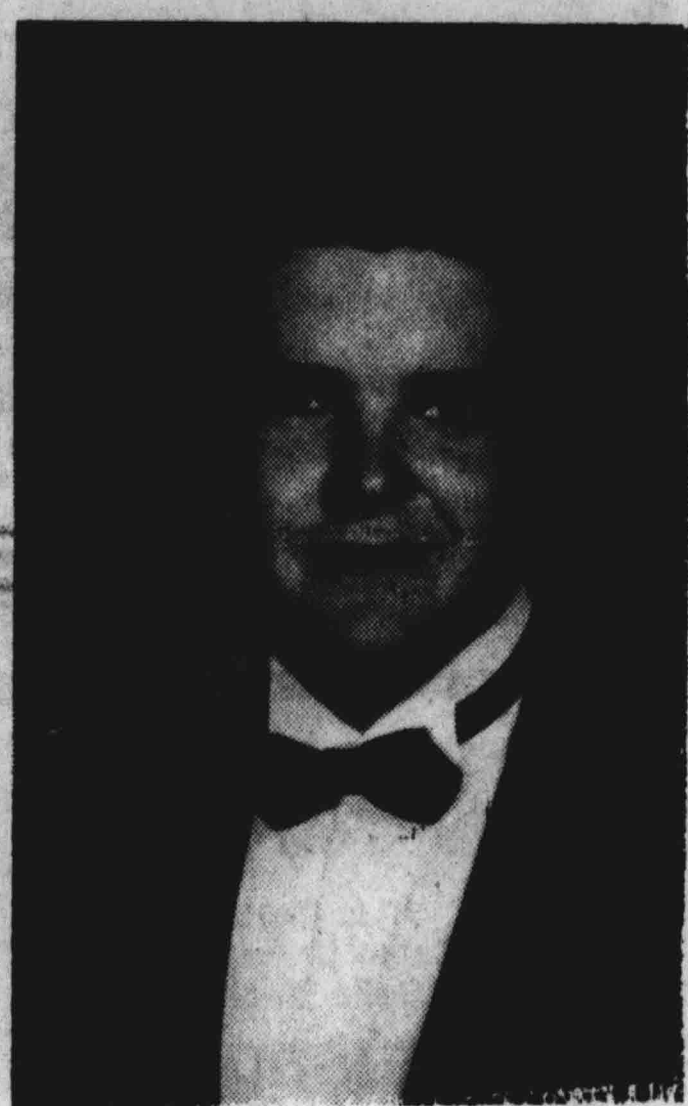

DR. E. GRADY BOGUE, brother of Mrs. Beth Escue, of Ripley, has published his fifth book, *The Evidence of Quality*, co-authored with Robert L. Saunders, dean emeritus of the College of Education of Memphis State University.

The book examines the mission of U.S. colleges and how their success is measured.

Dr. Bogue is visiting professor in the Department of Educational Leadership in the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. He is chancellor emeritus of Louisiana State University at Shreveport, where he served as chancellor 10 years. He was interim chancellor at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge in 1989.

He received his bachelor's degree in mathematics and his master's and doctor's degrees in education from MSU.

He has served as associate director for academic affairs with the Tenn. Higher Education Commission.

He spent the years 1964 through 1974 at MSU, where he held three different administrative appointments.

In addition to his books, he has published numerous articles in such journals as the *Harvard Business Review*, *Educational Record*, the *Journal of Higher Education*, *Vital Speeches*, and *Phi Delta Kappan*. He has been a consultant on planning, evaluation, quality assurance, and leadership to colleges and universities, state-level planning agencies, and corporations.

He was an American Council on Education fellow in academic administration in 1974-5 and served as a visiting scholar with the Educational Testing Service in 1988-9. He was director of the Performance Funding Project, which developed one of the first state-level incentive programs in higher education.

