Program (SIP) and will cost share for a variety of multiple use forestry practices.

The First step in being considered for the program is to obtain a Forest Stewardship Plan. The Tennessee Division of Forestry and other resource agencies work together with the landowner in developing the plan. The plan outlines multiple use practices such as timber stand improvement work, wildlife habitat development, tree planting trail construction and other to be performed on the tract of timberland once the plan is approved, cost shares are available to carry out these practices.

"We also appreciate Tennessee's giving us the benefit of their thinking on major legislative issues", he said.

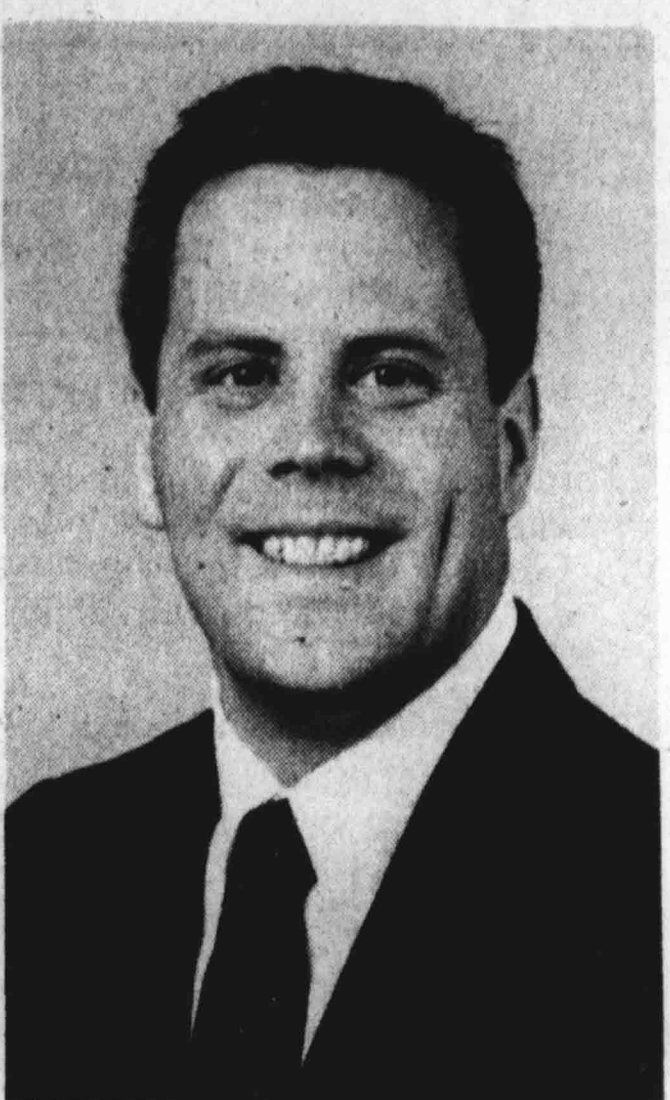

Water And Sewer Loans Available

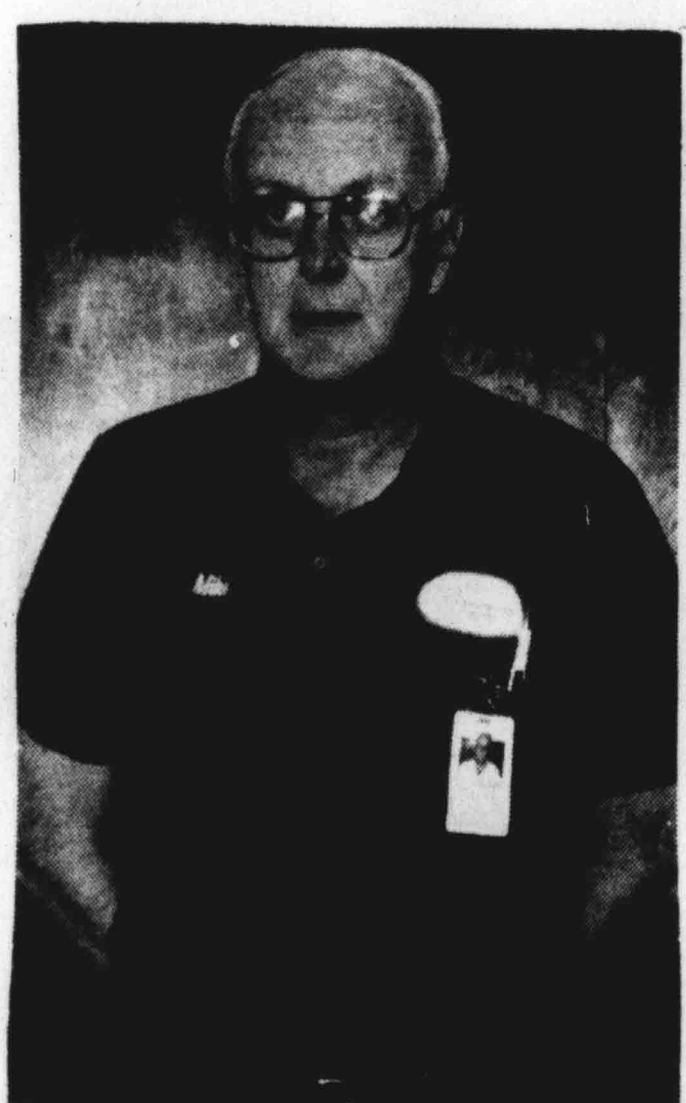

Important Notice To Dog Owners

All dog owners are hereby notified that the Tennessee Anti-Rabies Law, as passed by the 1957 legislature and approved by the Lauderdale County Court, will be enforced throughout the county. All dogs three months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian. All cats six months of age must be vaccinated by a veterinarian.

This law requires that all dogs in the county be vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian and licensed at the County Trustee's Office on or before the first day of May, each year, paying a county license fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each dog owned, kept, or harbored.

This law also requires that a certificate of rabies vaccination to date must be presented at the time of getting license and that no license certificate shall be issued unless a certificate of rabies vaccination is produced for each dog to be licensed.

In order to help dog owners get their dogs vaccinated, the following vaccination clinics have been set up throughout the county, and a charge of \$4.00 for each dog vaccinated will be made by the veterinarian at these clinics. A rabies control officer will accompany the veterinarian to these clinics, and all dogs can be licensed at these clinics. Good news: fewer pregnant women are taking alcohol. Researchers at the Centers for Disease control found that only 20 percent of pregnant women were drinking in 1988, down from 32 percent in 1985.