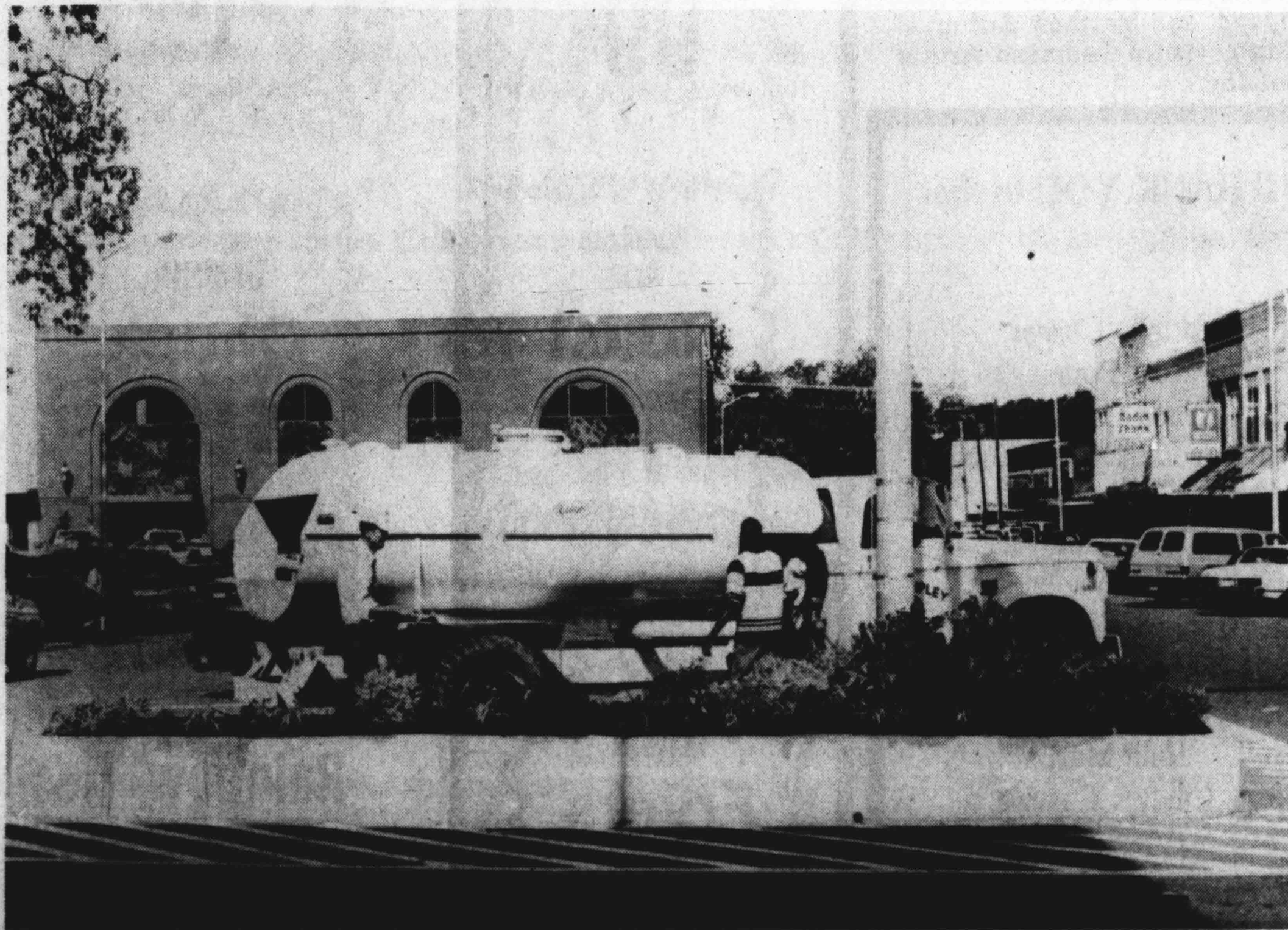

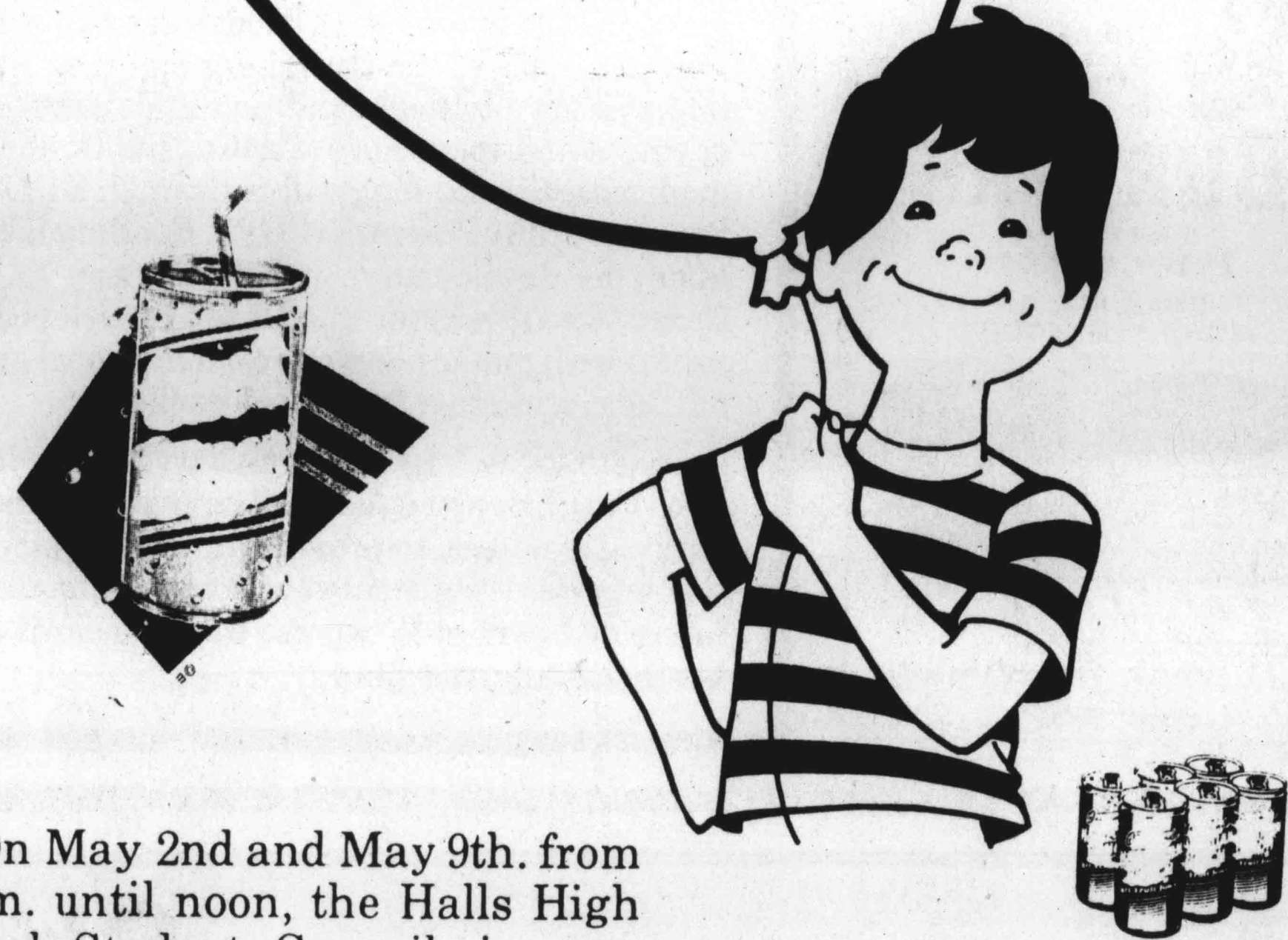

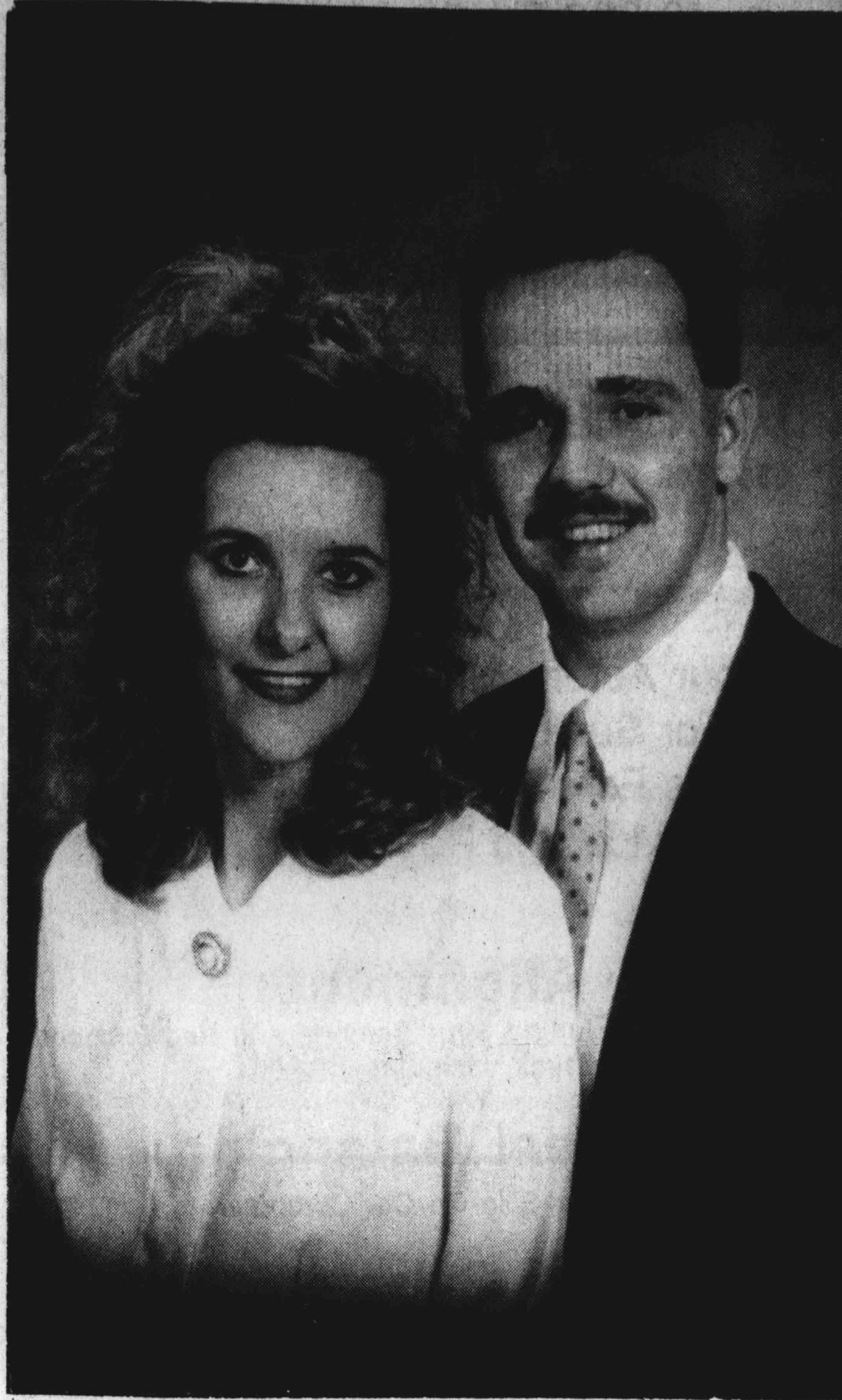

Possible cure for cystic fibrosis came a big step closer as doctors at the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, Bethesda, Maryland, successfully implanted healthy copies of a defective gene into the lungs of experimental animals. Human tests are a year away.

Isolated systolic hypertension (when only the first number in a reading is high) used to be left untreated as an accepted part of aging. Now doctors report that taking a mild diuretic lowers blood pressure and reduces the risk of heart attacks and stroke.

High-dose calcium supplementation helped teen-age mothers avoid premature delivery and reduced episodes of pregnancy-induced high blood pressure. The National Institute of Health is funding further tests.



The voices of those citizens of Lauderdale County who are in opposition to and those citizens who are in favor of our proposed Class 1 landfill and recycling facility are echoing through out the county. What ever your opinion, I am sending you this letter in an effort to inform you, your family and your friends on our plans and intentions. It is my desire that you be as knowledgeable on this subject as possible. I will also attempt to dispel fears and correct false rumors.

There have been several negative comments made about the operations currently being conducted at the "scrap yard" located on Old Highway 51 North just north of Halls.

The processing of scrap metals or "junk" is a dirty business. Few people are willing to dedicate their lives and professions to this end. Try to imagine the impact on our environment if we didn't have companies like Hutcherson Metals committed to reclaiming junk cars, trucks, farm equipment, tin from old barns and old batteries. The green rolling hills of Lauderdale County would be cluttered with these rusting eye sores. Every country road would be the depository of our discards. It is a physical impossibility to process and prepare these items without creating some dust and noise. Hutcherson Metals has and will continue to invest it's capital into equipment which will aid in this processing while attempting to reduce any negative impact to the environment and the citizens of Lauderdale County.

West Tennessee Enterprises has been created to aid in this reclaiming of discards.

1. The primary goal of this West Tennessee Enterprises is to build and operate a state of the art recycling facility. The disposal of solid waste is a major cost and concern of all businesses. We believe Hutcherson Metals, Inc. will become much more competitive when we are able to offer our clients a viable alternative for their waste disposal. Hutcherson Metals will continue to purchase their scrap metals and West Tennessee Enterprises will recycle their waste.

It is not now nor has it ever been the intention of West Tennessee Enterprises to bury bulk municipal, hospital or industrial waste. We are in the recycling business and the waste of our clients offers us an additional source of revenue and additionally offers our clients a reduction in their waste disposal costs.

2. The construction plans for our recycling facility calls for a 30,000 square foot metal building which will house a baler and conveying system. This conveying system will include means for both manual and mechanical picking and sorting of materials.

All wastes processed at this facility MUST be inspected prior to the completion of the sorting process. We will have trained and certified inspectors on this sorting line to insure that the products removed from the waste stream meets or exceeds the stringent requirements set by the various consumers of these recycled products.

Glass will be cleaned and separated by the colors amber, green and clear. It will then be packaged for shipment to consumers.

The aluminum cans will be cleaned and separated from the steel cans. They will then be baled or densified and prepared for shipment to consumers.

The plastic containers will be inspected and separated according to their composition and color; such as HDPE, 1e plastic milk jugs, and PET, 1e 2 liter soft drink bottles, and others. It will then be baled or granulated prior to shipment to consumers.

The cardboard boxes paper will be separated by grades and baled. Newspaper, computer paper and miscellaneous paper products will be inspected and separated. Newspaper will be baled or shredded and sold to consumers or to others for bedding material. The computer paper used with a dot matrix computer will be separated from the computer paper used with a laser printer and then baled prior to shipment to consumers.

Wood products will be separated and baled prior to shipment to be sold as an alternative to petroleum fuel.

Tires will be removed from the waste stream and shredded or granulated. This material will then be sold as a base material to be used in asphalt and other construction materials.

Textile and leather products, removed from this waste stream, will be processed and sold for export to third world countries.

There is a cost that we must recover from the construction of this recycling facility and for it's operation. The more material that is removed from the waste stream through the recycling efforts of West Tennessee Enterprises results in more recycled materials available for sale. THE FEAR OF THE UNKNOWN AND OR HAZARDOUS WASTES BEING DEPOSITED INTO THE LAND FILL IS NOT A VALID CONCERN. We will inspect the waste stream and it is not in our best interest financially nor is it in the best interest of our employees to allow hazardous, radioactive or infectious medical waste to enter our facility.

3. The proposed Class 1 landfill, which we intend to construct, is considered a convenience for our operation. We currently hold a valid building permit for the construction of this recycling facility and we have begun construction on the site of our present operating landfill. The waste that is not recyclable will be deposited in a landfill. We plan to transport this waste to the Lauderdale County landfill until our Class 1 landfill is permitted and operational.

4. We are currently formulating plans for the drilling of deep water wells which will provide us an uninterrupted water supply for cleaning and daily wash down.

5. The present or future public road requirements are not within the scope of our ability to plan or project. We feel that the taxes that we pay each year provide us the same rights and privileges as any citizen to road use and access.

6. The future harbors concerns and uncertainties for us all. The current concern being voiced is the desire and intention by some to prevent the permitting of this new state of the art Class 1 landfill.

Questions to ponder is "WHAT IS THE PRESENT CONDITION OF THE EXISTING LAUDERDALE COUNTY LANDFILL AND WHAT IS IT'S FUTURE?"

"WHAT IS PRESENTLY BEING DONE TO INSURE THAT HAZARDOUS, INFECTIOUS OR TOXIC WASTES ARE NOT CURRENTLY BEING DEPOSITED AND BURIED?"

"WHAT PERCENTAGE OF THE WASTE DELIVERED TO THE PRESENT LAUDERDALE COUNTY LANDFILL IS BEING INSPECTED?"

The present Lauderdale County landfill DOES NOT meet the new state mandated laws and requirements. Consequently, this landfill must be closed and operations stopped as early as October, 1993 and no later than a time prior to March, 1994.

Should Lauderdale County desire to operate a Class 1 landfill, even at it's present site, the county will be required to meet or exceed all the new regulations. It will be necessary for the Lauderdale County citizens and tax payers to finance the following.

A. Contract with an engineering firm to determine that the existing site is satisfactory. What will be this cost?

B. Conduct a hydrogeologic evaluation. How many wells must be drilled and what will be the cost? Who bears these costs if it is determined that the site is not satisfactory?