Even mild exercise can lower blood pressure for more than 12 hours, researchers found at the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. Small study got dramatic results.

New device simplifies the surgical removal of precancerous lesions and stems the spread of a sexually transmitted viral disease. Electrified wire loop, introduced from Britain and Canada,

removes lesions better than a biopsy and causes no pain or scar.

Some pediatricians suggest that acetaminophen --not aspirin-- should be used for those under 21. Excessive aspirin use by children has been linked to Reye's syndrome, a dangerous complication of viral diseases like flu and chickenpox. Convulsions and vomiting are danger signs.

ARTICHOKE AND WILD MUSHROOM STIR-FRY.

- 3 medium California artichokes
- 1 cup sliced wild mushrooms
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 tablespoons each dry white wine* and chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- Salt and pepper to taste

Bend back outer petals of artichokes until they snap off easily near base. Edible portion of petals should remain on artichoke hearts. Continue to snap off and discard thick petals until central core of pale green petals is reached. Cut off stems and top 2 inches of artichokes; discard. Trim outer dark green layer from artichoke bottoms. Cut artichokes into quarters lengthwise. Cut out center petals and fuzzy centers. Slice 1/2-inch thick lengthwise. Dip or rub all surfaces with lemon juice. Saute artichokes, mushrooms, onion and garlic in olive oil 3 minutes. Stir in wine, chicken broth and basil; salt and pepper to taste. Cook about 10 minutes or until artichoke is tender. Makes 4 servings.

*Water can be substituted for dry white wine.

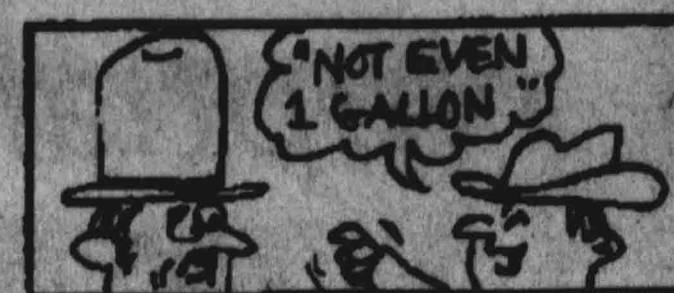

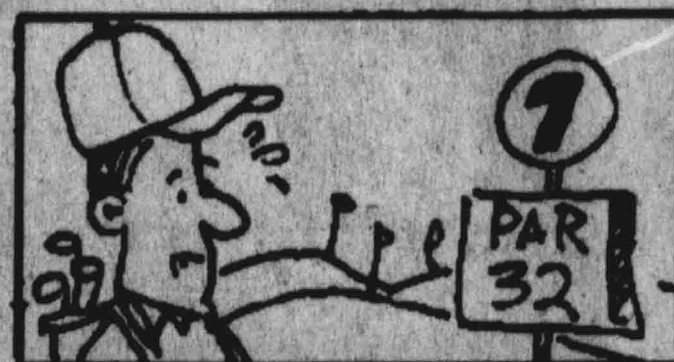

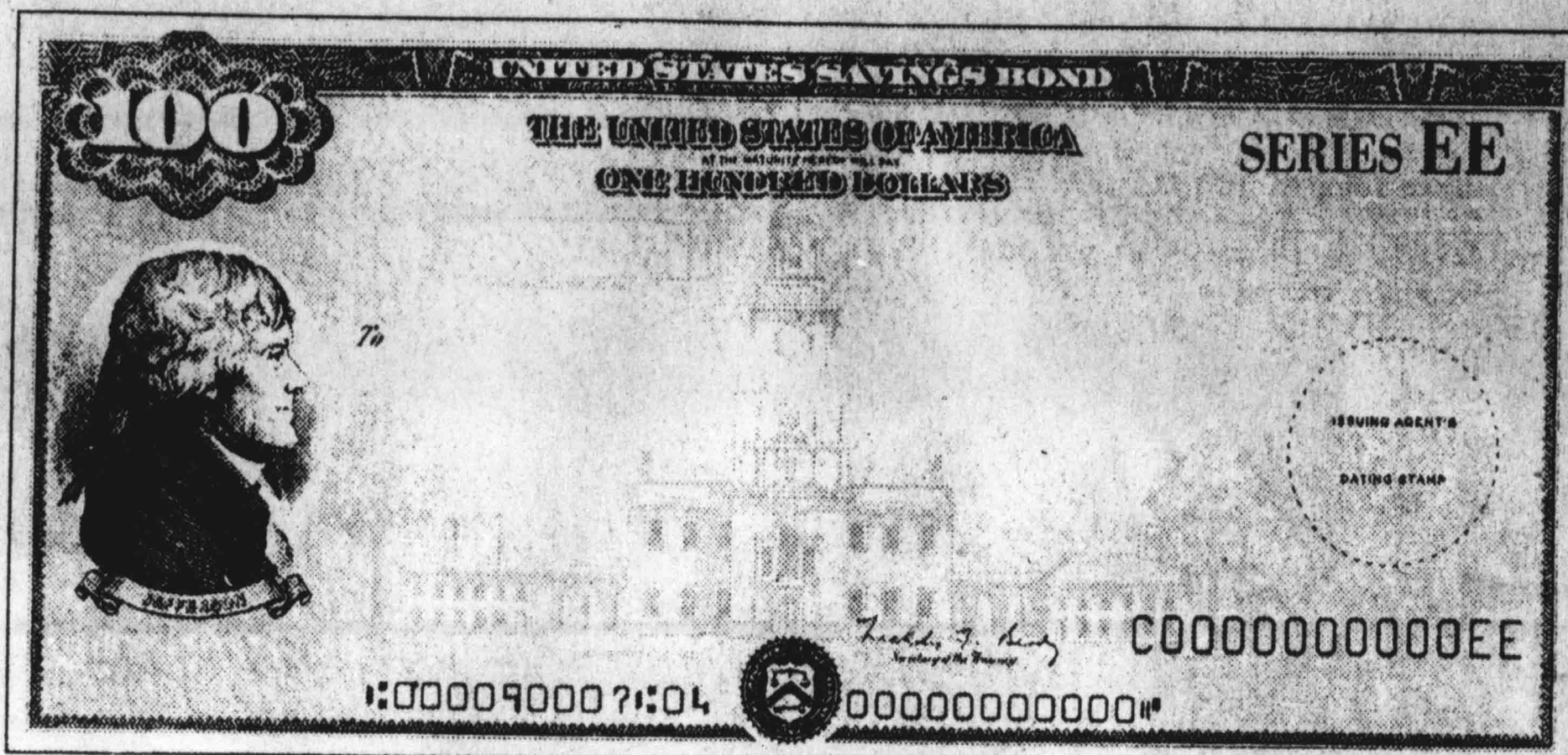