C. Determine the type and number of natural and or synthetic liners required. What are their costs?

D. A leachate collection, treatment and disposal facility must be designed and constructed. What is this cost?

E. The new Class 1 landfill must be designed and constructed. What is the estimate of these design and construction costs?

F. What is estimated to be the cost per year or per tax payer to operate this new Class 1 landfill?

7. Will Lauderdale County be able to continue to entice or persuade new industry to locate in Lauderdale County if Lauderdale County does not provide an adequate landfill?

8. How will Lauderdale County continue to finance new or improved schools and roads with out new industry?

9. How will Lauderdale County assist in providing new jobs for our children and grand children with out new industry?

10. Will our children and grand children be forced to move from this area for jobs?

I can not answer these questions; but feel that they are questions that deserve your attention and require answers. The present Hutcherson Metals landfill dilemma will pass; but the concerns previously mentioned will remain.

I wish you wisdom and insight as you ponder this controversial dilemma. Follow your conscience and determine what is best for the community, the environment and the present and future citizens of Lauderdale County. West Tennessee Enterprises and Hutcherson Metals, a leader in the recycling industry for over 25 years, is prepared to construct and operate a STATE OF THE ART Class 1 landfill which can benefit all. I will be available to answer any questions or address any concerns you have.

State Legislators End Controversial Session

The Tennessee House of Representatives completed their business on Capitol Hill Thursday of last week and adjourned sine die from the 97th General Assembly.

Education Reform

Members of the General Assembly voted 54-45 to raise the sales tax from 5.5 to 6 percent, generating a total of \$276 million a year, restoring \$230 million of the cuts Tennessee schools received during the 1991-92 fiscal year.

An additional \$114 million was distributed on a pro rata basis based on each school district's share of the scaled down version of the governor's original plan.

A \$200 licensure fee for professionals including architects, doctors and lawyers was also included in the bill raising \$22.7 million per year for other state services.

The maximum tax rate could not exceed 8.75 percent in any locality under provisions passed.

The bill went into effect April 1st of this year and expires June 1993.

Workers' Compensation

An effort to reform workers' compensation in Tennessee passed the General Assembly this week.

The bill establishes a workers' compensation advisory council to make recommendations to oversee the performance of workers' compensation.

Safety committees will be organized by employers to assess safety and better the quality of safety in the workplace.

An effort has also been made within the bill to control the rising costs of medical care within the workers' compensation program.

The bill will also establish a state fund to be submitted to all eligible parties a request for proposals for a preferred provider program for employers with workers' compensation coverage.

Proposal Passes

Members of the General Assembly approved legislation recently for the Medicaid program in Tennessee by passing a total budget of \$2.8 billion, aiding over 817,363 persons who are eligible for Medicaid.

The law will implement a \$525 million tax on hospitals and non-medical services and a \$90 million tax on nursing homes. The taxes will become effective Oct. 1st and will end on March 1, 1994.

Medicaid services provided in Tennessee cover hospitals, doctors, nursing homes, pharmacists, and mental health facilities.

Also included are ambulance services, hospice services, check-

ups and immunization shots for children, and medical equipment.

The program also provides limited coverage for physical therapy, speech therapy and rehabilitation.

The Medicaid Bureau, under the Department of Health and Environment, plans, organizes, develops, coordinates and directs the Medicaid program in Tennessee.

Balanced Budget

The 97th General Assembly approved a \$10.7 billion state budget including a funding mechanism for Medicaid, resorting cuts in K-12 education and a possible increase for state employees.

Allocated funds include the contingent appropriations for the 1992-1993 fiscal year, all dependent upon the amount of money overcollected in the budget.

Effective January 1, 1993, State employees, higher education employees and K-12 teachers would be the first to receive a pay raise of 1 to 4 percent in half percent increments in state revenues are above estimated projections. A pay raise requires \$26 million for each 1 percent.

Reapportionment Plans

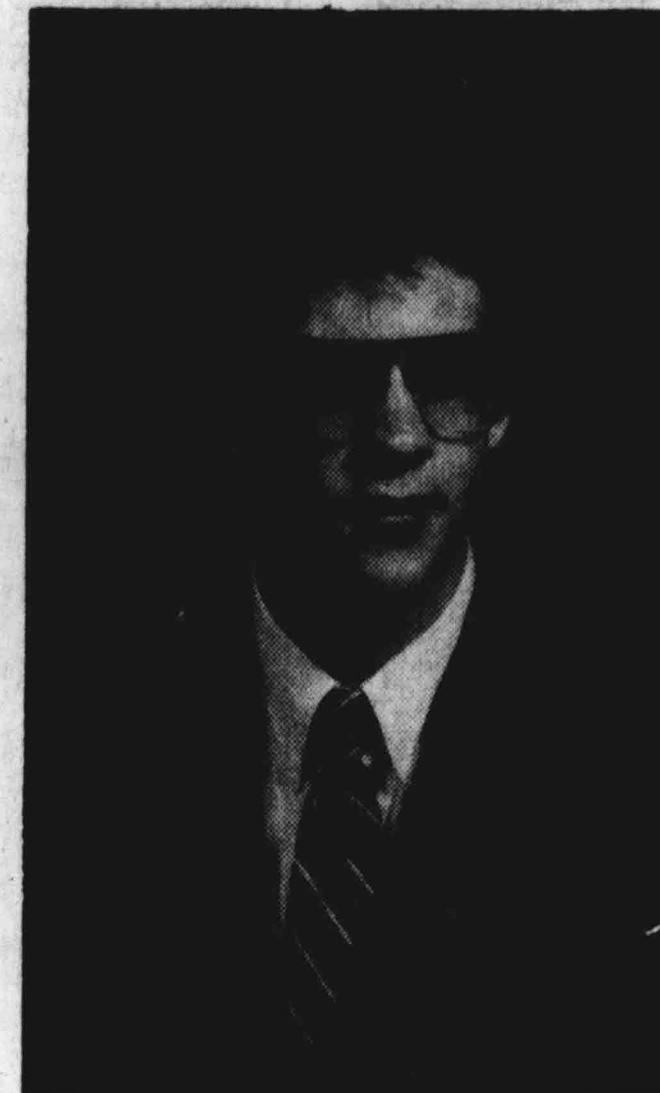
Members of the 97th General Assembly approved congressional, State House and Senate reapportionment plans during the last two weeks of the General Assembly. The state legislature is required to adopt new boundaries for the State House and Senate as well as congressional districts every 10 years to conform to the variances in population compiled by the 1990 census.

African-American communities will be provided an equal opportunity to participate in the political process and to elect candidates of their choice. The November elections will likely result in the largest number of minority representatives in the state of Tennessee in the 20th century.

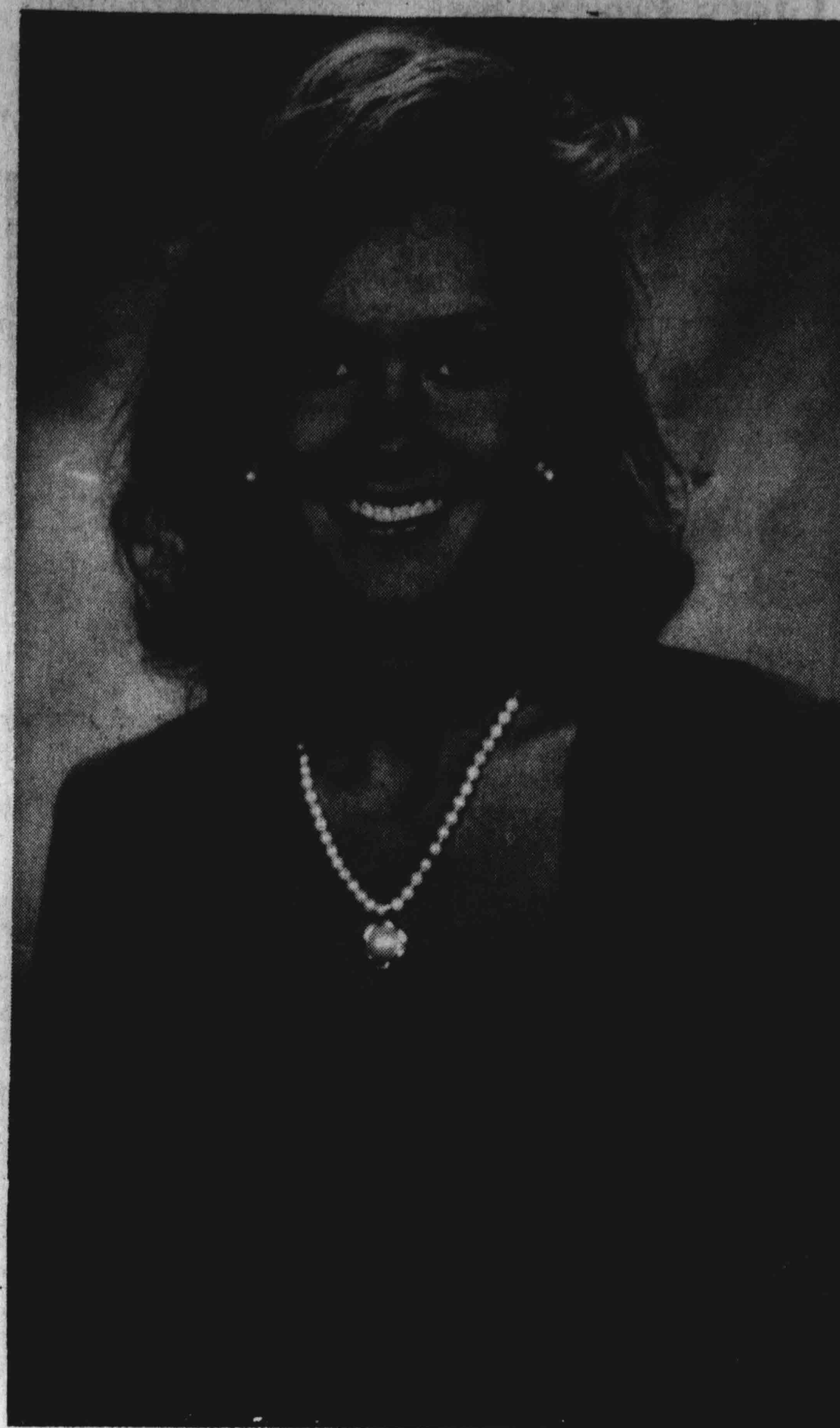

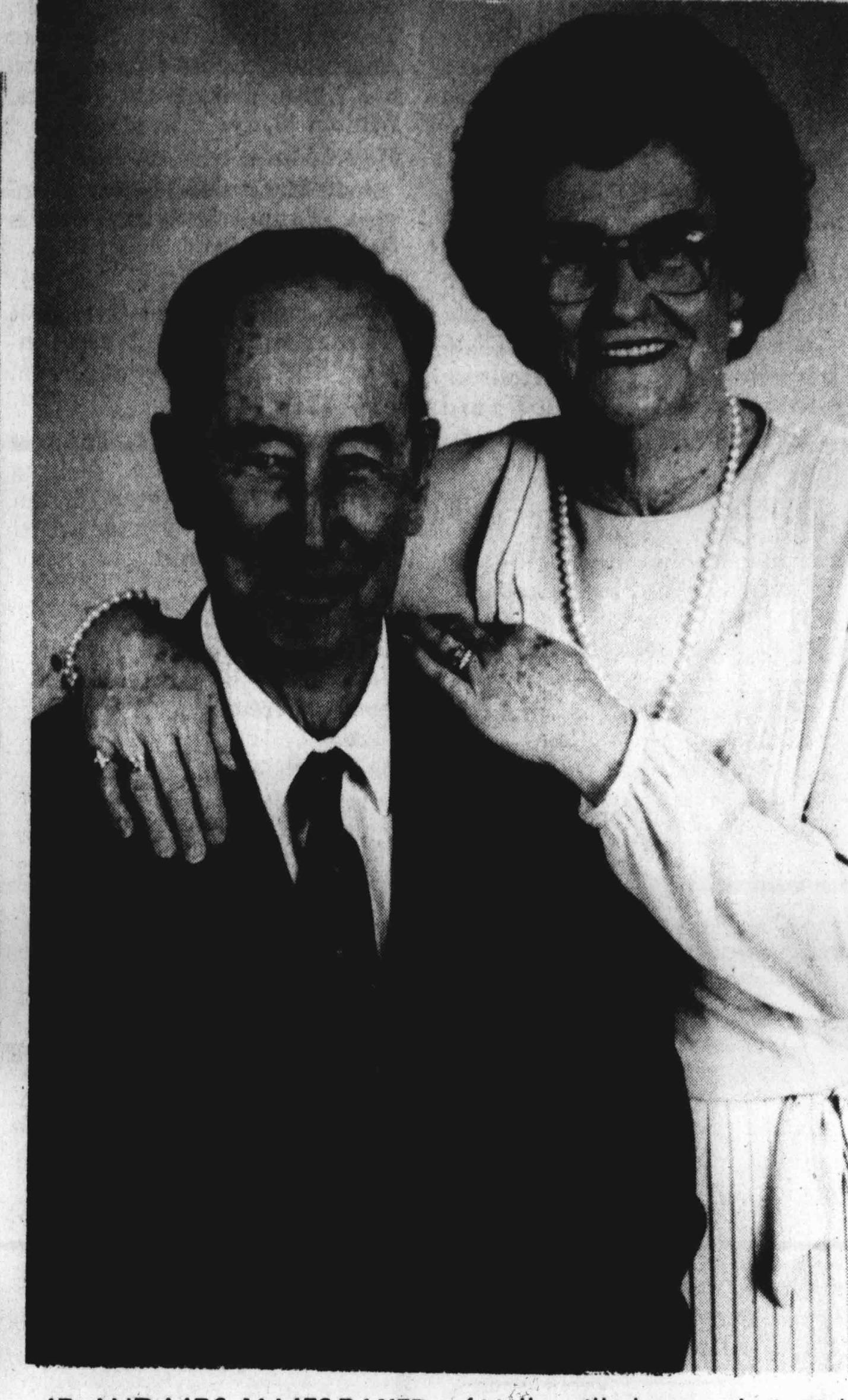

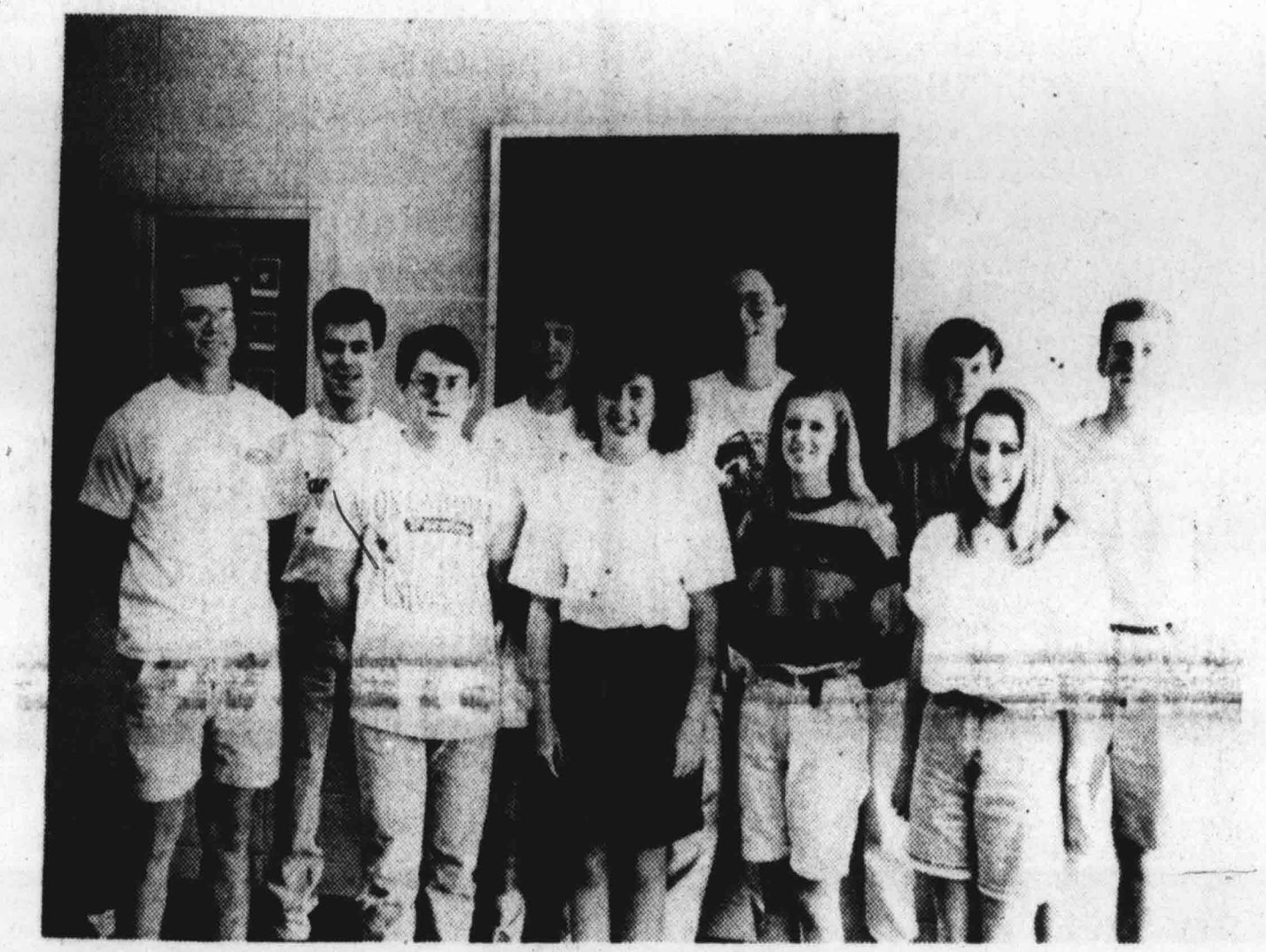

McCorkle Award 4 Countians Among 14 At Halls Elem. Held For Thefts Using Old Air Base In Halls

Sixth grade students at Halls Elementary School have an opportunity to be rewarded for excellence in English. Mrs. Davy Strong is establishing the "Mrs. H. G. McCorkle Award" to honor Mrs. McCorkle for her distinguished teaching career in Halls schools for over 30 years. During many of those years, Mrs. McCorkle sponsored the H. C. McCorkle Award for excellence in English in memory of her late husband and former high school principal.

Arrests in four states Thursday of last week, on a 31-count indictment from a federal grand jury in Jackson, included five defendants with addresses in Lauderdale or Crockett Counties.

Among 14 charged with receiving and/or interstate transportation of stolen property were Clifford Dwight Ellis, 39, and Claude R. Lewis, 52, of Gates, Rusty Clark, 59, and Larry Goodman, 30, of Halls, and Danny Cobb, 37, of Maury City.

Conviction could bring a maximum sentence of 10 years, plus a fine of up to \$10,000.

The 14 are charged with stealing trucks loaded with everything from tires and aluminum ingots to "34,000 pounds of frozen chicken drumsticks," The Jackson Sun reports.

The Sun says some of the stolen trucks were "cut up for parts and scrap" and their merchandise "unloaded and sold" from the former air base in Halls.

"In the three years the ring operated," the Sun says, "federal authorities believe as many as 250 trucks, valued at more than \$2.5 million, were taken there and cut up."

Last July, Richard Douglas, of Allied Lumber Co. in Ripley, alerted authorities when offered a load of plywood at suspiciously low prices.

Others arrested were J. R. Rippee, 50, Charles Rippee, 37, David Lynn Rippee, 33, Phillip E. Curry, 31, Roger William Tharp, 35, and Royce Willard Wilson, 37, of Poplar Bluff, Mo.; Billy Gene Rippee, 30, and Robert J. Rippee, 39, of St. Louis, Mo.; and Paul Jackson, 36, of Mantachie, Miss.

County farmers have accomplished much in the last few years in trying to save soil, renew resources, and contribute to clean ground and surface waters. There are, however, still improvements to be made.

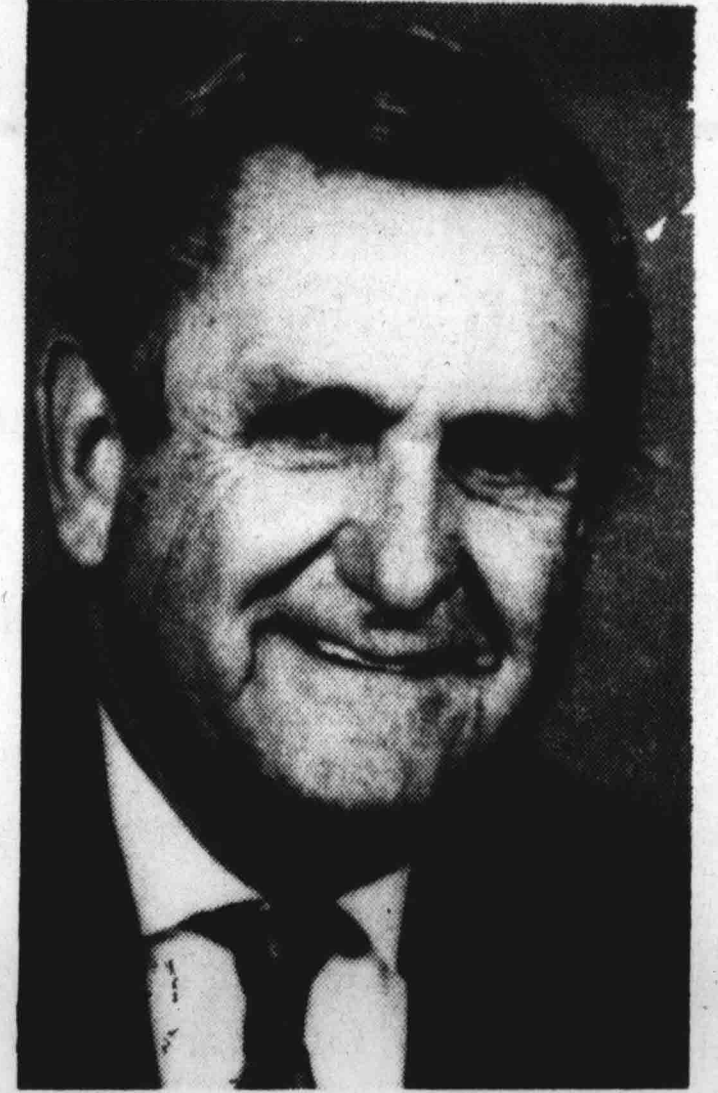

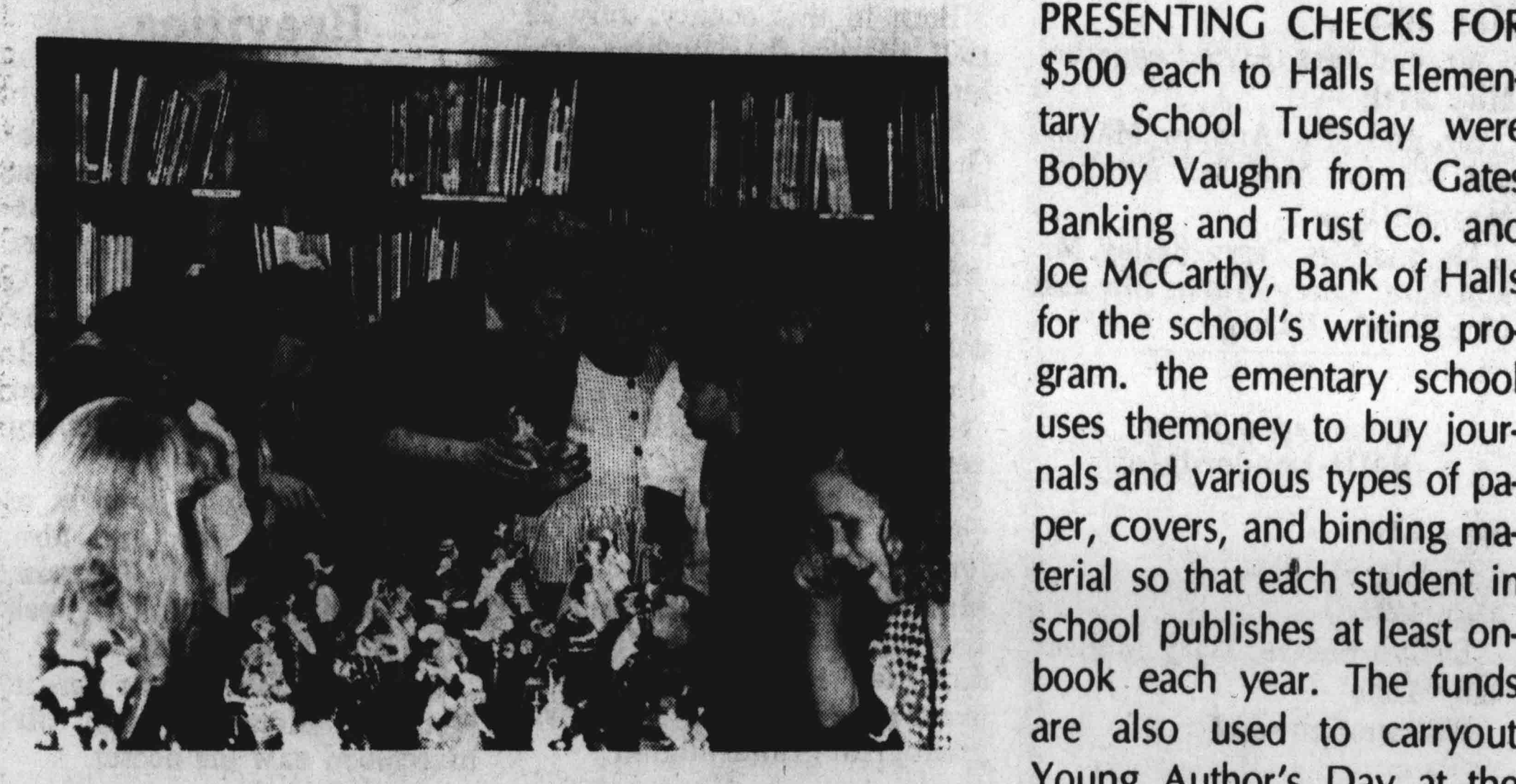

Balloon angioplasty to open clogged arteries is more effective than medication alone to relieve the pain of angina. The New England Journal of Medicine reports. Studies were done around the country.

Safe alternative to hysterectomy can stop abnormal uterine bleeding while sparing the uterus, a British study found. Instrument with a wire loop is inserted into the uterus and the heated loop is used to remove the endometrium that produces the bleeding.

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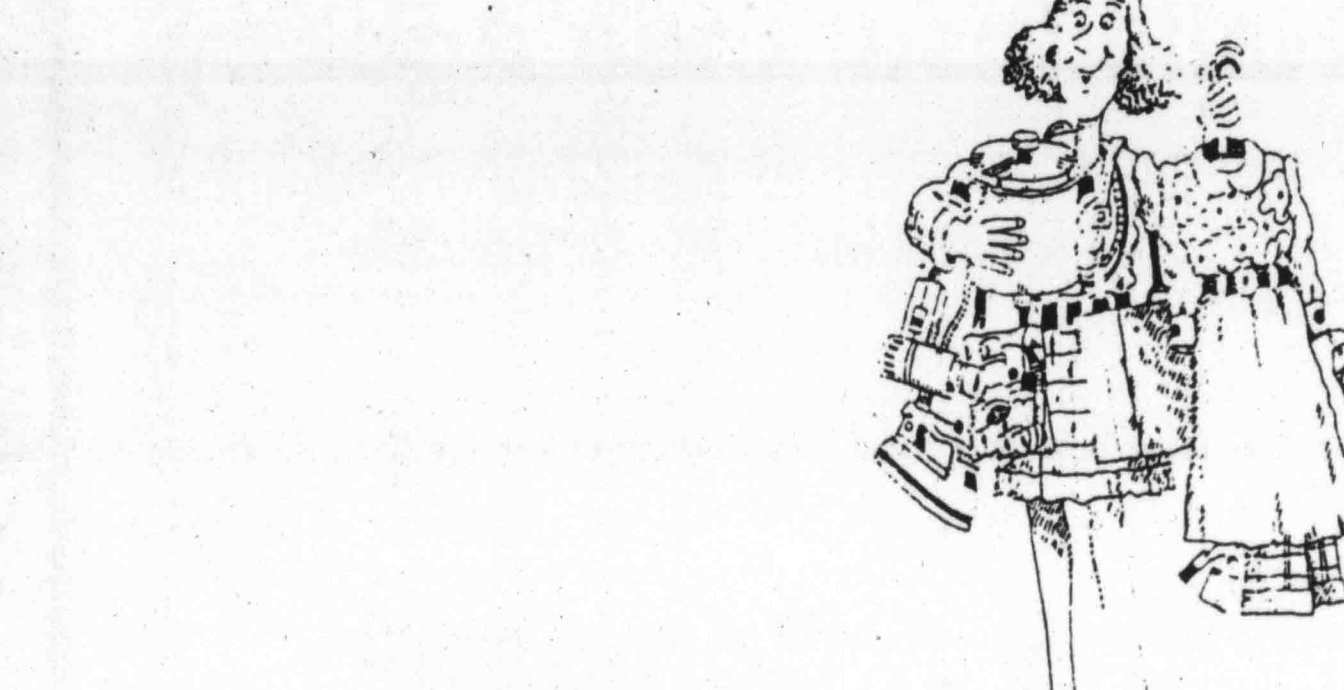

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

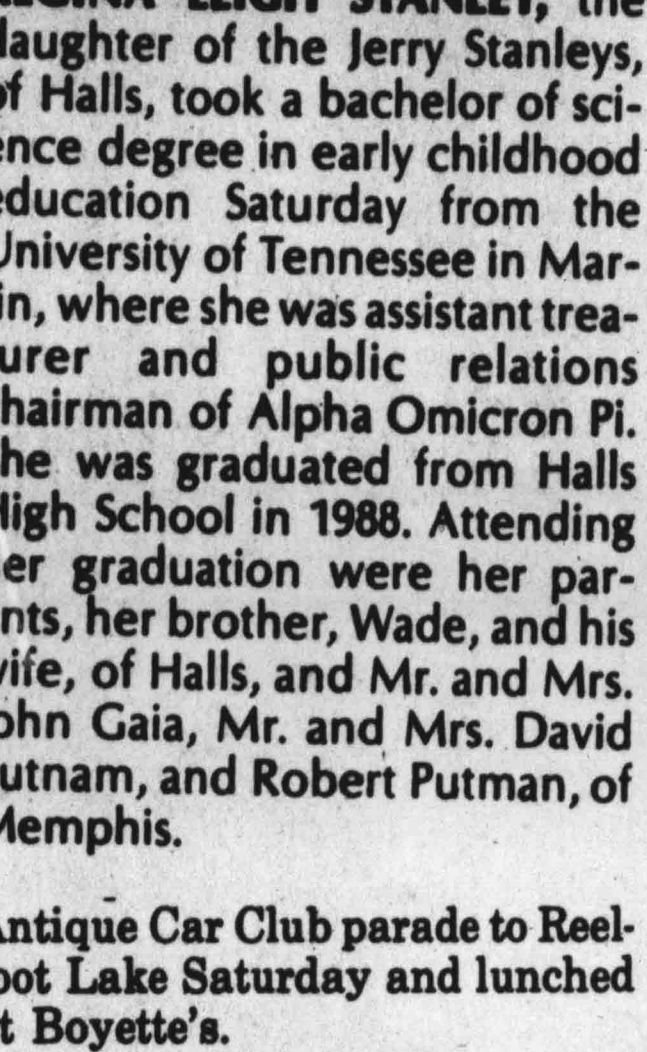

Class I wastes include: domestic, commercial, institutional, municipal, construction/demolition, and farming wastes; discarded automotive tires, and small dead animals...
 - Special Wastes
- ...Rule 1200-1-7-.01(2) defines special waste as including sludges, bulky wastes, pesticide wastes, medical wastes, industrial wastes, hazardous wastes which are not subject to regulations under Department Rules 1200-1-14-.03 through 1200-1-11-.07, liquid wastes, friable asbestos wastes, combustion wastes, and other solid waste that are either difficult or dangerous to manage and require extraordinary management...
- We urge you to study this issue. Attend the public meeting to be held by the Lauderdale County Commission at which you may listen, ask questions, or state your opinion.

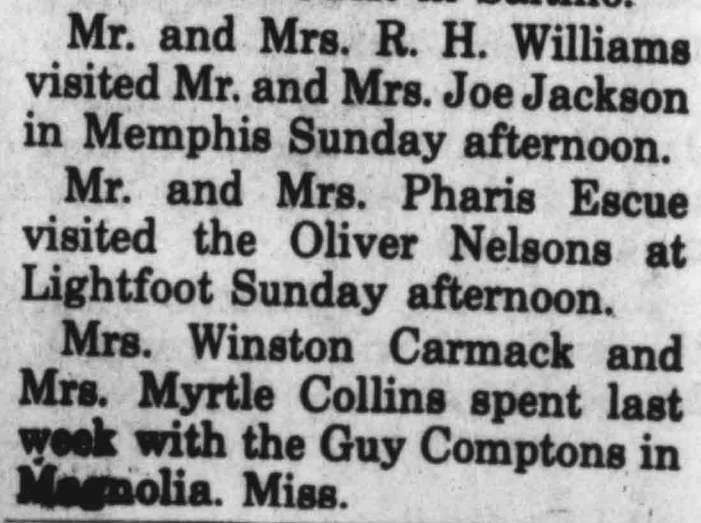

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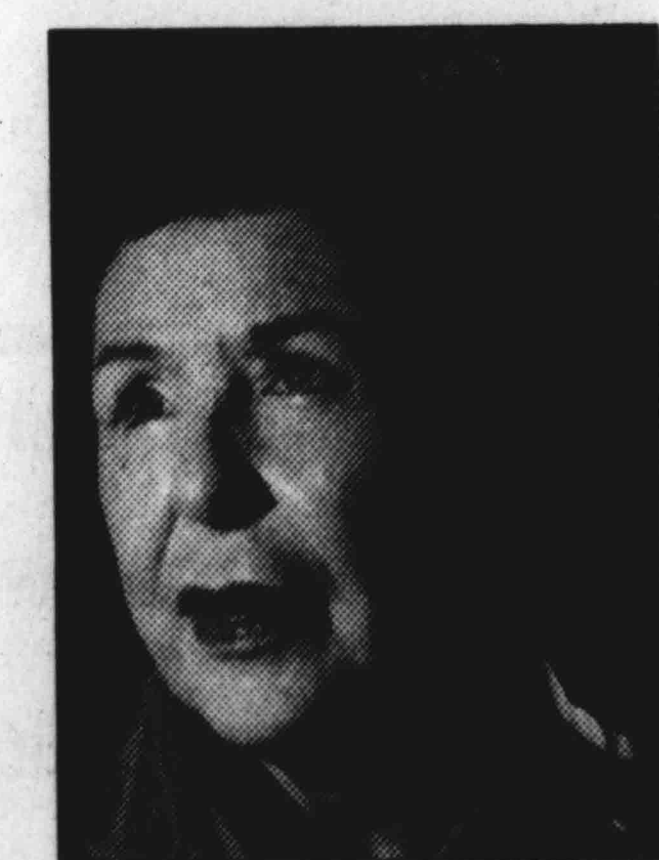
